No talks scheduled in 7-day-old GTE strike

Until a contract is negotiated that asks employees to give less concessions than the recently rejected contract called for, the 35 union workers of General Telephone-North of Cass City expect to continue their 7-day strike against the company.

The strike was initiated 2 days after the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local 1106, based in Lansing, voted 1,306 to 565 to reject a proposed contract by GTE management. Contract talks that had run from June 13 through August 7 were unsuccessful in producing a contract agreeable to both sides.

New contract talks are scheduled to take place in Grand Rapids between management and union negotiators, but the question is when. "We'll negotiate when the company contacts us," said

Bob Alexander, Cass City member of the union negotiating committee. "Monday (Aug. 15) we made an offer that we were willing to talk at any time. They said they were not willing to talk at that time," Alexander said.

Alexander remarked that this first strike in 10 years and 3 contracts reminds him of the same trouble negotiations faced in 1978 when union members remained on strike for 53 days.

He pointed out that the GTE management is asking employees to make concessions that the union does not feel are either fair or necessary, as was the case 10 years ago. "The company is reporting 34 percent profit in the second quarter of 1988 and we don't feel it is right that they ask for concessions," he said, adding that "they're resorting to the same tactics as in 1978."

CONCESSIONS
According to union press secretary Keith Flewelling in Lansing, some of the concessions the management is asking for take away points the employees were given in 1978.

Among the "long list" of concessions the management asked for, Flewelling pointed out the elimination of current overtime payments. Workers for the past 10 years have received double time for hours over 52 hours a week, according to Flewelling. Now management has proposed lowering overtime rates to time and a half.

Also, Flewelling remarked that a stipulation the union would like to address but that the company has not addressed is the issue of hospitalization.

Flewelling said that the company's proposal to in-

crease deductibles is unreasonable. He continued saying that "the union wanted insurance for retirees, and the company did not move significantly on that though they did move somewhat."

The company has proposed to allow insurance to retirees but under regulations that would not make workers eligible for insurance coverage immediately after retirement, a provision the union wants clearly stated, Flewelling said.

"In 1985 negotiations were tough, but we got through them," Flewelling said, stating that the managerial demands this year are a "slap in the face."

REJECT CONTRACT PROVISIONS
But the state vice president and general manager for GTE, Max Preston, said last week that "we (GTE) be-

School opening next week for area students

A combined 5,853 students in 5 area school systems are expected to start the 1988-89 school year in about 2 weeks.

Four of the area districts--Cass City, Owen-Gage, Kingston and Caro--plan to begin classes Aug. 30, while Ubyly School students will begin a day earlier.

Three of the 5 districts are negotiating new teachers contracts for 1988-89. They are Cass City, Kingston and Owen-Gage.

With the exception of Caro, existing programs and curriculums in the area districts aren't in danger of serious cuts in the upcoming school year thanks to voter approval earlier this summer of a host of millage

requests. The following is round-up of back-to-school news on each of the districts.

CASS CITY

Cass City School officials expect to greet about 1,635 pupils--a decrease of 20 students from 1987-88--when classes begin Aug. 30. Staff members' first day will be Aug. 29.

Bus routes will be about the same as last year with the exception of a route in the eastern portion of the district which has been eliminated. Students are urged to be ready 30 minutes earlier than normal the first week of school.

Lunch prices will be 90 cents for elementary students, 95 cents for secondary students and \$1.25 for adults. Milk will cost 25 cents.

School Supt. Ken Micklash noted several program changes in the school sys-

tem, many of them designed to cut costs. While voters in June approved 3 additional mills for operations for one year, the extra money basically will allow the district to maintain programs, Micklash remarked, adding, "We're still looking for ways we can conserve and save."

Among the changes are a decision not to offer an agriculture class, taught last year by veteran instructor Lyle Clarke, who retired this summer; and elimination of the assistant principal's position.

Among the additions are a calculus class in the high school, and a computer science class which all seventh and eighth graders are required to take for one semester. "We have a new computer lab that was developed over the summer and that's going to be available to all intermediate school students," Micklash

added. The Board of Education earlier this summer adopted a preliminary 1988-89 budget totalling \$4.55 million. Although the spending plan represents a one-percent decline in spending compared to 1987-88, Micklash noted that the new budget doesn't take into account a new teachers contract, which currently is being negotiated. The new pact will replace a 2-year contract, which expired Monday.

CARO

Some 2,300 students in the Caro School District will start the school year with half-days Aug. 30 and 31, with the first full day set for Sept. 1. Staff members will report Aug. 29.

Lunches will be served beginning Sept. 1, with elementary students paying 80 cents, high school students,

90 cents, and adults, \$1.35. Bus routes will be about the same as last year.

One new teacher has joined the school staff, Denise Keller, who teaches agriculture and science, replaces Jerry Brown, who retired in June.

The quality of education in the district will be affected by voters this fall, when a second attempt to gain approval for additional operating millage will be made. Voters will be asked to approve 3 additional mills for 3 years in a special election slated for Sept. 12.

Voters, who approved renewal of 4.5 mills but defeated a 3-mill hike proposal in June, also will be asked to okay a \$3.2 million bond issue to replace the old Schall Annex.

School Supt. Thomas T. Lanway, who noted that one of the 3 additional mills Please turn to page 14.

Hardees ready to build \$1 million facility here

Plans by Hardees Food Systems Inc.--the third largest hamburger fast food chain in the world--to locate its first Thumb area restaurant in Cass City are expected to become reality.

Hardees officials, who last week made a successful zoning permit application to the Cass City Village Planning Commission, say they hope to open the doors of the new restaurant by the end of October.

Timothy J. Schmitt, a construction manager for Hardees, presented plans for

the project to the local planning commission Aug. 16. His request for a zoning permit was approved.

Schmitt said Monday that the company, which has okayed a purchase agreement for property at the corner of Main and Nestle streets, must still obtain other necessary permits before construction can begin. He added, however, that he doesn't expect any difficulty in securing those permits.

"There probably won't be any problem at all," he remarked, adding that normally, the biggest hurdle in

establishing a new restaurant is getting community support.

Schmitt noted he expects to receive a building permit in Tuscola County this week. Approval of the project by the county health department and the Michigan Department of Transportation also is expected soon, he said.

That news has made a failed bid to attract a McDonalds Restaurant to town easier to swallow for village officials, who learned in late June that a McDonalds executive had rejected Cass City as a site

because he believed the village was too small to support the restaurant.

Much of the credit for the local Hardees proposal goes to Saginaw Realtor Richard Fletcher, who notified Hardees of the available site in Cass City after the McDonalds deal, which Fletcher also had worked on, fell through.

"I'm just glad we were able to get the deal made," Fletcher remarked Monday night, adding that village Manager Lou S. LaPonsie "helped enormously." "We'll prove Cass City's a whale of a town," Fletcher said.

According to Schmitt, the 3,767-square-foot structure being proposed for Cass City is the largest store Hardees builds.

The plans indicate the building, expected to cost an estimated \$470,000, would include a drive-through facility and seating for 99 persons. There would be nearly 70 parking spaces on the 297-foot by 198-foot lot.

In terms of jobs, the restaurant would employ 50 to 60 hourly employees plus a 4-person management team.

Schmitt, who hopes to begin construction by Sept. 12, estimated that the total project cost, including equipment and land, will exceed \$1 million.

Although Hardees is a newcomer to the Thumb, the company, headquartered in Rocky Mountain, N.C., is well established, with more than 3,000 restaurants in over 40 states in the nation and around the world, according to John Chidester, Director of Marketing at Hardees' Area 7 office in Livonia.

Area 7 covers Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, Illinois and Wisconsin.

Chidester said roughly one-third of the restaurants, including the planned Cass City restaurant, are company stores.

Council pushes for new baseball field

A motion formally requesting the Cass City School District to build a new baseball field on school property was approved unanimously by the Village Council Monday night.

Councilmen indicated they would be willing to contribute manpower and equipment for the project. They also made it clear that the school's need for a baseball diamond, should school officials decide they can't afford to build at this time, will take precedence over a proposal to convert the existing baseball field into a slow pitch softball field.

School Athletic Director Don Schelke, who attended Monday's monthly meeting to discuss the matter, stated the school's initial plans, back in 1968, were to build sports fields behind the school, but those plans never materialized.

Schelke indicated he would prefer to have a baseball field behind the school, but added the cost to construct the facility would total \$5,000 in materials

alone. He said he doesn't believe building a new field is the responsibility of the village, but said the school would appreciate any help the council could provide.

"We appreciate the use of the field. We don't want to start having problems (between) the school and village," he added.

Councilmen discussed the possibility of using the existing baseball field for both baseball and slow pitch softball, but decided not to pursue that option because the field would have to be stripped and the pitcher's mound lowered for slow pitch games.

Trustee Dorothy Stahlbaum said she believes it's important for the village to help the school. She added, however, that she doesn't feel it's the village's responsibility to build a new field for the school.

Trustee Nat Tuttle remarked that he would like to see something concrete in terms of interest from slow

pitch teams who would utilize a field in Cass City.

Initial interest in a slow pitch field was sparked by a request from the members of the 1987 Class C state championship slow pitch team sponsored by the Charmont in Cass City. Trustee Matt Prieskorn said a slow pitch field would encourage the formation of more teams and competition in the area.

Council President L.E. Althaver suggested that the council indicate its preference in the matter Monday because work on the project should take place in the fall.

"I'd rather meet our obligation to the school before we build a slow pitch field," he commented. "Baseball is the first priority... but we'd really like them to build their own" field so the village can accommodate another recreational activity in Cass City.

According to village Manager Lou S. LaPonsie, there have been questions regarding a lease between the school and village for use of

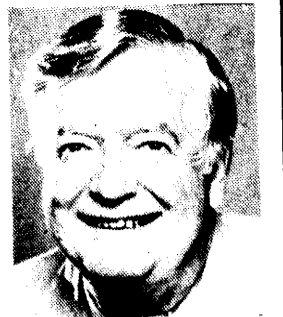

"If It Fitz..." Afraid of Detroit

Parking bureau scares family from ball game

Would you believe 6 of every 100 people living in tiny Rhodes, 12 miles west of Pinconning in east central Michigan, have broken the law in Detroit?

This hard-to-believe story begins with Karen and Dan Rifenbark of Rhodes and their 3 young sons. They have tickets to the Tigers-Twins baseball game in Detroit this afternoon.

"But we won't be there," Karen Rifenbark told me by phone Monday. "I'm afraid to go to Detroit."

Afraid of crime? "No, the police," she said. "I'm afraid we'll be arrested."

For what terrible crime? "For not paying a Detroit parking ticket that we shouldn't have to pay," she explained.

Rhodes is about 140 miles from Detroit. Rifenbark said not one member of her family has ever been in Detroit. Their Ford van has never been there either, she insisted.

But in May, the Detroit Municipal Parking Department notified Dan Rifenbark he had a \$25 ticket outstanding for "improper parking" of his van at 2:50 a.m. May 16 on Birwood in the 2nd (Schaefer) Precinct.

BUMBLING HAS FAMILIAR RING

Karen Rifenbark said she wasn't greatly surprised by the ticket. Her next door neighbor, Emil Neumeyer, was also recently notified of a parking ticket in Detroit.

"In fact, I know at least 6 Rhodes residents" who've had the same dunning experience with the Municipal Parking Department, and

none of them ever go to Detroit, she said. Six? The last census said the population of Rhodes is 100.

According to that ratio, it boggles the mind to speculate on how many people in larger cities are being hassled--and fined--without cause by our bumbling parking department.

Karen Rifenbark said some of the Rhodes Six eventually paid the tickets rather than spend the rest of their lives trying to get them dismissed. But she won't pay. And she contacted me because on Friday I wrote about a St. Joseph couple who are also continuing the good fight, even though our friendly parking department refused to believe the St. Joseph chief of police, who said the couple's car was definitely in St. Joseph on the night it was supposed to be blocking a Detroit alley.

Rifenbark lost track of how many times she tried to phone the number on the parking ticket. "One time I was put on hold for 15 minutes," she said.

When she finally got through, "I was told no one could help me" and she should either pay the ticket or ask for a court hearing (280 mile round-trip).

Mail communication with the parking department was equally frustrating. So Rifenbark phoned the 2nd Precinct, where the ticket was issued.

"The officer wasn't friendly," she reported. "He suggested one of my sons took the van to Detroit. When I asked what would happen if I didn't pay the ticket, he said if I were stopped for a violation in Detroit I could be arrested and even spend a weekend in jail until the matter was cleared up."

FAMILY FEARS PARKING POLICE That's what the trip to today's ball game--and the

The evening news summaries and the daily papers give more than enough information about those 3-ring circuses. I'm not alone. The television rating services place the convention at the bottom of the ratings.

Closer to home, Barb Hutchinson, librarian at Rawson Memorial Hospital, reports a booming business in mid-week video rental business. Best we've ever had, she says.

There was a time that the conventions served a useful purpose. A time when there was a doubt about who might be the party nominee. A time when the delegates had a voice in choosing the vice-president on the ticket.

Now it seems that its main function is giving the party faithful an opportunity to party. An award for grass-roots political support.

About this time every election there's talk about limiting campaigns to a set,

brief period. That's because all but the most ardent are sick of the whole election process long before the election date.

That's not realistic of course. Politicians are always running for election or reelection, announced or otherwise.

If you are only moderately informed about the political affairs of the day, the chances that you will learn anything more about the candidates are about as remote as a day in the 70's in Michigan this summer.

If you are only moderately informed you know that any resemblance of what they say to what they do is purely coincidental. George Bush says emphatically (just like President Reagan) that there will be no increase in taxes if elected. The system changes, but one way or another we continue to pay more taxes.

Gov. Dukakis can adopt semi-conservative stances and pick a conservative running mate, but his record indicates that in the gut issues he will be a liberal if elected.

So, if most of what is there is to know about the candidates is already known making a decision is easy. Right? No, wrong. The decision here was to vote for Bush before he selected the arch conservative from Indiana to be his running mate. I'm against the unlimited spending for defense that the vice-presidential candidate has consistently pushed as a senator.

The ideal candidate would be one who limits spending on defense, refuses to bow before the demands of big labor and cares for the needs of the underprivileged and minorities.

That candidate isn't running so the decision is which of the 2 candidates is most likely to adopt more of the issues the way I see them.

The answer promises to be hard to come by. Certainly I won't find it by listening to orations at conventions.

Maybe I'll just flip a coin and hope that it doesn't become a game of heads you win, tails I lose.

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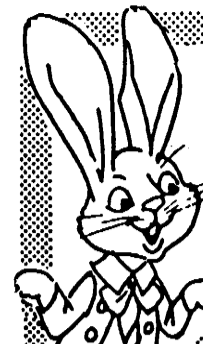

Tuscola Fair to break even despite lag in attendance

The dust has settled from clean-up at the Tuscola County fairgrounds, but financial figures expected to add up to almost no profit have yet to be calculated, according to Fair President Walt Jackson.

"We'll probably break even," Jackson remarked,

noting that the fair didn't attract as many spectators as he would have liked it to, because of the weather. "We're down a fair amount. You know, the hot weather was up in the 100 degrees a few days."

The official paid attendance count places 11,320

persons at the fairgrounds over the week-long event, a little more than 1/4 of the expected crowd and about 3,000 people short of last year's attendance.

The revenue brought in by attendance this year totaled \$21,579 compared to last year's \$24,862, but the over

\$3,000 difference isn't expected to have that big of an effect on the final financial outcome of the fair, according to Jackson.

The fair began its planning with a \$190,000 budget and about \$3,000 profit from last year's fair. Jackson noted that expenses this year remained close to those of last year meaning that even with the drop in attendance fees, the fair's credits and debits should match.

LANDFILL SOLD

In other business during the 65-minute session, the council accepted a lone bid of \$3,150 for an old village dump site. The bid was submitted by Cass City resident Curt Strickland.

Strickland said Monday that with the exception of some hunting, he has no immediate plans for the land.

The old dump, which covers nearly 2 acres bordered by the north and south branches of the Cass River, about one mile south of the village, hasn't been used in some 20 years. The village purchased the land, about one acre at the time, for \$125 in 1907.

ROAD FUNDS

Councilmen approved spending about \$9,000 for 3

road projects, 2 of which were previously authorized.

The previously approved expenditures are \$3,400, the village's share of paving 5 center blocks of Main Street, from West Street to Sherman Street, and \$3,000 for paving a section of Third Street which was torn up in order to replace a water main.

Also approved was spending \$2,600 to pave the unpaved portion of the drive area behind the municipal building.

Despite those expenditures, LaPonsie stated that better than expected prices for curb and gutter and asphalt this year have resulted in staying under the village's \$95,000 Local Streets budget.

Also Monday, the council noted that the 90th annual Michigan Municipal League Convention will be held Sept. 28-30 in Saginaw. It was noted that LaPonsie is completing his 3-year term as a member of the municipal league board.

CARESS program seeks volunteers

New mothers and volunteers are being sought by a new tri-county volunteer program called Care And Response Enabling Self Sufficiency (CARESS).

According to Ubyly resident and CARESS Executive Director Julia Heilig, the new program was established as a support system for new single or married mothers whether they're having their first baby or their eighth baby.

"We will pair a volunteer who is well intentioned (and) well informed with a new mom. Together they will create a supportive friendship during late pregnancy and after the birth of the child," Heilig explained.

"We ask our volunteers and moms to try to get together for at least one hour a week for caring and sharing, and if possible one phone call a week for a period of one year after the baby's birth," she continued. "The volunteer commitment is approximately 6 hours of training available on video tape, and the visits for one year. The new mother's commitment is to care and share with the volunteer for one year."

There will be 2 to 3 meetings per year that will be for the volunteer and the new mom. These meetings will be informative and entertaining as well as a time to share with the others in the

program, according to Heilig.

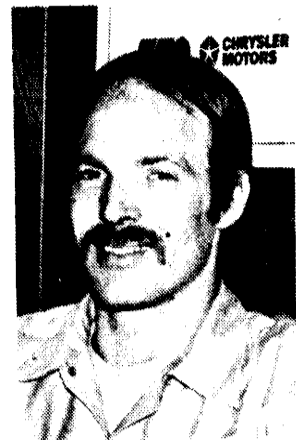

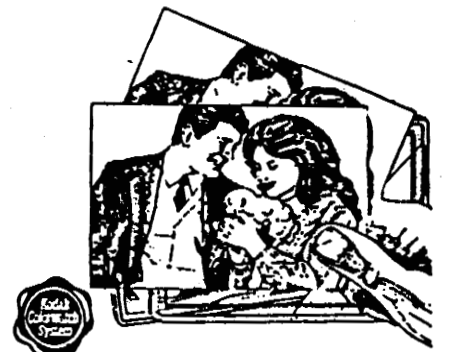
"How to Get the Job You Want" is a basic course with up to date information on job seeking skills, according to Tuscola County Extension Home Economist Betty Pattullo.

Buses

Buses will begin the year traveling the similar routes as last year. Adjustments to balance the bus loads and to provide for the transportation of new students will be made as soon as possible. The following bus policies have been adopted by the Board of Education.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

- To observe classroom conduct (except for ordinary conversation) while getting on, getting off and riding the bus.
- To occupy the seat assigned by the driver and remain seated in an erect position with both feet on the floor while the bus is in motion.
- To be at the pickup place designated at the scheduled time.
- To wait until the bus comes to a complete stop before attempting to get on or off.
- To keep all parts of your body inside the bus at all times.
- To cross a traveled highway, if necessary after leaving the bus, by walking in front of the bus.
- To leave or board the bus only with the consent of the driver and only through the proper door.
- To immediately report to the driver any damage to the bus.
- To help keep the bus clean, sanitary and orderly and the aisles free of any obstructions.
- To obey the driver cheerfully and to refrain from unnecessary conversation with the driver while the bus is moving.

PARENT RESPONSIBILITIES

- To take all precautions necessary for the protection of their children while going to and from the bus stop.
- To work in a cooperative manner with those responsible for pupil transportation.

BUS DISCIPLINE PROCEDURE

- First violation -- The driver submitting the violation report will deliver it personally to the Principal of the building the student attends. The Principal will arrange a conference at which the student, driver and Principal will be in attendance. A written communication regarding the violation and disciplinary action taken will be sent to the parents.
- Second violation -- The same procedure as in the first violation. The minimum disciplinary action will be a three day suspension from riding the bus.
- Third violation -- The same procedures as above with a five day minimum suspension.

Cafeteria

Elementary and high school cafeterias will open on Tuesday, August 30. The price for lunches at Campbell, Deford and Evergreen is 90 cents. Weekly lunch tickets are available on Mondays for students at a cost of \$4.50. The price for intermediate and high school students is 95 cents. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free and reduced-price meals or free milk.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced-priced meals, households should fill out the form and return it to the school. Additional copies of the application form are available at the principal's office in each school. An application which does not contain all of the following information cannot be processed by the school: (1) the total monthly household income AND the amount and source of income received by each household member (such as wages, child support, etc.) OR the household's food stamp case or AFDC number if the household is on food stamps or receives AFDC; (2) names of all household members; (3) social security numbers of all household members 21 years of age or older, or the word "None" for any adult household member who does not have a social security number; and (4) the signature of an adult household member.

Food Stamp/AFDC Households: If you currently receive Food Stamps or "Aid to Families with Dependent Children" (AFDC) for your child, you only have to list your child's name and Food Stamp or AFDC case number, print your name and sign the application.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility and verifying data. Applications may be verified by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

If children are approved for free or reduced-price meal or free milk benefits, the household must report to the school increases in household income over \$50 per month (\$600 per year) and decreases in household size.

Households may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If a household is not currently eligible but has a decrease in household income, an increase in household size or if a household member becomes unemployed, the household should fill out an application at that time.

In most cases foster children are eligible for these benefits regardless of the household's income. If a household has foster children living with them and they wish to apply for free or reduced-price meals for them, the household should contact the school for more information.

Under the provisions of the policy each building principal will review applications and determine eligibility.

Parents and guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. The household also has the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing to Kenneth J. Micklash, Superintendent, 4868 North Seeger St., Cass City, MI. 48726.

Five Japanese youngsters had an opportunity to experience American family life this summer in Sanilac County through the Michigan/Japan 4-H/LABO exchange program.

The Sanilac County visitors are among 80 Japanese young people and advisers who are in Michigan for a month-long stay with local families. All are members of Japan's language education

LABO program. Sanilac County host 4-H'ers and their families include: Dennis King Jr. of Decker, hosting Takayoshi Fujishiro, and Jeffrey Doerr of Ubyly, hosting Yuichi

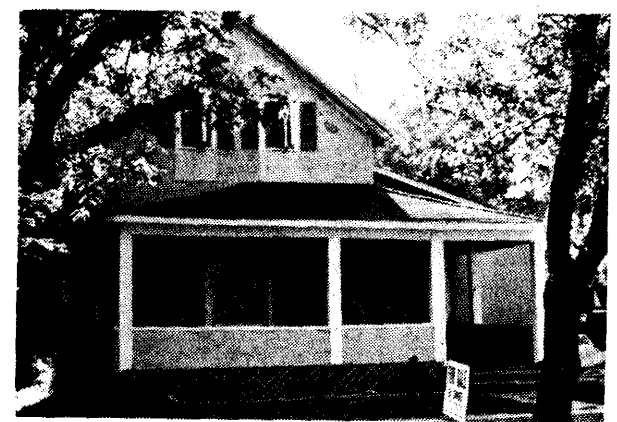

would be earmarked for repair and maintenance of buildings, indicated rejection of the millage would mean serious financial difficulties.

"If it passes, we'll maintain programs as much as possible. If it does not pass, we're looking at not replacing school buses (and) a counselor who's going to retire in December," he remarked. "We're looking at some major cuts then."

The millage would raise an estimated \$540,000, which includes state matching funds. A preliminary budget of \$7.622 million has been approved for 1988-89, compared to a 1987-88 spending plan totalling \$7.381 million. The proposed 1988-89 budget would leave a fund balance of only about \$100,000, according to Layway, who added, "Our projections are that we will have used up our fund balance by next July."

Teachers in the district are in the last year of a 2-year contract.

OWEN-GAGE

Some 353 Owen-Gage students are expected to report for the first full day of school Aug. 30. Staff members will report to work Aug. 29.

Hot lunch will be offered in both the Owendale and

Gagetown buildings on the first day. Prices are 70 cents for elementary students, \$1 at the high school, \$1.40 for adults and 40 cents per meal for reduced lunches at both schools.

Applications for free or reduced hot lunch will be handed out to students during the first week of school.

Buses will be running about the same routes as in 1987-88. Students are to be on the watch for the first week to establish a time table for their route.

There will be one new face among staff members this year. Lynette Halabis of Caro was hired to replace physical education and health teacher John W. Osterland, who is on a one-year leave of absence.

Another staff change involves the high school principal's post. Counselor Ronald D' Aoust will handle the administrative duties of the job, while veteran science teacher Manuel Thies will be the discipline officer.

School Supt. Harley Kirby has said he expects a new contract to be reached by the start of school for teachers, who have been negotiating since last summer.

The district's preliminary 1988-89 budget, which doesn't take into account adjustments related to a new contract, was set at \$1,382 million, down by \$36,252 or

2.5 percent from 1987-88. Although voters approved a 2-year renewal of 15.5 mills in June, and the district expects to receive some state "membership" aid this school year for the first time, school officials have had to trim expenses due to continued heavy declines in land values.

UBLY

Some 825 Ubyly School students are expected to greet staff members Aug. 29 for the first day of classes. Staff members will report Aug. 26.

Bus routes will be about the same as last year, but lunch prices have been increased by 10 cents. Elementary students will now pay 85 cents, while junior high and high school students will pay 90 cents, and adults, \$1.60.

A new band teacher is being sought by school officials. The new staff member will replace James Batcheller, who resigned to go on a fellowship in Florida.

School business manager Mark J. Tenbusch said no program or curriculum cuts are expected in the upcoming school year thanks to voters' approval in March of 4 additional mills for one year. He added, however, "We're just okay for (this) school year. Next year all of our millages will expire and we'll have to renew (them)."

One area school officials don't have to be concerned with right now is a new contract for teachers, who are in the second year of a 3-year contract.

Tenbusch said a preliminary 1988-89 budget of \$2.559 million was approved earlier this summer. The proposed spending plan represents an increase of \$230,258 or nearly 9 percent, over 1987-88 spending.

KINGSTON

Kingston School Supt. Jerry H. Laycock Friday said a tentative date of Aug. 30 had been set for the first day of classes for the district's estimated 740 students. A tentative first day for staff members was set for Aug. 29.

In contrast to the Ubyly School District, lunch prices will remain the same, but all bus routes have been changed for the upcoming school year.

Lunch prices will be 90 cents for elementary students, 95 cents for high school students and \$1.50 for adults. Laycock said a newsletter will be sent to

parents regarding bus routes.

A number of program additions and changes are planned this year, according to Laycock. Among them are a full year of band for fifth and sixth graders; the elementary school library has been upgraded; a new K-12 science curriculum, including new text books, has been added; a new health curriculum, including AIDS education, is planned for grades 7 through 9; and business law and bookkeeping classes have been re-introduced at the high school.

In terms of finances, the outlook is good following voter approval in June of a request of 3 additional mills for 3 years. Laycock said a preliminary 1988-89 spending plan totalling \$2.324 million has been approved. The tentative budget represents an increase of \$70,390 or 3 percent over 1987-88 expenditures.

Also, teachers and school officials are negotiating a new contract to replace a 2-year pact, which will expire Aug. 31.

lieve our final offer was a fair and equitable proposal and regret that those union employees who voted did not see it that way."

Preston points out that the final 3-year contract offered to the union on Aug. 4 offered a savings and investment plan already available to management that would allow employees to save up to 6 percent of their wages and have 50 percent of that matched by the company.

The rejected contract also included a \$700 ratification bonus and a 2 percent general wage increase in the 2nd and 3rd years of the contract.

Still the union demands further negotiations, and until negotiations resume, the strike ends and the some 2,200 workers affected by the strike return to work, the GTE management staff of 500 plans to cover for the striking employees, Preston said.

"Though there may be times when operator response time may be slower than we would prefer," he said, "telephone customers should notice little effect on telephone service as a result of the strike."
