A world gone awry

Sometimes the laughs stick in my throat, and I come closer to crying, even when I'm doing something as much fun as picking on Terrible Jean, my much older sister. That's what happened last week when TWA Flight 847 was hijacked in Greece.

It began funny, a couple of months ago, when I wrote about the adventures of the oldest daughter of Terrible Jean and her husband, Bill. Her name is Sheila Fitzgerald (it will be recalled that Terrible Jean married a Fitzgerald so she wouldn't have to change the "Fitz" welded to her motorcycle helmet.) Sheila was born the same year — 1958 — as my son, Nerd, and the two cousins have much in common when it comes to transporting parents north on a wall.

"It must be something in the genes of my side of the family," I wrote after revealing that Nerd once worked from 11 to 7 in a 7-Eleven store because he liked the sound of it. "I thought that would stand forever as the weirdest-sounding job description in the Fitz clan. But I just learned that Sheila Fitzgerald of Southfield is plucking chickens in an Israeli kibbutz."

Several readers thought I was kidding about Sheila's Irish presence in such a Jewish setting. But I read somewhere that the world is a tinderbox, so I don't kid around about international relations. However, I do sometimes make a mistake. I later learned that Sheila didn't actually pluck the chickens; she woke them up at 3 o'clock in the morning.

She picked up the protest-

ing chickens, two in each hand, and put them in a cage for shipment to market. Sheila also picked grapefruits and laid irrigation pipe. For this she was paid \$6 a month plus room, board and medical costs when she broke her foot dancing at a kibbutz party. And she loved every minute of it.

THE WRONG AIRPORT

Terrible Jean and Bill learned about the broken foot a few days ago when they met Sheila in Greece. She was on her way to new adventures on the island of Crete, and Terrible Jean and Bill were on a tour. Sheila had "Shalom to Mom and Dad" printed on her knee-high cast. She also carried a greeting sign and flowers as she waited at the Athens airport for her parents' plane to arrive.

But Sheila was at the wrong airport. Nerd has done the same thing several times. The two cousins belong to a religion that forbids intimate knowledge of airline names and flight numbers. When Nerd's sister Ferd learned about Sheila's foul-up in Athens, she said, "1958 was a bad year for having kids."

After several hours of confusion and worrying about plane crashes, the reunion was finally accomplished and a grand time was had in Athens. And soon it was time for Terrible Jean and Bill to fly home. They left from the

same airport and through the same imperfect security system that, two days later, was big news all over the world.

A WORLD GONE AWRY

They had stayed at the same hotel as some of the passengers on the jetliner hijacked by Shiite Muslim terrorists. Later, they recognized some of the freed passengers on TV.

The numbing thought is inescapable: It could have been them. Terrible Jean and Bill could easily have been among the passengers abused so outrageously by fanatics. It can happen to any traveler today, and no one knows what to do about it except stay home under the bed.

I think of how dismayed I'd be if Terrible Jean and Bill were on Flight 847. I think about the people who did board it, and about the people who love them.

I think the world is rapidly going nuts and I wonder how long it will be before it's impossible to laugh about anything, even grown children whose religion forbids intimate knowledge of the right airport.

Reality has edged into the Unionville - Sebawaing school system. The reality that every year numerous high school students in every Thumb school join the thousands of teenagers that become pregnant each year.

USA has adopted a sex education curriculum that starts in the grades and continues through graduation.

It was adopted after a year and a half of study by a school advisory committee.

There's nothing new about trying to establish a sex education program in Thumb schools. Cass City tried to do it several times. The last futile attempt came probably five years ago and caused a storm of protest.

A very limited sex education proposal was dropped like the hot potato that it was.

The arguments presented at school board meetings were variations of two familiar themes. The first was that sex education should be taught in the homes where the family values and standards could be maintained.

The second was that sex education merely promoted promiscuous pre-marital sex. All you do is show them how to do it, one person told me over the coffee table at the time the debate was raging.

Which I always felt was typical of the fuzzy thinking surrounding sex education. Because, of course, it isn't necessary to show them anything.

There is a little more validity in the concerns voiced by families that want their children taught sex education at home.

The USA plan circumvents this objection by allowing parents to pull children from the course without penalty.

Sex education was one area that the Cass City Citizens Advisory Committee overlooked in its year-long excellent study of the Cass City curriculum.

The strongest argument for sex education in our schools is that whatever we

are doing now isn't working.

Proponents of sex education claim that what students aren't learning in school they are learning on the street corners. Information that is more often wrong than right.

Maybe now that USA has broken the barrier in the Thumb, Cass City can take another look at sex education.

The need is there. That's sure. It may be that sex education is not the answer. But the reality is that the problem is growing year by year. It's not sure that sex education will stem the tide. It is sure that what we are doing today is failing and that we have nothing to lose by trying a new approach.

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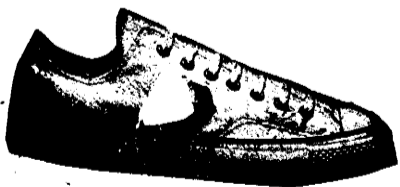


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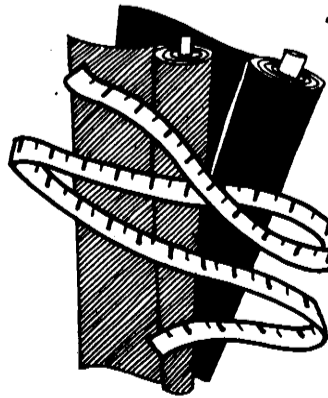
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Prolonging your life is one incentive for keeping high blood pressure under control, but here's another: you may be able to save money on health and life insurance premiums.

If you had high blood pressure that was not under control when you applied for a policy, you're probably paying a higher premium than a person in good health. But now, if you can prove your pressure is well-controlled, you can ask your insurance company to review your case and "re-rate" your premium.

Each insurance company has its own requirements. Some require evidence of control for one year, others for two, but your agent can help you determine what your insurer requires.

The dollars saved through insurance programs for controlled hypertension can be substantial. Marvin Moser, M.D., a long-time American Heart Association volunteer now at Yale University, and others, reporting on their survey of major U.S. insurance companies in the Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA), cited some examples:

A 35-year-old man with blood pressure at an uncontrolled "170 over 95" would pay a premium of \$847 a year for a \$100,000 five-year term life insurance policy. But for the same man with normal pressure or pressure under control in the normal range, the same policy would cost \$410, a savings of \$437.

In case of a typical "whole life" policy, the same person with uncontrolled high blood pressure would pay 28 percent more than the "normal range" person.

Personal health insurance plans may also offer similar savings. Like life insurance companies, most health insurance companies use a sliding scale -- the greater the risk, the higher the premium. A 35-year-old person with a blood pressure of "150 over 95" typically pays 15 to 25 percent over the standard premium. And a person with "180 over 102" would pay an extra 75 to 100 percent.

The stance of the insurance industry on blood pressure control contains an important message, according to Beverly Ware, Dr. Public Health, chairman, high blood pressure committee of the American Heart Association of Michigan, and corporate health education programs coordinator, Ford Motor Company.

"Insurance professionals have reviewed millions of cases over many years. Based on the facts, they're willing to back, with millions of dollars, what AHA has taught for decades: a person with uncontrolled high blood pressure is at a high risk of stroke, heart attack or other lethal disease," Ware said. "But a person who keeps high blood pressure under control -- provided that prior neglect hasn't permanently damaged any organs -- can live as long and healthy a life as a normal person."

The insurance industry's move makes sense in light of the increasing number of people who have controlled high blood pressure. A comparison of studies done from 1960 to 1982 was presented at the 1983 National Conference on High Blood Pressure Control. The studies showed that in the 1960s and early 1970s, only 15 to 20 percent of hypertensive patients had their blood pressure under control. The number has increased to 50 to 70 percent in the past few years.

Data obtained from the National Center for Health Statistics show that from 1972 to 1982 the death rate due to hypertensive heart disease declined 40.7 percent and death rate from stroke declined 42.7 percent.

Although not included in the JAMA study, employees in group health insurance plans can also benefit financially if group members with high blood pressure keep it under control. This doesn't yield a direct saving like the other case, but the group premiums are based on the insurer's "experience" with the entire group -- in other words, how much the insurer has had to pay for claims in the past. So more members keeping pressure under control means fewer expensive heart attacks and strokes, and that means the employer may pay lower premiums in the future.

"People with high blood pressure need motivation to stay with their treatment," Ware said. "As we identify incentives like insurance premium costs, lifetime control can be a little easier."

These questions will be answered as wheat growers will have an opportunity to look at comparison plots and a brief presentation by the Michigan State University wheat breeder.

The meeting will start at 7:30 p.m. at the Harold Hickey farm at the northwest corner of Bradleyville and Darbee Roads (four miles west and one mile north of Fairgrove).

Liquid refreshments will be furnished by Lakeside State Inc. If the weather is inclement, the group will go to the Wagner fertilizer plant, located north of the variety plots.

"Pulse" beats into Cass City

Taking off from the U.S.S. Nimitz's airstrip or being cast for a role in the next James Bond movie seem to be more viable options than cruising the streets of Cass City for the "Pulse."

One of only two owned in Michigan, the Pulse is described by owner David Zatkoff as an "F-1 fighter plane minus the wings."

Zatkoff and his long-and-lean, short-on-gas vehicle were in Cass City June 7 and along with their appearance came some pretty odd looks from passers-by.

"Boy, did I get some strange looks -- especially from the Cass City policemen," Zatkoff, 28, Saginaw, said. "The first thing they (the police) usually do is follow me to see if I have a license plate."

Approximately 60 of the two-passenger, fiberglass-bodied Pulses have been manufactured since January by Owosso Motor Car, Owosso, according to company president Ed Butcher.

Weighing 935 pounds and running on a 400cc Yamaha motor, the Pulse is capable of getting up to 100 miles per gallon and attaining speeds comparable to a compact car. The cost of the vehicle currently is about \$9,000, Zatkoff said. "It rides like a motorcycle. It's smooth and handles well. The driver's view reminds you of being in the cockpit of a plane," said Zatkoff, who uses the Pulse as a sales car for the Roger Zatkoff Co., a Detroit-based rubber/sealing device/packings firm.

The Pulse has an airplane-type steering wheel and shifts like a motorcycle.

Zatkoff said this was the first time he had been into Cass City with the Pulse. He conducted business that day with Walbro Corp., which has purchased goods from the Roger Zatkoff Co. for more than 25 years.

Owosso Motor Car was developed solely to produce the Pulse, thus making it a risky and expensive project.

"It's been a tough go. But

it's such a beautiful project and it's a lot of fun," said Butcher, one of six fledgling owners.

Plans to mass produce the Pulse are in the works. When modifications are complete, the Pulse will include a reverse gear, air conditioning, AM/FM stereo, and plush interior, among others, Butcher said.

"The vehicles have been well-received. It's a commuter vehicle, motorcycle, airplane, whatever. It's fun and useful," Butcher said. The sheer look of the

Pulse makes it a novelty to people of all ages.

"The kids call it 'the rocket,'" Zatkoff said. "They're just super enthusiastic about it. One time I spent about four to six hours just giving kids rides."

The youngsters aren't the only ones who marvel at the Pulse.

"I was driving by Saginaw Steering Gear and there was a film crew doing something there. As I drove by, this huge TV camera turned and took pictures of me instead of doing its job," Zatkoff said.

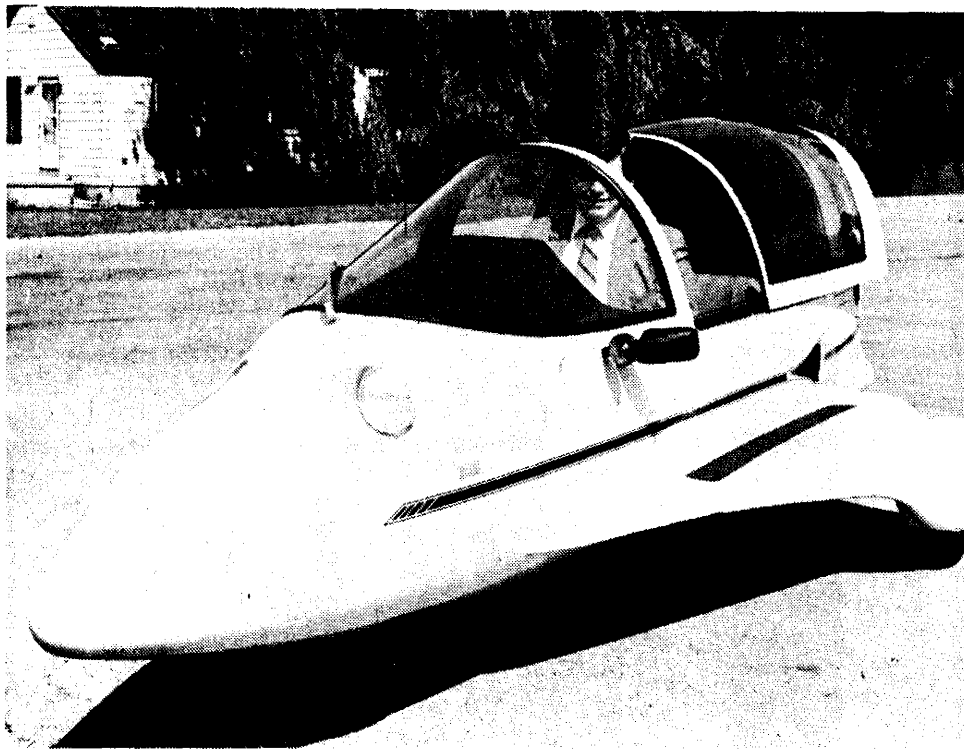

Blackburn was issued a citation for careless driving. The accident happened at 4:39 a.m.

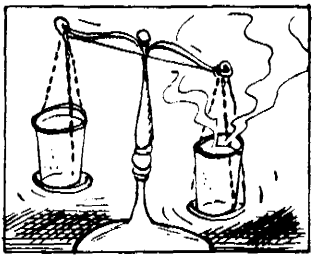
AUTO-DEER ACCIDENTS

ELEPHANTS are used to erect the big top when the circus, sponsored by Cass City Rotary, comes to town July 10.

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

Bradford attributed the reasonably low sticker price to the Shah of Iran's fall in '79 which led to skyrocketing gas prices. The big V-8 engines on the low gas mileage hotrods made them not-so-hot items at that time.

The all-fiberglass body, which does not rust, and the "fun factor" that go with

his car seem to override the fact the car "needs a lot of work," Bradford admits.

But looking back to the first car he owned, a 1974 Vega, Bradford can appreciate the gem he has now.

"What a heap! It was a pile of junk. It had a red body with a white vinyl top," said Bradford grimacing as he described the clunker. "Just before I sold it, I had to put in a quart of oil a day."

Another of Bradford's cars has been "beached in a parking lot for three years waiting to be towed away," he explained. "I think it has mice in it."

Bradford, a graduate of the University of Michigan, and a native of Detroit is a dentist working with Robert Green, DDS, in Cass City. He lives at 6352 Main St., Cass City.

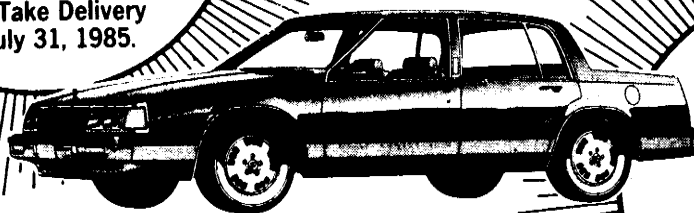

Rutkoski's shop features country style gift items

For Caroline Rutkoski, the opening of The Country Goose, a shop specializing in the sale of folk art dolls, miniature quilts, wooden knickknacks and other special order country folk art items was the culmination of years of practice and studying of her art.

Rutkoski began making country gift items for family members about four years ago. It was a way for her to keep busy after her older children started school. She opened the shop after family members suggested that she sell the items she produced. The name, The Country Goose, was recommended by her sister-in-law.

Rutkoski explained the shop's name comes from one of her early sewing creations, a goose wearing wire frame glasses and dressed in a bonnet and apron. She chose the name because it was something that she feels reflects the country and folk art scene.

The country style is reflected in the bears, stuffed animals and Appalachian and Amish dolls that she makes. Rutkoski attends auction and garage sales, looking for older "ratty looking" quilts that she can cut up to make the stuffed dolls. She explained she prefers the older, hand sewn quilts because they make the dolls look older.

"I guess the sewing just comes naturally," she said about the intricate stitching that she uses to make the dolls and miniature quilts. "I am quite persistent, I don't give up."

Recently she added wooden knickknacks, wall hangings and toys to her collection of items for sale. Rutkoski's husband Ron, an employee at Saginaw Steering Gear, cuts and sands the wooden objects. She paints and stains the wood for a life-like appearance.

Rutkoski has taken classes in painting landscapes and tole painting. She explained that with tole painting, the artist uses certain brush strokes, and must stay within drawn lines. When painting landscapes, she paints and designs the scene at the same time. "I like landscape painting better because it

is so free," she added. Rutkoski said that when painting and sewing, a person has to have a lot of patience to end up with a quality product.

This summer Rutkoski will be selling her hand made items at art fairs throughout the area, and as far away as Flint and Bay City.

"There are a lot of craft shows," she said. "A person could go every single week end if they wanted to." Rutkoski added she limits herself so she isn't away from home every week end.

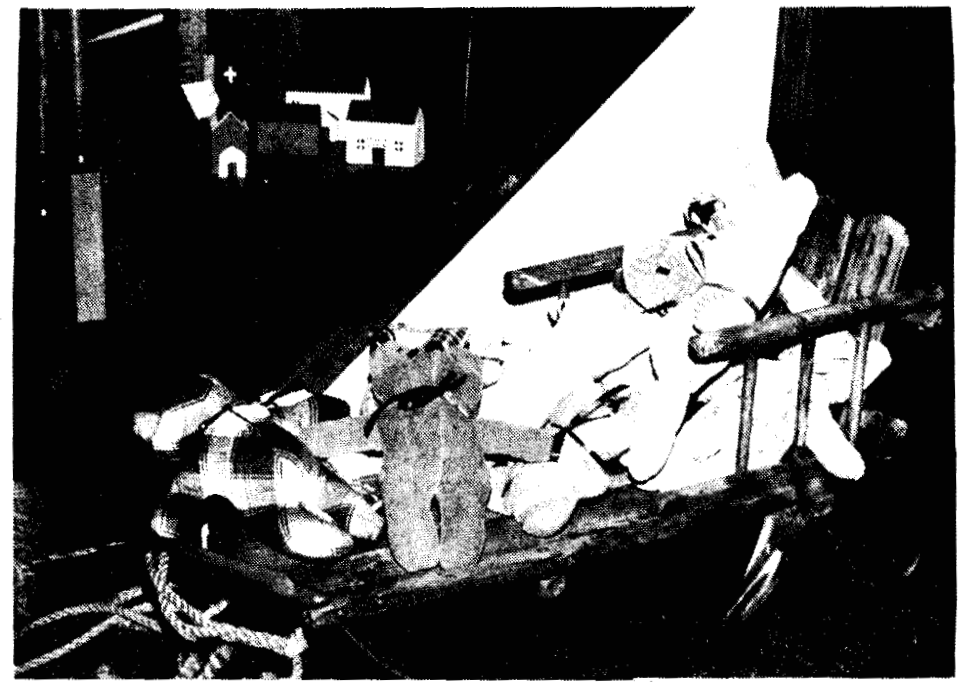

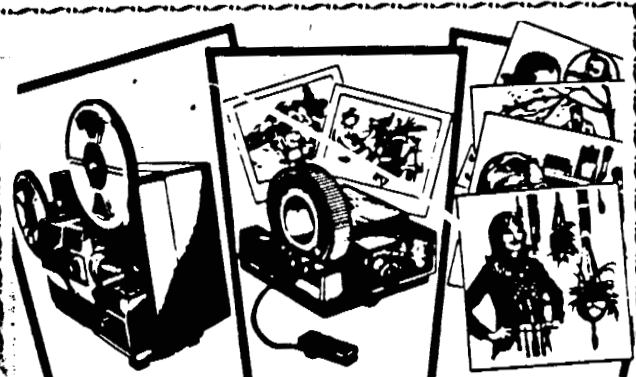
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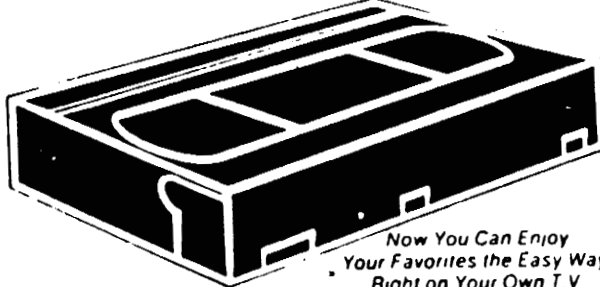

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Dairy farmers face possible price cut

Continued from page one: the profit margin for dairy farmers.

Hicks feels the Reagan administration is not supporting the family farmer. "I think they feel farmers should be shook out, and if

you can't make it, get out," Hicks said. Hicks and his son Fred milk 45 cows, and raise wheat and corn for a cash crop. "That's no better either," Hicks said about the price of wheat and corn.

"It's going to be rough," Hicks said, referring to the possible 50 cent price support cut. Leslie Severance, a Decker area dairy farmer, feels these are the toughest times he has seen since becoming a full-time farmer about 20 years ago.

"It all comes off the profit. It comes right off the top," Severance said about the cuts farmers have taken in the price of milk.

"If there isn't anything left over, then you're in trouble."

Severance milks 90 cows, and his milk production has stayed the same for the past several years.

He agreed that a decrease in the price support of milk, coupled with high interest rates that farmers have to pay on borrowed money, will make it difficult to show a profit on a dairy operation.

Taking stock

The couple, whom we'll call Harry and Mabel, were sitting pretty after a lifetime of work and saving. Recently they had sold the family business. The interest on the installment sale payments came to \$36,000 a year.

Savings over the years totaled \$150,000. At my suggestion, they had put this in tax-exempt bonds. Average yield was 10 percent, giving them an income of \$15,000 from this source.

"What are you doing with so many tax-free?" asked their accountant. "Why don't you invest in mortgages and get 14 percent instead of only 10 percent?"

It's a question that is relayed to me dozens of times a year.

The people who come to me are puzzled, because their "tax man" is something like their doctor — a person you don't argue with.

First of all, I ask them what their tax bracket is. Few of them know what the term means, and if they do know, they're not certain what their particular bracket is.

To figure your own bracket, you have to compute your total income subject to tax and then subtract your exemptions (\$1,000 per person under age 65, \$2,000 if over 65) and then your deductions (gifts to charity, interest paid, etc.). The answer is your net taxable income.

Take the case of Harry and Mabel:

Total taxable income.....\$42,000
Exemptions (Two, over 65).....(4,000)
Deductions (gifts, medical, etc.).....(2,000)
Net taxable income.....\$36,000

Now look at the table in this article. Under the column "Taxable Income in \$000," take the column "Joint Return."

The third figure down in that column is \$35-\$46. Remember, these are in thousands of dollars, so the \$36,000 net taxable income for Harry and Mabel will be on this line.

Since the bracket is for

incomes from \$35,000 to \$46,000, anything from taxable sources added to their \$36,000 (their own total) will be taxed at 33 percent. If they got another \$1,000 taxable income, they'd pay 33 percent tax on it and keep only 67 percent, or \$670.

In other words, for them to keep \$670, they'd have to earn \$1,000. For them to get a 10 percent return after tax, they'd have to get nearly 15 percent before tax. That's just what the table shows. If you go across the line under "Joint Income" showing \$35 (000) to \$46 (000), the next figure is 14.93.

Now we're ready to answer the question of the "tax man": Why do they have tax-free bonds at 10 percent instead of mortgage loans that would bring in 14 percent?

The quick answer from the table is that they'd need income of 14.93 percent to equal the 10 percent tax free. Right?

Wrong. Harry and Mabel had \$150,000 invested in their 10 percent tax-exempt bonds, producing \$15,000 net income. Their accountant would have had them put it in mortgages at 14 percent. That would have given them \$21,000 in income — but here's the rub:

The \$21,000 in taxable income would have been added to the \$36,000 they already had, subject to tax. New total \$57,000. That would have pushed them into a bracket where 01 Whiskers in Washington would have taken 38 percent of income over \$46,000. In that bracket, they would keep only 62 percent of every \$1,000 they earned.

Harry and Mabel would have to get a return of 16.13 percent taxable to equal the 10 percent on their tax-free bonds, once they're in the 38 percent bracket (see table, next-to-last line).

In this case, they're \$1,600 a year better off to go the 10 percent tax-free route. And that's \$1,600 net after-tax "keeping money" — the only kind that counts.

Kern sentences impaired driver

Tuscola County District Court Judge Richard Kern placed an 18-year-old Deford man on probation for two years, and suspended his driver's license for six months after he pleaded guilty to an impaired driving charge.

Judge Kern also ordered Gilbert Freeman, 18, 1417 N. Kingston Rd., Deford, to pay a \$208 fine, \$117 court costs, and \$60 to mental health screening.

Freeman was originally

charged with operating a vehicle while under the influence of alcohol. He was arrested by Tuscola County Sheriff's Department Sgt. Leland Teschendorf April 27. He pleaded guilty to the impaired driving charge May 21.

Under terms of his driver's license suspension, Freeman is allowed to drive to and from work, and to treatment program meetings.

File lawsuit to clean hazardous waste site

A lawsuit filed by Attorney General Frank Kelley is seeking a court order to clean up the Steven's Landfill in Monroe County and for owners of the hazardous waste site to reimburse the state for the cleanup operation.

The Department of Natural Resources ranks the 33-acre site as among the worst three in the state. The suit asks the Monroe

County Circuit Court to implement a DNR cleanup plan, which involves removal of about 400 toxic waste barrels and surface oils to a licensed landfill and continued testing to determine the effect of the contaminants on the land; order the company to reimburse the state for those costs and the lawsuit, and issue an injunction to permit DNR access to the site.

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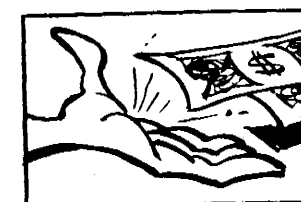
