# Sarah fights back in rehabilitation

**Editor's note:**  
A number of area residents have followed the progress of Sarah Miller since the Cass City youth was struck by a car near her home Feb. 24, 1987.

The daughter of Cass City Police Sgt. Donald and Bridget Miller, Sarah sustained serious closed head injuries which nearly ended her young life. Despite a several week long coma and months with very little progress in her recovery, however, Sarah has fought back with a determination that has surprised even her doctors.

Much of her progress has taken place at the Neurorehabilitation Center in Bloomfield Hills, where she has received intense therapy.

The following is a recent update on Sarah's progress, compiled by staff members at the center and sent to the Chronicle.

Sarah was admitted to the Neurorehabilitation Center in September 1987. When she came to us, she was not using her arms, she communicated with yes/no eye-blinks and she could not tolerate sitting for long periods.

Since Sarah has been at the Neurorehabilitation Center, she has received physical, occupational and speech therapies, as well as serial casting and orthotic management.

Sarah is now one year post-injury and she has been here for 6 months. During these months, Sarah has made dramatic and unexpected changes.

She has progressed from being wheelchair-bound to walking with the aid of parallel bars. She is also using a custom-made adaptive walker for ambulation. Sarah is able to stand to transfer from her bed to her wheelchair and, therefore,

no longer requires 2 people to put her into her wheelchair. When she is in her wheelchair, Sarah propels the chair with her left arm. All of these accomplishments have not only increased Sarah's independence, but have also enabled her to be much more mobile.

Six months ago, Sarah could not open her mouth. Although she continues to receive her primary nourishment through a feeding tube, she is now opening her mouth and is having therapeutic feedings (eating soft foods) 3 times a day.

Sarah is functionally using her left arm and hand to assist in brushing her hair and washing her face.

Her communication abilities have expanded greatly from the yes/no eye-blinks. Presently, Sarah communicates with head-nods and a communication

board, which is attached to her wheelchair and displays pictures and words. In order to communicate, Sarah points to a word or a picture of an activity to convey what she wants.

Sarah is also involved in outside social activities. She is an active member of the Sparks (a Campfire troop for children with special needs) and she has earned 7 badges since joining the troop.

Sarah also participates in group social activities with other children her age. She was recently included in a trip to the Shriners' Parade with a group of other children.

Sarah's parents and family have been wonderful and have provided a tremendous support system for her. The family visits Sarah several times a week, and takes her home for weekend visits.

## Unanimous vote

# O-G board confirms firing of Andrews

Citing a lack of both student discipline and effective communication, the Owen-Gage Board of Education Monday again voted not to renew high school Principal Robert Andrews' contract.

The board approved the action unanimously following brief discussion before an audience of about 21 persons.

Andrews pressed for specific reasons on why the board was considering not renewing his contract, saying that reasons given him, such as a lack of trust and confidence by students, and a lack of student discipline, are too "general."

Board President Ronald Good mentioned 2 instances—one in a classroom and the other at a sports event—in which he indicated there was a lack of student discipline on Andrews' part.

Andrews acknowledged the classroom incident, which involved a teacher who was having problems with student behavior, but denied "doing nothing" about the situation.

Good also read a list of complaints, including charges that Andrews has lacked effective interactive communication with the board, staff, students and community; has lacked in the area of public relations with the board, staff, parents and students, and has

shown a lack of emotional control with staff, parents and students.

Trustee William Kretzschmer stated that discipline at ball games has continued to be a problem.

"I personally have had some complaints from parents," he said, adding that comments from "quite a few people" have focused on problems involving scheduling, communication and an inability to deal effectively with parents.

Andrews, however, said he believes he has done a "decent job." He also indicated that he was unaware of the board's dissatisfaction earlier in the year, and that if he had been told, he would have done something to correct the problem.

"I've always dealt with anybody that approached me," he told the board. "I've tried to be cooperative and work with anybody I can."

Andrews, who has been with the district for about 2 years, later indicated that he believes there was little chance of changing the board's opinion of his performance.

"Obviously, I think they made a decision a long time ago, and there's nothing you can do about that. Even if push came to shove and you could prove what they did was wrong, I wouldn't want to work with a school district that doesn't want me as their principal."

Monday's vote followed

action last month in which the board rejected renewal of Andrews' contract and then later rescinded that motion.

The board, on a secret ballot, defeated a motion that would have renewed Andrews' contract at a regular meeting March 14. However, the vote was deemed illegal because there was no way for the public to know how members of the board had voted.

The board also had neglected to notify Andrews, prior to the vote, that it was considering not renewing the contract, which is required by state law.

The March 14 vote was rescinded during a special meeting March 21.

# O-G - Cass City relations thaw

Student transfer matters, an update on school finances and a proposed millage request were among the items acted on during a 3 1/2-hour Owen-Gage School Board meeting Monday.

The board unanimously approved 2 motions that should further improve relations between the Owen-Gage and Cass City school districts.

A request by Fred and Donna Mikolon, Gagetown, to allow their 2 young sons to continue attending school in the Cass City district for the 1988-89 school year was approved.

The action comes on the heels of a decision by the Cass City Board of Education March 21 to allow the 2 young children of James and Jeanne Brinkman, who live in the Cass City School District, to continue attending school at Owen-Gage for the 1988-89 school year.

The Owen-Gage board also gave school Supt. Harley B. Kirby tentative approval to meet with Cass City Supt. Kenneth Micklash on the matter.

Micklash has indicated that the Cass City board is willing to "trade" the Brinkman children for the Mikolon children, Kirby said, adding that the superintendents will discuss an agreement in which all 4 children would be allowed to attend the school of their choice for the duration of their educations.

Both full-time employees of Walbro Corp., the couple indicated they would have to hire 2 baby sitters if their son was forced to attend kindergarten in the Owen-Gage district.

Board members said they couldn't make a decision at this time because they are uncertain about Owen-Gage's possible status as an "in-formula" school district.

The district may be in-formula next year, meaning the school would receive per-pupil state aid, Kirby explained, adding Please turn to page 14.

## Board candidates file for office

Races for trustee seats on 3 of 4 area boards of education will be decided in annual school elections slated for June 13.

No race is expected in the Cass City School District, where 2 incumbent trustees were the only persons to file nominating petitions by Monday's 4 p.m. deadline.

Fred Matthews and Beverly Auten both are seeking reelection to their 4-year seats on the school board.

Four persons, including one incumbent, are vying for 2 trustee seats on the Owen-Gage Board of Education.

Incumbent Ronald Good and newcomers Randall L. Howard, Walter W. Swiastyn and Richard Roth are

each seeking a 4-year term. Incumbent trustee Donald Cummins did not file a nominating petition.

The election outlook is similar in the Ubyly School District, where incumbent John Rutkowski and challengers Bob Main, Anthony Rutkowski and Martin Kubacki will compete for 2, 4-year seats on the school board. Incumbent Marshall Grika decided not to seek reelection.

In Kingston, meanwhile, neither incumbent is seeking reelection.

Newcomers Marlene Powell and Judy A. Smith are expected to fill a pair of 4-year seats held by incumbents Albert Ruggles and John Borek, who did not file nominating petitions.

# "A wonderful life," says 100-year-old McPherson

The old adage "You're as old as you feel" may be more comforting than true in the final analysis.

Chances are good it depends on individual interpretation, but area resident Mae McPherson has found both truth and myth in the saying.

McPherson, who will be 100 years young Saturday, has trouble hearing those around her. She can walk, but must spend much of her time resting, and her sight is weak.

Despite the physical toll the years have taken on her, however, McPherson's mind has remained youthful.

"I've lived a wonderful life," she remarked last week at the H & M Retiree Home, 8550 N. VanDyke Rd., Cass City.

McPherson has lived at the home for only a few months. Until last summer, she lived at her own residence in the Thumb and handled all of her own affairs.

"She tells us stories quite frequently," Sister Mary Josepha, manager of the home, said. "She can remember details like you wouldn't believe."

A brief interview revealed it takes little prodding to get a story out of the long-time Pigeon resident, who's old enough to be the mother of a few of the 7 other current H & M residents.

McPherson paused.

"This is really true," she began, adding that she was driving with a niece and

nephew in the Canadian west years ago when they stopped at a truck drivers stop for lunch. A young truck driver walked in, sat down and was approached by a young, new waitress, she continued.

"His order was 2 wheels and a cup of oil (2 doughnuts and a cup of coffee), and the girl never heard of such a thing," McPherson said. "So, she took the order back to the kitchen and the cook told her to open the largest can of beans they had, put them on a platter and take it to him."

"He says, 'I didn't order that,' and she said, 'Gas up and wait for repairs.'"

McPherson's stories are only a small portion of the wealth of dates, names and events she recalls when

looking back on her life.

Not bad considering she arrived in this country from her native Canada in 1906. At the time, the United States' 26th president, Theodore Roosevelt, was beginning his second term in office.

McPherson was 18 when she left her family farm in Canada. Three years after arriving in Detroit, she married Charles Smith. He died in 1955, and McPherson remarried in 1963. Her second husband, William McPherson, died in 1974.

McPherson, who moved to Pigeon around 1950, says her longevity is due in part to her lifestyle, particularly during the years she was growing up on her parents' farm in Ontario, where they



**In the Army**

While Jim Fitzgerald is on vacation, we're running columns he wrote for other newspapers before coming to the Free Press in 1976. This one's from 1961.

I am typing these words on a date that annually prompts thousands of people to remember where they were, and what they were doing WHEN.

Twenty years ago this Dec. 7 I was shooting nine-ball in Curley Peloso's pool-room in Port Huron.

The rack boy asked if I knew where Pearl Harbor was. I said I didn't know her.

Unfortunately, I can recall feeling no great stirring of patriotism when I learned the United States was at war. In fact, as a high school junior, I was sure the fighting would be over before I reached draft age and I wasn't a bit sorry to miss out on being a soldier.

Many nine-ball games later, when I was skipping high school commencement rehearsals in favor of Curley's, I still couldn't believe Uncle Sam would dress me in olive drab. It wasn't just that I was frightened, which I definitely was, but I felt totally

incapable of contributing anything physical to the war effort.

**A SMALL COWARD CONFESSES**

I could peddle defense stamps to my newspaper route customers, and collect tin cans for the scrap drive. I didn't complain about gas rationing because I drove a bike, and I never wore black market shoes.

But carry a gun and march in the mud and live in a tent and duck German 88s? Not me. Mrs. Fitzgerald raised a frail boy, obviously incapable of withstanding the rigors of war. I wasn't a big coward. I was a small coward.

I reported for my draft physical with 2 husky friends. One of them was smart enough to faint as he watched me get shots in both arms. He was rejected.

My other guy was tabbed 4-F by the examining psychiatrist. He had nerve trouble. What he really had was nerve enough to tell the doctor he liked boys better than girls. He is now married and has 7 children.

I was a special case and the Army couldn't make up its mind whether it wanted to take the risk. I was put in a small room and, after everyone else had gone home, the head doctor came to see me. I still remember his first question vividly:

"How can you be over 6 feet tall and weigh only 120 pounds?"

In the intelligent style that was to be my trademark throughout an illustrious Army career, I shrugged what passed for

my shoulders and mumbled something about having grown too fast.

"Do you think regular hours and a regular diet would put some fat on those bones?" asked the doctor.

Well, I knew Mother had already rented my room and bought a blue star for the front window, so I answered with an enthusiastic "maybe."

The United States was still losing the war at this point, and "maybe" was good enough for that jerk doctor who didn't recognize a basket case when he saw it. I was in the Army.

I was inducted at Ft. Sheridan, Ill., and issued clothes 2 sizes too big.

"You'll grow into them," said the supply sergeant. "You gotta. It's either that or death by malnutrition."

**A WEIGHTY MILITARY ISSUE**

That was my introduction to army sergeants, and I soon discovered he was typical of the breed. I never met one I liked. Almost 3 years later, when I made sergeant myself, I sewed on the stripes and thumbed my nose at every mirror I passed.

Anyway, I have to admit the doctor guessed right. I began putting on blubber my first day in service and haven't stopped since. Except when I diet, which makes me a miserable, cranky man who beats his children.

I am convinced that, had that doctor nixed me, I would still be a Slim Jim. I owe my figure to the Army and for that I can never forgive it.

The next war, I can just hear some doctor telling me I'm drafted because he's sure regular hours and meals will make me lose weight.



Youth from all over Tuscola County will gather the projects they have worked on during the winter months, John Wurm, Tuscola County Extension 4-H youth agent, said.


New this year, Wurm remarked, will be club displays put together to compete with other clubs in the county. Five clubs will be selected to receive honors for their displays. These

Never that he has reached the age when retirement is normal and to expect him not to retire is really what is not normal.

I always wonder, too, if the retiree will regret it a year down the road.

It scares me a little to feel that I might be like my predecessor, the late H. F. Lenzner, who worked until he was in his early 70's before selling out to me. A year after he quit he came into the office and offered to help in the back shop for free just to have something to do.

Come to think of it, Herb didn't like to do lawn work either.

**Public health official says**

**Flush pipes for lead-free water**

There's no need to panic over notices being issued by area municipalities regarding the presence of lead in drinking water, according to a Michigan Department of Public Health official.

Gagetown village officials recently issued such a notice, which states, in part, that "Sampling by the Michigan Department of Public Health has confirmed the presence of lead in drinking water from certain piping systems where the water has remained stagnant for a period of time. Levels in excess of the current drinking water standard (50 parts per billion) have been detected."

Michael Kovach, a reg-

ional engineer with the state health department's Division of Water Supply, says the notice is designed primarily to inform the public and is not aimed at individual communities.

Kovach explained that all municipalities in the United States are required to present the notices to residents by June 19, 1988, in compliance with a 1986 amendment to the Federal Safe Drinking Water Act.

The notices can be issued

in one of 3 ways—publishing in a newspaper, hand delivery or through direct mail, he said.

Kovach pointed out that the notice is based on independent water samples conducted by each state at both new and old buildings.

Some of the samples, particularly first-drawn samples (where the water was not allowed to run for a brief period prior to taking a sample) revealed higher than accepted levels of lead

in water, he said.

Kovach explained that lead was traced to 2 sources—lead piping and lead-based solders and fluxes used to join copper piping.

Although the installation of lead piping has not been allowed for potable water piping systems for the past decade, the use of lead solder with copper piping systems has been legal, he said, adding that an amendment to the state Plumbing Construction Code Act prohibiting its use is expected to be approved in May.

Kovach noted that higher levels of lead were found in connection with the copper piping systems. He stated that water, when stagnant for even a few hours in contact with lead solder and flux, can result in a significant concentration of lead.

However, he added, persons who believe they might be at risk can protect themselves.

"The most critical thing to do is let the water run for several minutes" after a lengthy period in which the water was allowed to stagnate. "I can almost guarantee you that if you take a sample after a good flush... it's going to be lead-free," he said.

The type of water involved also plays a factor, Kovach remarked, adding,

"Michigan waters have a tendency to be hard and scale forming. Typically what we've seen, as the piping ages with use, is there's a calcium deposit inside the pipe (which) prevents lead

from leaching out." Area residents who have concerns or questions on the topic can obtain additional information by contacting their local water department, Kovach said.

**Beef checkoff votes due**

Beef cattle, dairy and veal producers have until April 29 to obtain absentee ballots for the Beef Promotion and Research Act - the beef checkoff.

Any person who has produced and sold one or more head of cattle during the past year is eligible to vote.

Voters are being asked to approve a \$1 assessment for every head of livestock sold.

The bulk of the assessment would be used for consumer education, promotion and advertising, university research, producer education and market research.

Absentee ballots can be obtained from Steve Rust, Department of Animal Science, Michigan State University, East Lansing, MI 48824. Rust, an MSU Extension beef specialist, has been designated the state referendum coordinator.

Producers who vote by absentee ballot have until May 3 (before the close of the business day) to get their ballots to the MSU Cooperative Extension Service office in the county they reside in. The ballots may be mailed or delivered in person.

The absentee ballot vote and the May 10 in-person vote are being coordinated by the county Extension office, as required by the act. In-person voting will be conducted during business hours May 10 at all county Extension offices.

The ballots will be counted by the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

**KEEPING SECRETS** by Suzanne Somers (non-fiction).

Before the age of 21, actress Suzanne Somers had a baby, an abortion, a divorce, and had made a name for herself in the exciting world of cocktail-waitressing. Somehow, some way - through her arrest for bouncing rubber checks, through the horror of leaving her little son unattended before he was run over by a car, through a decade-long affair with Canadian TV star Alan Hamel - Somers made the big time, as dumb-blonde actress, poet, frequent guest on "The Tonight Show," nightclub star, and exploited nude Playboy model.

The first half of the story is set mainly in Masqat, the capital of the Sultanate of Oman, where 236 Americans are being held hostage by fanatical Arab terrorists. The hostages are rescued chiefly through the efforts of freshman congressman Evan Kendrick, whose background is perfect for undercover work in the Middle East and who has a personal vendetta to settle with the mastermind of the situation. Kendrick comes on like Indiana Jones; the tension is excruciating and violence rampant. The second half of the book takes place a year later in the U.S. Kendrick's exploits are leaked to the press, exposing him to a vengeful terrorist organization but also making him a national hero. A secret group of Washington power brokers manipulates Kendrick into political prominence and into the vice-presidency, meanwhile plotting the president's death. But a second group has different ideas.







## HEALTH TIPS

### Early detection key to breast cancer treatment

Breast cancer is the most common cancer among American women — about one of every 10 women will develop this disease sometime in her life. In 1987, an estimated 130,000 women were diagnosed with breast cancer in the U.S.

When breast cancer is detected early enough, there is a good chance it can be treated successfully. And early detection offers a woman more options for treatment.

Several techniques are available to help find breast cancer at an early stage, before it has spread to other parts of the body. One is for women to examine their own breasts. When done each month, breast self-examination helps to identify changes that might indicate a problem. Also important are regular breast examinations by health professionals who are qualified to detect changes in a woman's breast. If more women would have routine checkups by their doctors, there would be far fewer deaths — unnecessary deaths — from breast cancer.

A third, and the most effective, way of finding breast cancer early, even before it can be felt by hand, is mammography. A mammogram is a special breast X-ray that can detect very small changes that are typical of breast cancer. Mammography also can be used to identify benign (non-cancerous) breast changes.

Long-term studies have proven the benefit of mammography, together with a breast exam by a health professional, in reducing deaths from breast cancer. The National Cancer Institute encourages women with no symptoms of breast cancer to begin having mammograms every one to two years at the age of 40. After the age of 49, NCI recommends a mammogram every year.

The American Cancer Society now suggests that women between the ages of 35 and 40 who have no symptoms of disease nevertheless have a mammogram done to provide a baseline picture of their breasts. In addition to their immediate value as an early test for early cancer, the pictures are saved and compared with mammograms taken in the future.

Any woman who has had breast cancer should have an annual mammogram, regardless of age. A physician may also recommend annual mammography for a woman whose mother or sister has had breast cancer.

When a woman has a mammogram, the breast is positioned above a photographic plate and compressed firmly, so that the tissue is evenly distributed. Two images of each breast are taken and examined by a radiologist. If there are areas that seem suspicious, the woman will be referred to her physician for further assessment.

Mammograms are available in the radiology departments of most hospitals and many outpatient clinics and private medical offices. Usually, a referral from the woman's physician is required. The radiation dose of modern mammography equipment has been greatly reduced, so that the benefits of finding cancer early far outweigh the risk...and it is a very small risk...of exposure to radiation.

If you are over 40, regular mammograms make good sense. They should be a part of your regular medical check-up.

# Commissioners set to cut services

Tuscola County Commissioners were expected to begin sharpening their budget axe during Tuesday's regular board meeting.

Officials last week predicted that reduction or elimination of a number of county services, including the sheriff's road patrol, will become reality soon following voters' rejection April 5 of a county-wide mil-

lage request of 1.5 mills for 4 years.

Officials' surprise at the measure's defeat appeared to be equalled only by their puzzlement at some of the township vote totals.

A number of areas that have local police agencies (including Cass City, Caro and Reese), and thus would be least affected by elimination of the sheriff's road patrol, approved the measure. Several areas that would be left with little police protection if the road patrol were cut, meanwhile, defeated the millage.

Only about 15 percent of the county's 31,444 voters made it to the polls. The measure, defeated 2670-2042, was approved in only 6 townships. Among them was Elkland Township, which posted the largest margin of approval at 171-116.

Commissioner Kim D. Glaspie (D-Cass City) echoed the comments of other commissioners last

week, saying, "I was surprised. I knew it would be a close vote, but I remained optimistic that it would pass."

"Now, I guess we go to work and sharpen our pencil and make some cuts," he said. "Personally, my opinion is we gave the people the facts and said, 'You decide.' I think we have to stand behind our word."

Although commissioners have left the door open regarding another millage attempt in August, Glaspie said that question is secondary for the present.

MAIN CONCERN

"I'm sure we will come back sometime, but that's not the main concern right now. I think some cuts have to be made and the people decide if they want these cuts and want to maintain that situation. The main concern (now) is what we're going to do with what we've got."

Commissioners had planned to use the extra millage money (an estimated \$826,000 in 1989) to offset the loss of revenue due to the elimination of federal revenue sharing funds (\$500,000 annually) and declining property tax revenues because of falling land values. The county estimates a combined loss of \$626,000 in property taxes over a 3-year period beginning in 1987.

When commissioners approved a 1988 spending plan of \$5.69 million, including the budgeting of nearly \$1 million in reserve funds, they did so with the assumption that the millage would pass, Glaspie indicated.

With no additional monies expected now, he added, "I don't think the people of this county want us to spend all our reserves this year."

County Controller Michael Hoagland noted that a deficit of some \$957,048 is projected in the 1988 budget. Assuming the millage would pass, commissioners had planned to cover the deficit with all remaining banked federal revenue sharing funds (\$546,385), \$328,880 in delinquent tax revolving fund monies, \$66,769 from the Friend of the Court Fund

and \$15,014 in delinquent tax administration fees.

DEPENDENCE

Hoagland noted that the county's financial woes now and in the future are partly due to the fact that the county over the years has developed a strong dependence on funding sources that have either been eliminated, such as federal revenue sharing, or are declining, such as property tax revenue.

Developing a dependence on revenue from the county's delinquent tax revolving fund also is risky, he says, because that program is in jeopardy following questions raised last year by the Internal Revenue Service regarding the tax exempt status of county-issued General Obligation Limited tax notes.

Commissioners, meanwhile, will have to make some tough decisions with a projected deficit of \$700,000 to \$900,000 in 1989.

While expenses have steadily increased over the years, the county's property tax revenue next year is expected to total \$2.314 million, about the same as was collected in 1982.

"I can't name anything... that hasn't gone up in the last 24 years," board Chair-

man William Worth remarked last week, referring to the county's last operational millage increase in 1964.

Prior to last week's millage defeat, Tuscola County voters rejected 3 similar requests over the past 10 to 11 years. A request for 1.5 mills for 9 years was nixed by nearly 300 votes in 1985.

Worth stated that he isn't sure what specific cuts will be made, only that something will be done soon, regardless of whether the board decides to take the issue before voters again this year.

"Really, we all thought it (millage) was going to pass. It's really quite a defeat for us," he said, adding, "I assume there are going to be cuts before August."



Sampling by the Michigan Department of Public Health has confirmed the presence of lead in drinking water from certain piping systems where the water has remained stagnant for a period of time. Levels in excess of the current drinking water standard (50 parts per billion) have been detected. Laboratory testing has shown that the principal sources of lead are lead piping and lead based solders and fluxes used to join copper piping. Based on these results and those from other studies, the Michigan Department of Labor, Bureau of Construction Codes and the Michigan Department of Public Health have supported legislation which prohibits the use of lead based solders and fluxes in potable water piping systems. The plumbing industry and homeowners who may construct potable drinking water piping systems must no longer use lead based solders and fluxes for joining copper piping. Other solder materials or joining methods are available and must be used. Lead piping has not been allowed for new installations for about the last ten years. Building copper piping water systems constructed to date likely contain lead based solder and flux.

Water is the universal solvent and even relatively stable water when stagnant for a period of even a few hours in contact with lead solder and flux can result in a significant concentration of lead in the water. The health department is recommending that those piping systems in which the water has remained stagnant overnight or for longer periods be flushed for several minutes prior to using the water for drinking or cooking purposes. This typically has been found to satisfactorily reduce the level of lead and other metals that may concentrate in the water within the building's piping system.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly.

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greater risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:  
- if your home or water system has lead pipes, or  
- if your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and  
- if the home is less than five years old, or  
- if you have soft or acidic water, or  
- if water sits in the pipes for several hours.

Besides lead in water from certain piping systems, there are other exposure pathways to lead including:

air - from industrial discharges, automobile exhaust

food - from airborne deposition of lead on crops and lead solder seams in some food containers

nonfood items - lead based paint, dirt, solder, or any object containing lead

It should be noted that the major source of lead exposure and lead poisoning in the United States is due to children consuming lead based paint chips.

People who may have concerns about the concentration of lead from their building or household piping are advised to contact a reputable private laboratory for a water analysis. Others who may have specific concerns relative to any possible health effects are urged to contact their physician.



## Taking stock

Since this newspaper is not devoted to Child Rearing, let the reader be assured quickly that this column will later develop a financial angle to make it acceptable to the editor. Just be patient.

This child, whom we'll call Billy, was the first grandchild. His grandfather Alex had a background in teaching before his retirement. Indeed, he was so smart in fields of business and worked so little that he always seemed to be retired.

When the one and only grandson was 3 years old, Grandpa Alex started his tutoring. When he was 4, Billy could read, he could do figures and play gin rummy with his granddad. At 5 he started to school, in the third grade. When he was 8 years old he was in the fifth grade.

The rest of local school years he did one grade a year, and graduated with honors just before he was 16.

His parents thought that 16 was a little young to go to college.

"He ought to learn to shave first," said his father.

So what did they do but pack off this adolescent boy to Mt. McKinley National Park, near the Arctic Circle, in Alaska, where he became a full-fledged ranger a few days short of his 16th birthday. He was not only the youngest ranger in the National Park Service, but, at 105 pounds, the smallest.

Sourdough hotcakes and driving a dog team all winter combined to put 25 pounds and 5 inches in height on this pint-sized kid.

After a year of this, the boy was judged ready to go to college. When he graduated with a bachelor of science in journalism at Stanford he was not quite 20 years old.

Right at this point his father bought a county-seat weekly newspaper at Gladwin, Mich., following the editor's death. (In fact, he closed the deal before the funeral, whilst other eager buyers were standing by, politely, waiting for the final rites.)

The dewy-fresh graduate in journalism was given 2 days to unpack his clothes and see his old playmates in Michigan, and presto! he was plumped into the editor's chair to run the Gladwin County Record. The pay was \$15 a week, and included a primitive bedroom in the attic of the printing office. It made the log cabins in Alaska look good. They might not have had plumbing, but they did have stoves.

In 1933, \$15 a week went quite a ways. A \$5.50 meal ticket at Edge Wagar's restaurant cost \$5 and covered meals for 6 days. His lodging cost him nothing, about what it was worth, and a suit of clothes at Harry Goldberg's store was

\$25. Weekends he drove 30 miles to the next county and stayed with Aunt Jane and Uncle Charlie, took a bath and ate a lot, and played nickle-dime poker with Charlie and the neighbors Saturday night.

Two years of this and he moved on to the family's bigger paper downstate. He kept the quarter-interest he had in the Gladwin paper, and "bought in" one-twelfth interest in a bigger paper at Lapeer. Salary had gone up to \$35, by time of Pearl Harbor, but he also had a share of the profits at Lapeer and his original dig-ins back at Gladwin.

When he was married in 1936, he was 24 and had paid for his partnership shares and had enough to buy a house for \$6,500 for his bride.

Nowadays at age 24, most lads are still messing around in graduate school, trying to get a head of steam big enough to face the world.

Anyhow, at 24 here was Grandpa's Billy Boy, pretty well-established. The war occupied his talents for nearly 4 years and then he was back at the newspaper.

When he was 48 he retired, dabbled around part-time at the bank, and spent some time handling investments for an insurance company. Mostly, though, he ran a 34-foot Hatteras sports fisherman in Florida, pretending he was a fisherman.

Now we will get to the money angle of this autobiography.

These were the key factors en route to retiring at 48:

1. Early schooling. Grandpa Alex taught me the basics of the primary grades before I was 5. Playing rummy for money is as good a way as any of learning arithmetic.

2. By graduating at not quite 16 I had a year to earn money, to see another part of the world, to improve myself physically, and to earn enough money to pay for half my 4 years at Stanford. During college, I worked summers at Yosemite National Park.

3. In 1933 I was lucky, of course, to have a good job to step into, even though the pay was only \$15 a week. There was no lag time, no frittering around before I started producing.

4. Living modestly until Pearl Harbor enabled me to buy interests in 2 newspapers and to buy a house. In the war I lived even more modestly. An ensign's pay was \$125 a month.

5. After the war we lived on a little higher scale, traveled quite a bit, but saving kept its priority.

6. Fifteen years later I retired, and lived in Florida most of the time. There wasn't a pile of money but there was enough. Following the dictum of an old Greek philosopher, I found the simplest way to increase your income is to simplify your wants.

It has worked out pretty well. At this point I have been retired as many years as I worked -- 27 of each.

My spouse, whose pen name is Jennifer Birdsong, snorts, "Retired, indeed! Ha!"

Anyway, in this case, recited today, getting schooling out of the way early, working steadily and living modestly, has made a pretty good life out of it. If I went around the track again, I'd do it the same way.

that allowing students to transfer out of the district might jeopardize the district's eligibility, which is based on student numbers and state equalized valuation.

The board indicated it would consider the request in August, after more specific finance related figures become available.

### FINANCES

Kirby told board members that although the district is in a position to become an in-formula district, there are several "ifs" surrounding the question.

Even if it becomes in-formula, he said, the district is still facing a decline in property tax revenue, primarily due to steadily falling agricultural land values.

Based on preliminary figures, the Owen-Gage district has lost about \$4.7 million in SEV from 1987 to 1988, a decrease of some 14 percent. The estimate translates into the loss of nearly \$193,000 in tax revenue.

Assuming voters approve renewal of 15.5 mills for operation, the district's enrollment totals at least 334 and the SEV doesn't rise above the projected 1988 figure of \$28,695,714, the district will receive about \$67,236 in per-pupil state aid, Kirby explained.

He pointed out that with the state aid, the district would be facing a loss of about \$125,500 in tax revenue in 1988-89.

"It doesn't look that great, but it isn't really that dim yet," the superintendent remarked, adding that he's hopeful that fund equity carried over from the 1986-87 and 1987-88 budget years will cover the lost revenue.

Assuming the preliminary figures are accurate, the 14 percent decline in SEV means the district has lost more than 40 percent of its tax base since 1985, when the SEV of the land totaled \$47.88 million.

### MILLAGE

Kirby recommended, and the board approved, a motion to request renewal of 15.5 mills for 2 years at the annual school election slated for June 13.

If approved, the district would levy the maximum amount allowed by law—a total of 41 mills—for operations in 1988-89, the same as in 1987-88.

Asked if the millage would go toward teachers' salary increases, Kirby

stated that the district is required to pay increment hikes, but that no decisions have been made yet regarding other increases.

He pointed out that teachers, who currently are negotiating with school officials on a contract, are "understanding of the situation and they are willing to work with us."

In other business during the monthly meeting, the board:

—Approved recommendations of second year probation for English teacher Joanne Hopper and band and English instructor James Shippee, and third year probation for resource room special education teacher Sharon Krzyzaniak.

—Approved an annual tax anticipation borrowing resolution that authorizes Kirby to borrow \$580,000 for school operations in the 1988-89 school year.

—Okayed a 3-year lease at \$230 per month for a school car from McCormick Motors, Inc., Pigeon.

—Voted to continue participation in a snow blower/lawn mower program through Gettels, Inc., Sebawaing, at a total cost of about \$900 for the elementary and high schools.

—Approved nomination of Judy Campbell for the second consecutive year as the school's representative to the Thumb Meet of Champions.

—Accepted "with deep regret" the resignation of Julia Haag, a long-time teachers aide at the elementary school who plans to retire at the end of the school year.

—Approved Lloyd Fritz as the Student of the Month for March.

### GOOD FOOD

"It was just good food. My father was a great provider and my mother knew how to take care of it," she recalled, adding she was the third youngest among 9 brothers and one sister.

She and her siblings helped take care of the farm when their father died at the age of 63. Her mother died at 86.

Despite good memories, McPherson says living to be 100 also has its drawbacks.

With the exception of her adopted daughter, Betty, she has outlived much of her immediate family.

"There's nothing I can do for everyone, and that makes me feel bad," McPherson lamented. "I like to be doing for someone else."

McPherson enjoys reading the Bible and meditating during most days. She attends television church services at the home, and rarely turns down a chance to get outdoors for a ride or to eat out.

"When you tell her we're going out, she always gets her purse and is by the door

hours before the rest of us," Sister Josepha noted. "She loves to get out."

McPherson noted that she hasn't lost her taste for a good meal. "I love apples, but I like everything in the line of food," she added. ## Buying a home? Careful inspection is necessary





# Check, recheck measurements carefully



The first rule of a do-it-yourself project is to measure the space. Then, measure it again to make sure the measurements are correct. Professional craftsmen do this all the time. They're never content with just one measurement. When checking the dimensions of an opening, for example, they measure the top, middle and bottom.

with a button that locks the tape or rewinds it. A matte finish permits pencil marks, which may be wiped off easily.

Many of the better tapes have a swivel hook at the end. When taking measurements longer than arms length, use a piece of masking tape to anchor the hook at the edge to prevent slippage when measuring.

For accurate measurements up to six feet, the experts at Lufkin, manufacturers of measuring tapes and rules, suggest a wood folding rule. For more precise inside measurements, choose a type that has a sliding extension at one or both ends. To use it, unfold the rule to where it nearly stretches across the inside of the opening. Then, pull out the extension.

Do it yourselfers can also benefit from the short cuts developed by experienced craftsmen. For instance, when dividing the width of a board into equal parts, place the rule diagonally across the board so an even number lines up with one edge.



This illustration shows the 13-inch end of the rule on the right. The extension is pulled out to show 3 3/16-inches on the left. The width of the opening is 13-inches plus 3 3/16-inches or a total of 16 3/16-inches.

In the illustration, the rule's six-inch mark is aligned with the edge of a four-inch board. Pencil marks are made at the two- and four-inch positions to divide the board into three equal two-inch strips. The center would be at the three-inch point.

To determine the circumference of an object such as a pipe, pull the tape taut after wrapping it around the object. Align the two-inch mark with the spot on the tape where the circumference ends.

For measurements beyond the six foot range, use a good steel tape. Most professionals use one

## Making a wall system purchase

A variation on the bookcase theme, a wall system offers a multitude of functions. Available in the widest variety of finishes and woods, wall systems are the solution for people wanting ample storage and display space in one or more pieces of furniture.

As with any furniture, the purpose and potential location of the wall system you're looking at must be a major consideration when planning a purchase. A unit chosen for a family room might be more casual than one for a study or hall.

If an emergency came up and you had to evacuate your home, would you know what to do?

Each year, thousands of Americans find themselves in such a predicament as they flee from hurricanes, fire and other perils, says the Insurance Information Institute, and you ought to be prepared just in case you're ever in such a spot.

Do what you're asked to do. Your public officials want you and your family to be safe. That's why they are asking you to leave your home.

Fleeing from a fire or storm is very upsetting, and children and older people will need your assurance that everything will be all right. It's very important that you stay calm.

After everyone in your house is accounted for, gather up what you will take with you. If anyone in your family needs medication, take whatever supply of it you have.

If you have to spend some hours or a night in a public shelter, you will very likely be provided with food and blankets, but a prescribed medication may not be easily attainable.

For each of your family members, take only that clothing which is immediately necessary. Don't weigh yourself down with items that you probably will not need.

For example, it might be sensible for every family member to take a raincoat and boots if you're threatened by a torrential rainstorm and flood, but these items would be useless if you're running from a fire in the middle of July.

Also, take whatever important papers, such as mortgage deeds, insurance policies and bank books, you have in your home.

A lot of people keep their important documents in a safe deposit box in a bank, but there are usually papers at home that you haven't yet had a chance to put in the box, or which you refer to on a regular basis.

Even if you aren't worried about ever having to evacuate your home, you should keep these papers together in a folder or metal box.

Everyone in your family will have some prized possessions that he or she will want to take. Allowing a toddler to take along a favorite stuffed toy may help the child feel better, but there's no point in an adult's taking a television set or other relatively heavy object.

Before you leave, be sure you lock all the windows and doors.

Remember that your homeowner's insurance covers your possessions as well as your house, and tenant's insurance covers clothes, furniture and other items.

Once the threat of the hurricane or other peril is over, you'll be permitted to return to your home. At that point, you'll be able to assess any damage that has occurred and submit a claim to your insurance company.

What's important now is that you make certain that you have sufficient coverage on your home, car and other possessions. This is the time to call your insurance agent or company representative.

However, advance planning is always a help, so spend a few minutes thinking about what you would take with you, if you had to leave your home on very short notice.

Making a list of the items you'd take might save you some precious time if a hurricane or other danger should ever threaten your home.





# Landscaping ups value

Landscape trees and shrubs are one of the wisest investments you can make in your property, increasing its resale value by as much as 15 percent while adding beauty, privacy, shade, fruit and flowers.

Spring is the time when most people plant, when garden centers start filling up with old favorites and new varieties to titillate the imagination and pocketbook. Sadly, many people will spend good money on good trees and shrubs this spring, only to lose them through improper planting and cultivation.

You can avoid throwing your hard-earned money down a hole by following some simple rules. Here are 10 tips from Ross Daniels, Inc., makers of the Ross Root Feeder.

**1. Buy Wisely:** Landscape plants are a lifetime investment. Always buy from a reputable nursery or garden center where you can get professional advice and service.

**2. Choose the Spot Carefully:** A misplaced tree or shrub can become a liability later on and have to be relocated or even destroyed. A tree that overhangs the house will clog gutters with leaves every fall. Roots can invade drain fields, crack walks, and pierce founda-

tion walls causing expensive damage. Leave room behind foundation shrubs to paint, put up screens, etc.

**3. Visualize:** Place stakes in intended planting spots and look at them from several angles. They'll help you imagine how trees and shrubs will look after planting and as they mature.

**4. Prune For Balance:** With all woody plants, trim off any broken or twisted roots and the ends of large roots to encourage branching. The foliage of all woody plants except evergreens should be pruned by one quarter to one third at planting time. Too much top growth may demand more water than roots can supply at first. Check at the nursery about when and how much to prune.

**5. The All Important Hole:** A planting hole should be twice the width of a tree's rootball and as deep, but no deeper. Set the rootball on undisturbed soil or it will settle and end up lower than the general landscape. When refilling the hole, put the topsoil where it will do the most good — at the bottom — and subsoil closer to the top.

**6. Stake for Support:** Trees with trunks two or more inches in diameter should be supported with a pair of wooden stakes driven into the ground on either

side just beyond the rootball. Fasten with wire or rope and protect the trunk from abrasion with a section of old garden hose.

**7. Root Feed & Water:** Feed and water thoroughly after planting. A Ross Root Feeder can be used to inject water and a special tree and shrub starter solution directly into the soil. This will help reduce transplant shock while conserving water and promoting vigorous root growth. Ross also offers starter tablets which can be dropped directly into the planting hole.

**8. Wrap for Protection:** Tender bark is susceptible to sunburn and damage from gnawing rodents. Young trees should be protected with Ross Daniels Tree-Gard, a reusable flexible plastic wrap.

**9. Mulch for Water Retention:** Two to four inches of wood chips, pine bark or needles, grass clippings, or compost will keep moisture in, maintain even soil temperature, protect shallow-rooted plants and add nutrients to the soil as it decomposes. A planting hole should be twice the width of the rootball, and as deep, but no deeper. The bottom of the rootball should rest on undisturbed soil or the whole tree may sink below ground level. When refilling the hole, put topsoil at the bottom, poorer subsoil toward the top.

qualified borrowers, making interest rates extremely competitive, all local bankers agree. Interest rates vary from a low of 8 percent at one local institution for a one-year adjustable mortgage to as high as 11 1/2 percent for residential construction. Other loans are generally higher.

In addition there are savings available in the way repayments are made. One bank offers a bi-monthly payment schedule. Over the life of a \$75,000 loan, it was estimated that in 25 years, savings in interest could amount to \$38,000.

Over the years there has been a wide variation in the amount spent in the village for commercial additions. In 1986 no money was spent for new commercial buildings. In 1987 almost a million dollars was spent. While commercial building boomed in 1987, new residential did not. In 1986 \$638,000 was spent for new residential buildings and last year that figure dropped to \$370,000.

In all categories, zoning permits declined in 1987 over the previous year with 49 issued in '86 and 40 last year.

Oddly enough, the average cost of a new home declined slightly in 1987.

# Skylight popular

When people imagine a magazine's survey their dream house, many shows. A national poll of 2,700

house shoppers by *Builder*, a construction journal, showed skylights among interior features sought by consumers.

They also like fireplaces (except in Florida), upgraded carpeting, hardwood floors, bay windows, French doors and deadbolt locks.

"Singles and higher income buyers expect skylights and vaulted ceilings," the magazine said. "Natural light in the master bath appeals across the board." In another poll, kitchen skylights also ranked high.

To let more daylight stream through the roof opening, skylight makers such as Wasco Products have designed low-profile models with slim polymer frames. Old-fashioned bulky wood units can block out some light, says Bart Mosser, a skylight marketer.

To help you visualize skylit interiors, Wasco has published "Dream Rooms," a new pocket-sized pamphlet with full-color photos and a chart for picking the right size skylight.

## Check roof for leak signs

As sure as the sun shines on a cloudless day, a roof that's neglected is certain to create a headache.

The first signs of trouble may be a spot on the ceiling or wall after a heavy rain. Unless the condition is corrected, real trouble can be expected.

Chances are the problem may be minor, especially if the roof is less than ten years old. It may be a shingle that has come loose or has blown off in a storm and needs to be nailed down or replaced. Or, it could be faulty flashing that should be repaired. But, a roof of standard shingles that is 15 years old or older has seen its best days. In this case, reroofing is probably in order.

To check for leaks, go up in the attic with a flashlight and look for water spots on the underside of the roof and along the rafters. Outdoors, walk around the perimeter of the house with binoculars for a close up look at the condition of the roof. Look for cracked, curled or missing shingles.

If you spot them, call a professional roofing contractor who will conduct a thorough, on-the-roof inspection. He can tell you whether it's a case of repairs or reroofing. If it's the latter, remember to ask the contractor for his advice about color, design and longevity.

Asphalt shingles, for example, are the most widely used roofing in both new home construction and reroofing. They are atop four out of five American homes, says the Asphalt Roofing Manufacturers Association, because they are attractive, economical and durable.

## Novesta Town Hall

# Estimate restoration at \$12,000

The Novesta Township Hall in Deford will undergo a face-lift this summer.

Plans to repair and improve the structure have been slated in accordance with the wishes of township residents who approved the action during an annual meeting March 26, according to township Supervisor William C. O'Dell.

Township officials currently are seeking bids on the project, O'Dell said, adding that interested contractors, who must submit bids by May 1, can obtain additional information by contacting him at 872-2349.

The project, which will cost an estimated \$11,000 to \$12,000, will include removal of an existing upper story of the township hall


and installation of a gable roof, which will extend out from the front of the building with the support of 4, 10-inch diameter columns.

According to O'Dell, the work will not only enhance the appearance of the building, but also will save on maintenance costs. "We spend money every year" on roof repairs, he explained.

Although township officials aren't sure exactly when the township hall was built, old board minutes state that the structure was deeded to the township in April 1937. The first Township Board meeting at the hall was held April 10, 1937. Prior to that, board members met at various residences.
