

## All administ. Mr. 1911 rehired for 1982

pens to the proposal to increase the millage for Cass City Schools April 30, all present members of the administration will be rehired for the 1982-83 school

That was one of the issues decided in a special meeting of the board Tuesday afternoon at the school. In addition the board is prepared to drastically curtail bus transportation next year as the only solution they see to relieve the \$550,000 budget shortage that the failure of a favorable vote April 30 on the increase in millage will

It's probable that a majority of the board would prefer half days to restricting transportation, but there is little chance of State approval of this method of cost cutting, Supt. Don Crouse

However, an attempt to gain permission for half days will probably be tried

The board also is saying by its vote Tuesday that Evergreen and Deford schools will definitely be operated in 1982-83.

The reason for the decision at this time is that Public Act 183 requires 90 days notice to administrators if they are to be pink slipped. That means that first notice had to be mailed about April

Since the board voted not to notify the administrators the non-action means in effect that they will be rehired for the next school

The vote was 5-1 with President Geraldine Prieskorn voting no and Trustee J.D. Tuckey absent.' In the original discussion there were only four board members present.

A vote among the four to send preliminary notices to all administrators except the superintendent and principals of the high school,

takes a majority of the seven-person board to pass a measure.

Hurried phone calls to Dr. E. Paul Lockwood and Dr. Ed Scollon brought them to the meeting for the decision that was reached.

Mrs. Prieskorn's vote not to guarantee administrative jobs was to keep the school's options open for action at a later date.

In the original list of cuts that could be used to save money, the elimination of the assistant high school principal would have saved \$13,800. For eliminating a high school counsellor the savings are \$17,850 yearly and an intermediate counselor, \$21,400. That's a total

These are net costs figuring that the administrators would go back to teaching in the system and because of length of service be paid more than the teachers they replaced.

the district can use some \$100,000 earned from the State for reimbursement for transportation this year.

With the elimination of the possibility of cutting administrative staff and the closing of Deford and Evergreen schools, other possible cuts outlined by the superintendent would total about \$200,000. That still leaves the district \$350,000 short of a balanced budget, not figuring the latest cuts in State Aid that Gov. Milliken has

proposed. The \$100,000 from the State earned last year could be applied to the deficit leaving \$250,000 to be saved, probably from transportation which translates in today's costs to over half the service now offered.

Trustee Ben Hobart asked what happens if the 12.9 renewal millage fails. If that money isn't voted the only thing left would be to run the school for a few months till the money ran out and then close.

The Human Development Commission in Caro was expected to submit a bid to run the program, but didn't.

Money to operate the SYEP will come from two federal Comprehensive Employment and Training Act programs.

Title IV money will total \$470,000, which will fund 345 jobs for economically disadvantaged youngsters ages 14-21 who are in-school.

Of the total, \$20,000 will be spent for administration, \$40,050 for service for the participants and the rest for wages and fringe benefits. They will receive the minimum wage of \$3.35 an hour.

\$100,000 will fund 75 jobs for economically disadvantaged out-of-school youth ages Of the total, \$99,500 will be

Title II-R funds totaling

spent for wages and fringe benefits and the rest for services. (Administrative costs will be covered out of the Title IV funds.)

Students will be able to apply for jobs through their schools starting in April. Out-of-school youths should contact the Huron ISD in Bad Axe.





Friday evening appointed Jerome Root Jr. as the new fire chief

He will be the first chief of the department to be paid to serve in the position part-

His appointment is in apparent conflict with the fire department bylaws that say the department members will elect their chief.

The board accepted the resignation of Dave Mc-Naughton who had served as chief since January of last

Root will be paid \$5,500 a year, according to township Supervisor Jack Gallagher. Previously, chiefs were paid \$250 annually in addition to the \$4 an hour they received for fighting fires, the same as all firemen.

Root won't receive anything beyond the \$5,500. He will be setting his own hours, Gallagher said.

The supervisor explained the board felt the job of fire chief had grown to the point where it was too much work for someone to do on an asneeded basis.

If the board's deciding to appoint the fire chief puts it in conflict with the fire department bylaws, he said, then the bylaws will have to be changed.

The change was announced at the regular fire department meeting Monday evening.

McNaughton told the fied Township Clerk Carol Ware prior to the township board's March 8 meeting that he was thinking of stepping down.

He decided to resign, he explained, because his job at his time and also involves some traveling.

He plans to remain as a at its April 12 meeting.

Board at a special meeting also serves as an emergency medical technician for the Cass City Area Ambulance Service on a limited basis. At one time, he handled all the scheduling for the am-

## Statewide school tests show rare improvement

By Warren M. Hoyt Mich. Press Association

Reading and mathematic scores at all three grade levels tested statewide have improved since last year, marking only the third time in the 13-year assessment program that scores improved in all areas.

The assessment tests, checking minimal skills in both reading and math, are given each fall to fourth, seventh and 10th graders. They also show girls demonstrating better skills than boys, the State Board of Education reported.

Although scores are up, and education officials praised the public system for the achievement, State Superintendent of Public Instruction Phillip Runkel, concerned whether the progress can continue, said districts are experiencing their greatest reductions ever in the number of teach-

Runkel also said he is concerned with budget cuts at the state and federal levels, particularly in some

federal programs which have targeted aid to urban districts and helped raise Detroit's scores.

The state superintendent said the biggest disappointment in the tests is the relatively large number of students not meeting minimal skill levels for mathematics in the seventh and 10th grades, more than 40 percent in each grade.

Only 50.4 percent of the seventh graders demonstrated minimal skills in math (up from 48.7 percent) while 58.5 percent of the tenth graders had acceptable scores (up from 57.7 percent).

At the fourth grade level, 74.2 percent (up from 72.3 percent) had acceptable

In reading, 72.9 percent (up from 70.9 percent) of the fourth graders had acceptable scores while 77.9 percent of the seventh graders (up from 76.7 percent) and 76.3 percent of the 10th graders (up from 73.3 percent) had acceptable scores.

Edmund Vandette, a state school board member from Houghton, added that it is rather amazing that schools require two years of physical education but not two years of science or math.

The tests marked the third straight year girls outscored boys in reading and math, although in reading the gap narrows at the seventh and 10th grade levels.

## New church bells debut on Palm Sunday

Church will be alive with the sound of bells Palm Sunday,

That is the day when the church's new adult and vouth bell choirs make their

It was a gift from family and friends of the late Ella croft, who died last year,

The First Presbyterian bells and hence, the bell choirs, possible.

The two octave set, a total of 25 bells, cost \$2,000, according to Rev. Harry Capps. They arrived last October. A plate on the handle of each is engraved, "In memory of Ella Croft, October, 1981.'

Conductor of the bell which made purchase of the choirs is Marilyn Peters,

who, as she put it, was "recruited" by Rev. Capps for the job. She is a member of the church's adult choir and conductor of its children's choir.

In preparation for the arrival of the bells, she attended one-day workshops at Michigan State University and in Detroit.

The members of the bell

choirs volunteered and range from the church organist to some who couldn't read a note of music. The latter have learned to recognize their notes as they follow the music, the key signatures and to watch the conductor.

Practice began in November and has continued since, except for three weeks off at

Each choir practices for 45 minutes to an hour each Thursday, starting with the adult group at 4 and the junior and senior high group

Christmas time.

"Considering we never played bells before, it's starting to sound like something," Mrs. Peters commented at the March 18 practice session.

WHAT IS REFERRED to as English type handbell ringing began in England in the 17th century as a simple means of practicing change

Change ringing is ringing of from 5-12 tower bells in a certain order by men pulling ropes attached to the bells.

It was sometimes cold and damp in the towers on rehearsal nights, plus the clanging of the bells -- especially when someone new was "learning the ropes" -- disturbed the neighbors.

Thus the use of handbells was developed, which enabled bell ringing to be learned and practiced indoors. The downstroke of the handbell represents the backstroke of the tower bell and vice versa.

THE CHANGE RINGERS began experimenting with tune ringing of the handbells and by the 18th century in England, larger sets of handbells were being cast

The popularity of handbell ringing reached its peak in the 19th century. Interest waned in the early part of the 20th century, but has been revived since World

English handbells are thought to have been introduced in the United States in the 1830s, but didn't become widely known until the Beacon Hill Ringers were organized in Boston in 1923.

The American Guild of English Handbell Ringers was founded in 1954 and by the mid-1960s, it was estimated there were more than 1,000 bell choirs in the United States and over 10,000 bell ringers.

AS FOR THE TWO NEWest bell choirs, both will be performing at the Palm Sunday sérvices at First Presbyterian and the youth choir at the Easter Sunday service.

Probably just the adult bell choir is scheduled to perform for the Cass City branch of the American Association of University Women in May.

Both choirs are learning the same music, though they will play different numbers Palm Sunday.

Some music is available especially adapted for bell ringing, Mrs. Peters explained. In lieu of that, piano music can be used, since most of it is in the same range.

Each bell has a different sound, ranging from low G to high G, like on a piano keyboard. The smaller the bell, the higher the sound and vice versa.

The church may some day acquire a third octave of bells. Some bell choirs have four or five octaves, which in addition to more bells, requires more persons to play

Each person in the First Presbyterian group has three bells to ring except for the person with the low notes, who has four bells. BELL RINGING APpears easy, according to

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## Your Neighbor says Many jobs but low pay in Oklahoma City

Business is booming in Oklahoma City, Okla., according to Irene Doerr, but if you go there, don't expect to get rich.

She and her sister, Marilyn Young of Caro, returned home Saturday after visiting their sons there, Mike Doerr and Chuck Hover, respectively.

The two young men, unable to find steady employment in this area, Mrs. Doerr said, arrived in Oklahoma City March 29 of last year and found jobs the same day.

Mike, 23, is now employed as a lab technician for Coca Cola and Chuck works for an oil company

Although jobs are plentiful there, she said -- the Sunday newspaper there contained an entire section of job openings -- the common starting salary is the minimum wage of \$3.35 an hour. Her son started at that level, but since has received

some pay increases. Jobs that are hard to get are in the oil business,

because they pay more. Although pay is low, Mrs. Doerr observed, the cost of living doesn't appear to be less. One exception is gasoline. Regular was selling for 98 cents a gallon.

Mrs. Doerr observed there are a lot of fast food restaurants in Oklahoma City, a lot of churches and a lot of construction.

The weather is very nice, 77 degrees when the two women arrived for their week's stay and 80 degrees when they left Saturday. Flowers were in blossom and homeowners were working on their lawns. "I would say they're four weeks ahead of us."

Mrs. Doerr and her husband, Jack, live at 6720 Third Street. In addition to Mike, they have one other son, Jim, who lives with his wife, Brenda, in Kingston.



PRODUCTION AND EMployment are down at all Walbro carburetor plants "and don't let anyone tell you you can't lay off people in Japan.

The worldwide market for chainsaws, he said, is down 50 percent from its peak in late 1979 and early 1980. Walbro is developing new

products, all related to fuel systems, for all of its plants, he said.

The firm employs about 215 hourly and salaried workers in Cass City. The Caro fuel pump plant employs 125 and Arjay Manufacturing plastics plant in Bad Axe, 50, for total upper Thumb employment by Wal-

(The biggest employer in Cass City is General Cable with about 335-340 employees, salaried and hourly,

working three shifts.) One strike against any Michigan community in attracting business, Althaver said, has been its high labor, workers' compensation and unemployment compensation costs.

The Lions have responded generously to Murakami's request. In the first five months of his term of office-which ends on June 30-nearly 700,000 trees have been planted and it is estimated that approximately 1.5 million will be planted in all.

## Firewood grows in 10 years

In fact, you can produce your own firewood in 10 years or less - if you plant hybrid poplar or cottonwood trees. They're the fastest growing trees you can grow. Hybrid poplars will thrive

in any part of the state. Cottonwoods are less tolerant of cold weather, but they'll grow well anywhere in the lower peninsula, ac-University professor and forestry specialist Donald Dickmann.

"Another advantage to growing hybrid poplars or cottonwoods is that they do not need to be replanted," Dickmann explains. "The trees regenerate themselves by sending out sprouts from the stumps after harvest."

Other trees, such as oak or hickory, produce fuelwood that is more dense (with a higher heat value -- more BTUs per cord) than poplar or cottonwood. Because they burn faster, you will need more cottonwood or poplar

With three to five acres of acre to one-half acre, every year for seven to 10 years. A hybrid poplar or cottonwood plantation will grow on almost any kind of soil, but medium-textured sandy loam is best. Above all, cording to Michigan State avoid planting on soils with poor drainage or in low areas where water stands

and severe frost is likely. "Spray the site with a broadspectrum contact or systemic herbicide in late summer or early fall before you intend to plant," Dickmann said. "Herbicide can be applied to the entire site or only in the rows where you intend to plant tress."

After the herbicide takes effect, the site should be plowed and disked. If the plot is small, rototilling may be practical.





## Grocers can say 'no' to dirty cans

Michigan grocers have the right to refuse to cash-in unsanitary deposit bottles and cans under a law which went into effect last week.

The new law also allows grocers to "say no" to Michigan shoppers who want to cash-in more than \$25 worth of bottles and cans on any given day.

Public Act 39 of 1982, signed into law by Gov. William Milliken March 16, amends the state's mandatory deposit law. That law was passed in public referendum in November, 1976.

## Milk price the same in February .

Michigan milk producers received an average of \$14.10 per hundredweight (cwt.) for milk this past 🕻 February, according to the Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. This price level was unchanged from a year earlier.

February milk production totaled 398 million pounds, up 4 percent from the previous year. Cow numbers, at 394,000 head, were down from last month but remained up nearly 1 percent from last year. Milk per cow during February, at 1,010 pounds, was up nearly 4 percent from a year ago. Slaughter cow prices aver-

aged \$36.90 per cwt., down 16 percent from a year earlier. At the national level, Feb-

ruary milk production totaled 10.3 billion pounds, up 2 percent from a year earlier. Production per cow averaged 937 pounds, 6 pounds above a year ago.

Increases in milk output per cow continue to shrink. However, total milk cow numbers remained up 1 percent from February,

## Farm computers

In the mid-1950s when I came to Tuscola County, the closest thing to a computer was a slide rule, adding machine and a comptome-

I used all of these plus plenty of pencil calculations to find answers.

Prior to the Michigan State University Computerized Farm Record Keeping and Business Analysis Telfarm system's development in 1962, I did all the calculations by hand. In the last 10 years, hand

calculators and other more complex hardware along with subsequent computer programs have been developed.

Home and office computers are now in the forefront and will become common farm business management

Many county extension offices have computer terminals and even programmable calculators. Tuscola County has both and is capable of running a large number of programs for farm and non-farm business

One such program we call Telcal Program 80. It's a good one, in fact one of the most useful computer programs yet to come down the pike. It is useful to both farm business and lending agen-

Program 80 provides monthly cash flow and resource budgeting for farm operations.

Last week I heard a short statement over the radio from U.S. Secretary of Agriculture John Block. He said that the most hazardous situation facing American

farmers today is cash flow. The farmers who can manage cash flow will be survivors.

Program 80 is available to farmers, certified public accountants, lending agencies and whoever can use the program. There is no charge at this time when goir, through your extension or

I could elaborate on what farm business data inputs and business information is needed to be plugged into the computer. However, I'm not going to at this writing.

However, if you have a good set of crop and livestock production figures, credit information, along with the income and retur information you use for in come tax purposes, a Program 80 can be run for your operation. If you don't have production costs and tax returns, the computer is automatically programmed

for averages. Program 80 can be run anytime during the year. However, now is the best time to determine your cas flow situations and 11 needed, make arrangements with your credit people to facilitate advantageous credit adjustments.





--Keep the Poison Control Center telephone number for quick reference. Long-distance callers can use a toll-free number, 1-800-572-5396. These numbers are answered 24 hours a day.

--Keep a bottle of Syrup of Ipecac on hand to use if a physician or the Poison Control Center advises you to induce vomiting. A small bottle can be bought for under \$1 without a prescription in drug stores. Do not induce vomiting unless pro-

fessionally advised to do so. Vivian said that children between the ages of 1 and 2 are most susceptible to accidental poisoning.

During 1981, Hurley received 1,097 calls about possible poisoning of children age 5 and under. Last year 207 youngsters in that age group were treated at Hurley for accidental poisoning. ## Free cheese distribution Friday

The Human Development Commission will distribute surplus cheese at two locations in Tuscola County Friday. They are St. Xavier Cabrina Catholic Church in Vassar, and the HDC, 429 Montague Street, Caro.

Distribution will begin at both locations at 10 a.m. and continue until the cheese supply is exhausted. There will be approximately 1,250 pounds of cheese in fivepound blocks at each loca-

That is the balance of HDC's allocation at this time. In Tuscola County, 3,742 pounds of cheese have previously been distributed. Attempts are being made to reach those eligible individuals who did not receive cheese at the prior distribution in Caro Feb. 23.

All households containing a person age 60 or older are eligible to receive the cheese. Also, households who are eligible to receive services through the Human Development Commission, the Department of Social Services or migrant organization are eligible.

Individuals must report to the distribution site in person and show proof of age if a senior citizen or identification that he or she is receiving food stamps, Medicaid or other public assistance.

A person may pick up cheese for another individual unable physically to go memselves, only if that person is eligible and proper identification is presented. Only one family member may receive the cheese during the distribution.

The surplus 'cheese has been made available to HDC, a local community action agency, from the federal government.
