The Haire Net

There's plenty of flak hurled about these days about criminals running loose when they should be in jail. Every week or so the papers and the boob tube recount horror stories about crimes committed by persons who should have been behind bars.
It has long been the contention here that our system does not need revamping and there is nothing wrong with the Miranda decision that protects the rights of the accused, even though occasionally a criminal will slip by unpunished because of it. The other side of that coin is that many, many innocent persons have been protected with it. The protection of our individual rights is worth the risk of the guilty getting away once in awhile.
There is a serious problem in our courts and it is the caseload that delays trials 2, 3 or more years. One reason is the frivolous cases that clog the court docket. Damage suits with-

out merit abound and we are finally getting around to trying to curb them.
Maybe the government should get its own house in order. Chances are you have read or heard about the suit brought against metro Detroit car dealers who are accused of violating antitrust laws, by the Federal Trade Commission. Not for fixing prices or conspiring to sell shoddy merchandise, but for closing nights and Sundays.
Already there have been 12 days of testimony from more than 30 witnesses and the Feds still have to present rebuttal witnesses, which is expected to take 3 days, beginning Oct. 27.
Will the Feds move into the Thumb next? I don't know of one dealership that is open on Sunday and most of them also close at noon on Saturday.
The trade commission says that the restrictive hours do not allow workers to comparison shop and result in higher prices.
There's no way to determine just how much this case is costing us, but it's certain that it will total hundreds of thousands of dollars when you realize, in addition to the court costs, the amount of time investigators must have spent to come up with the information they are presenting to the court.
Meanwhile, the trials of violent criminals that need to be taken from the street are delayed.
Cases like these tend to strengthen the belief among many that we have lost our sense of proportion.
We need protection from monopoly. Regulation of utilities and cartels that can affect our life styles and against which we have little or no power is very necessary. Very good.
But regulation of the hours that a car dealer can sell cars? Forget it.

Garbage picker

On a sunny afternoon in Greektown a few days ago, I saw a lanky man standing beside a trash barrel, licking his fingers. And I can't get him out of my mind.
Because of his full beard, it was hard to guess his age — probably between 35 and 45. His clothing was dirty, baggy and too much for the warm temperature. He looked like most of the downtown panhandlers I try to ignore while walking between home and office several times a week. Except he wasn't asking anyone for money.
He was doing something that at first I thought I'd never seen in the flesh before, only in newspaper photographs and TV footage. But then I remembered what I'd seen 41 years earlier.
In the trash basket, the man had found one of those white Styrofoam hotdog containers. There appeared to be no decent-sized hunk of meat or bread left, just the skimpy residue of someone's lunch stuck to the sides and bottom of the container. It looked like mostly chili.
The man was wiping the residue loose with two fingers and sticking the fingers in his mouth. He was doing it swiftly, in an almost continuous motion, as though afraid someone would stop him before the container was clean.
Several people were walking by, close enough to touch the man eating garbage, but I seemed to be the only one interested in his situation. I had to stop and ask:
"Are you really that hungry?"
It was a dumb question, of course. Would anyone eat out of a trash can if he or she weren't hungry? What I really wanted to know, I guess, was did the man realize what he was doing? Or was he one of the street people to whom eating garbage makes good sense? Last winter, you may recall, I found a woman who didn't realize there was anything unusual about living in a bus shelter for two months.
Was he one of those people who need to be taken care of, but no one will do it? Because no one cares.
The man looked at me blankly, saying nothing, continuing to lick his fingers. So I gave him some money and walked home.
No one needs to tell me my money was probably spent on booze. I may have supplied the one last pint of gin needed to kill that unfortunate man. Nancy Reagan recently advocated capital punishment for drug suppliers whose victims die. Maybe I should be electrocuted.
I don't know if I did the right thing. After seeing the woman in the bus shelter morning after morning, I made some phone calls and was dismayed at how long it took — two weeks — to get her off the freezing street. If I see the garbage-eating man, should I get back on the phone?
It is shocking to see someone hungry enough to eat out of a garbage can. It's different than seeing starving people on TV or in newspaper photos. Of course, you ache for anyone anywhere hungry enough to eat garbage, but you don't expect to see it while walking in downtown Detroit on a sunny afternoon.
Certainly the sight was much less surprising in 1945 in Germany. As an Army private, one of my more prestigious assignments was trucking mess hall garbage to a dump. And there were always dozens of local citizens waiting to snatch the refuse and eat it there or take it home to their families.
I was an idealistic 18-year-old then, and I remember writing home that as long as even one person anywhere in the world was starving, everyone else in the world should be ashamed.
That was 41 years ago. I went a long time between seeing people eat garbage. And I would be ashamed to count how many times, during those years, I forgot what I knew when I was 18.
That's why I can't get that bearded man and that cruddy hotdog container out of my mind.

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

Cass City Girl Scouts plan Hawaii trip in '88

Girl Scouts—they don't just sell cookies anymore. "We're trying to get away from selling and trying to get more involved in service," troop leader Kay Warner said.

Warner, a troop leader to the same troop for five years, actively looks for ways Cass City Girl Scouts can help the community. They have already planted flowers along Main Street, planted trees with the VFW and adopted grandparents at the Provincial House.

Asking local clubs, such as the Business and Professional Women, the Lions and the Jaycees, to sponsor troops is one of Warner's

goals to involve the girls and the community. "I'm not asking for money," Warner stressed. "The girls are available to serve and help clean at banquets."

Warner also said she's getting a lot of help from former troop leaders.

Only twice a year does Warner's troop go door to door soliciting. Calendars and cookies are the only two products the girls sell that way. Any other fund raising projects have to be authorized.

Girl Scouts can't have raffles but they are allowed to hold bake sales, car

washes and rummage sales. Warner's troop also sells hot dogs during the sidewalk sales.

The girls from Warner's troop have taken a Red Cross baby-sitter course and have taken younger Girl Scouts bowling and camping.

Warner's troop has also travelled quite a bit. Last year the girls went to Toronto by train.

"Some of them had never been on a train, taxi or subway," Warner said. "They were playing with the revolving door at one place. We stayed at the Holiday Inn downtown and visited the CN Tower and Science Center."

Recently the troop stayed a week at Kelly Smith's Oak Beach home. They were beach bums for a week, Warner said. Putt putt golf, the water slide and Sleeper State Park were some of the Caseville attractions the girls visited.

Her troop's next trip is a whopper.

"The girls have been talking about going to Hawaii since they were little," Warner said. "They're hoping to go the summer of 1988."

With only \$100 left in her troop's treasury, Warner admits they are a long way from going, but that's why they're planning to leave in 1988 and not 1987.

"We feel it will take a minimum of \$500 per girl—if we can stay in places the Girl Scout Council provides us or at youth hostels."

The necessary money will be earned as a troop, Warner said. For the Toronto trip, the girls earned \$1500.

Warner said so far there are eight troops in the Cass City and Owen-Gage area involving 100 girls. Already one troop went to the Sanilac petroglyphs park, and tours through Hills and Dales Hospital are planned.

After some information finding, Warner was excited to learn there are scholarships for Girl Scouts and a Wider Opportunities program for Cadet scouts. She has been looking not only for interesting activities and trips, but for opportunities where the girls can learn new things about themselves and their surroundings.

One thing's for sure, whatever the Girl Scouts do, Warner's enthusiasm is sure to buoy them up.

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HEALTH TIPS

Epiglottitis and asthma

When young children come down with epiglottitis -- a severe throat infection -- it's likely that asthma will follow later in life.

These findings were reported by Hollis R. Chaney, M.D., of the Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh and the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine at the annual meeting of the American Lung Association and its medical section, the American Thoracic Society. Dr. Chaney announced that from her study, "We found that lung function abnormalities were significantly more common in epiglottitis survivors than in children of a similar age who did not have this disease."

According to Dr. Chaney, this information may help parents and physicians identify those children who are more likely to develop asthma.


Epiglottitis is a frightening, often fatal, throat infection that appears without warning and is most commonly seen in children between three and seven years of age. The infection closes off the windpipe (trachea) and leaves the child gasping for breath. It may be fatal within hours unless radical emergency procedures are quickly followed. Epiglottitis is usually caused by the bacterium hemophilus influenzae, which is also the most frequent cause of bacterial meningitis in children under the age of three.

Dr. Chaney noted that a vaccine against hemophilus is now available for children between the ages of two and six, and recommends that parents request the vaccine from their child's physician.

"Our study strongly connects epiglottitis in early childhood with subsequent asthma," Dr. Chaney said. "We haven't yet determined whether it's a cause-and-effect relationship, or whether children with lung abnormalities are prone to both epiglottitis and asthma."

She suggested that parents and physicians of children who have had epiglottitis be alert for symptoms of asthma -- such as wheezing, and excessive cough or mucus production -- as these children grow up.

Paslode makes 20 different types of power hand tools. All will eventually be assembled at the Oskaloosa plant.

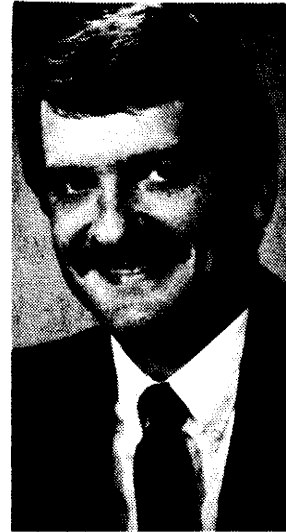

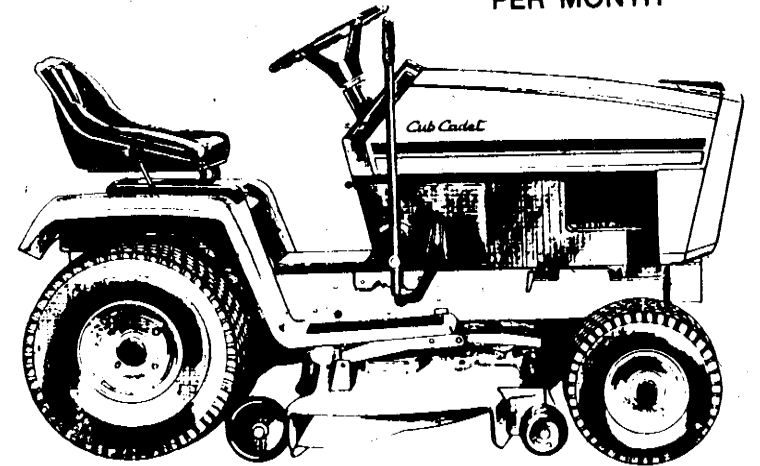

School board accepts bids

A special meeting of the Cass City School Board Friday afternoon decided the interest rates for funds that the school will need to borrow during the current school year.

In order to pay for 3 new school buses, the board will borrow \$82,844 from Chemical Bank Cass City at an interest rate of 7.75 percent for 5 years. The bid was the lowest of 3 bids received.

The board also accepted the low bid of 4.35 percent from Thumb National Bank of Cass City for borrowing up to \$.08 million against anticipated revenue for operation. The money will be repaid by April 1.

The board was not as successful in securing liability insurance for board members. At the last regular board meeting, Supt. Donald Crouse announced that he had received just one bid for the insurance and it was substantially higher than it was the previous year.

The board delayed action on the bid and asked Crouse to seek other bids. Because of the increased cost, protection was cut in half from the previous year. At the special board meeting Friday, Crouse said that he is still looking for other bids for the coverage, but had not yet received any.

While the insurance picture was bad news for the school, there was good news. Because of increased enrollment in the elementary school, an additional teacher was hired. She is Nancy Leino, who will teach in the 2nd grade, where another class section was added.

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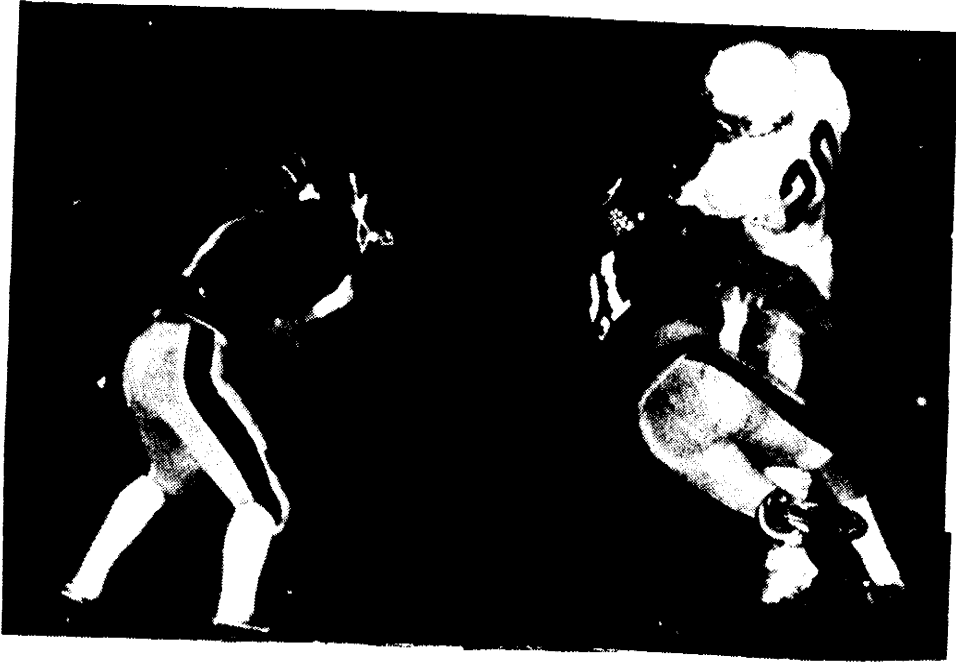

The Broncos continued to go to their bench in the 3rd

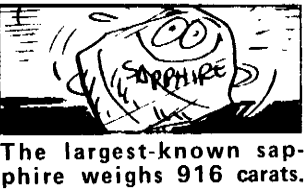

RAMPAGE by Justin Scott (fiction). Refusing to increase bribe payments to the Cirillo crime family, Mike Taglione is killed, and his son Chris takes over his father's construction company. Chris and his brother Tony vow revenge, but Tony fights the Mafia within the law as head of the district attorney's strikeforce. Chris takes his mother's name, Taggart, and amasses a fortune, building handsome edifices in Manhattan. Paying off crooked union bosses and cops, Taggart bides his time, then invests in a mercenary army composed of terrorists from Ireland and other countries. In love with Helen Rizzolo, capo of her family, Chris demolishes her rivals and his enemies, the Cirillos. The Taggart commands attack the most powerful Mafia groups, who have no suspicions of where the real adversaries are, and accelerate the wars with each other.

THE PHYSICIAN by Noah Gordon (fiction). The story concerns Robert Jeremy Cole, who by dint of talent, intelligence and determination surmounts an orphaned childhood in the streets of King Canute's London to become a learned physician and philosopher. The young man discovers his vocation while apprenticed to a peripatetic barber-surgeon and determines to travel to Persia where he will study at the hospital established by world-famous physician Ibn Sina. PLIGHT OF THE FARMER: Two years ago I wrote some columns on the sad state of farming. Not many agreed that it was a money-losing business. Few farmers admitted they were steadily digging a hole for themselves, and held on.

One of my critics was an old farmer friend in Lapeer County, Michigan. The other day he reported to me that good farm land that just a few years ago sold for \$1,000 an acre was now on the market at \$200 an acre—and still not finding buyers.

The reason it isn't selling is that if someone gave you land, free, it still wouldn't be a bargain. You'd lose money, farming it.

Meanwhile the politicians and do-gooders think the answer is to throw more money at the problem. It hasn't worked in the past, and it isn't working now.

It makes good political fodder to agonize over "the family farm," and say we must preserve it.

Why? Did we subsidize "the family grocery" when the supermarkets took over? Regretful as it may have been, the law of the market prevailed, and the little grocer went out of business.

Nobody sobbed about "the family newspaper," and its going out of business over the last 25 years. I grew up in such a field. Our family had interests in half a dozen country weekly newspapers. Some of them made money and some didn't. Ones that couldn't make money we sold while the selling was possible. Stronger ones we kept.

In our county when I was a kid, there were five weekly papers. Today, the county is twice as big and there are only two papers.

out gimmick is to pay farmers to sell their dairy cows to the government. The government pays above-market prices to give farmers an extra reason to go out of the milk business.

So what happens? Farmer Smith wants to sell 20 of his cows and start getting out of dairying. The government will pay the same for cull cows as it will for good ones.

Farmer Smith has a neighbor, Farmer Jones, who is going to stay in business, and would like to improve his herd. So Jones makes a deal with Smith. He swaps 20 of his cull cows to Smith for 20 good ones, and gives Smith a little bonus.

Farmer Smith then peddles the cull cows to the government, and pockets his "boot" from his neighbor. Everybody wins except Uncle Sam.

Meanwhile, the Michigan Farm Bureau reports that milk production is higher than ever.

I continue to chide writers for foggy prose. The Detroit News recently had a sentence in an editorial that ran 66 words before the writer could find the period on his typewriter. I sent the example to the editor, Thomas Bray, and had a gracious reply, with a promise it wouldn't happen again, he hoped.

Today I am sending Editor Bray a clipping from a review in Insight magazine of a book about S.J. Perelman. The excerpt was printed to show what a great word craftsman Perelman was, and it is a splendid example. Here it is, from the book, "Listen to the Mockingbird":

"As recently as 1918, it was possible for a housewife in Providence, where I grew up, to march into a store with a five-cent piece, purchase a firkin of cocoa butter, a good second-hand copy of Bowditch, a hundredth-weight of quahogs, a shagreen spectacle case, and sufficient nainsook for a corset cover and emerge left over with enough to buy a balcony admission to 'The Masquerader' with Guy Bates Post, and a box of maxixe cherries."

It all goes to prove that long sentences aren't always bad. It's just very hard to write one that is understandable. Not having the Perelman talent, we ordinary hacks should stick to short sentences and small words.

Colony House hosts township officials meeting

Township officials from Huron, Sanilac and Tuscola counties will attend the Michigan Townships Association's (MTA) Fall District Meeting in Cass City, Thursday, Oct. 2.

The Colony House will host the all-day educational program for MTA's District 14.

Township officials will listen to three MTA directors during the morning session and choose among several workshops for the afternoon session.

MTA Executive Director **John La Rose** will give an overview and history of MTA and discuss federal issues. **Gene Thornton**, MTA's Director of Legisla-

tion Affairs will update officials on current state legislation.

MTA director of Education **Mary F. Douglass** will speak on IRS and Social Security requirements. Michigan Municipal Bond Authority and court decisions concerning zoning, solid waste disposal and township right of way and annexation. Workshop topics include: election issues, summer taxation, planning and zoning and ethics in local government.

A special three hour program on assessors renewal will be offered during the other workshops.

The program costs \$30 at the door and includes lunch and materials.

Voter registration deadline draws near

Oct. 6 is the last day to register for the Nov. 4 general election said Secretary of State **Richard H. Austin**.

"Residents who have not registered (in order) to avoid jury duty should know voter registration lists will no longer be used to select jurors," Austin said. "Beginning in 1987, these lists will be drawn from Michigan driver license and personal identification card files."

Austin urged 17-year-olds who will be 18 by Election Day to register now.

"You don't have to be 18

"You have to be at least 18 to vote on Election Day."

To vote in Michigan, a person must be a United States citizen, reside in the city or township for at least 30 days before the election and be at least 18 years old.

People who have moved in the last few years should check their voter registration card to see that they are registered at their new address.

Registration applications can be completed at any Secretary of State branch or at the local city or township clerk's office through Oct. 6.

Commission to establish agency

The Tuscola County Board of Commissioners took steps to establish a Tuscola County based agency to serve senior citizens at its meeting last Tuesday.

The board passed a resolution informing the Region VII Board of Directors of the board's intentions to establish a separate agency for Tuscola County seniors only. Region VII rules require the Board of Commissioners to submit such a resolution for consideration before Oct. 1, 1986.

"We had to be in (with a resolution) before Oct. 1 because there's a year's turnaround," Commissioner **Royce Russell** (District 2) said.

The Commissioners voted to put 2 proposals on the Nov. 4 ballot. A one half mill renewal will be used to improve local township road bridges and street systems.

Russell said with the conditions of roads and bridges because of the flood disaster, it would be especially important to continue the bridge millage.

"We're renewing it to keep it current," **Russell** said. "Otherwise we'd lose a year."

The bridge millage was scheduled to run out in 1987, so **Russell** hurried the Road Commission to get the proposal worded correctly so it would be on the November ballot.

The second millage proposal asks taxpayers for 2/10

of one mill (20 cents per \$1000 of state equalized valuation of property) to expand and maintain services for older citizens in Tuscola County.

This is not an increase in millage, but a continuation of the existing millage for 2 more years. Under this new proposal, the funds generated by the millage will be allocated to the proper agency by the board of commissioners.

"That way we should know where the money is," **Russell** said.

The board authorized the Sheriff to hire two Corrections Officers. The two certified officers who have been working in the Corrections Department can now return to Road Patrol duty.

The board approved the labor contract between the Sheriff, the Board of Commissioners, the Labor Council and the Michigan Fraternal Order of Police.

The board approved applications for Intensive Probation grants, Diversion grants and a Secretarial grant from the State.

The Annex Building and Probate Court vault will be carpeted. The board transferred \$8,500 from the equipment/capital outlay contingency fund to pay for the carpeting and intends to have both jobs bid at the same time to save costs.

The board accepted the resignation of Department of Public Works Board member **Robert Balzer**. **William Pratt** was ap-

pointed to fill the Private Industry Council vacancy left by **Howard Napp's** resignation. The board endorsed **Betty Colling** for a consumer seat on the East Central Health Systems Agency Board of Directors.

Five attend Owen-Gage tax meeting

Superintendent **Harley Kirby** said the turnout at last Wednesday's meeting was not what he expected.
