## O-G critical millage vote set Monday

Owen-Gage School District voters will be asked for the third time in a little more than 4 months to approve a 1-year, 6-mill property tax levy in a special election Monday.

The Board of Education is scheduled to hold the 2nd of two informational meetings on the proposal Oct. 15 from 8 p.m. to 9 p.m. at the Gagetown Elementary

Voters defeated the proposal, which would raise about \$240,000, by 44 votes in June, and again in August by a 4-vote margin.

closeness that existed between business and the farm community is not what it once was. No longer do we know every customer that walks though our doors.

Perhaps now would be a fine time to try to reestablish it. There's an effort underway for interested persons in the community to do what they can to help in this time of crisis on the farm. Really, though, there is not much we can really do to help. We might volunteer to drive a truck on a week end or devote a couple of hours after work to help out. And there are lots and lots of folks that live in town that would be willing to do it in this emergency. How much

real help this would be is questionable. It's like trying to plug a hole to stop the water after the dam has

There was a time when unskilled labor made a real difference. Way back when I was in high school, there was a week off each October for "beet vacation" when school kids could help out at home on the farm and the town kids would hire out if needed to get the crop in. It was mostly back breaking, hand work in those days, which pinpoints the difference today. All the kids in all the schools volunteering to help wouldn't be of much use running a beet harvester.

It's no secret that the severe farm financial crunch has caused depression among farm owners. How could they not be affected when the very best possible harvest result will be a huge loss? And many farmers are wondering how to get enough money to plant next spring or face the loss of the land that they spent a lifetime acquiring.

One farm wife we heard about was leaving her job early in the afternoon because she feared what her husband might do if left

While actual physical help that we can offer is minimal, we can help by being a friend to a farm friend. It's suggested that we call a friend or stop out and visit. Offer to do what we can and listen to what he has to say. Listening is important, our farm expert says. Let them know you care.

(If there is anything good to come out of this catastrophe, it should be the reminder that we all need and are dependent on each other. We can never recreate the close knit community that was ours in a simpler, less hectic time, but we can make it better than it was. The rain has brought us closer and we should do our best not to drift farther apart again when the sun shines.



In accordance with the authority for the appointment of such Village officers as the Council shall deem necessary for the execution of the powers granted to the Village contained in Section 2 of Chapter 11 and Section 8 of Chapter V of Act No. 3, P.A. of 1895, as amended, which is the Charter of the Village, there is hereby established the office

of Village Manager. Sec. 2. Appointment of Village Manager The President shall, with the concurrence of four or more Trustees, appoint a Village Manager for an indefinite term and the Council may, by contract, enter into such other terms and conditions as the Manager and Council deem appropriate. The Manager shall serve at the pleasure of the Council and may be removed by the affirmative vote of four or more Trustees, but only after a hearing before the Council:

The Manager shall be selected solely on abilities with special reference to training and experience.

The Manager need not be a resident of

the Village at the time of appointment but shall become a resident within 90 days from permitted upon approval of the Council. The ter during the term of office.

Sec. 3. Acting Village Manager. The Council may appoint or designate an Acting Village Manager during the period of a vac-ancy in the office of Manager or during an absence approved by the Council from duties in the Village.

Sec. 5. Duties. The Village Manager shall

be Chief Administrative Officer of the Village and shall be responsible to the Village Council for the efficient administration of all affairs of the Village and shall exercise manage ment supervision over all departments and over the public property belonging to the

Village.
The Manager shall have the following

functions and duties:

A. Act in behalf of and carry out the instructions of, and be the authorized epresentative of the Village Council B. Be responsible for the employment, suspension and discharge of adminitrative officers and department heads

charge of all other employees of the Village.
Be solely responsible to the President and Council for directing all the departments of the Village under his

jurisdiction, and the personnel there-in, within the limits set by law. D. Attend all meetings of the Village Council with the right to take part in

E. Be a member ex-officio of all commit tees of the Village Council.

F. Recommend to the Council for adoption such measures as he may deem

The Village Manager shall have the au hority to purchase any product or serv the cost of which does not exceed \$5,000.00 provided that funds have been appropriated exceed the unencumbered balance of the herein after provided, the Village Manage shall not purchase any product or service the cost of which exceeds the above dollar amount without prior approval of the Village Council. The Village Manager may progate rules governing the purchase of ucts or services.

The Village Manager shall have the austhority to purchase any product or service regardless of its cost when such purchase is necessitated by an emergency condition. "Emergency condition" is defined to mean any event which would result in the disrup tion of a Village service which is essentito the public health or safety.

If any portion of this person or circumstances shall be found to be invalid by a court, such invalidity shall not affect the remaining portions or applice tions of the ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid portion or applications provided that such remaining portions or applications are not determined by said court to be inoperable, and to this end this ordinance is declared to be severable.

## German native trades riding a bike for waxing his exchange brother's car

and a multi-colored shirt with a fashionable white undershirt. 17-year-old Thorsten Walte fits in well with his senior classmates at Cass City High School.

The brown-haired, blueeyed teenager, who stands about 5' 8" and sports a

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stylish, short hair cut, could easily be mistaken for the "boy next door."

But Walte, who speaks with a distinguishable accent and pleasantly contagious grin, is a friendly stranger to the Thumb area. For that matter, he's a stranger to the United States.

A native of Bremen, W. Germany, Walte is here as exchange student through the local Rotary. Since his arrival Aug. 18, he's been living with the Ben Hobart family in Gagetown, the first of 3 homes he will reside in during his year-long stay.

The differences between Bremen and the Cass City area are, as they say, black and white. Bremen, a commercial and industrial city located 45 miles south of the North Sea in northern W. Germany, was founded sometime before A.D. 787 and has a population of some 558,942, compared to Cass City's 2,258. Bremen's population is about equal to

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the populations of Grand cause I learned British En- Hobart. Walte says he plans Rapids, Flint, Kalamazoo and Lansing combined.

Despite the major switch from urban to rural living, however, Walte says he has come to enjoy small-town life. "When you go through the streets in Bremen, nobody says 'Hi'. If you do, they are wondering what's wrong with this person,' Walte explained. "When you go here, you say 'Hi' to somebody you don't know and you talk to them. I like

Language hasn't been a problem for Walte, whose English is impressive considering the fact that he also speaks French as well as German. "It was difficult for me at first be-

than the English spoken here. American English is less 'proper' and spoken faster than British English, which made it hard at first to understand the language here," the teenager said.

Walte's training in English began in the 5th grade, the first of 6 years of the language required in W. German schools. He has studied French for 4 years.

An all-around athlete. Walte is trying some sports which are new to him. He says he loved his first-ever water skiing expedition and his first game of baseball, introduced to him by his exchange brother, Clayton

> He still enjoys one of his favorite sports, tennis, but was somewhat dismayed when he learned that field hockey isn't a major boys' sport in Michigan. In Bremen, boys' field hockey leagues, as well as soccer and tennis leagues, are popular, Walte noted.

Also popular in his hometown, at least among young people, is the bicycle. The more traditional mode of transportation is a logical choice in a sprawling city where you are close

to stores, restaurants and recreation, he says.

Although it's common for American teens to own and drive cars, especially those who live in rural areas where motor transportation is practically a necessity, Walte says the practice is very new to him. "It was surprising to me that nearly all the younger people here have big cars. I couldn't believe this, but it's true," he remarked. Walte, who rides to school in Clayton's car, added, "I am riding a bike all my life and now I am waxing a car.'

Learning how to drive and getting a driver's license is a goal Walte hopes to realize when he returns home. In W. Germany, he explained, getting a license is a major operation. Aside from the cost, the equivalent of about \$600 in U.S. currency, potential drivers must attend a special driving school for 6 months. Walte, like many youths his age in Germany, hopes the cost of a license will come via an 18th birthday gift. "Eigh- talk to them about almost teen is a very big birthday anything," he said. "When when you can do anything-anything legal, of course,"

he said. Even if he had the money before his upcoming birthday, he still would have to wait because you must be 18 to receive a driver's license in W. Germany.

The popularity of the automobile among American youths wasn't the only surprise for Walte, who admitted he had a few preconceived notions about life in the United States.

"When I came here I thought all Americans ate only hamburgers and hot dogs," he said, adding dinners at the Hobart's have been a pleasant surprise. An impression of Walte's that turned out to be true was Americans' obsession with television. He commented that he doesn't spend much time in front of the boob tube, probably because only 3 channels are available in his hometown, 7 channels if you have cable service.

Another area new to Walte is the local education system, particularly teachers. "Teachers here are like friends. You can you have problems in Germany with the teachers,

you don't talk to them.' Walte noted that the educational system in Germany is split into 3 school types; one for average students, one for above-average students and one for below-average students. Having attended the above-average school, Walte says he would like to follow in his father's footsteps and work in his insurance company.

For now, however, Walte is happy to enjoy his temporary home in the Thumb among friends with whom he enjoys talking and laughing. And it doesn't hurt that area girls are "very pretty," he says. That's quite a complement as the teen has seen pretty girls in England, France, Italy, Switzerland, Austria, Holland, Belgium, Sweden, Denmark and W. Germany.

Walte, who lives with his parents, Henry and Antje. and a sister, Martina, 20, in a condominium at 27B Saarbrueckener St. in his hometown, said he hasn't had any bouts with homesickness yet. "So far, I don't miss anything. Well ...I think I will miss my bike. And, of course, I miss my friends and family.'



## New books at the library

ON A FAR WILD SHORE by Malcolm MacDonald (fiction). A young woman, widowed on the day of her marriage, tentatively approaches the Cornwall estates which are her late husband's legacy. The young widow grows into an entrepreneur, unique for her gender in the 1890's, as well as a sexually liberated woman. Elizabeth Troy develops some 3500 acres of farm and horseland, pumps up the economy of the village no longer able to rely on aging tin mines, and all the while counters, without vengeance, the relentless antagonism of her sister-in-law. Though Elizabeth marries again, not happily, she finds mature love in extramarital pleasure with another Troy, this time a member of the American branch, on a business visit to Cornwall.

HOUSES BY MAIL: a guide to houses from Sears, Roebuck Co. by Katherine Cole Stevenson (non-fiction). Between 1908 and 1940 Sears sold over 100,000 nearly completed houses across the country, particularly in the Northeast and Midwest. Some 500 models were available, and the company sought to make ordering them "easy as ordering an automobile, radio or piece of furniture." The houses which had on average 30,000 pieces and cost between \$650 and \$2500, were usually shipped by rail and often were assembled by Sears' employees. This book reproduces copy from the original Sears house catalogues. There is, for example, the "Matoka," a two-bedroom bungalow that was popular during World War I. The "Rockhurst" had three possible exterior designs. The "Winthrop" was based on classic New England styles. This book offers a nostalgic and informative look at the tastes of Americans in the years before World War II.

UNVEILING CLAUDIA: a true story of serial murder by Daniel Keyes (non-fiction). In 1978, in Ohio's capital city, mentally disturbed Claudia Yasko, age 26, confessed to police certain information that led to her arrest for homicide in connection with a triple murder that had taken place in Columbus not long before. The charges eventually were dropped when it was determined that she had not participated in the crime. There remained, however, questions in the authorities' minds regarding how she had obtained knowledge of the crime scene. A few years later, Claudia decided to tell her story and contacted the author. Over a much longer period than he expected the process to take. Keves elicited from Claudia - he was forced to wrench the information from her because of her fears for her safety and her cloudy mental state - the truth about the murders and how she came to know the layout of the scene of the

### I agree with Reagan's decision

Despite the distance between Reykjavik, Iceland, and Cass City, Mich., the reported collapse of the super-powers meeting held over the weekend on nuclear arms control and reduction has area residents wondering whether the future holds peace or annihilation.

Reports on why the meeting ended with no agreements are conflicting. The U.S. contends that the Soviets insisted on a 10-year ban on developing, testing and deploying a defense against nuclear missiles. The Soviets, meanwhile, indicated that the United States insists on the right to test Star Wars, formally known as the Strategic Defense Initiative, in both the laboratory and space.

How do you feel about President Reagan's stand on Star Wars considering the failure of the weekend talks?

"If they want us to postpone defense systems, that must tell you something," 16-year-old Mark Hampshire said. Hampshire, a junior at Cass City High School, said he agrees with President Reagan's decision not to accept a total ban of Star Wars. At first, the teenager commented, the defense system didn't sound very effective. "Now, it seems like the perfect defense system."

Hampshire says the threat of a renewed arms race isn't news to his generation and that the topic has

race," he remarked. "It's been going on for quite awhile. If you can already destroy the world, what's point of more weapons?" He added, 'Sooner or later you're going to get the urge to try these new toys."

Hampshire says the threat of nuclear holocaust isn't something he thinks about often, but adds that the failure of agreements between the super powers probably is due to a lack of cooperation--give and take. "If you go to a meeting like that with a closed mind, what can you hope to accomplish?

Hampshire, who works at the Rawson Memorial Library as a co-op student, is the son of Richard and Joyce Hampshire, 6268 Cedar Dr., Cass City.

### A diet deficient in amino acids can lead to emphysema

According to a recent study, a diet deficient in essential amino cids at an early age can lead to abnormalities in the structure of the lungs that may lead to emphysema and other serious lung dis-

Presenting her findings at the Annual Meeting of the American Lung Association and its medical section, the American Thoracic Society, Janet S. Kerr, Ph.D., of DuPont Pharmaceuticals in Wilmington, Del., said that amino acid deprivation is most injurious to lung development in young animals, but this effect may occur at any age.

Dr. Kerr fed complete and incomplete diets to young laboratory rats and found that, even when the total caloric intake was adequate, significant emphysema-like structural changes were observable in those rats fed a diet lacking the essential amino acid lysine after only 8 weeks. Emphysema is a chronic,







## Area influenza vaccine

and Huron County residents who are prone to the miseries of the flu season have only a few more opportunities to take advantage of county health department-sponsored influenza vaccine clinics

Remaining dates and locations for Tuscola County clinics, which offer flu shots for \$5 and free diphtheria/ tetanus boosters, are Oct. 17 from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Vassar City Hall and Nov. 14 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the County Health Department in Caro.

Persons eligible to attend the clinics are those aged 65 and older, and so-called "high risk" individuals, department chief clerk Carol Hicks said. Persons who have heart, kidney or lung problems, asthma, anemia, diabetes or similar maladies are considered high risk, she added. "If (high risk) people got the

Eligible Tuscola, Sanilac flu, it would be very hard on them--life threatening, even.

clinics name final dates

While persons are urged to get a flu vaccination once a year, the diphtheria/ tetanus booster is normally given once every 10 years. Special emphasis on the booster this year is the result of flooding problems, Hicks said, adding persons working in clean-up operations are subject to infec-

According to Hicks, the clinics are set up primarily to insure that older persons receive the shots. "We try to help the elderly by going to different sites," she said.

The department is cur-

rently making plans for a first-ever adult immunization program in January which would offer the diphtheria/tetanus booster, Hicks said, but no specific details on the program are available yet.

## Post-polio syndrome strikes polio victims

Obenauf also agrees with Anderson's belief that there are "many" persons suffering from post-polio syndrome in Michigan. "It has been increasing somewhat during the past year. We anticipate it will continue to increase," Obenauf remarked.

While the average victim of post-polio syndrome is thought to experience polio symptoms approximately 30 years after the first attack, the number of persons who have post-polio syndrome and the disease's exact cause are not known for certain yet. Obenauf said. "A lot of the studies

really have only begun to take shape. We really should know more in the next 2 or 3 years.'

While victims of postpolio syndrome wait for studies and research to discover more about their mysterious ailment, support groups are beginning to form. To reach post-polio victims, regional support groups have been established under an umbrella state organization called the Polio Network, Inc.

According to Anderson, there are about 16 local support groups in Michigan, including the branch, which was started last March. Anderson, herself a victim of post-polio

syndrome, said the support group's goal is to educate lay people and physicians about the disease, and to provide support for victims. "Michigan is probably leading the pack of states that are recognizing and doing something about it," she commented.

Anderson said that she hopes plans for a post-polio syndrome clinic in the Saginaw area will become a reality in January. The clinic staff would include physical and occupational therapists, a dietician, a psychologist and related professionals to help evaluate each victim's condition and determine a plan for dealing with it. Currently, persons have few alternatives for such care, according to Anderson, who said there is an 8 to 10month wait at a similar facility in Ann Arbor.

Stine, who was one of some 130 persons to attend a seminar on post-polio syndrome last month at St. Hospital Saginaw, said she didn't learn a great deal more about her problem at the meeting, but that it was nice to be around others in the same predicament.

"It's sort of devastating," she said, looking off into the distance. "There's no way of building (strength); all we can do is reserve. I hope I don't get so bad that I have to get back in a wheelchair, but who knows?

She added, "There's nothing that will take the pain and aches away.
