O-G, Cass City school war continues; deny transfer

Hard feelings over student transfer requests between the Owen-Gage and Cass City School districts probably won't be resolved in the near future if action taken by the Owen-Gage School Board Monday night is any indication.

The board, during its 2-hour monthly meeting, rejected a request from Fred Mikolon and Donna Matt to allow Matt's 2 sons, Nicholas, 5, and Nathan, 8, to continue attending school in Cass City.

That motion was approved on a 5-1 vote after a motion to allow the children to remain in the Cass City district for the remainder of the current school year died without support.

The request was presented by school Supt. Harley B. Kirby, who stated that he was approached by

the couple with the request after the board's January regular meeting.

Matt and Mikolon, who lives in the Owen-Gage district, plan to marry in March, and would like all of their children to attend school in the same district, Kirby said, adding that Mikolon has a son who is a senior.

"I told them they would be taking a chance," Kirby remarked, adding that the couple decided to enroll Matt's children, who previously attended school in the USA district, at Campbell Elementary School in January.

Trustee Joseph Warack, who cast the lone dissenting vote Monday, indicated that he was willing to approve a motion to allow the children to continue attending school in Cass City for

the remainder of the school year, chiefly because the board over the past year has approved similar requests for 4 other children to attend schools in Bad Axe and Reese.

Trustee Jack Brinkman, however, disagreed.

2-WAY STREET

"Let's have a 2-way street," Brinkman said, referring to action by the Cass City Board of Education at its January meeting.

Brinkman attended that meeting and presented a request from his son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. James Brinkman, to allow their 2 children to complete their education in the Owen-Gage district. The James Brinkmans' property is in the Cass City School District, but through an oversight the children have been at Owen-Gage, one for 6 years.

Cass City School Board Trustee Ben Hobart stated that cooperation between the districts is a 2-way street, and pointed out that the Owen-Gage School Board had recently rejected a request to allow students to transfer to Cass City while approving similar requests for students to attend schools in other districts.

Brinkman said that the request was turned down because those involved gave no reason for their request.

But Cass City Trustee Richard Wallace remarked that there must have been a reason or the request would not have been made.

REVIEW SET

The Cass City board voted to allow the Brinkman children to continue attending in the Owen-Gage district through the current school year, and then review the

request again before the next school year.

Owen-Gage School Board President Ron Good indicated Monday night that the Owen-Gage board hasn't based its transfer request decisions on the school districts involved. "I think we've tried each case on its own merit," he said.

But Brinkman, who made a motion to deny the request submitted by Matt and Mikolon after the first motion died, stated after the meeting that his actions were based partly on the Cass City board's action last month.

"I would say that had something to do with it," he commented. "I'm saying the same thing that Ben (Hobart) said. It's a 2-way street."

Brinkman added that he believes the Cass City district should make the first move in terms of cooperation. "Why should we start it? They've (Cass City School District) got enough of our territory. They've crippled our district enough," he said.

According to Kirby, all of the student transfer requests granted by the Owen-Gage board have been for one-year periods. He stated that if the Owen-Gage district became an "in-formula" district (meaning the district would be eligible for state aid on a per-pupil basis), transfer requests would be approved only under the condition that the Owen-Gage district be reimbursed for lost state aid per student.

SUPT. CONTRACT

In other business Monday, the board announced its plans to offer Kirby a third one-year contract, with salary to be negotiated at a later date. Kirby's current contract expires June 30.

The action was approved after a 65-minute executive session, called for the purpose of discussing the superintendent's contract.

Board members approved, on Kirby's recommendation, a motion to cancel an agreement with Trust Thermal Systems of Eagle to inspect the school district buildings for friable and non-friable asbestos, and develop a management plan for the materials in compliance with the new Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act.

The board then approved an agreement to have DeLisle Consulting and Laboratories Inc. of Kalamazoo do the job.

Kirby stated that the Kalamazoo firm, aside from having more experience, will do the work for 1.6 cents per square foot, compared to Trust Thermal Systems' estimate of 2.9 cents per square foot.

The Eagle firm last month upped its estimate to 2.9 cents from an earlier quote of 1.2 cents.

Also Monday, Kirby informed the board that he recently was contacted by the Tri-County Bargaining Association to set up dates to continue teacher contract negotiations, which have been on hold since October.

The district's teachers have been without a contract since August, when the final year of a 4-year pact expired.

Owen-Gage School District residents are invited to attend the second of 3 scheduled informational meetings focusing on the development of a curriculum for the school on Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome.

The meeting has been slated for 6:30 p.m. Feb. 15 in the Owendale High School library.

Study indicates Tuscola County's strength and growth projects

Tuscola County and its manufacturing businesses can look to a promising future if goals set by a special task force, following completion of a recent industry expansion and retention study, become reality.

Results of the study, conducted in the fall, were presented to nearly 30 county officials and businessmen Friday at the Tuscola Area Skill Center.

Among the recommendations, to be carried out by the Tuscola County Economic Development Corporation and other agencies, are:

- Assist businesses that intend to expand their facilities.
- Increase efforts towards helping companies locate in the county.
- Continue efforts to insure timely completion of the M-24 "connector" project and other road improvements.
- Assist in establishing and maintaining a healthy trucking industry to serve the county.
- Schedule a meeting of area bankers to encourage the use of revolving loan funds and other financing programs for businesses.
- Provide information to firms on procuring government work, assist seasonal firms in diversifying product lines, and discuss the option of incorporation with sole-ownership companies.

The in-depth study was sponsored by the EDC, Tuscola County Board of Commissioners and Michigan Bell.

A total of 17 trained volunteers surveyed 38 county firms, representing nearly 70 percent of the county's manufacturing and manufacturing related business population.

Michigan Bell Economic Development Manager Laurie Cline told those in attendance Friday that the survey, which has been conducted in 32 other communities representing more than 2,000 businesses, revealed good news for Tuscola County.

vitalization efforts.

Further, 55 percent indicated that they plan to modernize or improve existing buildings or equipment; 26 percent plan to expand at their present location, and 24 percent plan a new building in their community.

Cline pointed out that 76 percent of the firms interviewed have their corporate headquarters in Tuscola County. "We feel that's important," she added.

Another important factor is that 69 percent of the firms own their property, which, Cline says, represents stability within the county and closer ties to communities.

Some 40 percent of the companies interviewed require production workers to have a high school diploma or equivalent, which is a much higher percentage than in other areas of the state, according to Cline, who noted that 55 percent of the chief executive officers stated that they obtained new employees from area high schools, 32 percent have obtained new employees from area technical/trade schools, and 18

percent have obtained new employees from area universities.

LITTLE CRIME

Crime, or lack of it, also is important. Cline pointed out that in the past 12 months, only 4 firms, or 11 percent (among those interviewed), were vandalized, while only one firm was burglarized.

Other points of interest in the study include:

- 50 percent of existing firms were established since 1960, with 16 percent

of the firms established over the past 10 years.

- Customers and competitors of county manufacturers are concentrated in Michigan, with half of the businesses obtaining primary components for the manufacturing process from Michigan suppliers.
- Less than 25 percent of the manufacturers currently supply to government contracts, although the firms are generally interested in expanding and initiating government contracts.
- 76 percent of the firms have 40 or fewer employees, with a median of 15 employees. Over the next 5 years, some growth is expected, with the greatest change occurring in the over-40 employee segment.
- Average wages in the county are slightly lower than state averages. The county's average wage for highly skilled employees is \$8.80 (state \$11.02); semi-skilled, \$6.69 (state \$7.90), and unskilled, \$5.69 (state \$6.14).

2 injured

William Czewski dies in crash

A multi-vehicle accident north of Pigeon last week, which left a 29-year-old Gageton man dead, remains under investigation by the Huron County Sheriff's Department.

William Czewski was killed Feb. 3 when a semi-tractor trailer struck a stranded trailer he was standing near on Caseville Road, pinning him under the front axle of the first vehicle.

Injured in the 6:30 a.m. accident were William Parrish, 42, Kinde, and Richard

Drabek, 19, Bay Port, who were treated and released from Scheurer Hospital, Pigeon.

According to Huron Sheriff Deputy Elwood Smith, the accident occurred after a semi-tractor trailer loaded with hay, driven by Robert Webber Jr., Caseville, pulled onto southbound Caseville Road from Webber Farms and the trailer came unhitched.

Webber parked the tractor on the southbound lane and tried to get the trailer re-connected. Drabek, a

neighbor, parked his pickup truck on the east side of Caseville Road and attempted to help, as did Czewski, who parked his car nearby.

Smith stated that a southbound semi-tractor trailer driven by Parrish did not see Webber on the road signaling with a flashlight. Parrish's semi collided with the stranded trailer, pushing it into Drabek's truck and causing Webber's semi-tractor to strike Czewski's car.

Area post offices cut hours to meet cuts in budget

Cass City Postmaster William Zinnecker recently announced a slight reduction in business hours, effective Feb. 13, due to compliance with the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act adopted in December.

Office hours at the Cass City office have been changed from 8:15 a.m.-4:45 p.m. to 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, and from 8:15 a.m.-noon to 8-10 a.m. on Saturdays.

Hours at the Deford Post Office, according to Postmaster Donald Hill, will re-

main at 7:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. (closed from noon to 1 p.m.) Monday through Friday, but will be reduced by 30 minutes on Saturdays, 8 to 11:30 a.m. The Decker Post Office, meanwhile, has ended window service on Saturdays, but will maintain post office box service hours from 8 to 10 a.m.

In Gageton, office hours will remain the same with the exception of Saturdays, when the office will close one hour earlier at 11:30 a.m.

The budget act requires the Postal Service to cut ex-

penditure levels by about \$1.25 billion over the next 21 months. This includes \$815 million in capital expenditures and \$430 million in operating expenses.

The capital cuts will result, nationally, in elimination of a great deal of the building and equipment purchases the Postal Service had planned for the next 2 years, according to Zinnecker, who stated that the service is working aggressively to minimize the effect of the cuts on customers. As a result, two-thirds of the impact will be inter-

nal.

The impact on customer service includes a 10 percent adjustment on window hours. However, programs will be made available to offset the window adjustments, including stamps by mail, consignment sites and vending machines.

Another impact is the elimination of Sunday collections and adjustments of Sunday mail processing operations. Specifically, Zinnecker said, customers should plan on mailing their letters on Saturday or Monday.

Tap Brewster Shaw for space flight

After Cass City's Col. Brewster Shaw completed his second space flight in 1985, it was announced that he would pilot the third flight of the "Atlantis" probably within a year.

That year has been stretched to at least 3 years due to the explosion of the Challenger shuttle. But last week it was announced that Shaw will pilot the new space shuttle when it flies sometime in early 1989.

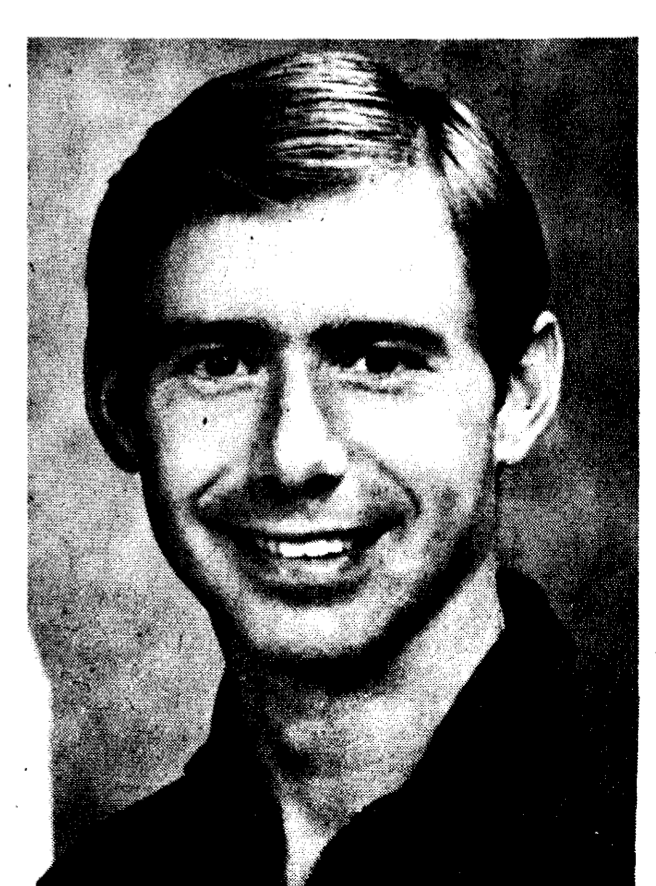
The flight will feature a Department of Defense payload which Shaw says is classified information on which he cannot comment.

In a typical statement, the self-effacing astronaut said that it is exciting to have the opportunity to fly in space for your country.

In a phone conversation with a reporter from the Bay City Times, Shaw is reported to have repeated something that he has said in his many visits to his old home town.

It was that the Challenger disaster didn't change his feelings about going into space. "I've always been afraid, he has said in Cass City many times. If you aren't afraid sitting on the end of a rocket it's because you don't know what you are doing, he believes. Once more he doesn't feel that

Shaw's flight next year will not be the first since the accident. The next mission is scheduled in August if bugs that have developed are ironed out, and Shaw is sure they will be.

Jessie is — was — a dog. Some kind of spaniel, around 10, too big to sit on our lap, but always sitting on your lap anyway. Jessie was a marvelous, loving

pet, an important member of Ferd's family ever since her wedding, an everyday part of the life of Emily and Tricia for as long as they have lived.

But Jessie wasn't my child or grandchild. I'm ashamed to admit I almost interrupted Ferd's sobs by shouting "Whoopie, it was only Jessie!" What an insensitive lout. My daughter was heartbroken, and I felt like the Tigers just won the World Series.

It was a unique experience. I'd never before received such a bad-news, good-news communication; never before had my feelings plunged and then soared so quickly. I didn't know how to handle it.

Good Lord, I almost gave a tearful Ferd heck for scaring me so badly. I almost suggested she should have begun the conversation by saying, "All your children and grandchildren are just fine, Dad, but there's this little problem with Jessie..."

I wasn't that loutish. I said I was terribly sorry about Jessie and handed the phone to my wife. Mother and daughter cried together, and Mother went to spend a couple of days with the survivors. I was left alone with frozen dinners — and my thoughts.

PETS GET THE COLD SHOULDER

I thought about my attitude toward family pets; it's standoffish. I'm angered by any sort of cruelty to animals. I'm the columnist who regularly aims jibes at hunters who kill for fun. But on the other hand, I never romp or talk nonsense with dogs or cats. A hello and goodby pat is about it. My grandchildren's pets soon learn this about me, and keep their distance in favor of the more visible gush abundantly available from other members of my family. I wasn't always that way.

I remember, as a child, sleeping with a collie named Cappy, and crying uncontrollably when he died. I remember the anguish of my young children when their pets died. Once I ran out and bought a new puppy to give them at the same time they learned their old dog was wiped out by a car.

It must have been these experiences that, somewhere along the line, shaped my present attitude toward pets. I decided there was enough sadness inevitable in life without setting myself up for more by becoming attached to a dog who, because of a much shorter life span, would inevitably die while I was loving it.

GRANDPAS CAN BE WRONG, TOO

While thinking these thoughts, I learned by phone that 6-year-old Emily was afraid to lie down and sleep because Jessie lied down and died. Should I tell her — and her mother — they wouldn't be so troubled if they hadn't loved a mere dog?

No. Instead, I sent Emily a note: "Some people (like grumpy grandpas) think it's dumb to get attached to pets because they are just going to die and make you feel bad. But the grumps are wrong. Loving a pet is worth it because it's so much fun — and the pet appreciates it. If all of you hadn't loved Jessie so much, she wouldn't have lived such a happy life. And you will always have nice memories of Jessie. I'll write a column about her and you can put it in your scrapbook to read years from now."

This is the column. And I will be nicer to Jessie's replacement, also inevitable.

Tuscola ISD speech and language program lauded

The Tuscola Intermediate School District Speech and Language Pathology Program has been named a recipient of the Program of the Year Award by the Michigan Speech-Language-Hearing Association.

The Tuscola ISD program is one of 5 public school programs to be selected from among more than 1,000 speech-language-hearing programs in the state to receive the honor this year.

The award will be presented at the MSHA's annual conference, set for March 17 at the Grand Traverse Resort, Grand Traverse Village.

According to Tuscola ISD Speech and Language Pathology Department Chairman Ron Laeder, the honor is shared by both the ISD staff and district residents.

"We're all really excited about this recognition. It is a tribute to the citizens of Tuscola County who have supported our efforts

throughout the district to provide the very best help we can for children with communication disorders."

"The cooperation of parents, teachers and administrators has been great," Laeder added.

The Tuscola ISD Speech and Language Pathology program, staffed by 11 speech/language pathologists, serves persons ranging in age from infancy through 25 years with communication disorders in local school districts, and in the ISD's Center programs.

The Center programs include preschool classrooms, preschool speech therapy centers and classrooms for severely handicapped children.

The ISD's K-12 program covers nine local school districts and offers services such as diagnostics, consultations and individual and group therapy.

Also tied to the program

is the ISD's "Services to Tuscola's Exceptional Preschoolers" team, an interdisciplinary group of professionals providing diagnostics, consultation, referral and recommendations for parents concerned about their preschooler.

Laeder stated that more than 600 children, including 70 in the Cass City School District, receive therapy through the ISD program each week.

A speech pathologist himself, Laeder serves about 55 children in the Cass City School District. He works with children at Campbell Elementary and at the intermediate and high schools.

Another speech pathologist, Therese Shifler, serves Deford and Evergreen Elementary students along with others in the Kingston School District.

THE "OPIAS"

The three most common forms of visual dysfunction are: myopia, hyperopia and presbyopia.

MYOPIA (nearsightedness) is a type of vision in which seeing is clear at near distances and blurred at far distances.

HYPEROPIA (farsightedness) is vision in which seeing is generally clearer at far distances and blurred at near. A large amount of hyperopia can cause some blurring at far distances as well.

PRESBYOPIA occurs when the ability of the eyes to focus decreases to the point where vision becomes blurred at reading distances. This commonly happens in middle age.

These dysfunctions are not diseases. They should be thought of as "eye conditions" that are generally fully correctable by properly prescribed lenses.

Traffic problem is hazardous for area pupils

Dear Mr. Haire:

I believe all parents fear for the safety of their children. Being the father of a seven-year-old, I feel a strong desire to comment on a hazardous situation.

I cannot help but worry about the children as they are dismissed from Campbell Elementary and venture toward their respective ride home. If their parents, relatives, or friends have parked illegally, on the wrong side of the street, the young students are forced to walk across busy and crowded Rose Street. When people park beside the line of cars parked near the sidewalk, they make the children walk between two rows of cars. Besides this danger, these people are double parked and make it difficult for traffic to flow in an orderly fashion.

One possible solution to this dangerous congestion is to construct a u-shaped gravel road around the outer edge of the empty field that sits near the playground equipment. The entrance and exit of this one way road would be off the high school road. This new road could only be used during the time school is dismissed. This way the children could get in their cars from the sidewalk in either the usual line or the newly created u-shaped line. By blocking the entrance and the exit, except at dismissal time, the students could still use this field for their recess activities.

I feel this traffic problem meets our warranted concerns. If nothing can be done to ease the situation then I strongly urge people not to park on the wrong side of the street, and please do not double park. Does convenience outweigh your child's safety and happiness?

The new owner has made a concentrated effort to become a Cass City booster as well as a Cass City businessman. He is spons-

soring a student of the week at Cass City Schools and Board has become a familiar sight at school events and other civic meetings.

The most recent expansion was recently announced by Carol Ingles, who has more than doubled the space at Cass City

Floral by taking over the building adjoining her location on Main Street.

Ingles says that the new section includes a bridal room and will also house green plants. This spring, she confides, when the cooler now in the original building is moved to the ad-

acent building, the original building will be devoted entirely to gift items.

The expansion of the shop comes just one year after Ingles purchased the business. She arrived on the business scene from Pigeon, where she makes her home and owns and oper-

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New books at the library

A VIEW FROM THE BENCH: JUDGE JOSEPH A. WAPNER OF PEOPLE'S COURT by Joseph A. Wapner (non-fiction). Wapner is known not only for his appearances as judge on the nationally televised program, People's Court, but for his 30 years of administering the law with flair as attorney and judge in the California legal system. His memoir is replete with stories, mostly involving human suffering, of how he dispenses justice by putting himself "into the loss and anger and dismay" of the people who appear before him in the Los Angeles courts. His aggressively effective efforts at settlement, dubbed "The Wapner Treatment," have involved him in versatile explorations and creative applications of the law. This entertaining retrospective of a career by a jurist who clearly loves his work is also an enlightening primer in the ways of the legal system.

THE UNKNOWN IACOCCA by Peter Wyden (non-fiction). When Iacocca refused to grant an interview, author Wyden turned to the published record and quotes from relatives, friends, associates, competitors, journalists and psychologists for this biography of Lido Anthony "Lee" Iacocca, the Ford Motor Company president who in 1978 was fired, went on to lead the foundering Chrysler Corporation back to health with an unprecedented federal government assist, wrote a collaborative autobiography selling in the millions and now, as Mr. Can-Do of American business, is perceived as a tentative, still enigmatic but potentially formidable U.S. Presidential candidate. Wyden describes Iacocca as a shy, striving child driven by an energetic immigrant father; an old-style Italian family man unable, when widowed, to stay married to a younger, more modern woman; an irresistible salesman rising through Ford dealership ranks; and, finally, as a vigorous, innovative executive, persistent, proud, patriotic, irascible, charismatic, fascinated with making automobiles.

DEEDS by Joseph Amiel (fiction). Ralph Behr is a Manhattan real estate developer, and unbridled ambition brings Ralph to the pinnacle of his profession at age 36, yet many detest his brashness, conceit, materialism and obsession with self-gratification. To ensure his immortality, he plans to erect three 150-story towers called Behr Center in New York City. Just as the controversial project gets under way, Ralph's father, Henry, an aging real estate tycoon, tells his son some astounding news. Twenty years ago, Henry's partner, Abe Weintraub, committed fraud and went to prison. Abe threatened to implicate Henry unless he agreed to surrender half the Behr fortune to the Weintraubs upon Abe's release. Henry commands Ralph to wed Abe's daughter, Gail, to make the impending \$100 million transfer less conspicuous. The union turns out to be acrimonious, for Gail, an impassioned champion of the rights of battered women, loathes the egotistical rich in whose company she finds herself.

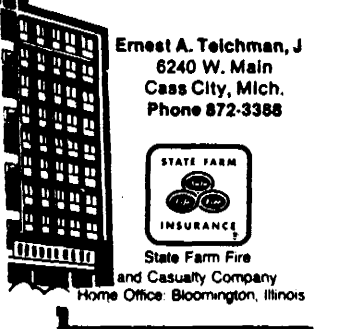

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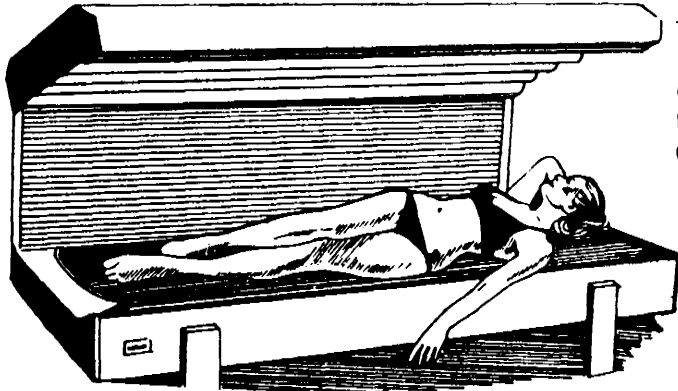

HEALTH TIPS
Help is available for phobias and alcoholism

Phobias are the number-one mental health problem among American women; alcoholism ranks first among men.

Is there a relationship? Some experts think there is.

Recent evidence suggests that many men, and perhaps women too, drink in an effort to mask or control their phobias, according to Jerilyn Ross, president of the Phobia Society of America. And one-third to one-half of the alcoholics studied have been found to have phobias or panic disorder.

According to National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH) studies, phobias—persistent, irrational fears that cause people to avoid certain objects or situations—are overall the most common mental health disorder in the United States and alcohol abuse is second.

The nature of the relationship between phobic/panic disorders and alcohol abuse is not clearly established however. The possibility exists, for example, that those who abuse alcohol may be more prone to developing phobias.

An intriguing idea is suggested by NIMH studies that find alcohol abuse to be about twice as common among men, whereas agoraphobia—fear of being alone in public places—is 2 to 3 times more common among women. Experts speculate: Do men try to generate false courage with alcohol, while women respond to fears by staying at home?

one will suffer humiliation in a particular type of social encounter. The person with social phobia may fear being tongue-tied when called upon to speak in public, or choking on food when eating in front of others, or being unable to urinate in a public lavatory or having a trembling hand or other physical symptom reveal his or her anxiety.

People with this anxiety disorder often retreat from social involvement and are handicapped in work activities. Tragically, many also abuse alcohol. One study found that 20 percent of social phobics consumed excessive alcohol, and another reported that, in a sample of alcoholic individuals, 25 percent of the men and 17 percent of the women had social phobia.

Although this disorder is seldom discussed and not very well known to the general public, studies conducted over 6 months found that it may affect as many as 2 to 4 million adults within that time frame.

In general, anxiety disorders such as social phobia and agoraphobia are unusually common among those with alcohol dependence.

Help is Available

Specific types of therapy have proved effective for the various phobias and for panic disorder. Help should be sought before problems are compounded by destructive attempts at "self-treatment" with alcohol and before the many repercussions of phobias severely restrict individuals' private and professional lives.

In many cases, it may be necessary to treat the 2 problems of alcohol abuse and agoraphobia as separate disorders. Clinicians must also be alert to special difficulties in treatment—such as agoraphobic and social phobic individuals who find it too difficult to attend AA meetings.

The Phobia Society of America is a national non-profit organization of helping professionals, researchers and people with phobias. It provides informative materials about the various phobias and serves as a resource to locate experts in all areas in the country. In addition, the organization sponsors professional meetings to disseminate research findings dealing with phobias and panic disorders.

Panic Attacks -- Often the Root Cause

Individuals with panic disorder are subject to overwhelming anxiety attacks during which they may fear they are dying of a heart attack or choking, while they perspire profusely, tremble and experience heart palpitations, difficult breathing or other frightening symptoms.

Untreated panic disorder can lead to phobias—including agoraphobia, where people avoid most public settings—as individuals become afraid of situations that they think will induce panic attacks.

Agoraphobia and Social Phobia -- Common Phobic Disorders

Agoraphobia is extreme anxiety about being in a setting from which escape will be difficult or in which help will not be available. Some people are afraid to leave their homes unless accompanied by a person they can rely on for help. For many, the fear stems from the possibility of a panic attack occurring when they are without assistance.

Recent studies conducted in several cities, under the sponsorship of NIMH, found that during a 6-month period between 2.7 and 8.4 percent of the population over age 18—from 4.7 to 14 million adults—experienced agoraphobia severe enough to be diagnosed as a disorder.

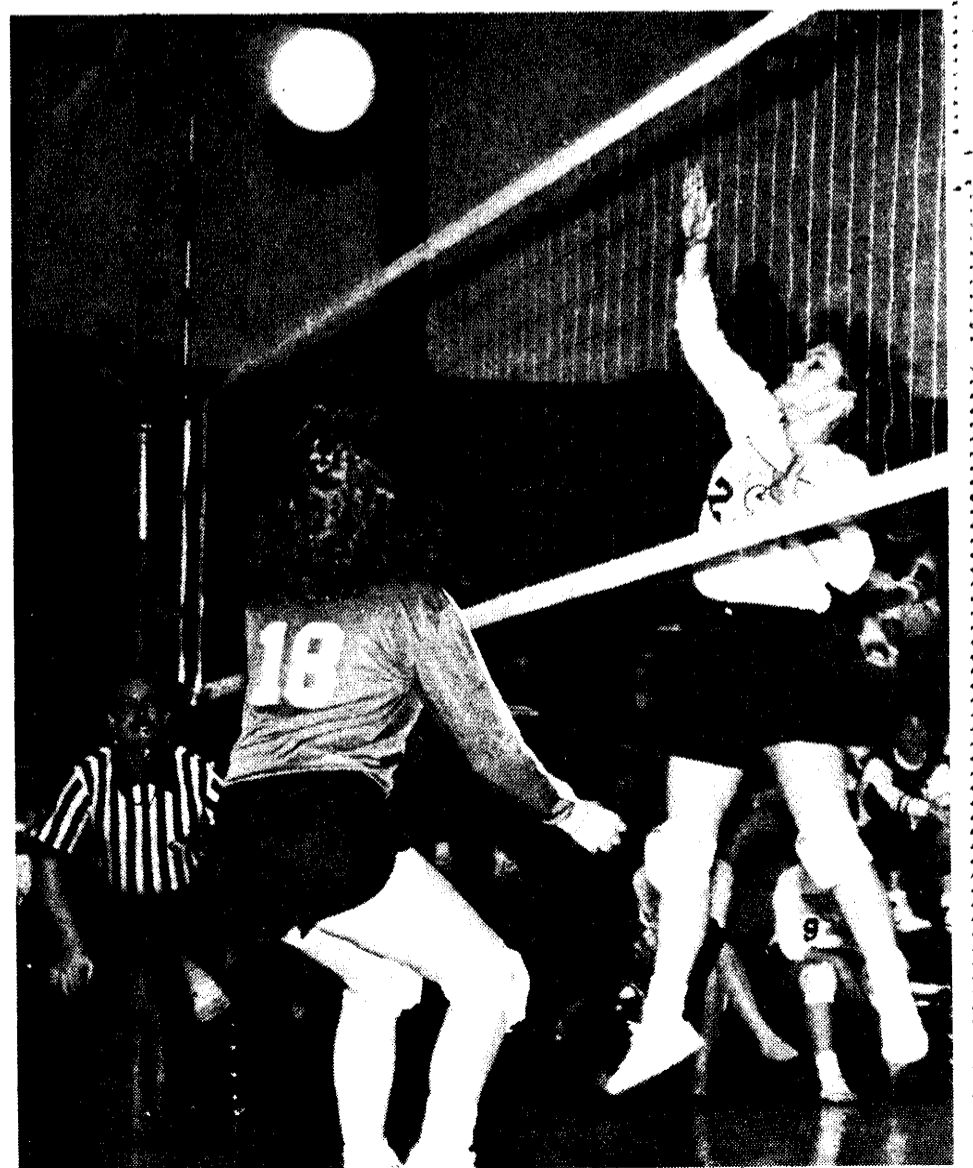

After that it was mop up time as both coaches made sure that everyone got a chance to get into the action.

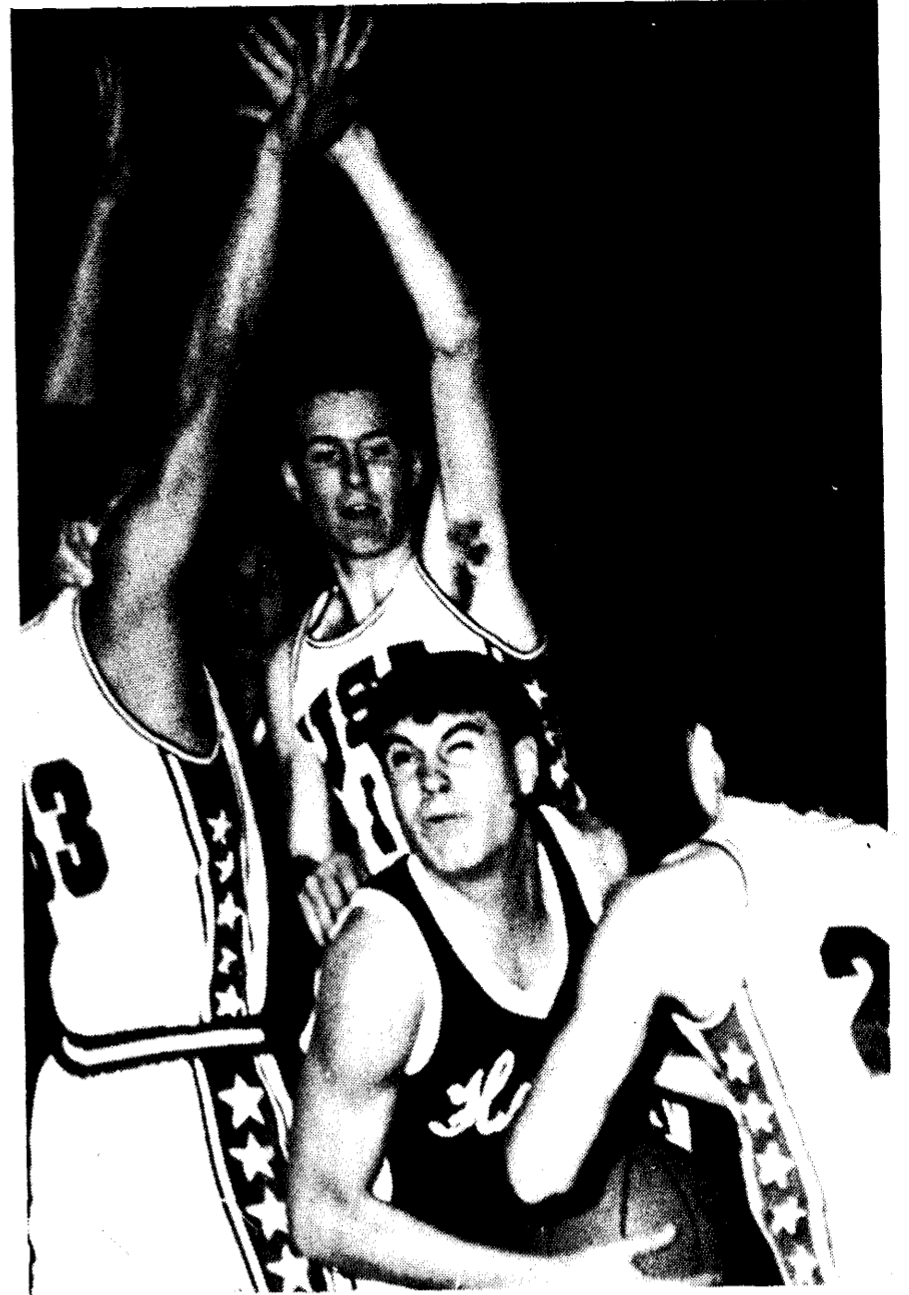
Tuckey, with 14 points, led Cass City while Elenbaum scored 24 and Wertz 16 for the Lakers.

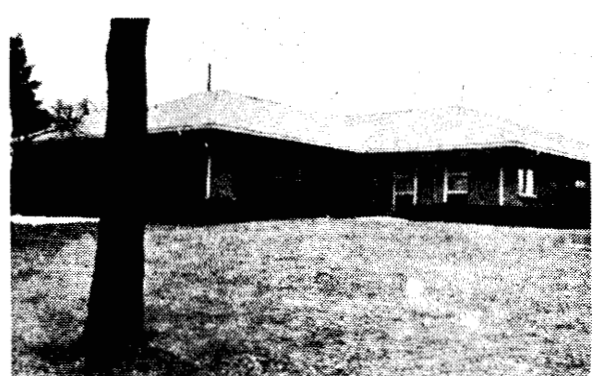

in the county, Cline pointed out that 45 percent of the firms interviewed have been contacted by other states, primarily from the Midwest, attempting to lure them away from Michigan.

"We have to take into account that they're (county businesses) constantly being bombarded with the promise of greener pastures," she added.

According to EDC Executive Director James

McLoskey, who served as manager of the study project, portions of the recommendations made by the study task force already are in motion.

McLoskey stated that he, state Senator James A. Barcia (D-Bay City) and state Representative Dick Allen (R-Caro) are scheduled to speak Feb. 23 at a Michigan Department of Transportation Department public hearing in Bay City on behalf of the M-24 project, which would extend M-24 from Caro north to M-138.

McLoskey said that the purpose of attending the hearing is to urge MDOT officials to follow through with plans to complete the project by 1993.

The project, part of the

MDOT's 10-year investment plan, is vital, McLoskey said, adding that trucking is used by 71 percent of the firms interviewed in the study to transport components to plants and transporting about 81 percent of the finished products from the plants.

IMPRESSED

Senator Barcia, who also attended Friday's meeting, lauded the study. "I'm really impressed with the quality and depth of the research," he remarked after the presentation.

Barcia indicated he was particularly impressed with county officials' initiative to conduct the study, and the findings regarding the large percentage of employers who require employees to have a high school diploma or equivalent.

"You talk about the change in skill levels and training today," Barcia commented, "it's so critical that our people have those skills."

"It's going to provide us with information that will carry us into the 1990s," EDC Chairman William Kaiser remarked. "We're
