O-G, Cass City school war continues; deny transfer

ween the Owen-Gage and Cass City School districts probably won't be resolved in the near future if action taken by the Owen-Gage School Board Monday night is any indication.

The board, during its 2hour monthly meeting, rejected a request from Fred Mikolon and Donna Matt to allow Matt's 2 sons, Nicholas, 5, and Nathan, 8, to continue attending school in Cass City.

That motion was approved on a 5-1 vote after a motion to allow the children to remain in the Cass City district for the remainder of the current school year died without support.

The request was presented by school Supt. Harley B. Kirby, who stated that he was approached by

Hard feelings over student transfer requests betafter the board's January regular meeting.

Matt and Mikolon, who lives in the Owen-Gage district, plan to marry in March, and would like all of their children to attend school in the same district. Kirby said, adding that Mikolon has a son who is a

"I told them they would be taking a chance," Kirby remarked, adding that the couple decided to enroll Matt's children, who previously attended school in the USA district, at Campbell Elementary School in

January. Trustee Joseph Warack, who cast the lone dissenting vote Monday, indicated that he was willing to approve a motion to allow the children to continue attending school in Cass City for the remainder of the school year, chiefly because the board over the past year has approved similar requests for 4 other children to attend schools in Bad Axe and Reese.

Trustee Jack Brinkman, however, disagreed.

2-WAY STREET

"Let's have a 2-way street," Brinkman said, referring to action by the Cass City Board of Education at its January meeting.
Brinkman attended that

meeting and presented a request from his son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. James Brinkman, to allow their 2 children to complete their education in the Owen-Gage district. The James Brinkmans' property is in the Cass City School District, but through an oversight the children have been at Owen-Gage, one for 6 years.

Cass City School Board Trustee Ben Hobart stated that cooperation between the districts is a 2-way street, and pointed out that the Owen-Gage School Board had recently rejected a request to allow students to transfer to Cass City while approving similar requests for students to attend schools in other dis-

Brinkman said that the request was turned down because those involved gave no reason for their re-

But Cass City Trustee Richard Wallace remarked that there must have been a reason or the request would not have been made.

request again before the next school year,

Owen-Gage School Board President Ron Good indicated Monday night that the Owen-Gage board hasn't based its transfer request decisions on the school districts involved. "I think we've tried each case on its own merit," he said.

But Brinkman, who made a motion to deny the request submitted by Matt and Mikolon after the first motion died, stated after the meeting that his actions were based partly on the Cass City board's action last month.

"I would say that had something to do with it," he commented. "I'm saying the same thing that Ben (Hobart) said. It's a 2-way

Brinkman added that he believes the Cass City district should make the first move in terms of cooperation. "Why should we start it? They've (Cass City School District) got enough of our territory. They've crippled our enough," he said. district

According to Kirby, all of the student transfer requests granted by the Owen-Gage board have been for one-year periods. He stated that if the Owen-Gage district became an 'in-formula'' district (meaning the district would be eligible for state aid on a per-pupil basis), transfer requests would be approved only under the condition that the Owen-Gage district be reimbursed for lost state aid per student.

SUPT. CONTRACT

In other business Monday, the board announced its plans to offer Kirby a third one-year contract, with salary to be negotiated at a later date. Kirby's current contract expires June

The action was approved after a 65-minute executive session, called for the purpose of discussing the superintendent's contract.

Board members approved, on Kirby's recommendation, a motion to cancel an agreement with Trust Thermal Systems of Eagle to inspect the school district buildings for friable and and non-friable asbestos, and develop a management plan for the materials in compliance with the new Asbestos

Emergency Response Act. The board then approved an agreement to have De-Lisle Consulting
Laboratories Inc.
Kalamazoo do the job.

Kirby stated that the Kalamazoo firm, aside from having more experience, will do the work for 1.6 cents per square foot, compared to Trust Thermal Systems' estimate of

2.9 cents per square foot.
The Eagle firm last month upped its estimate to 2.9 cents from an earlier quote of 1.2 cents.

Also Monday, Kirby informed the board that he recently was contacted by the Tri-County Bargaining Association to set up dates to continue teacher contract negotiations, which have been on hold since Oc-

tober. The district's teachers have been without a contract since August, when the final year of a pact expired.

Study indicates Tuscola County's strength and growth projects

Tuscola County and its manufacturing businesses can look to a promising future if goals set by a special task force, following completion of a recent industry

study, become reality. Results of the study, conducted in the fall, were presented to nearly 30 county officials and businessmen Friday at the Tuscola Area Skill Center.

Among the recommendations, to be carried out by Tuscola County Economic Development Corporation and other agencies, are:

-- Assist businesses that intend to expand their facilities. --Increase efforts to-

wards helping companies locate in the county. -- Continue efforts to insure timely completion of the M-24 "connector" project and other road im-

provements. --Assist in establishing and maintaining a healthy trucking industry to serve the county.

--Schedule a meeting of area bankers to encourage the use of revolving loan funds and other financing programs for businesses.

--Provide information to firms on procuring government work, assist seasonal firms in diversifying product lines, and discuss the option of incorporation with sole-ownership companies.

The in-depth study was sponsored by the EDC, Tuscola County Board of Commissioners and Michigan

A total of 17 trained volunteers surveyed 38 county firms, representing nea-1-70 percent of the county; manufacturing and ma ufacturing related busine.

population. Michigan Bell Economic Development Manager Laurie Cline told those in attendance Friday that the survey, which has been conducted in 32 other comrepresenting munities more than 2,000 businesses. revealed good news for Tuscola County.

HIGH RATINGS

Overall, nearly 70 percent of the businesses surveved rated their local communities as being "good" to "excellent" places to do business because of community support, good location and revitalization efforts...

Further, 55 percent indicated that they plan to modernize or improve existing buildings or equipment; 26 percent plan to expand at their present location, and 24 percent plan a new build-

ing in their community. Cline pointed out that 76 percent of the firms interviewed have their corporate headquarters in Tus-cola County. "We feel that's important," she added.

After Cass City's Col. Brewster Shaw completed his second space flight in 1985, it was announced that he would pilot the third flight of the "Atlantis"

probably within a year. That year has been stretched to at least 3 years due to the explosion of the Challenger shuttle. But last week it was announced that Shaw will pilot the new space shuttle when it flies sometime in early 1989.

The flight will feature a Department of Defense payload which Shaw says is classified information on which he cannot comment.

In a typical statement, the self-effacing astronaut said that it is exciting to have the opportunity to fly in space for your country.

In a phone conversation with a reporter from the Bay City Times, Shaw is reported to have repeated something that he has said in his many visits to his old home town.

It was that the Challenger disaster didn't change his feelings about going into space. I've always been afraid, he has said in Cass City many times. If you aren't afraid sitting on the end of a rocket it's because you don't know what you are doing, he believes. Once more he doesn't feel that

the Challenger accident will be the last one. When we fly as many as 100 sorties you can expect to have an accident, although it won't be because of faulty O-rings, he asserts.

Tap Brewster Shaw for space flight

Shaw's flight next year will not be the first since the accident. The next mission is scheduled in August if bugs that have developed are ironed out, and Shaw is sure they will be.

Area post offices cut hours to meet cuts in budget

Cass City Postmaster William Zinnecker recently announced a slight reduction in business hours, effective Feb. 13, due to compliance with the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act adopted in December.

Office hours at the Cass City office have been changed from 8:15 a.m.-4:45 p.m. to 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, and from 8:15 a.m.noon to 8-10 a.m. on Satur-

Hours at the Deford Post Office, according to Postmaster Donald Hill, will re-

main at 7:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. (closed from noon to 1 p.m.) Monday through Friday, but will be reduced by 30 minutes on Saturdays, 8 to 11:30 a.m. The Decker Post Office, meanwhile, has ended window service on Saturdays, but will maintain post office box service


hours from 8 to 10 a.m. In Gagetown, office hours will remain the same with the exception of Saturdays, when the office will close one hour earlier at 11:30

The budget act requires the Postal Service to cut expenditure levels by about \$1.25 billion over the next 21 months. This includes \$815 million in capital expenditures and \$430 million in operating expenses. The capital cuts will re-

sult, nationally, in elimination of a great deal of the building and equipment purchases the Postal Service had planned for the next 2 years, according to Zinnecker, who stated that the service is working aggressively to minimize the effect of the cuts on customers. As a result, two-thirds of the impact will be inter-

The impact on customer service includes a 10 percent adjustment on window hours. However, programs will be made available to offset the window adjustments, including stamps by mail. consignment sites and vending machines.

Another impact is the elimination of Sunday collections and adjustments of Sunday mail processing operations. Specifically, Zinnecker said, customers should plan on mailing their letters on Saturday or Mon-

You have to wonder if they just don't know the danger of ice on the river with its current or whether they just ignore it. Suffice to say those 2 were all wet. Pun intended.



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

These dysfunctions are not diseases. They should be thought of as "eye conditions" that generally fully correctable by properly prescribed lenses.

LETTER

I cannot help but worry about the children as they dismissed Campbell Elementary and venture toward their respective ride home. If their parents, relatives, friends have parked illegally, on the wrong side of the street, the young students are forced to walk across busy and crowded Rose Street. When people park beside the line of cars parked near the sidewalk, they make the children walk between two rows of cars. Besides this danger, these people are double parked and make it difficult for traffic to flow in an or-derly fashion.

One possible solution to this dangerous congestion is to construct a u-shaped gravel road around the outer edge of the empty field that sits near the playground equipment. The entrance and exit of this one way road would be off the high school road. This new road could only be used during the time school is dismissed. This way the children could get in their cars from the sidewalk in either the usual line or the newly created u-shaped line. By blocking the entrance and the exit, except at dismissal time, the students could still use this field for their recess ac-

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New books at the library

VIEW FROM THE BENCH: JUDGE JOSEPH A. WAPNER OF PEOPLE'S COURT by Joseph A. Wapner (non-fiction). Wapner is known not only for his appearances as judge on the nationally televised program, People's Court, but for his 30 years of administering the law with flair as attorney and judge in the California legal system. His memoir is replete with stories, mostly involving human suffering, of how he dispenses justice by putting himself "into the loss and anger and dismay" of the people who appear before him in the Los Angeles courts, His aggressively effective efforts at settlement, dubbed "The Wapner Treatment," have involved him in versatile explorations and creative applications of the law. This entertaining retrospective of a career by a jurist who clearly loves his work is also an enlightening primer in the ways of the legal system.

THE UNKNOWN IACOCCA by Peter Wyden (nonfiction). When Iacocca refused to grant an interview, Wyden turned to the published record and quotes from relatives, friends, associates, competitors, journalists and psychologists for this biography of Lido Anthony "Lee" Iacocca, the Ford Motor Company president who in 1978 was fired, went on to lead the foundering Chrysler Corporation back to health with an unprecedented federal government assist, wrote a collaborative autobiography selling in the millions and now, as Mr. Can-Do of American business, is perceived as a tentative, still enigmatic but potentially formidable U.S. Presidential candidate. Wyden describes Iacocca as a shy, striving child driven by an energetic immigrant father; an old-style Italian family man unable, when widowed, to stay married to a younger, more modern woman; an irresistible salesman rising through Ford dealership ranks; and, finally, as a vigorous, innovative executive, persistent, proud, patriotic, irascible, charismatic, fascinated with making automobiles.

DEEDS by Joseph Amiel (fiction). Ralph Behr is a Manhattan real estate developer, and unbridled ambition brings Ralph to the pinnacle of his profession at age 36, yet many detest his brashness, conceit, materialism and obsession with self-gratification. To ensure his immortality, he plans to erect three 150-story towers called Behr Center in New York City. Just as the controversial project gets under way, Ralph's father, Henry, an aging real estate tycoon, tells his son some astounding news. Twenty years ago, Henry's partner, Abe Weintraub, committed fraud and went to prison. Abe threatened to implicate Henry unless he agreed to surrender half the Behr fortune to the Weintraubs upon Abe's release. Henry commands Ralph to wed Abe's daughter, Gail, to make the impending \$100 million transfer less conspicuous. The union turns out be acrimonious, for Gail, an impassioned champion of the rights of battered women, loathes the egotistical rich in whose company she finds herself.

suggests that many men, and perhaps women too. drink in an effort to mask or control their phobias, according to Jerilyn Ross, president of the Phobia Soclety of America. And onethird to one-half of the alcoholics studied have been found to have phobias or panic disorder.

According to National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH) studies, phobias -persistent, irrational fears that cause people to avoid certain objects or situations -- are overall the most common mental health disorder in the United States and alcohol abuse is sec-

An intriguing idea is suggested by NIMH studies that find alcohol abuse to be about twice as common among men, whereas agoraphobia -- fear of being alone in public places -- is 2 to 3 times more common among women. Experts speculate: Do men try to generate false courage with

Social phobia is a consuming preoccupation that

one will suffer humiliation in a particular type of social encounter. The person with social phobia may fear being tongue-tied when called upon to speak in public, think there or choking on food when evidence eating in front of others, or being unable to urinate in a public lavatory or having a trembling hand or other physical symptom reveal his or her anxiety.

People with this anxiety disorder often retreat from social involvement and are handicapped in work activities. Tragically, many also abuse alcohol. One study found that 20 percent of social phobics consumed excessive alcohol, and another reported that, in a sample of alcoholic individuals, 25 percent of the men and 17 percent of the women had social phobia. Although this disorder is seldom discussed and not very well known to the general public, studies conlationship between phobic/ ducted over 6 months found panic disorders and alcohol that it may affect as many as 2 to 4 million adults within that time frame.

In general, anxiety disorders such as social phobia cohol may be more prone to and agoraphobia are unusually common among those with alcohol dependence.

Help is Available

Specific types therapy have proved effective for the various phobias and for panic disor-der. Help should be sought before problems are compounded by destructive attempts at "self-treatment" with alcohol and before the many repercussions of phobias severely restrict individuals' private and professional lives.

In many cases, it may be necessary to treat the 2 problems of alcohol abuse and agoraphobia as separate disorders. Clinicians must also be alert to special difficulties in treatment -such as agoraphobic and social phobic individuals who find it too difficult to attend AA meetings.

The Phobia Society of America is a national nonprofit organization of helping professionals, researchers and people with phobias. It provides informative materials about the various phobias and serves as a resource to locate experts in all areas in the country. In addition, the organization sponsors professional meetings to disseminate research findings dealing with phobias and
