## Althaver: new firm to bring more jobs

There will be more jobs in Cass City because of the joint venture between Walbro Corp. and AB Svenska of Sweden, Lambert Althaver, president and chief executive officer of Walbro, said this week.

Extra jobs will be in the 10's, Althaver said, and should be coming by the end of the year. "The big plus we have going for us in this venture," Althaver pointed out, "is that the products in the venture are sold to the same customers that Walbro has served for 35 years. They know us."

Last week a team from Walbro and 2 persons from Svenska hit the road to call on these customers. The joint venture products offered are ignition systems and other electronic and electromechanical devices.

Asked if the new products would be manufactured in the former Bauer Candy Building at the corner of Garfield and Doerr Road, Althaver said that the property wasn't purchased with that in mind, but it was reasonable to feel that it could be used for the new company.

## Cass City bank prexy resigns

Richard A. Gorz, chief executive officer of the Cass City State Bank, has resigned as an officer and director of the bank to pursue other interests, it was announced this week by officials of the company.

C. James Bess, president of the bank, has been named acting chief executive officer.

Gorz took over the management of the bank from Frederick Auten in June 1985. Under his direction the bank was reorganized and several key persons recruited, including Bess.

Also under his direction, a bank holding company, Community Financial Corporation (CFC), was formed to include banks in Bad Axe and Harbor Beach. A merger of the Peoples State Bank of Caro and the Cass City State Bank is nearing completion and the combined bank will be part of the holding company.

Bess stressed that this change has not yet been completed.

Gorz came to Cass City from the Key State Bank of Owosso. While directing the Cass City bank, he has served other banks in the area, including the Decker-ville State Bank.

Gorz has evidently been out of the community in recent days as numerous calls to his home in Cass City have not been answered.

## Cass City council votes to dump the (old) dump

Plans to sell an old village dump were approved by the Cass City Village Council during a monthly meeting Monday night.

The dump, bordered by the north and south branches of the Cass River about one mile south of town, will be put out on bids, which must be submitted by 3 p.m. Aug. 22.

Trustee Nat Tuttle, chairman of the council's Public Services Committee, recommended the sale.

Tuttle, who noted he, Trustee Elwyn Helwig and village Manager Lou S. LaPonsie visited the dump recently, told the council he's concerned about possible liability at the site. He referred to the dump as "an accident waiting to happen."

Village President L.E. Althaver stated the council years ago had discussed developing the dump site into a recreation facility. He and other councilmen agreed, however, that the section of river in question isn't suitable for such development.

The village purchased the dump for \$125 in 1907. The site hasn't been used in nearly 20 years.

In other business during the 45-minute regular meeting, the council learned that 2 road projects in Cass City have been recommended for approval by the Thumb Task Force.

The task force is made up of 2 representatives each from Tuscola, Huron and Sanilac counties, according to LaPonsie, who along with county highway engineer Robert Wellington are Tuscola County's representatives.

LaPonsie explained that the purpose of the task force is to recommend to the Michigan Transportation Commission the funding of eligible road and street projects on Federal Aid System routes (county roads that join communities). Communities were urged to submit a 5-year priority list, he said, adding that each of the 3 counties will be eligible to receive about \$1 million over the 5 years to fund the road projects.

Included in the list submitted by Tuscola County are 2 projects within the Cass City village limits. They are some 1,320 lineal feet of North Seeger Street from the north village limits south, and Doerr Road, from Garfield Avenue to Division Street (about 2,000 lineal feet). The Seeger Street project, LaPonsie noted, is the village's only Federal Aid System route. The Doerr Road project is not, but the criteria were waived because that road serves the village's industrial park, he said.

Total cost of the project is estimated at \$157,000, LaPonsie continued, adding that the village would be responsible for \$57,000 of the cost.

The council tabled the matter. Althaver said other road projects, requested by village residents, should be taken into consideration for funding next year, particularly because the village will be limited in such funding.

LaPonsie noted that one or both projects could be approved by the council, and it might be possible to approve and postpone the projects for one year.

In a related matter, the council acknowledged a petition from 17 Brooker Street residents requesting the village to install curb and gutter along Brooker Street.

Councilmen noted the project can't be done this year, but that the request will

be considered along with other road work in future discussions.

Also Monday, Althaver noted that the village's Industrial Park has been certified by the Michigan Department of Commerce.

Althaver said the recognition, received after weeks of effort by LaPonsie, means the park meets all commerce department specifications, and that the state recognizes and will encourage businesses planning to locate in the area to consider the industrial park.

## Satchel dies despite effort to resuscitate

The death of a Cass City area man, who was found lying face down in water near an irrigation pump inlet Monday morning, remained under investigation by the state police Tuesday.

Sgt. William Sholten of the Caro post said Michael F. Satchell, 45, 2647 E. Caro Rd., was found at about 10:30 a.m. by his father, Frank Satchell, near an inlet to the pump, located south of Dutcher Road and east of M-81.

Sholten said Michael Satchell had left the Satchell farm between 8:30 and 9 a.m. Monday to check a pump that had stopped the night before. His father went to check on him when he didn't return promptly. Attempts by state police and Caro EMS personnel to resuscitate Satchell were unsuccessful. He was pronounced dead at 12:10 p.m. The cause of death was unknown as of Tuesday morning.

## AIDS program studied

## School board okays Bible distribution

The Cass City School Board Monday night authorized the distribution of Bibles to fifth graders in the Cass City School District and took first steps towards the establishment of courses designed to study AIDS (acquired immune deficiency syndrome).

The board approved the distribution of the Bibles unanimously although there appeared to be tacit agreement that the distribution is illegal. Trustee Dick Wallace said that he doubted if anyone was going to jail for approving the distribution as he made the motion approving the distribution and the board members agreed that one single protest would result in the elimination of the distribution. Dan Allen, Gideon representative, ap-

peared before the board with letters from various churches and church members, but was cut short by Wallace, who said that the board had the facts from a previous meeting.

Supt. Ken Micklash said that he had reviewed other schools and all said that any protest would eliminate the Bible distribution program. He said an alternative within the law would be to send home flyers to parents and if the Bibles were requested, the Gideons could deliver them. Trustee Jim Turner said that he liked that idea, but it did not receive any more support. Several persons evidently in favor of the distribution attended the meeting to give support to the Gideon cause.

A lengthy communicable disease control policy is under study by the board and is expected to be adopted at the next regular meeting. Working in conjunction with the Tuscola County Health Department, the policy would establish guidelines for action if a student or staff members contact a disease that is a threat to the school population.

One of the important features of the new policy would be to establish a review panel to deal with persons who contact diseases not known to be spread by casual contact, including AIDS and Hepatitis B.

Any student or staff member that contacts one of the diseases will have the case decided by a panel with the right of a review of the decision.

Hopefully, Micklash said, we will not have any of these cases to decide. Of more immediate interest is the proposal to teach about AIDS as part of the school curriculum. Classes are suggested for grades 7 and 8,

grades 9 and 10 and 11 and 12.

Students will learn how AIDS is transmitted and how it is not transmitted in all classes. Students will be taught risk reduction techniques and high risk behaviors.

The curriculum will be taught in physical education classes for students in grades 7 and 8. The course for grades 9 and 10 and 11 and 12 will be taught throughout the year in connection with the ADEC program.

After meeting in a session closed to the press and public, the Cass City School Board voted, 5-1, to hire Dave Lovejoy to succeed Jacqueline Freiburger as Campbell Elementary principal. Voting against the appointment was Fred Matthews and abstaining was Dick Wallace.

Lovejoy is currently director of community education. Prior to that he taught in Cass City and Caro.

### OTHER BUSINESS

Two requests were heard for transfer from Deford School to Campbell Elementary School. One was granted, the other denied. By a 4 to 3 vote, the board granted a request that a twin son of the Mike Gilliams be

allowed to transfer. Last year the board allowed one of the twins to transfer because the parents felt that they would do better in separate classes. This year the transfer was approved for the second twin because they would not be together. The transfer was approved because of convenience to the parents who both work and because the student load in the grade to which the transfer was to be made was low enough to accommodate the request. There will be no added cost to the school district. Voting in favor were Dr. Ed Scollon, Ben Hobart, Wallace and Turner. Voting no were Beverley Auten, Fred Matthews and Allan Hartwick.

A request for Joshua Koepf to transfer to Campbell was denied because the student count there in his class is already large, with 30 students enrolled. Mrs. Koepf had requested the transfer because of problems that her son had encountered with a teacher in the system. Discussion revealed that the boy and several buddies who have presented discipline problems will be in different classes this year. While denying the request, the board granted permission for the youth to transfer to Campbell after the first marking period if problems persist.

Mrs. Koepf was not happy with this suggestion and asked to allow the boy to attend Caro School. This request was denied. It's not that I have anything against Deford School, Mrs. Koepf said. I've had 2 other children attend there. It's just that Josh is not doing well in the Deford situation and examiners have indicated that he is bright enough to do the work and we feel we must do something to solve. 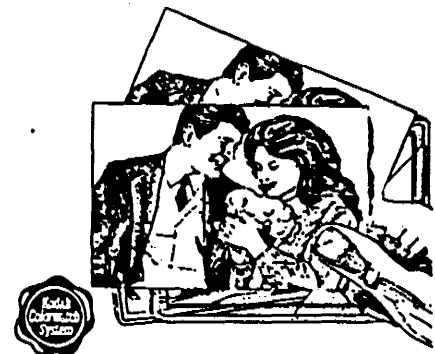

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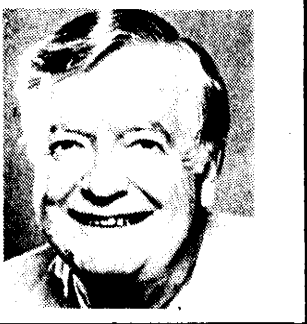
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**"If It Fitz..."**

Likewise, Iacocca doesn't need professional counseling on how to save corporations, make presidential decisions and get paid a million dollars per hour plus time-and-a-half for overtime.

But when Lee split up with Peggy on their way home from the wedding, he agreed to see a marriage counselor.

The point you thought I'd never get to is that it's com-

mon to all of us. Iacocca was no help. The Iacoccas divorced, and now Peggy is also wealthy enough to become a best-selling author. Maybe her book will reveal what his didn't — what the marriage counselor advised, and why the advice didn't work.

If I were a marriage counselor, I'd advise husbands to be cunning. For instance, last Friday my wife and I were scheduled to guide 6 out-of-towners to good food and entertainment in downtown Detroit. And the Pistons were scheduled to play basketball against the Celtics on TV.

"The spring grains of barley and oats, along with the new growth of second cutting hay, have been the most seriously affected as of to date," Bill Bortel, County Extension director said.

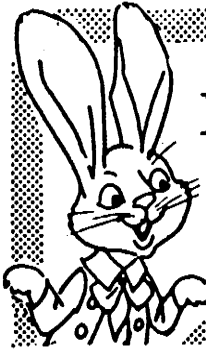
Planting of dry beans is at a critical period since many fields do not have sufficient moisture to germinate newly planted seeds.

There are not many options with the United States Department of Agriculture because the 1985 Food Security Act states that a farmer must have crop in-

surance protection to qualify for an emergency loan through FHA. Haying and grazing has already been approved on the set aside acres, following the filing of the drought distressed application.

The board, which will

continue to monitor the drought, is composed of representatives from the Soil Conservation Service, Farmers' Home Administration, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and the Cooperative Extension Service.

In our capitalistic system the customer is king nearly everywhere. The key word here is nearly. There are exceptions and one of them is the way our courts operate.

If you have been exposed to the system, as a defendant, plaintiff, member of a jury or witness, chances are great that you have been frustrated, inconvenienced or made downright mad by the treatment received.

Is there a juror anywhere who has not trudged dutifully to the courthouse only to be told that the trial was cancelled at the request of one of the lawyers?

Is there a witness anywhere who was called to the stand at a time convenient to him or her to make it easier to comply with the law of the land? Is there a witness anywhere who has not sat around all day only to be called back the next to spend his few minutes on the stand?

Sure there are times when such highhanded treatment is necessary, but when I find a court that bends over backwards to help the laymen in the courts rather than the professionals, it will be the first time.

This is a long standing pet peeve of mine and, judging by the comments heard, of the vast majority of others who have been called to court.

What brought it to mind was the Wheeler case. Details are in a story in this

issue. Now the judge has said that he made a mistake charging the jury and that the \$1.7 million jury judgement was void and the case needs to be tried again.

This case was tried in Federal District Court and took 3 1/2 weeks to try and included many, many trips to Detroit for the Wheelers.

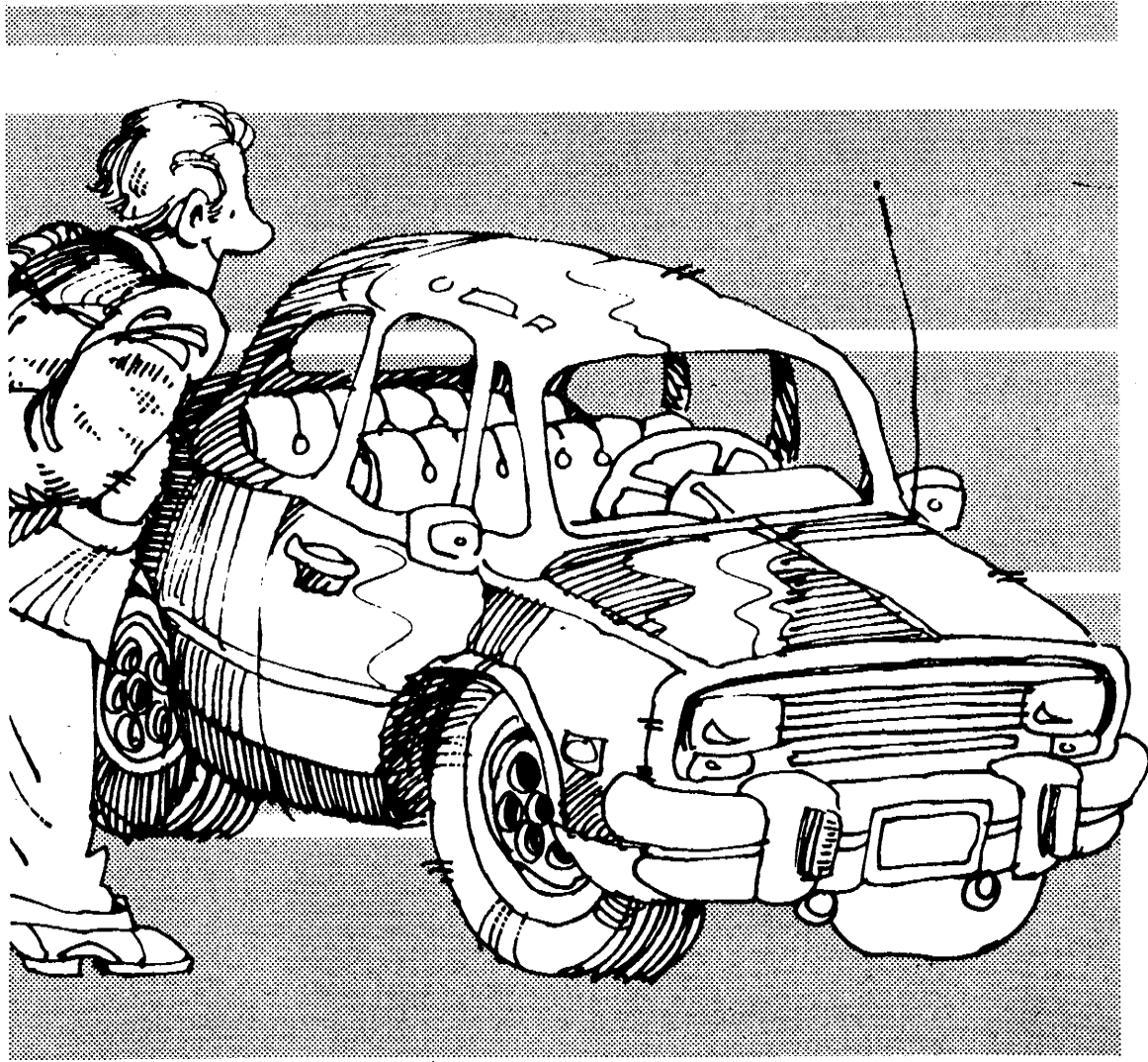
The judge says that he made a mistake when charging the jury and that is the reason he is saying that the verdict reached by the jury is void and the case must be tried again. Certainly it's proper to void a decision if it is necessary in fairness to both parties. Anyone can make a mistake.

My beef with all this is the reason that I say the courts are run for the pros, not the customers.

It was a year ago that the decision in Detroit was reached and it took this long for the judge to render a decision to void the verdict. Meanwhile the Wheelers wait in limbo.

If it were a normal customer-business relationship the businessman would be doing everything possible to atone for the error. Such as arranging the retrial in Sanilac county so that the long, inconvenient and expensive trips to court would not have to be borne again by the Wheelers who were not responsible for the error.

If you have been to court you know what the chances of having that happen are.

# Old Owendale depot to serve as a home

Friends of George and Audene Janssen know the couple loves antiques, so it probably came as no surprise when the pair decided to add to their collection.

The Janssens' latest purchase, however, is particularly unusual. And heavy. In fact, it's an area landmark rich with local history.

"This is the best antique I ever bought," George remarked Thursday morning. He smiled with anticipation

as he watched Anthes Brother Building Movers, Gagetown, move the old Owendale Depot into his store parking lot at the intersection of Elkton and Sebewaing roads.

The Janssens, whose party store is located about 4 1/2 miles east of Owendale, bought the depot and paid to have it moved from the village to a site some 300 feet behind their store.

"It's a beauty," George

said. "Every time I see it, I like it better and better. We're just like a couple of kids with a new toy."

The Janssens, who currently rent a home about 1 1/4 miles from their store, plan to live in the old depot with their youngest son, George Jr., 6.

Although used as a bank in recent years, the old depot played an important role in Owendale's early history.

According to an historical account of the village, written by Cass City resident Marilyn Peters, the railroad brought in mail and supplies as well as beet workers for fall harvesting. The book recalls a drayman, named Kitchen, who with his team of horses and wagon hauled supplies, including big boxes of unwrapped bread, to the grocery store from the depot in 1914.

Back then, Owendale had 4 passenger trains, 2 north and 2 south, with 3 or 4 coaches on each and 2 regular freight trains daily on the Grand Trunk line. The Michigan Central Railroad had 2 daily passenger trains and 2 freight trains daily.

## BUILT IN 1913

According to officials at the Grand Trunk Western Railroad Co., Detroit, the original Owendale depot was built in 1913 by the P.O. & N. Railroad Co. and used jointly with the Michigan Central Railroad until the structure was destroyed by fire Aug. 4, 1925.

The existing depot was built in 1927, just about the time the P.O. & N. Railroad Co. was consolidated into the Grand Trunk Western Railroad Co. Original cost of the building, which was taken out of service in 1961, was \$4,700.

"George has loved that building," Audene remarked. "Ten years ago he asked Mrs. (Grace) Esch if

she would sell the building, but she said it wasn't for sale."

Audene noted that Esch, a Sebewaing resident who owned the depot for some 25 years, had a change of heart earlier this year. "She called the first part of June," Audene recalled. "We got in there and we fell in love with it."

Although moving the structure, made of solid pine and weighing an estimated 100 tons, was a challenge, George said the toughest part was removing a bank safe, which was surrounded by a 4-foot wall of reinforced concrete.

He noted that he had planned to put the building further away from the road on 12 acres he owns behind his store, but said he changed his mind because of the structure's historical importance. "This should be where it can be seen," he added.

## NO CHANGE

"We're not going to change it," he continued, noting the structure's French Canadian-architecture, which is unusual for American depots.

The couple plans to put cabinets and bathroom fixtures in, but that's about all because the structure was refurbished, including new wiring, plumbing and ceilings, while occupied by the First of America Bank branch, which closed a few months ago.

## Senior citizen programs hurting, county board told

An increasing demand and fewer dollars for senior citizens services administered by the Human Development Commission has meant cuts in those programs, with more on the way if county millage proposals fail in August.

That was the message Mary Ann Vandemark, executive director of the HDC, had for the Tuscola County Board of Commissioners last week.

Vandemark, who asked for and received support from commissioners for an HDC budget request to be presented to the Region VII Area Agency on Aging, said the senior citizens' meal program budget has been reduced this year by about 25 percent. The cuts have included closing meal sites in Millington and Fairgrove, and reducing the kitchen staffs at the Mayville and Vassar kitchens.

Despite those reductions, further program cuts, including those involving the delivered meals program, are certain if voters don't approve senior millage, she warned.

Vandemark said a monthly average of 5,000 meals have been delivered in the county since October. The HDC has reduced that figure to about 3,000 per month, with plans to further cut the figure to 2,000 per month during the current fiscal year, which ends Sept. 30.

Although Vandemark said seniors in dire need of the meals program will be served, she noted that the demand for the program isn't being met. HDC officials have and continue to look at ways to reduce the number of clients by finding alternative resources for some.

A major problem, Vandemark explained, is dwindle-

ding county funding. Tuscola County voters defeated a special millage request for senior services in November 1986, she noted, adding the county's contribution for senior services has gone from \$135,000 in 1985-86, to \$75,000 in 1986-87, to \$50,000 in 1987-88. The same figures for the tri-county (Tuscola, Huron and Sanilac) area combined are, in order, \$240,000, \$180,000 and \$150,000.

## IN OTHER BUSINESS

In other business during the June 14 regular meeting, commissioners approved reinstating a County Investment Committee, to be composed of the board chairman, Finance Committee chairman and county treasurer, with the county controller to serve as recording secretary (non-voting).

The purpose of the committee will be to evaluate current investment practices, implement an investment report summarizing current investments, and develop an investment policy identifying types of investments permitted and where funds can be invested. The treasurer's role in day to day investment responsibilities also will be defined.

The county previously had an investment committee in place from 1968 to 1984.

Also last week, the board approved annexation of land to the village of Caro. The parcel, which totals about 16 acres and is located at the intersection of Romain

Road and M-81, was purchased last year by Carp River Associates, Lapeer, which plans to develop apartments at the site.

A resolution extending the county's gratitude for more than 30 years of service from the late Ann Sattelberg, who died unexpectedly last month at the age of 49, was approved. Sattelberg served most recently as county register of deeds.

The board also approved application by the County Health Department for an Adolescent Health Planning Grant; gave the sheriff permission to install extra wire along the top of the inside security fence and along a portion of the jail roof; and authorized the board chairman to sign a letter involving a "table top disaster exercise." County Controller Michael Hoagland said the exercise is a plan of action designed to prepare emergency services officials for an emergency.

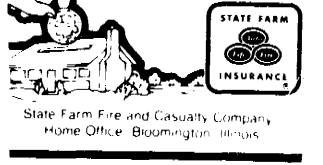

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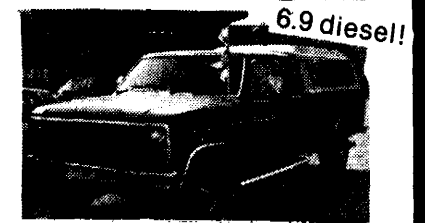
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## Root graduates from Air Force training

## HEALTH TIPS

### Everyone should know and understand cholesterol level

Who hasn't discovered, after waiting for a medical technician to draw a blood sample, that the anticipation was worse than the brief sting?

Tests such as this are likely to become even more commonplace in our lives.

Growing evidence points to high levels of cholesterol in the blood and to uncontrolled diabetes as causes of heart disease. Screening large numbers of people for these 2 conditions can help save lives.

Testing the blood for cholesterol and glucose (sugar) usually is done by drawing blood from a vein in the arm. Finger-stick tests -- faster, simpler, less traumatic and easier for younger patients and people with hard-to-find veins -- also can be used for both conditions. (Finger-stick tests for cholesterol are still being evaluated, but show considerable promise.)

I cannot overemphasize the importance, particularly for those approaching middle age, of having the

levels of both blood glucose and cholesterol checked. The normal, fasting blood sugar level for an adult is below 115 mg/dl; for a child it is less than 130 mg/dl. For adults, high-risk blood cholesterol levels are 240 mg/dl or above and physicians view people with cholesterol levels of 200 or higher as being at moderate risk and in need of dietary modification.

#### High Blood Sugar and Cholesterol Can Both Lead to Heart Disease

An estimated 12 million Americans, or nearly one in every 20, have diabetes. About one million of these people have insulin-dependent diabetes and must take daily injections of insulin to control it.

Far more prevalent is non-insulin-dependent diabetes, which usually first appears in middle age. Experts believe that about 10 million people have this, and 5 million of them don't even know it. These people are generally over age 40, are overweight and have a family history of diabetes.

Another 40 million Americans have dangerously high levels of cholesterol in their blood, but no symptoms yet of heart disease.

Each year heart disease kills some 540,000 people.

Frequently, diabetes is an underlying cause of death from heart disease. One study found that about 60 percent of diabetes-related deaths involved heart attack and 25 percent stroke.

#### New Regimen Even Unclogs Arteries in Some Cases

Controlling cholesterol and lipids is emerging as one of the most significant ways to reduce the clogging of arteries that causes heart disease.

Recent evidence of this has come from David H. Blankenhorn, M.D., director of the Atherosclerosis Research Institute and professor of medicine, and his colleagues at the University of Southern California School of Medicine, Los Angeles. They studied men who had had coronary bypass operations to improve blood flow to the heart -- flow that had been impeded by clogged arteries. They found that aggressively lowering blood cholesterol with a diet low in saturated fat and cholesterol plus the drug colestipol (Colestid Granules, Upjohn) and therapeutic doses of the vitamin niacin reversed or retarded further clogging of arteries in some of the men. (Niacin supplements, however, must be used with careful blood sugar monitoring by people with diabetes.)

Although diabetes is a disease in which people can't properly use the sugar they eat, a growing body of scientific research is showing that diabetes also affects the chemistry of the lipoproteins, also known simply as lipids (fats), that circulate in the blood. Uncontrolled diabetes is associated with lipid abnormalities believed to lead to heart disease in non-diabetic individuals.

Traditionally, treatment of diabetes has focused on controlling the level of glucose in the blood. But Henry N. Ginsberg, M.D., associate professor of medicine, Columbia University College of Physi-

cians and Surgeons, New York City, recently analyzed the research results from many scientific studies in this area and concluded that both blood glucose and lipids must be controlled in treating diabetes.

Quality care for diabetes mandates controlling lipid abnormalities as well as blood glucose levels, Ralph DeFronzo, M.D., associate professor of medicine at Yale University, New Haven, Conn., told a recent national meeting of the American Diabetes Association. In the past, treatment often was so focused on blood sugar levels that cholesterol and other lipids were ignored, he said.

For most people, the primary treatment for both high blood cholesterol and non-insulin-dependent diabetes is simple, inexpensive and effective: diet, weight normalization and exercise. Only if this approach is unsuccessful does it become necessary to resort to medications.

#### The Greatest Obstacle: Getting People to Diet and Exercise

The difficulty lies in convincing the patient to adopt a diet lower in sugar, saturated fats and cholesterol, to lose weight (which is particularly important for non-insulin-dependent diabetes) and to exercise. Estimates vary, but some medical specialists treating people found to have high cholesterol levels report that only one out of every 4 patients follows the dietary treatment program they outline. Compliance may increase if the patient already has had a heart attack.

For example, Najam Wasty, M.D., who is assistant director of the Cardiac Arrhythmia Service at Beth Israel Medical Center in Newark, N.J., said at the recent national meeting of the American College of Cardiology that he would be happy if one in 4 patients followed dietary instructions. He said most patients look forward to receiving a drug, believing they won't have to modify their life styles.

From my point of view as a scientist who has devoted most of his career to the study of cholesterol and lipids and their relationship to heart disease, this is most unfortunate. However, my hope is that if we continue to educate both health care professionals and the public about the effect that reducing blood cholesterol can have on heart disease for people with and without diabetes, we will begin to see a change.

I think with the wide availability of the finger-stick tests for blood glucose and cholesterol and additional education, we will see more and more people being tested. Further, this new approach should encourage screening of younger-age people, including children. Really long-term early intervention may prove most effective as a preventive and protective measure.

Just as people have learned in recent years that they should have their blood pressure taken and understand what the reading means, I hope the day will come when everyone has his or her cholesterol tested and knows the result.

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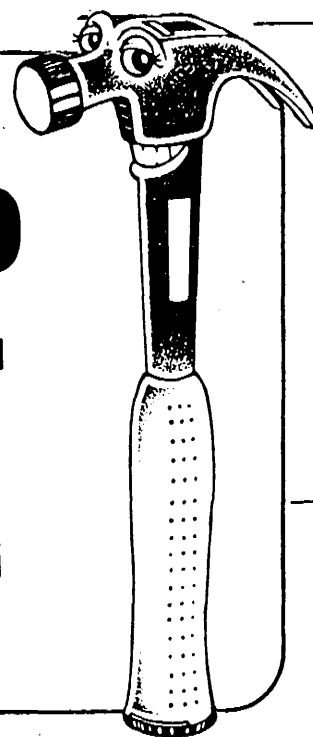
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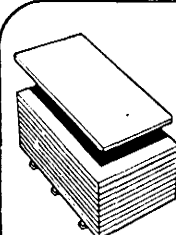
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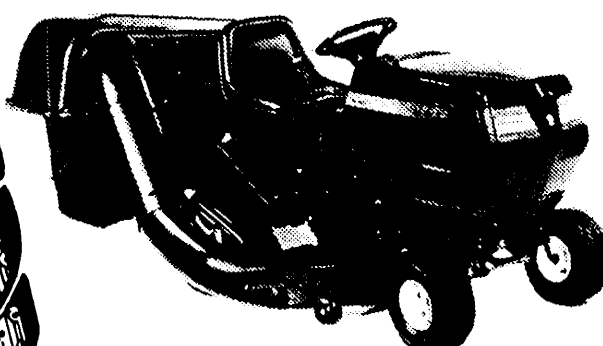
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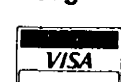
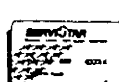
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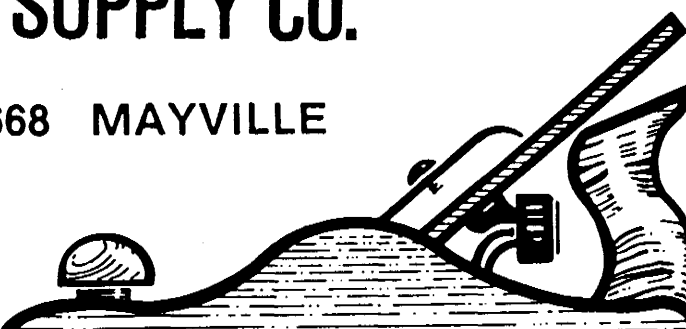

## New books at the library

THE SPY IN QUESTION by Tim Sebastian (fiction). This story begins in wintry, forbidding Moscow, a city full of spies, counteragents and distrust. It's 1990, and Dmitry Kalyagin is about to attain membership in Gorbachev's politburo when his long-dormant status as a "mole" for the British is suddenly reactivated. English intelligence man George Parker, feeling indebted to Kalyagin, begins a covert effort to pull the agent out before his Soviet counterparts discover the traitor's identity. But as the body count starts to rise, Parker's attempts to protect Kalyagin are hampered by both Russian ruthlessness and British indifference. Parker's dogged persistence and Kalyagin's increasing desperation lead to a climactic showdown in the Moscow streets between 2 networks of spies.

QUINN'S BOOK by William Kennedy (fiction). Daniel Quinn, America's foremost Civil War reporter, recalls his adolescent years in and around Albany, New York, and his 15-year pursuit of the mysterious Maud Fallon, a theater star world-renowned for her nude interpretations of Byron and Keats. Quinn has a newsman's eye for detail, and history buffs will enjoy his accounts of the anti-draft riots, the underground railroad, and Saratoga racing in its heyday. However, as in the rest of the "Albany cycle," real people and events take on an almost mythological significance.

"E" IS FOR EVIDENCE by Sue Grafton (mystery). Private eye, Kinsey Milhone, is unwittingly setup to take a fall in an insurance scam. Before charges can be brought against her, she investigates the human muck that lies ominously in the past of a wealthy family. Kinsey untangles the web of deceit and perversion, thus exonerating herself and fingering a mad bomber who almost does her in for good.



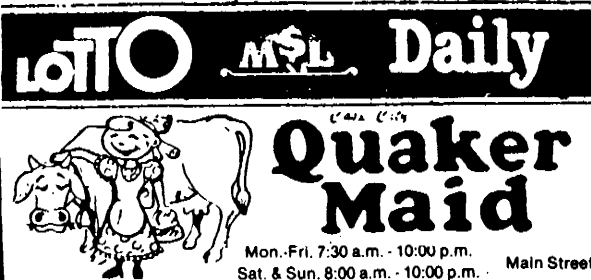

# Principal's raise, budgets approved

The Cass City School Board adopted a revised budget for the current school year and a tentative budget for 1988-89, granted Principal Russ Bieffer a contract extension with a 5 percent raise and accepted bids for reinsulation of pipes after asbestos removal, at its regular session Monday night at the high school.

Highlight of the budget was an increase from the previously estimated fund balance of \$50,000 to \$92,000 as the estimated deficit this year is now \$247,834 instead of \$289,501.

The budget for the next school year is required to be presented now by law, but is for the most part an extension of the current budget. It will be revised when revenues of the school are more clearly defined. Enrollment and state aid are unknown at this time as are costs for instruction at the school and the teachers are in the midst of negotiations of a new contract.

Despite a projected increase in employee wages and other costs, Supt. Ken Micklash is projecting that total expenditures will be less in 1988-89 than they are this year. That's because of reduction in the teaching staff and the elimination of an assistant principal due to a decrease in enrollment.

When Micklash and High School Principal Bieffer were hired, it was decided by the board to review their contracts at the end of the current school year. The review was held at the meeting. Bieffer was granted a 5 percent raise from \$42,500 to \$44,625 and his contract extended for 2 years.

The board appeared ready to grant Micklash an increase in salary while ex-

tending his contract to the normal 3-year pact that the superintendent works under.

However, Micklash, who earns \$49,500 yearly and receives car expense, said that he was not seeking a raise. We decided in January to review these contracts now and the normal contract extension with the yearly salary review is the only action requested. I'm happy with what I'm getting, he said. The board quickly acted on his recommendation.

Four bids were received for rewiring pipes at the 4 schools in the district. Low bid that was accepted was from AAA Insulators of Bay City for \$13,295. The bids ranged from that low to a top

bid of \$20,700.

### QUOTE REJECTED

Two quotations for service of band instruments owned by the school were received. Rejected was Kohn Music Store's low quote of \$647.50, about 11.9 percent under the quote of Marshall Music Co. of Lansing, which was \$735. Band Director George Bushong said that he had some unfavorable experience with Kohn when repairing privately owned instruments. Bushong said that he has been dealing with Marshall and its predecessor for 17 years.
