Fact finder called

School sure for next 4 months

Cass City Schools are operating under a consent agreement that assures that there will be school until at least Feb. 2, 1987, but it appears as if the Tri-County Bargaining Association, representing Cass City teachers, and the school district are still not close to reaching a settlement on the economic issues that caused an 11-day strike.

Both the school and the union can't officially comment on the state of the negotiations because the bargaining is under the jurisdiction of the Tuscola County Circuit Court, which has issued a gag rule on both parties, Sheldon Markley, negotiator for the union, said Monday.

In the consent agreement reached Friday, the teachers agreed not to strike until after Feb. 1 and to give 10 days' notice if they plan to strike again

An indication of the lack

of progress in negotiations can be determined from the action of the court under which bargaining is continuing. It has ordered fact finding. The procedure is for 3 names to be submitted as the fact finder. The school and the union have the right to cross one name off the list. The fact finder is selected from the name

or names remaining. Prior to the agreement,

negotiators bargained Wednesday, Thursday and Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the courthouse in Caro. Representing the school for all the sessions was Donald Crouse. superintendent. Others working some of the time were Al Luce, school negotiator, and various board. Representing the union were Markley, Diane Williams and Geraldine

After the fact finder makes recommendations, the parties will bargain again. However, the recommendations are not binding

Dunn challenges DNR plan for restoring fish to Cass River

Sometime next spring and summer, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) will conduct a series of meetings explaining why it's to the best interest of everyone to kill all the fish in the Cass River and replant with desirable game fish.

Dave Dunn of Cass City hopes that the meetings will draw large crowds and that most of them will heed the nessage he is preaching to everyone that will listen, and tell the DNR to leave well enough alone.

Dunn is an avid fisherman. He fishes all over, but the Cass River is the one that he loves the most and he says his hundreds of hours on the river and his training (he has a bachelor's degree in forestry and a minor in entomology) qualifies him to challenge the proposed prog-

Authorities of the fish division of the DNR know Dunn and his views well. He has written letters and right today is busy compiling a file of the big fish caught in the Cass. He laboriously waded through back issues of the Chronicle to pinpoint dates that big fish were caught in the river by local anglers.

What are the bones of contention between Dunn and DNR? They differ on just about every key issue.

The DNR points to a survev taken at 13 different locations in the Thumb. It showed, says Joe Leonardi, DNR fishing technician from Imlay City, that 75 percent of the fish were non-game fish such as carp, suckers, red horse and others, 15 percent were minnows and other forage fish and only 10 percent were game fish, pike, bass and bluegills.

The department formed these conclusions from 33,000 pounds of fish taken in a total of 12 acres of stream from the headwaters to the dam at Frankenmuth. Of the total collected, 24,000 pounds were undesirable fish. The test sites included riffles and pools where all fish were killed by chemicals in 700 feet of

Dunn refutes these claims. He says that the tests were taken in water where the big fish just don't stay. You have to seek them

out, but they are there. The DNR says that carp in the river are ruinous to the habitat because they constantly root around in the bottom of the stream

and keep the water dirty and the river's ability for natural reproduction of game fish down. As proof, Leonardi points to the Black River, which received the all fish kill treatment. Before removing the trash fish, that stream was so dirty that you couldn't see 2 inches below the surface. Today it's possible to see to the bottom.

Dunn challenges the DNR about this, too. He says that carp rile up the stream for only a couple of yards and then the river cleans itself. He also says that at certain times the Cass is clear now, depending on rain and other fac-

Dunn feels that all the killing of the fish in the river will do is kill any fishing for 2 years, perhaps bring irreparable harm to the insect population and make no difference at all in the number of game fish avail-

The DNR plan calls for the reintroduction of game fish in what the fish division sees as a much better habitat capable of supporting more game fish that sportsmen seek.

Right or wrong, it's sure that Dunn's campaign will see that the entire issue is publicized and explained.

The DNR feels that it's all to the good, too. That's why we are going to hold these meetings, Leonardi says. We want to do what the majority of the people feel is right. If we don't have popular support, he concludes, it's almost sure that the program will be dropped, even if the money is available for it.





Torrential rains soaked the county with reported amounts from 7 to nearly 13 inches in surrounding areas. Cash crop farmers are well aware of some of the problems to come. Of primary concern is the welfare of the dry bean crop. If the weather clears and stays cool and dry, the beans may come through with only somewhat low-

ered yields. The saturated soil will cause beans to mature quicker than normal, because of the loss of oxygen in the soil. Another major concern is the temperature forecast for the next few weeks. Hot weather in combination with all this moisture could cause tremendous mold growth and ruin

Moisture testers are available in extension offices if you would like to purchase one. We can't do anything about the weather but we can take what we're given and manage it to the best of our ability. That's what is important to remember.

INSULATION WITH VENTILATION **IMPORTANT** IN YOUR HOME

With energy costs expected to soar unabated for the next 10 years, wise homeowners across the country are busily tightening up their homes by plugging leaks, adding storm windows and doors, and installing increased amounts of insula-

In their efforts to save money and keep their dwellings cooler in the summer and warmer in the winter, however, many homeowners are concerned about creating overly "air-tight" homes.

By sealing a home too tightly, water vapor from such everyday activities as cooking, cleaning, bathing and laundry might not be able to disperse to the outside.

Instead, it could collect in the attic or walls, soak the insulation and decrease its effectiveness. Water vapor can also soak into the internal structure of a home and create musty smells, stained ceilings, crumbling plaster and peeling paint.

Energy conservation experts at the CertainTeed Home Institute say the remedy is simple. Sufficient ventilation and proper installation of vapor barriers will prevent the collection of too much water vapor.

Vapor barriers retard the flow of moisture from the inside air through walls. They can be purchased already attached to the insulation, as in the case of Certain-Teed's foil or kraft-faced fiber glass insulation, or can be bought separately, as in the case of polyethylene sheeting.

The use of insulation with a vapor barrier (facing) is vital in a new home's attic, or in an attic with no previous insulation. It should be installed with the "facing' side toward the interior of the home. When adding to existing insulation, always use unfaced fiber glass insulation.

When adding fiber glass insulation to your attic, an easy and cost effective way to fight rising cooling and heating bills, remember not to cover existing ventilation



questions on corn silage

If I treat my silage with ammonia or urea as NPN sources, how much should I use per ton?

The treatment rate depends on the desired protein content and silage dry matter. As the silage be-comes dryer it will take more pounds of NPN to bring the crude protein level up to your desired level. The Cooperative Extension Service has charts available free of charge indicating the pounds of NPN required per ton of dry matter or amount of crude protein required changes.

Should I use a microbial inoculant on my corn silage? Live microbial cultures can help preserve corn silage which is too wet or too dry. These products help

provide for a good fermentation which preserves the silage. When corn silage is harvested at the correct moisture and packed in the silo quickly, these additives

Is silo gas poisonous?

Silo gas is VERY POISONOUS!! During the first 2 to 3 weeks of the ensiling process a large amount of gas is produced. NEVER enter an upright silo during the first 3 weeks of ensiling without special precautions. Silo gas is heavier than normal air so it can become concentrated in the silo or feeding room. If you must enter a silo, take care. Run the silage blower at a high rate for 10 minutes prior to entering. Never work alone, be sure someone knows you are in the silo. Local fire departments have oxygen masks and equipment you might borrow if you must enter a silo.

In Tuscola County, 52,000 acres of navy beans and 22,000 acres of colored beans were hit by 8 to 12 inches of rain. Tiled land tends to be dryer. Yields look to be good unless more rain or frost hits.

A 72,000 acre navy bean crop and 24,000 acres of colored beans in Huron County took a lot of water. Early harvested beans ranged from 15 to 24 cwt per acre. Crops in Pigeon and Pinnebog River basins were badly hurt.

Sanilac County reported saturated bean fields. Beans on untiled land may not get harvested. Losses are still being assessed.

Ontario farmers say 10 percent of their crop is gone. Their predicted record yield-per-acre is probably behind them at this Minnesota/Dakota far-

mers may still have record yields and exceptional quality beans. Current production estimates for white beans range from 1.8 to 2.0 million cwt.

The revolving collection will supplement the collection of over 200 large print books owned by the library. The service is funded by the Cass City Lions Club.


Large print books are printed with a large, easy to read typeface which can be read by many partially sighted or visually hand-

Heart-lung transplant patients susceptible to pneumonia

A recent study shows that 100 percent of heart-lung transplant patients suffer from a rare "opportunistic" pnéumonia that takes advantage of people with weakened immune systems. It is the number one killer of patients with acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS).

But, doctors say that this lung infection can be detected at an early stage -even before symptoms appear -- and can be successfully treated with antibio-

Irvin L. Paradis, M.D., of University Pittsburgh and the Veterans Administration Medical Center in Pittsburgh. presented the results of his study at the Annual Meeting of the American Lung Association and its medical section, the American Thoracic Society. Dr. Paradis said that twothirds of his transplant patients were diagnosed as pneumocystis having carinii pneumonia before any signs of illness appeared and before X-rays showed any abnormalities in their lungs. The infection was easily detected in lung washings obtained by a diagnostic simple technique called bronchoalveolar lavage (BAL). Pneumocystis is a common microorganism that rarely causes illness in humans.

In transplant patients, immunosuppression is a necessary addition to surgery so that the pa-

tient's immune system will fection. not reject the new organs. Patients who have undergone heart-lung transplant are at a continued risk of opportunistic infections because they must take cycpressive drug, for the remainder of their lives.

are an experimental procedure that have been performed at fewer than 10 at 1-800-292-5979. health centers worldwide. Of the 100-150 transplants performed to date, 35 have been at the University of Pittsburgh since 1982. "The majority of these patients are young adults with primary pulmonary hypertension who have at most a few years to live," Dr. Paradis

the 35 patients operated on at the University of Pittsburgh, 19 survived the postoperative period with resumption of a near-normal life. Four of these patients died later, two of pneumocystis infection. Twelve patients have been monitored by periodic BAL, and although infection occurred in all of them, only four developed the typsymptoms pneumonia with abnormal

X-rays. The remaining eight either had no symptoms or mild upper respiratory tract disease. In one patient, the infection disappeared without treatment. Many of the patients are treated out of the hospital, and about one half are now taking antibiotics regularly to prevent future in-





SESQUI...WHAT? by Ruby Maschke

It was September, 1862. The editor of the Huron County News, Sand Beach, said Mr. O.L. Purdy of Rook Township had a turnip which was bigger than any he had ever seen. The turnip was 2 feet 10 inches long and weighed 20 pounds.

At Port Hope, the Rev. Bigelow addressed a war meeting that resulted in the enlistment of between 15 and 20 volunteers. "Patriotism of Port Hope is up to standard," commented the editor. "Should many more enlistments take place, the mill at Port Hope

The following advertisement appeared. "White Rock. The most southern point in Huron County. The county back of it is among the best around this lake shore for farming purposes and is fast settling up, great advancement being made in the past few years. White Rock is already one of the most important shipping points, and when the Arlington and White Rock State Road is completed, the outlet from a large tract of the very best land, already pretty well settled, will be this point."

Nineteen years later in September, 1881, the newspapers from Saginaw to Detroit to the Thumb were filled with only one topic --

September 6, 1881. The Saginaw Daily Courier. "For a good eight weeks past the rains have been very light, and the showers did comparatively little good. Rainfall has been much below average and heat rather above average. The earth has become parched, crops have been scorched and the water supply greatly diminished. In the city the heat has been oppressive. Farmers, in many instances, have to carry water for many miles

Monday noon, and at times it has been as dark as night. On Tuesday afternoon a horrible hurricane set in, the wind blowing directly toward the village, but when the advancing wall of fire was within a few rods of the place, the wind changed and thus the village was saved."
Sept. 9, 1881. The Sanilac
Jeffersonian. "Thermome-

ter Tuesday, the 7th, 102° at one o'clock in the afternoon...Great loss of life! Wholesale destruction of property! Whole villages burned! Thousands of people homeless! Huron City, Port Hope, Verona, Axe, Charles-

ton...burned. weather...has finally culminated in one of the most disastrous fires on record...We have only partial reports as yet from the districts visited by the fires...but we know of enough already to make a sickening record."

Sept. 8, 1881. The Huron County News. "The night was a fearful one. Few heads touched pillows and few eyes closed during its long weary hours...Tuesday morning the horrors of the situation only began to dawn as wagonload after wagonload of blinded, maimed, homeless and naked refugees began to into the vilpour lage...Physicians found their hands full. The stories of horror began...friends missing...whole families found, their bodies burned to a crisp...Some were found half suffocated at the bottoms of wells."

It was a tragic episode in the history of the new state of Michigan, certainly the greatest single destructive event in Huron County.

So what would the new tax bill do to IRA? 1. Changes affect only

people with incomes over \$40,000 (\$25,000 for singles). 2. And of this level of in-

comes -- only 13% of the population -- affected only are those who also have company-provided pension plans. 3. Other wage-earners,

with incomes of \$50,000 (\$35,000 for singles), who have company-provided pension plans lose all contribution deductions. They can still defer interest earned on IRA contributions until the IRA account is tapped, starting at age 59.

4. Most of the people under (3) who lose the full deduction can get their employers to expand their pre-tax contributions (up to \$7,000 a year) to companysponsored 401-K savings plans.

4. All workers get a big break because the new tax bill reduces the period for vesting pension rights to 5 years from the present 10 years. Under the old pension laws you had no guaranteed or vested benefits until you worked 10 years for a company. Now can be cashed if you leave the company after 5 years.

5. If you have a company retirement plan and your wages are between \$40,000 and \$50,000 (\$25-\$35,000 single) the amount of IRA deductible contribution falls \$200 for each \$1,000 of income over the threshold amounts. You still can

The provision of the new law letting certain brackets of workers deduct only interest on IRA -- there's not much point in taking advantage of this.

If you're in this group and want to defer interest, just get some zero-coupon taxexempt bonds with whatever savings you might have put into an IRA. These bonds pay around 8%. You can sell them anytime, and there's no tax to pay on the proceeds or whatever interest they have earned. No red tape, no reports to Uncle Sam, and your money is not tied up. Under an IRA you mustn't draw it out until age 59, or you'll pay a penalty.

One year later leaf ban brings people plaudits

Cass City village residents were forced to abandon the traditional fall rites of leaf burning. No longer could the pungent smell of leaves burning in yards around town fill the air and remind us all that fall was here and winter was not far away.

When the village council decreed that burning was taboo forevermore, there was grumbling and complaining from residents with big yards and big trees.

Most grudgingly went along with the new law, realizing that burning does contaminate and really should not be allowed. Nevertheless, it did hurt a little, make a little more work than was required when burning was allowed. Now, a year later, how do

Last fall for the first time. folks feel about not burning with a new fall raking season just ahead? Pretty good, really. The extra work didn't prove to be as great as many feared and, according to a Chronicle spot check, most folks support the burning ban. Helping ease the transition is the free leaf pick-up by the village crew. Home owners simply rake leaves onto the street and the village hauls them away.

"It was convenient to burn leaves in the fall," said Ann Connolly of 4258 South Maple Street. "Now we rake the leaves into the gutter and four days later they're picked up. By then they've been blown back in

'It was a nuisance,' Cook said. "At night we'd go to bed and smell it. I didn't mind the leaves, I kind of like the smell of burning leaves.

State will not

Governor James Blanchard has announced the state will begin the 1986-87 fiscal year without finding it necessary to borrow in the short term credit markets to make school aid and local government revenue sharing payments.

He noted this year's local school aid advance of \$366 million will be made Oct. 1 from existing state cash reserves.

Blanchard said the fall of 1986 is the first time since 1976 it was not necessary to borrow on a short-term basis to make the payment.

The state has had to borrow as much as \$500 million each year during the 1979-83 years with that amount dropping to \$450 million in 1984, \$350 million in 1985 and to zero this year. Taxpayer cost of the borrowing reached \$94.6 million in 1981 and totalled more than \$325 million during the past 10

Further touting the state's turnaround in its financial picture, the governor cited figures produced by Standard and Poor's Corp. showing that during the second quarter of 1986, Michigan has had 164 municipal bond upgradings

with no downgradings during the April-June, 1986 period.

The upgradings included 158 school district ratings upgraded as a result of the state's upgrade. Some 23 states suffered downgradings during the same

Asked about the affects of a possible downturn in the auto industry, Blanchard said he believed the state's finances are secure enough to ride through another recession.

He said the state's economy is now more diversified and any auto industry downturn would not affect the state economy so directly. He added the automobile industry itself is more diversified and the industry would not feel the effects so directly.

Other factors placing the chard said. state on stronger economic footing, Blanchard said, include the state's improved vestment in education and reduction in the number of state employees, down Michigan." from a high of over 73,000 to recent increase due to the demand for more corrections employees.

The Youth Corps was around 58,000 even with a proposed by Blanchard and approved by the Legislature in 1983.

During the first summer, 67,000 youths applied for 25,000 jobs. By the end of this summer, the program will have provided 72,000 summer jobs, including 12,500 this summer.

The wide variety of work performed by the Corps this year includes: Establishment of a Cleanwater Corps to work on more than 100 water-related projects statewide; historical renovation of an 1869 farmhouse in Oakland County's Waterford Township to serve as a museum, in conjunction with Michigan's Sesquicentennial, and participation in the first international young worker exchange program between Michigan and the Netherlands.

A survey conducted last year for the Youth Corps showed that 75 percent of the Youth Corps graduates had landed jobs or were enrolled in school or receiving job training.

Name winners at annual barrow, pig feeder show

The 1986 Thumb Area Barrow Show and 3rd Annual Feeder Pig Derby were held Sept. 6, at Michigan Livestock Exchange, Cass City. There were 14 producers entering hogs in the barrow show and 24 producers entered hogs in the Feeder Pig Derby.

Feeder pigs, ranging in weight from 36 to 69 pounds, were weighed in May 23. Pigs were fed for 104 days on the same diet in the same facility. The diet contained 16% crude protein until the pig weighed 100 pounds and then 14% crude protein. The rate-of-gain contest for the feeder pigs was won by a barrow entered by Ralph Moeller of Palms, which gained 2.12 pounds per day. The overall average daily gain was 1.7 pounds per day.
