

Lightning burns out appliances

Lightning struck a barn owned by Don Cummins, McAlpine Road, Gagetown, exploding a hole in the side of the barn and wrecking he wiring in the home about 50 feet away.

Cummins reported that he was away Tuesday, Sept. 8, and when he re-turned he found the hole in the barn and wires burned out. How it escaped burning, he said, I'll never know. Just lucky, I guess.

In the home, most of the appliances were burned ut, including the televisions, refrigerator, radios and hot water heater. Also out of commission is the garage door opener.

Strangely enough, the freezer, water pump, stove and dryer escaped damage. Cummins said that he has no idea of the cost of the damage pending the securing of estimates this week or his insurance company.

When the take-over by USI was announced Wednesday for \$27.25 net per share, the market for Walbro stock jumped \$5.00 per share to \$30. Friday USI announced that it would be willing to pay more for the stock, but did not say how much. On Friday the Walbro stock increased again, closing at \$32.50.

Monday the market for the stock hovered around the Friday closing price.

When it announced that it was trying to take over, USI had already purchased lightly more than 8 percent of the Walbro stock. USI is a privately owned company whose chairman of the board, founder and chief executive officer is Harry Lebensfeld, who is in his mid 80's.

"They've all through their lives avoided this. They've learned all the tricks" involved with faking it, he commented.

EMBARRASSING

Erlind Nordstrom, assistant director of Community Education in Caro, agrees. "People get very good at hiding their lack of ability to read, and it's very embarrassing for them," he said.

Nordstrom has administered reading, math and other basic skills tests to a portion of Department of Social Services clients over the past 9 months as part of a new program designed to help aid recipients become more employable by determining what basic skills they need to have.

'I've found in the testing (of about 180 persons) that 1/4 to 1/3 are in need of some sort of remedial instruction

proach is important in terms of learning reading skills.

"That's where we appreciate having literacy volunteer tutors," he remarked. "There's no question that there's a need for these programs.'

Both Nordstrom and Lovejoy agreed that adults, once having tackled their reading problems, can go on to earn their high school diploma and even enter college or a training program. Still, persons in need of help must first be reached.

WORD OF MOUTH

"It has to be by word of mouth," Lovejoy said. "How do you get to these mouth." people? They can't read the article you're writing.'

Lovejoy noted that national campaigns, such as the literacy campaign currently underway that includes television spots, sometimes miss area residents who may need help but don't know where to go locally. "I wanted this to be available; I wanted us to be there," he said.

County Board okays building permit fee hikes during meet

Persons who plan to build homes with crawl spaces control vehicle, the purchin Tuscola County will have to dig a little deeper in their pockets to pay for some building permit fees following action by the County Board of Commissioners last week.

Commissioners, on a recommendation from Department of Public Works Director Paul Lefler, approved a new permit fee schedule with average increases of 15 to 20 percent.

Most of the fees that were increased are related to plumbing and electrical work, according to Lefler, who stated that some permits related to mechanical work, particularly for commercial projects, will cost more

"What we're doing is trying to recover a reasonable amount of the cost," Lefler said after the meeting. He explained that while many basic permits in the county were up to date and were not increased, others, such as those for plumbing, electrical and miscellaneous work, and some inspections were in line for increases.

Under the new fee structure, fees for work such as adding a garage to an existing building, modular and mobile homes, pole buildings and building moving were increased between \$10 and \$20

So says Joel Saper, MD, Arbor, headache Ann writing in specialist, MediScene, the quarterly medical care trends magazine published by the Michigan State Medical Society.

Doctor Saper recommends that headache sufferers first gain an accurate understanding of their condition, along with an awareness of treatment limitations.

Like other forms of pain, headache is a warning signal. In some cases, he says, the headache is a signal of infection, insufficient circulation, swelling, or body chemical imbalance.

Headaches also can be the first warning of carbon monoxide intoxication from a faulty furnace, exposure to various other intoxicants or chemicals, or to some unknown infection or allergy.

Erickson suspended with pay by school board; vows to fight

Editor's note: This story about Ron Erickson, former Owen-Gage principal, is a week late in this issue. We had the story from the Detroit News written for the last issue, but felt that it should be verified by Erickson. We called and his answering service said to leave our name and phone number and he would get back to us. We did, explained what we wanted, and told him to call collect. He hasn't called as this note was written Tuesday at 7:00 a.m.

While at Owendale-Gagetown High School for over a decade where he

served as superintendent, Ronald Erickson was often embroiled in controversy with neighboring school districts, especially Cass City. He generated either strong support or strong disapproval. In Owen-Gage he had the support of the school board during his entire tenure and when he left to take the superintendent's post at Allendale, Michi-

gan. According to an article in the Sunday Detroit News, he was not as successful in generating support in his new post. The News article said:

"Insisting he's a victim of religious bigotry, Allendale School Supt. Ronald Erickson said Friday that School he would appeal his suspension with pay by the school board.

'The bottom line is that we have some pit bull bigots here, and it's not just one church,' Erickson said.
