## Friend offers helping hand to McDonald

The old adage, "A friend in need is a friend indeed," has once again stood the test of time.

Cass City resident Cathy McDonald, currently undergoing treatment for cancer, is a "friend in need." In need of friendship, compassion and the financial help of her friends. Faced with staggering costs of cancer treatment without hospitalization insurance, a "good friend," Mrs. Milton Phillips, has offered her assistance in Mrs. McDonald's time of need.

Phillips has planned a fund raising benefit dance to help defer Mrs. McDonald's numerous medical expenses. Without insurance, the McDonalds have had to turn to social services for assistance in covering the hospital and doctor charges. The benefit dance will be held May 10 at the Colony House.

Cathy McDonald's medical problems first became noticeable in March, 1984. She was feeling tired and weak all the time. The constant exhaustion forced her to quit her job of 10 years as a cook at Sommers' Bakery.

"I quit because I didn't feel very well," she said. "It was too much for me." Mrs. McDonald went to her family doctor during April, 1984. A blood test revealed she had a low blood count. She was given an injection of vitamin B-12 to help build up her depleted blood count. The B-12 injection did not relieve the exhaustion she was feeling.

About three months later she noticed the first sign that there was a major medical problem. On the right side of Mrs. McDonald's lower abdomen she could feel a lump.

Further examinations and X-rays verified the lump was malignant. Growing on her abdomen was a cancerous tumor.

Mrs. McDonald underwent surgery to remove the growth in September. "They removed the tumor," she said. "But it came right back." She explained the tumor began growing on top of the surgical incision.

Mrs. McDonald underwent a second surgery in November. During this surgery, doctors removed

a portion of her stomach that the tumor was attached to. A fiber mesh was sewn over the area of the stomach that was removed. For the next three months, Mrs. McDonald wore a tight wrapping across her stomach to keep the mesh in place.

For a third time the tumor has begun growing in her abdomen. This time doctors are using only chemotherapy, drugs that destroy cancer cells, for treatment.

"They make me tired," Mrs. McDonald said about the 19 chemotherapy treatments she has been given so far. "But I don't get real sick. My legs do get weak though."

Mrs. McDonald receives one week of chemotherapy treatments every three weeks. The treatments are given to her as an outpatient at Hills and Dales General Hospital.

She was most recently admitted to the hospital April 23, after she was unable to keep her meals down. The surgeries and chemotherapy treatments have reduced the weight of the 51-year-old Cass City woman from 125 pounds to about 100 pounds. This is the third time that Mrs. McDonald has been hospitalized since the tumor was discovered. She has been fed intravenously since being admitted.

"I hope to get out by Monday, when they take these tubes out of me," she said Friday, pointing to the intravenous feeding tubes in the back of her right hand.

Mrs. McDonald, a mother of seven, had six children from a previous marriage. Her first husband, Carl Gohsman, died from cancer while she was pregnant with her daughter Lori.

"He didn't live to see her," she said about Carl Gohsman's death. She married Richard McDonald about two years later. They have one child, now 20 years old.

The benefit dance will be held at the Colony House May 10 at 8:00 p.m. There will be a \$3 per person admission charge. Food and drinks will be available.

"Yes, I will be there," Mrs. McDonald said when asked if she would be attending the upcoming dance.

# Finalize plans for festival

Plans for Cass City's annual Fourth of July Festival are being finalized with activities expected to be bigger and better than last year.

## Bans guns in village

# Village okays buy of 22-acre site

Tuesday night the trustees of the Cass City Village Council agreed to purchase the 22-acre industrial park site from the Cass City Industrial Development Committee for \$28,000.

The industrial park, located in the southeast corner of the intersection of Doerr and Schell Roads, was originally offered to the village for \$38,000. The village made a counter offer of \$22,500. The village and the IDC agreed on the \$28,000 purchase price about two weeks ago.

Village President Ray Armstead told the council the price is less than the IDC has invested in the property. "I feel it is a reasonable offer,"

Armstead added. "I think it is the smart way to go," said Trustee Elwyn Helwig. "It is going to be a plus for Cass City." Helwig added that even if new industries are Economic Development Committee supported, qualifying for a 50 percent property tax break, the village would be getting more from property taxes, if the property tax abatement is granted, than the village is now receiving.

At a public hearing, before the regular meeting, the council agreed to apply for a \$35,300 state funded small cities program grant to pay for part of the costs of improving Schell Street. The street, which runs

through the industrial park, will be widened to 40 feet, and curb and gutters will be installed on the 880-foot long street. The grant is available only to non-profit organizations.

The council agreed to apply for the grant before they had agreed to purchase the industrial park from the IDC, a profit making organization.

Trustee Dorothy Stahlbaum asked what would happen to the grant application if the village did not purchase the property.

"If we don't purchase it, then we just throw it out," Armstead said about the grant application.

According to Tuscola County Economic Development Director Lydia Walenga, to meet the requirements of the grant, the village had to agree to fund one-third of the total cost of the project. The village agreed to fund \$15,000 of the project. The remaining \$35,000 will come from the state funded grant program.

Another requirement of the grant is that an industry in the area shows a need for the improvements. On the application, \$182,000 of Walbro's \$5 million expansion program, and future industrial expansion of Schell Street were cited as reasons for the improvements.

Armstead pointed out that by purchasing the industrial park for \$28,000, the village qualifies for the \$35,000 grant for Schell Street improvements. He said the village had originally budgeted \$42,350 for improvements to the street. If the village receives the grant for street improvements, for about \$1,000 more than they originally budgeted, they can own the industrial park, and have the street repaired. Village superintendent Lou LaPonsie pointed out the total from the grant, and the village share of \$15,000 for street improvements is about \$7,000 more than the village had originally budgeted. The \$7,000 difference is because of engineering costs required for the grant.

## GUNS BANNED

Also at the meeting, the council passed an ordinance prohibiting the firing of air, spring-loaded guns, bows and arrows and firearms in the village limits.

At the last council meeting, trustees tabled the ordinance until a definite time period for confiscation of the weapons was decided. The village trustees agreed that if a police officer confiscates a weapon, it will be held for six months. Please turn to page 20.

## 3rd drowning victim still not found

A 68-year-old Mayville man and his five-year-old grandson drowned Saturday afternoon when a wave swamped their fishing boat, sinking it about one mile off shore in the Saginaw Bay. A third man, the stepfather of the five-year-old boy, is still missing and presumed drowned.

According to a report filed by Tuscola County

Sheriff's Department Sgt. James Giroux, Leonard Bodeis, 68, 6053 First St., Mayville, and his grandson, Jason Rumph, 5, 121 Howard St., Caro, were both pronounced dead on arrival at the Caro Community Hospital.

The search continues for Kevin K. Hecht, 22, 121 Howard St., Caro. Tuscola County Sheriff Paul Berry said that a helicopter was to be used Tuesday afternoon to try to locate Hecht's body.

The accident was reported by Lloyd Tracey, Essexville, as happening at 1:57 p.m. Tracey told Sgt. Giroux he saw what looked like a sinking boat. Upon arrival he pulled Bodeis out of the water. He also was able to locate Chester R. Burke, 23, and his stepson, Kevin Cryderman, 9, both of 1446 S. Colling Rd., Caro. Burke and Cryderman were both treated and released from the Bay Medical Center, Bay City. They were suffering from exposure.

Jason Rumph's body was found at 6:40 p.m. Saturday, by divers from the Tuscola County and Bay County Marine Patrols. Chester Burke told Sgt. Giroux that Jason was wearing a life jacket when the boat sank, but it must have come off while he was in the water.

Kimberly Hecht, 25, Jason's mother, ran into the water, in an attempt to find her husband and son after she learned they were missing. She was treated and released from the Bay Medical Center Saturday.

The 15-foot Fiberglass boat, owned by Bodeis, sank in about nine feet of water. Sgt. Giroux reported the water was extremely rough when the boat sank.

They are the first reported drownings in Tuscola County this year.

## Prom's tragic end; girl dies

The Caro High School Junior-Senior Prom ended tragically when a 15-year-old Caro girl was killed in an auto accident Saturday at 11:50 p.m. The driver of the vehicle is in critical, but stable condition at the Bay Medical Center, Bay City.

According to a report filed by Huron County Sheriff's Department Deputy Arlin Herford, Kristine M. Golsch, 1635 Parkway Dr., Caro, a freshman at the Caro High School, was killed when a vehicle she was riding in failed to

stop at the intersection of Bay Port and Sebewaing Roads.

The driver of the vehicle, Todd W. Beckrow, 18, 1670 E. Caro Rd., Caro, a senior at Caro High School, was southbound on Bay Port Road.

The Beckrow vehicle was struck by a vehicle driven by Betty Champagne, 40, 1749 N. Farver Rd., Elkton. Champagne was eastbound on Sebewaing Road.

Beckrow and Golsch had reportedly attended the high school prom at Sherwood on the Hill, Gageton, and afterwards had gone to Caseville. They were returning from Caseville when the accident happened.

Beckrow was taken to the Scheurer Hospital, Pigeon, by the Sebewaing Ambulance Service. He was later transferred to the Bay Medical Center. Golsch was pronounced dead on arrival at the Scheurer Hospital. Champagne was taken to the Huron Memorial Hospital, Bad Axe. She is listed in fair condition.





## Aging quickly

Darn! I guess I'm not as young as I thought I was. President Reagan gave me false hope.

A few weeks ago, Reagan said not many Germans are old enough to remember the Holocaust and World War II, so it would be irrelevant for him to visit a concentration camp when he goes to Germany next month. I figured the same thing must be true of the age of most Americans, especially me.

For almost 40 years, I thought I was old enough to remember being in Germany when World War II ended. I also thought I remembered entering a concentration camp before all the prisoners were freed.

But then Reagan abolished aging in Germany, and I felt younger. I figured if all those Germans weren't old enough to remember 1945, neither was I. I was so young when I was in Germany, I couldn't possibly remember being there. Most likely I was unconsciously lying to myself and everyone else when I said I remembered celebrating V-E Day in a German hospital.

It wouldn't be unusual. There are some people who swear they remember being born, but scientific investigation indicates what they actually remember is hearing about their birth, usually from their parents, many years after the fact. They hear the same old story so often they begin to believe they remember participating in

the birth.

I was practically newborn when I was drafted and sent to Germany. It could have been that my parents or some old soldiers told me about it later, over and over, until I came to believe I actually remembered seeing Gen. Patton rather than George C. Scott.

It could have been that in 1985 I was too young to remember being in Germany in 1945. That's what I decided when Reagan said most Germans weren't old enough to remember that far back. It felt good to discover I wasn't such an old poop after all, and didn't actually have firsthand memories of sugar rationing, gas stamps and Wendell Wilkie.

I suddenly understood what Ponce de Leon was looking for — proof that all the old stuff he thought he remembered was actually told him by his father. (It was my grandfather who told me about Ponce.)

However, my Reagan-inspired youth was as fleeting as the usual kind. Less than a month after the president declared Germany's death camps unremembered and irrelevant to 1985, White House officials announced he would probably visit one after all. According to one

news report, Reagan changed his mind "to balance his visit to a German military cemetery."

Many Jews and others had protested that Nazi soldiers are buried in that cemetery and they've been dead just as long as the victims of Nazi death camps. So if dead Nazis can be remembered with a presidential visit in 1985, why not the Jews and others who died in concentration camps?

The White House suddenly decreed there are still enough people old enough to remember what happened 40 years ago — enough to make a president worry about losing his political balance. Alas, I can quit hoping I'm too young to remember Germany in 1945.

One thing I remember is standing in a military formation near Munich and hearing that President Franklin D. Roosevelt was dead. Last week, on the 40th anniversary of that day, I was startled to be reminded that Roosevelt was only 63 then.

Perspective changes. When I was 18, I thought Roosevelt was incredibly old. Today I realize a president isn't old until he's 74 and can't remember that some people can never forget.



## 25 years of use shows ultrasound safe

Recently, there has been a lot of attention focused on the use of ultrasound during pregnancy. A few months ago, a group of leading experts on ultrasound decided that after 25 years of use in this country, there was no scientific evidence that ultrasound harms either the mother or the fetus.

Before ultrasound was invented, doctors were forced to use X-rays if they needed to see what was happening with the developing fetus. Now, physicians can use high frequency sound waves to take a moving picture of the fetus in the womb to help them and you learn a tremendous amount about the health of your unborn child. Since medical procedures are not done routinely unless there is some benefit, the panel of experts found no reason to screen all pregnant women routinely with ultrasound.

We use ultrasound to determine the age and size of the fetus, if it is growing and developing on schedule, and to see if there is more than one. Ultrasound can be used from early in pregnancy to diagnose problems in the mother or fetus into labor to check the baby's well-being and position. It is used during and after childbirth to monitor the placenta.

If you have some medical condition that may or may not be related to pregnancy, such as diabetes or high blood pressure, your doctor may use ultrasound to make sure that your baby's development is not being affected. Certain tests during pregnancy, such as amniocentesis for birth defects, are made safer by the use of ultrasound.

However, if you are under 35, healthy with no continuing medical problems, and having a normal pregnancy, your doctor may not feel that the ultrasound is necessary. Ultrasound should not be performed just to get a "picture" of the baby nor to determine the baby's sex.

The ultrasound examination is simple and painless.

You will be asked to drink fluids before the examination because a full bladder helps the operator locate the other organs. Pressure from your full bladder should be the only discomfort you feel.

As your abdomen will be exposed during the procedure, you might want to wear a two-piece outfit. You will lie down on an examining table, and the operator will put some oil or lubricating jelly on your skin to let the scanner move more smoothly across your stomach. As the scanner is moved up and down and back and forth across your abdomen, images will show up on a television-like screen. Although the black and white images may seem quite fuzzy to you, the operator can point out such details as outline of a head or a limb.

If you have any concerns about the safety of ultrasound, you should discuss them with your physician. Be reassured, however, that in almost 25 years of use, ultrasound has not been known to harm any mothers or children.

## Allen requests deadlines be set

State Representative Dick Allen (R-Caro) announced that he has co-sponsored legislation in the Michigan House of Representatives that would require the governor to call special elections to fill existing legislative vacancies within a prescribed period of time.

Allen explained that the proposal was prompted by two separate incidents last year when the governor waited between six and eight months before calling for a special election to fill the vacant House seats. Consequently, voters in those districts were without representation for more than half a year.

"This legislation is de-

signed to insure that the electorate in any district in which a vacancy occurs will not be without representation for any longer than is absolutely necessary," Allen stated.

Allen added that the legislation would require the governor to call a special election within 21 days of a vacancy and also requires that election to be held within 90 days of the vacancy. The bill does allow an election to be held in conjunction with a regularly scheduled election, if that election is scheduled within four months of the vacancy. Provisions also allow election officials adequate time to prepare for the election.

**HOLD THE DREAM: THE SEQUEL TO A WOMAN OF SUBSTANCE** by Barbara Bradford (fiction). This novel continues the saga of business tycoon Emma Harte, now in her eighties. The story centers on Emma's granddaughter Paula McGill Fairley, whose life closely parallels Emma's own. **CITIZEN HUGHES** by Michael Drosnin (non-fiction). Predicated upon private papers purloined from Howard Hughes' Hollywood hiding place in 1974, this zippy narrative chronicles the billionaire recluse's reckless spending in pursuit of whatever struck his fancy -- owning Las Vegas, controlling ABC, strongarming presidents and candidates into banning nuclear tests, and making sure whoever was elected in 1968 would be his debtor.

## Free trip to essay winner

An all-expense-paid trip to Washington, D.C., June 9-15, will be awarded to one young person from this area by the Thumb Electric Cooperative, according to Michael Krause, manager of the system.



Jim Crawley was the only Hawk that didn't have trouble solving the slants of Ankley. He picked up both of Cass City's hits.



# DNR stocks Cass River for walleye fishermen

The Cass River has never been noted as a sport fisherman's paradise. A fisherman is able to hook an occasional pike, if he knows the right spot, or catch some small-mouth bass, but the most common fish in the river are carp and suckers. This may all change if planting efforts by the Department of Natural Resources are successful. Last week, DNR workers planted about 2.7 million walleye fry in the Cass River. Workers started planting the one-day-old, quarter-inch long walleye fry near the Frankenmuth dam. By the end of the day they had planted the walleye fry at 15 locations along the river. At the Cemetery Road bridge, south of Cass City, an estimated 100,000 walleye were planted last Wednesday afternoon.

Bill Deephouse, district fisheries biologist for the DNR, Imlay City post, said they chose the Cass River after an evaluation of the river's environment showed that walleyes may survive in the water.

"I wouldn't guarantee a thing, but you never can tell," Deephouse said. "The chances of them surviving, as a fry plant, are slim."

Deephouse explained that when walleye fingerlings, fish about 2½ inches long, are planted, they expect about 20 percent will survive. Fingerlings have a much better chance of

survival than the fry that were planted last week. Deephouse estimated that about one percent of the walleye fry they planted may survive.

The eggs were taken from walleye preparing to spawn in the Muskegon River during the first two weeks of April. Deephouse said DNR workers electronically shocked areas of the river, stunning the walleye and salmon. The females were quickly gathered, stripped of their eggs, and returned to the river unharmed. The eggs were taken to a fishery to be fertilized. The eggs hatched in 16 days.

As soon as the walleye eggs hatched they were loaded into a truck and taken to the Cass River. According to Deephouse, one of the reasons they planted the walleye was to find out if the river has adequate food supply to support the walleye.

The walleye fry will eat plankton, which Deephouse hopes will be abundant in the river. After they reach about 2½ inches long they will start to eat other, smaller fish.

The walleye will be trapped in two parts of the Cass River, east of the Caro dam, and between the Caro and Frankenmuth dams.

Deephouse explained the only way the walleye fry can leave the river is if a large rain causes water to flow over the top of the

dams, allowing the walleye to migrate into the Saginaw River.

"I am hoping we don't get any gully washers," Deephouse said.

If the walleye survive in the river, they are expected to grow to about eight inches long by the end of this summer. Next summer Deephouse expects they will be 12 inches long. By the third summer they should reach legal catching size of 15 inches.

Deephouse added that the walleye in the Saginaw Bay, where food is abundant, reach legal size in two years.

## Joslyn sentences Caro man on marijuana charge

Monday, Tuscola County Circuit Court Judge Patrick Joslyn sentenced a 29-year-old Caro man to a 60-day deferred jail sentence on a delivery of marijuana charge.

Guerin was also originally charged with an additional count of larceny with safe damage.

Joslyn will sentence Guerin June 17. Bond continues at \$2,800 on each charge.

Also Monday, Judge Joslyn sentenced Lynn N. Uhl, 30, 1647 Farmlane Rd., Reese, to a six-month delayed jail sentence. Uhl had pleaded guilty to a charge of operating a vehicle while under the influence of liquor, third offense.

Uhl was originally charged with operating a vehicle while under the influence of liquor, third offense, and operating a vehicle with a suspended driver's license.

Judge Joslyn accepted a guilty plea from Douglas E. Benjamin, 31, 7393 Mayville Rd., Marlette, on charges of uttering and publishing three non-sufficient fund checks within 10 days.

Joslyn will sentence Benjamin May 20. Bond continues at \$20,000.

Judge Joslyn considered and denied a motion of limine from a Camp Tuscola inmate on charges of possession of alcohol and contraband marijuana in a prison facility.

# Tuscola Marine Safety program cut

The comprehensive marine safety program that has been established and run by the Tuscola County Sheriff's Department will be reduced to a bare bones operation required by statute, Sheriff Paul Berry said this week.

There is no other way that we can operate now that state funding has been reduced so drastically, Berry explained.

The marine patrols across the state are in serious jeopardy because the state has cut payments 40 percent across the board.

The cuts were mandated because the Marine Safety Fund from which the DNR draws is running a \$938,000 deficit.

To cover the loss, the DNR wants to double the fees for three-year licenses which are based on the length of the boat.

The sheriff's association wants an increase, but not 100 percent.

The license fee has been unchanged since 1975.

Originally, Berry had budgeted \$22,000 for the marine program with the state paying two-thirds and the county one-third of the cost.

The state then referred to a 1981 needs study and cut the budget to \$9,000. From that total another cut of 40 percent has been announced.

That leaves just \$5,400 for the entire program. Already \$2,900 has been spent for the marine safety edu-

cation program for children. That can't be cut until next year.

However, schooling for divers at the Department of Natural Resources' school where divers were trained twice a year has already been cancelled.

The county has three boats. The biggest is a 22-footer that is 25 years old. There won't be any money for repair of boats or purchasing of diving equipment for the six staff members that have been trained in diving and marine safety.

What it means, Berry said glumly, is that about all we'll be able to do is recover bodies. We're required by law to do this and must do it even if it means taking money from other departments to do it.

It's sad to see this happen, the sheriff feels, because the safety program in the schools had been well received and effective.

We've had a year when there wasn't a death in the county from drowning, he pointed out, and our educational program was working.

"That's all ended now. Unless there's a change in financing, that doesn't look likely," he said regretfully.

Because it has a 92-mile shoreline, Huron County is hit harder than Tuscola. Sheriff Richard Stokan had a budget of \$68,000 and now figures he has about \$6,000 for the marine safety program.

before it is returned to the owner.

Under the new ordinance, the discharge of weapons, including BB guns and other air powered weapons, spring-loaded guns, bows and arrows, and firearms, within the village limits are prohibited. Law enforcement officers are allowed to use their weapons in the performance of their duties. A person is permitted to discharge a weapon for the protection of his life and property, and a person may discharge a weapon at a range that has been approved by the village council.

In other business, trustees agreed to hold a public hearing at the May 28 meeting to discuss curb and gutter assessments for residents on Pine Street, between West and Brooker Streets, and for the Schell Street improvements.

Trustees agreed to purchase a leaf vacuum to remove leaves from curbs and gutters this fall. The cost of the leaf vacuum is \$16,500.

The council appointed Kelly Smith and Roger Little to replace Bernard Ross and B.A. Calka on the planning commission. Ross is retiring after 11 years of village service. Calka has served on the planning commission since 1958. Both men have also served on the village council. The council thanked the men for their service to Cass City.

# Tuscola property values up 3.4%

The equalized valuation of real and personal property in Tuscola County is up 3.4 percent over 1984 levels, according to an equalization report approved by the Board of Commissioners at a special meeting Tuesday.

The 1985 equalized valuation, one-half of the true cash value of the property in the county, is now \$700.28 million, up from last year's

\$676.87 million. Last year Tuscola County property increased 4.61 percent.

The report, on which December's tax bills will be based, must now be approved by the State Tax Commission.

The total equalized valuation in area townships (1984 figures in parentheses) are: Elkland, \$54 million (\$44 million); Ellington, \$14.2 million (\$13.3 million); Elmwood, \$25.3 million (\$24.5 million); Novesta, \$14.4 million (\$13.7 million), and Kingston, \$15.1 million (\$15.9 million).

Indianfields Township is the richest with an assessed equalized valuation of \$55.7 million. Wells has the least of any township with \$12.7 million.

Elkland Township represents 6.49 percent of the total worth of Tuscola County; Ellington, 2.03 percent; Novesta, 2.05 percent; Kingston, 2.15 percent; Elmwood, 3.6 percent.

## Power plants
