Glaspie votes no

Nonunion salary increases given county employees

Nonunion salary increases ranging from 2.4 percent to 11.7 percent over a 2-year period were approved by the Tuscola County Board of Commissioners during a regular meeting Nov. 24. The board also approved a number of benefit improvements, and okayed nonunion hourly wage increases similar to those in recently approved contract for some union courthouse employees. Commissioners approved hikes of 4.7 to 5 percent for most salaried nonunion employees. Bigger raises were approved for the sheriff (\$28,250 to \$32,000-11.7 percent), the controller (\$35,000 to \$38,500-9 percent) and the clerk (\$21,850 to \$24,000-9.8 percent). The prosecutor, meanwhile, received a 2.4 percent raise, from \$40,000 to \$41,000.

The new salary levels will remain fixed through 1988 and 1989. Improved benefits okayed by the board include an increase in life insurance coverage starting in January, a new co-pay dental program with an \$800 cap starting in July 1988, and a new retirement plan which will allow employees to retire at the age of 55 if they have 25 years of county employment. According to Commissioner John Goodchild (R-Fairgrove), who chairs the County Personnel Committee, the raises were based, in part, on an attempt to begin bringing county officials' salaries in line with those in neighboring counties. Goodchild indicated that studies show county officials here are paid less than their counterparts doing the same work in nearby counties. "There's no one in our system who is overpaid that I can see," he said. The 2-year salary plan was

approved on a 5-1 vote, with Commissioner Kim D. Glaspie (D-Cass City) casting the lone dissenting vote. Glaspie stated that he voted "no" primarily because the 2-year plan includes a new salary scale, set by the board in August, for the positions of chief assistant prosecutor and the assistant prosecutor. Glaspie said that he was against a salary increase for chief assistant prosecutor in August, and that he remains opposed to that increase.

Turning to the nonunion hourly wage increases, commissioners indicated that the hikes are similar to those in a contract approved recently by members of the largest union local in the county courthouse, represented by the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees. That contract is for 3 years, and includes an \$800 raise retroactive to July 1, a \$200 raise Jan. 1, 1989, and a \$250 raise July 1, 1989. The contract, which includes improved fringe benefits, was rejected by the union local representing district court employees. Commissioners also approved a resolution offering eligible retired county employees the opportunity to pay to belong to the county's medical insurance program. County Controller Michael Hoagland noted that there are less than 2 dozen living retired county employees, and that those interested in the program would be required to pay 100 percent of the cost plus a 10 percent administrative fee. In other personnel matters, the board established a voluntary deferred compensation plan for employees through the Michigan Association of Counties. Hoagland stated that the plan is a retirement program where up to \$7,500 in taxes can be deferred annually. The plan is a no-cost

program to the county, according to Hoagland, who added that courthouse, sheriff's department and annex employees are currently eligible to participate. The program may also be offered in the future to mental health and health department employees, he added. In other business last week, commissioners received a letter from Circuit Court Judge Patrick R. Joslyn in regard to the board's recent action allowing a nativity scene to be set up on the courthouse lawn. Hoagland indicated there is a question over the legality of allowing the scene on the courthouse lawn. He said that the county prosecutor is reviewing the matter. Also, commissioners appointed Walter Parrott to the Region VII Area Agency on Aging Advisory Council, and approved renewal of a janitorial services contract at the Cooperative Extension Service Office.

came aware of Whitehead through the Ford Motor Co. when the Whitehead reservoir and vapor recovery system was adopted and Ford recommended that Whitehead come to us for the fuel pump to operate it. Rick Whitehead, president and co-founder of the company, will continue to manage the company, which was founded 7 years ago and now hires 120 persons. Council outlines projects

9.9% spending jump in village budget

A proposed 1988 general fund budget of nearly \$700,000, up \$69,170, or 9.9 percent, from the projected final 1987 budget, was reviewed by the Cass City Village Council during its monthly meeting Monday night.

The council set a budget hearing for 7 p.m. Dec. 28, just prior to the regular December meeting when the new budget is expected to be adopted.

The proposed spending plan calls for \$696,150 in expenditures and revenues, compared to projected 1987 totals of \$626,980 in expenditures and \$652,600 in revenues.

Village officials expect to end the current fiscal year with a fund balance of some \$300,000.

Council President L.E. Althaver outlined the 1988 spending plan. He noted that an expected increase in general fund revenues of \$43,550 compared to 1987 is the result primarily of additional millage levied by the village as well as additional taxes related to new construction and machinery at Walbro Corp. Major new general fund expenditures in 1988 will include some \$18,000 towards a computer system for the village, with the total cost of the system estimated at about \$36,000.

Village Manager Lou S. LaPonsie explained that funds earmarked for the system in 1988 will cover the cost of equipment, installation and training, and will allow the system to be used for budgeting and bookkeeping. Eventually, the system also will be used for general accounting, billing and other tasks, he added.

Other general fund expenditures pointed out by Althaver are expected additional costs involved in holding an election in 1988, higher insurance costs and an additional transfer of \$17,350 for local street work, approved by the council recently.

Also in the 1988 spending plan, expenditures in the village's Major Street Fund are proposed at \$61,000, down \$32,525 from 1987. LaPonsie attributed the decrease to additional money spent in 1987 on road construction related to Division Street.

In contrast, the Local Street Fund expenditure

total is estimated at \$149,150, compared to \$85,810 in 1987. The jump is due to planned road improvements on 4 blocks of Leach Street, from Pine Street to Garfield Avenue, and one block of Third Street, from West Street to Vulcan Street. The council in October approved engineering work related to the project.

Total expenditures in the Wastewater Treatment

Fund are set at \$258,400, compared to \$244,700 in 1987, while revenues also are expected to total \$258,400, compared to \$256,000 in 1987.

The Water System Fund is expected to be close to 1987 levels at \$86,300 in revenues and expenditures, compared to \$85,425 in both areas in 1987.

Village officials expect to set aside nearly \$27,000 more in capital investment in the

Motor Vehicle and Equipment Fund for purchases in 1988, with expenditures set at \$91,650, up \$30,150 from 1987. Revenues also are set at \$91,650, while revenues in 1987 are expected to total \$78,240.

In a related matter Monday, the council held a 12-minute executive session to discuss personnel wages, which are expected to be acted on this month.

Housing project depends on FHA

A Cass City landowner's request that the village tentatively agree to annex 3 1/2 acres of property for the purpose of construction of an apartment complex was discussed by the village council Monday night.

The landowner, Bruce D. Gee, stated in a letter to the council that housing developers William and Thomas Breaker are proposing to build a multiple family housing complex at the site.

Gee emphasized that he desires annexation of the property only if the developers receive approval of Farmers Home Administration financing for the project.

The 185-foot by 891-foot tract, currently zoned Agricultural, is adjacent to the south village limits, just east of the intersection of Elizabeth and Maple streets.

The council took no formal action, but indicated it has no objections to the project provided zoning and other related matters are handled appropriately by the developers.

The housing project is the second proposed this year in Cass City by agent land buyer Thomas Purman on behalf of the developers.

Purman in April proposed a similar complex on a 6-acre village-owned tract at the southeast corner of the village, near Gee's 3 1/2 acres. The low-to-middle income housing project was to consist of up to 48 units.

Village officials set a price of \$25,000 for 4.5 acres available at that site for the

project, but no further action was taken.

Aside from projected high development costs associated with the village property, the project also drew fire from a couple of area residents who told the council in April that they are opposed to the proposed housing complex.

In other business Monday, the council set a special meeting for 4 p.m. Dec. 8 to discuss insurance bids received by the village Nov. 20.

Village Manager Lou S. LaPonsie stated that the council will meet with an insurance consultant to hear

recommendations and choose an insurance package.

Also last week, LaPonsie reported that a district engineer with the Michigan Department of Health visited the village recently to help village officials regarding a serious rust problem experienced by some residents along Third Street between Sherman Street and Woodland Avenue.

LaPonsie said that a village crew will soon be tapping a main in an attempt to determine whether the problem is originating with village water lines or within the residences.

Mystery plant eyeing area

Authorities for a food processing plant have shown interest in Tuscola County and the Thumb, and Cass City is one of 4 locations in the county that could meet the criteria set by the company, according to Jim McLoskey, Economic Development Director for Tuscola County.

Details are sketchy, McLoskey said, because the request was submitted through the Michigan Department of Commerce, which did not reveal the name. McLoskey said the sites submitted were from 4 different areas of the county.

McLoskey said that he did not have his notes in front of him, but thought that a 200-acre site would be needed. Other estimates said 40 acres or more were needed.

The plant would require about a million gallons of water a year and McLoskey said he was told that for that quantity, a new well would be necessary. The area suggested for the plant if it came to Cass City is near the corner of Schwieger Road and M-81, a mile east of Cass City. A new sewer would have to be constructed to connect to the Cass City system.



## AIDS program held at O-G

AIDS probably seems very distant to Owen-Gage High School students, but just the same, administrators in the tiny rural district are determined that students learn the facts surrounding the deadly disease.

Owen-Gage last week became one of the first area school systems to host an informational program on AIDS.

Kris Popilek, senior staff RN with the Red Cross' Wolverine Region in Flint, presented several programs on AIDS to the school's 120 students in grades 9-12 Nov. 25.

"The reason we teach

this is primarily to teach that you are responsible for you," she remarked during one of the programs. "If you're protecting yourself, if you're not being blatantly irresponsible—that's your decision."

Popilek's presentation included a videotape as well as discussion on myths about AIDS, how to protect against the disease, and how the disease is contracted. Students also had the opportunity to have their questions answered.

Popilek, who said that Owen-Gage is the first school district to approach the Wolverine Division with a request for an AIDS prog-

ram, explained that the most common myth held by the teens seems to be that AIDS "is never going to affect them."

"When you get right down to it, there are so many people who you wouldn't know" have AIDS, she said, adding that she feels for the students, who must be concerned about a deadly disease at a time when they will soon begin to develop serious relationships.

The bottom line, she pointed out, is "it's (sex) not safe anymore."

According to High School Principal Robert Andrews, the decision to host the AIDS presentations was based on a desire to protect students.

"My feeling is that all students should have a basic understanding. In our world we touch on so many people in so many areas," he remarked. "We want them to know the truth."

"It's a good program. I think they (students) have been receptive," Andrews said.

Andrews noted that school officials hope to eventually incorporate an AIDS section in a health course which all ninth graders are required to take.

## Newsworthy deer

June Sanderson of Birmingham phoned to say it ruined her breakfast to read my column that morning. Nothing personal. It wasn't me that made her want to throw up, it was a picture on the same page—a picture of a freshly shot, lifeless deer draped over a log.

Sanderson wondered what makes newspaper editors think readers want to look at photos of dead animals. I used to be a newspaper editor so maybe I could explain why a dog hit by a car never gets its picture in the paper, but a deer hit by a bullet is worth a photo essay.

The difference, of course, is you can run over a collie without leaving the highway but you have to put out bait, hide behind a tree, and use the EZ-Grunt-Er deer call to do in a doe 10 yards away with a high-powered rifle. Also, dead dogs don't help the saloon business up north.

When I was editor of a country weekly, I didn't have to send a photographer into the woods to capture furry corpses for posterity. The triumphant hunters brought their victims to the newspaper office. They plopped shattered ducks and bloody geese on the front counter. They parked cars tied to dead animals at the front curb and dragged the editor outside to see what they had killed. They sought newspaper space as earnestly as the publicity chairman of the annual Kiwanis minstrel show and as proudly as the father of the high school's star quarterback.

At first, as a naive non-hunter from the big city, I didn't understand why anyone would brag about killing a deer. How hard could it be? According to the

people bringing dead deer to my door, 10-year-old boys could kill deer and so could 80-year-old women. And not even once did a doe ask me to take her picture with a dead hunter.

I figured if some people would rather shoot meat than buy it at the supermarket, it was OK with me. But I'd never boast about getting past the A&P checkout clerk without being bitten or clawed. And I wouldn't ask the local newspaper to publish a picture of me standing beside a pot roast tied to my Chevrolet.

Also, there was the question of enjoyment. I'd had fun walking to and from the supermarket, admiring neighborhood architecture and leap-frogging parking meters. And after shopping there'd been more fun eating and drinking with friends, playing cards and swapping stories about produce clerks and bag boys. But I'd never enjoyed the actual stalking of pork chops.

What I mean is I'd never gotten a thrill out of spotting the desired cut of meat, grabbing it and stuffing it in a shopping cart. Certainly not the sort of thrill that hunters told me they got from squeezing the trigger and watching bloody venison stagger a few yards, fall to the forest floor and gasp for life in vain.

Based on my experiences

in getting meat for the dinner table, I was one editor who could see no decent reason for putting pictures of dead deer and their killers in the newspaper. But my boss soon wised me up. He explained that hunting was a sport, and running a photo of a hunter's dead victim was the same as running a photo of a kicked football.

My boss also said deer suffer and die for a good cause — to increase the rental of motel rooms and the sale of hunting equipment and beer. And he said the Department of Natural Resources wouldn't work so hard to increase the deer herd if there weren't so many people who enjoyed trying to wipe out the herd.

And when I mentioned that a kicked football doesn't bleed, it was pointed out that, by God, I liked hamburgers, didn't I?

So that's why that photo of a dead deer was on the same page as my column. If enough people enjoyed killing a cow, there would have been a photo of a dead hamburger draped over a log.

### HIB vaccine available in Sanilac

A new vaccine to help protect against the most life-threatening bacterial diseases of young children is available at Sanilac County Health Department. This new vaccine immunizes against diseases caused by the germ commonly known as "HIB."

HIB diseases affect about one child in 200 before the age of 5 years. HIB diseases, which include spinal meningitis, are serious. Many result in hospitalization, and up to 10% can be fatal. In clinical studies, HIB vaccine was 90% effective in 2 to 6-year-old children.

The United States Public Health Service recommends this new vaccine for all children once they have reached 24 months of age. Because of their increased risk, children 18-23 months old who attend day-care should also be considered

for vaccination, although the vaccine may not be as effective in this age group.

There is now no charge for the one shot vaccine. Additional information is available by calling the Sanilac County Health Department at (313) 648-4098.



## New books at the library

**TENDING TO VIRGINIA** by Jill McCorkle (fiction). Virginia Suzanne Ballard is 28 years old, eight months pregnant and not at all sure she wants to leave her family and move "North" (to Richmond) with her young lawyer husband. When stricken with toxemia, Ginny Sue is tended for a week by three generations of her family's women: her favored grandmother Emily and great-aunt Lena, cantankerous and large-hearted widows not always willing to distinguish between past and present; her mother Hannah with her cousin Madge, and her own contemporary cousin Cindy, a brash and vulnerable, quick-spoken divorcee. Conversation among the women is woven of memories and half-remembered recollections, current misunderstandings, wishes, disappointments and a dark secret concerning Cindy's father, a Chevrolet salesman with an Egyptian obsession. The author leads her characters to revelations and emotional relief during an afternoon when a tornado adds its own bit of havoc.

**WEAVERWORLD** by Clive Barker (science fiction). Barker envisions a race of fey folk known as the Seerkind who live undetected among mere mortals (whom they slyly refer to as the Cuckoos) until threatened by destruction. In response, the Seerkind weave themselves and their living places into a carpet, a magical riot of color and wonder known as the Fugue, which is then placed in the care of a mortal woman. Years pass, the woman grows old and dies, and her death signals to malign forces who wish to possess it that the Fugue is no longer protected. These are the demonic, immensely powerful woman known as Immacolata, her two ghostly, repulsive sisters, and her mortal cohort, the avaricious and power-hungry Shadwell. But the granddaughter of the Fugue's former caretaker manages to get possession of the rug, and so begins a long pursuit.

**KALEIDOSCOPE** by Danielle Steel (fiction). Sam Walker and Arthur Patterson, American soldiers in war-torn Paris, fall in love with Solange, a proud young Frenchwoman. Having won her, Sam brings his beautiful war bride to New York, where he instantly sets Broadway agog at his acting talent, mercurial temper and restless love affairs. Tragedy strikes when he kills Solange during an argument, and later himself, orphaning their three pampered daughters. Arthur cravenly arranges adoptions for the youngest two, but nine-year-old Hilary is dealt a life of utter misery. Determined to reunite her little family, she grimly survives only to find that the man responsible for her torment has lost all traces of her sisters. Years later, John Chapman is hired by a dying, penitent Arthur to find the sisters and bring them together.


The Bulldogs could also get some help from 6'6" Dave Deming, the team's tallest and only true center.

Saturday's performance was sold out while Friday and Sunday the First Presbyterian Church was nearly full. Tuesday's performance in Caro, with a larger seating capacity, was about half full.

The Festival chairman was Holly Althaver, who recently was appointed to the board of directors of the Concerned Citizens for the Arts in Michigan.

At the Tuesday organ recital, David Schrader was joined by trumpeter Martin Porter. Lois Moslander of Cass City, who attended the recital last year and this year, said that she felt the addition of the trumpet this year made the recital more enjoyable. It was the first time that I had ever seen a piccolo trumpet, she said.

One of the highlights of Sunday's concert was the work of Frank Kowalsky in the Concerto for Clarinet in A Major, K. 622. He received a sustained standing ovation. Dr. Harold Peterson, who presented the pre-concert lectures, said that Kowalsky's clarinet was seamless and as good as he had ever heard. It was Kowalsky's second year at the Festival.



## Damage is minor in 2-car crash



### Taking stock

Three of the eight-little, seven-little, six little Indians running for the Democratic nomination have found a safe issue to rally 'round the voters of Iowa.

Gasohol. Michael Dukakis, Paul Simon and Richard Gephardt think it's a dandy idea, and they're all for it.

When alcohol is made from corn, the Federal government subsidizes it to the tune of 60¢ a bushel, by not taxing the product as it does gasoline, at 6¢ per gallon.

This delights the corn growers, and penalizes the rest of us. For some strange reason the corn-growers have conned the politicians into spending 40% of the farm subsidies on them, and so a lot of corn is grown and the market is glutted.

It also delights the Sierra Club and the environmentalists because it is a Renewable Resource, and dear to their hearts. The smog areas of Los Angeles and Denver are all in favor because the air could be a little cleaner if only alcohol was burned. Gasohol is only 10% alcohol and it's but a drop in the nation's gas tank, but the poor souls in those foul areas will grab at anything.

Meanwhile oil well exploration is held up because its competition is subsidized. It's also held up by the well-meaning but silly conservationists who fight anything in the way of exploration in the Arctic. No matter that the caribou around the North Slope are more plentiful than ever. The Sierra Clubbers say that's because there are fewer predators -- wolves, namely.

I happen to be an Alaska sourdough. I spent over a year near the Arctic Circle, as a National Park ranger. Our whole job was in preserving the herds of caribou

and the flocks of mountain sheep. We kept the poachers away, but caribou migrations, nobody ever figured out. One season there'd be tens of thousands, the next a few hundred. Nobody knew why, except the caribou and they weren't talking. In any event, it wasn't civilization that made them so eccentric.

Not long ago one of the oil companies wanted to drill offshore in the Prudhoe area.

Nature groups had a fit. They said the noise of drilling would make the whales nervous. Possibly. But not as nervous as they were when the Eskimos' explosive harpoons blew up inside the whales. But that was for the good of the Noble Eskimo, and acceptable.

Back to gasohol. A friend of mine, the late Austin Brightman, Mobil Corp. engineer for all his working career, told me once why alcohol from corn or wood chips or whatever would never compete with gas or oil for a fuel.

Transportation. Gas and oil, once extracted, flow to refineries by pipeline, a real cheap way of moving things. Corn stalks are hard to put through pipes. Seem to clog, somehow. So they're hauled by farm wagon to trucks and by trucks to the alcohol plant. The plants have to be fairly close, so no plant is very big. Not big enough to build a pipeline for the alcohol that it turns out. Oil refineries get their product by pipeline (or tanker), make it into gasoline and then deliver by pipeline.

The best an alcohol plant can do is get it in small truckloads, and then send it out usually by tank trailers. In the corn country there

aren't even many railroads to move the product by tank car.

There are some other features of gasohol that car owners don't like -- hard to start, say some. Hard on rubber hoses, they claim.

It's an expensive way of keeping the nature lovers and the Iowa voters happy. As I say, it's a safe issue for a campaign, especially in Iowa, and in other places where the facts of the matter are kept under wraps.

Onward to 1988, and more of the same. It's going to be a long year to that first Tuesday in November, 1988.

A brickbat I had ready for the Wall Street Journal and Barron's after trying to get delivery changed to that by carrier turned into a bouquet. After getting the "Hold" treatment on the 800 number and then dosed with canned music and ugly commercials for 10 minutes, a sweet young thing named Diane Coleman smoothed my feathers, called me back a few minutes later and said in 2 days a carrier-fellow would be bringing it to the door. My faith is restored.

### Local United Way expects to meet goal

The Elkland-Novesta United Way campaign will meet its record goal of \$17,000, predicts Arthur Holmberg, one of the volunteers in the campaign. With 2 weeks left, the campaign has \$12,000 in cash and pledges. Donations from the general campaign are yet to be tallied and not all of the industrial donations have been received.
