New 2-year pact to raise costs for teachers \$428,000

Labor peace at Cass City Schools was assured Monday with the ratification of a new contract by the Cass City Teachers Association and the school district for the 1986-87 and 1987-88 school years. The pact will add about \$428,000 to the district's cost for teachers over the life of the agreement. In the current year the additional cost will be \$145,000 and in the second year the additional cost will be \$138,000.

Supt. Don Crouse said that the cost of the new pact will be 6 percent the first year and 6.25 percent the second year. These costs do not include increases for length of service.

Figuring the percentage of increase for individual teachers is difficult. At the top of the scale (13 years' service) a teacher with a bachelor's degree will be paid \$27,832, an increase of \$1,600. A teacher with a master's degree will be paid \$29,511, an increase of \$1,670.

A feature of the contract that the Tri-County Bargaining Association has been seeking is the lowering of the time necessary to reach the top of the scale. In the first year of the contract the steps (years) on the scale have been reduced from 13 to 12 and in the second year from 12 to 11. The reduced time it takes to reach the top will help new teachers entering the system and will increase the cost to the district. However, in recent years very few new teachers that start at the bottom of the scale have

been added. The settlement came after lengthy bargaining and an 11-day teachers' strike. At the time of the strike and when fact finding started, the school district was offering a package valued at \$115,000 and the teachers were asking for a package costing \$289,000. The settlement reached with one on one bargaining between Sheldon Markley, negotiator for the TBA, and Crouse is estimated to cost \$145,000 in the first year. 

Dairy farming $workshop\ slated$

Many dairy farmers could probably make a lot more money with their dairy herds if they gave more care to the calves they raise for herd replacements.

Just how much more money is hard to pin down. But almost èveryone associated with dairy herd management in the Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service believes that farmers could substantially increase their profit margin.

To show farmers how to do this is the purpose of an all-day workshop being held around the state Jan. 8-Feb. 17. One will be at Cass City's Colony House, Jan. 15. It's called "Raising Dairy Heifers for More Profit Through Better Management: Nutrition, Breeding, Health and Housing.

"We're not saying that producers are doing a poor job," says Bill Bickert, MSU Extension agricultural engineer. 'But there are some areas of management being overlooked by producers, and there are some new ideas that we've developed that can help them do a more



Farm family stress seminar

Farmers urged to manage their stress

A seminar on farm family stress and agriculture trends drew 80 people to Bad Axe's Franklin Inn last Thursday, Dec. 11.

Huron County Cooperative Extension sponsored the seminar, attended by farmers, bankers, teachers and representatives from agribusinesses, churches, the Department of Social Services and Community Mental Health.

Dr. Anne Soderman, a Human Development Specialist at Michigan State University, talked about

stress and how it physically and emotionally affects people.
"What happens if you

don't do something about stress?" Soderman asked. "Five or six years down the road we're going to see stress problems. Stress problems don't just occur overnight. Five years from now we expect to see more heart disease, hypertension, family breakups and alcoholism. In the long run, consequently, it's more than just losing the farm."

Stress equals excess energy, Soderman said. The audience chuckled when she showed a picture of a large bear nipping at a caveman's butt. The problems people face today are like the animals our ancestors had to face. That excess energy is left over from evolution, she

Soderman explained the General Adaptation Syndrome, the phases of reaction to stress. First, stress alerts the body, as if an internal alarm sounds. The hormones adrenaline and noradrenaline are released. As the stress continues, the body switches to the second phase, continued resistance. Then stress picks on the body's weakest system or organ.

programmed to put up with stress for only so long," she said. "Then the body is programmed to break down. The immune system shuts down. Have you ever been under a great deal of pressure for a long period of time and when it's over you come down with a terrible cold or the flu?"

Even though she was talking about stress for the seminar, Soderman said stress workshops aren't what farm families need. She advised learning relaxation and breathing techniques and countering the stress.

You don't have to blow, you can react on a lower level, she said. Find outlets for energy, remain calm, and remember the world goes on. Find good friends to talk to and information with.

"Some people do need outside help," Soderman said. "That's what mental health is all about. I don't know why people won't talk someone who's

After asking the audience to close their eyes, Soderman used a soothing voice to outline her technique for alleviating pain. Find a quiet spot, shut your eyes and focus on breathing, she said. Go to the area where the pain is. Picture the pain, mentally outline it and then color in the whole area. When you

have a handle on it, when it's solid and you have a picture of the entire thing, s-l-o-w-l-y just turn the whole area into liquid and drain it right out.

'Stress control won't take away the farm crisis, it will only help us get through it," she said. "There's not anything I can do for farm families. Stress is what Ubly's St John's Church said happens to your body. You better do something about it. Eventually stress leads to disease. Stress can kill.

"Farmers are going to go through 3-4-5 more years of problems," Soderman continued. "Learning stress management techniques. paying attention to your diet, getting exercise and not making a million dollar problem out of a \$10 problem will be important. Take advantage of resources and government programs. Don't try toughing it out by yourself but get in support groups.

One Harbor Beach dairy farmer said he was out of the fields now so he figured he had time to come to the seminar but he doubted he would use any of the stress relaxation techniques.

"Farming is stressful even under normal times," he said. He owns a dairy farm of 70 cattle he and his son manage. He doesn't plan to get out of farming.

"I'm 54," he said. "What kind of job would I start now? We've done good--not great and not bad.

The effects of the flood will be seen next spring, he said. Will farmers be able to get financing, will we be able to

plant next spring? he asked. 'I've heard some farmers say it was hard to pay bills this fall," he said. "They don't know about next spring.

Rev. Pat O'Connor of

Huron Cooperative Extension agent Jim LeCureux was a member of

his parish and asked him to attend the seminar.

'The parish I'm assigned to is pretty much farm oriented," O'Connor said. "As a pastor I want to help our people out if I can."

The Ubly parish is made up mostly of dairy farmers and at least a half dozen are involved in the dairy buyout, he said. He doesn't see the farmers as feeling helpless or hopeless but rather frustrated because they

realize that being a good farmer doesn't necessarily mean getting a good income.

'Most farmers feel a great deal of dependence-and most farmers don't like feeling dependent," O'Connor said.


A lot of farmers are trying to hold on, hoping things get better. They try to do more in less time to be as efficient as they can be. The more they try to do a good job, the more surplus they produce and the commodity prices fall farther, O'Connor said.



Blood bank to visit Dec. 23

Area hospital officials are hoping Cass City residents include "giving blood" on their Christmas lists this year.

Cross The Red Bloodmobile will be at Hills and Dales General Hospital from 1 to 7 p.m. Dec. 23.

The blood drive, sponsored by the hospital and Cass City Zonta Club, is coming at a time when the need for blood is typically high, according to Jane Mitchell, the local volunteer Red Cross blood drive coordinator.

'Christmas is a bad time because there are so many accidents. There really is a severe shortage" during the holiday, she added.

Persons aged 17 years or older, weighing at least 100 pounds and in good health may qualify as donors, Mitchell explained. The procedure, which takes about an hour, is done by a qualified Red Cross Registered Nurse. "Each donor receives a mini-health check, an analysis of their blood type for future reference and a permanent Red Cross blood donor identification card.' Mitchell indicated that few

persons are rejected as blood donors, but those taking certain high blood pressure medications, have a cold or are taking some special medications are not allowed to give blood. Persons who plan to give

blood should eat a good meal before the procedure, and are urged to take part in the hospital's orange juice and cookie table after the procedure, Mitchell continued. She added, "Some people feel better after giving a pint of blood and some don't notice. Some feel a little tired."

"People in the community have been very supportive of the blood bank," Mitchell remarked. She said that attendance at the local drives is usually at least 85 to 90 persons, with at least 70 persons qualifying to give a unit, or pint, of blood. The highest attendance was about 110 persons, she added





Chapter three in "The Case of the Crumbling Bricks." To recap - in the fall of 1874, 450,000 bricks were ordered from R.W. for the building of a courthouse at Bad Axe. Port Austin had been the county seat until October 1873, and the editor of the county's only newspaper wrote somewhat biased reports of the progress of the new county seat, and especially of the new courthouse, indirectly lamenting Port Austin's loss of being the county seat.

The bricks were delivered in the fall, and in April, 1875, the editor reported that the bricks were "exceedingly brittle...that even with the most careful handling very many of them would break." Here's how the story con-

tinued. April 15, 1875, "The winter passed, and as it did, so snow and storm descended upon the bricks. There have also been a few showers of rain. The result, considering they (the bricks) are of a high priced, superior article, are. crumbling into fragments. They are so soft they can be readily smashed by the pressure of the hands, and are pronounced by practical men as being unfit for a public building or any other building. Many of the bricks, as they crumble, exhibit a mixture in which black muck, leaves, etc., make up a part. In short, Huron County has got a worthless pile of dirt on its hands, which represents over \$4000 of the hard earned taxes its people have, or will be called upon,





HEALTH TIPS

Shoveling snow can be hazardous to your heart

"Risking one health to eliminate another," that's how the president of the American Heart Association of Michigan (AHA/MI), Andrew Hauser, M.D., describes snow shoveling. "While shoveling snow from porches and walkways may prevent a sprain, the strain could cause a heart attack," says the Birmingham cardiologist.

Barry Franklin, Ph.D., chairman of the AHA/MI exercise and cardiac rehabilitation committee also warns of the danger of heart attack while shoveling or shortly thereafter.

To point out how strenuous shoveling is, Dr. Franklin has a formula based on a 154 pound man that relates shoveling to other activities.

The shoveling activity in the formula is lifting the snow, taking two steps and throwing the snow at a rate of 10 shovels per minute. Shoveling with a combined weight of 8.8 lbs. for shovel and snow is equivalent to singles tennis or light

downhill skiing.

Shoveling a combined weight of 13.8 lbs. is equivalent to running 5.5 mph or playing hand ball or basketball. Shoveling 22.5 lbs. (wet snow) at the rate of 10 shovels per minute is as strenuous as running 9 mph for the same length of time.

Franklin has identified five elements of shoveling that each have a detrimental effect on the cardiovascular system. The first is that shoveling, an upper body exercise, brings about a higher heart rate and blood pressure response because upper body work is less efficient than leg work.

Secondly, says Franklin, "Exercising in a standing position, especially when the legs are frequently motionless, may cause pooling of blood in the lower extremities. The decrease in the rate of return may reduce blood flow to the heart while the heart rate and oxygen demands of the heart are high.

"Simply holding a shovel full of snow, or straining to lift or push heavy loads, creates another form of cardiovascular stress isometric exertion," continued Franklin.

During strenuous lifting efforts, there is another response that induces sudden changes in heart rate and blood pressure and should generally be avoided by persons with car-diovascular disease. This response is holding your breath with your mouth

Simple exposure to cold air causes a constriction of select blood vessels throughout the body which increases blood pressure and the heart rate and the likelihood of angina. The effect of one, or the combined strain of all of these factors can, and does, cause heart

Some people don't realize they're having a heart at-tack and even dismiss the pain as indigestion. In 1984 an estimated 350,000 people died of heart attack before reaching a hospital.

The symptoms of heart attack include:

*Uncomfortable pressure, fullness, squeezing or pain in the center of your chest, lasting two minutes or more. *Pain that may spread to shoulders, neck or arms.

*Severe pain, dizziness, fainting, sweating, nausea or shortness of breath may also occur.

*NOT ALL SYMPTOMS MAY BE PRESENT.

If you suspect you or someone with you is having a heart attack: *Stop whatever activity

you're doing. *Don't wait, call the emergency rescue service **CO11**
