Explain procedures for collecting disaster funds

"FEMA Form 90-52" isn't a foreign language-it's Federal language.

Public officials from Huron, Tuscola and Sanilac counties learned to speak this "Federal language". quite well last Wednesday during the Federal Emergency Management Agency's presentation at the Colony House.

Jan DiDomenico, a Federal public assistance officer of FEMA, told the 44 officials gathered how to apply for disaster assistance. Officials have 90 days after the President's disaster declaration to submit an initial project application.

After an application is received, an inspection team will be scheduled to survey disaster sites. FEMA Form 90-52's, or Disaster Survey Reports (DSR), will be completed by teams of Federal, state and local inspectors who visit damaged

The DSR's document the type and extent of damage as well as provide the best available description of the scope and estimated cost of work to fix the damage.

Fifteen engineers are scheduled to come to the three counties. It will take

two months to survey the to process the application.

DiDomenico told the officials how to plan for the engineers' arrival.

'Get a map of the area and plot the damage sites," DiDomenico said. "You are responsible for identifying the damage sites. You have to get the damage identified as soon as you can now. We're not going to look too kindly on you next spring.'

Labor, equipment and material costs for each location where work has been completed must be compiled. Someone must accompany the inspection team, too.

For work done by contract, a copy of the contract and invoice is needed, a breakdown of costs, equipment used, dates, location of work, hourly rates and hours used must be provided. If governmental units use their own personnel, then payrolls, equipment use and supplies used must be linked to a specific damage site.

Damage must be substantial for a FEMA engineer to survey it. FEMA considers sites with damage less than \$250 as maintenance problems. It would cost more than that

It costs each village, township or unit of government \$1000 to apply for consideration

Tuscola County Drain Commissioner ... Stanley Henry said he has 150 to 200 damage sites. Some of them would fall below the \$250 limit and others would be considered under the same project.

The inspectors will estimate the damages and send the estimate to the temporary FEMA office in Saginaw. Then FEMA approves the estimate and gives back a copy. FEMA approves 95 percent of the estimates it receives. Di-Domenico said.

"If you don't agree with the estimate, you have the right to disagree and write a little narrative why." Di-Domenico said. "Normally we replace things to their pre-disaster situation." For work already done

on damage sites, Di-Domenico said to take pictures of each damaged site, especially the major sites.

'You've got to document what you've done out there,' DiDomenico stressed. "For work already completed, to the extent it's possible, we'll write a cost estimate. For work principally not completed we'll write unit price estimates. Officials should let

FEMA know of cost overruns or of facilities still underwater that can't be estimated yet. Emergency work should be done by March 18, 1987,

Twenty Disaster Application Centers (DAC's) were set up around mid-Michigan to handle flood victims.

The Small Business Administration and Farmer's Home Administration were at the DAC's. Individual assistance, individual grants, legal services, the Red Cross and insurance company representatives were available to help people.

Altogether, 4,388 applications have been filed. Caro fielded 85 applications last Sunday and 325 applications were filled out in Vassar. In Sandusky, 92 people applied and in Bad Axe, 174 people have applied so far.

eral unemployment benefit funds are available through the Disaster Unemployment Assistance (DUA) program. Both workers and the

farmers, may be eligible for DUA payments if they: -no longer have a job, or -could not get to their jobs, even if they worked outside the disaster area, or --were to begin work and now do not have a job because of

the flood or are unable to reach the job, or -- cannot work because of a disaster incurred injury, or --bebenefits came the major support of a household because the head of the household died as a result of the disaster.

MESC expects about 1200 jobless workers will file DUA claims. Claims must be filed by October 24, 1986. Claims may be filed retroactively for weeks of unemployment beginning on or after September 14.

Applicants should take self-employed, including their Social Security card, driver's license or one other piece of identification with a fixed signature. Also records that show their employment and earnings prior to the mid-September flood should be brought.

Student count up at most schools

The Cass City School District's luck in the annual Fourth Friday student count has finally changed.

For the first time in some 11 years, the district has about 36 or 37 students, according to school Supt. Donald Crouse.

The annual count, held last Friday at schools across the state, is used to determine the amount of state aid a school district will receive for each student.

Although the district hasn't experienced an enormous increase from last year's student population, an increase in this year's state aid formula could mean an increase in revenue of roughly \$240,000 to \$250,000, Crouse said, adding, "Revenues will defi-

nitely be up this year." Crouse attributes the increase to more younger students. "It looks like we're beginning to get a wave of larger enrollments in the

elementary school," the superintendent explained. This year's increase, which reversed a trend of an aver-

The Cass City district's

total student count Friday totalled 1,475, which is broken down into 541 students in the high school, 419 in the intermediate school and 515 in the elementary. Last year's count totalled 1,428. New lights to cut village costs

Revised plans for street approved plan would cost lighting, approved by the \$4,609 more at \$17,322 a Cass City Village Council Monday night, will mean a yearly operating savings of nearly \$4,000 over a previously approved plan.

Village Supt. Lou LaPonsie told the council that Detroit Edison's System Engineering Department has reviewed the street light circuit in Cass City and is now recommending 400watt high pressure sodium lighting over 1,000-watt mercury vapor lighting.

Currently, the village has 400-watt mercury vapor

lighting. The council in April approved 1,000-watt mercury vapor lighting, but LaPonsie said that the high pressure sodium system features less glare and is more economical. "You don't have the brightness, but you do have the visibility,"

Under the current system, the yearly charge totals \$12,722. The previously

year, while the new plan would cost \$712 more per year at \$13,435, LaPonsie Under Detroit Edison's

proposal, the company will remove an existing secondary system now serving Christmas decorations and replace it with a larger system serving both the decorations and street lighting. The company will own and maintain the system.

LaPonsie and the streets and parking committee were directed by the council to investigate alternatives for Christmas tree lighting in the village as well as continuing an existing communication sys-

In other business at the 75-minute re-scheduled meeting, the council approved an amendment changing the title of "village superintendent" ''village manager''.

Rules member Joanne Hopper plaque at the community outlined the amendment, which has been reviewed by village and Michigan Municipal League attorneys. A major change in the iob description, she said, is the written authority to purchase products and services which do not exceed \$5,000, provided such expenditures have been appropriated. Also new is a section directing the council and village president to deal directly with the manager on matters under his jurisdiction.

The council approved entering into agreements with the Michigan Municipal League to allow the village to obtain employment tests. The exams, covering all branches of village employment, will aid the village in hiring for both standard and specialized positions, the council said.

committee ing the village to place a park property memorating her family's former ownership of the land. In her letter, Bauman outlined the history of the park property, all of which was originally settled by her grandfather, Robert Orr, around 1865. The council, which noted that a previous council had


The council heard a report from LaPonsie, who lauded village crews for their work relating to heavy rains during the past 2 weeks. Aside from several complaints of flooded basements and a backed-up main sewer line, the village was "very fortunate", he said. The wastewater treatment plant, which normally handles 360,000 gallons a day, took care of nearly 2 million gallons per day during the storm, he added. A written report from Vil-

lage Treasurer Joyce A. LaRoche stated that 93.3 percent of village taxes were collected prior to the Sept. 25 deadline for delinquent taxes. The village collected 91.8 percent last year by this time.

The council met in executive session for about 20 minutes to discuss negotiations of a police contract.

The resignation of Village Zoning Board of Appeals member Jude Patnaude was accepted. Patnaude has been transferred to the Midland area.

The next regular meeting of the council was rescheduled from Oct. 28 to Oct. 27 at 7 p.m.

Garbage picker

On a sunny afternoon in she weren't hungry? What Greektown a few days ago, I saw a lanky man standing beside a trash barrel, licking his fingers. And I can't get him out of my mind.

Because of his full beard, it was hard to guess his age -- probably between 35 and 45. His clothing was dirty, baggy and too much for the warm temperature. He looked like most of the downtown panhandlers I try to ignore while walking between home and office several times a week. Except he wasn't asking anyone for money.

He was doing something that at first I thought I'd never seen in the flesh before, only in newspaper photographs and TV footage. But then I remembered what I'd seen 41 years earlier.

In the trash basket, the man had found one of those white Styrofoam hotdog containers. There appeared to be no decentsized hunks of meat or bread left, just the skimpy residue of someone's lunch stuck to the sides and bottom of the container. It looked like mostly chili.

The man was wiping the residue loose with two fingers and sticking the fingers in his mouth. He was doing it swiftly, in an alble Street, Caro, hit a tree most continuous motion, as though afraid someone would stop him before the container was clean.

Several people were touch the man eating garbage, but I seemed to be the situation. I had to stop and

"Are you really that hun-

It was a dumb question.

I really wanted to know, I guess, was did the man realize what he was doing? Or was he one of the street people to whom eating garbage makes good sense? Last winter, you may recall. I found a woman who didn't realize there was anything unusual about living in a bus shelter for two

months. Was he one of those people who need to be taken care of, but no one will do it? Because no one cares.

The man looked at me blankly, saying nothing, continuing to lick his fingers. So I gave him some money and walked on home.

No one needs to tell me my money was probably spent on booze. I may have supplied the one last pint of gin needed to kill that unfortunate man. Nancy Reagan recently advocated capital punishment for drug suppliers whose victims die. Maybe I should be electrocuted.

I don't know if I did the right thing. After seeing the woman in the bus shelter morning after morning, I made some phone calls and was dismayed at how long it took — two weeks — to get her off the freezing street. If I see the garbageeating man, should I get back on the phone?

It is shocking to see someone hungry enough to eat out of a garbage can. It's different than seeing starving people on TV or in newspaper photos. Of course, you ache for anyone anywhere hungry enough to eat garbage, but you don't expect to see it while walking in downtown Detroit on a sunny afternoon.

Certainly the sight was much less surprising in 1945 in Germany. As an Army private, one of my more prestigious assignments was trucking mess hall garbage to a dump. And there were always dozens of local citizens waiting to snatch the refuse and eat it there or take it home to their families.

I was an idealistic 18year-old then, and I remember writing home that as long as even one person anywhere in the world was starving, everyone else in the world should be ashamed.


That was 41 years ago. I went a long time between seeing people eat garbage. And I would be ashamed to count how many times, during those years, I forgot what I knew when I was 18.

That's why I can't get that bearded man and that cruddy hotdog container out of my mind.





One area couple, however, has turned a life based on the "graveyard" hours into a successful

David and Sharon Matthews, 4630 Hadley Rd., both work 11 p.m. to 7 a.m. shifts. What's unique about the couple's arrangement is that not only do they share the same hours, they also share the same employer, General Cable Co. in Cass City.

Both agree that 3rd shift has been good for their marriage. "We're together a lot. I like that (because) it leaves us free to do whatever we want," David Matthews said. "We're really flexible because we can sleep whenever we want."

The couple has had a great deal of experience with night hours. David is a 24-year veteran with the company and has worked 3rd shift for the past 13 years, while Sharon has been with the company for 10 years, 8 of which she has worked 3rd shift. The couple has been married for 4 years.

A sleeping schedule of 8 a.m. to l p.m. and 8 p.m. to 10 p.m. has worked well for the Matthews. Sharon noted that she has gotten used to the hours, but not the occasional interruptions. "It's hard for other people to comprehend that you have to sleep during the daytime," she continued.



Epiglottitis and asthma

When young children come down with epiglottitis -- a severe throat infection -- it's likely that asthma will follow later in life.

These findings were reported by Hollis R. Chaney, M.D., of the Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh and the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine at the annual meeting of the American Lung Association and its medical section, the American Thoracic Society. Dr. Chaney announced that from her study, "We found that lung abnormalities function were · significantly more common in epiglottitis survivors than in children of a similar age who did not have this disease."

According to Dr. Chaney, this information may help parents and physicians identify those children who are more likely to develop





Epiglottitis is a frightening, often fatal, throat infection that appears without warning and is most commonly seen in children between three and seven years of age. The infection closes off the windpig (trachea) and leaves the child gasping for breath. It may be fatal within hours unless radical emergency procedures are quickly followed. Epiglottitis is usually caused by the bacterium hemophilus influenzae, which is also the most frequent cause of bacterial meningitis in children under the age of three.

Dr. Chaney noted that vaccine against hemophilus is now available for children between the ages of two and six, and recommends that parents request the vaccine from their child's physician.

"Our study strongly connects epiglottitis in early childhood with subsequent asthma," Dr. Chaney said "We haven't yet deter mined whether it's a causeand-effect relationship, pr whether children with lung abnormalities are prone to epiglottitis asthma.

She suggested that p rents and physicians of children who have had epiglottitis be alert for symptoms of asthma -- such a wheezing, and excessive cough or mucus production -- as these children grow up

In order to pay for 3 new school buses, the board will borrow \$82,844 from Chemical Bank Cass City at an interest rate of 7.75 percent for 5 years. The bid was the

lowest of 3 bids received. The board also accepted the low bid of 4.35 percent from Thumb National Bank of Cass City for borrowing up to \$1.08 million against anticipated revenue for operation. The money will be

repaid by April 1. The board was not as successful in securing liability insurance for board members. At the last regular meeting, Supt. Donald Crouse announced





Chris takes his mother's name, Taggart, and amasses a fortune, building handsome edifices in Manhattan. Paying off crooked union bosses and cops, Taggart bides his time, then invests in a mercenary army composed of terrorists from Ireland and other countries. In love with Helen Rizzolo, capo of her family. Chris demolishes her rivals and his enemies, the Cirillos. 

PLIGHT \mathbf{OF} THE FARMER: Two years ago I wrote some columns on the sad state of farming. Not many agreed that it was a money-losing business. Few farmers admitted they were steadily digging a hole for themselves, and held on.

One of my critics was an old farmer friend in Lapeer County, Michigan. The other day he reported to me that good farm land that just a few years ago sold for \$1,000 an acre was now on the market at \$200 an acreand still not finding buyers.

The reason it isn't selling is that if someone gave you land, free, it still wouldn't be a bargain. You'd lose money, farming it.

Meanwhile the politicians and do-gooders think the answer is to throw more money at the problem. It hasn't worked in the past, and it isn't working now.

It makes good political fodder to agonize over "the family farm," and say we must preserve it.

Did we subsidize "the family grocery" when the supermarkets took over? Regretful as it may have been, the law of the market prevailed, and the little

grocer went out of business. Nobody sobbed about "the family newspaper," and its going out of business over the last 25 years. I grew up in such a field. Our family had interests in half a dozen country weekly newspapers. Some of them made money and some didn't. Ones that couldn't

Meanwhile, the Michigan Farm Bureau reports that milk production is higher than ever.

I sent the example to the editor, Thomas Bray, and had a gracious reply, with a promise it wouldn't happen again, he hoped.

Today I am sending Editor Bray a clipping from review in Insight magazine of a book about S.J. Perelman. The excerpt was printed to show what a great word craftsman Perelman was, and it is a splendid example. Here it is, from the book, "Listen to the Mockingbird"

"As recently as 1918, it was possible for a housewife in Providence, where I grew up, to march into a store with a five-cent piece, purchase a firkin of cocoa butter, a good second-hand copy of Bowditch, a hundredth-weight of quahogs, a shagreen spectacle case, venues, principal Wayne and sufficient nainsook for a corset cover and emerge left over with enough to buy a balcony admission to "The Masquerader" with Guy Bates Post, and a box of maxixe cherries.'

It all goes to prove that long sentences aren't always bad. It's just very hard to write one that is understandable. Not having the Perelman talent, we ordinary hacks should stick to short sentences and small words.
