The National Commission on Excellence in Education came up with a new grade for the nation's schools when it issued its report last week "M" for mediocre. The commission, saying

schools are threatened by "a rising tide of mediocrity,' called for a wide range of reforms, including more required courses, a longer school day and school year

and more homework. How do area high schools measure up?

As shown in the chart, their graduation requirements for the most part aren't close to what the commission recommends, which probably puts them with the majority of the nation's schools.

There isn't agreement that everything the commission recommended would be beneficial.

For instance, the commission recommended extending the school year to 200-220 days a year, from the 180 days required in Michigan and in most states.

"I see no purpose in(a longer year)," said Owen-

Wright. "I think our school year is sufficient."

"I suppose any time you can give more exposure (to learning), there would be some value," commented Cass City Principal Russell Richards. He cautioned, however, that a point of no return could be reached, with no value gained, if the school year is too long.

Ubly Principal Richard Holdship doubts the school year will ever be lengthened in rural districts like his own. Not only must farm youngsters work in the summers, a longer school year would be more costly.

#### REQUIRED CLASSES

Principals are exploring whether there should be more required courses in certain subject areas, but they don't necessarily agree with the recommendations of the commission.

For instance, Kingston Principal Joseph Peet has reservations about the value of a third year of science. Kingston requires two now.

But in a different subject area, he commented, would like to see our school principal Wayne offer more math."

work on expectations and standards with the time we have now, rather than lengthen the school year." For college-bound students, Owen-Gage offers four years of math, through trigonometry.

But for those not going to college, unless they want to take some of the advanced courses, there is the one year of business math. Some also take one year of prealgebra.

In contrast, North Huron offers general math, business math and consumer math. Having taught all three subjects, Wright said there is some overlap, so he has reservations about offering three years of such subjects.

Whether more math should be required is being evaluated, Wright said.

For a small school district like Owen-Gage, there is also a problem in having enough teachers for all those courses.

At one time, it offered Spanish and French. It presently doesn't have a foreign language teacher.

The problem is there aren't enough students interested to employ a full-time language teacher and Owen-

As for a longer school year, he said, "I'd say let's Gage hasn't yet been able to find one who can teach that and another needed subject.

Ubly High School has a teacher who can teach Spanish, but not enough students were interested this year to offer a class.

All the high schools have computers or have ordered them so various computer classes are in the planning stages, though not necessar-

ily at the high school level. Cass City and Kingston, for instance, are starting "computer literacy" training at the intermediate school or junior high level.

#### **HOMEWORK**

There was agreement about the value of homework, something the commission feels students don't get enough of.

Holdship feels students who care have enough. "I believe students who are in school to learn and care about their education have enough homework every evening."

Wright feels students should have a minimum of 1½ hours of homework a night. They don't always

have that now at Owen-Gage, but the second year principal is aiming toward the day when teachers will be required to assign homework to their students.

"I guess it's a question of whether you want to get by or excel," Richards commented. The amount of homework students are assigned varies from class to class and week to week.

Students have time to do after class assignments in study hall. Cass City has a seven period day. Ninth and 10th graders are required to take six classes, so most have one study hall a day. Eleventh and 12th graders must take five classes. The average is six, which means that some have two study halls per day. Some students do take seven classes.

A seven-period day, with the implication that students have seven classes per day (newspaper accounts didn't say) was one of the recommendations of the commis-





It's rare that we agree with the scripture as handed down from on high by President Ronald Reagan. Old double R and I seldom see eye to eye.

Once in awhile there is a grain of wheat in the sea of chaff. Education is a good example.

Reagan's plan for aid to private schools with a tuition tax credit is a bad idea and very probably violates the constitution. Prayer in school violates the civil rights of all non-Christians. His attempt to close down the Federal Department of Education would be fine if only the department closed and the funds for schools remained the same or are increased.

The recent report by the distinguished panel of educators and leaders said in no uncertain terms that we face a crisis in educa-

It recommended among other things that schools be open 220 days a year instead of 180 and that schools stay open seven hours a day instead of 5½ or six.

The panel suggests that this country is behind all industrial nations in the quantity and quality of education, especially in math and science.

The answer isn't to pour tax dollars from Washington into school systems. There are myriad of these programs now, all tied with bundles of red tape and rethat burestrictions aucracies always create.

A giant step forward would be to dish that money to local districts and let the districts use the money for education.

That would be a step forward, but catching up with the rest of the world isn't

A big hurdle in lengthen-

ing the school day and the school year is the teachers. In a panel discussion, a head of one of the unions said on national TV that the teachers need the summer months off to rejuvenate themselves.

What is needed is what she called "quiet time" to teach without interference. Reading between the lines, that means eliminating the slow learners and the discipline students from the class

That's a radical suggestion for this country, but it's one that may be necessary if we are to improve. In foreign countries you earn the right to qualify for college prep courses and in these courses you earn the right to go to college. That system may be one that we will have to adopt if we are to retain our place in high technology.

Teachers will have to change. Summers off may be a luxury that we no longer can afford.

The average taxpayer will have to change, too. There has to be a realization that all of this will cost more money. It's a case of spending money to make money.

That may be an even bigger hurdle than asking teachers to adopt a new work schedule.

The taxpayers will plead poverty and blame it on the way our schools are operated. The teachers will have equally compelling reasons for saying that any lengthening of the school year is virtually impossible.

It's not impossible as our foreign competitors have shown. But it just might be impossible in the United States until things get so bad that we can no longer bury our head in the sand.

Otherwise, there will always be the danger that someday I'll be terribly embarrassed by a phone call notifying me that my wife is lying on her back in the A&P, pumping beans.





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

#### Automation. part II

After my last week's column about automation appeared in print, I read David Halberstam's article, "Robots Enter Our Lives," in the April 10 issue of Parade nagazine. (I am obviously behind in my reading.)

He used the same story I did concerning the late Walter Reuther, though the details differ.

to Halber-According stam's version, the then president of the United Auto Workers was visiting an auto plant in Cleveland and a "young manager began to talk excitedly of a new process they had for auto-nating the line."

Reuther finally interrupted. "And tell me," he asked the manager, "these wonderful robots -- will they go out and buy cars from your company?

That was probably 20 years ago. Reuther would probably spin in his grave if he knew about the new Nissan (Datsun) truck plant ın Smyrna, Tenn. --2,000 employees, none of whom belong to the UAW, and 220 robots.

Halberstam's outlook for the future of blue collar employment is gloomy. "A factory job in the new era may be more pleasant than in the past, but it will be a much harder job to get."

Not only will American workers lose jobs to automaion, he writes, many Ameridan firms will build their new highly automated plants in Asia, "which means, finally, fewer and fewer industrial jobs at

He quotes a Massachusetts Institute of Technology research associate who fears "that a vast and oncerosperous core of the nation -- Michigan, Indiana, Qhio, Illinois and western Pennsylvania -- will become 'a new Appalachia.'

Halberstam mentions two other experts, from Carnegie-Mellon University in Pittsburgh, who predict that by 1990, "robots -- in conjunction with other automation -- could, by attrition, internal shifts and retraining, affect some 3 million

jobs in American industry.' The author concludes gloomily, "A generation of blue collar workers may be stranded on their own shores. A new, exciting economy beckons, but who will be able to enter it? Our education system is hopelessly ill-equipped to prepare people already on the margin for a place in the new economy

A more optimistic outlook comes from a study prepared by H. Allan Hunt and Timothy L. Hunt for the W.E. Upjohn Institute for Employment Research in Kalamazoo.

"Futurists and others compete for media attention with wild projections of the impacts of robotics -- 800,000 people making robots, 1.5 million technicians maintaining robots, and millions of workers displaced -- with little or no consideration of the practical issues involved," they write.
Instead, the Hunt and

Hunt study predicts a "1990 U.S. robot population of 50,000-100,000 units, representing an annual growth rate of 30-40 percent. From this it is estimated that 100,000-200,000 jobs would be eliminated directly and that 32,000-64,000 new jobs would be created.'

Out of the total American work force of perhaps 85 million (my guess), a loss of 68,000-168,000 jobs isn't that much percentagewise.

However, Hunt and Hunt are somewhat in agreement with Halberstam about who will be hurt by the new technological revolution.

"The jobs eliminated are semi-skilled or unskilled," the Kalamazoo researchers point out, "while the jobs created require significant technical background. Any increase in unemployment is likely to be felt by new labor market entrants, by the less educated and the less experienced part of the labor





## Novesta upset over valuation change

Novesta Township officials aren't pleased with the factor added to boost agricultural valuations in the

Supervisor Bill O'Dell reported to the township board Monday evening that he had sent out 125 notices to agriproperty owners lowering their valuations a total of \$240,000.

He felt the decrease was justified due to economic conditions and farm prices, according to Clerk Nursie Kloc. The reduction was approved by the board of re-

The county equalization report approved April 26 by the county board of commissioners, prepared by the county equalization department, imposed a factor (percentage increase) of 1.3114, which brought the agricultural values almost to where they were, "and we're very unhappy about it," Mrs. Kloc said.

The factor was based on equalization department studies, needed to bring values to 50 percent of true cash value, which were in disagreement with O'Dell's

In other action, the board decided to have the county ville Roads.

Road Commission apply 1,000 cubic yards of gravel on Dodge Road, north of Deckerville Road, at a cost of approximately \$3,000 for the gravel, plus labor.

The board also approved payment of \$4,500 to the Road Commission as the first installment for repair of the one mile of Gilford Road between Cemetery and Englehart Roads.

The township board signed the contract for the project at its April meeting. Cost is supposed to be \$8,750, plus and equipment

charges. Cass City Oil and Gas owner Duane Chippi appeared at the board meeting to discuss two drainage problems, one at his firm's fuel oil storage yard on Cemetery Road. where water accumulates.


O'Dell will check with the Road Commission about having the property drain into the roadside ditches or with the drain commissioner about having it drain into the Spencer Drain at the rear of the property.

## Cass City to test own water supply

Testing Cass City's drinking water for purity is going to be cheaper and quicker. Gundega Ozols, laboratory certification officer from the Michigan Department of Public Health (DPH), inspected the village's sewage treatment plant laboratory last Thursday to determine if it could meet the standards for testing of the village's water supply.

It met the requirements and she has now recommended to her superiors that the lab be certified. Approval is expected in about two weeks.

The lab is normally used to conduct tests to determine if the sewage plant is operating properly in removing pollutants from wastewater before the effluent is poured into the Cass River.

During the planning stages, village Superintendent Lou LaPonsie explained, it was decided to add equipment for testing the drinking water supply, so that was included in the total \$6 million cost of the plant, paid for with federal, state and local funds.

### School board in Kingston being sued

The Kingston Board of Education is the defendant in a lawsuit filed April 20 in Tuscola County Circuit Court concerning an incident that supposedly hap-pened almost nine years

ago.
Plaintiff is Tony Lee Crittenden, now living in Caro. The suit says he was a student at Kingston Elementary School on or about Oct 14, 1974, when he fell from a piece of playground equipment and hit his elbow and arm on the concrete founda-

These days Uncle George is a lot more grouchy than he used to be. The mere mention of dentures causes him to mutter about 3 or 4 "fool" dentists who couldn't fit him properly with "fool" plates.

The difference, of course, between Aunt Millie and Uncle George is the type of pride which they displayed. Aunt Millie's pride was constructive. It caused her to have the patience to develop the skills necessary to successfully manipulate the artificial teeth.

Uncle George's pride was destructive. When he couldn't immediately master the dentures, it literally stuck in his craw. In Uncle George's mind, the "manly" thing to do is blame the dentist or the dentures. But deep inside, he feels defeated for the first time in his life and it sure makes him grumpy. If Uncle George is ever going to successfully chew with his dentures, he's going to have to swallow his pride first. Time and patience are essential to developing the motor skills needed to successfully wear dentures.

In my next article, I will suggest specific techniques to improve Uncle George's chances for success.

### Children don't always follow parents' drinking

Contrary to popular notion, the children of problem drinkers are unlikely to follow their parents' drinking habits, says a University of Michigan public health researcher.

His findings are based on a detailed study of the drinking habits of adults and their parents in Tecumseh, southwest of Ann Arbor. 'The conventional wis-

dom is that the parents' behavior sets the course of a child's drinking career, especially in the case of the problem drinker," says Ernest Harburg, Ph.D., research scientist of epidemiology and psychology and director of the Urban Health Research Program. "But this study counters that

Harburg and his colleagues, Deborah Davis, MPH, and Roberta Caplan, Ph.D., found that children tended to follow their parents' drinking behavior except when their parents were at either extreme of the drinking spectrum either abstainers or very heavy drinkers. In those cases, the number of children imitating their parents' behavior fell off.

The researchers suggest that the children of parents who either abstained or were problem drinkers broke away from their parents' behavior "because in both cases their parents' drinking style was a source of stress. Children of abstainers were at odds with the community norm. Children of very heavy drinkers appear to have been responding to the stresses of alcohol-caused problems within the family."

The respondents labeled their parents as abstainers, or rare, light, moderate, heavy or very heavy drink-

They labeled their own drinking, and calculated how much beer, wine and liquor they consumed each week. From this information, the researchers were able to determine the community norm. That is, what the community considered to be light, moderate or heavy drinking.

The researchers analyzed the information for relationships between mothers and daughters, mothers and sons, fathers and daughters, and fathers and sons.

Children tended to follow their parents' drinking behavior except at the extremes. Children of light drinkers drank lightly, children of moderate drinkers drank moderately and so on. This imitation was most apparent for the behavior of the same-sex parent -- like father, like son

But children of teetotalers usually drank and children of very heavy drinkers did not drink as much as their parents. This inverse relationship was especially true in response to the oppositesex parent. For example, daughters of heavy drinking

Parents need to be made aware that how much they drink will influence how much their children drink, says Harburg, and that even moderate alcohol users can have alcohol use problems. Moderate drinking by a pregnant woman, for instance, can lead to fetal alcohol syndrome, a leading alcohol syndrome, a leading cause of mental retardation Szarapski

A special group at risk may be children of abstainers. "Problems may occur because they have not been because they have not been taught moderate drinking third place habits; they are pressured by norms and attitudes outside the family to drink and carry with them a standard of drinking as an 'all or nothing' affair," suggests in woodworking at the Mich-Harburg.

The good news, says Harburg, is that many children thought to be at risk of becoming alcoholics, based on their parents' drinking habits, will in fact likely turn away from the drinking style that causes distress within the family.







Cow numbers increased to 402,000 head, up 2.5 percent from a year ago. Monthly milk output per cow averaged 1,150 pounds, up 30 pounds from March 1982.

Milk producers in Michigan received an average of \$13.80 per hundredweight (cwt.) for their milk in March, down 10 cents from a year earlier. March slaughter cow prices averaged \$43.20 per cwt., up 10 percent from a year earlier.

The quantity of grain and other concentrates fed to milk cows on April 1 averaged 16.2 pounds per cow, up 6 percent from a year ago. The value of this ration averaged \$7.10 per cwt., up 50 cents per cwt. from the previous year.

Nationally, March milk production totaled 12.0 billion pounds, up 3 percent from a year earlier. Production per cow averaged 1,087 pounds, 23 pounds above last year. Total milk cows averaged 11.1 million

### Farm share is 35 percent

The farmer gets an average of 35 cents of each dollar spent for domestic foods purchased at the supermarket, according to the Michigan Farm Bureau.

He only gets 28 cents of the overall food dollar, which includes fish and imports and food purchased away from home as well as at the supermarket. That's well below the 32 cents paid for labor after the food leaves the farm gate.

A further breakdown shows that 8 cents of each food dollar goes for packaging, 5 cents for intercity transportation of the food, 41/2 cents for rent and depreciation, 4 cents for fuels and electricity, 2 cents for advertising, 2 cents for interest, 11/2 cents for repairs and 81/2 cents for "other costs." That last item includes property taxes, insurance, accounting and professional services, promotion, bad debts and other miscellan-
