# 2 youths killed in crashes

A 20-year-old Deford man is dead and another Deford man was listed in "critical" condition at Saginaw St. Mary's Hospital Monday following a 2-car crash early Sunday morning northwest of Kingston.

John D. Androsuk, 366 Froede Rd., died at 5:47 a.m. Monday after being transferred to St. Mary's by helicopter, a hospital spokesman said.

Franklin H. Kish, 28, of Deford, the driver of the other vehicle, meanwhile, is in critical condition at St. Mary's.

A passenger in Androsuk's vehicle, Lance G. Powell of Decker, and a passenger in Kish's vehicle, Dawn M. Mahaney of Deford, were treated and released at Caro Community Hospital.

According to state police troopers at the Caro post, Androsuk's vehicle was northbound on Froede Road when it ran a stop sign at the Bevens Road intersection and was struck by Kish's eastbound vehicle. Androsuk's vehicle continued northbound for some

146 feet and came to rest upside down on the east side of Froede Road, while Kish's vehicle went into a

ditch on the north side of Bevens Road. Both vehicles sustained heavy damage.

Mahaney was the only person among those involved wearing a seat belt, reports indicate.

## Crash claims David Doerr

A head-on collision Friday afternoon in Sanilac County's Argyle Township which left a 17-year-old Snover youth dead remains under investigation by the Sanilac County Sheriff's Department.

David L. Doerr died following the 2-car crash on M-19 about 1/2 mile north of Stone Road, according to a Sanilac Sheriff's deputy, who stated that Doerr's vehicle was southbound in the northbound lane of M-19 when it collided with a pickup truck driven by Bradley Henry, 23, also of Snover.

Doerr was thrown from his vehicle and pinned underneath it. Citizens at the scene assisted Deputy Mike

Redman in lifting the car off Doerr, the deputy said.

Officials are unsure at this time why Doerr was driving on the wrong side of the road, and whether either of the vehicles was speeding.

Henry and a passenger, Brian Smith, 23, of Snover, received minor injuries in the 4:45 p.m. accident.

Bingham Township rescue personnel transported Doerr to Deckerville Community Hospital, where he died at 6:27 p.m.

None of the persons involved were wearing seat belts, reports indicate.

Funeral services were held Monday at St. Joseph's

Church, Argyle, for David L. Doerr.

Born Nov. 5, 1969, in Sandusky, he was the son of Emelie (Jaskowski) Doerr and the late David L. Doerr. He was a senior at Deckerville High School.

Survivors include his mother, Emelie, of Snover; one sister, Tammy, at home; paternal grandmother, Mrs. Leone Doerr of Argyle, and maternal grandparents, Elmer and Beatrice Lamke of Ubyly.

He was preceded in death by his father, David Lee Doerr, Sept. 11, 1986.

Burial was in the church cemetery. The Zinger-Smigielski Funeral Home, Ubyly, handled arrangements.

## "Don't feel sorry for me"

# Plan benefit for Becky Emmons, 16

At first glance, Becky Emmons appears to be a typical 16-year-old.

The petite Owen-Gage High School junior has a bright, contagious smile and bubbly personality. She loves cheerleading, dating and visiting friends.

To look at Becky, no one would suspect that the area teen is engaged in a fight for her life.

Becky learned in August that she has Ewing's Sarcoma, a form of bone cancer. Doctors have told her that with chemotherapy and radiation treatments, she has a 40 percent chance for a complete cure.

Owen-Gage School and Hills and Dales Hospital employees have rallied together to help Becky and her family by sponsoring a fund raiser dinner prior to the school's homecoming game Friday. The fund raiser, a chili and chicken noodle soup dinner, will be held from 4 to 8 p.m. at Owendale High School, with tickets prices set at \$3 for adults and \$2 for students.

Despite the nature of her disease and the unpleasant side effects of various treatments and tests, it's "life as usual" as far as Becky is concerned. And the acceptance of that attitude by her classmates and family, she says, has made life "normal" again.

"I don't want people to feel sorry for me (or) change the way they think about me," Becky remarked Monday after her first day back to school following a 2-week bout with bronchitis. "I just want to be normal."

"Nobody treats me different. I think if the people hadn't accepted it," it would have been harder to deal with, she continued, adding that classmates and school staff members have helped in her adjustment in school.

### EARLY PROBLEMS

Becky's problems actually began a year ago, according to her mother, Diane Howey, who along with husband Joseph, a truck driver, reside with their 4 children at 4803 State

St. in Gagetown. The couple's other children are Gary, 12, Christina, 6, and Amanda, 4.

Diane explained that Becky started to experience severe pain in her lower back a year ago. The pain ceased after surgeons removed her tail bone, but a strange numbness in her right foot and leg began to bother her in June.

Despite numerous tests in a number of hospitals, Becky's condition remained uncertain until early August.

"She went into Midland for tests Aug. 3. They found a mass, but didn't know what it was," Howey said.

She noted that Becky was then sent to Detroit Children's Hospital Aug. 11, where specialists performed a biopsy and discovered an oblong-shaped tumor—a little larger than an orange—on the inside of her spine near the base. "Because of its location, they couldn't remove it," she added.

Becky began chemotherapy immediately and has had treatments in Detroit every Friday since mid-August. She now travels to the hospital every other week for the treatments. "She will be on the chemotherapy for a year, and starting the second week of November she has to go through 8 weeks of radiation therapy," Howey explained.

### ROUGH AT FIRST

"At first, it really, really bothered me," Becky remarked. "It wasn't the cancer so much, it was

losing my hair." She noted that she lost most of her hair over Labor Day weekend, nearly 4 weeks after starting chemotherapy. "It doesn't bother me so much now," she said, adding, "I get up in the morning and it's like, so what if I have to put this wig on to go to school."

"I still go out on weekends; I still do what I normally do." It wasn't quite so easy at first, Becky and her mother agreed.

"The first two weeks were traumatic; we cried a lot," Howey said. "I think that's the only time I thought that she could die."

Becky nodded her head in agreement, adding that her first trip to look at wigs was one of the hardest moments for her.

She grinned. "We even joke around about it (wig) now" at home and in school, she said. "I usually don't wear it around the house."

Besides, she added with a grin, there is a bright side to losing the hair—"I won't have to shave my legs."

Becky's decision to beat cancer and her determination to continue living as she did before are largely due to a wave of support which, she says, has been "pouring in."

### THANKFUL

"There's so many people to thank," Becky said. Howey agreed, adding that the family's church, Gagetown Nazarene Church, as well as the school district have helped. "People we don't know send cards," she said.

Financially, Howey acknowledged that medical

bills for a variety of tests and procedures can quickly pile up, but that insurance is covering a portion of the cost, and she is currently applying for special grant funds.

Despite missing about half of the school days so far this year, Becky, who had to give up cheerleading after 2 years of the sport, says she's particularly thankful for her classmates. Teachers and students alike visited her while in the hospital for bronchitis recently, she noted.

"I've missed a lot of (school) days, but I just bring my homework home and do it. The teachers work around" my schedule, Becky explained.

And future plans? Well, in the short term, she says she's looking forward to taking part in Owen-Gage's homecoming festivities this year. In terms of long-term goals, Becky explained that she's in an office occupation program at the Huron Intermediate Skill Center.

The study, she hopes, will lead to a career involving computer and secretarial skills.

"She's accepted it so much," Howey observed. "I don't even think about the possibility" of death anymore.

Despite working as an LPN for the past 10 years at Hills and Dales General Hospital, Howey admitted that "it's different when it's so close to home."

She added, "We made a deal that if either of us got down, that we would be honest and talk to each other. I think we've become closer."

## \$3,800 losses reported

# Thieves strike in area

Three separate complaints involving some \$3,800 in missing property in the Cass City area remain under investigation by the Tuscola County Sheriff's Department.

According to reports filed with the department, breaking and entering complaints were filed Sept. 18-19 by Cass City residents Kenneth Lalko, Thomas W. Laurie and David A. Whittaker.

Lalko, 7006 Walter Rd., told deputies Sept. 19 that he found several items missing from his home after a 2-week absence. He stated that he is in the process of moving.

Several guns are among the items reported missing by Lalko. Total value of the items has been set at \$1,370. Missing are a 12 gauge "Deerslayer" (\$250), a Remington Model 1100 16 gauge (\$300), a 410 pump Springfield (\$150), a 22 Remington automatic (\$100), a 50-caliber Hawkins muzzle loader (\$175), a pair of binoculars (\$125), a jewelry box and contents (\$250) and a "strong" box (\$20), a report on the incident states.

Laurie, 5408 Cedar Run Rd., meanwhile, reported that someone entered his tool shed between Sept. 15 and Sept. 18 and stole a garden tractor/mower, valued at \$2,000, in addition to 3 heavy-duty hand drills with a combined value of \$390.

The tractor apparently was pushed out of the shed, into a corn field and then into a bean field north to the Cedar Run Road/Hoppe Road intersection before being taken away, the report states.

Whittaker, 3623 Elmwood Rd., told deputies Sept. 19 that someone took a battery from his pickup truck while parked in a tool barn on his property. The battery is valued at \$40.

# Council outlines road work plans

The Cass City Village Council agreed that it would extend an easement on a parcel south of town after buying the land, and reviewed long-term road work plans during a quiet monthly meeting Monday night.

The easement, for a 500-foot section of property in front of a trailer park, would be approved (assuming the village buys the land) if requested by Kelly and Co. Realty, which has a purchase agreement on the property.

In return, Village Manager Lou S. LaPonsie explained, the company has verbally agreed to drop the purchase agreement.

The section is part of a 2,900-foot by 50-foot right-of-way, formerly owned by Grand Trunk Railroad, which the council would like to purchase.

Councilmen last month approved a purchase price of \$3,960 for the 3.3-acre parcel, which stretches from the southeast corner of the Walbro property south to the Cass River. The council cited the land's value in terms of allowing the village ease of access in maintenance and repair of

existing ditches and a sanitary sewer line in the area.

The purchase also would mean acquiring right-of-way for future expansion of utilities, and would allow the village to be contiguous to properties from which the village may seek annexation in the future, the council said.

The village's purchase offer, through Deerfield Real Estate, Inc., of North Branch, has not yet been approved, LaPonsie noted.

Drew was rushed to Hills and Dales Hospital before being transferred to the Detroit hospital.

It's hard for me to judge, since it's the only one I know. However, the inconsistencies of American English, not to mention the slang and corruptions of words, seem plenty formidable.

Take verb forms.....

please. Past and past participle forms of some common verbs are: leak, leaked, leaked; peak, peaked, peaked; speak, spoke, spoken. Does that make sense?

How about sink, sank, sunk; drink, drank, drunk; think, thought, thought? Or greet, greeted, and meet, met? See, saw, seen, doesn't fit any pattern. You can hatch a theory and it's been hatched, but if someone catches you in error, you're caught.

Pluralization is no less mystical. More than one cow = cows, but if the cows have more than one calf, they're calves.

The inconsistencies abound. Spelling deserves a column in itself. Likable or likeable is usable or useable. You can take your choice. But debatable is not!

Pronunciation is still another matter. Why doesn't depot rhyme with teapot, or debris with remiss? Probably it's because

America, in the process of melting nationalities in its unique and wonderful pot, also mingles their native tongues.

We take a little French, a little German, a little Hebrew, stir it up with Latin and Greek, add to our mother English, and come up with American.

Some Englishmen refuse to recognize our speech as theirs. A line from Lerner and Loewe's cleverly written musical, "My Fair Lady," says it well: "There even are places where English completely disappears. Why, in America they haven't used it for years."

Multiplicity of definitions further complicates matters. "Cleave" can mean "to split, separate," or "to adhere, cling, stick to."

Haven't you ever puzzled over a newspaper headline because you can't tell if a word is a noun, verb or adjective?

For the simple word "fall," Webster lists 21 definitions as a noun, 21 as a transitive verb, and 21 as an intransitive verb, in addition to 20 related phrases such as fall back on, fall short, fall in, fall out, etc.

If it's true that other languages are more difficult to master than ours, anyone who speaks one fluently and can understand and make himself understood here is worthy of respect, if not awe.

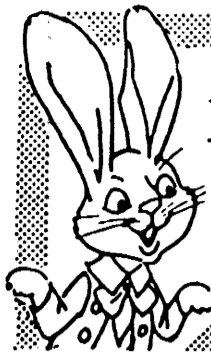

## EDC to conduct survey of industries

An in-depth survey of Tuscola County's industrial firms is being conducted under the sponsorship of the Tuscola County Economic Development Corporation and Michigan Bell.

The information obtained through the surveys will be used to help industrial firms stay and expand in Tuscola County, James McLoskey, EDC executive director stated.

McLoskey explained that a crew of 18 volunteers is in the process of conducting interviews with the presidents or chief executive officers of some 61 industrial firms in the county. "We're hoping that we can complete all the interviews in October," he continued, adding that the data will then be compiled by Michigan Bell. An ad hoc task force will evaluate the information. "We should have a nice, neat package of recommendations by the middle of December," McLoskey added.

Members of the task force are Cass City Village Manager Lou S. LaPonsie, Caro Village Manager Donald Duggar, EDC Board Chairman William J. Kaiser, county Commissioner Michael Green, and William L. Pratt, asst. superintendent of vocational education with the Tuscola Intermediate School District.

McLoskey remarked that the survey should help officials "find out what our strong points are and what our weak points are." That information will be used to make recommendations to the appropriate agency or governmental unit.

"We think (air and ground) transportation is one of the concerns" of area industries, he said, adding that other topics also will be addressed by the task force.

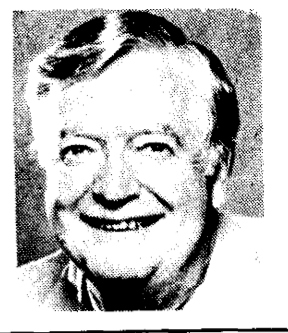
"It had gone out by the time we got there," Root said, adding that the fire apparently was the result of an electrical short in the vehicle's wiring.

Speaking of specific, it would be fair if Donna Rice gave Hart a share of the money she is being paid for wearing tight jeans in TV commercials. She wouldn't be making all that money if Hart hadn't joined her in doing nothing specific.

Hart told Koppel he was relaxing, with his guard down, when Donna Rice just sort of dropped into his lap, and he was embarrassed to see that she wasn't a friend of his wife. That's the sort of stuff George Bush is up against in vying for media attention.

It's not because of the cynicism that 4 decades in the news business breeds that I take with a grain of salt a recent projection of the Central Michigan Planning Commission that there will be 10,000 more people in Tuscola County by the turn of the century.

There was a time when that kind of prediction would be looked at with a less jaundiced eye.

That was before a study, was conducted by Detroit Edison that must have been completed around 25 years ago. The details are hazy, but the conclusion drawn was that we were going to be knee-deep in people here by this time.

Well, we have had some growth, but nothing like what was expected. I suppose it's wrong to judge all predictions by that made by Edison. After all, their judgement about the Midland nuclear plant wasn't anything to write home about as any shareholder can attest.

What could make the population boom is a large plant locating in the county, but we can't see that happening. Whatever growth that comes to the county via the employment route will be by the expansion of existing plants of which Walbro, of course, is a prime example and the odd smaller concern that doesn't need to locate very close to its customer base.

Getting those kinds of plants is no bowl of cherries. Cass City Development Corporation recently conducted a spirited campaign complete with advertising in business sections of major media and failed to receive a single inquiry. There's been no action despite the cooperation of existing industry to welcome new firms with open arms and do anything they

can to entice them to come to this community.

The competition is horrendous not only from other states and other locations within the state, but from other areas right here in the Thumb. All want a piece of the pie and not only is there not enough to go around, it's rare for anyone in the Thumb to get as much as a sliver.

If we are not going to grow all that much from increased employment opportunities, where are the 10,000 people that are to be here in 13 short years going to come from?

Maybe a few that seek out the pleasant country living available in areas such as ours and who have the means to live here if they desire. Remember, though, that there are fewer farmers every year and the new arrivals have to make up that deficit before any growth occurs.

There has been growth in the western edge of the county as people move farther out from urban centers where they work.

Maybe these workers will push farther into the county as the years pass. Certainly there is an allure to the type of life style available here as any of the many workers who commute daily to Detroit, Pontiac, Saginaw, Bay City, Flint and other areas will tell you.

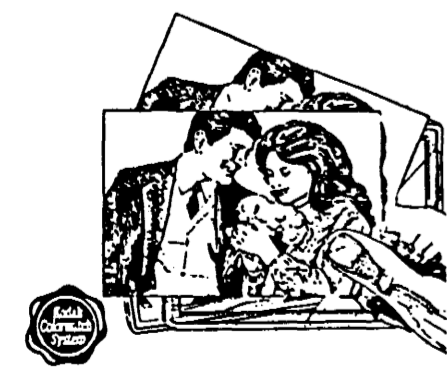
It will be interesting to see if the present planners prove to be more accurate than those of 25 years ago.

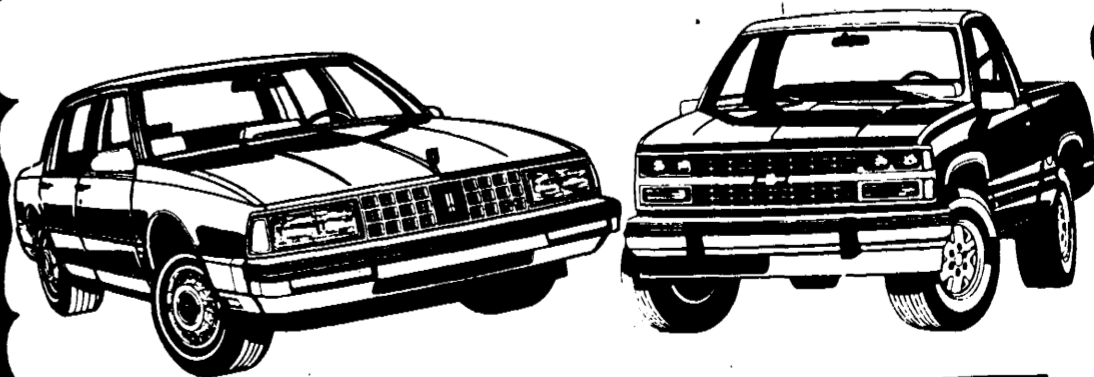

## Gagetown pair pleads innocent to fraud charges

A Gagetown couple charged with 15 counts of mail fraud and conspiracy pleaded innocent in U.S. District Court in Bay City after a federal grand jury indicted them Sept. 16.

The indictments, released Sept. 21, allege that Rance W. Kilbourn, 38, a diesel mechanic, and his wife, Ingrid, 34, a self-employed consultant, conspired between Nov. 22, 1985, and Sept. 14, 1987, to defraud the general public through a mail-order loan scheme.

A preliminary exam for the pair, who were arraigned Sept. 18, is to be scheduled.

U.S. Magistrate Charles E. Binder allowed the Kilbourns to be released on a \$15,000 unsecured bond pending further court action before U.S. District Judge James P. Churchill.

According to U.S. Attorney Roy C. Hayes of Detroit, the couple allegedly defrauded the public by "running advertisements in various periodicals for an organization called 'The New Concept Club'."

The advertisements stated that the loans would be for any purpose, Hayes said, adding that some of the ads stated that no one would be refused.

Those who responded were sent an application form requiring payment of a fee prior to any loan processing, Hayes stated.

The indictment alleges

that after receipt by the Kilbourns of the fee, no loan would be issued, requests for refunds would be denied and money obtained through the mails "ultimately (was) used for the Kilbourns' personal living and other expenses."

The indictments also charge that the Kilbourns rented and used a numbered postal box in Bad Axe to receive the funds from customers.

The indictments charge that fees of between \$10 and \$40—totalling \$380 from 15 mail order customers—were received by the Kilbourns from persons answering ads from Mobile, Ala.; Jackson, Mich.; Philadelphia, Pa.; Martins Ferry, Ohio; Chul Vista, Calif.; Fort Bragg, N.C.; Dorchester, Mass.; Forest Grove, Ore., and Detroit.

Hayes pointed out that an indictment is only a charge and is not evidence of guilt. The defendants are entitled to a fair trial in which it will be the government's burden to prove guilt beyond a reasonable doubt.

Mail fraud is punishable by up to 5 years in prison and a fine of up to \$250,000. Conspiracy is also punishable by up to 5 years in prison and a fine of up to \$250,000.

The indictments culminated an investigation conducted by the U.S. Postal Inspection Service's Detroit office.

## Cass City man injured in collision with tanker

A Cass City man and a passenger in his vehicle were injured Thursday in a broadside collision at an intersection just west of the Bad Axe city limits.

William P. Durr, 40, of Cass City, was scheduled to be released Monday from Huron Memorial Hospital, where he was transported after the accident. His passenger, 70-year-old Ann Durr of Bad Axe, is listed in "good" condition at the hospital.

A Huron County Sheriff's Department spokesman stated that Durr's vehicle

was pulling out onto eastbound M-53 when it was struck by a gasoline tanker truck headed west on M-53.

The tanker driven by Carson O'Dell of Caro, skidded some 189 feet before striking the car, according to a report on the mishap, which indicated that the truck was empty at the time of the 1 p.m. crash. O'Dell was not injured.

The vision of both drivers was obstructed by a semi-truck that was parked along northbound M-53 just east of the intersection, the spokesman said.

Elkland fire chief urges fire safety; to "play it safe...plan your escape"

There have been no fire fatalities in the Cass City area recently. That's a trend Elkland Township Fire Department officials say they want to maintain. Fire Chief Dick Root says

he's hoping residents will take some time during Fire Prevention Week, slated for Oct. 4-10, to ask themselves if they're prepared for a fire emergency. This year's fire preven-

tion theme, "Play it Safe... Plan Your Escape," focuses on home fire escape planning and preparedness and encourages all families to develop and practice an escape plan.

According to Root, area residents seem to be better prepared recently compared to past years in terms of fire prevention. This year's 50 fires to date have included only one chimney fire, compared to 9 in 1986, while there have been 15 house fires.

So far this year, few persons have been injured in fires. Two residents sustained burned hands in separate house fires, while one fireman was overcome by smoke and heat in a March grass fire.

Still, Root says, memories of past fatal fires, including a mobile home blaze nearly 3 years ago in Cass City which left 3 young boys dead, are tragic reminders of the importance of family planning.

have been very, very bad."

"The first thing (persons) should do, rather than try to put the fire out, is call the fire department," Root urged. He stated that an unsuccessful attempt at putting out a fire can mean the difference between minimal damage and a total loss.

He stressed that above all else, persons in a fire situation should focus their attention on escaping the dwelling.

"Anything in that house can be replaced, but a life can't be replaced," Root remarked. He pointed out a fire in Cass City years ago in which an elderly woman escaped a house fire and then re-entered the building. "She came out, but she forgot her purse so she went back in. She never came back out," he explained.

ESCAPE PLAN

Root outlined some steps involved in planning an escape, which is important because people often become confused when they discover a fire, and the home in which they live can become unfamiliar, he said.

There are 2 steps for a good evacuation program at home—planning and practice, Root explained.

The following are some basic steps in preparing such a plan:

—Gather the entire family at a convenient time during Fire Prevention Week to develop a floor plan of the home. Identify all rooms, including doors, exits, windows and hallways.

—Plan and draw an escape plan using arrows to

indicate 2 ways out of each room.

—Plan the place where everyone will meet once they are out of the building. Pick the person who would call the fire department and decide which telephone the person will use. Always leave the building first, then call from a nearby phone.

—Make sure all family members are familiar with the plan, particularly younger, older or disabled family members who may need special assistance.

—Practice the entire plan. Walk through each room and identify each escape route.

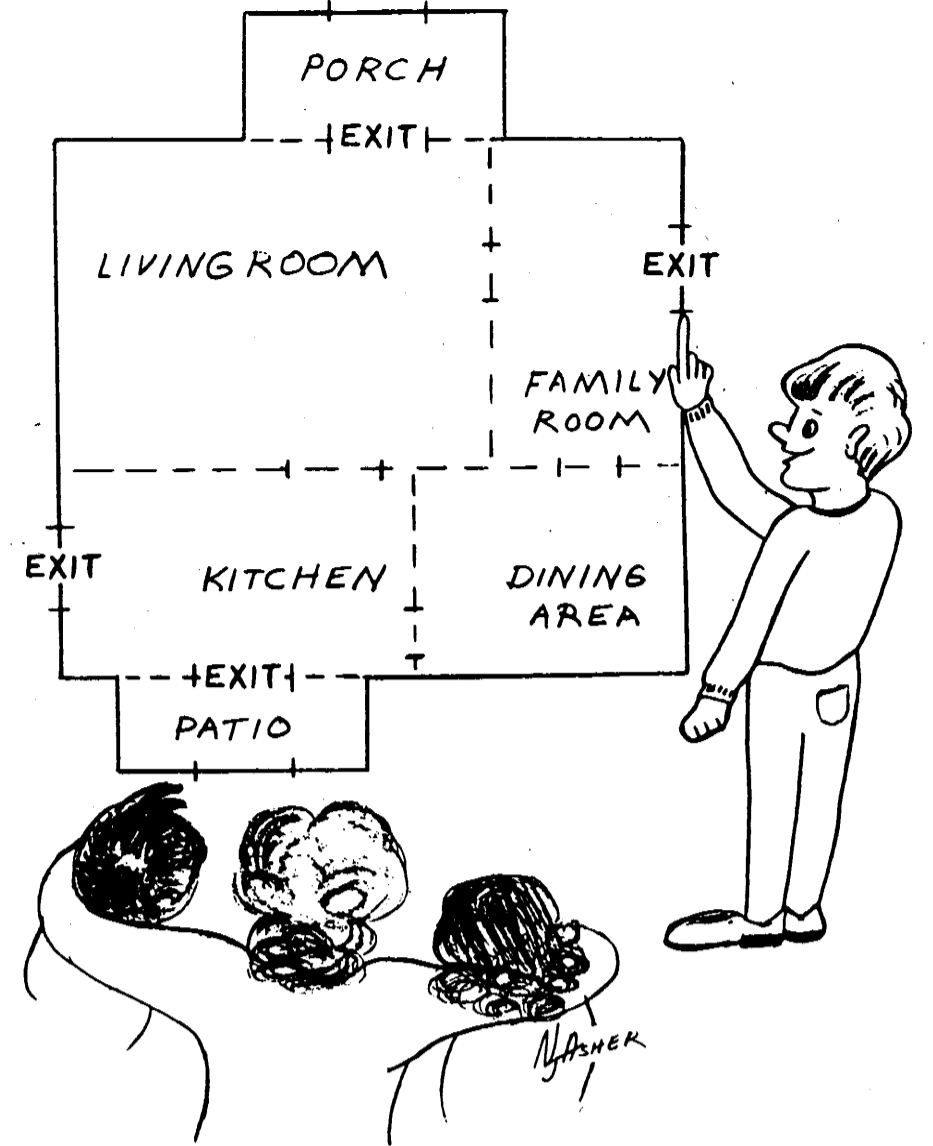
—Point out and test smoke detectors so everyone knows the sound of an alarm.

—Memorize the fire department phone number (Elkland Township, 872-3473), especially children.

—Practice testing a door for fire. Doors act as temporary barriers from smoke and fire and they should be closed at night when sleeping. Feel the door, pretend it's warm—use an alternative escape route. If it's cool, brace a shoulder against the door and open it cautiously; slam it if smoke or heat rush in.

—Crawl low in smoke when escaping, and make sure children can operate windows, descend a ladder or lower themselves to the ground.

—Know what to do if escape is impossible. Stay in the room and close windows and doors, stuff cracks near the door and vents with sheets (wet, if possible), towels, clothing, etc.

"We're finding more and more smoke alarms. Everybody should have one and most homes should have 2," Root pointed out, adding, "Everyone should have a fire extinguisher."

Root noted that a house fire Sept. 2 just behind the fire hall illustrates his point. In that incident, which left a Cass City man hospitalized for severe burns on his hands, a passing village crew reacted quickly with a fire extinguisher. "If the village hadn't come along," he added, "that fire would

Village Council airs road plans, easement request

Continued from page one the 70-minute session, Councilman Elwyn Helwig presented a long-term plan for future road improvements in the village.

Helwig, who noted that planned street projects through 1988 have been completed, presented a number of tentative priority projects.

The first project would involve resurfacing Brooker Street from Main to Garfield, including connecting sections of Pine, Third and Fourth streets; the second would be to resurface and install curbs and gutters along Hill Street from Church to Dale, and resurfacing Dale Street from Huron to Hospital Drive; the third would be to resurface Leach Street from Garfield to Pine, and the fourth would be to resurface Rose Street from Oak to Ale, in addition to installing curbs and gutters on the south side of the

road, and from Ale Street to the elementary school parking lot.

Also in need of resurfacing are Leach Street from Church to Huron, and Ale Street from Third to Houghton, Helwig said, adding that the tentative projects aren't final.

The council indicated it will discuss the matter further next month.

In a related matter, councilmen approved paving Sherman Street from Third Street to Garfield Street this fall, instead of waiting until next year.

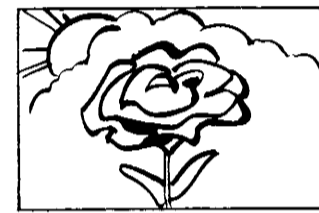
Village officials had planned to delay the paving, following completion of curb and gutter work along the street 1 1/2 months ago, in order to allow the street to "settle."

But LaPonsie and Helwig remarked that there has been no deterioration of the road and that the current price for asphalt (\$19-\$20 per ton) could mean a significant savings if the work is done this year. The paving will cost about \$6,600, LaPonsie said.

Also Monday, the council approved a resolution proclaiming Oct. 4-10 as Fire Prevention Week; established 5:30 to 7 p.m. as this year's Halloween hours; heard a brief informational report from Tuscola County Big Brothers/Big Sister Executive Director Lucy M. Schiller on the program's services and needs, and learned that 92.7 percent of the village's taxes have been collected to date, compared to 93.3 percent at the same time a year ago.

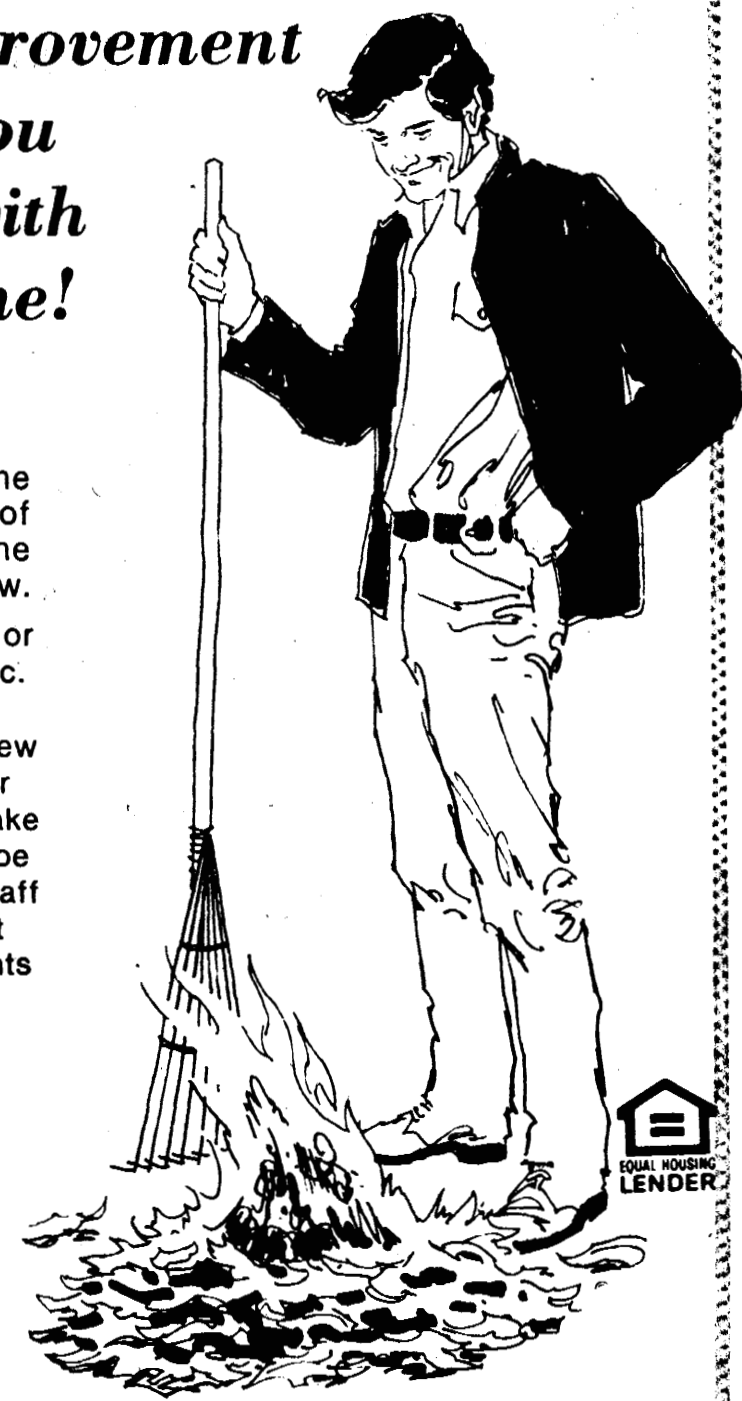

## TIL therapy may help in cancer treatment

White blood cells known as tumor-infiltrating lymphocytes (TIL), obtained directly from lung cancer tissue, appear to be somewhat effective for the treatment of metastatic lung cancer, according to the results of the first clinical trial of this substance.

TIL, when injected into the patient from whom the cells were obtained, caused some shrinkage of the tumor in a high percentage of patients.

Richard L. Kradin, M.D., of the Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston, said that TIL therapy is one of several new types of immunotherapy now being tested in cancer patients. He presented his findings at the recent Annual Meeting of the American Lung Association, the Christmas Seal People, in New Orleans.

"Based on the results of this preliminary trial, TIL therapy is probably most effective for reducing the size of lung metastases in patients with primary kidney cancer and melanoma, a highly invasive skin cancer," Dr. Kradin said. "We do not know yet how effective this treatment will be for primary lung cancer."

Tumor-infiltrating lymphocytes are recently discovered white blood cells that are found in the tumor mass. Those obtained from a particular cancer have the ability to kill only the cells of that cancer. Although only a small number of these cells can be obtained from the patient, the number can be greatly increased by growing the cells in the presence of interleukin 2 (IL-2) outside of the body until a sufficient number are available for treatment purposes.

Dr. Kradin treated 7 patients with metastatic lung cancer with TIL alone. The

TIL cells were obtained by biopsy, grown in the presence of IL-2, and injected into the patient. Five patients responded with some shrinkage of the tumor.

Another 7 patients with primary lung cancer were treated with TIL and IL-2. A partial response, defined as tumor shrinkage to less than one half of its original size, was obtained in only one of the lung cancer patients.

Patients treated with TIL alone experienced no serious toxicity. The only adverse effect appeared to be a mild decrease in pulmonary function. More severe toxicity occurred in those treated with IL-2 in addition to TIL. These patients developed fever and there were changes in their white blood cell counts, as well as decreased pulmonary function.

"TIL therapy will definitely play some role in cancer treatment," Dr. Kradin said. "These cells are exceptionally effective killers of tumor cells in animal models, and appear to be less toxic than other methods of immunotherapy now in clinical trials."

## 2 plead guilty, one stands mute to delivery charges

Two persons pleaded guilty to drug related charges while another, a Cass City woman, stood mute to drug charges in Tuscola County Circuit Court Friday.

Anthony Ruiz, 23, 179 State St., Caro, entered pleas of guilty to 2 counts of delivery of LSD. Sentencing is to be set and bond was continued at \$10,000 for each count.

The convictions stem from incidents involving delivery of the drug Aug. 14 and again Aug. 15, 1986, in Caro, court records state.

If convicted, Ruiz faces a maximum sentence of 7 years imprisonment and/or a \$5,000 fine per count.

Also pleading guilty was Robert E. Severn, 4592 Hanes Rd., Vassar, who

was charged with delivering marijuana Oct. 23, 1986, in Vassar Township.

Sentencing is to be set for Severn, 22. Bond was continued at \$5,000.

Severn faces a maximum sentence of 4 years imprisonment and/or a \$2,000 fine if convicted.

Cass City resident Shelly A. Foote, 6730 Pine St., stood mute to charges of delivering marijuana and cocaine.

A pre-trial for the 22-year-old was scheduled for Oct. 9. Bond was continued at a combined \$25,000.

Foote is charged with delivering marijuana June 20 in Novesta Township, which carries a maximum sentence of 4 years imprisonment and/or a \$2,000 fine, and delivering cocaine

June 9 in Wells Township, which carries a maximum sentence of 20 years imprisonment and/or a \$25,000 fine.

### ASSAULT CHARGE

A 19-year-old Caro man stood mute to charges of assault with a dangerous weapon and fleeing a police officer.

A pre-trial for Richard M. Warford Jr., 2101 Bliss Rd., was slated for Oct. 9. Bond was continued at \$10,000.

The charge stems from a chase with Tuscola County Sheriff's deputies Ronald Suranye and Wayne Newton Sept. 6. The chase, which began in Caro and continued through Indianfields, Wells and Kirgston townships, ended with Warford's vehicle colliding with the deputies' patrol car.

If convicted, Warford faces a maximum sentence of 4 years imprisonment and/or a \$2,000 fine.

Sharon S. Phagan, 6007 Buren St., Kingston, pleaded guilty to embezzlement over \$100. Sentencing is to be set; bond was continued at \$5,000.

The conviction stems from missing funds, which belong to the Kingston Veteran of Foreign Wars Ladies Auxiliary, sometime between March 1985 and April 1987, according to court records.

If convicted, Phagan, 39, faces a maximum sentence of 10 years imprisonment or a \$5,000 fine.

James T. Moore, 18, 1246 Luder Rd., Caro, was sentenced for a plea of guilty to larceny in a building to 270 days in the county jail with credit for time already served.

Moore's conviction stems from a March 29, 1986, incident in which tools belonging to William Stewart were taken from a basement garage at 1299 Luder Rd., Caro.

Also sentenced for a plea of guilty to larceny in a building was Michael S. Patterson, also of Caro.

Patterson, 29, was sentenced to 60 days in the county jail or 120 hours of community service within 120 days, 3 years probation and was ordered to pay costs and fines totalling \$600.

Patterson was involved in the larceny of furniture July 16 from a house at 4554 Colwood Rd., Unionville, court records state.

CFI-131.87  
(Under authority of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended)

### ORDER TO RESTRICT SPEARING SEASON

Under authority of Act 230, Public Acts of 1925, as amended, being sections 300.1 through 300.5 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, the Natural Resources Commission, at its September 11, 1987, meeting, ordered that for a period of five years in the Lower Peninsula it shall be unlawful to take or attempt to take any species of fish with a spear or bow and arrow, from any waters north of Highway M-72 during the month of April, or south of Highway M-72 and north of Highway M-46 from April 1 through April 15, all dates inclusive.

This order supersedes the previous order entitled "Order to Restrict Spearing Season" effective April 1, 1983, and given number CFI-131.82.

This order shall take effect November 1, 1987, and shall remain effective through March 31, 1992.

**AROUND THE FARM**

*Proper soil pH*

By Bill Bortel

In Tuscola County we are finding more soils with a declining pH reading. This is especially true with the lighter ridges or fields throughout the entire county. Soil tests should be run to know your soil pH levels as well as the fertility readings of individual fields.

A soil's pH, which is a measure of its acidity or alkalinity, probably influences crop yields more than any other single soil characteristic. Though liming is much more likely to be neglected than the application of fertilizer, both are essential for maintaining a well-balanced soil fertility program.

Without the proper soil pH, it is impossible to obtain maximum efficiency

of fertilizer and to achieve top crop yields. For cropping systems that include the production of alfalfa, clover, or other forage legumes, and barley, mineral soils should be maintained at pH of around 6.5. For most other crops, a pH of at least 6 is usually sufficient for achieving maximum yields.

Lime improves crop yields in several ways. The following benefits are achieved by maintaining soil pH in the desired range.

- \*Improved availability of soil nutrients such as phosphorus, potassium, nitrogen, calcium, magnesium, sulfur, boron and molybdenum.
- \*Reduced availability of aluminum and manganese, which may cause toxicity in acid soils.
- \*Increased microbial activity.
- \*Better soil structure.
- \*Increased longevity of legume stands such as alfalfa and clovers. Also improved nodulation.
- \*Increased supply of calcium and magnesium, if dolomitic limestone is applied.
- \*Possible improvement in the effectiveness of some herbicides.

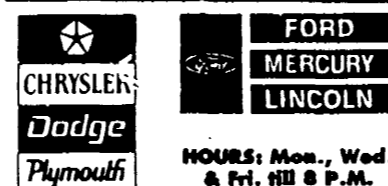

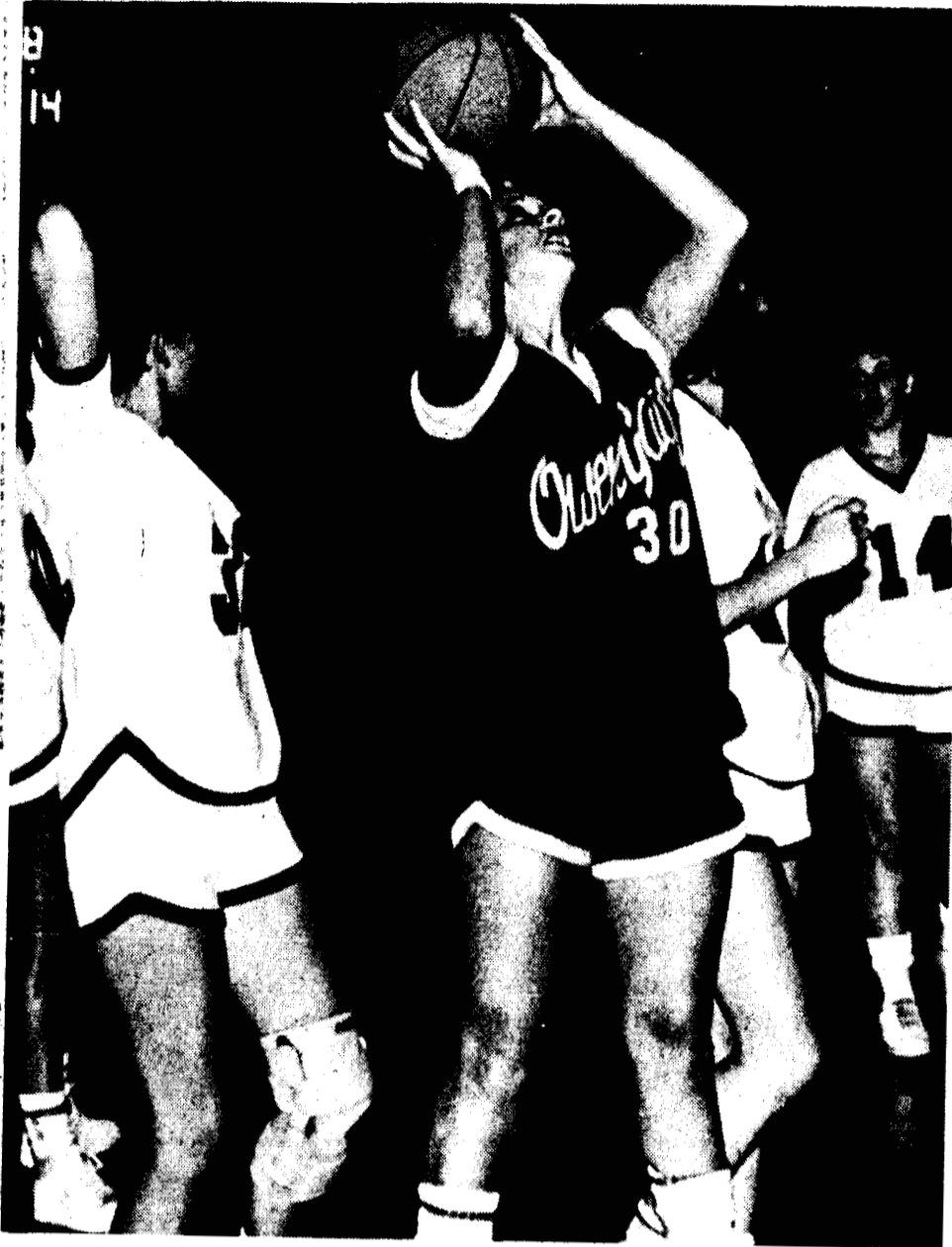

# Besonen changes lineup after injury to Stirrett

The Bulldogs lost more than their 2nd straight North Central Thumb League contest on Friday to Peck 28-18. They lost the services of quarterback and 2 way starter Chad Stirrett for the rest of the 1987 season as he suffered a broken arm late in the first quarter. The Bulldogs will now have to regroup behind last year's quarterback Marc Reinhardt, which will leave a void to be filled in the Bulldog backfield for this week's game at home against much improved Akron-Fairgrove.

"Losing our quarterback hurt us both offensively and defensively but we never gave up, scoring 2 touchdowns in the final quarter," Besonen said.

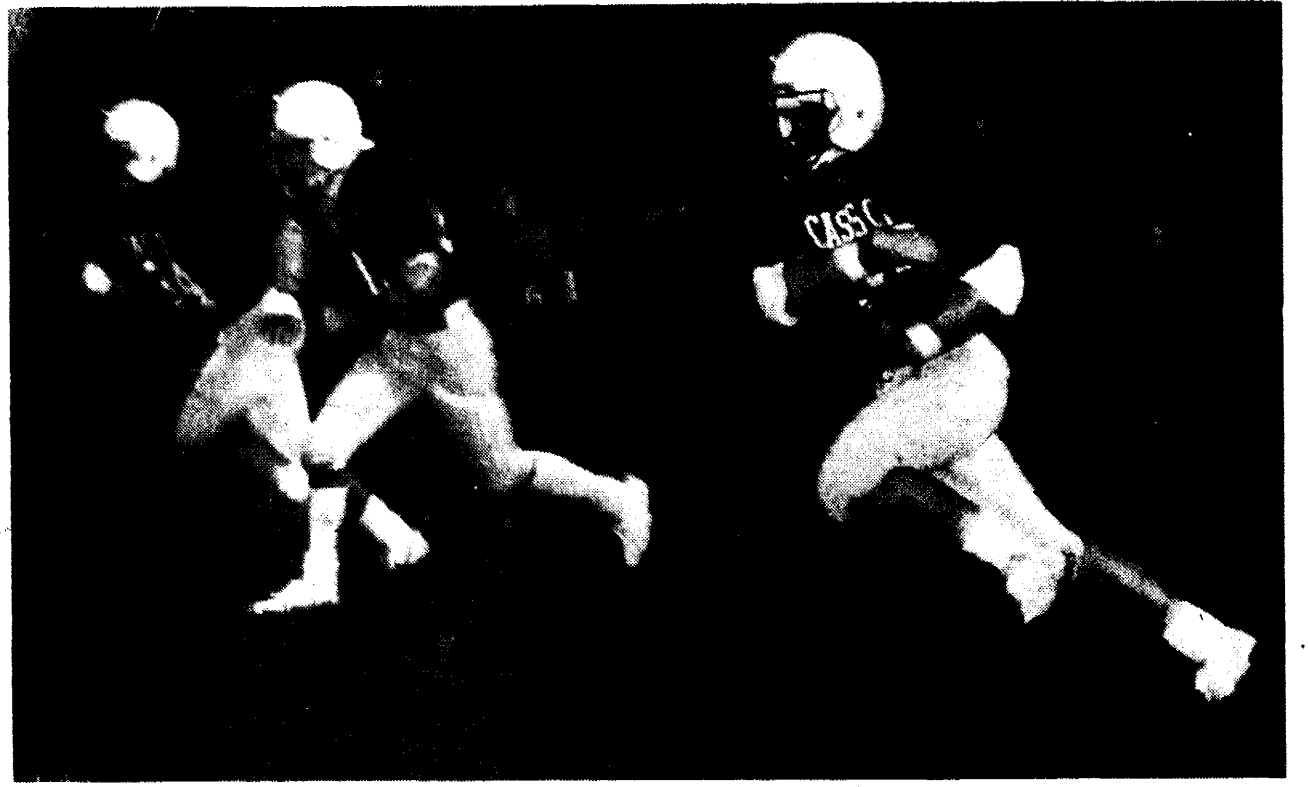

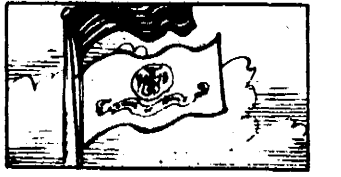

## Taking stock

Leave it to the sharpies in New York to dream up schemes to rake in dollars you've saved.

My old friend of banking days of yore, C.M. "Doc" Ruhmann, sent me a leaflet put out by Citicorp of New York. The title:

### THE ZERO RISK WAY TO GIVE YOUR SAVINGS WALL STREET POTENTIAL

"If you've been thinking about moving some savings into the stock market, but find yourself discouraged by the risk, then worry no more!" the pamphlet leads off.

"You can benefit from Wall Street's stock market growth -- with absolutely NO risk to your principal."

Then Citicorp explains further: Say you invest \$10,000 in this thing that looks like a CD. The rate the CD pays, though, is a gamble. You can be paid a return of as much as 12%. Or you can get no interest at all -- zero return.

The rate of interest you get is tied to the change in the Standard & Poor 500 stock index, and what it does in the 6 months after the deal starts for you. Here's the table:

S & P Index % change, 6 mos.	Your annual rate in %
+ 12%	12%
+ 6%	12%
+ 3%	6%
+ 0%	0%

Note the catch. The change in the stock market has to go up to 6% or more in 6 months. But you don't get 12% for that 6 months in interest. You get 12% as an annual rate, or 6% actually for that half-year period.

You're risking \$300 interest you could have earned on a regular CD for the chance of making an extra \$300.

If you're going to stay in

the scheme and roll over your investment at the end of 6 months, then the stock market has to go up 6% or more again in the next 6 months.

Say the market as measured by the S & P 500 is 320 when the deal starts for you and the Dow averages are 2600. So in 6 months the S & P 500 will have to go up to at least 6% for you to get the big annual rate of 12% on your CD. If you stay in the deal for another 6 months then it has to go up another 6% or more -- on top of the first gain. The figures:

S & P	Goes up	Level
9-87	3-88	339

S & P	Goes up	Level
3-88	9-88	360

S & P	Goes up	Level

S & P	Goes up	Level

If the S & P index is not familiar, use for illustration the Dow Industrial index, the one that hits the telly screen each night. Say it's 2600 in September, 1987. For you to get the big 12% rate, it must go up 6% in 6 months, then if you stay in it must go up another 6% the next 6 months, which will be a year from now. That would mean 2921 for the Dow.

So you've got 12% for your investment in a year. But if the market just kept at the present level, which some think is pretty high, you get no interest at all. You have lost \$600 that a plain old CD would have brought you.

The other day I bought some Potomac & Electric bonds, rated AA, yielding 10.4%. While the principal is not insured as the Citicorp CD is, a double A bond is pretty darned secure. So I'm getting \$1,040 a year on my \$10,000 investment, whether the stock market goes up, down, or sideways.

The averages for the Dow, for example would have to climb to 2921 for me to get 12% the Citicorp way, or \$1,200 return on my \$10,000. (We ignore the compounding feature in both cases for the income, but the market level does compound under the Citicorp deal.)

Sure, there's a risk in bond prices being less a year from now. And there's as good a chance they'll go up. Meanwhile, I've got \$1,040 sure instead of \$1,200 maybe, or nothing at all maybe, depending how the stock market behaves.

And meanwhile, I'll sleep better.

# Commissioners okay new assistant for prosecutor

Tuscola County millage rates were set and Prosecutor William Bond received permission to fill a vacancy in his office after a 4-week delay during a regular County Board of Commissioners meeting last week.

All of the millage rates set by the board--for bridge and local streets, the medical care facility and operations--remain at last year's levels, despite an 11.5 percent drop in the county's state equalized valuation in 1987-88.

The millage rates are .5 of a mill for county bridge and local streets and the medical care facility, and 4.2 mills for operations.

The operational millage rate, which has remained unchanged since 1964, is the lowest among Michigan counties.

According to county Controller Michael Hoagland, the drop in SEV means some 76,000 fewer dollars in 1988 in the combined streets and medical care facility millages compared to the previous year.

The drop in SEV also means 317,000 fewer dollars

for operations. In the past 2 years, the county has lost some \$500,000 in property tax revenue for operations due to dropping agricultural land values, which are projected to drop another 7 percent in 1988-89.

The county's senior millage (.2 of a mill), which raised \$135,000 this year, has expired, Hoagland noted.

An ad hoc committee appointed to investigate measures for dealing with existing and future financial woes in the county hasn't yet made its recommendations, but Hoagland indicated that he's looking for a "very moderate increase for the 1988 budget. We may only see a 2 percent increase in the 1988 budget, but don't hold me to that" figure yet, he said.

He added that while some county officials remain skeptical on whether the position is needed in the prosecutor's office, moving the position now would mean forfeiting the grant, which will pay 100 percent of the cost of employing an additional assistant for one year to work on drunk driving cases.

"In order to get the grant, we had to show that we (would be) adding staff," he explained. "So we were placed in a position where if we didn't leave the position in the office... essentially we would have lost 2 positions" in the prosecutor's office.

Hoagland noted that Bond can reapply for the grant after it expires Sept. 30, 1988, but that further funding would be reduced and commissioners would have to decide on whether to contribute funds for the position.

Also last week, the board approved a judicial wage schedule in compliance with state levels effective Jan. 1, 1987.

Hoagland stated that the funding levels call for salaries of \$70,612 for probate judges, \$72,872 for district court judges and

\$84,465 for circuit court judges. Although the salaries are up overall from the previous year, the county's contribution hasn't changed, Hoagland stated, adding that the county pays \$6,000 toward the probate judge's salary, \$2,215 for the district court judge's salary and \$9,577 for the circuit court judge's salary.

District 2 Commissioner Kim D. Glaspie explained that the decision to keep the position in the prosecutor's office was based primarily on 2 issues. One is need; the other is retaining eligibility for a \$28,346 Alcohol Enforcement Program Prosecution Enhancement grant, which recently was awarded to the office, Glaspie said.

He added that while some county officials remain skeptical on whether the position is needed in the prosecutor's office, moving the position now would mean forfeiting the grant, which will pay 100 percent of the cost of employing an additional assistant for one year to work on drunk driving cases.

## Dave Ackerman's brother missing

## NOTICE OF ADOPTION REVISED ZONING ORDINANCE Township of Elkland, Tuscola County, Michigan

A revised zoning ordinance regulating the development and use of land has been adopted by the Township Board of Trustees of the Township of Elkland, Tuscola County, Michigan. The revised ordinance updates the previous zoning ordinance of the township in light of changes in the state enabling legislation, state supreme court decisions and the experiences of administering the ordinance.

These revisions principally effect the purpose, land use districts, and special land use permits as provided in the ordinance. The RA Residential Agricultural District is changed to three districts including an A-1, Agricultural District, an RR-1 Rural Residential District and an RC-1 Residential Cluster District. The B Business District is revised into a B-1 Business District and the I-1 Light Industrial District is revised into an M-1 Manufacturing/Distribution District. In addition, a new FC-1 Forestry Conservation District is added.

The zoning map is changed to reflect the revised districts. Generally the RC-1 districts are limited to areas surrounding the Village of Cass City. The B-1 Districts are principally on M-81 and principally near the Village. M-1 Districts are mainly south and west of the Village. RR-1 Districts are in rural areas that are not prime agricultural land, while A-1 Agricultural Districts are in the principal farming areas. The FC-1 Districts include most State Game Area and other lands not suitable for agriculture or development including wooded areas and lowlands.

The revised Zoning Ordinance Text and Zoning District Map are on file for public inspection at the Elkland Township Offices. In addition, the Zoning Ordinance Text and Zoning District Map will be on file for public inspection at the Rawson Memorial Library, 6495 Pine Street, Cass City during normal library hours. Copies may be purchased by calling the Township Supervisor at 872-2937.

The adopted ordinance will take effect on October 1, 1987, subject to the circulation of petitions within 30 days to request submission of this ordinance to the electors.

Cut chicken into 1/2 inch cubes. Melt butter in large skillet, add chicken, and cook over high heat until lightly browned. Lower heat, add brown sugar, and stir until sugar is melted and chicken is coated. Add onion and garlic and cook until onion is transparent. Combine ketchup, 1/4 cup water, Worcestershire, vinegar, and chili powder in small bowl. Stir to blend. Add to skillet and stir well. Season with salt, pepper, and hot pepper sauce. Simmer, stirring until sauce is very thick, about 5 minutes. Split pita pockets in half crosswise and line each half with lettuce. Place 2 tomato slices and 2 pepper rings into each pocket. Spoon chicken mixture into pockets and serve. Makes 4 servings.

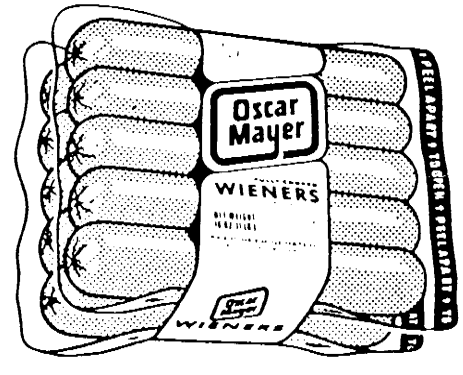
