# Village ready for Halloween

Last year, Halloween night in Cass City was a quiet and safe evening for both residents and pranksters. Police Chief Gene Wilson plans on making that a tradition.

"I will have extra patrol units on all week, starting Monday (Oct. 28)," said Cass City's top lawman. He explained that Monday and Tuesday, he would have two patrol units inside the village limits. Wednesday and Thursday night, he plans on having three patrol units and five officers on duty to cover the peak

Chief Wilson has instructed his officers to "lay down the law, tough" when it comes to dealing with pranksters who have gotten out of hand. Pranksters 17 years old and older whose Halloween pranks are more than harmless tricks, may find themselves receiving a ticket, or possibly being escorted to the Tuscola County Jail. Pranksters who are underage will be taken home, to their parents, and may possibly face an arraignment in probate court.

Chief Wilson requests that persons who are giving out treats turn on all outside lights to make it easier for children to find their way. He asks residents to give out only packaged candy. If the candy bar has been opened or appears to have been tampered with, parents should not allow the child to eat the treat. Apples and other fruits should be washed and inspected. If parents find any contaminated food, they are to report it to the Tuscola County Sheriff's Depart-

"We would like to see parents escort their children if they are below junior high school age," Chief Wilson



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# Area food closets to operate on reduced funds

Local food closets will find themselves relying more on local contributions and less on federal dollars to supply emergency food to families in need because the federal government cut funding by about one-third.

According to Pat Christie, community services coordinator for the Human Development Commission, a grant of \$10,104 for this fiscal year is down about \$33,000 from last year's funding levels.

Christie explained the money is used to purchase food that is distributed by a local United Way Federal

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Agency board. Funds are also used for emergency heating and shelter needs. The announcement of the cut comes at the start of HDC's busiest season, from October to April, when more people are in need of emergency funds for heating fuel supplies.

Christie said the board received \$33,000 to fund emergency programs in January. By July the funding had been used up. She added they were "lucky to have food on hand," and received enough donations from local individuals to get the food pantries Emergency Management through the year. She ex-

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pects to receive the \$10,104 by Dec. 1. Without community support and donations, funds could be used up in 60 to 90 days. Christie added that Sanilac County received \$7,938, also about one-third of what was received last year.

The amount of support the counties receive is based on poverty levels, and continuing high un-employment. Thirty-five counties in Michigan received the funding from the federal government.

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
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# **McLeody** Days

At the time I could have ione without the 6'5" science teacher who intimidated freshmen with his physical appearance, not to mention his high demands of a student. It was Lucas who (mercifully) ended my freshman football season at the end of the first six-week grading period. The loss of a 105-pound second (maybe third) string offensive guard didn't cause any waves around Brown City High School, but the E on my report card caused a lot of waves at home.

Brown City High School required students to earn a 2.0 (C) grade point average before they were allowed to participate in extracurricular activities, the same as Owen-Gage schools re-

When I started high school I was ready for the extra, but not the curricular part of the deal. Lucas changed all of that. For the first time in my young academic career, I had to get down and work, not just so I could play football, but to survive. Thoughts of repeating freshman science as a sophomore made me uckle down to the point

where I earned an A from Lucas three grading periods later. For me the motivation from the E lasted a lot longer than the football season. Ironically, Lucas was also a basketball coach. He didn't show any favoritism towards jocks. If you passed his class, you earned it.

Once again, for the first time in about 20 years, academic eligibility has become an issue of interest to me. This time I get to hear about it whenever I walk over to the sidelines at an Owen-Gage football game. Two weeks ago, six Bulldog players were declared ineligible because of the 2.0 requirement, angering a lot of the parents who are now nable to see their sons

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

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enough.

I can understand Coach Arnie Besonen's frustrations over losing six of his top players. One thing I like about Besonen, he isn't complaining about the 2.0 requirements. His concern is that Owen-Gage is the only school in the Thumb D League that requires a C average for students participating in sports. Because he lost so many players, he has had to use inexperienced freshman players against teams with larger and experienced juniors and seniors. I honestly believe when he was talking about

forfeiting his last two games, Besonen's concerns were not with winning or losing, but with the safety of his smaller players. Besonen decided to play because he wasn't going up against teams with big players in the last two games. I agree with Besonen that all schools in the league, under the same eligibility

and the state should play requirements. I feel it is up to the state to set that requirement at a 2.0. Presently, most schools operate under the state requirement that a student must pass three classes to remain eligible. This means a player could receive three "D's" and still suit up for the Friday night contest. I can't understand how

state educators, who are al-

ways bragging about im-

proved scores on nationwide tests, still allow a student to play sports while receiving below average grades. To me it would be a cruel joke to allow an outstanding athlete to earn a college scholarship, and not be able to take advantage of it because he can't cut it in freshman English. I would estimate the chances of a high school football player ever playing professionally are about as good picking six two-digit numbers in the Lotto. But the student, even if he is a

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

will force some farmers to place harvested corn in makeshift storage, and will increase the possibility of insect problems in grain. To prevent such problems, farmers need to start with clean, low-moisture grain and use good management techniques. Adequate moisture protection and ventilation are essential for preventing grain insect infestation, because moist grain allows insects to flourish

When bins are full, farmers are likely to start putting their corn in flat storage. Because flat storage has a high surface-to-volume ration, much of the corn is on a surface where it may be exposed to moisture. Farmers need to take extra care in sealing the grain in this type of storage to prevent moisture seep-

and decreases pesticide ef-

fectiveness.

Grain should always be treated with an insecticide when it's put in storage. Once grain is stored, farmers need to check it about twice a week for insects.

Broken kernels, webbing and off-colored grain are all indications of insect infestation. Surface worms. such as the Indian meal moth, are common in grain but remain stored mostly on the top of grain. Insects on the surface can be eliminated by scraping off the top layer.

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





According to Michigan Department of Transportation Director James P. Pitz, 80 percent of the funds for the replacement of bridges will come from the federal government. 



# Boards to meet on medical facility

At an Oct. 21 meeting, the Tuscola County Commissioners requested a meeting with the Social Services board to try and resolve communications problems over the county-owned Medical Care Facility.

The problem stems from some commissioners talking with area hospital directors about the possibility of local hospitals taking over some of the facility's services. Workers and family members of patients at the 123-bed facility began circulating petitions, requesting commissioners to ask voters to approve a 0.25 mill increase to fund the facility. The circulation of the petition angered several of the county commissioners.

"They excited people over there," Commissioner Royce Russell, Cass City, said about the petitions and rumors that circulated at the facility. One employee was told when he received his pay check it would be the last pay he would receive from the county. "There was no need to get them excited."

Social Services board member Kenneth Kennedy said the petitions were circulated without the board's approval, and the board told circulators to stop getting signatures.

"It's nothing more than trying to get them on the right track," Russell said, about the Nov. 12 meeting with the Social Services board. The petitions request that

a millage proposal, only for the Medical Care Facility, be placed before the voters. In the past, commissioners had decided not to request millage increases for individual departments. "We will draw up our own

resolution when the time comes," Russell said, about the possibility of a special millage increase request.

He added if commissioners did decide to ask for another millage increase it would probably be on the August 1986 primary ballot. Russell explained it is past the Sept. 15 deadline for collection on this year's tax roll. He added the cost of a special election in the county is \$20,000.





# Asbestos removal to be expensive

moving it," the spokesman, who also requested not to be identified, said. "It's horrible stuff. It has very fine, light fibers.'

After removal, before a school building can be opened, the air must be tested to determine if all asbestos fibers have been

According to EPA rules under which Michigan schools operate, a district with asbestos in the buildings can remove it, encapsulate (cover over with a heavy epoxy paint) or simply post a sign informing employees, students and parents the building has asbestos material.

An EPA spokesman said is "unfortunate" that districts can just post a sign because it doesn't require the asbestos to be removed. If a school district knows it has asbestos, and does not post a sign, it can be fined up to \$6,000 per building by the EPA.

Last year in Michigan, 22 school districts were fined a total of \$700,000. Schools in the Detroit area were fined \$456,000. In the Saginaw area, \$11,000 in fines were levied.

Dick Claflin, State Board of Education asbestos consultant, said this year the

federal government has allocated \$50 million to all 50 states for asbestos removal

and encapsulation. Claflin explained in Ohio a team of specialists inspected all of the school buildings in the state, and estimated it will cost \$1 billion to remove asbestos materials from all of the state's school buildings.

Claflin said the EPA has one inspector looking at 5,000 school buildings in Michigan. The inspector has found some school districts have tried to address the problem themselves, but have made matters worse. He explained in one school, heat ducts wrapped in asbestos were scraped, but the asbestos was allowed to fall on the ground, making the fibers more prone to become airborne.

Claflin added that down the road, school boards may find themselves facing yet another problem with school construction. He has heard that urethane foam, an insulating material that became common in the 1970's, is being inspected for possible health related problems.



The report states Grice failed a sobriety test and was taken to the Tuscola


