## Farm crisis sparks campaign by concerned Cass City Rotary Club

Members of the Cass City Rotary Club held a special meeting Thursday night in the conference room at Walbro Corporation to discuss ways in which the club and the community could help farmers with crops decimated by the flood of 1986.

It was generally agreed that it would be impossible to come up with any meaningful financial assistance to save the family farm.

What the club can do,

President Gary Vollmer said, is show the farm families that we care.

Suggestions were weighed from most of the members present and it was decided that the first step should be to call the attention of community residents to the campaign now underway in Washington for grants of up to \$100,000 with vouchers good for produce from government storage. This plan, backed by both Michigan

United States senators and area U.S. representatives is now under consideration.

The names of the influential members of the congress, the cabinet and the White House have been compiled by Vollmer and are published in an advertisement in this issue. The ad includes the names of nearly all the politicians that are in a position to pass or reject the bill.

Meanwhile, the area escaped the week end with

only a minimal amount of rain after the forecast predicted showers for both days.

Farmers were busy in the bean fields Sunday and Monday trying to harvest what remained of the crop. A few farmers were pulling the beans and then harvesting the crop in the traditional manner, but most were clipping the tops because the ground was too wet or the beans nearer the ground spoiled and not worth harvesting. Many

fields have been abandoned.

Michigan Sugar Company's David Sutherland said that plants started to accept beets Monday but the crop was just starting to trickle in. Farmers are in the bean fields, he said. We hope to get processing started by mid-week, Sutherland added.

Sutherland said that the plants are making every effort to eliminate beets destroyed by the weather. We want no bad beets, Sutherland says, and we want every beet that we can make sugar from.

Growers were told at a series of special meetings that any beets that came into plants that were not useable would be charged back to the plant they were taken to and the farmers have signed agreements to pay for the removal of any beets that were piled but useable, Sutherland explained.

A bright spot in the dismal picture is the price of beans. Monday they were listed at \$30 per hundred. A few beans have been coming into the elevator, Robert Wischmeyer, manager of Berger and Co. of Cass City, said, but all are of poor quality with a high pick that reduces the value.

Guernsey replaces Deanna Patnaude.

Librarian Barb Hutchinson asked the board to adopt a resolution supporting White Pine Library Cooperative's attempt to get a Michigan Equity Program grant. The grant would bring the Cass City library \$4000 worth of compact disc equipment.

Clerk Norma Wallace said she has election workers for Nov. 4. Wallace will oversee the absentee precinct during the election.

## Elkland Township ready to enforce junk ordinance

Look out, Arnold Schwartzenecker, Elkland Township has its own "Enforcer" now.

Duties and salary for Elkland Township's new zoning administrator were discussed during Monday night's board meeting.

Zoning Administrator Anton Peters wanted to know the amount of time the board wanted him to work and what would be expected of him.

Peters will take care of building permits, junk cars and other problems people

have.

"Wherever it's a bother-some thing, I'll let people know there's a way to get rid of it," Peters said.

The township took applications for a zoning administrator last spring, Supervisor Dave Milligan said.

The junk ordinance will remain the same, however, township officials plan to pass a new zoning ordinance.

"We're staying with the same junk ordinance, only now we're going to enforce

it," Milligan said.

Peters said he would work with the township board to make the new zoning ordinance work.

The board agreed to pay Peters \$500 per year plus a share of fees per incident to be decided at the time the zoning laws are adopted.

"I think we need to be careful not to be picking on people," Treasurer Art Randall said.

The board appointed Alice Guernsey to the library board as the Elkland Township representative.

## O-G critical millage vote set Monday

Owen-Gage School District voters will be asked for the third time in a little more than 4 months to approve a 1-year, 6-mill property tax levy in a special election Monday.

The Board of Education is scheduled to hold the 2nd of two informational meetings on the proposal Oct. 15 from 8 p.m. to 9 p.m. at the Gagetown Elementary School.

Voters defeated the proposal, which would raise about \$240,000, by 44 votes in June, and again in August by a 4-vote margin.

The extra millage, if approved, would be used entirely for school operations, school Supt. Harley Kirby said.

The superintendent termed attendance at a Sept. 24 informational meeting "disappointing." The meeting, held at Owendale High School, offered residents a chance to express concerns about the school and the proposal. But only 4 persons attended the meeting in addition to the board and 2 board members' spouses. "I didn't think it was showing too much interest," Kirby said.

"It's like a phantom. Nobody wants higher taxes,

but if there's a reason—if they want something done differently—let us know."

Kirby said the district would actually realize a net increase of only 2.3 mills if the proposal passes. "The state equalized valuation has dropped almost 3 mills from last year," he said, adding that this is the last year the district will levy .7 of a mill for a 1987 debt retirement fund.

Kirby said the district currently is operating on 9.25 allocated mills, 9.15 extra-voted mills, 2.70 mills

for a 1986 debt retirement fund and .7 of a mill for the 1987 debt retirement fund.

Kirby pointed to at least one payless pay day last year, saying, "I don't want it to happen again."

The fact that the proposal was defeated by only four votes in August is reason for optimism, the superintendent said. "The only thing that could hurt us now is the rain," he continued, adding that flood damage and financial strains may play a role in the special election.

## O-G oks 1-year principal's pact

Changes to the Owen-Gage Schools lunch program, which is responsible for some \$12,000 in debt over the past two years, will be investigated following a report from school Supt. Harley Kirby at a lengthy board of education meeting Monday night.

Also announced at the 3 3/4-hour meeting was the hiring of Robert Andrews as the high school principal.

Kirby told the board Monday that he would like to present some proposals designed to limit losses sustained by the school district from its lunch program.

Some 75 percent of the 183 high school students normally participate in the program, which costs \$1 per lunch, Kirby explained. The lunches, on the average, cost the district \$1.75 each to produce, and students are now allowed to make multiple trips to the lunch line, he continued.

"I'm not saying they're not worth it, but I have a concern in that it does cost quite a bit," Kirby said. "We're in the business of educating people, not providing the biggest meal of the day."

"I'd like some time to work on it, and work with the cooks," the superintendent told the board. Kirby added that money saved in the program could be used to purchase school supplies, such as computers.

The lunch program, which costs the district more in the high school than in the elementary school, Kirby said, resulted in roughly \$5,000 in debt in the 1984-85 school year and \$7,000 in 1985-86.

Kirby emphasized that he's not suggesting that the quality of the program suffer as a result of the proposed changes. "The lunch is a meal to supplement throughout the day," he said. "Students get a balanced meal by state guidelines."

Turning to the hiring of Andrews as high school principal, the board approved a one-year contract with a base salary of \$24,937. He will receive an additional \$3,650 annually for serving as athletic director and advising the National Honor Society and Student Council, Kirby said.

Andrews, who replaces Wayne Wright, taught junior and senior high students in the Flat Rock school system for 5 years and served one year as assistant principal at the Career Center in Adrian, Kirby said. He began his duties Sept. 15.

Wright became principal of Kingston High School after resigning at the beginning of the school year.

In other business Monday, Kirby recommended replacing the school system's telephone system with a more efficient and

updated system. Both the current and proposed systems are through the AT&T Co.

Under the proposal, the system's 10 dial phones would be replaced by 8 touch-tone phones.

Currently, the district is facing a 4 percent increase in monthly charges, from \$114 to \$121. But Kirby said that the new system, which would be purchased over 3 years, would cost \$95.95 per month in the first year, and \$117.45 per month in the remaining 2 years. After that, the school district would own the phones, reducing the monthly charge to \$21.50, Kirby said.

The board accepted the high bids for the following "junk" items: a 1974 Ford pickup truck, \$110; a LoBoy tractor/mower, \$511; a band saw, \$100; a 10-inch table saw, \$100; a 1975 International passenger bus, \$176.50; a 10-foot ice cream chest freezer, \$25, and a buffer, \$80.

The board rejected all bids on a 550 Oliver tractor, which had a high bid of \$425 and a low bid of \$101; a 1971 International passenger bus, one bid of \$106.75, and an emergency diesel generator, which had a high bid of \$221.50 and a low bid of \$100.

Ronald D'Aoust was hired as a counselor. D'Aoust, who began his duties Sept. 12, has 5 years of counseling and teaching experience.

In other personnel-related business, Kirby reported that former district teacher Nancy Folk will receive \$2,214.10 in a court-order settlement with the school district dating back to May 5, 1984. Another employee, Kay Nguyen, will receive \$1,473.63 in an agreement settled out of court this week on the balance of her 1985-86 contract.

The board heard a report from representatives of Laine Appold, Inc., which conducted the district's annual audit for the fiscal year which ended June 30.

In a related matter, the board approved closing out 2 building and site funds which total \$276.03. The action was recommended in the audit, and the money will be used to purchase school supplies, Kirby said.

The board met in a 43-minute executive session to discuss "personnel matters."

Andrews gave a brief report and suggested changes to a policy allowing students to "sign out" and leave the school grounds during the regular school day. He said that parental permission will be required for a student to leave school property and that students will no longer be allowed to park across the street from the school.

## 30 years later post-polio syndrome strikes victim

A 6-month-long bout with poliomyelitis some 30 years ago has come back to haunt long-time Cass City resident Elizabeth Stine.

The 66-year-old widow, who defeated the dread disease at the age of 34 and lived a normal life up until 2 years ago, is again finding it hard to walk, extend her left arm and even rest without the strange, yet familiar aches and pains she hoped she had left behind so long ago.

"I couldn't figure out what went wrong with me," Stine said last week in an interview at her home at 6760 Houghton St. "My arm seemed to be losing strength and so did my legs. I'm still losing more strength."

Stine speaks in a youthful, light tone of voice, but the salt and pepper-haired mother of 6 grown children is visibly strained when shifting from a sitting to standing position. Her left

arm hangs limply at her side. She walks with a pronounced, yet rhythmic, limp.

Stine describes her first fight against polio as an uphill battle. "My right leg and left arm were affected the worst. I came home in a wheelchair, (but) I gradually built up enough strength where I could walk," she explained.

"Now, this summer, I've had to start using a cane." The increasing muscle weakness Stine has experienced for the past 2 years, she learned, is due to post-polio syndrome, which reportedly is being experienced by some 20 to 70 percent of Michigan's estimated 10,000 polio survivors.

Post-polio syndrome is fairly new to the medical community, according to Sue Anderson, chairman of the Post-Polio Syndrome Support Group in Saginaw. "The magnitude was not

discovered until a year or so ago," she said.

Polio is caused by tiny virus particles that attack the brain and spinal cord, Anderson explained, and specialized cells, called anterior horn cells, are destroyed when a person first has the disease. Although many victims are able to regain normal physical activity after suffering the initial attack, they no longer have the same amount of horn cells, which activate muscles. Consequently, Anderson said, the normal loss of muscle function that accompanies the aging process is magnified in former polio victims.

Anderson said there are 2 basic forms of polio—one affects the lungs and the functions of swallowing and breathing; the other involves the loss of limb function. Symptoms may include any one of the following: respiration problems, fatigue, aches, muscle

spasms, joint pain, chronic headaches and depression.

While persons stricken with polio are encouraged to exercise in order to regain their strength, post-polio syndrome victims are encouraged to do the opposite, Anderson said. "The more you do, the more functional loss you will have," she added.

"You thought you had it licked at one point in time, and all of a sudden you just don't have (the strength) anymore," Anderson said. "It's devastating."

Roger Obenauf, Saginaw Community Hospital Rehabilitation Center administrator, affirmed Anderson's comments on treatment for post-polio syndrome patients. "The more they overexert themselves, the faster their condition will deteriorate," he said. "It was, 'use it or lose it'; now it's 'use it and lose it.'"

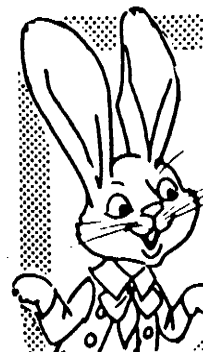
## Scouts hold housewarming

The closeness that existed between business and the farm community is not what it once was. No longer do we know every customer that walks through our doors.

Perhaps now would be a fine time to try to reestablish it. There's an effort underway for interested persons in the community to do what they can to help in this time of crisis on the farm. Really, though, there is not much we can really do to help. We might volunteer to drive a truck on a week end or devote a couple of hours after work to help out. And there are lots and lots of folks that live in town that would be willing to do it in this emergency. How much

real help this would be is questionable. It's like trying to plug a hole to stop the water after the dam has broken.

There was a time when unskilled labor made a real difference. Way back when I was in high school, there was a week off each October for "beet vacation" when school kids could help out at home on the farm and the town kids would hire out if needed to get the crop in. It was mostly back breaking, hard work in those days, which pinpoints the difference today. All the kids in all the schools volunteering to help wouldn't be of much use running a beet harvester.

It's no secret that the severe farm financial crunch has caused depression among farm owners. How could they not be affected when the very best possible harvest result will be a huge loss? And many farmers are wondering how to get enough money to plant next spring or face the loss of the land that they spent a lifetime acquiring.

One farm wife we heard about was leaving her job early in the afternoon because she feared what her husband might do if left alone.

While actual physical help that we can offer is minimal, we can help by being a friend to a farm friend. It's suggested that we call a friend or stop out and visit. Offer to do what we can and listen to what he has to say. Listening is important, our farm expert says. Let them know you care.

(If there is anything good to come out of this catastrophe, it should be the reminder that we all need and are dependent on each other. We can never recreate the close knit community that was ours in a simpler, less hectic time, but we can make it better than it was. The rain has brought us closer and we should do our best not to drift farther apart again when the sun shines.

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## Religious liberty rally at Juniata

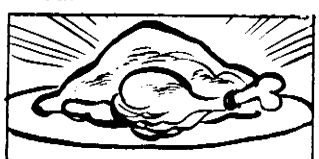

## ORDINANCE 124

An Ordinance for establishing the position of Village Manager:

The Village of Cass City Ordains:

Sec. 1. Establishment of Office. In accordance with the authority for the appointment of such Village officers as the Council shall deem necessary for the execution of the powers granted to the Village contained in Section 2 of Chapter 111 and Section 8 of Chapter V of Act No. 3, P.A. of 1985, as amended, which is the Charter of the Village, there is hereby established the office of Village Manager.

Sec. 2. Appointment of Village Manager. The President shall, with the concurrence of four or more Trustees, appoint a Village Manager for an indefinite term, and the Council may, by contract, enter into such other terms and conditions as the Manager and Council deem appropriate. The Manager shall serve at the pleasure of the Council and may be removed by the affirmative vote of four or more Trustees, but only after a hearing before the Council.

The Manager shall be selected solely on the basis of administrative and executive abilities with special reference to training and experience.

The Manager need not be a resident of the Village at the time of appointment but shall become a resident within 90 days from the date of the appointment with extensions permitted upon approval of the Council. The Manager shall reside in the Village thereafter during the term of office.

Sec. 3. Acting Village Manager. The Council may appoint or designate an Acting Village Manager during the period of a vacancy in the office of Manager or during an absence approved by the Council from duties in the Village.

Sec. 4. Duties. The Village Manager shall be Chief Administrative Officer of the Village and shall be responsible to the Village Council for the efficient administration of all affairs of the Village and shall exercise management supervision over all departments and over the public property belonging to the Village.

The Manager shall have the following functions and duties:

- Act in behalf of and carry out the instructions of, and be the authorized representative of the Village Council.
- Be responsible for the employment, suspension and discharge of administrative officers and department heads subject to Council approval, and the employment, suspension and discharge of all other employees of the Village.
- Be solely responsible to the President and Council for directing all the departments of the Village under his jurisdiction, and the personnel therein, within the limits set by law.
- Attend all meetings of the Village Council with the right to take part in discussions but without the right to vote.
- Be a member ex-officio of all committees of the Village Council.
- Recommend to the Council for adoption such measures as he may deem necessary or expedient for improvement or betterment of the Village.
- Prepare and administer the budget as provided for in the Uniform Budgeting and Accounting Act, Act No. 2, P.A. of 1968, as amended.
- Be the purchasing agent of the Village.
- Exercise and perform all administrative functions that are not imposed by charter or ordinance upon some other official.

Sec. 5. Emergency Condition. "Emergency condition" is defined to mean any event which would result in the disruption of a Village service which is essential to the public health or safety.

Sec. 6. Dealing with employees. Neither the Council nor the Village President shall attempt to influence the employment of any person by the Village Manager or in any way interfere in the management of departments under the jurisdiction of the Manager.

Sec. 7. Severability. If any portion of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall be found to be invalid by a court, such invalidity shall not affect the remaining portions or applications of the ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid portion or applications not being determined by said court to be inoperable, and to this end this ordinance is declared to be severable.

Sec. 8. Repeal of conflicting ordinance. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Sec. 10. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective twenty (20) days after its adoption.

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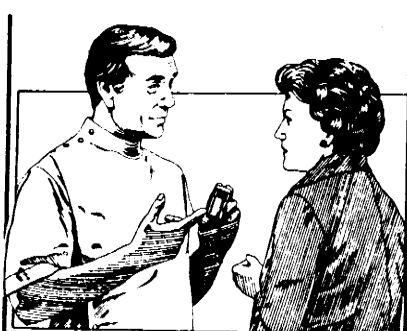

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# German native trades riding a bike for waxing his exchange brother's car

Dressed in gray slacks and a multi-colored shirt with a fashionable white undershirt, 17-year-old Thorsten Walte fits in well with his senior classmates at Cass City High School.

The brown-haired, blue-eyed teenager, who stands about 5' 8" and sports a

stylish, short hair cut, could easily be mistaken for the "boy next door."

But Walte, who speaks with a distinguishable accent and pleasantly contagious grin, is a friendly stranger to the Thumb area. For that matter, he's a stranger to the United States.

A native of Bremen, W. Germany, Walte is here as an exchange student through the local Rotary. Since his arrival Aug. 18, he's been living with the Ben Hobart family in Gageton, the first of 3 homes he will reside in during his year-long stay.

The differences between Bremen and the Cass City area are, as they say, black and white. Bremen, a commercial and industrial city located 45 miles south of the North Sea in northern W. Germany, was founded sometime before A.D. 787 and has a population of some 558,942, compared to Cass City's 2,258. Bremen's population is about equal to

the populations of Grand Rapids, Flint, Kalamazoo and Lansing combined.

Despite the major switch from urban to rural living, however, Walte says he has come to enjoy small-town life. "When you go through the streets in Bremen, nobody says 'Hi'. If you do, they are wondering what's wrong with this person," Walte explained. "When you go here, you say 'Hi' to somebody you don't know and you talk to them. I like this."

Language hasn't been a problem for Walte, whose English is impressive considering the fact that he also speaks French as well as German. "It was difficult for me at first be-

cause I learned British English, which is different than the English spoken here. American English is less 'proper' and spoken faster than British English, which made it hard at first to understand the language here," the teenager said.

Walte's training in English began in the 5th grade, the first of 6 years of the language required in W. German schools. He has studied French for 4 years.

An all-around athlete, Walte is trying some sports which are new to him. He says he loved his first-ever water skiing expedition and his first game of baseball, introduced to him by his exchange brother, Clayton

Hobart. Walte says he plans to try out for the varsity baseball team in the spring. "I'll have to try what (position) I'm good for," he added.

He still enjoys one of his favorite sports, tennis, but was somewhat dismayed when he learned that field hockey isn't a major boys' sport in Michigan. In Bremen, boys' field hockey leagues, as well as soccer and tennis leagues, are popular, Walte noted.

Also popular in his hometown, at least among young people, is the bicycle. The more traditional mode of transportation is a logical choice in a sprawling city where you are close

to stores, restaurants and recreation, he says.

Although it's common for American teens to own and drive cars, especially those who live in rural areas where motor transportation is practically a necessity, Walte says the practice is very new to him. "It was surprising to me that nearly all the younger people here have big cars. I couldn't believe this, but it's true," he remarked. Walte, who rides to school in Clayton's car, added, "I am riding a bike all my life and now I am waxing a car."

Learning how to drive and getting a driver's license is a goal Walte hopes to realize when he returns home. In W. Germany, he explained, getting a license is a major operation. Aside from the cost, the equivalent of about \$600 in U.S. currency, potential drivers must attend a special driving school for 6 months. Walte, like many youths his age in Germany, hopes the cost of a license will come via an 18th birthday gift. "Eighteen is a very big birthday when you can do anything—anything legal, of course,"

he said. Even if he had the money before his upcoming birthday, he still would have to wait because you must be 18 to receive a driver's license in W. Germany.

The popularity of the automobile among American youths wasn't the only surprise for Walte, who admitted he had a few preconceived notions about life in the United States.

"When I came here I thought all Americans ate only hamburgers and hot dogs," he said, adding diners at the Hobart's have been a pleasant surprise. An impression of Walte's that turned out to be true was Americans' obsession with television. He commented that he doesn't spend much time in front of the boob tube, probably because only 3 channels are available in his hometown, 7 channels if you have cable service.

Another area new to Walte is the local education system, particularly teachers. "Teachers here are like friends. You can talk to them about almost anything," he said. "When you have problems in Germany with the teachers,

you don't talk to them." Walte noted that the educational system in Germany is split into 3 school types; one for average students, one for above-average students and one for below-average students. Having attended the above-average school, Walte says he would like to follow in his father's footsteps and work in his insurance company.

For now, however, Walte is happy to enjoy his temporary home in the Thumb among friends with whom he enjoys talking and laughing. And it doesn't hurt that area girls are "very pretty," he says. That's quite a complement as the teen has seen pretty girls in England, France, Italy, Switzerland, Austria, Holland, Belgium, Sweden, Denmark and W. Germany.

Walte, who lives with his parents, Henry and Antje, and a sister, Martina, 20, in a condominium at 27B Saarbrueckener St. in his hometown, said he hasn't had any bouts with homesickness yet. "So far, I don't miss anything. Well...I think I will miss my bike. And, of course, I miss my friends and family."

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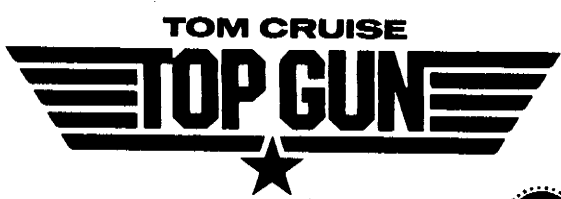
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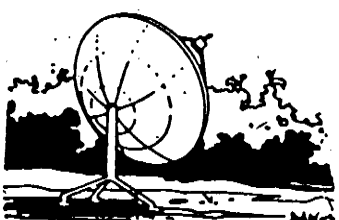

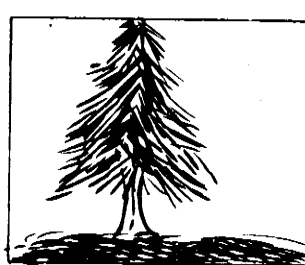

## New books at the library

ON A FAR WILD SHORE by Malcolm MacDonald (fiction). A young woman, widowed on the day of her marriage, tentatively approaches the Cornwall estates which are her late husband's legacy. The young widow grows into an entrepreneur, unique for her gender in the 1890's, as well as a sexually liberated woman. Elizabeth Troy develops some 3500 acres of farm and horseland, pumps up the economy of the village no longer able to rely on aging tin mines, and all the while counters, without vengeance, the relentless antagonism of her sister-in-law. Though Elizabeth marries again, not happily, she finds mature love in extramarital pleasure with another Troy, this time a member of the American branch, on a business visit to Cornwall.

HOUSES BY MAIL: a guide to houses from Sears, Roebuck Co. by Katherine Cole Stevenson (non-fiction). Between 1908 and 1940 Sears sold over 100,000 nearly completed houses across the country, particularly in the Northeast and Midwest. Some 500 models were available, and the company sought to make ordering them "easy as ordering an automobile, radio or piece of furniture." The houses, which had on average 30,000 pieces and cost between \$650 and \$2500, were usually shipped by rail and often were assembled by Sears' employees. This book reproduces copy from the original Sears house catalogues. There is, for example, the "Matoka," a two-bedroom bungalow that was popular during World War I. The "Rockhurst" had three possible exterior designs. The "Winthrop" was based on classic New England styles. This book offers a nostalgic and informative look at the tastes of Americans in the years before World War II.

UNVEILING CLAUDIA: a true story of serial murder by Daniel Keyes (non-fiction). In 1978, in Ohio's capital city, mentally disturbed Claudia Yasko, age 26, confessed to police certain information that led to her arrest for homicide in connection with a triple murder that had taken place in Columbus not long before. The charges eventually were dropped when it was determined that she had not participated in the crime. There remained, however, questions in the authorities' minds regarding how she had obtained knowledge of the crime scene. A few years later, Claudia decided to tell her story and contacted the author. Over a much longer period than he expected the process to take, Keyes elicited from Claudia - he was forced to wrench the information from her because of her fears for her safety and her cloudy mental state - the truth about the murders and how she came to know the layout of the scene of the crime.

## Your neighbor says

### I agree with Reagan's decision

Despite the distance between Reykjavik, Iceland, and Cass City, Mich., the reported collapse of the super-powers meeting held over the weekend on nuclear arms control and reduction has area residents wondering whether the future holds peace or annihilation.

Reports on why the meeting ended with no agreements are conflicting. The U.S. contends that the Soviets insisted on a 10-year ban on developing, testing and deploying a defense against nuclear missiles. The Soviets, meanwhile, indicated that the United States insists on the right to test Star Wars, formally known as the Strategic Defense Initiative, in both the laboratory and space.

How do you feel about President Reagan's stand on Star Wars considering the failure of the weekend talks?

"If they want us to postpone defense systems, that must tell you something," 16-year-old Mark Hampshire said. Hampshire, a junior at Cass City High School, said he agrees with President Reagan's decision not to accept a total ban of Star Wars. At first, the teenager commented, the defense system didn't sound very effective.

"Now, it seems like the perfect defense system."

Hampshire says the threat of a renewed arms race isn't news to his generation and that the topic has

become "routine."

"I think there is an arms race," he remarked. "It's been going on for quite awhile. If you can already destroy the world, what's the point of more weapons?" He added, "Sooner or later you're going to get the urge to try these new toys."

Hampshire says the threat of nuclear holocaust isn't something he thinks about often, but adds that the failure of agreements between the super powers probably is due to a lack of cooperation—give and take. "If you go to a meeting like that with a closed mind, what can you hope to accomplish?"

Hampshire, who works at the Rawson Memorial Library as a co-op student, is the son of Richard and Joyce Hampshire, 6268 Cedar Dr., Cass City.

### A diet deficient in amino acids can lead to emphysema

Mom may have been right when she told you to eat up everything on your plate! A well-balanced meal is rich in lysine, one of the essential amino acids, the building blocks of protein. According to a recent study, a diet deficient in essential amino acids at an early age can lead to abnormalities in the structure of the lungs that may lead to emphysema and other serious lung diseases.

Presenting her findings at the Annual Meeting of the American Lung Association and its medical section, the American Thoracic Society, Janet S. Kerr, Ph.D., of DuPont Pharmaceuticals in Wilmington, Del., said that amino acid deprivation is most injurious to lung development in young animals, but this effect may occur at any age.

Dr. Kerr fed complete and incomplete diets to young laboratory rats and found that, even when the total caloric intake was adequate, significant emphysema-like structural changes were observable in those rats fed a diet lacking the essential amino acid lysine after only 8 weeks. Emphysema is a chronic,

irreversible lung disease resulting from the breakdown of the microscopic air sacs (alveoli) of the lungs. It is most often seen in long-term smokers.

"The results in young animals are striking, but we cannot say for certain yet that the same changes will occur in humans," Dr. Kerr said. However, she recalled reports of a study of the occupants of the Warsaw ghetto during World War II showing that many of these individuals, who were severely malnourished, had structural changes similar to those she observed in rats.

A possible explanation for those abnormalities is that lysine is a major component of collagen and elastin, two proteins that are key structural elements of the lungs. In the absence of dietary lysine, these proteins may not be normal, leading to breakdown of the lung's structure.

Groups of people who may be at special risk for nutritional diseases are the large numbers of economically deprived people around the world who are chronically malnourished, the chronically ill, and any individuals who do not consume a well-balanced diet.

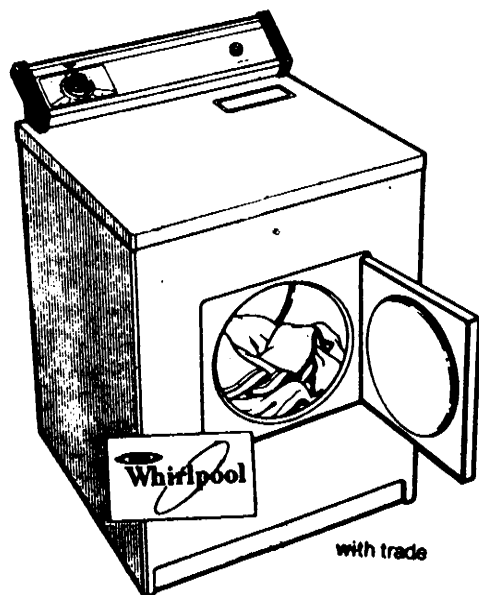

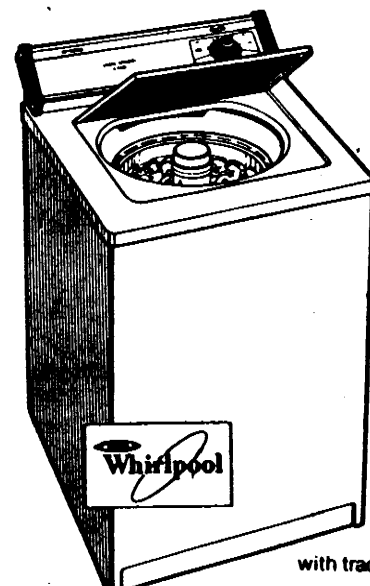

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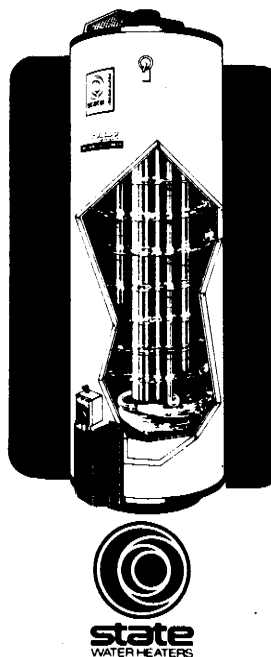
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Owen-Gage beats CPS

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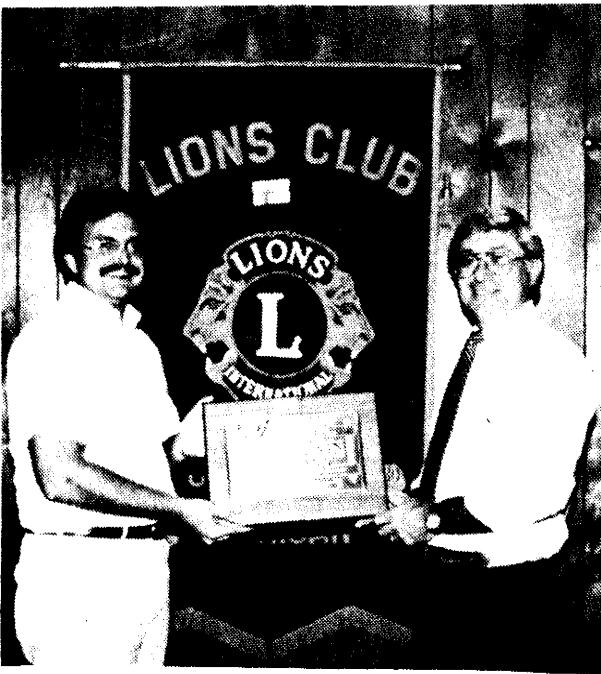

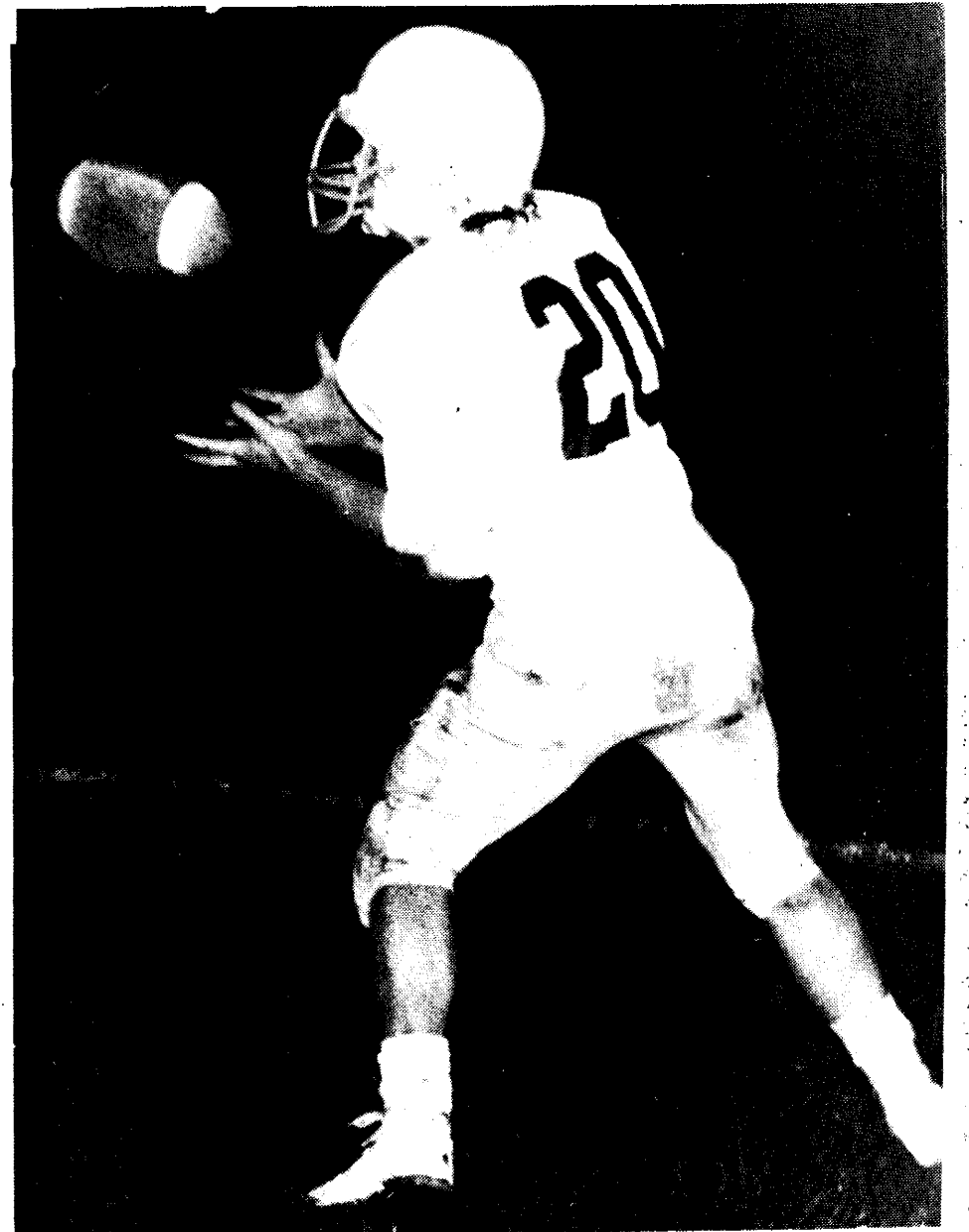

Led by 2nd-year head JV coach Don Markel, the upstart "junior" Red Hawks have outscored their opponents 130-26, including shutouts over Caro, Bad Axe and North Branch.

Followers of the Cass City football program may be wondering what happened this year, considering last year's JV finish of 4-5.

"The proverbial bounce of the ball has gone our way," Markel said. "Sometimes you have to have some luck and at other times we've created our own breaks."

Markel, a 1977 graduate of Central Michigan University, where he majored in history with a minor in physical education, has coached for 4 years at Cass City, including 2 years as assistant JV coach. Before that he coached for one season at Marine City Schools, his alma mater.

The 31-year-old mentor is quick to explain this year's success by pointing to the Cass City football program as a whole, rather than himself. "We have a pretty good JV team because of what (the kids) learn through the system," he added.

Markel noted that the philosophy of the football program is that every athlete, regardless of grade, is eligible to make the varsity team each year. Those who don't are placed on the freshman and JV squads, he continued. And as players advance through the program from the

Each Wednesday from April to November as many as 95 seniors have participated. These golfers come from a wide radius of Cass City and as far away as South Lyon and Wayne County.

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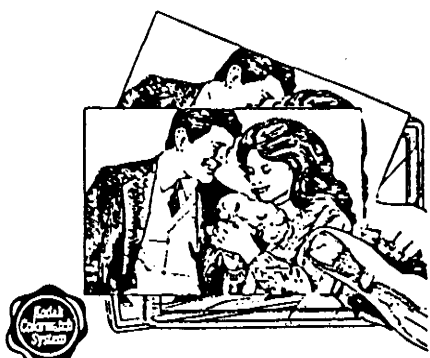
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# Area influenza vaccine clinics name final dates

Eligible Tuscola, Sanilac and Huron County residents who are prone to the miseries of the flu season have only a few more opportunities to take advantage of county health department-sponsored influenza vaccine clinics.

Remaining dates and locations for Tuscola County clinics, which offer flu shots for \$5 and free diphtheria/tetanus boosters, are Oct. 17 from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Vassar City Hall and Nov. 14 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the County Health Department in Caro.

Persons eligible to attend the clinics are those aged 65 and older, and so-called "high risk" individuals, department chief clerk Carol Hicks said. Persons who have heart, kidney or lung problems, asthma, anemia, diabetes or similar maladies are considered high risk, she added. "If (high risk) people got the

flu, it would be very hard on them—life threatening, even."

While persons are urged to get a flu vaccination once a year, the diphtheria/tetanus booster is normally given once every 10 years. Special emphasis on the booster this year is the result of flooding problems, Hicks said, adding persons working in clean-up operations are subject to infection.

According to Hicks, the clinics are set up primarily to insure that older persons receive the shots. "We try to help the elderly by going to different sites," she said.

The department is currently making plans for a first-ever adult immunization program in January which would offer the diphtheria/tetanus booster, Hicks said, but no specific details on the program are available yet.

In Sanilac County, mean-

while, clinics will be held Oct. 20 and 27 from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. at the County Health Department. Both the flu vaccine and diphtheria/tetanus booster will be available for \$3 each. Eligibility is the same as in Tuscola County in addition to persons who provide care to high risk individuals, such as physicians, nurses, nurses aides and nursing employees, and those who provide an essential community service, such as emergency medical technicians, police officers and firemen.

In Huron County, flu shots and diphtheria/tetanus boosters will be available for \$5 each Oct. 16 from 1:15 p.m. to 2:15 p.m. at St. Edwards Hall, Kinde, and Oct. 21 from 1 p.m. to 2 p.m. at the American Legion Hall in Caseville. Flu shots are also offered on Tuesdays from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. at the Huron County Health Department in Bad Axe. Eligibility guidelines are the same as in Sanilac County.

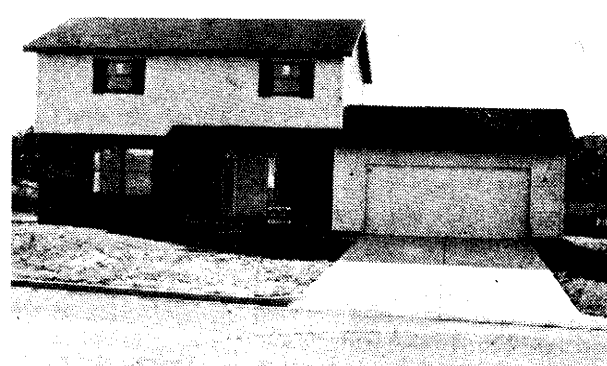

# Taking stock

It's **snooking** that a man like Richard Russell (Dow Theory Letters) was so unaware of the truth when publishing his Sept. 10 Letter.

Earlier in September, a Democratic House Committee gave wide circulation to some government figures that showed "the rich get richer, saying the 'rich' controlled 35% of all assets, up from 25%. Despite advice that there must be a statistical error, the Democrats went ahead and used the report. Even the Wall Street Journal -- and of course Dan Rather and his crowd -- published the figures.

Anyhow after a few days, the real, corrected numbers came out. The rich's share went up 1%, not 10%, and even the 1% could have been zero, using the range of sampling error.

The Wall Street Journal immediately corrected its story, and made a long editorial about it. (Dan Rather, naturally, remained silent.)

Surely Richard Russell, so renowned that Barron's magazine did a long article on him this summer, must read the Journal. Anyhow Russell's Letter of Sept. 10 used the erroneous report.

The error in the first report should have been apparent to any financial editor, for the whole trend of wealth in America is one of

narrowing the gap between rich and poor.

As long as we're pointing on Mr. Russell, let us note another mistake in the same letter. He said that money compounded at 7.7% doubles in 10 years. Instead it does so in a shade over 9. A zero-coupon bond due in 10 years at 7.7% yield costs 50.66, showing a growth factor of 1.973943939992, if you want to be exact, and boring.

We will not hammer any more on Russell, although it's quite a temptation to quote him as of Sept. 10: "The bull market is still in force...we can rest in peace at this point..."

Two days later the market fell on its ear, and the average dropped 141 points in a week.

My neighbor, Mac, now retired, has kept his license as a general insurance agent. Smart move. He gets a commission on any policy he writes.

He was considering buying an annuity as an investment.

"Why not?" he asked. "I get a 7% commission."

Fine for Mac, but it shows what you're paying as an individual when you buy an annuity. You plump down \$10,000 and the 7% comes off, and you have \$930, working for you. Then the insurance company takes the \$930 and invests in the same things you can buy directly yourself--bonds, mortgages, and so forth.

There'll be overhead charges as time goes by. And there'll be restrictions on cashing it in during the first 5 or 6 years.

Signs of the times in northern Michigan, in this case, our summer home of Benzie County.

Mitchell Corporation with about 150 employees is the biggest payroll in the county.

Mitchell makes interior trim for GM, and was losing business --and money-- because its prices didn't compete.

In May the company said hourly wages would be cut 30% -- from \$7.36 to \$5.25. The company was non-union.

Unions saw this as a chance to organize the plant and called for an election.

Two weeks before the election the company advertised it would take applications for about 25 jobs at \$4.75 an hour. The morning announced as the day to apply, over 200 people showed up. Some had come and stood in line since midnight in bitter weather. Our friend Mary Jane showed up at 4 a.m. and she was No. 94.

The election came off week later. The union bid was turned down 93 to 47.

# Post-polio syndrome strikes polio victims

Obenauf also agrees with Anderson's belief that there are "many" persons suffering from post-polio syndrome in Michigan. "It has been increasing somewhat during the past year. We anticipate it will continue to increase," Obenauf remarked.

While the average victim of post-polio syndrome is thought to experience polio symptoms approximately 30 years after the first attack, the number of persons who have post-polio syndrome and the disease's exact cause are not known for certain yet, Obenauf said. "A lot of the studies

really have only begun to take shape. We really should know more in the next 2 or 3 years."

While victims of post-polio syndrome wait for studies and research to discover more about their mysterious ailment, support groups are beginning to form. To reach post-polio victims, regional support groups have been established under an umbrella state organization called the Polio Network, Inc.

According to Anderson, there are about 16 local support groups in Michigan, including the Saginaw branch, which was started last March. Anderson, herself a victim of post-polio

syndrome, said the support group's goal is to educate lay people and physicians about the disease, and to provide support for victims. "Michigan is probably leading the pack of states that are recognizing and doing something about it," she commented.

Anderson said that she hopes plans for a post-polio syndrome clinic in the Saginaw area will become a reality in January. The clinic staff would include physical and occupational therapists, a dietitian, a psychologist and related professionals to help evaluate each victim's condition and determine a plan for dealing with it. Currently, persons have few alternatives for such care, according to Anderson, who said there is an 8 to 10-month wait at a similar facility in Ann Arbor.

Stine, who was one of some 130 persons to attend a seminar on post-polio syndrome last month at St. Luke's Hospital in Saginaw, said she didn't learn a great deal more about her problem at the meeting, but that it was nice to be around others in the same predicament.

"It's sort of devastating," she said, looking off into the distance. "There's no way of building (strength); all we can do is reserve. I hope I don't get so bad that I have to get back in a wheelchair, but who knows?"

She added, "There's nothing that will take the pain and aches away."
