Althaver: new firm to bring more jobs

There will be more jobs in Cass City because of the joint venture between Walbro Corp. and AB Svenska of Sweden, Lambert Althaver, president and chief executive officer of Walbro, said this week.

Extra jobs will be in the 10's, Althaver said, and should be coming by the end of the year. "The big plus we have going for us in this venture," Althaver pointed out, "is that the products in the venture are sold to the same customers that Walbro has served for 35 years. They know us.'

Last week a team from Walbro and 2 persons from Svenska hit the road to call on these customers. The joint venture products offered are ignition systems and other electronic and electromechanical devices.

Asked if the new products would be manufactured in the former Bauer Candy Building at the corner of Garfield and Doerr Road, Althaver said that the property wasn't purchased with that in mind, but it was reasonable to feel that it could be used for the new com-

CASS CITY VILLAGE President L. E. Althaver Monday accepted a plaque on behalf of the village signifying that Cass City's Industrial Park has been certified by the Michigan Department of Commerce.

Carolyn Towsley, a site specialist with the commerce department, made the presentation. Cass City council votes

to dump the (old) dump Plans to sell an old village dump were approved by the Cass City Village Council

Monday night. north and south branches of the Cass River about one mile south of town, will be put out on bids, which must be submitted by 3 p.m. Aug.

Trustee Nat Tuttle, chairman of the council's Public Services Committee, recommended the sale.

Tuttle, who noted he, Trustee Elwyn Helwig and village Manager Lou S. LaPonsie visited the dump recently, told the council he's concerned about possible liability at the site. He referred to the dump as "an accident waiting to hap-

Village President L.E. Althaver stated the council years ago had discussed developing the dump site into a recreation facility. He and other councilmen agreed, however, that the section of river in question isn't suitable for such devel-

opment. The village purchased the dump for \$125 in 1907. The site hasn't been used in nearly 20 years.

In other business during the 45-minute regular meeting, the council learned that 2 road projects in Cass City have been recommended for approval by the Thumb Task Force.

The task force is made up of 2 representatives each from Tuscola, Huron and Sanilac counties, according to LaPonsie, who along with county highway engineer Robert Wellington are Tuscola County's representa-

LaPonsie explained that the purpose of the task force is to recommend to the Michigan Transportation Commission the funding of eligible road and street projects on Federal Aid System routes (county roads that join communities). Communities were urged to submit a 5-year priority list, he said, adding that each of the 3 counties will be eligible to receive about \$1 million over the 5 years to fund the road projects.

Included in the list submitted by Tuscola County are 2 projects within the Cass City during a monthly meeting village limits. They are some 1,320 lineal feet of The dump, bordered by the North Seeger Street from the north village limits south, and Doerr Road, from

Garfield Avenue to Division Street (about 2,000 lineal feet). The Seeger Street project, LaPonsie noted, is the village's only Federal Aid System route. The Doerr Road project is not, but the criteria were waived because that road serves the village's industrial park, he

said. Total cost of the project is estimated at \$157,000, LaPonsie continued, adding that the village would be responsible for \$57,000 of the cost.

The council tabled the matter. Althaver said other road projects, requested by village residents, should be taken into consideration for funding next year, particularly because the village will

be limited in such funding. LaPonsie noted that one or both projects could be approved by the council, and it might be possible to approve and postpone the projects for

one year. In a related matter, the council acknowledged a petition from 17 Brooker Street residents requesting the village to install curb and

gutter along Brooker Street. Councilmen noted the project can't be done this year, but that the request will be considered along with other road work in future discussions.

Also Monday, Althaver fied by the Michigan Department of Commerce.

Althaver said the recognition, received after weeks of effort by LaPonsie, means the park meets all commerce department specifications, and that the state recognizes and will encourage businesses planning to locate in the area to consider the industrial park.

ol board okays Bible distribution

The Cass City School peared before the board Board Monday night authorized the distribution of Bibles to fifth graders in the Cass City School District and took first steps towards the establishment of courses designed to study AIDS (acquired immune defi-

ciency syndrome). The board approved the distribution of the Bibles unanimously although there appeared to be tacit agreement that the distribution is illegal. Trustee Dick Wallace said that he doubted if anyone was going to jail for approving the distribution as he made the motion approving the distribution and the board members agreed that one single protest would result in the elimination of the distribution. Dan Allen,

with letters from various churches and church members, but was cut short by Wallace, who said that the board had the facts from a previous meeting. Supt. Ken Micklash said

that he had reviewed other schools and all said that any protest would eliminate the Bible distribution program. He said an alternative within the law would be to send home flyers to parents and if the Bibles were requested, the Gideons could deliver them. Trustee Jim Turner said that he liked that idea, but it did not receive any more support. Several persons evidently in favor of the distribution attended the meeting to give support to the Gideon cause.

A lengthy communicable disease control policy is under study by the board and is expected to be adopted at the next regular meeting. One of the important features of the new policy would be to establish a review panel to deal with persons who contact diseases not known to be spread by casual contact, including

AIDS and Hepatitis B. Any student or staff member that contacts one of the diseases will have the case decided by a panel with the right of a review of the deci-

Hopefully, Micklash said, we will not have any of these cases to decide. Of more immediate interest is the proposal to teach about AIDS as part of the school curriculum. Classes are suggested for grades 7 and 8,

grades 9 and 10 and 11 and

Students will learn how AIDS is transmitted and how it is not transmitted in all classes. Students will be taught risk reduction techniques and high risk behav-

The curriculum will be taught in physical education classes for students in grades 7 and 8. The course for grades 9 and 10 and 11 and 12 will be taught throughout the year in connection with the ADEC program.

After meeting in a session closed to the press and public, the Cass City School Board voted, 5-1, to hire Dave Lovejoy to succeed Jacqueline Freiburger as Campbell Elementary principal. Voting against the appointment was Fred Matthews and abstaining was Dick Wallace.

Old Owendale depot to serve as a home

Friends of George and as he watched Anthes Audene Janssen know the couple loves antiques, so it probably came as no surprise when the pair decided to add to their collection.

The Janssen's latest purchase, however, is particularly unusual. And heavy. In fact, it's an area landmark rich with local history.

"This is the best antique I ever bought," George remarked Thursday morning. He smiled with anticipation

Brother Building Movers, Gagetown, move the old Owendale Depot into his store parking lot at the intersection of Elkton and Sebewaing roads.

The Janssens, whose party store is located about 4 1/2 miles east of Owendale, bought the depot and paid to have it moved from the village to a site some 300 feet behind their store.

"It's a beauty," George

said. "Every time I see it, I she would sell the building, We're just like a couple of kids with a new toy.

The Janssens, who currently rent a home about 1 1/ 4 miles from their store, plan to live in the old depot with their youngest son, George Jr., 6.

Although used as a bank in recent years, the old depot played an important role in Owendale's early history.

According to an historical

account of the village, written by Cass City resident Marilyn Peters, the railroad brought in mail and supplies as well as beet workers for fall harvesting. The book recalls a drayman, named Kitchen, who with his team of horses and wagon hauled supplies, including big boxes of unwrapped bread, to the grocery store from the depot in 1914. Back then, Owendale had 4 passenger trains, 2 north and 2 south, with 3 or 4 coaches on each and 2 regular freight trains daily on the Grand Trunk line. The Michigan Central Railroad had 2 daily passenger trains and 2 freight trains daily.

BUILT IN 1913

According to officials at the Grand Trunk Western Railroad Co., Detroit, the original Owendale depot was built in 1913 by the P.O. & N. Railroad Co. and used jointly with the Michigan Central Railroad until the structure was destroyed by fire Aug. 4, 1925.

The existing depot was built in 1927, just about the time the P.O. & N. Railroad Co. was consolidated into the Grand Trunk Western Railroad Co. Original cost of the building, which was taken out of service in 1961, was \$4,700.

Although moving the structure, made of solid pine and weighing an estimated 100 tons, was a challenge, George said the toughest part was removing a bank safe, which was surrounded by a 4-foot wall of reinforced concrete. noted that he had planned to put the building further away from the road on 12 acres he owns behind his store, but said he changed his mind because of the structure's historical impor-""This should be tance. where it can be seen," he

"We're not going to change it," he continued, noting the structure's French Canadian-architecture, which is unusual for American depots.

The couple plans to put cabinets and bathroom fixtures in, but that's about all because the structure was refurbished, including new wiring, plumbing and ceilings, while occupied by the First of America Bank branch, which closed a few months ago.

"This year we're going to concentrate on landscaping. Next year I'm going to concentrate on painting it," George said, adding he plans to restore the original loading dock on the depot, which has 2 bathrooms, 2 bedrooms, a living room and a kitchen.





Each year heart disease kills some 540,000 people. Frequently, diabetes is an underlying cause of death from heart disease.

One study found that about 60 percent of diabetes-related deaths involved heart attack and 25 percent stroke.

New Regimen Even Unclogs Arteries in Some Cases

Controlling cholesterol and lipids is emerging as one of the most significant ways to reduce the clogging of arteries that causes heart disease.

Recent evidence of this has come from David H. Blankenhorn, M.D., director of the Atherosclerosis Research Institute and professor of medicine, and his colleagues at the University of Southern California School of Medicine, Los Angeles. They studied men who had had coronary bypass operations to im-prove blood flow to the heart -- flow that had been impeded by clogged arteries. They found that aggressively lowering blood cholesterol with a diet low in saturated fat and cholesterol plus the drug colestipol (Colestid Granules, Upjohn) and therapeutic doses of the vitamin niacin reversed or retarded further clogging of arteries in some of the men. (Niacin supplements, however, must be used with careful blood sugar monitoring by people with diabetes.)

Although diabetes is a disease in which people can't properly use the sugar they eat, a growing body of scientific research is showing that diabetes also affects the chemistry of the lipoproteins, also known simply as lipids (fats), that circulate in the blood. Uncontrolled diabetes is associated with lipid abnormalities believed to lead to heart disease in nondiabetic individuals.

Traditionally, treatment of diabetes has focused on controlling the level of glucose in the blood. But Henry N. Ginsberg, M.D., asversity College of Physicians and Surgeons, New York City, recently analyzed the research results from many scientific studies in this area and concluded that both blood glucose and lipids must be controlled in treating diabetes.

Quality care for diabetes mandates controlling lipid abnormalities as well as blood glucose levels, Ralph DeFronzo, M.D., associate professor of medicine at Yale University, New Haven, Conn., told a recent national meeting of the American Diabetes Association. In the past, treatment often was so focused on blood sugar levels that cholesterol and other lipids were ignored, he said.

For most people, the primary treatment for both high blood cholesterol and non - insulin - dependent diabetes is simple, inexpensive and effective: diet, weight normalization and exercise. Only if this approach is unsuccessful does it become necessary to resort to medications

The Greatest Obstacle: Getting People to Diet and Exer-

The difficulty lies in convincing the patient to adopt a diet lower in sugar, saturated fats and cholesterol, to lose weight (which is particularly important for noninsulin-dependent diabetes) and to exercise. Estimates vary, but some medical specialists treating people found to have high cholesterol levels report that only one out of every 4 patients follows the dietary treatment program they outline. Compliance may increase if the patient at ready has had a heart at

For example, Najam Wasty, M.D., who is assistant director of the Cardiac Arrhythmia Service at Beth Israel Medical Center in Newark, N.J., said at the recent national meeting of the American College of Cardiology that he would be happy if one in 4 patients followed dietary instruc-tions. He said most patients look forward to receiving a drug, believing they won't have to modify their life styles.

From my point of view as a scientist who has devoted most of his career to the study of cholesterol and lipids and their relationship to heart disease, this is most unfortunate. However, my hope is that if we continue to educate both health care professionals and the public about the effect that reducing blood cholesterol can have on heart disease for people with and without diabetes. we will begin to see a change.

I think with the wide availability of the finger-stick tests for blood glucose and cholesterol and additional education, we will see more and more people being tested. Further, this new approach should encourage screening of younger-age people, including children. Really long-term early intervention may prove most effective as a preventive and protective measure.





Cass City Shriners share bond with former area woman

News Editor

Former area resident Lynn Wilson doesn't know the 7 Cass City men who spent a full day June 10 collecting money at the intersection of Seeger and Main streets.

The men, all members of the Elf Khurafeh Temple, were taking part in the Shriners' annual paper sales event, collecting donations which are used to pay all medical expenses for thousands of crippled and burned children.

Still, Wilson, a Deckerville native, and the local Shriners share a special

That bond is Wilson's daughter, Jennifer, a petite 4-year-old whose smile could light up a room, and whose dark brown eyes communicate more than her limited vocabulary is capable of.

Despite her vibrant personality, Jennifer, who lives with her mother in Sarasota, Fla., is unlike many "nor-mal" children her age. She is a victim of cerebral palsy, a condition characterized by

paralysis, weakness, incoordination and other motor function aberrations.

The condition is caused by injury to the brain, usually at the time of birth. In Jennifer's case, a slow heartbeat and low blood sugar are believed to have contributed to her condition, which has resulted in the child's confinement to a special chair. Despite her age, Jennifer, who was born 2 months premature after a difficult pregnancy, has already had eye and hip surgery.

Wilson, who recently visited family members in the Cass City area, including her mother, Frances Reinelt, who owns the Eat Shop in town, and her sister, Lugene Kruse, says the Shriners have made dealing with Jennifer's condition a little easier.

"She's always been in contact with the Shriners" in one way or another. "They're always right there," Wilson remarked.

Jennifer was diagnosed with cerebral palsy at the age of 10 months, she began to see doctors through a state funded program called Children's Medical Serv-

ices. At 1 1/2 years, Jennifer began receiving speech, physical and occupational therapy at the Easter Seals Happiness House in Bradenton, Fla. She's still receiving therapy at that facility. Although Jennifer's treat-

ment to that point did not directly involve the Shriners, Wilson noted that Shriners took kids from Happiness House on outings, including a trip to the beach. They also took Jennifer and some of her classmates, who attend special preschool classes for handicapped children, to a fair.

"We would take turns going on rides with her, and he (a Shriner) helped me feed her," Wilson recalled.

Last September Wilson took Jennifer to the Shriners' children's hospital in Tampa, where she was examined and given leg braces and shoes. Like all services She explained that after and equipment offered at the

children's hospital, the braces, shoes and examinations were free of charge.

"The orthopedic doctors I've called want \$65 to \$150 for a visit, and per visit, and that doesn't include equipment-braces or whatever, Wilson noted. She pointed out that one estimate she was given put the cost of one leg brace at some \$350.

NO WORRY

Cost at the Shriners hospital hasn't been a worry, Wilson observed, adding, "There are no cash registers in the hospital. Since September they've seen her 3 times, and they'll see her again (Friday)," she continued. "We're looking at surgery, too. The muscles in her legs are getting tight."

Wilson, who was forced to quit working 1 1/2 years ago due to the number of medical related appointments Jennifer has, and the amount of care Jennifer requires, says the Shriners have made a big difference in her life. "It's a lot of work, believe me, but she's worth it."

Wilson's sister, Lugene, says having a "normal" child of her own has made her appreciate her sister and the Shriners efforts. Lugene and her husband, Duane, of Cass City, have a 7-year-old

son, Kristopher.

"You think, boy you're pretty fortunate," she remarked, adding that the little things she expects of her child, such as walking, picking up his toys and going to the bathroom alone, are luxuries her sister doesn't

The Shriners' help has "meant a lot," Wilson repeated.



But who scrutinizes government pension plans?

In Michigan, for instance, the ambitious state treasurer, Robert Bowman, has set up a plan that lets the state pension fund managers earn up to 100% bonuses over their salaries.

The bonus is paid on their performance -- the income of the fund, compared to market returns.

Bowman, a smart man who came to government work from Goldman Sachs, "They call it the fun part of says the civil service scale isn't high enough to keep good men running the fund. Some of the ones who left once brought in a 20% rate of return for the pension Jensen said. "It can be the fund.

A 20% rate of return happens once in a blue moon with a big fund, which, because of its very size, tends to track the averages. If it happens right along it's blind luck or the manager is supernatural.

To conclude that doubling salaries is going to produce sky-high yields, is to believe in miracles. Somehow civil service

workers in a state government don't seem to produce miracles.

Now what's Michigan doing, trying to get its pension funds super-heated in a search for the big buck? With bonds yielding 3 times that of stocks, the choice is simple and the yields are high, higher than anyone expected when the funds started.

As this is being written early in March, I bought some AA telephone bonds to yield 9.6% -- which was 1.2% higher than governments.

The Michigan pension managers, fund bonuses up to 100% of their pay dangling before them, would surely be tempted to get into high-risk, maybe-high-return stuff. Junk bonds would look sweet to them, and so would a lot of volatile stocks.

For the managers it's a sweet deal -- heads I win, tails I don't lose. They still have their salaries no matter what happens. Under civil service unless they steal or become alcoholics, they'll have a job forever. If they plunge into the highrisk side of the market they make it big, maybe. If they fail, they still have their base pay to fall back on.

Has anyone ever thought of the little guy who has chipped in to the fund so he could have a secure pen-

I dare say that if the whole job could be farmed out to private industry, it

would cost the state less. It just shakes me to think

of some of these characters in the capitol at Lansing shooting for the stars with money belonging to the wage-earners of Michigan.

Thomson McKinnon, 8th biggest brokerage firm in America, recently took a page ad in the Wall Street Journal to brag about their performance as a stock picker. And they should be proud. In the 18 months ending Dec. 31, 1987 their recommendations for longterm holdings were up 17% (dividends and price

No other broker came close. Shearson Lehman's picks were up 4.3%. All the rest were on the minus side.

For the year 1987, Thomson McKinnon was up 15.8%. The other ranged
