### Teachers to seek wage parity in Thumb schools

Teacher wages, classroom sizes and a possible ortage of teachers were topics of discussion at an Oct. 8 meeting of area teachers and the vice-president of the Michigan Education Association, Mary Christian.

At the meeting, held in Cass City, teachers were told they are paid about 20 percent less than a statewide average for teachers.

eldon Markley, executive director of the MEA's Tri-County Bargaining Association, explained area teachers, with 12 years of seniority and a bachelor's degree, earn less than the state-wide salary for teachers with the same education, regardless of seniority. He added school

the area, pays a teacher contract. with a bachelor's degree and 12 years of experience \$25,800 annually. This is below the 1984-85 state average of \$28,000 for teachers with a bachelor's degree. The state average includes teachers from all steps of the seniority scale.

Markley pointed out teachers in the Kingston School District receive the lowest pay in Tuscola County. A teacher in Kingston with a bachelor's degree and 12 years of experience earns \$23,870 per year. With a master's degree and 12 years of experience a Kingston teacher earns

### Minor injuries in crash

An 81-year-old Cass City resident suffered minor iniuries in a Wednesday afternoon accident at the intersection of Main and Seeger Streets.

According to a report, filed by Cass City Police Officer Dave McComb, Mary L. Kritzman, 81, 4291 Leach Cass City, was westbound on Main Street, attempting to turn south onto Seeger Street. Her vehicle collided with a vehicle driven by Duane E Kursinsky, 37, 175 Maple Circle Dr., Sandusky, who was eastbound on Main Street. Kritzman told officer McComb she did not see Kursinsky's vehicle approaching the intersection.

She was taken to Hills and Dales General Hospital by Service and was treated and released.

Elementary teacher Kay Nguyen was discussed by board members and union representative Manuel Thies. Nguyen has been on sick leave from the district since the beginning of the school year. She filed for sick leave because of pregnancy complications.

Thies claims Nguyen is owed sick leave pay for the current school year. Under the terms of the schoolunion master contract, a school teacher receives 10 sick days each year. Thies explained Nguyen should be paid for 21 sick days, 10 from this year, and 11 she had built up from previous years.

Thies said so far Nguyen has been paid for only 11 sick days, and is still owed 10 for this year. He explained the agreement with the school states the first day of the current school year began Aug. 12, and teachers received their first paycheck for this school year Aug. 23. Thies claims Nguyen's sick leave began Aug. 23, the first day teachers were required in the classroom. He presented a copy of pay statements that show Nguyen was paid for two sick days. Aug. 23 and 24. On a second ay statement, two later, she received payment for the remaining sick days she had accumulated from previous years. According to Thies, Nguyen has not been paid for the 10 sick days she received at the start of the year.

### Lost leg fails to stop Muntz

an outstanding athlete at Owen-Gage High School he carried into each game a winning attitude that gave him an edge over the competition.

Today, less than four months after a tragic farm accident that severed his left leg, Muntz is still relying on that competitive spirit to give him an edge /er the toughest opponent ne has ever faced, the psychological and physical

effects of losing a leg. 'The way I look at it, I will still be able to run the 100-yard dash. I won't be as fast, but I will finish," Muntz said. Although he has not been fitted for an artificial leg, Muntz has not allowed the injury to force m to live the life of an

invalid. "People act like your life should come to an end, but it doesn't have to be that way. I've slowed down. I have to resign myself to that fact, but I am more active than before."

Since the accident, Muntz has returned to driving tractor on his father's and neighbors' farms. He has en deer hunting several ..mes, and Friday nights he scouts upcoming games for Owen-Gage football coach Arnie Besonen. "I really

When Terry Muntz was haven't had any problems, severed in a July 16 grain other than just being slower. There's nothing I have had to quit.

"It's all in your mind,' Muntz said about keeping an optimistic outlook on life. "I've just had the attitude that I am not going to let it stop me. You just keep going. You've got to be tough.

Although Muntz has crutches, he prefers to hop around on one leg. He is able to easily climb the stairs in his parents' Koepfgen Road house. Muntz explained he only uses the crutches when he has to stand for a long time. "I want to be free, to be mobile," he explained. "I've hopped over onequarter of a mile across a dirt field. It's a lot easier than people make it out to be." Muntz admitted he has been hampered by the crutches when he is deer hunting. He explained he move quietly cannot through the woods. When Muntz gets his artificial leg he will be able to walk without a limp, something he is looking forward to. "I want to get out and do as much

looked down and I could see my foot," Muntz said, explaining his foot was lying in the auger. "Five seconds after I saw it, I knew it was gone. I had it in my mind 'don't let yourself go to sleep.' I just prepared myself mentally. I knew I had nothing below my knee . . . I was really

happy I still had my knee.' But dirt and wheat had been forced into cuts above the knee. Infection set in. "I begged them to please save my knee," Muntz said he told doctors at St. Mary's Hospital, Saginaw. Later that night he was airlifted to the University of Michigan Hospital, Ann Arbor. When Muntz awoke the next morning he reached down and felt what remained of his leg. "I've still got my knee," Muntz said were the first words he spoke to family members who spent the night in his room.

But three days later Muntz was taken to surgery to amputate the leg above the knee. He was told the infection had moved above the knee, and it would kill him if the surgery wasn't performed. "It was either the knee or my life.'

Muntz spent one month in the U of M Hospital. Much of the time was spent in the physical therapy department, learning to adjust to the loss of his leg. While in therapy he was around other people who had lost not only an arm or leg, but also their positive attitude on life. "I told them, 'Don't ever give up. There's no reason to give up until you are lying in a box'." Instead of joining the people in their self pity, Muntz forced himself to vigorously pursue his therapy.

"If there was anything that kept me going, it was just watching them. It would get me so mad because the people would let it get to them. I can honestly say I have had only three instances where I have been depressed...I don't let myself get into that situation...I can't change what has happened, so why let it bother me.

Muntz added, support from family, friends and neighbors helped him in his recovery. When he was at the Saginaw Hospital, only hours after the accident. four of his friends visited

him. "My room was filled with flowers...I got over 300 cards. You couldn't ask for a better bunch of people.' Muntz pointed out that neighbors and friends pitched in to harvest the rest of the wheat crop and care for the family farm.

Muntz is excited about getting an artificial leg so he will have complete mobility. He explained the leg will have a hydraulic system to make the knee work, and he will get a spring steel foot so he can still play basketball. While at Owen-Gage, Muntz earned allleague honors in basketball and baseball, and played in track and football.

In January he will attend agricultural classes at Michigan State University. A second semester junior, he will be a crop and soil biologist. He chose to go into an agricultural related field because of his love for farming and the outdoors.

"I am going to do it. I've set a lot of goals," Muntz said, explaining he wants to prove to himself and to others he can complete college, and live an active life involving outdoor activities. "It means so much to me to have someone say 'He doesn't give up'."

A 20 percent increase in teachers' salaries is what the goal is for the union. That would bring salaries from \$20,000 a year average in the Thumb to the State average of \$28,000. In the Thumb these days,

in the only vote that counts, the one cast in the voting booth, approving a 20 percent increase in taxes has about as much chance as farmers have selling land for prices received four years ago.

Elimination of split classes is another area where the union and the Cass City District are far from coming to a meeting of the

That's because if classes aren't split in Evergreen and Deford these schools would have to be closed or, at the very least, consoli-

The MEA says that the better teachers will leave the Thumb and the most qualified new teachers will avoid coming to the schools because of the salaries paid. Past history indicates that the Thumb competes successfully despite the salaries paid.

The union demands in the last couple of years have moderated, at least in the Thumb, but the new campaign announced in Cass City reflects a changing situation.

You can expect the union to be more unyielding in its demands because of it.

There is a growing shortage of teachers. Michigan, with its higher teacher salaries, can draw from other states to a limited degree, but already in certain areas finding a good teacher is hard to do.

You can expect to see more teacher movement down the road as the screws tighten. Persons frozen to jobs will be able to find other jobs more easily and probably keep seniority rights when they do it.

It may be that administrators will find themselves between a rock and a hard place, caught between inflexible demands teachers and solid resistance by taxpayers.

It will work itself out, but until it does there promise to be some nasty potholes on the education trail.

While head lice problems are not running rampant in local schools, it is a problem that Cass City Public Schools nurse Gerri Tonti would like to nip in the bud.

Tonti explained she discovered five cases of head lice last week. So far she has checked the students in the district's three elementary schools, and the intermediate school. "In all of the schools I have found

maybe 10 cases out of 1,100 kids examined, so that's not bad," Tonti said.

If Tonti finds lice or eggs (nits) on a child, parents must take the child to a doctor, or to the Tuscola County Health Department, for a scalp examination. If lice are found on the child, a medicated shampoo is prescribed. The child will not be allowed back into the school until Tonti

"Anybody can get this (head lice). It is nothing to be ashamed of. We (nurses) can get it, teachers can get Tonti said. She explained that head lice are easily passed from one person to another, and having lice is not an indication the family lives in a filthy home

Tonti said she and teachers encourage children not to share items such as combs and hats because they can carry lice from one person to another. Lice cannot jump or hop, they can only move from person to person by being carried on a comb or a hat, or when children's heads touch.

Tonti said a louse can live for one to three days when separated from a human head. The louse lives by sucking blood from the scalp. If left untreated, a louse can live for up to three weeks on a human, and a female can lay several eggs, which will cause the person to be continually in-

Gagetown Elementary School Principal William Britt said the school has been fortunate so far this year. He has not found any cases of lice on children.

A spokesperson for the Tuscola County Health Department said they have recorded a normal number of cases this year.

"It just seems like when school is back in session it becomes a problem," the spokeswoman said. She added that during the summer months children are not in constant contact with other children, as they are during the school year, so the problems with head lice are not as common.

For parents who suspect their child has lice, the Health Department will examine the child free. A health nurse is generally on duty Monday, Wednesday and Friday afternoons at the department offices.

"It is a very tedious and time consuming process,' she said, about getting rid of head lice in the family. She explained the child's hair must be shampooed and combed with a fine tooth comb to remove any eggs. The house, car, and the child's clothing and bedding must also be treated. If parents don't take all of the necessary steps to insure the environment has been killed of lice, the child may become reinfected. "Sometimes we fighting a losing battle."





### Governor opposes **Great Lakes** oil wells

The Governor is seeking support of other governors and Canadian premiers in the region for a statement of principle against oil drilling in the Great Lakes.

The action follows seismic tests for types and quantities of oil and gas in the Upper Great Lakes by a Houston, Texas, exploration company.


State law banning Great Lakes drilling does not cover seismic tests, but in June, Blanchard told the company, Grand Norpac, he opposed the project. Governors of Wisconsin and Minnesota had approved exploration with some restrictions. The region has not adopted a policy against oil drilling in the

The policy statement calls drilling an "unwise risk" and says, "We agree that this precious resource should not be vulnerable to oil drilling and its attendant dangers. Therefore, we collectively state our opposition to drilling in the waters of the Great Lakes or its connecting channels."

The letter went to the governors of Wisconsin, Minnesota, Indiana, Illinois, Ohio, Pennsylvania and New York, and the premiers of Ontario and

Walk your way

back to good health

Home Economist. Walking briskly on a regular schedule will:

--Improve your circulation and help your heart and lungs work more efficiently:

--Burn off extra calories. An average 150-pound person walking at about two miles per hour will use up 240 calories in an hour.

--Help iron away anger and tension.

--Give you more energy. What makes a walk a workout? It's largely a matter of pace and distance. When you are walking to exercise, don't stroll. Move at a steady clip that is brisk enough to make your heart beat faster and cause you to breathe more deeply.

No one can tell you exactly how far or how fast to walk. For answers to those questions, you have to listen to your body. If you've been inactive for a long time, it will take time to get into shape. Build up slowly.

You may want to start by walking for just a few minutes and gradually increase the time, rather than concentrate on distance. To determine how fast, try the test"...you should be able to carry on a conversation while walking. If you are too breathless to talk, you're going too fast. Regularity is the key. To be effective, most authorities agree that you should exercise at least three times a week, preferably on alternate days. Fitness is not a commodity that can be

stored. It's important to warm up before you begin walking. Pay attention to stretching the backs of the legs and thighs.

If a snappy jogging outfit puts you in the mood to walk, by all means wear one. But all you really need are loose comfortable clothes. Dress appropriately for the weather. As it gets cold wear layers, so that you can add or take away as you become cold or hot. Always wear a cap

during cold weather. A good pair of shoes is the one piece of special equipment you will need. Choose a comfortable, sturdy pair that provides good support. Good running shoes are good walking shoes.







University (MSU) researchers is successful.

Niles Kevern, head of the
MSU project. "The fish will
be priced comparable to Starting Oct. 17, the IGA hamburger, but since the fish has a lower fat content. the consumers will be getting more protein for their money than with hamburger.

Kevern explained that commercial fishermen of the Great Lakes have traditionally relied on only a few species of fish, such as lake whitefish or chubs. The numbers of these species vary widely from year to year. By developing markets for non-traditional fish species such as suckers, the fishing industry will be strengthened.

"If the study is successful, it would directly benefit the Saginaw Bay commer-

cial fishery," said Kevern. "With a potential annual catch of one million pounds suckers, between \$270,000 and \$540,000 would be generated, creating eighteen to thirty-six new jobs in the area.

The study is funded by the Great Lakes Development Foundation. It is being conducted by the MSU Department of Fisheries and Wildlife, the Cooperative Extension Service, and the Bay Port Fish Company. The frozen minced fish is processed by the Bay Port Fish Com-

According to Kevern, suckers have a high quality flesh, but are not traditionally fished commercially because of the large number of small bones. By mechanically mincing and deboning the fish, this problem is avoided.

Judge Joslyn sentenced Dennis L. Kammerer Oct. 7 after he pleaded guilty to the charge Sept. 3. In a plea bargaining agreement, Kammerer, 31, 2501 Gerou Rd., Caro, had a second delivery of LSD charge, and a charge of delivery of marijuana dropped.

Kammerer was one of seven Tuscola County residents that were arrested in a July 25 drug raid after undercover law enforcement agents purchased about 100 LSD pills and marijuana.

Kammerer will serve his sentence in Southeastern Michigan Prison, Jackson. He was given credit for two

days already served. On another drug related charge, Judge Joslyn sentenced Arthur C. Howse to 180 days in the Tuscola County Jail on a charge of attempted delivery of marijuana.

Howse, 20, 222 Plum St., Vassar, pleaded guilty to the charge Aug. 5. He was originally charged with de-livery of marijuana Sept. 19, after he sold marijuana to an undercover law enforcement officer.



Blanchard sent SEMTA Acting General Manager Albert Martin a letter notifying him of the possi-

ble deductions. Young said he firmly believes that with the newlyhired Turner Construction Company as project manager, the 2.9 mile elevated transit system can be completed without further overruns and within its projected completion date of January, 1987, his press secretary Robert Berg

He said the priority is to finish the project, not worry about possible overruns.

Austin Urges Five-Year Voter List Purge

Dropping persons from voter registration lists after five years of inactivity and broader local authority regarding deputy registrars has been proposed by Secretary of State Richard Austin.

Those and four other proposals respond to many complaints contained in a pending federal lawsuit that the deputy registrar system acts to unconstitutionally deprive persons of voting rights.

'We believe most of these changes are attainable this year," Austin said.

ceremonies commemorating the 10th anniversary of a state program allowing voter registration at secretary of state branch offices, Austin said the system has resulted in a "significant" increase in the number of registered voters, and that proportion of voting age persons who are registered is the highest among industrial states.

The five year "purge" of voter registration files was twice vetoed last year by Governor Blanchard, who said access to registration must be improved. Austin said the six-part proposal attempts to do that.

Rather than remove persons from the registration list after 10 years of not voting (four years in a non-voting active file and six in an inactive file), the proposal would erase registrations of persons who had not voted in five years.

Austin said he also supports legislation to permit reinstatement of cancelled registrations on election day for voters who could prove they were still residents.

To provide greater ac-Austin proposed granting county clerks the power to appoint deputy registrars with countywide registration authority, instead of authority resting at city and township levels. The state would provide a standardized voter registration form.

Other proposals include: giving the Department of State authority to register voters at group meetings at the request of organizations sponsoring the events; eliminating requirements that voter registrations submitted by mail be notarized, and authorizing voter registration by mail for persons permitted to renew driver licenses by

Austin also proposed using Department of State resources to provide local election officials with address changes and voter registration transactions completed in branch offices, as well as cancellations.

The Secretary of State also said since the branch office voter registration system was adopted, the number of persons regis-tered and of those voting has increased faster than the growth of the voting age

Which would you prefer when you retire?--

1. \$108,714 or 2. \$74,342

Would you believe that three out of four people in the group specified are NOT choosing the \$108,714? All because they're not taking advantage of Individual Retirement Accounts

(IRA's). So why aren't they taking advantage of the IRA plan? Don't they know about it? Or can't they save less than 10 percent of their income. Or what?

Assume they don't know. heaven's sake. Tell them they can invest up to \$2,000 these is taxable each year, a year in an IRA plan and deduct this from their taxable income. It goes on earning, deferring tax until they take it out, which can be as late as 70 years old. Then they do pay tax on amounts taken out.

So you convince them to put in \$2,000 this year. Put it in zero-coupon govern- another choice, and surely ment bonds earning about 11 percent. In 40 years the \$2,000 becomes \$144,952. ### To keep medical facility

### County dispels lease rumors

A copy of a "to whom it may concern" resolution that dispels rumors the Tuscola County Commissioners are going to lease the county-owned medical care facility has been sent to all employees and patients of the facility.

Christ-Commissioner Taylor, explained in the resolution, approved at an Oct. 8 board meeting, that employees and patients of the facility have been incorrectly informed that the facility has been leased to Hills and Dales General Hospital, Cass City. Taylor wrote that rumors are running

rampant and morale at the 123-bed facility has rapidly deteriorated. He cited as an example, one employee was told when he received his pay check it was his final pay from the county.

Taylor explained that

since defeat of a millage increase request at a special Sept. 10 election, commissioners have investigated possible alternatives to streamline county operations. Taylor listed as possible alternatives: The hiring of a county administrator; combining all health care services such as the health department, medical care facility and the mental

health department into a human services department, and the possibility of combining or sharing some services with the county's two hospitals.

Taylor also requested the Social Services Board, who oversees the medical care facility, to squash rumors from the top to the bottom of the employee list," that the facility is being leased. Social Services board

member Kenneth Kennedy, Millington, said the board has placed a stop order on a petition being circulated that instructs the commissioners, to request a 0.25mill increase for the medical care facility. Kennedy explained the petitions were circulated without the authorization of the board, by employees of the facility, and family members of patients. In one day they collected about 1,500 signatures, more than is required to place the issue on

Kennedy added the social services board had requested the commissioners put a separate issue on the Sept. 10 ballot to raise funding for the facility. The board felt that voters would have approved the request.

the ballot.

Kennedy said the petitions have been put on hold until the social services board and the county commissioners can sit down and clarify some of the is-

The final statement of resolution states: "Again we must assure you that we have no intention of leaving patients homeless, nor are we going to tolerate further undermining of morale."

JAIL IMPROVEMENTS

Also at the meeting, commissioners instructed the building and grounds committee to hire an architect to draw up plans for a detoxification cell, holding area and a multipurpose room for the county jail. The

changes are needed to bring the jail into compliance with rules and policies of the Michigan Corrections Commission.

Sheriff Paul Berry explained the jail has been out of compliance with commission rules for the past five years. Whenever the jail is inspected, Berry said the three areas are always cited for improvements.

Berry explained the existing detoxification cell and holding area need to be remodeled, and a multipurpose room could be added by placing a roof and a floor in an existing outdoor recreation area. He explained the walls are already in place for the multipurpose

Berry gave an "educated guess" of about \$50,000 for the cost of the improvements. He added if the im provements had been done about five years ago, when it was first recommended by the commission, the cost would have been less.

Berry added if the county does not make the improvements, sooner or later the state will force them to, or make the county take prisoners to another jail, and pay rent at that facility.

"Our facility is basically a good one," the lawman said. "Let's get it done. I want to be progressive and keep things up to date."

Also at the meeting, commissioners agreed to sell 80 acres of county-owned property to the highest bid-

Commissioner Royce Russell, Cass City, said the property, located on Ludei Road near the Skill Center, has been rented out to a farmer for several years. If the county accepts a bid, the money will be put into the building and site fund for future expansion. "If you are going to sell property, it (the money) should be used to buy property," Russell said. Of the 80 acres, about 12 to 15 acres are wooded.

### Stewards take charge of three Snover churches

In the Snover area, husband and wife farming teams are common in the rural community, but this summer a new type of husband and wife team came to town, a team dedicated to the spiritual growth of the community.

When Ed and Priscilla Steward took over the pastoral duties of the Trinity United Methodist Church, Snover, and the Moore and Elmer United Methodist Churches, they set their sights on bringing younger people into the church.

"These three churches are, as is the case with most churches, going through a phase where the population is growing older," Rev. Ed said. The age group they are trying to reach is the young children up to age 30, the age where many people don't come to church. "The emphasis is to build in a

wider group of ages." Since coming to the Snover area in June, they have begun youth groups and their youngest son Doug, a senior at Sandusky High School, has become a patrol leader for a Snover Cub Scout group.

This is the second fulltime appointment for the Stewards. Although they have always been active in Methodist Church life, they didn't become pastors until 1982. Ed is 46. Priscilla is 48. They have three sons.

Before Ed decided to become local pastor he worked as a grocery store manager for 25 years. "It's not that I wasn't happy. It just came down to what was more important." He added he had been putting off going into the ministry for many years.

After a brief period when the Stewards served as interim pastors, they took over their first full-time pastoral position at the Glennie, Curran and Wilber **United Methodist Churches** in northeastern Michigan. At that time Priscilla was the local pastor, and Ed served as the associate pastor. After 21/2 years the Stewards were transferred to the Snover area.

The Stewards still have three churches to care for, but this time Ed is the local pastor, and Priscilla has taken over as the student pastor.

Priscilla explained she wanted to be the student more time for her college studies. She is a junior at Saginaw Valley State College where she is majoring in history, and minoring in sociology and philosophy. After she earns her bachelor's degree she plans on attending a seminary that, after graduation, will allow her to become an ordained United Methodist minister.

Priscilla said women pastors are becoming more and more common in the Methodist Church. She estimates this year, about 50 percent of the graduating class from seminaries will


be women. "I believe the United Methodist Church leads all other denominations in women in the ministry," she said. "I think women are very well suited to the ministry." Of the 45 active bishops in the Methodist Church three are women.

Priscilla added she has been well accepted by the congregations. This is the first time a woman has served as a pastor at the and Moore Spover churches.

She said it would probably be more sensible for her to devote all of her time to her studies and graduate as soon as possible, but "something inside of me wants to preach and teach and be part of the congregation." Each summer Ed goes to school for about a month at the Garrett Evangelical Theological Seminary in Evanston, Ill. He explained that during that month he is tested on studies he has worked on during the year.

Each week the husband and wife pastoral team takes turns preaching at the different churches. If Priscilla preaches at the Moore and Elmer churches one Sunday, the next week she will preach in Snover. and that Sunday, Ed will preach at the two churches.

Priscilla explained the three churches are less than 10 miles apart, but they have not been forced to consolidate. "Each congregation is unique, with their own tradition. They are proud of that tradition,' she said.

Place roast on rack in shallow pan. Roast in pre-heated 325 F. oven, uncovered, to desired degree of doneness. Baste frequently with marinade. Note: Choose a roast weighing no less than 3 lbs. for open pan roasting. Do not add water. Roasts with bone-in should be placed in a shallow pan without rack.

Pour mixture over meat and stir. Cut green peppers into thin strips and cut tomatoes into wedges. Quickly brown beef strips (% at a time) in hot oil and remove from pan. Reduce heat; add green pepper, garlic and water to pan and cook until green pepper is tender-crisp, 5 to 6 minutes. Stir in meat and tomatoes and heat through.
