## 3 more Edison votes set

Detroit Edison franchise elections will take place Tuesday in Novesta, Kingston and Brookfield townships.

In addition, voters in Novesta will be asked to approve a half-mill tax increase for five years for fire protection. The levy, if approved, will begin with December, 1984, tax bills.

The state constitution requires franchise elections to be held every 30 years. Approval gives Detroit Edison the right to operate within the township, such as to run power lines across public roads.

The utility is paying the entire cost of the election except in Novesta, where it is paying part. The township pays the rest because of the millage proposal.

If approved, the levy will raise about \$7,000 annually, according to Supervisor Bill O'Dell. The money will be used to pay the standby fee to Elkland Township for fire protection from its fire department.

Novesta presently pays the standby fee out of its general fund. The fee for the present fiscal year, until June 30, 1984, is \$6,300. (The board does not have to levy the full amount of the millage.)

When the board voted in September to seek the millage, O'Dell said its passage would enable the township to spend more money for other purposes, such as roads.

Voting hours in all three townships are 7 a.m.-8 p.m. Voting places are the Novesta Township hall in Deford, Kingston Township hall in Wilmot and community building in Owendale.

## Teachers hit bricks for informational picketing

Cass City teachers Monday began what they called "informational picketing" to inform the public they are working without a contract.

The picketing in front of the intermediate school Monday ended before most children arrived at school, having lasted from 7 to about 7:50 a.m.

Cass City Education Association President Don Schelke said it would be done each day before school through Friday.

The next bargaining session, which will be with a

## Driver escapes as car is demolished

A Deford woman, though injured, managed to walk away after her car ran over a bridge guardrail, went airborne and crash landed on the far side of the creek.

Injured was Jacqueline Kay Yost, 19, of 6950 Deckerville Road, who was reported in fair condition Tuesday afternoon at Saginaw General Hospital.

The accident, reported to have taken place at 2:30 a.m. Saturday, took place at the Deckerville Road bridge over Mud Creek, .3 mile east of Cemetery

Road.

Sheriff's deputies reported she was eastbound when her car went off the north side of the road, ran over the guardrail at the approach to the bridge and traveled 72 feet through the air before coming to a halt against the abutment on the opposite side of the creek.

The accident was reported to the sheriff's department from Hills and Dales General Hospital at 4:12 a.m. Officers at the accident scene said Ms. Yost walked to a nearby house

after the accident and the occupants took her to the Cass City hospital, from which she was transferred to Saginaw General.

The Elkland Township Fire Department was called to the scene in case the car started burning.

## Await contract vote

# Judge prodded teams reach strike accord

Tuscola Intermediate School District professional personnel returned to work Monday, the result of a tentative agreement having been reached Friday. They had been on strike 11 days.

Even if the agreement hadn't been reached, classes at the Tuscola Area Skill Center and Highland Pines School and various special education services would have resumed, Tuscola County Circuit Judge Patrick R. Joslyn having ruled last Thursday the union members had to go back to work Monday even if no agreement was reached.

He also ruled the two sides would bargain from 9 a.m.-6 p.m. Friday and if no settlement was reached, he would oversee negotiations over the week end. The nine hours was about how long it took to reach agreement.

The 78 members of the Tuscola Intermediate Education Association, who were represented in bargaining by the Tri-County Bargaining Association,

started their strike Friday, Oct. 14.

Details of the pact won't be released until after it has been ratified by both sides.

TISD Supt. Bruce Dunn and TIEA President Wendy Rummell confirmed the tentative contract is for three years, but wouldn't say whether it provides for the days lost to the strike to be made up.

The 10 days lost when TIEA members struck in 1980 were made up by eliminating most scheduled vacation time.

Details of the tentative agreement were explained Sunday evening to TIEA members, who also voted then to return to work.

HOWEVER, COPIES OF the agreement wouldn't be available for each member until probably Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday of this week, she said after the meeting Sunday.

TCBA rules say that once they get their copies, at least five days must go by before they vote on it, "so people can be familiar with the contract so they know

what they're voting on," Miss Rummell explained. That means the TIEA members won't vote on the pact until some time next week.

Dunn said Monday the TISD Board of Education won't vote on the tentative agreement until after the union members vote. If the board waits until its next regular meeting, the vote won't be until Nov. 21.

The TISD board still must reach agreement with the Michigan Educational Support Personnel Association, which represents its paraprofessional employees (teacher aides, bus drivers, secretaries, etc.). The board has requested the services of a state mediator and is now waiting to hear from him, according to Jerome Thienes, TISD assistant superintendent.

The TISD bargaining team Friday consisted of Dunn, Thienes, one board member in the morning and another in the afternoon, plus several other administrators, and its hired negotiator, Al Luce.

The TCBA team consisted of four TIEA members, including Miss Rum-

mell, and Lee Longfield of the Michigan Education Association.

The two teams were in different rooms at the TISD office. Luce served as go-between carrying proposals back and forth.

THE SETTLEMENT Friday came after numerous negotiating sessions. What made the difference?

"I think when we got to a meeting of the minds, we had an agreement," Dunn responded.

"There was a lot of bargaining going on Friday that should have been going on in the first place," Miss Rummell commented.

Neither felt that the threat of having to negotiate over the week end was a factor in reaching a settlement Friday.

The judge told those at the hearing Thursday, if no settlement was reached the next day, "I suggest you bring your dirty bags (Saturday) and I intend to have marathon negotiations." He also ordered that all members of the TISD board be there.

The purpose of the hearing was for the TISD board. Please turn to page 18.

## 9-year-old winning fight with cancer

Bob Broecker has a disease he will never find in his third grade spelling book -- rhabdomyosarcoma.

It is a type of cancer that mostly affects the soft tissues of the bodies of children. It has affected his optic nerve, leaving him blind in the left eye.

Since the disease was diagnosed in July, the nine-year-old son of Arnold and Rachel Broecker of Downington Road, Decker, has spent many days in the hospital and will be making many more hospital visits before his treatment is scheduled to end next June.

If all goes well, his doctors have told him, the only permanent reminder of his ordeal will be the permanent loss of vision in his left eye.

His parents have Blue Cross-Blue Shield, which pays the majority of his medical expenses. Easter Seals is paying the remainder.

There are other expenses, however, such as gasoline and hotel bills, and to help the Broeckers, Evergreen Elementary School families are putting on a pancake supper and bake sale Saturday from 5-8 p.m. at the school in Shabbona.

The youngster has been undergoing treatment at William Beaumont Hospital in Royal Oak, which is about 170 miles round-trip. According to his mother, they have been there about 45 times since July. Mrs. Broecker, whose husband farms, usually does the driving. The Broeckers have four other children, all adults.

This Wednesday, Robert was scheduled to go back to Beaumont for tests to determine if he is able to take his next round of chemotherapy treatments, scheduled Nov. 7, 8 and 9. A round-trip will be made each day.

BOB'S DISEASE SURFACED in June. His nose kept running and he had a bad odor, according to his mother. The family doctor thought it was an allergy

problem, so referred him to a Saginaw specialist. The specialist couldn't fit him into his appointment schedule until August.

His condition didn't improve, so the Broeckers took him to their former family physician in Lapeer, Dr. Harry Zemmer, who examined him and told the family to take him immediately to Beaumont, which they did. That was all on Monday, July 4.

Two days later, he underwent surgery. Pus was removed through his mouth and nose. During the surgery, it was discovered the bone had deteriorated. It then took several days before the diagnosis was back, that he had cancer.

ROBERT BEGAN chemotherapy July 12 and radiation treatments the next day. His first stay in the hospital lasted two weeks. He then went there every day, except week ends, for radiation treatments, which lasted until Aug. 18. For that portion of his treatment, he now only has to go back for checkups.

The chemotherapy treatments are scheduled to last until June of next year. Chemotherapy is a liquid drug, which in Robert's case, enters his body through a needle inserted in his hand.

How long he stays in the hospital each time he undergoes chemotherapy depends on which of the four types of drug is used. For some, his mother takes him to Royal Oak and he is home the same day. Another type means a five-day stay.

THE IMMEDIATE side effect of the chemotherapy, Robert said, is "You just feel sick." Another side effect of it and the radiation is that the youngster does not have any hair, except for some fuzz, but it will eventually grow back.

The chemotherapy is supposed to kill the cancerous cells, but in the process, it also kills healthy ones, which lowers his resistance

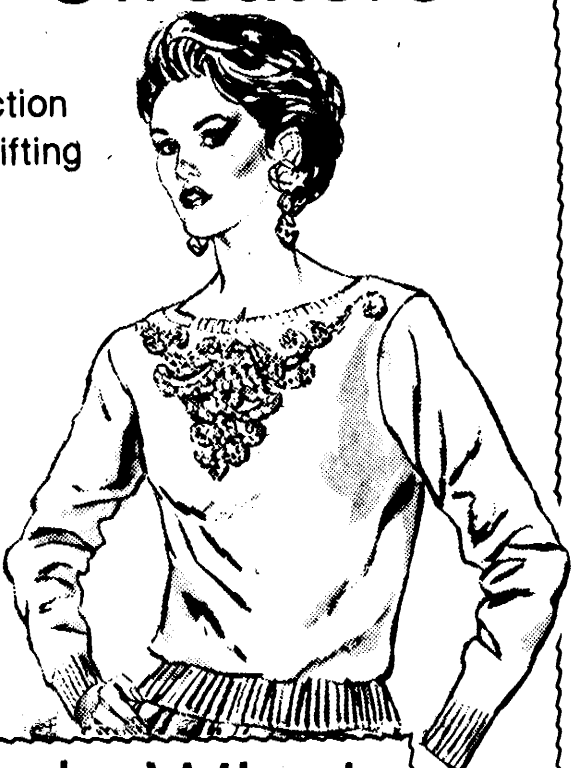

Last week end I put my body in Frankenmuth, Michigan's enchanted kingdom, where tourists flock to eat chicken dinners and buy Christmas decorations. If I were the type of columnist who put his money where his mouth is, I would have put my body in Clark Park in Detroit.

At the Frankenmuth High football game, I watched my 14-year-old granddaughter, Michele, do the same thing her mother — my daughter Karen — did 19 years earlier. Before the game, Michele played in the band, then ran inside the school to change uniforms, and returned as a cheerleader.

After her freshman year, Michele will probably have to make the same choice her mother made — band or cheerleading? Karen chose the band, and became drum major. Whichever Michele chooses, it will do her no good to implore, as she did last Friday, that her grandmother please not embarrass her by tramping over innocent spectators to get close enough to take 82 quick snapshots of her musical-genius granddaughter playing the flute.

It is astonishing to realize that the young man in my mirror is the grandfather of a high school student. And it bugs me that baby books always picture Dick and Jane's grandfather as

a white-haired old geezer wearing a straw hat and carrying a hoe. My idea of gardening is to move a vase of flowers to make room for my glass on the piano bar.

Nevertheless, I'm sappy about my grandchildren simply because that's how the Creator intended grandparents to be, to make up for hard-nosed parents. Far be it from me to upset the balance of nature, let alone deny the Kodak people the profits they need to fight family planning.

My three other grandchildren were also at the Frankenmuth game. Melissa, 10, sat a few rows ahead of me with her best friend, but every once in a while she turned around and lit up my life with a smile (speaking of sappy lyrics). Nine-year-old John scooted into view only briefly because he was busy elsewhere, losing his cap and getting mud on his shoes so his parents could harden their noses on him.

And two-year-old Emily was so excited by the game and my colorful description of it that she fell asleep in my arms. To illustrate the difference between parents and grandparents, I held that chub for 30 minutes, never once moving my aching arms for fear of awakening the little doll. If she'd been my own kid, 25 years ago, I would have dumped her on her mother after two minutes and fled the scene in search of a vase of flowers to garden.

Anyway, it was a marvelous time in Frankenmuth with my grandchildren. But should I have been there?

After all, I'm the grandfather who wrote, more than once, that if I really loved my grandchildren, I'd do everything I could, every chance I got, to prevent a nuclear war. And last week end I was invited to join the Nuclear Weapons Freeze movement in Clark Park to protest the deployment of cruise and Pershing II missiles in Europe.

That deployment is another overkill duplication and an incredible waste of resources for purely political purposes. It is one more step away from the day when my grandchildren won't have to worry about being blown up in a world gone nuts. But I didn't put my body in Clark Park, where my brain knew it should be, because I wanted to see the grandchildren who light up my sappy heart.

The irony is too obvious to belabor further. And it occurred the same week end our marines were slaughtered in the name of peace in Beirut.

It is great to watch your granddaughter lead cheers the same way your daughter did. That type of continuity provides all the immortality a person needs. But it is frightening to realize your grandson will soon be old enough to join the marines, and sometimes a sleeping baby must be awakened.

The right type of grandfather would have put his body in Clark Park, even if he had to carry a hoe.

## Extended jobless benefits approved

An estimated 325,000 jobless Michigan workers will benefit from a measure signed into law Oct. 24 extending the federally funded unemployment benefit program for another 18 months, according to S. Martin Taylor, director of the Michigan Employment Security Commission.

The extension will benefit about 300 Tuscola County residents, according to the MESC office in Caro. Eligible claimants were supposed to have received notification by postcard.

Extension of the Federal Supplemental Compensation

(FSC) program could mean over \$500 million will come into the state in the form of federal jobless benefits during the next 1½ years, benefiting three categories of jobless workers:

--Individuals who qualified for and exhausted their FSC benefits between April 1 and Oct. 22, will receive five more weeks of FSC.

--Those currently receiving FSC and who exhaust their benefits after Oct. 22 will receive four additional weeks of FSC.

--Those exhausting their regular state unemployment benefits after Oct. 22 will receive up to 14 weeks of FSC benefits.

Anyone who first qualified for FSC before April 1, 1983, is not eligible for more benefits under this new law.

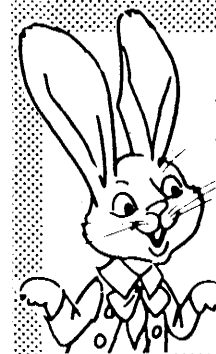
MESC offices began taking claims from eligible individuals Monday, Friday, Nov. 11, is Veterans Day and MESC offices will be closed.

The FSC program provides federally funded unemployment benefits to those who exhaust their regular state jobless benefits. The FSC program, which expired Sept. 30, was temporarily extended.

Then Congress passed and the President signed a measure extending the program through March 31, 1985. Jobless Michigan workers can now receive up to 40 weeks of unemployment benefits -- 26 weeks of state benefits and 14 weeks of FSC.

## Pedaling Around

## No easy answer

I have a feeling when the Reagan administration decided last September to send the Marines back to Lebanon, it felt their presence there would be enough to stop the bloodshed.

All the Marines would have to do is drive around, guns at the ready and the warring factions would lay down their arms, afraid to fight.

It didn't work out that way.

Now the president is promising retribution, once it is known who was responsible for the Oct. 23 massacre.

Fat chance. The bombing could have been the work of any of numerous factions in Lebanon, or some outside of the country.

If we knew, what good would it do? If we found the bombers were Shiite Moslems, would we line up everyone who is a Shiite and shoot them? That, of course, would be impossible. There are far too many of them and why should all be punished for the work of a few.

But the mad bombers may not have been Shiites. They may have been Suni or Druze Moslems, Christian Phalangists, the Palestine Liberation Organization, the Syrians, etc.

Acts of terrorism should not go unpunished, but the Israelis have been retaliating for years and they're still fighting. Retribution has its limits.

Part of the problem for the Marines in Lebanon is that the United States is backing a government that is predominantly Christian in a country where Christians are a minority.

In the United States, that wouldn't be a problem. The government doesn't change that much, no matter what religion the President is, and probably to Reagan's regret, it doesn't change that much whether the president is conservative, moderate or liberal.

Lebanon is like Northern Ireland, except that instead

of two factions fighting each other, the Catholics and the Protestants, there are many.

The easy thing to do in Lebanon would be to let all the warring factions fight each other. If they want to kill each other, that's their problem.

Unfortunately, it's not that simple. In addition to all the Lebanese groups, the Israelis are occupying part of the country and the Syrians another, and neither will leave until the other leaves first.

Israel invaded Lebanon to drive out the PLO, which has since sneaked back. Syria is backing a PLO faction that wants to get rid of the present PLO leader.

There doesn't seem to be much value in our Marines being there. The only reason they may have kept some of the Lebanese from shooting at each other is because they have been shooting at the Marines instead -- or blowing them up.

The effectiveness of the Marines is even less now, because presumably the main thing they are doing is hiding behind barricades, afraid to go out.

However bad conditions in Lebanon are, they probably would be worse if the Marines withdrew, unless it were possible to get all foreign forces to withdraw, including Israel, Syria and the PLO, but it isn't.

And, if the Marines withdrew, it would mean whatever group which killed 229 of them had accomplished its goal.

There isn't an easy answer.

## Road board defendant in lawsuit

The Tuscola County Road Commission is a defendant in a lawsuit filed by survivors of a Saginaw man who was killed in a June 12 traffic accident.

The other defendant is William L. Palm of Reese, who was the other driver involved in the accident, which took place north of Reese.

Killed was Earl M. Johnson, then 37. Plaintiffs are Sylvia Ann Johnson, as next friend of Serena and Samantha Ann Johnson, the victim's daughters; Gertrude Johnson, his mother, and Mamie Jones, his sister.

According to the suit, Johnson was driving south on Van Buren Road, didn't stop at the Gifford Road intersection because vandals had painted over the stop sign, and collided with the eastbound Palm vehicle.

The suit claims the sign was painted over on or about June 9, that the Road Commission should have known about it by the time of the accident and was therefore negligent because nothing was done.

The suit asks for damages in an amount to which the plaintiffs are found to be entitled, together with costs, interest and attorney fees, with the amount in controversy exceeding \$10,000.

## Small town a change for Methodist pastor

The churches Rev. James McCallum has served have been about the same size.

It's the communities he serves in that get smaller. The new pastor of Trinity United Methodist Church gave his first sermon there Oct. 16.

He and his wife, Cathy, came to Cass City from the United Methodist Church, Lambertville, where he served 2½ years.

Lambertville isn't really a town. It is part of Bedford Township, which has a population of about 24,000 and is on the Michigan side of the border with Ohio. Most of its working residents work in Toledo, Ohio.

Before that, Rev. McCallum was pastor of Messiah United Methodist Church in northeast Detroit for 13 years.

A native of Leonard in northern Oakland County, McCallum, 43, served a church near Port Huron as a student pastor for a year before he entered a seminary in Ohio.

While a seminary student, he served two churches his first two years and one church his last two years.

In Cass City, he replaces Rev. P. Thomas Wachterhauser, who is now at a church in Ann Arbor.

MESSIAH, WHICH HE described as "almost like a suburban church" was his first assignment as an ordained minister.

When he started there, it had about the same number of members as Trinity, which has 276 members and about 150 families.

That was before a federal court ordered that schools in Detroit be integrated by busing.

One result was that the church, which had only one black member, lost about half its membership as families moved to the suburbs to avoid busing.

Many families who stayed in Detroit put their children in parochial schools.

"The intention was good, but the result was not," Rev. McCallum said, of the busing plan. Instead of eliminating segregation, which was a goal of busing, the schools had an even higher percentage of black students.

The Detroit church was "more like a small town church. Everybody knew everybody," he commented, adding, "It was a very warm and caring place."

BUT AFTER 13 years, it was time to move on. Lambertville, Rev. and Mrs. McCallum found, was

a different place. "In Bedford Township, the people are always moving in and out."

Perhaps for that reason, the people there weren't as close as were the church members in Detroit or Cass City.

The McCallums arrived just after a new building was constructed. It was built on the theory it would attract new members. It didn't work out that way, however, and the result was a big debt. About half the budget was devoted to paying the mortgage, Rev. McCallum noted, and most church meetings dealt more with money than the work of the church.

That is one reason why he was happy to come to Cass City. "This is the first church I've been in that isn't encumbered by a mortgage."

Being at Trinity therefore represents an opportunity he didn't have before, "to be able to invest my energies in program-

ming of the church, rather than having to meet a budget."

ANOTHER REASON for coming to Cass City is that the McCallums are closer to their parents. The minister's parents live between Rochester and Imlay City. Mrs. McCallum's parents live near Yale in northern St. Clair County.

When not involved with church work, the couple likes to go camping and sailing. They own a 24-foot sailboat.

After having lived in Michigan's biggest city and what can be considered a suburb of another large city, Rev. and Mrs. McCallum haven't had trouble making the transition to a small town.

"So far we've been very happy with what we've found," Rev. McCallum said. "The people have been very friendly and very nice to us."

## AAUW members attend workshop

Mary Brown and Linda Albee, members of the Cass City branch of the American Association of University Women, attended the recent AAUW fall workshop at Central Michigan University, Mount Pleasant.

Women must first edu-

Mrs. Leimas also said women should monitor public school curriculum to encourage courses in global interdependence, conflict resolution and awareness of different cultures.

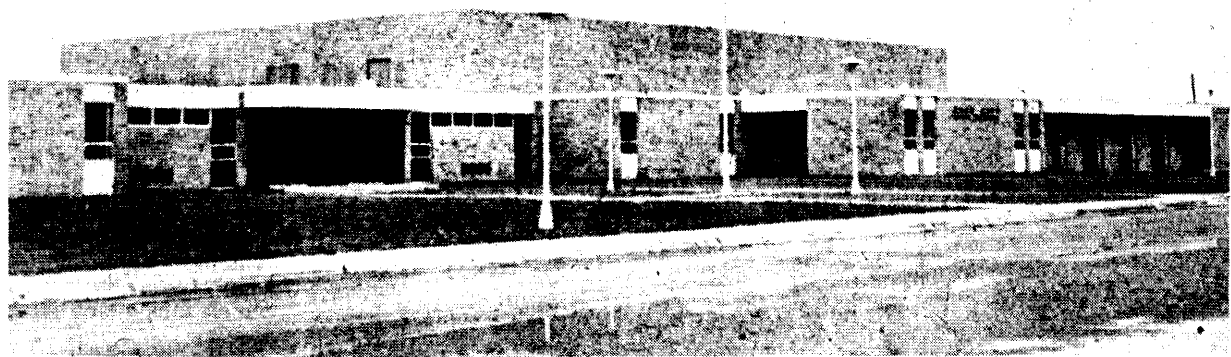

## NEGOTIATIONS

### SALARY AND FRINGE BENEFITS

The teachers in the Cass City Schools are now involved in what is called informational picketing. The problem with informational picketing is that it gives very little information. Yes, the teachers want a contract. So does the Board of Education! Yes, the teachers are frustrated. So is the Board of Education!

The status of negotiations now is no different than it was when bargaining began on June 18th. The union demands

have not changed. The financial package they initially presented included a more costly insurance program, a 5% plus cost of living change in the salary schedule for the 1983-84 year and another 5% plus cost of living improvement for the 1984-85 school year.

The position of the Board of Education is that the salary schedule should not be modified for the 1983-84 school year. An examination of the Cass City salary schedule for the last few years compared to neighboring schools best explains the Board's position.

### CONTRACT LANGUAGE

The present contract language is good language that is understood by all parties. It has been developed over a period of seventeen years.

At the start of negotiations the teachers presented demands for nineteen changes in the contract language. None of these demands have been changed or withdrawn. People familiar with the bargaining process realize that most changes in language involve increased cost or loss of performance. Space limitations prevent a detailed explanation of the nineteen demands in this article. However, nineteen changes in contract language is not a

reasonable request. Bargaining, from the viewpoint of management, has been defined as the art of giving things away slowly. This year there are a few areas where language modifications may be made. However, there are not nineteen!

Another mediation meeting has been scheduled for November 8th. At the last mediation session the Board made unofficial offers through the mediator. No unofficial counter offers or offers were received from the teacher representatives. Hopefully, their team will soon begin bargaining. The teacher team has not presented one counter proposal to the Board since negotiations started! (ADV.)

Free blood tests to help detect diabetes will be offered next week, which has been designated Diabetes Detection Week.

Testing will be done from 9-11 a.m. and 3-4 p.m. Wednesday in the basement meeting room at Hills and Dales General Hospital. At other times, testing can be arranged by appointment.

Caro Community Hospital will perform tests from 9-11 a.m. Thursday in the Gagetown municipal building. They will also be done at the hospital Wednesday from 9-11 a.m. and 2-3 p.m.

Marlette Community Hospital will give the tests from 1-3 p.m. Tuesday at

the Kingston United Methodist Church and the hospital Thursday from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. and 7:30-8:30 p.m.

The testing is sponsored by the hospitals and the

Michigan Affiliate of the American Diabetes Association. It is offered to persons over 18 years of age who have not been previously diagnosed as diabetic.

Diabetes is a disease that is a major cause of heart attack, kidney failure, blindness and death. Symptoms, when present may include frequent urination, abnormal thirst, unusual hunger, rapid weight loss, itching, fatigue, blurred vision and slow healing of cuts and scratches.

For best results, a meal high in carbohydrates with large amounts of starches and sugars should be eaten two hours before the test. The meal should be eaten within 15 minutes and nothing else except water should be taken before the test.

## Your neighbor says Grenada invasion was necessary

Was the United States justified in its Oct. 25 invasion of Grenada?

"My first impression was I was opposed to it," said Lew Bishop.

His initial objection was that the invasion was illegal. "That was my very first impression, but since that time I feel there was justification for the move."

Why did he change his mind?

He feels the American students at the medical college on the island were in

jeopardy. It appears doubtful the Grenadian army had a need for the huge amount of weapons the American forces found "unless they had ulterior motives."

The more information that was revealed about Grenada, the more Bishop felt the invasion was necessary.

The government has better information than citizens do, he pointed out and unlike the Soviet Union, he commented, "I think we can believe what our government does."



Bishop still has one criticism, which is with the intelligence information supplied to the U.S. troops, who initially had to depend on photocopies of tourist maps for guidance. "If there was any dereliction, it was with the intelligence department," Bishop said. "I don't believe they were too well fortified with details."

Bishop retired as Cass City postmaster in 1965. He and his wife, Janet, live on Sixth Street. They have one son, L.J. Bishop, who lives in Big Rapids, and one grandchild.

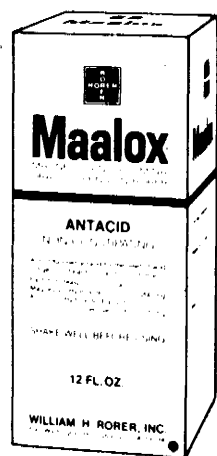

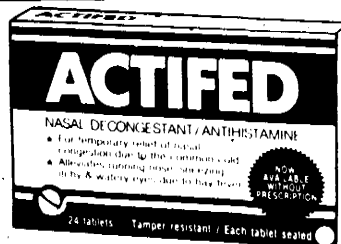

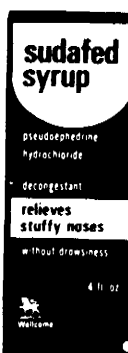

### HEALTH TIPS

## Obstructions to a good nights sleep

Seven or eight hours of sleep leaves the average person refreshed and ready for a new day.

Sufferers of obstructive sleep apnea, however, wake feeling unrested after a night of interrupted sleep. Fortunately, while a serious affliction, the Michigan State Medical Society says sleep apnea may be successfully controlled once diagnosed.

Sleep apnea victims temporarily stop breathing during sleep -- for 10 seconds or longer and more than five times an hour. This action interrupts the sleep cycle, depriving sufferers of sleep's benefits.

Obstructive sleep apnea, both the most common form of sleep apnea and the most difficult to treat, occurs when the air exchange at the nose and mouth simultaneously ceases as the lungs attempt respiration.

Essentially, excess fatty tissue at the base of the tongue makes the throat opening smaller. During sleep, the muscles in the throat tend to tighten, closing the opening and prohibiting the exchange of air.

When this constriction occurs, the victim awakens to consciously take the needed breath. Sleep then resumes only to be shortly interrupted again by recurrence of the blocked throat.

Sleep apnea generally afflicts middle-aged, overweight men. While born with a predisposition to the problem (demonstrated by heavy snoring), their extra weight compounds it.

Diagnosis of sleep apnea is difficult since the victim is unaware of the problem while asleep and breathes normally when awake. Symptoms may include morning headaches, constant fatigue, nausea, bed-wetting, and impotence.

In severe cases -- 300 to 500 awakenings nightly --

resultant decreased blood oxygen can lead to pulmonary hypertension, heart failure, cardiac irregularities, and death. Hence the importance of early detection.

Two proven methods of diagnosing sleep apnea exist. The first measures, under laboratory conditions, a person's breathing patterns during sleep and identifies any existing problems.

The second, called a sleep latency test, judges the quality of sleep by determining how readily an individual falls asleep during the day.

Once diagnosed, sleep apnea is readily treatable. Often weight loss solves the problem. In other cases it may be treated by medication or a tracheostomy (insertion of a tube into the trachea).

Only in the most severe cases will surgery be needed to enlarge the throat opening.

## Millington Township has highest taxes

Residents of Millington Township pay the most property taxes in Tuscola County, 45.6988 mills.

The cheapest place to live in the county is in the portion of Tuscola Township that is in the former Pinkerton School District, now part of the Vassar district. The total is 33.7 mills.

The figures are contained in the report of local taxes, prepared by the county Equalization Department, which was presented last week to the county Board of Commissioners.

Property tax bills to be mailed at the end of this month will bill county property owners for a total of \$24.72 million in taxes, according to the report. That is an increase of 3.55 percent from last year.

The state equalized valuation of county property is \$647.06 million, 2.6 percent more than last year.

All Tuscola County residents pay a county government tax of 4.2 mills, plus voted levies of .5 mill for bridge and street repairs and .2 mill for senior citizen programs.

If they live in a local school district that is part of the Tuscola Intermediate School District, such as Cass City or Kingston, they pay 3.5 mills to the TISD, which consists of 1.75 mills for the Tuscola Area Skill Center, 1.6 for special education and .15 for operations.

Residents of Elkland Township in the Cass City School District will pay a total of 37.8 mills, including 2.7 for the local schools and 2.4 for township government.

Those living in the Owendale-Gagetown District will pay a total of 38.18 mills, the differences being the Owen-Gage school tax is 29.75 and the Huron Intermediate School District tax totals 1.13 mills.

In Novesta Township, all of which is in the Cass City School District, the total tax bill will be 36.9114 mills. The township tax levy is 1.5114 mills.

Elmwood Township is divided into three school districts. The cheapest one to live in is the Caro district, where the total tax levy is 36.4352 mills. Those in the Cass City district will pay 37.2152 mills, except for those in the Goslin territory, which used to be part of Owen-Gage. They will pay 36.6152 mills, since they don't have to pay .6 mill extra voted debt approved by voters prior to when the property transfer took place. Owen-Gage residents will pay 37.5952 mills. The township tax levy is 1.8152 mills.

Kingston Township residents will pay 36.9947 mills if in the Cass City School District; 37.7647 mills in the Kingston District; or 37.2940 mills in the Marlette district. The township tax levy is 1.5947 mills.

In Ellington Township, the total tax levy is 36.7619 mills for those in the Caro School District; 37.5419 in

the Cass City district. The township tax levy is 2.1419 mills.

SANILAC COUNTY

All of Evergreen Township is in the Cass City School District. The total levy there will be 36.4334 mills - Cass City schools 27 mills; Tuscola Intermediate School District, 3.5; township .9338; county government, 4.8098, and senior citizen activities, .1898.

In Greenleaf Township, the total levy is 38.1454 mills in the Cass City School District or 31.6218 in the Ubyly district. The difference is the Ubyly school tax totals 22.8464 mills, plus a Huron Intermediate School District tax of 1.13 mills. The Cass City school tax is 27.0 mills and the Tuscola ISD tax is 3.5 mills.

The township tax levy is 2.6458 mills, which includes extra voted levies for roads and fire protection. The county and senior citizen taxes are the same as in Evergreen.

## Taking stock



The big city experts are just getting around to facts of business life we country bumpkins knew forever ago.

Take for instance this story from a syndicated columnist on a metro daily business page.

It was telling companies how to make more money "by using sophisticated cash management to postpone payables and speed up collections." It quoted Craig Ramsey, an audit manager with the national CPA firm of Touche Ross & Co.

"If you can accelerate the receipt of funds you can reduce the need to borrow to meet the company's cash requirements. And if you can keep those funds in your account for extended periods you can use the money to pay down existing debt."

"In either case the benefits of sound cash management can be equivalent to that of an interest-free loan."

Up in that hometown of mine, Lapeer, better stores and companies have been doing that for some time. We just call it collecting our accounts, getting what was owed us off the books and into the bank.

When I sent the office manager Charlotte Batzloff out with a handful of bills for advertising the first of the month, I can imagine her reaction if I had said, "Now I want you to go out and accelerate the receipt of funds."

She would have wrinkled her nose and said, "Huh?" The Touche Ross expert also advises companies to have an "account analysis" done by the bank to see if they're carrying more money in the account than the bank insists on.

From a few years' experience around a bank, I can tell the big CPA firm a simpler way: Draw down the balance gradually until the bank hollers. That's what counts—the least balance the bank will let

you get away with.

Banks are doing their own analyses of accounts all the time—or should be. They won't hesitate to tell you if you're not keeping enough money with them. If you think the bank is unreasonable, show the account to another bank and ask them if they'd like your business.

Another idea of the city experts was to have customers send payments to a P.O. box, and have the bank pick them up and credit your account.

"The box may be serviced several times a day as well as on week ends," said another CPA.

Golly, we had our own P.O. box, and I picked up the mail on the way to work.

Like most post offices over the whole U.S., 90 percent of the mail for the day was in the box by 8 a.m. By noon, the bookkeeper had the deposit made up and in the bank. It was credited to our account that day.

To say that a bank would pick up your checks on week ends and holidays is nonsense. How can a bank that is closed credit your account with funds that arrive on Sunday? Did some professor in business school dream that one?

All this involves fees—the bank for this special service and the CPA for the consultation. Just use your own P.O. box and plop the money into the bank the same day. All the fancy systems in the world won't do better than that.

The elitist world of accountants could never understand the down-to-earth approach of us country folk.

We sold as many ads and subscriptions as we could. We paid our help the going wage and firmly believed in merit pay. We collected as many of our bills as we could, and kept hounding the deadbeats. We paid our own bills early to get the discount.

The money left over we called profit. The system worked pretty well.

to conventional diseases, which is why he isn't attending school.

Children sometimes go to school who are sick, he explained, and if he catches what they have, it could make him even sicker. "I don't have cells to fight off a cold with."

When he isn't in the hospital, Bob goes almost every day to the nearby house of Joyce Cameron, a substitute teacher, for his schooling. In addition, his teacher from last year at Evergreen, Barbara Kilmer, stops by after school when she has time to help him with any problems.

He was able to go to Evergreen Monday for the Halloween activities and his mother is hopeful before the school year is over, he might be able to go mornings.

ASKED IF HE MISSES being in school, he responded, "Ya, I do." As for whether he will be able to return to Evergreen full time come fall, Bob said, "I think so."

He is hoping to be able to go to the pancake supper Saturday. "I'm going to try. I want to be there."

The chemotherapy has also had other effects. "I sleep a little longer and I don't do as much stuff," Robert said. He doesn't eat as much, "but I drink a lot of milk."

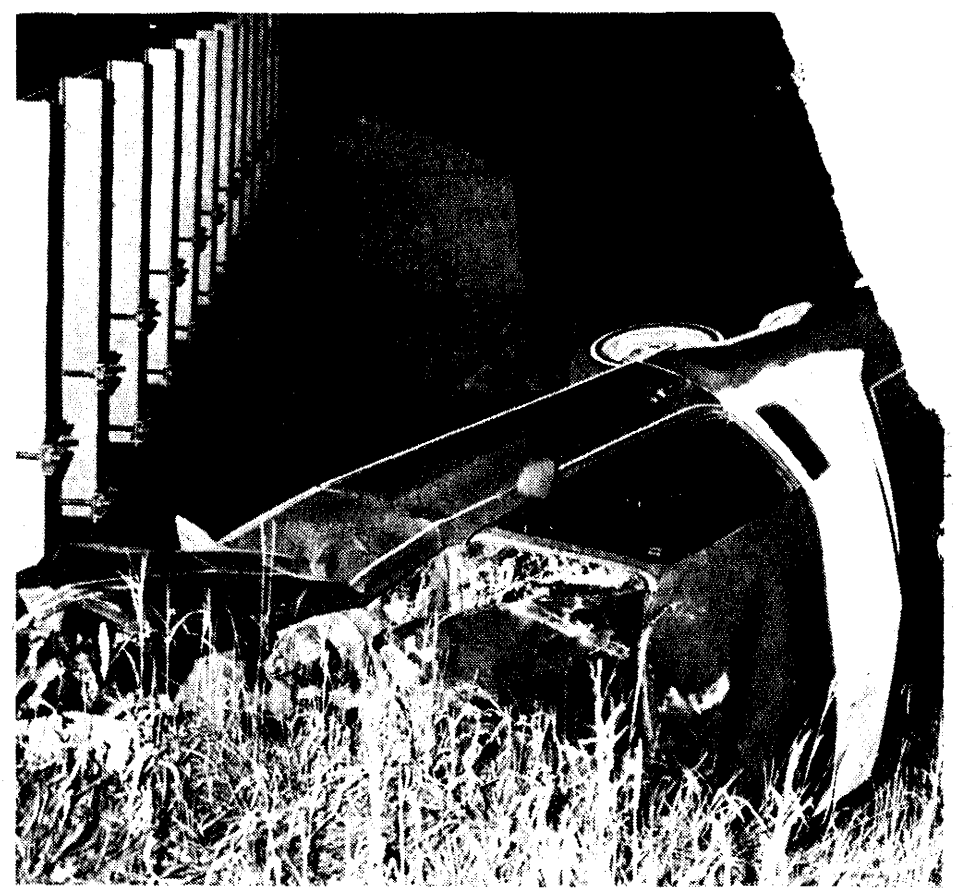
There are also frustrations. "I wonder how it started," he said of his disease. "I ask the doctors and they don't even know."

Although he has shown improvement—the radiologists are very pleased with his progress, Mrs. Broecker said—it isn't possible yet to predict the future with certainty, although it appears he will be okay once treatment ends.

to show cause why Joslyn shouldn't issue a preliminary injunction replacing his temporary restraining order of Tuesday, Oct. 25, that the board must bargain in "good faith." The TCBA had sought the order.

The next day, the judge signed another order presented by the TCBA, finding the TISD board in contempt for violating his restraining order by supposedly not bargaining in good faith.

Had the settlement not

been reached Friday, there was to have been another hearing Saturday morning, before the start of the marathon bargaining, at which the board's attorneys were to argue why the board shouldn't be punished for its supposed contempt of court.

At the Thursday hearing, the board's attorney, Donald Bonato of Lansing, argued Joslyn lacked jurisdiction, that under state law, "The court is not authorized to determine where an unfair labor practice has occurred." Only

the Michigan Employment Relations Commission had jurisdiction, he said.

The TCBA's attorney, Daniel Hoekenga of Southfield, argued that Joslyn did have jurisdiction, and if the union sought legal action through the MERC, it would be at least a year before it issued a ruling.

In making his ruling Thursday, Joslyn agreed with Hoekenga that he had jurisdiction and with Bonato's contention that the TIEA members were violating state law by striking.
