# Top weather, top events bring 10,000 to festival

More than 10,000 persons, the largest crowd in history, came to Cass City Thursday to enjoy the celebration of America's Independence Day.

"We had a lot more people than ever before," said Curt Strickland, cochairman of the Cass City July 4th Festival committee. "Everything went really good. It couldn't have gone any better."

Strickland said that in past years people would come to the parade, then go home during the afternoon. This year, events were scheduled throughout the afternoon, and people spent the entire day. A large crowd stayed to watch the fireworks display.

Strickland explained that after events such as the popular mud volleyball and softball tournaments, people stayed to watch the music extravaganza featuring the Community Choir and the Sally Doerr Dancers. They were followed by a square dance exhibition and the gospel concert.

A strong wind throughout the day kept the hot air balloons from a scheduled launching, but they were able to inflate the balloons and take them for a short flight behind the high school. Strickland said this was better for the people

### School board approval seen

# Operating engineers sign 3-year pact for raises totaling 15%

Board is expected to ratify an agreement with the Operating Engineers at its next regular session next Monday.

Members of the Operating Engineers at Cass City Schools will receive raises that total 15 percent over three years.

Details of the agreement which has been ratified by the union were presented to the school ooard Monday in a special session. Approval was delayed so that trustees can study the contract. The Operating Engineers includes the cooks, custodians and bus drivers

In the first year, the new agreement will cost taxpayers an estimated \$13,500 over the amounts paid in

The increases are greater in the first year of the contract than they are in the second and third years of the agreement.

In the third year of the contract (1987-88) bus drivers will be paid \$2,080 yearly. Cooks will be paid \$5.50 per hour and custodians will receive \$7.40 per nour.

In addition to the wage increases, adjustments were made in payment for unused sick days. After 70 days are accumulated the 10 days a year earned will be paid as follows:

Custodians from \$7.00 to Cooks from \$5.00 to \$6.00. Bus drivers from \$1.00 to

3.00 per run. Also changed were amounts paid for extra trips. It increases year, \$5 to \$5.25 the second year and from \$5.25 to \$5.50 the third year.

The maximum-minimum for each trip was also increased. The minimum goes to \$9.40 from \$9.01 the ond year and \$10.25 in 1987-

The maximum will be increased from \$53 to \$55 the first year. In 1986-87 the amount will be \$57.50 and in the final year \$60 per trip.

It's the afternoon of the many persons as can be at-


Or switch the date, although switching has many problems, too. People work on non-holiday week days.





If a bow hunter is denied these precious practice sessions then many more deer will be merely maimed or forced to die slow, painful deaths because of poorly placed shots from lack of practice.

All I ask is that the people responsible for this ordinance stop to think of what to 100. You may sign up at they are doing. A five-year-old Cass City boy was treated and released from Hills and Dales General Hospital after his sister shot him with a BB gun June 27.



Since this was my first Cass City July 4th Festival, I cannot compare it with previous years, but several people said the parade was the largest ever, for both entrants and spectators.





Precautions for

mer draw near, the American Heart Association of Michigan would like to remind people of the extra precautions necessary for exercising in the summer "Anyone starting an exercise plan should take it

easy in the beginning, but people who have a set regimen can be harder to convince when it comes to exercising precaution," said Dr. Joseph Rogers, chairman, exercise and cardiac rehabilitation committee, American Heart Association of Michigan. "If precautions are not taken during warm, humid days, heat exhaustion or heat stroke can occur.

"The symptoms of heat exhaustion include a body temperature below normal, headache, dizziness, nausea, and sometimes confusion.

"The other and more serious occurrence is heat stroke. The symptoms are dizziness, headache, thirst, nausea, and cramps. But there are two important symptoms that occur with heat stroke: (1) sweating stops and (2) body temperature may become dangerously high - which can be a serious problem,' Dr. Rogers said. "Both heat exhaustion and heat stroke can be avoided by drinking brisk walk, jogging, or enough liquids to replace those lost in exercising and by taking the important precautions listed below."

On hot, humid days: \*Exercise during cooler parts of the day such as early morning or early evening after the sun has gone down.

\*Exercise less than normal for a week until you become adapted to the

\*Drink lots of fluids, particularly water. You do not need extra salt because you get enough salt in your diet. Also, a well conditioned body learns to conserve salt so that most of the sweat is

\*Watch out for signs of heat stroke.

\*Wear a minimum of light, loose-fitting clothing. elastic suits, sweatshirts, brisk activities do not reand sweat pants. Such clothing will not help you lose weight any faster by making you sweat more. The weight you lose in fluids by sweating will be quickly replaced as soon as you begin drinking fluids again. This

type of clothing can also cause dangerously high temperatures, possibly resulting in heat stroke.

Dr. Rogers said, "Using these precautions as an excuse to avoid exercise isn't valid. Anytime you're pursuing a physical activity, you should use caution, but in general, the benefits gained from the exercise far outweigh the dangers as long as an individual monitors himself.

"Too many people have myths about exercise. There are five myths in particular I'd like to dispel.

Myth 1. Exercising makes you tired. As their body gets more in shape, most people feel exercising gives them even more energy than before. Regular, brisk exercise can also help you resist fatigue and

Myth 2. Exercising takes too much time. Regular exercise does not have to take more than about 25 to 40 minutes, three times a week. Once you've estabmuscle lished a comfortable exercise routine, exercising becomes a natural part of your life.

> Myth 3. All exercises give you the same benefits. All physical activities can give you enjoyment. But only regular, brisk and sustained exercises such as a swimming improve the efficiency of your heart and lungs and burn off a lot of calories. Other activities do not give you these benefits, although they may give you other benefits such as increased flexibility or muscle strength.

Myth 4. The older you are, the less exercise you need. With age we tend to become less physically active, and therefore need to make sure we are getting enough exercise. In general, middle-aged and older people benefit from regular exercise just as young people do. Age need not be a limitation. What is important, no matter what your age, is tailoring the exercise program to your own

fitness level. Myth 5. You have to be \*Avoid rubberized or athletic to exercise. Most quire any special athletic abilities. In fact, many people who found school sports difficult have discovered that these other activities are easy to do and enjoyable.

"Enjoy the summer with exercise," Dr. Rogers said. "You're not expected to be an olympic athlete. Instead, start something as simple as a walking plan. The aerobic benefits are great when you do it right.

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

I was delighted to note that tax-exempt bonds in 1984 scored a 10.55 percent total return, measured by Shearson-Lehman index. Taxable bonds corporate and U.S. government - were up 15.27 percent. An indifferent stock market showed a total return of only 6.10 percent.

Look for the unofficial, but real, trading price for the currency. In Brazil, this is not a black market, necessarily, but an open transaction. For example, in Rio, when we were there, the bank would give 4,000 cruzeiros for a dollar. Hotels, in their usual greedy style, would allow only 3,700 although there would be a bank next door offering 4,000.

There were currency exchange offices, usually with the word Tourism in their name. One was Copacabana Street and another next to the Maximo jewelry store at Rio Branco 25. There, you could get 5,100 to the dollar.

Hotel porters usually had cruzeiros for sale, too. One offered me 4,800 for a dol-

Golly, I bought a gift costing \$200 and paid for it with a cool million cruzeiros. Readers of an older generation will recall transactions like this in the days of the Amos 'n' Andy radio show.

In all my travels, which now include 105 countries on every continent in the world, I have never found a hotel that gave an honest rate of foreign exchange. Always, you can do better by going to a nearby bank. Savings, on average, are 5 percent.

Next time a broker touts you on stocks as an inflation hedge, refer him to The Financial Weekly and its figures on The "Constant-Dollar Dow," published monthly

A recent one compared the Dow averages from 1921 to the present, first the actual figures and then the figures discounted by the CPI - consumer price index. Inflation, in other

Here was the Dow when it nudged 1300 in February. Indexing the average to 1913 dollars at 100, it becomes 120. The indexed figure was at that same level in 1954. After 31 years of varied times - level prices, runaway inflation, a war and other crises - the constant-dollar average is just where it was in 1954. In the great inflationary decade of 1972-1982, the constantdollar stock average dropped from 242 to 120. Some hedge!
