In the letter, Glaspie enclosed a \$450 check to cover the cost of the insurance. The letter states: "Pursuant to our conversation...My understanding is that we will be covered in the aggregate amount of \$300,000 per occurrence."

Village Superintendent Lou LaPonsie said that after the May 28 meeting he talked to Jaycee member Dan Ulfig, and Ulfig was to get back with him on insurance coverage. LaPonsie has not heard from Ulfig.

"They're not concerned. They have a meeting once a month, and maybe five guys show up, and they are different guys each month. They don't have their act together," said trustee speed zone ahead.

LaPonsie said the village's liability insurance covers routine activities in the village park, but it will not cover the fireworks show. He added that most insurance companies will not write a policy to cover fireworks shows.

"We're just going to have to wait and see," McIntosh said about further action on permitting the fireworks show to be held in the village park. "We are going to have to come back and make a decision."

Under the JTPA progan unemployed worker who lacks job skills, meets income guidelines, is given on-thejob training with a participating employer. During the specified training period, one-half of the worker's wages are paid by the consortium, and the employer pays the other half. To determine the length of the training period, the consortium uses a federal guideline manual, the Directory of Occupational Titles, which lists how long it should take for an employee to learn a new job. The training period generally lasts from two to 5½ months. The consortium pays one-half of the wages

set by the employer. By entering into the program, the employer not only has an employee whose wages are partially paid tax credit through the Targeted Jobs Act.

Under the JTPA program, an unemployed worker is also eligible for continuing education programs through area colleges, or at the local skill centers.

"The good news is we got the extra money because of our performance," Pichla said. "Hopefully we can keep it up.

Pichla added that if they continue to perform at a rate higher than state average, they will be eligible for an additional \$72,000 grant.

Pichla said they have also placed about 400 workers from the four county area into Summer Youth Program jobs so far this summer. He expects to have 600 to 700 youths employed before the sum-

# **New Chronicle** publication day

Starting next week, the Chronicle will have a new publication day and will be available a day earlier than previously.

Newsstand copies will be available Tuesday afternoons and mail copies delivered to the homes Wednesday.

The change in publication date comes in response to the continuing trend of earlier in the week shopping.

In order to meet the advanced deadlines, advertising copy deadlines will be Friday at 5 p.m. News copy should be submitted as far in advance of publication day as possible to insure publijected to exceed 5 billion pound reduction in total pounds during the next 12 milk months. will probably do that," Secretary of Agriculture's possible price support reduction. Surplus dairy products are purchased by the federal government's Commodity Credit Corporation. The surplus products are duced by 50 cents, the price used in federal military installations, prisons, and public schools or they are given to needy American families through programs such as the surplus commodity distribution. The milk is used as cheese, butter or powdered milk.

If the price reduction goes into effect, it will be the second 50-cent price cut for farmers this year. The first reduction came April 1, but was offset by the end of the dairy diversion program where farmers paid 50 cents per hundredweight to support farmers who agreed to produce less milk. Under the diversion program, participating farmers were paid \$10 for each 100

said that since the end of the diversion program, "It is my opinion that he milk production has increased about three per-Kirkpatrick said about the cent, further adding to the surplus.

farmers are squeezed financially, their tendency is to produce more," Kirkpatrick added.

If the price support is reof milk will drop from \$12.10 to \$11.60 per hundredweight for milk with a 3.5 percent butterfåt test.

Kirkpatrick added that farmers who carry a high debt to asset ratio, typically a younger farmer, will have a difficult time coping with a 50-cent decrease.

Kirkpatrick said that another factor that is adding to the milk surplus problem is low crop prices. He explained that when crop prices are down, farmers tend to increase their dairy herd, and feed the crop instead of selling it.

As an example, Kirkpatrick pointed out that a farmer can afford to feed \$2.50 a bushel corn to a cow

that produces 40 pounds of area dairy farmers may be milk a day. But when corn is selling for \$3.50, it is more profitable to sell both the cow and the excess corn. As of Friday, the purchase price of corn was \$2.60 a bushel. One year ago corn was selling for \$3.48 a bushel. Kirkpatrick said that when the government passes the 1985 farm bill, they will know if corn price support will increase.

To try and promote additional dairy product consumption, the MMPA is involved in nation-wide promotion programs that Kirkpatrick said is increasing sales. MMPA farmers contribute 15 cents per hundredweight for promotion programs.

Kirkpatrick added that farmers will have to look at ways of reducing production costs, making it more profitable to produce milk at a lower price. This way the farmer can hold on until the price goes up. Kirkpatrick expects the Secretary of Agriculture to announce the price support cut later

Dennis Stine, Tuscola County Cooperative Extension Service agent, said if the dairy price support is reduced by 50 cents, some forced out of business. He explained these farmers, who are "just breaking even" with the current price of milk will lose money if the price drops.

"Some farmers won't be able to take it," Stine said about the price reduction. He added that it will not only force some farmers out of business, but will also place farmers who are pre-

# **NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS-VILLAGE OF GAGETOWN**

In order to connect to the sewer system the following activities are required.

The property owner is to apply for a Sewer Connection Permit from the Village Clerk. The fee for this Permit is \$85. This will pay for inspection of the lead and the administrative cost of preparing the permit.

The total connection fee for a standard residential user is \$2,000.00 plus the above listed inspection fee of \$85. The connection fee and the inspection fee is payable at the Village Office on each Monday and Wednesday between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 12:00 P.M., or at the Village Clerk's home at

The connection charge can be paid in full before a connection to the sewer system is made, or an installment payment program can be used by any person who elects to pay in that manner. These installment payments shall be made in thirty-nine (39) equal payments at a 12% interest rate. The entire unpaid balance may be paid at any time. However, it is a requirement that 10% of the connection charge is paid at the time the permit is obtained.


The total connection fee for a non-residential or multiple residential users, i.e., apartments, commercial establishments, restaurants, etc., may be higher than the dollar amount noted above. Please contact the Village's Office for the cost of this connection fee. Installment payments are also available for

Quarterly billing will be done by the Village of Gagetown. Once you are connected to the system, you will be billed on the basis of the amount of water that you use. A minimum residential bill has been established at \$18.00 per quarter with a charge of \$1.50 per thousand gallons or fraction thereof used over and above 12,000 gallons per quarter.

All sewer lead installations must be inspected by an inspector employed by the Village. This inspection will run from the end of the sewer lead at the street, to the point of connection at the building. Two inspections will be made. The first at the time the cookie (plug) is removed and a second to view the entire line before backfilling.

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
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

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

# Lower insurance costs by lowering blood pressure

Prolonging your life is one incentive for keeping high blood pressure under control, but here's another: you may be able to save money on health and life insurance premiums.

If you had high blood pressure that was not under control when you applied for a policy, you're probably paying a higher premium than a person in good health. But now, if you can prove your pressure is well-controlled, you can ask your insurance company to review your case and "rerate" your premium.

Each insurance company has its own requirements. Some require evidence of control for one year, others for two, but your agent can help you determine what your insurer requires.

saved dollars through insurance programs for controlled hypertension can be substantial. Marvin Moser, M.D., a long-time American Heart Association volunteer now

at Yale University, and others, reporting on their survey of major U.S. insurance companies in the Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA), cited some examples:

A 35-year-old man with blood pressure at an uncontrolled "170 over 95" would pay a premium of \$847 a year for a \$100,000 five-year term life insurance policy. But for the same man with normal pressure or pressure under control in the normal range, the same policy would cost \$410, a savings of \$437.

In case of a typical "whole life" policy, the same person with uncontrolled high blood pressure would pay 28 percent more than the "normal range" person.

Personal health insurance plans may also offer similar savings. Like life insurance companies, most

health insurance companies use a sliding scale -higher the premium. A 35year-old person with a blood pressure of "150 over 95" typically pays 15 to 25 percent over the standard premium. And a person with "180 over 102" would

pay an extra 75 to 100 per-

ance industry on blood pressure control contains an important message, according to Beverly Ware, Dr. Public Health, chairman, high blood pressure committee of the American Heart Association of Michigan, and corporate health education programs coor-

dinator, Ford Motor Com-

'Insurance professionals have reviewed millions of cases over many years. Based on the facts, they're willing to back, with millions of dollars, what AHA has taught for decades: a person with uncontrolled high blood pressure is at a high risk of stroke, heart attack or other lethal disease," Ware said. "But a person who keeps high blood pressure under control -- provided that prior neglect hasn't permanently damaged any organs -- can live as long and healthy a life as a normal person.

The insurance industry's

move makes sense in light of the increasing number of people who have controlled high blood pressure. A comparison of studies done from 1960 to 1982 was presented at the 1983 National Conference on High Blood Pressure Control. The studies showed that in the 1960s and early 1970s, only 15 to 20 percent of hyperten sion patients had their blood pressure under control. The number has increased to 50 to 70 percent in the past few years.

Data obtained from the National Center for Health Statistics show that from 1972 to 1982 the death rate due to hypertensive heart disease declined 40.7 percent and death rate fron. stroke declined 42.7 per-

Although not included in he JAMA study, employees in group health insurance plans can also benefit financially if group members with high blood pressure keep it under control. This doesn't yield a direct saving like the other case, but the group premiums are based on the insurer's "experience" with the entire group --in other words, how much the insurer has had to pay for claims in the past. So more members keeping pressure under control means fewer expensive heart attacks and strokes, and that means the employer may pay lower premiums in the

"People with high blood pressure need motivaton to stay with their treatment,? Ware said. "As we identify incentives like insurance premium costs, lifetime control can be a little easier."

# "Pulse" beats into Cass City

Taking off from the U.S.S. Nimitz's airstrip or being cast for a role in the next James Bond movie seem to be more viable options than cruising the streets of Cass City for the "Pulse.

One of only two owned in Michigan, the Pulse is described by owner David Zatkoff as an "F-1 fighter plane minus the wings.'

Zatkoff and his long-andlean, short-on-gas vehicle were in Cass City June 7 and along with their appearance came some pretty odd looks from passers-by.

"Boy, did I get some strange looks -- especially from the Cass City policemen," Zatkoff, 28, Saginaw, said. "The first thing they (the police) usually do is follow me to see if I have a license plate."

Approximately 60 of the two-passenger, fiberglassbodied Pulses have been manufactured since January by Owosso Motor Car, Owosso, according to company president Ed Butcher.

Weighing 935 pounds and running on a 400cc Yamaha motor, the Pulse is capable of getting up to 100 miles per gallon and attaining speeds comparable to a compact car. The cost of the vehicle currently is about \$9,000, Zatkoff said.

"It rides like a motorcycle. It's smooth and handles well. The driver's view reminds you of being in the cockpit of a plane," said Zatkoff, who uses the Pulse as a sales car for the Roger Zatkoff Co., a Detroit-based rubber/sealing device/ packings firm.

The Pulse has an airplane-type steering wheel and shifts like a motorcy-

Zatkoff said this was the first time he had been into Cass City with the Pulse. He conducted business that day with Walbro Corp., which has purchased goods from the Roger Zatkoff Co. for more than 25 years.

Owosso Motor Car was developed solely to produce the Pulse, thus making it a risky and expensive pro-

"It's been a tough go. But

it's such a beautiful project and it's a lot of fun," said Butcher, one of six fledgling owners.

Plans to mass produce the Pulse are in the works. When modifications are complete, the Pulse will include a reverse gear, air conditioning, AM/FM stereo, and plush interior, others, Butcher among

"The vehicles have been well-received. It's a commuter vehicle, motorcycle, airplane, whatever. It's fun turned and took pictures of


and useful," Butcher said.

Pulse makes it a novelty to people of all ages.

"The kids call it 'the rocket'," Zatkoff aid. "They're just super enthusiastic about it. One time I spent about four to six hours just giving kids rides.





# Rutkoski's shop features country style gift items

For Caroline Rutkoski, is so free," she added. Rutthe opening of The Country Goose, a shop specializing in the sale of folk art dolls, miniature quilts, wooden knickknacks and other special order country folk art items was the culmination of years of practice and studying of her art.

"I guess the sewing just comes naturally," she said about the intricate stitching that she uses to make the dolls and miniature quilts. "I am quite persistent, I

don't give up. Recently she added wooden knickknacks, wall hangings and toys to her collection of items for sale. Rutkoski's husband Ron. an employee at Saginaw Steering Gear, cuts and sands the wooden objects. She paints and stains the wood for a life-like appear-

Rutkoski has taken classes in painting landscapes and tole painting. She explained that with tole painting, the artist uses certain brush strokes, and must stay within drawn lines. When painting landscapes, she paints and designs the scene at the same time. "I like landscape painting better because it

koski said that when painting and sewing, a person has to have a lot of patience to end up with a quality pro-

This summer Rutkoski will be selling her hand made items at art fairs throughout the area, and as far away as Flint and Bay

'There are a lot of craft shows," she said. "A person could go every single week end if they wanted to." Rutkoski added she limits herself so she isn't away from home every week end.



# New books at the library

THE QUIET STRANGER by John Buxton Hilton (mystery). Detective-Constable Brunt is 24, smarting under the domination of pompous, stupid Inspector Pickford. Wily old Sergeant Nadin, however, allies himself with the young constable and teaches him how to get around the inspector's irrational commands. Nadin shares Brunt's disquiet when a stranger, George Ludlam, arrives in the village. Ludlam is among the few who have survived abuse as child laborers in the former mill. When a vicious woman is murdered, Inspector Pickford takes charge, virtually guaranteeing that Ludlam will be convicted of a revenge killing. The officer orders Brunt and Nadin to concentrate on catching petty crooks like Amelia Pilkington, who collects rich "gifts" from lonely people whom she befriends. But the constable and the sergeant operate instead behind Pickford's back and enjoy the satisfaction of producing the real murderer.

SHANGHAI by Christopher New (fiction). Fresh from England, provincial, priggish, naive and mortally shy, John Denton arrives in Shanghai in 1903 to work for the Customs Service. Through his eyes, we see the city and its various social classes, from the stuffy, inbred British colony and the Chinese merchant community to the brothels in the French sector and the appalling poverty of the servant and peasant populations. Denton's integrity causes him to lose his post after he has violated the arrangement between the corrupt Customs Service and the Chinese smugglers it protects. Eventually he makes, loses and regains a fortune in various business endeavors, at least one of them is quite shady. He takes as his mistress a teahouse sing-song girl, Su-mei, casts her aside in order to marry an American woman (who proves to be frigid and a lesbian), persuades Su-mei to return to him in spite of the scandal their marriage will cause and fathers children by both wives. Denton is tempered by tragedy when two of his sons die, when he is victimized by his Chinese nemesis, Pick-mark Chen and when he is imprisoned by the Japanese invaders.

**AROUND THE FARM** 

Ag Expo

By Bill Bortel

This year's field demonstrations during Michigan State University's Ag. Expo '85, July 23-25, will demonstrate the newest technology available for land improvement prac-

These will include the latest concepts in drainage tile installation, pond development, surface water diversion, laser surveying techniques and subirrigation practices. The daily demonstrations

are being sponsored by the ricultural Engineering in cooperation with the Michigan Land Improvement Contractors Association. Included will be a de-

monstration of field contour mapping using a microcomputer.

"This demonstration includes a laser surveying a vehicle that is driven across the site to be tiled and provides data needed to plan land improvement -including tiling a field -- in a matter of hours instead of days" says Ted Loudon, MSU agricultural engineer.

The system also provides more information about the characteristics of the field and its drainage contours than conventional methods, which require survey crews and days of work at a drawing board, Loudon says. The tile drain installa-

tions will be done by eight or more tiling machines using trenching and plow concepts. All of the units will be using the laser control system.

One of the unusual aspects of the tile drainage demonstration is that tile will be installed through standing corn. Though some of the crop

is damaged during the installation, the long-range benefits overshadow the loss, principally because the tiling machine tends to fracture the soil more extensively in the summer when it is dry and so provides better drainage performance in future years. That's not the case when tiling is done in the spring or fall, when soils are wetter. Under those conditions, installation of the tile tends to smear the soil, and this permanently reduces

"Another interesting aspect of the tiling demonstrations will be a new method of putting a field drainage tile under a roadway," Loudon says. "This process involves jacking and boring and saves a considerable amount of time



"What are you doing with so many tax-frees?" asked their accountant. "Why don't you invest in mortgages and get 14 percent instead of only 10 per-

It's a question that is relayed to me dozens of times a year.

The people who come to me are puzzled, because their "tax man" is something like their doctor — a person you don't argue

First of all, I ask them what their tax bracket is. Few of them know what the term means, and if they do know, they're not certain what their particular brac-

To figure your own bracket, you have to compute your total income subject to tax and then subtract your exemptions (\$1,000 per person under age 65, \$2,000 if over 65) and then your deductions (gifts to charity, interest paid, etc.). The answer is your net taxable income.

Take the case of Harry and Mabel:

Total taxable income.....\$42,000 Exemptions (Two,

over 65).....(4,000) Deductions (gifts, medical, etc.).....(2,000) Net taxable income .. \$36,000

Now look at the table in this article. Under the column "Taxable Income in \$000," take the column 'Joint Return.'

The third figure down in that column is \$35-\$46. Remember, these are in thousands of dollars, so the \$36,000 net taxable income for Harry and Mabel will be

If you go across the line under "Joint Income" showing \$35 (000) to \$46 (000), the next figure is 14.93.

Now we're ready to answer the question of the "tax man": Why do they have tax-free bonds at 10 percent instead of mortgage loans that would bring in 14 per-

The quick answer from the table is that they'd need income of 14.93 percent to equal the 10 percent tax free. Right? Wrong.

Harry and Mabel had \$150,000 invested in their 10 percent tax-exempt bonds. producing \$15,000 net income. Their accountant would have had them put it in mortgages at 14 percent. That would have given them \$21,000 in income --but here's the rub:

The \$21,000 in taxable income would have been added to the \$36,000 they already had, subject to tax. New total \$57,000. That would have pushed them into a bracket where ol' Whiskers in Washington would have taken 38 percent of income over \$46,000. In that bracket, they would keep only 62 percent of every \$1,000 they earned.

Harry and Mabel would have to get a return of 16.13 percent taxable to equal the 10 percent on their tax-free bonds, once they're in the 38 percent bracket (see table, next-to-last line).

In this case, they're \$1,600 a year better off to go the 10 percent tax-free route. And that's \$1,600 net after-tax "keeping money" —the only kind that counts.
