

Top 10 stories

1986 was a good (bad) year

1986 was a year like all of the years that came before. Only the names and the faces changed. As always the community lost respected leaders. As always there were changes in the business communities. As always, there were the inevitable surprises, some that were saddening, some that were unexpectedly joyful.

It was a year marked by more than the usual amounts of concern about the local economy that was reflected in several intense labor negotiations.

It was a year that selecting the top 10 stories of 1986 could be challenged by observers of the local scene who could easily cite important stories that are not reviewed here.

1. The top story of the year is one where the final chapter has yet to be written. A story that may not be over next year when the new year rolls around. It is, of course, the plight of the farmers. Farmers and

farm observers were unanimous in predicting that it was going to be a tough year on the farm. And that was before the 60 days of rain that made the Thumb and mid-Michigan a disaster area. Accompanying the devastating weather were plummeting land values and low crop prices. Many farmers went bankrupt and the crisis is expected to become worse in the spring of 1987 when money for crops and fertilizer is needed again.

2. The plight of the farmers made good economic news even more important than usual. That's why Walbro's expansion was an important story. The company announced joint ventures with Champion Spark Plug Co, Orbital Engine Co. of Australia and Mitsuba of Japan. The dividend was increased and future building expansion projected. It was a saving factor in a gloomy economic picture.

3. There was a wide difference of opinion over the long-term impact of the next story selected. Short-term it caused about as much of a stir throughout the Thumb as any single event. It was, of course, the establishment of the lesbian camp, "Camp What-yawanabe." In Huron County a church-led group led a protest and vowed never to let the camp on Sebewaing Road, about 2 miles west of M-53, survive. A survey showed that most, not all, area pastors wanted the camp to be closed, but their feelings against the camp were more restrained, possibly because of the camp's location.

4. A case could be made for the next story to be the tops in importance of any published. It's the story of the negotiations between the Tri-County Bargaining Association and the Cass City School District. It's important because down the road it is estimated that

more than \$428,000 will be needed in new money to pay for the settlement reached. It's important because school was out for 11 days for a strike and the strike touched nearly everyone in the community.

5. There were break-ins at Nothing Ordinary and Schneeberger's TV and Appliance. Two among a rash across the Thumb. An important story because it was a symptom of a change in the free and easy and safe atmosphere of this rural area.

6. The \$1.8 million settlement earned by Randy and Shirley Hampshire gave new hopes to scores of farmers with similar complaints against DeLaval Company for faulty milkers. The Hampshires waited 4 years for the settlement and said it came just in time to avert bankruptcy. The lawyer for the Hampshires cautioned that each case is different and his success with the DeFord farmers didn't neces-

sarily mean that others would be able to secure judgements.

7. Cass City slipped back into the national news again. Lt. Col. Brewster Shaw was appointed to a committee to probe the Challenger space disaster. The astronaut is a Cass City native and was a speaker to the community and the school after his first space flight.

8. Many dairy farmers bailed out of business when the government announced its dairy herd buy out program. In the area 80 submitted bids under the program. However, most farm observers felt that, other than helping the farmer who wanted to quit the dairy business, the program would do little to ease the milk surplus.

9. In long-term impact, this story probably

should have ranked near the top of the important stories. It didn't because it has been a continuing saga for 11 years and still continues. It's the fight for land between Owendale-Gagetown district and Cass City District. Under the guidance of former superintendent Ron Erickson, a court case was reactivated after 11 years seeking to have the "Goslin" tract of land returned to the district. A compromise offer to exchange the "Belk" parcel for an end of the dispute between the 2 districts was refused. Later the decision to leave the Belk parcel in the Cass City District was announced. The court case is still to be decided.

10. The annual July 4 Festival was a top news maker. Early in the year the story centered around the possibility of the demise of the event. When it occurred, as always it attracted the usual throngs and was good enough so that it will survive though 1987 at the very least.

Special group to aid investigation

A special working group involving officials from the Judicial Tenure Commission and the Attorney Grievance Commission to confidentially receive information regarding the Court of Appeals has been created by Supreme Court Chief Justice G. Mennen Williams.

The group is the product of a directive three weeks ago by the court to review the bribery solicited by Court of Appeals Judge S. Jerome Bronson and procedures to protect judicial integrity.

Williams said the group provides a specific forum for the public to report information regarding actions by judges or attorneys, and provides better coordination of the investigation than if the judicial and attorney groups handled independent investigations.

Grievance Commission Chairman Michael Schwarz is scheduled to meet Friday with attorney James Canham, who was the middleman in the bribe.

"With this working group in place, it is envisioned that a thorough investigation of the Bronson matter can be made. By assigning staff directly to the Judicial Tenure Commission and Attorney Grievance Commission, the confidentiality requirements of these two

bodies at the investigation stage can be maintained," Williams said.

The group will be assisted by attorneys from the attorney general's office, an investigator from the State Police, and an auditor from the Department of Treasury.

Marilyn Hall, speaking for Williams, said auditors are sometimes brought into investigations in legal matters, and said there is some interest in looking at Bronson's financial records.

She said the investigation is focussed on Mr. Bronson and the particular case involved in the bribe (a \$3.25 million damage judgment against Ford Motor Company) but the working group will take it whenever it goes.

She said there is no time limit for the group to complete its investigation.

Williams said, "We are hoping that the Bronson incident was an isolated event, but, if it was not, then we want to know and take appropriate action."

State Bar President Julia Darlow offered strong endorsement for the working group concept.

"Citizens are entitled to assurance that the case will be fully investigated. Every possible effort must be made to determine whether this was or was not an isolated incident. That is

Thumb Ag day slated Jan. 16

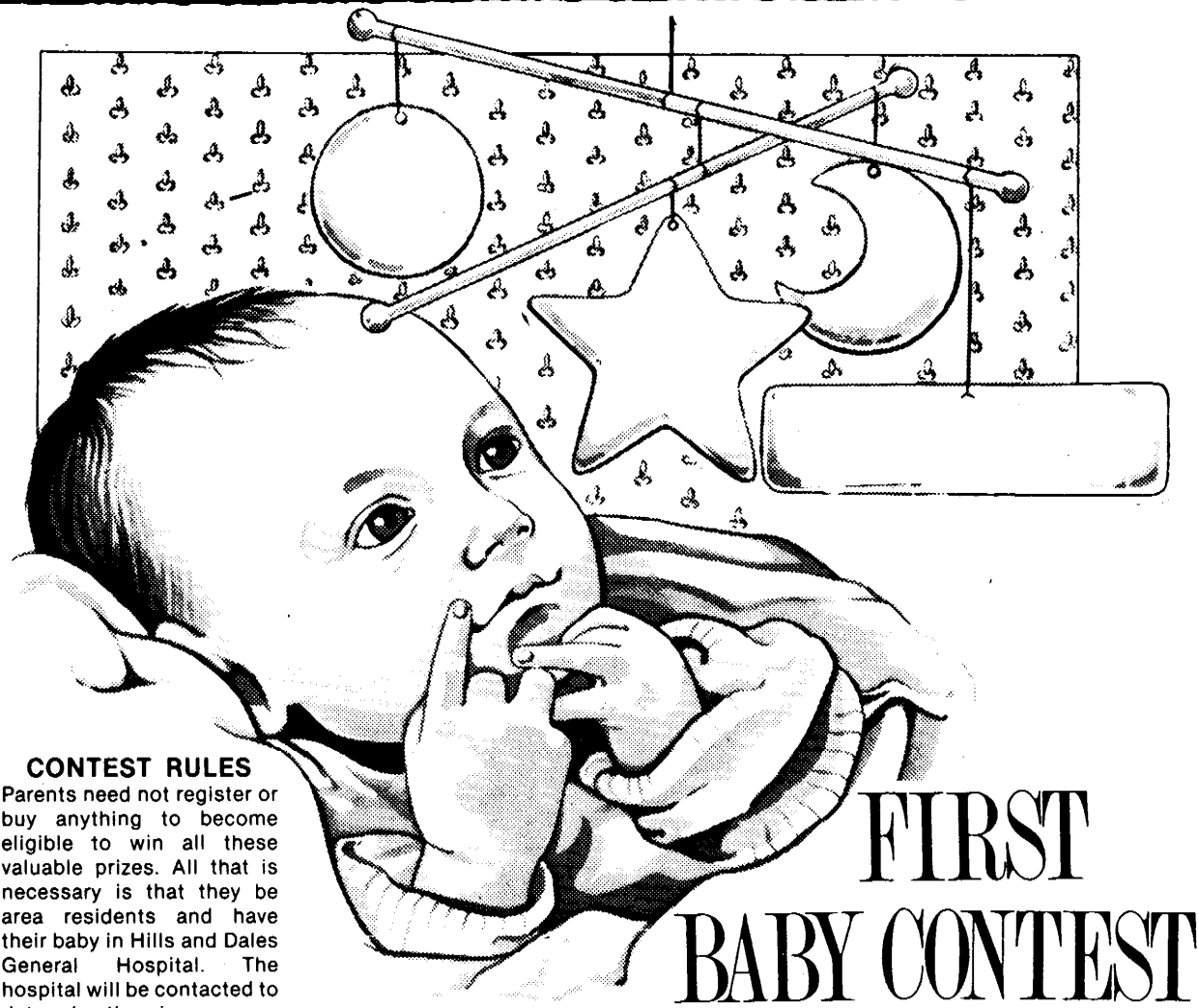

Project still to continue

Hopes dim for funds to assure UPS building

A plan by United Parcel Service in Cass City to relocate in the village's industrial park has run into some "slight hang-ups," according to the village council.

But councilmen at a regular meeting Monday night indicated the project will be "within the village's means" whether or not state funding is available.

"We're running into a little bit of a problem, (but) it's not really a problem," council president Larry Davis remarked.

"At this point, it doesn't look like we're going to get the necessary support for the grant."

According to tentative plans announced by the council late last month, UPS is expected to purchase 3 acres of the village's 75-acre industrial property.

The company wants a commitment from the village to pave and improve Division Street, which borders the land in question.

Village officials have planned on proceeding with the estimated \$72,000 project with the help of a Michigan Community Development Block Grant. The grant would cover 70 percent of the total project cost, while the village would be responsible for the remaining cost, about \$21,600.

A mandatory expansion of UPS is required in order to receive support for the grant, but it appears that that requirement won't be met, Davis indicated Monday night.

UPS reportedly has increased its staff during the past year, but it would have to expand by a minimum of 6 more jobs over the next 2 years in order for the village to receive grant support.

UPS has offered to hire 3 full-time employees and 1 part-time worker over the next 2 years.

Another snag, according to a letter from Tuscola County Economic Development Corporation Director Jim McLoskey, is that UPS is not willing to comply with the Davis-Bacon Act prior to construction.

McLoskey has worked closely with Village Manager Lou LaPonsie on the land purchase talks along with Doug Reed of UPS.

LaPonsie said that the act, required under the grant proposal, would mean that UPS would have to adhere to state standards relating to construction, wages and other similar concerns.

Also to be considered, Davis commented, is the extent of improvements to the 650-foot stretch of Division Street. The village could decide to finance only construction of a hard surface, compared to paving, and curb and gutter work.

For now, however, "There is really nothing we can do," Davis added.

LaPonsie, the village currently is awaiting a counteroffer in answer to a village counteroffer.

LaPonsie pointed out that the total project cost, if funded by the village alone, would be significantly reduced without the Davis-Bacon requirements. The village would not have to follow the act's guidelines if the state grant isn't awarded, he said.

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For now, however, "There is really nothing we can do," Davis added.

Property tax funds show small increase

The Department of Treasury has reported that the increase in property taxes from 1982 to 1985 was the smallest percentage increase since 1945 although property taxes continue to be the largest source of government revenue, providing \$5.59 billion to local governments.

Reports released indicate that property taxes made up 38.1 percent of total state and local taxes during fiscal year 1984, providing more revenue than state income and sales taxes combined.

A report entitled "Property Taxes in Michigan: Rates, Revenues and Relief," also noted that in 1985, ad valorem property taxes increased by 4.1 percent, or \$219 million, over 1984, the fourth smallest percentage increase in property tax revenue since 1962.

The department report further noted that local governments' reliance on property taxes declined from 1975 through 1980, in-

creased in 1981 through 1983 and declined again in 1984.

The report declared the 1981-83 increases occurred because of a simultaneous decrease in federal intergovernmental aid and state school aid and the relatively large increase in property tax revenue in 1981 and 1982.

The 1984 decline in school districts' reliance on property tax was due to an increase in state aid and stable property taxes, the report stated.

The property tax report indicated the 1985 average total property tax rate was 54.77 mills, compared to the 1984 rate of 53.66 mills.

The latest rate exceeds the previous peak of 53.89 mills in 1977. Property values, meanwhile, reached \$106.2 billion, an increase of 3.4 percent over 1985. The 1986 state equalized value of residential property increased by only 2.7 percent.

The report also showed senior citizens benefited most from property tax rebates in 1984. Nearly 37 percent of all property tax credits, \$233 million, was paid out to seniors.

In total, 1.4 million Michigan homeowners, farmers and renters received property tax credits totaling \$633 million.

The Treasury Department also released another report entitled "Income, Income Tax and Property Tax Credit Data by School District," presenting data from 1984 income tax returns showing income by district, average tax paid before and after credits, ratio of property tax credit claims to income tax returns and average property tax credits.

The report showed an average 1984 income of \$23,384, with a before and after credit average tax of \$1,229 and \$1,019, respectively. The average property tax credit for the year was \$453.

Financial instructors from Michigan State University will be on hand to help guide you through the steps of financial planning. Before you leave, you will have completed a quarterly cash flow plan for your farm in 1987. You can see the impact of your cash plan on your projected balance sheet. To help do this job easily and accurately, the team will be bringing a microcomputer system. In the first part of the workshop, we'll help you quickly learn the few things you need to know about running the computer. You will print off as many copies of the intermediate and final reports as you want. If you've never run a computer, this is a good chance to get a gentle introduction to what they can do while you plan for the realities of 1987. The workshop location will hold 10 microcomputers. Drug fight in county to get boost

The Eliminate Narcotics Activities in the County of Tuscola program is expected to get the first of several monthly financial "boosts" in early January, thanks to donations, and work by several Lions Club organizations.

Program officials say they're hoping the expected funds will help cover expenses relating to investigations of delivery and use of illicit drugs.

"There's a real drug problem," County Assistant Prosecutor Victor Fitz said in a recent interview. "A lot of the problem is that (drugs are) out there, but there has been little money in the budget for investigations."

Fitz, who also serves as chairman of the local drug program's Board of Directors, noted that Lions Clubs from Cass City, Richville, Vassar, Caro and Mayville have begun distributing donation canisters throughout their respective communities.

The organizations will be collecting the money each month and turning the funds over to the new program.

"It's specifically earmarked for undercover drug enforcement activity," Fitz said of the donated money, which will be transferred by the organization's board to the county Sheriff's Department.

The 4-member board is composed of Fitz, Sheriff's Department detective Larry Walker, Vassar police officer Fred LaPratt and Caro resident Brett McLaughlin.

According to Fitz, the program came into being after a cooperative brainstorming effort a year ago by LaPratt and former county prosecutor G. Scott Stermer, who modeled their idea after a similar program in another Michigan county.

Primary emphasis is being placed on investigations leading to the

arrest and prosecution of drug suppliers. Fitz acknowledged that convictions aren't easily obtained, at least not those involving "high-level" drug dealers.

"The drug dealer today is a lot more sophisticated than 10, 15 years ago," he remarked. Fitz explained that lengthy investigations, often lasting several months, and a substantial amount of "buy" money are needed to catch and convict the higher-level pushers.

A variety of age groups are involved with drugs, particularly marijuana, in Tuscola County, Fitz explained, adding, "We've seen it in the younger groups as well as in more established members of the community."

"I would say that the (problem) hasn't diminished. I can't go into a lot of specifics, but if you look every year there are (drug) charges against persons in substantial

numbers." County-wide, the number of drug-related arrests have remained the same or increased from 1983 through 1985. Statistics for this year haven't been compiled yet.

In 1983, there were 29 misdemeanor and 18 felony arrests in Tuscola County. The misdemeanors included 24 marijuana possession charges, 3 distribution of marijuana charges and 2 LSD possession charges. The felonies were 12 charges of delivering marijuana and 5 charges of delivering LSD.

The number of arrests remained at 47 in 1984, but there were 5 fewer felonies. There were 31 charges of marijuana possession and 3 charges of delivery with money changing hands. The felonies were 7 charges of delivering marijuana, 2 for delivering LSD, 2 for possession of cocaine and 2 for possession of phenobarbital.

Arrest numbers, particularly felonies, jumped nearly 64 percent in 1985. Aside from 22 misdemeanors—all marijuana possession charges—law enforcement officials recorded 35 marijuana delivery charges, 8 charges on delivery of LSD, 7 charges on possession of marijuana with intent to deliver and 2 charges of possession of contraband in a prison.

Fitz cautioned that the figures represent only the number of charges made, not the number of actual drug-related crimes in the county. "I think what we're seeing is just the tip of the iceberg," he predicted.

"Over the past year, I have seen several cases where we've had situations of kids using cocaine," Fitz

continued, adding he recalls a case involving 2 girls, aged 14 years and 15 years, using the increasingly popular drug. "It was a pretty sad sight seeing kids totally messed up with cocaine when they're supposed to be in the prime of their lives."

Hopefully, the county's newest weapon against drug use and trafficking will help reduce such tragedies, Fitz said.

Aside from current fund-raising efforts, additional money may be obtained through drug busts, thanks

to recent approval of new forfeiture laws in Michigan. The law provides that vehicles, for example, which are used to help conduct a drug deal, can be sold at an auction with a portion of the proceeds going for local drug enforcement efforts.

Regardless of where the money comes from, Fitz indicated that a successful campaign against illicit drugs is impossible without adequate financial resources. Local efforts to date have often lacked enough money, he added.

"There have been times when, for a couple of months, he's (Detective Walker) had only \$100 to \$200 of buy money. He's had to use his own money to support undercover investigations."

Members of the board overseeing the new program are available to organizations interested in participating in or learning more about enforcement of drug laws in the county, Fitz said. Additional information can be obtained by contacting Fitz at 673-5999.

Bricks cost \$6.75 per 1,000

Sesqui...What?
by Ruby Maschke

Last week we followed the account written by the editor of the Huron News. He wrote about the progress of the building of the courthouse, and although he was partially wrong about the brick that was used, he continued his criticism, only to be proved wrong again. Read on.

May 20, 1875. "The 75,000 bricks purchased at Saginaw for the courthouse building at Bad Axe arrived at Port Austin Saturday evening in a tow barge. They cost \$6.75 per thousand on the Titabawassee River above east Saginaw, and the freight will probably reach \$3 per thousand. With dock charging and hauling, these brick will cost at least \$18 per thousand delivered at Bad Axe. They are cream colored and hard enough for any wall, but are quite rough and hardly of such a finish as brick for so good a building ought to be."

May 27, 1875. "A scow, carrying the much needed dressed stone for the courthouse, arrived at Port Austin Saturday, and teams made an early start with the same for Bad Axe Monday morning. The hauling of the stone was completed yesterday, and the bricks are now going forward. The scow was two days and two weeks on the trip up from Ohio, being detained, her captain said, by bad weather."

The Detroit Free Press said, "Huron County is pay-

ing 15 or 20 men from Saginaw \$42 per day to play baseball, making matters lively at the county seat. The difficulty is that a boatload of stone for the new courthouse...has been expected for the past two weeks. Not having arrived, the workmen on the building are all idle, and the delay not being the fault of the workmen or contractors, the county will have to foot the bill.

"As we are informed, the case stands thus: Worthington and Sons of Ohio agreed, with the building committee, to have the stone at Detroit on time for the Benton to bring up either on her first or second trip this spring. Had they done so, there would have been no loss of time and no idle men to pay, and we presume this bargain is in such a shape that the county will be made good for the extra expense incurred."

June 3, 1875. (Note that the editor was again too hasty.) His account continues. "At the request of the chairman of the building committee, we would state that the cut stone for the courthouse was purchased at 25¢ per foot, delivered at Port Austin, and not of that figure at the place of manufacture, (as I reported the committee statement might seem to imply). He also advises us that there is no agreement with the party to have them delivered at any particular time by the Benton. Neither were the committee bound to deliver them or any other material—only at a reasonable time for the comple-

tion of the building by the first of January, which has so far been done, and they do not consider that they are under obligation to pay contractors for any time that may have been wasted by them, or those under their employ."

A week later, June 10, the editor noted: "Work on the new courthouse is progressing very rapidly, since the Saginaw brick put in an appearance. The walls of the first story are completed all around and the building begins to look well."

But the building did not "look well" to a farmer who wrote a letter to the editor. On June 17 the Huron News published the following letter.

"Dear Sir: I was at Bad Axe, the new county seat, Monday. While there I was much pleased with the looks of the county building, so far as it has been built, which with its facing of nice white brick is going to be a credit and an ornament to the whole county. It is a pity that the red brick in the body of the walls, however, are giving away some, causing the walls to split and spread. One door jamb in the southeast section of the building is much cracked and many of the pieces loose, and where the padlocks were, the bricks on which they have rested are loosened and crumbled. If the red brick were mine, I would not use them for so costly a building, but as the county authorities say they are to be used for the inside, I suppose it is alright."

An update was presented by LaPonsie on planned conversion of downtown lighting from mercury vapor to high pressure sodium lighting.

LaPonsie stated that the project, initially expected to be completed this month, has been held up because of delays relating to material orders. A Detroit Edison official informed the village in a letter that all materials, with the exception of the main wire, have been delivered.

The council also received an update on revision of a village cable ordinance.

Davis said that First Michigan Cable, which currently holds the right to provide cable in the village, is considering selling those rights to Welbec Cable of Washington, D.C.

Davis indicated that Welbec Cable wants to renew the current 15-year agreement, which expires May 31, "as is" for the next 10 years. But the council

wants to first revise and update the village ordinance before approving any such agreements, he added. Davis announced that a

\$100 gift has been given to the village for purchase of a grill for the park. The donation is from Mr. and Mrs. Ken Martin, he said.

Actually, it would be great if rates did go down to 3% and 4%. Those 8% Detroit airport and Texas Housing bonds I got for you last August at par -- know what they'd be worth if rates went to 4%.

154 -- that's what. And if rates went to 3%, an 8% 20-year bond would be worth 174.

Don't take my word for it. Look at the prices of government bonds. The 15.75% bonds which came out at 100 in the early 80's are now 169.

So quit fretting so much. You'll get a headache. Worry about more important things such as how to make last year's Christmas tree lights work. Later on in the year, switch your concerns to crab-grass.

Meanwhile, keep sweet, li'l darlin'.
