4th-quarter dividend declared by Walbro

The Board of Directors of Walbro Corporation, at a regular meeting Dec. 8, declared a fourth quarter dividend of 10 cents per share payable Jan. 30 to stockholders of record Dec. 31.

The 10 cents per share fourth quarter dividend represents an increase from the 8 cents per share dividend trend which began in the fourth quarter of 1985. Dividends of 6 cents per

share were paid for the first three quarters of last year. Total dividends paid in 1986 were \$.34 per share, on an estimated average of 3,301,635 shares outstanding. This compares with a total dividend payout of \$.26 per share based on an average of 2,942,124 shares outstanding for 1985. (A two-for-one split of Walbro common stock occurred May 28, 1985. The above figures have been restated to take the split into account.)

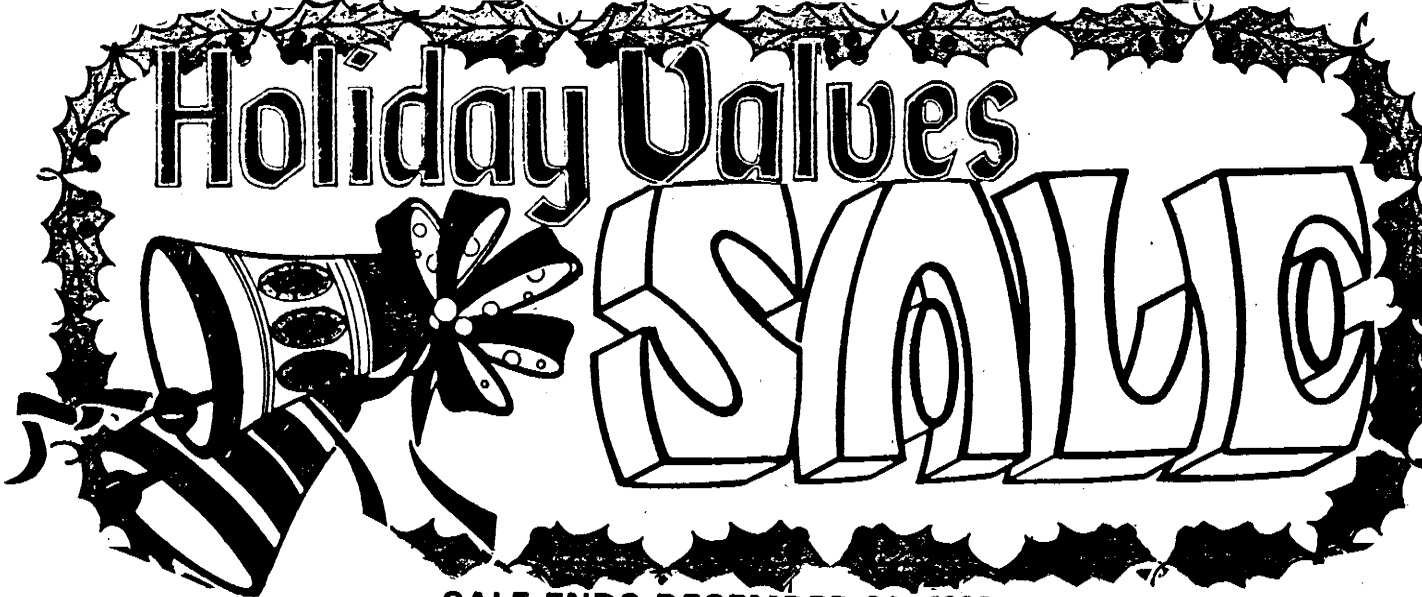

Caister is certified diabetes educator

Susan Caister, a Registered Dietitian at Saginaw's St. Luke's Hospital recently passed the first national Certification Examination for Diabetes Educators.

Caister can now use the initials CDE—for Certified Diabetes Educator—after her name.

"In the past 9 months I've been working with diabetic clients on a one-to-one basis," Caister said. "I've been teaching classes since one of the dietitians retired." One of the major reasons Caister decided to become certified was because it gives her national recognition. The certification shows she has expertise in all areas of diabetes—not just diets. It's a specialty, she said.

From Michigan, 42 nurses, pharmacists and dietitians took the test. Those who wanted to take the test had to be registered in their area and have 2 years or 2000 hours of direct participation with diabetics. The certification expires in five years, at which time re-certification is needed.

Caister was enthusiastic about the diabetes program at St. Luke's.

"Diabetes is a disease a lot of people don't understand," Caister explained. "Many feel they can't do certain things or eat certain foods if they're diabetic. They look at the negative points. Our program is a positive program. A lot of people need to lose weight and I like being here to see them start to lose weight and see them follow through with their diet."

Caister graduated from Cass City High School in 1978. She is married to Durrell Caister, also a Cass City High School graduate. They live in Bay City.

Caister's father, Royce Russell of Cass City, was impressed by his daughter's accomplishment.

"We're kind of proud," Russell said. "That's quite an accomplishment. Not many dietitians, if any, have those kinds of credentials."

Diabetes classes set for January

Persons with Diabetes Mellitus will have an opportunity to attend a series of diabetes education classes beginning January 6 from 1 to 2 p.m. at Hills and Dales General Hospital.

Offered by the Hospital, the classes are designed to help maintain good diabetes control through effective self-management, hospital spokesman Bonnie Johnson said.

"Statistics show that persons with adequate education are better motivated to maintain good control and less likely to have complications of impaired vision, poor circulation, kidney problems, heart problems and gangrenous foot problems," she added.

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Negligence suit filed against bar

An auto negligence suit seeking in excess of \$10,000 in damages was filed Monday by Earle L. Haney against Richard A. Neiger and Ebenhoeh Investments, Inc., the owners of an Akron tavern.

The suit stems from an early morning incident May 10 in which Haney claims he was seriously injured at the Ebenhoeh's Corner Inn Bar parking lot. Haney claims he was run over by a vehicle driven by Neiger.

The suit states that Neiger and a companion, Anthony L. Nelson, had been at the bar "for some time" and were "obviously" intoxicated and becoming argumentative while Haney was there.

Haney claims that after leaving the establishment, Neiger was negligent in that he backed up his vehicle and drove forward without making proper observations concerning the safety and whereabouts of pedestrians. Haney also says Neiger didn't stop and render assistance after allegedly hitting him.

Medical expenses exceeding \$27,000 and a hospital stay from May 10 through June 21 for several bone fractures and other injuries resulted from the incident, Haney claims.

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Farm family stress seminar

Farmers urged to manage their stress

A seminar on farm family stress and agriculture trends drew 80 people to Bad Axe's Franklin Inn last Thursday, Dec. 11.

Huron County Cooperative Extension sponsored the seminar, attended by farmers, bankers, teachers and representatives from agribusinesses, churches, the Department of Social Services and Community Mental Health.

Dr. Anne Soderman, a Human Development Specialist at Michigan State University, talked about

stress and how it physically and emotionally affects people.

"What happens if you don't do something about stress?" Soderman asked. "Five or six years down the road we're going to see stress problems. Stress problems don't just occur overnight. Five years from now we expect to see more heart disease, hypertension, family breakups and alcoholism. In the long run, consequently, it's more than just losing the farm."

Stress equals excess energy, Soderman said. The audience chuckled when she showed a picture of a large bear nipping at a caveman's butt. The problems people face today are like the animals our ancestors had to face. That excess energy is left over from evolution, she said.

Soderman explained the General Adaptation Syndrome, the phases of reaction to stress. First, stress alerts the body, as if an internal alarm sounds. The hormones adrenaline and noradrenaline are released. As the stress continues, the body switches to the second phase, continued resistance. Then stress picks on the body's weakest system or organ.

"The body is genetically programmed to put up with stress for only so long," she said. "Then the body is programmed to break down. The immune system shuts down. Have you ever been under a great deal of pressure for a long period of time and when it's over you come down with a terrible cold or the flu?"

Even though she was talking about stress for the seminar, Soderman said stress workshops aren't what farm families need. She advised learning relaxation and breathing techniques and countering the stress.

You don't have to blow, you can react on a lower level, she said. Find outlets for energy, remain calm, and remember the world goes on. Find good friends to talk to and share information with.

"Some people do need outside help," Soderman said. "That's what mental health is all about. I don't know why people won't talk to someone who's objective."

After asking the audience to close their eyes, Soderman used a soothing voice to outline her technique for alleviating pain. Find a quiet spot, shut your eyes and focus on breathing, she said. Go to the area where the pain is. Picture the pain, mentally outline it and then color in the whole area. When you

have a handle on it, when it's solid and you have a picture of the entire thing, s-l-o-w-l-y just turn the whole area into liquid and drain it right out.

"Stress control won't take away the farm crisis, it will only help us get through it," she said. "There's not anything I can do for farm families. Stress is what happens to your body. You better do something about it. Eventually stress leads to disease. Stress can kill."

"Farmers are going to go through 3-4-5 more years of problems," Soderman continued. "Learning stress management techniques, paying attention to your diet, getting exercise and not making a million dollar problem out of a \$10 problem will be important. Take advantage of resources and government programs. Don't try toughing it out by yourself but get in support groups."

One Harbor Beach dairy farmer said he was out of the fields now so he figured he had time to come to the seminar but he doubted he would use any of the stress relaxation techniques.

"Farming is stressful even under normal times," he said. He owns a dairy farm of 70 cattle he and his son manage. He doesn't plan to get out of farming.

"I'm 54," he said. "What kind of job would I start now? We've done good—not great and not bad."

The effects of the flood will be seen next spring, he said. Will farmers be able to get financing, will we be able to plant next spring? he asked.

"I've heard some farmers say it was hard to pay bills this fall," he said. "They don't know about next spring."

Rev. Pat O'Connor of Uby's St John's Church said Huron Cooperative Extension agent Jim LeCureux was a member of

his parish and asked him to attend the seminar.

"The parish I'm assigned to is pretty much farm oriented," O'Connor said. "As a pastor I want to help our people out if I can."

The Uby parish is made up mostly of dairy farmers and at least a half dozen are involved in the dairy buyout, he said. He doesn't see the farmers as feeling helpless or hopeless but rather frustrated because they

realize that being a good farmer doesn't necessarily mean getting a good income.

"Most farmers feel a great deal of dependence—and most farmers don't like feeling dependent," O'Connor said.

A lot of farmers are trying to hold on, hoping things get better. They try to do more in less time to be as efficient as they can be. The more they try to do a good job, the more surplus they produce and the commodity prices fall farther, O'Connor said.

The Cass City Economic Development Commission met Dec. 9 and discussed expanding the Cass City Chamber of Commerce.

The chamber may create individual memberships for people who don't belong to a business or are not employed by a business but want to be involved, said General Chamber President Kim Glaspie.

Tom Proctor suggested having a representative from each community group become a chamber board member. Someone else suggested changing the chamber meeting time from 7:15 a.m. to a later hour. Another suggestion was to combine the retail chamber with the general chamber or at least develop more lines of communication between the two groups to foster

increased involvement.

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Sesquicentennial celebration to be held at Cass City High School. Harold Perry said the high school has been contracted to prepare a meal Jan. 26, the day all the townships plan to celebrate the Sesquicentennial.

The CCEDC's promotion committee is gathering information for the second newsletter. The newsletter plans a larger circulation. Dorothy Stahlbaum funded the first newsletter and donations for upcoming newsletters will gladly be accepted.

The design committee was concerned about the trees lining Main Street. The committee would like a uniform look downtown, so Tom Proctor will see if the 5 trees which aren't hawthorns can be removed and replanted elsewhere so there will be only one type of tree lining the street. The design committee will also investigate how Caro and Frankenmuth encourage

their communities to plant flowers along the curb. The CCEDC would like to start similar projects.

Lou LaPonsie said the new lights in the parking lots should be installed by Jan. 1.

The CCEDC also plans to distribute its second survey to the Municipal Building, Walbro Corporation, the library, the schools, the hospital, the Provincial House, General Cable and Anrod Screen Cylinder. This survey will have an increased circulation and include more questions.

The questionnaire will ask where people live, their ages, how often they come to Cass City, the reasons they come, where else they shop and ask them to rate downtown businesses and services.

Elk hunt once in lifetime experience

The only way that Mike Otulakowski's successful elk hunt could have been better would have been that the once-in-a-lifetime trophy was bagged with a bow and

arrow and set a new state record for size and antlers. But the young hunter is not complaining. After all he did come home with a bull weighing 455 pounds field

dressed last Tuesday while hunting in the Pigeon River Forest area near Vienna, west of Atlanta. Just to win a license in the lottery was an unbelievable

stroke of good fortune for the Cass City hunter. His was one of 36,280 applications received for 95 available licenses, of which just 40 were for bulls.

Otulakowski went north with the aim of being the first hunter in Michigan to down a bull with a bow. He tried for nearly 3 days. During that time he trailed 3

elk, but never was able to get close enough to use his bow.

The bull he finally downed with a rifle was farther away than one of the animals he trailed trying to get close enough for a bow shot. The elk was shot at about 5:20 p.m. and went down immediately. Still it took 5 hours to get the huge animal to the road using a snow machine.

The bull was weighed and examined by authorities at

the Department of Natural Resources. It was 3 1/2 years old.

While no one has yet reported killing a bull with a bow, a 355-pound cow elk was taken that way by Jim Hoelt of Ann Arbor. In other developments of the hunt several records were set. John Alsup of Beulah shot a bull with a 47-inch, 10-point spread. Paul Chism of Farmington Hills killed a bull that weighed 682 pounds

field dressed to break the old record of 664 pounds.

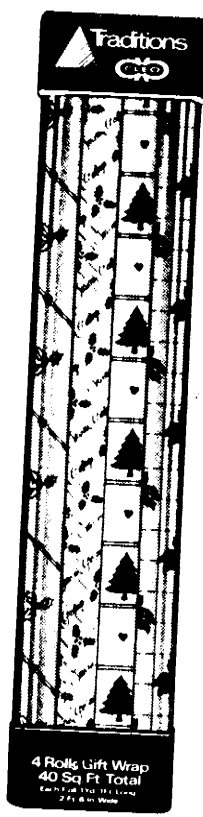
Hunters this year are proving to be more patient or to be having a harder time finding an elk as success in the opening days was less than it was in the previous 2 hunts.

It could be that the elk are becoming more wary. Don't let anyone tell you it's like shooting a cow in a pasture, Otulakowski says, because it's not that way at all now.

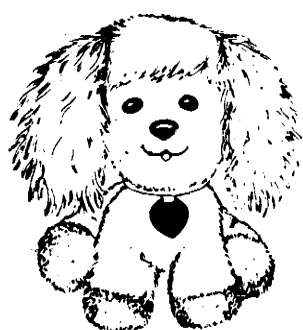
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ONCE IN A LIFETIME is the way Mike Otulakowski describes the elk hunting trip to the Pigeon River Forest area in Michigan last week.

O-G fails to improve, bows to weak Eagles

The Owen-Gage Bulldogs suffered their second defeat of the season last Friday, losing to Caseville 67-69 in what disheartened coach Dean Roller summed up as "we got beat by the team who was predicted to finish last in our league."

The loss puts the Bulldogs at 0-2 on the year, while Caseville evens its record at 1-1 and marked their first North Central Thumb League win. The Bulldogs will travel to Kingston Friday before breaking for the Christmas holidays.

The Bulldogs started out slow for the second week in a row and trailed 13-16 after the first period. "I saw no improvement from the first game," noted Roller. "We're not playing like a team as of yet."

The Eagles stretched their lead to 7 in the second quarter and went into the half leading 30-23. Their mentor, Randy Bingham, was very pleased with his cagers. From our perspective we played well. It was close all the way and we made a couple of free throws at the end to hold on for the win.

The Bulldogs came out strong in the third quarter, eliminating many of their turnovers to knot the score at 47 by quarter's end. The Bulldog run was even more impressive because of the fact that much of it was accomplished without the aid of last year's leading rebounder, Steve Root, who was ejected midway through

the period after receiving a technical foul.

The Bulldogs went up by 3 early in the fourth quarter when Eagle coach Bingham inserted Matt Kraus into the game. Kraus quickly came down and hit 2 consecutive long range jumpers to put the Eagles back on top. Kraus was far from done. The 6' forward went on to score 14 of his team's 22 fourth quarter points hitting a variety of shots both inside and out. Kraus finished the night with 20 points.

The Bulldogs were able to cling close despite Kraus' effort and had chances to win when the Eagles could only convert on the front ends of two one and one situations in the game's final 30 seconds.

"The Bulldogs lost their poise, and I was surprised considering they field a veteran team," stated Bingham. The Bulldogs were charged with 43 turnovers.

Leading the Bulldog attack for the second week in a row was Rick Salcido, who played a fine game and posted 17 points on 5 buckets and a 7-9 performance from the stripe. As a team the Bulldogs shot 19-37 from the line, an area where Coach Roller, and any basketball critic, will have to see improvement if the Bulldogs hope to win any tight contests.

Joining Salcido in double figures for the Bulldogs were Stu Stirrett, who came away

with 14 tallies, and Dave Laurie and Chris Abbe, who both finished with 13 points.

In the preliminary game the Bulldogs wasted little time in routing the host 64-20.

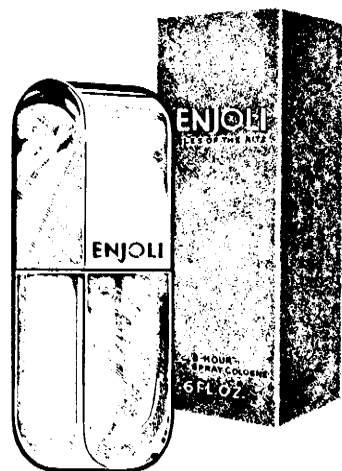
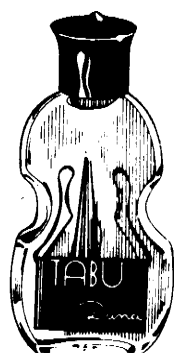
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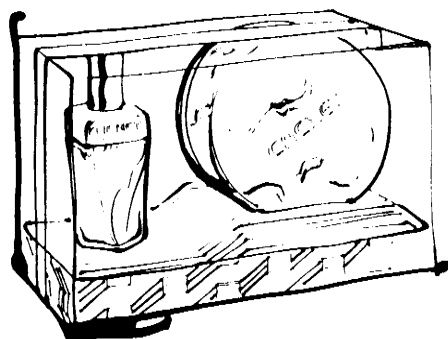
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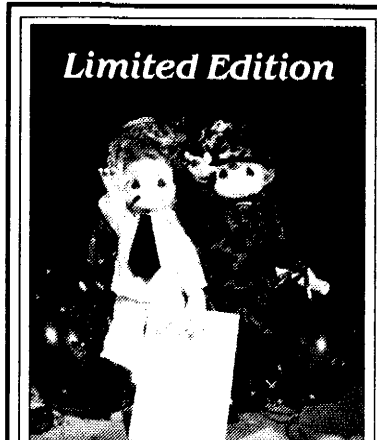


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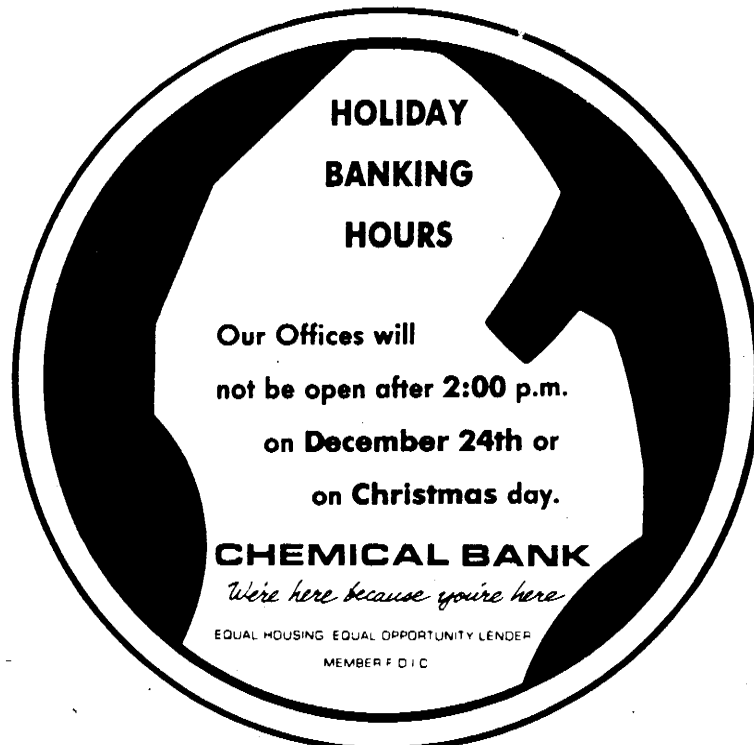
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Caro falls 91-56

Hawks win breather in prep for USA, Broncos

It isn't often that a game against the Caro Tigers can be called a breather, but that's exactly what Friday's Thumb B Association game at Cass City was for the Red Hawks. The Hawks toyed with the talent shy, winless Tigers while registering a 91-56 win.

The soft game on the schedule comes at a good time for the undefeated Red Hawks. This week's card pits Coach Ron Nurnberger's charges against Unionville-Sebewaing and North Branch. The USA contest was to be played Tuesday and was the first game for the Patriots after an upset loss to surprising Mayville. The game with the Broncos Friday pits Cass City against one of the teams expected to

make a run for the Thumb B title.

Fans that attended the Caro tilt were expecting a blowout and that's exactly what they saw as it was apparent after the first 4 minutes of the game when the Hawks pushed off to a 13-2 lead that Cass City would dominate.

After the first period, Nurnberger was able to experiment with different combinations and get every man dressed into the game. At the end of the opening 8 minutes Cass City was in front, 24-7.

The game did showcase the Hawk depth this year. Jeff Sontag played another strong game coming off the bench as he hit consistently on jumpers from the side and the top of the key. Virgil

Peters scored 12 points and the remainder of the bench cast turned in creditable performances. Cass City played without the services of Mike Randall because of illness.

It was Sontag that led the offensive charge in the second quarter as he hit 5 jumpers in 6 tries for 10 points.

The Hawks cruised to a 23-47 half-time lead and increased it to 69-40 at the end of the third quarter. Because everyone dressed played, 10 of the 11 players suited for the game shared in the scoring honors.

Although it is hard to find fault in a one-sided game against an out-manned opponent, Cass City could be concerned about its fouls. A trademark of a Nurnberger

coached team over the years was the absence of fouls and the ability to convert from the charity stripe. Instead of fewer fouls than the opponents, Cass City has fouled more. The Tigers had 36 chances at the line compared to 25 for the Hawks. In addition, Caro converted 61 percent and the Hawks 60 percent. Neither of these percentages is outstanding.

The Hawks had 4 players in double figures led by Dave Miller with 17 points. Mike Kelley scored 14. Sontag also had 14 and Peters chipped in 12.

The varsity is not the only team to be undefeated in the first 4 games of the season. The junior varsity kept pace during the week with a 47-32 win over the Lakers and an 11-point, 55-44, decision over Caro.

Hawks play finest game to roll over Lakers, 72-52

Will the real Cass City Red Hawks please stand up? Is it the bumbling, turnover prone team that opened the season against Harbor Beach and Uby or the smooth functioning team that decimated the Elkton-Pigeon-Bay Port Lakers on the Lakers' home floor Friday, 72-52?

Coach Ron Nurnberger hopes that Friday's performance was an indication of the way the team will function in the chase for the Thumb B Association title and post-season tournament honors. We played about as well as we are capable of playing, Nurnberger said.

Conversely, the Lakers showed the results of the long football season, limited practice time and lack of game competition. There's little doubt that the defending league champions will play much better as the season progresses.

It's doubtful that any league team could have handled the Hawks Friday. They started the game obviously charged up and took charge from the opening whistle. Kurt Bliss started the scoring when he beat the Laker defense on a fast break. Dave Miller added a bucket and Mike Kelley scored when he was at under the basket all alone for an easy bucket.

With 3:16 left in the first quarter, Dan Ware hit for a

bucket and was fouled and made the free throw. Cass City led 11-0 and the Lakers never threatened after that.

In the first period the Lakers were stone cold and were limited to 2 field goals despite some very good shots that would have produced points on a normal shooting night. Paul Elenbaum, who is expected to be a force on the team, has had limited practice time because of injury.

Featuring a balanced scoring attack, the Hawks widened the margin in the second period, storming to a 26-7 lead in the first 2 1/2 minutes of the second quarter before the Lakers staged a brief rally to score 6 unanswered points to close the gap to 13 points. That was as close as they were to come all night.

Cass City took control again with 3 unanswered buckets by Steve Ross,

Miller and Kelley. The third quarter was a Bliss and Miller show. The duo accounted for the first 15 points of the quarter between them, and Cass City coasted to a 50-24 lead in the first 4 minutes. After that it was mop-up time and both coaches substituted freely.

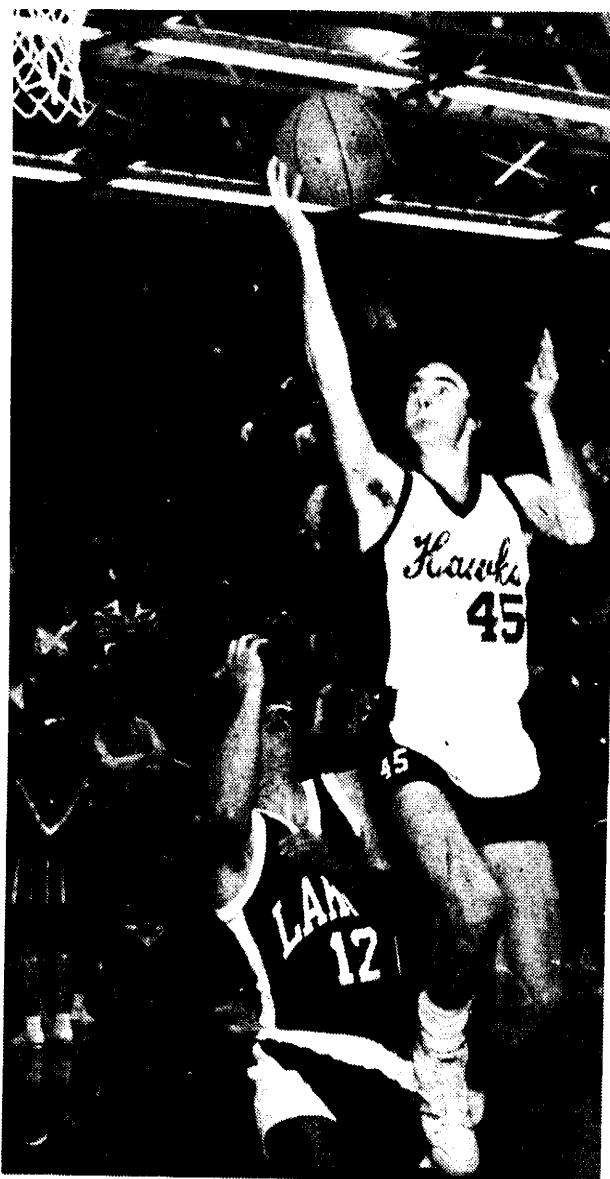
Nurnberger pointed to the defensive game played by Ware as very important. He said it was the second straight game where he had excelled for the Hawks. Kelley snapped up 15 rebounds to go with 17 points and Bliss led all scorers with 21 points, 17 in the last half, and picked up 6 assists. Miller had 4 assists and 15 points despite being a marked man all night, and played his usual strong defensive game.

Nurnberger said that his charges finally put together a good running game with a controlled offense when it

was impossible to run. "The key for the season will be for them (players) to learn when and who they can run and when they can't," he said.

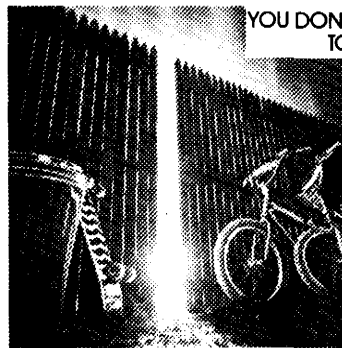
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Reynolds family holds reunion

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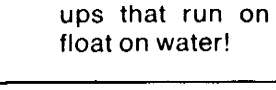

Courthouse in Bad Axe
The crumbling bricks

SESSUI...WHAT?
 by Ruby Maschke

Chapter three in "The Case of the Crumbling Bricks." To recap - in the fall of 1874, 450,000 bricks were ordered from R.W. for the building of a courthouse at Bad Axe. Port Austin had been the county seat until October 1873, and the editor of the county's only newspaper wrote somewhat biased reports of the progress of the new county seat, and especially of the new courthouse, indirectly lamenting Port Austin's loss of being the county seat.

The bricks were delivered in the fall, and in April, 1875, the editor reported that the bricks were "exceedingly brittle...that even with the most careful handling very many of them would break." Here's how the story continued.

April 15, 1875. "The winter passed, and as it did, so snow and storm descended upon the bricks. There have also been a few showers of rain. The result, considering they (the bricks) are of a high priced, superior article, are crumbling into fragments. They are so soft they can be readily smashed by the pressure of the hands, and are pronounced by practical men as being unfit for a public building or any other building. Many of the bricks, as they crumble, exhibit a mixture in which black muck, leaves, etc., make up a part. In short, Huron County has got a worthless pile of dirt on its hands, which represents over \$4000 of the hard earned taxes its people have, or will be called upon, to pay.

Last evening, 25 workmen arrived at BadAxe from Saginaw, ready to begin work on the courthouse. It should be seen to at once by the building committee and by the supervisors also, that no worthless material is allowed to go into that building. The other materials which the builders were required to furnish, is on the ground and is said to be good. They are all ready to go ahead with the work, and may be damaged by delay. But it's better for Huron County to pay damages if need be, than to have a building erected which is liable to fall to the ground at any time. A practical brickmaker informs me that the clay used is not at fault."

April 29, 1875. "In regard to the Bad Axe courthouse brick. What we stated in regard to the letting of the contract to Mr. W., we had from the chairman himself, and therefore cannot be called fault and malicious slander. The other state-

ments in regard to the worthlessness of the bricks for constructing such a building, were made entirely upon the authority of others, men in whose opinion upon such a matter we had confidence.

Being contradicted, we thought it proper to go to Bad Axe and there see for ourself. This we accordingly did, and walked over and around the pile, delved into the same, and tested the brick in various ways. Our former statements need to be somewhat qualified. There are fully as many broken as we said, two thirds of the entire batch. Where we said they are so soft they can be readily smashed by a pressure of the hands, should be limited to the two bottom tiers which absorbed dampness and froze, and a few others scattered through the pile, which the committee claims are scovins that should not have been hauled and are not paid for. But all of them, even the very best that can be picked out, are too soft and brittle to be

called a good brick, and can with the hands be broken and picked to pieces. If allowed to fall, breakage is the inevitable result, and the tenders upon the masons (who are now laying the brick in the partition walls of the basement) handle them as carefully as though they were eggs.

To us they appear to be the sorriest lot of bricks we have ever seen. Like counterfeit coin, they entirely lack the genuine ring that a good brick should possess. We talked to many in regard to them, and found none to really speak in their defense. The general opinion seemed to be that they were unfit for such a building, and that they would be dear at any price, and that Mr. W. had succeeded in wrongdoing the county.

Mr. Doney, one of the contractors, spoke to us mildly in their favor. He said those brick, soft and much broken, yet when once laid in their bed of mortar in the wall, away from the weather, would answer just as well as a harder brick, and that it is in that way they intend using them. And yet, as he also informed us, Mr. Doney does not regard Mr. W. as a success as a brickmaker, and refused to give him a recommendation to a Masonic building committee at Lexington.

We are told that the committee, on settling with R.W., were so dissatisfied

with the quality of the brick; that they deducted \$2 per thousand from the contract price, paying him \$7 instead of \$9. We are also told that the contractors are to have \$1 per thousand extra for laying these brick because of their broken condition.

R.W. has furnished 371,000 brick of the kind described, made near Bad Axe, and 25,000 hauled from Sanilac. These latter are hard, and will make a strong wall, but they are very rough and some of them badly warped...The committee have now purchased 50,000 cream colored brick in the Saginaw country, which are to be brought to the place and hauled to Bad Axe or wagons. These bricks will be sufficient for the facing of the front and sides, while the Sanilac brick are to be used for the back part. Doney says this will leave some 30,000 of R.W.'s bricks that can be carefully piled up and housed until needed in the construction of a jail."

Thus ended the case of the crumbling bricks. But the editor still kept a sharp eye on the courthouse-building proceedings.
