Surplus food cut means hard times for area poor

Nearly 900 low-income families in Tuscola County are among those who probably will receive less federal surplus cheese, butter, milk and rice in the near future because of dwindling supplies nationwide.

According to state and county officials, a reported decrease in federal surplus food stocks may affect area residents as early as next spring.

Pat Christie, Community Services director with the Human Development Commission savs that some 4,100 households in Tuscola, Sanilac, Huron and Lapeer counties--HDC's service area--will be affected.

Christie stated that the Michigan Department of Education, which receives and distributes surplus food from the USDA, has indicated that reports of re-duced food supplies are cor-

"The most recent correspondence indicated that dairy products will not be guaranteed past March 1988," she said, adding, "after that date, we don't know what we'll receive or even if we'll receive anything. They're also telling us that honey and rice are

in short supply. The HDC normally distributes some 100,000 pounds of federal surplus food every other month in the

Although the surplus food is only meant to be a supplement, for some, she added, "this is a major staple in their diets."

Turkey prices this year have dipped below last year's levels due to an estimated record-high production, up 20 percent from last year, and overall turkey stocks up 24 percent.

Locally, grocer specials have dropped the price to as low as 39 cents per pound with a coupon and \$25 purchase. Current advertisements list prices of 49

helping to hold down area food bills. Ample crops of white potatoes, sweet potatoes and yams have led to at-

tractive prices, while carrots, celery, broccoli, cauliflower, radishes and green onions also are in good supply at prices comparable to last year.

An especially good buy now are apples, area retailers say. The U.S. and Michigan apple crops are very large this year and prices

It's the same old story, really. If you don't like the news, kill the messenger. I wouldn't be so crass as to say that Schuette and his cohorts are acting with their eyes on the voting booths. Perhaps it's just petty spite that motivated them.

It's possible to defend a view that our freedom of speech doesn't extend to persons from outside the country. The Bill of Rights doesn't extend past the nation's boundaries.

But there's no law that says we can't listen to what the leader from the world's other superpower has to say and here's one vote for allowing it to happen. When the politicians try

to muzzle Gorbachev, they are saying to all of us that we aren't capable of separating the wheat from the chaff. The view from here is that we should listen when he talks and let him talk all he wants to. It can't hurt and it could help a little. Probably won't, but it could.

It's sure that those with a contrary view are saying, if we let him speak here, our president should be able to speak in Russia and have it reach the Russian people.

There are long, long odds against that, but it shouldn't matter. If we give more than lip service to freedom of speech, we should welcome Gorbachev to the Congress. Refusing to even listen seems to me to be a poor way of attempting to increase world understanding and chances for peace.
