Two things are sure following the meeting last Tuesday of the Michigan Education Association in Cass City. One is that teachers will be taking a more militant stance in negotiations. The second is that the requests as outlined at the meeting are light-years away from what area boards of education see as meeting the desires of the taxpayers.

A 20 percent increase in teachers' salaries is what the goal is for the union. That would bring salaries from \$20,000 a year average in the Thumb to the State average of \$28,000. In the Thumb these days, the one cast in the voting booth, approving a 20 percent increase in taxes has about as much chance as farmers have selling land for prices received four years ago.

Elimination of split classes is another area where the union and the Cass City District are far from coming to a meeting of the minds.

That's because if classes aren't split in Evergreen and Deford these schools would have to be closed or, at the very least, consolidated.

The MEA says that the better teachers will leave the Thumb and the most qualified new teachers will avoid coming to the schools because of the salaries paid. Past history indicates that the Thumb competes successfully despite the salaries paid.

The union demands in the last couple of years have moderated, at least in the Thumb, but the new campaign announced in Cass City reflects a changing situation.

You can expect the union to be more unyielding in its demands because of it. There is a growing shortage of teachers. Michigan, with its higher teacher salaries, can draw from other states to a limited degree, but already in certain areas finding a good teacher is hard to do.

You can expect to see more teacher movement down the road as the screws tighten. Persons frozen to jobs will be able to find other jobs more easily and probably keep seniority rights when they do it.

It may be that administrators will find themselves between a rock and a hard place, caught between inflexible demands of teachers and solid resistance by taxpayers.

It will work itself out, but until it does there promise to be some nasty potholes on the education trail.

Preaching peace

"If you were my wife, I'd never let you out of my sight," I said, using my favorite movie cliché.

"I am your wife," she said.

That's right, and that's why I wouldn't attend the doctors' peace game without her.

Because of their publicity-access job, not their sparkling personality, columnists are invited to a wide range of functions, along with their spouses. My wife often complains about the invitations I accept, and those I reject.

Recently, for example, we were invited to live in a \$500,000 mansion in Bloomfield Hills for two days as part of a builders association promotion. My wife thought it would be interesting to discover how plush her home might have been if she'd married more wisely. But I reminded her of the night I drove our old car through a Bloomfield Hills neighborhood and several burglar alarms were automatically activated. It was uncomfortable. I'd rather spend two days on an Anchor Bar stool.

So, instead of Bloomfield Hills, we went to Dearborn to hear a gang of doctors preach peace. Knowing how much I hate speeches, my wife demanded an explanation. I told her about Sister Elizabeth Walters, a 42-year-old Lansing nun recently jailed for 60 days for conspiring against a missile manufacturer.

Now get this: Sister Elizabeth had already served 15 days and paid fines for disturbing the peace outside Williams International Corp. in Oakland County. Her dastardly deed was trespassing and littering — she placed toys in the Williams driveway — and her original sentence was fair for a crime comparable to ignoring a "Keep Off the Grass" sign.

But it wasn't enough for Oakland County. Sister Elizabeth was also convicted of conspiracy to

disturb the peace. That means she talked! to someone about walking on the grass before walking on it. When she balked at paying a fine and reporting to a probation officer for merely talking, she was put back in jail.

For 60 more days, the public will be protected from the dangerous conspiracies of Sister Elizabeth.

When the punishment of peace-game players is aimed at stifling dissent, rather than administering equal justice, I get so angry I want to go out and play a peace game myself. So we listened to the doctors say such things as:

"War starts in human minds, and it can be prevented in human minds."

"When U.S.-Soviet peace negotiations end in failure, the only thing to do is begin new negotiations. We can either live together or perish together."

For peace-game players, it was pretty ordinary stuff, notable for only one reason: The speakers were Soviet doctors, guests of the Detroit chapter of Physicians for Social Responsibility. "They look just like us and say the same things,"

my wife said. Sure. But if I don't tell you it is naive to believe the Soviets — especially their leaders — desire peace just as much as we do, William Buckley surely will, and he's smarter than everybody.

However, when the friendly man across the dinner table says he plays peace games for the sake of his grandchildren, I'm not going to call him a liar because he's a Russian. It feels good to believe him, and it feels right to wish such belief was widely contagious. There is something to be said for rampant naivete', and I just said it.

The morning after the doctors, my wife also used a movie cliché: "Last night was wonderful."

Paul Newman hears it under different circumstances but, in the quest for peace, I'll settle for whatever I can get.

# School acts to nip head lice spread

While head lice problems are not running rampant in local schools, it is a problem that Cass City Public Schools nurse Gerri Tonti would like to nip in the bud.

Tonti explained she discovered five cases of head lice last week. So far she has checked the students in the district's three elementary schools, and the intermediate school. "In all of the schools I have found

maybe 10 cases out of 1,100 kids examined, so that's not bad," Tonti said.

If Tonti finds lice or eggs (nits) on a child, parents must take the child to a doctor, or to the Tuscola County Health Department, for a scalp examination. If lice are found on the child, a medicated shampoo is prescribed. The child will not be allowed back into the school until Tonti

again examines him to be sure his hair is free of lice.

"Anybody can get this (head lice). It is nothing to be ashamed of. We (nurses) can get it, teachers can get it," Tonti said. She explained that head lice are easily passed from one person to another, and having lice is not an indication the family lives in a filthy home.

Tonti said she and teachers encourage children not to share items such as combs and hats because they can carry lice from one person to another. Lice cannot jump or hop, they can only move from person to person by being carried on a comb or a hat, or when children's heads touch.

Tonti said a louse can live for one to three days when separated from a human head. The louse lives by sucking blood from the scalp. If left untreated, a louse can live for up to three weeks on a human, and a female can lay several eggs, which will cause the person to be continually infested.

Tonti explained lice are difficult to see, but it is easy for a parent to recognize if the child has been infested. With a magnifying glass the parent can see small, silver colored eggs attached to individual hairs. When checking, the parents should look carefully at the back of the head, and behind the child's ears. In severe cases of infestation the child's lymph glands in the neck and arms may become swollen. The child persistently scratching may be an indication of lice.

After the child's hair has been shampooed with the special shampoo, the house, clothing and bedding must also be cared for. Tonti said there are sprays that can be used to kill the lice in the house. Furniture and rugs should be vacuumed thoroughly. The child's clothing should be washed and put into a hot dryer. Temperatures of 120 to 140 degrees will kill or stun the louse. "If you give a child a treatment, the bedding should be washed so he doesn't crawl back

into the bed and get reinfested," Tonti said.

She explained because lice can live for a maximum of three days without human contact, lice on a child's stuffed toys can be killed by placing them in a sealed plastic bag for three days.

Gagetown Elementary School Principal William Britt said the school has been fortunate so far this year. He has not found any cases of lice on children.

A spokesperson for the Tuscola County Health Department said they have recorded a normal number of cases this year.

"It just seems like when school is back in session it becomes a problem," the spokeswoman said. She added that during the summer months children are not in constant contact with other children, as they are during the school year, so the problems with head lice are not as common.

For parents who suspect their child has lice, the Health Department will examine the child free. A health nurse is generally on duty Monday, Wednesday and Friday afternoons at the department offices.

"It is a very tedious and time consuming process," she said, about getting rid of head lice in the family. She explained the child's hair must be shampooed and combed with a fine tooth comb to remove any eggs. The house, car, and the child's clothing and bedding must also be treated. If parents don't take all of the necessary steps to insure the environment has been killed of lice, the child may become reinfested. "Sometimes we are fighting a losing battle."

Otto Bacon, director of pharmacy for Hills and Dales General Hospital, said there are several over-the-counter shampoos av-

ailable that will kill head lice. He explained they work well, and are inexpensive. Bacon said a pharmacist can recommend what

the parent needs to take care of the louse problem. Bacon added the parent should only use the medicated shampoo if they are

sure the child has head lice. If there are any open sores Bacon recommends the child be taken to a physician.

## Trustees agree to honor contract in grievance dispute

Thies, claiming Nguyen has already been paid for her 10 days of sick leave. He explained she was paid for the sick days in her paycheck because she has already received two paychecks, and has not yet been in the classroom.

The discussion ended with a motion by trustee

Joseph Warack stating if Nguyen has the sick pay coming, she will be paid for it under the school's agreement with the union in the master contract. "I am sure we will be abiding by the contract, and the board will do what is just," Warack said.

### OTHER BUSINESS

The board agreed to hire

Royce Ehrle as the new band director.

Trustees agreed to hire Jeanine Brinkman to replace Pat Enderle as the teacher's aide at the Gagetown Elementary School. Enderle replaced Nguyen who is on sick leave.

Diane Warack was hired to be the instructor of a preschool class for children in the school district. The board agreed to pay Warack 20 percent of the base salary rate for teaching two 10-week sessions of preschool classes. Morning and afternoon preschool sessions are held at the high school on Tuesdays and Thursdays. The school charges \$30 per student for each 10-week session. Warack will be paid about \$2,900 for the school year.

Erickson told the board he will attempt to clarify the sewage usage fee for the Owendale High School building. He explained the district is being charged 10 times the household rate for a hookup fee, but their usage fee is to be higher than 10 times the household rate. Erickson said a household in the village will pay \$30 every two months for sewer service, but the school is going to be charged \$900 every two months.

"We seem to be paying more than our fair share," Erickson said. He will try

to meet with the village council as soon as possible.

The board approved a request from High School Principal Wayne Wright that sets a limit on the number of unexcused absences. In the past the board has had a policy that students are allowed 12 absences, but the number of unexcused absences was not defined. Under the new policy, students who have seven unexcused absences will not receive credit for the classes from which they were absent.

The board commended the high school cafeteria staff on receiving a 100 percent inspection rating from the Huron County Health Department.

Trustees gave Wright approval to go to the Thumb D League board and vote to raise the prices of sporting events to \$2 for adults. In the past, throughout the league, the cost of an adult ticket has been \$1.50, and \$1 for students. The student rate will not change. It is up to the league board of athletic directors to determine the admission charge for games. If the increase is approved by the league board of directors, the maximum amount a school can charge is \$2 per adult ticket. The school can elect to charge less.

Trustees thanked John Olszak for the donation of an engine stand for the district.

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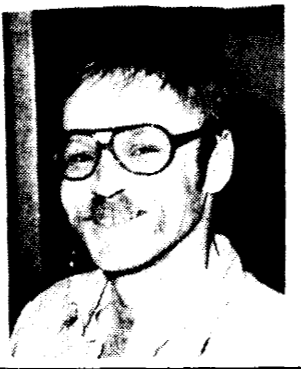

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# Governor opposes Great Lakes oil wells

The Governor is seeking support of other governors and Canadian premiers in the region for a statement of principle against oil drilling in the Great Lakes.

The action follows seismic tests for types and quantities of oil and gas in the Upper Great Lakes by a Houston, Texas, exploration company.

State law banning Great Lakes drilling does not cover seismic tests, but in June, Blanchard told the company, Grand Norpac, he opposed the project. Governors of Wisconsin and Minnesota had approved exploration with some restrictions. The region has not adopted a policy against oil drilling in the lakes.

The policy statement calls drilling an "unwise risk" and says, "We agree that this precious resource should not be vulnerable to oil drilling and its attendant dangers. Therefore, we collectively state our opposition to drilling in the waters of the Great Lakes or its connecting channels."

The letter went to the governors of Wisconsin, Minnesota, Indiana, Illinois, Ohio, Pennsylvania and New York, and the premiers of Ontario and Quebec.
