Four of the area districts--Cass City, Owen-Gage, Kingston and Caro--plan to begin classes Aug. 30, while Ubly School students will begin a day earlier.

Three of the 5 districts are negotiating new teachers contracts for 1988-89. They are Cass City, Kingston and Owen-Gage.

With the exception of Caro, existing programs and curriculums in the area districts aren't in danger of serious cuts in the upcoming school year thanks to voter approval earlier this summer of a host of millage

requests. The following is round-up of back-to-school news on

each of the districts. CASS CITY Cass City School officials expect to greet about 1,635

pupils -- a decrease of 20 students from 1987-88--when classes begin Aug. 30. Staff members' first day will be Aug. 29. Bus routes will be about

the same as last year with the exception of a route in the eastern portion of the district which has been eliminated. Students are urged to be ready 30 minutes earlier than normal the first week of school. Lunch prices will be 90

cents for elementary students, 95 cents for secondary students and \$1.25 for adults. Milk will cost 25 cents.

School Supt. Ken Micklash noted several program changes in the school sys-

tem, many of them designed to cut costs. While voters in June approved 3 additional mills for operations for one year, the extra money basically will allow the district to maintain programs, Micklash remarked, adding, "We're still looking for ways we can conserve and save."

Among the changes are a decision not to offer an agriculture class, taught last year by veteran instructor Lyle Clarke, who retired this summer; and elimination of the assistant principal's position.

Among the additions are a calculus class in the high school, and a computer science class which all seventh and eighth graders are required to take for one semester. "We have a new computer lab that was developed over the summer and that's going to be available to all intermediate school students," Micklash

One new teacher has joined the school staff. Denise Keller, who teaches agriculture and science, replaces Jerry Brown, who retired in June.

The quality of education in the district will be affected by voters this fall, when a second attempt to gain approval for additional operating millage will be made. Voters will be asked to approve 3 additional mills for 3 years in a special election slated for Sept. 12.

Voters, who approved renewal of 4.5 mills but defeated a 3-mill hike proposal in June, also will be asked to okay a \$3.2 million bond issue to replace the old Schall Annex.

> Much of the credit for the local Hardees proposal goes to Saginaw Realtor Richard Fletcher, who notified Hardees of the available site in Cass City after the McDonalds deal, which Fletcher also had worked on, fell through.

> "I'm just glad we were able to get the deal made,' Fletcher remarked Monday night, adding that village Manager Lou S. LaPonsie 'helped enormously.'

"We'll prove Cass City's a whale of a town," Fletcher said.

According to Schmitt, the 3.767-square-foot structure being proposed for Cass City is the largest store Hardees builds.

The plans indicate the building, expected to cost an estimated \$470,000, would include a drive-through facility and seating for 99 persons. There would be nearly 70 parking spaces on the 297-foot by 198-foot lot. In terms of jobs, the restaurant would employ 50 to 60 hourly employees plus a 4person management team.

Schmitt, who hopes to begin construction by Sept. 12, estimated that the total project cost, including equipment and land, will exceed \$1 million.

Although Hardees is a newcomer to the Thumb, the company, headquartered in Rocky Mountain, N.C., is well established, with more than 3,000 restaurants in over 40 states in the nation and around the world, according to John Chidester, Director of Marketing at Hardees' Area 7 office in Livonia.

Area 7 covers Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, Illinois and Wisconsin.

Chidester said roughly one-third of the restaurants, including the planned Cass City restaurant, are company stores.

Council pushes for new baseball field

A motion formally requesting the Cass City School District to build a new baseball field on school property was approved unanimously by the Village Council Monday night.

Councilmen indicated they would be willing to contribute manpower and aquipment for the project. fhey also made it clear that the school's need for a baseball diamond, should school officials decide they can't afford to build at this time, will take precedence over a proposal to convert the existing baseball field into a slow pitch softball field.

School Athletic Director Don Schelke, who attended Anday's monthly meeting to discuss the matter, stated the school's initial plans, back in 1968, were to build sports fields behind the school, but those plans never materialized.

Schelke indicated he would prefer to have a baseball field behind the school. but added the cost to contruct the facility would toalone He said he doesn't believe building a new field is the

responsibility of the village, but said the school would appreciate any help the council could provide.

"We appreciate the use of the field. We don't want to start having problems (between) the school and village," he added. Councilmen discussed the

possibility of using the existing baseball field for both baseball and slow pitch softball, but decided not to pur-

sue that option because the field would have to be stripped and the pitcher's mound lowered for slow pitch games.

Trustee Dorothy Stahlbaum said she believes it's important for the village to help the school. She added, however, that she doesn't feel it's the village's responsibility to build a new

field for the school. Trustee Nat Tuttle re-

marked that he would like to see something concrete in tal \$5,000 in materials terms of interest from slow

pitch teams who would utilize a field in Cass City.

Initial interest in a slow pitch field was sparked by a request from the members of the 1987 Class C state championship slow pitch team sponsored by the Charmont in Cass City. Trustee Matt Prieskorn said a slow pitch field would encourage the formation of more teams and competition in the area. Council President L.E.

Althaver suggested that the council indicate its preference in the matter Monday because work on the project should take place in the fall. "I'd rather meet our obligation to the school before we build a slow pitch field," he commented. "Baseball is the first priority. . .but

we'd really like them to build their own" field so the village can accommodate another recreational activity in Cass City.



Parking bureau scares family from ball game

Would you believe 6 of every 100 people living in tiny Rhodes, 12 miles west of Pinconning in east central Michigan, have broken the law in Detroit?

This hard-to-believe story begins with Karen and Dan Rifenbark of Rhodes and their 3 young sons. They have tickets to the Tigers-Twins baseball game in Detroit this afternoon.

"But we won't be there," Karen Rifenbark told me by phone Monday. "I'm afraid to go to Detroit. Afraid of crime?

"No, the police," she said. "I'm afraid we'll be arrested.

For what terrible crime? "For not paying a Detroit parking ticket that we shouldn't have to pay," she explained.

Rhodes is about 140 miles from Detroit. Rifenbark said not one member of her family has ever been in Detroit. Their Ford van has never been there either, she insisted.

But in May, the Detroit Municipal Parking Department notified Dan Rifenbark he had a \$25 ticket outstanding for "improper parking" of his van at 2:50 a.m. May 16 on Birwood in the 2nd (Schaefer) Precinct.

BUMBLING HAS FAMILIAR RING

Karen Rifenbark said she wasn't greatly surprised by the ticket. Her next door neighbor, Emil Neumeyer, was also recently notified of a parking ticket in Detroit. "In fact, I know at least 6 Rhodes residents'' who've had the same dunning experience with the Municipal Parking Department, and

The Cass City Public Schools policy for free and reduced price meals for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch, School Breakfast or Commodity School Programs uses the following household size and income criteria to determine eligibility:

Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free and reduced-price meals or free milk.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced-priced meals, households should fill out the form and return it to the school. Additional copies of the application form are available at the principal's office in each school. An application which does not contain all of the following information cannot be processed by the school: (1) the total monthly household income AND the amount and source of income received by each household member (such as wages, child support, etc.) OR the household's food stamp case or AFDC number if the household is on food stamps or receives AFDC: (2) names of all household members; (3) social security numbers of all household members 21 years of age or older, or the word "None" for any adult household member who does not have a social security number; and (4) the signature of an adult household member.

Food Stamp/AFDC Households: If you currently receive Food Stamps or "Aid to Families with Dependent Children" (AFDC) for your child, you only have to list your child's name and Food Stamp or AFDC case number, print your name and sign the application.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility and verifying data. Applications may be verified by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

If children are approved for free or reduced-price meal or free milk benefits, the household must report to the school increases in household income over \$50 per month (\$600 per year) and decreases in household size.

Households may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If a household is not currently eligible but has a decrease in household income, an increase in household size or if a household member becomes unemployed, the household should fill out an application at that time.

In most cases foster children are eligible for these benefits regardless of the household's income. If a household has foster children living with them and they wish to apply for free or reduced-price meals for them, the household should contact the school for more information.

Under the provisions of the policy each building principal will review applications and determine eligibility.

Parents and guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. The household also has the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing to Kenneth J. Micklash, Superintendent, 4868 North Seeger St., Cass City, MI. 48726.

Some 825 Ubly School students are expected to greet staff members Aug. 29 for the first day of classes. Staff members will report Aug. 26.

Tenbusch said a preliminary 1988-89 budget of \$2.559 million was approved earlier this summer. The proposed spending plan represents an increase of \$230,258 or nearly 9 percent, over 1987-88 spending.

Still the union demands further negotiations, and





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
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
