Ubly man killed in crash

A 33-year-old Ubly man was killed and 2 other area residents injured Friday in a 2-car collision in Huron County's Sheridan Township.

Patrick A. Binkley, 4575 Garfield St., Ubly, was killed after his northbound pickup truck collided with an eastbound United Parcel Service truck driven by Kelly M. Dillon, 23, Cass City, at the intersection of McIntyre and Barrie roads at about 9:45 a.m., a Huron County Sheriff's Department spokesman said.

Dillon was treated and released from Huron Memorial Hospital, while a passenger in Binkley's vehicle, Madonna M. Czewski, 32, of Ubly, was listed in "good" condition at the hospital Wednesday morning.

According to reports, there were no seat belts in the Binkley vehicle. Dillon was wearing a seat belt at the time of the accident.

There are no traffic signs at the intersection, the spokesman said, adding neither driver apparently saw the other until it was too late to avoid impact.

Township investigation continues

Up to 20 youth offenders are expected to enter Michigan's first "work and learn" camp in Koylton Township Oct. 1 following licensing of the camp last week.

The state Department of Social Services issued the camp license Aug. 31 to Pioneer Work and Learn Center Inc., which has contracted with the DSS to operate the program at Kingston Hills Camp, located about 1 1/2 miles south

of Kingston. According to Jack Drenovsky, program manager of the contracts unit in the DSS Office of Children and Youth Services, the DSS also approved a second contract with Pioneer officials.

The 13-month contract, effective Aug. 31, 1988, to Sept. 30, 1989, calls for expenditures of up to \$2.945 million. The contract replaces a trial contract for \$43,253, which ran from

May 3 to Aug. 30. Mike Jones, director of the camp, remarked Tuesday that job interviews, many of them with area residents, are already well underway for positions such as counselors, cooks, secretaries and maintenance personnel.

There's a lot of interest," he said, adding the camp staff will eventually total 54 per-"We're definitely sons. going to hire right here." Despite the planned opening, Koylton Township zoning officials say they are continuing their investigation of the camp, which will eventually house up to 50 juvenile delinquents-ages 13 to 17-who have been convicted of non-assaultive crimes. The campers will take part in a 6-month program that emphasizes educational and work experiences similar to those offered in popular wilderness survival programs such as Outward Bound. ing. "It (Cass) seemed to fit the bill in terms of habitat,' Nelson explained. He added that large pools and an ample population of redhorse sucker (the primary forage base for Ohio strain muskellunge) made the river a good choice.

Nelson noted the Ohio strain is a type of northern muskie that inhabits rivers rather than lakes. Although the river muskellunge tend to be a little smaller than their open water cousins, they "have the potential to reach very large sizes, up to 45-48 inches," he said.

Nelson pointed out that any local study will have to wait until a significant number of the Ohio strain muskie are available. There's little chance of determining, with the number of fish planted last week, whether any have survived 3 or 4 years down

Cass City school talks stall Kingston OK's pact

Kingston teachers and school officials reached a tentative contract settlement Friday following 2 all-day negotiation sessions.

School officials in Cass City, meanwhile, have called in a state mediator in hopes of making some progress in talks with teachers in that district following an unproductive session Aug. 30.

Kingston School Supt. Jerry H. Laycock said allday talks Aug. 31 and Friday netted a tentative 2-year contract for teachers, whose previous 2-year pact expired Aug. 31.

Details of the new contract aren't being released pending ratification by the Tri-County Bargaining Association, teachers and the local school board, Laycock said. In Cass City, teachers will continue to work as school and union officials prepare to begin mediation Sept. 14.

Lloyd Schinnerer, president of the Cass City Education Association, said talks, which were last held Aug. 30, currently are "just on hold.

"I'd like to be optimistic that the person (mediator) assigned to this region can get things moving," he remarked.

School Supt. Ken Micklash said a mediator was requested by the school board's labor consultant during the Aug. 30 negotiation session. He said "little

Dr. Donahue will be honored at the organization's 11th induction ceremony for his wrestling record at the University of Michigan. Dr. Donahue was the first Big Ten wrestling champion for the Wolverines in 1926.

He also was first in 1927 and

Joining Donahue in the hall of fame will be other athletes well known by all who follow sports at the university. A new program is under way in the Public Health Service. It's called the National Cholesterol Education Program, and its purpose is to reduce mortality from heart disease, the number one cause of death in America today. Its message: "Know your cholesterol level. It could save your

life.' The links between high levels of cholesterol in the blood and the development

of heart disease are clear. Many good studies have documented the connection; the matter is beyond dispute. The problem is that high blood cholesterol, like high blood pressure, seldom causes symptoms. You can

even the best heart specialists to save you from a heart attack. That is why everybody needs to know his or her blood cholesterol number.

You can get a cholesterol test from your doctor or at a health center. Your participation in the test will be quick and easy; you simply have to give up a sample of blood from a vein in your arm. From that sample, your cholesterol number will be calculated.

At present, devices that require only a drop of blood (from a simple finger stick) for the measurement of cholesterol are being evaluated. These tests are of great interest to public health officials because they typically give results in 3 to 20 minutes and can be used at worksites, shopping malls and other locations where large numbers of people could be

family history of heart or blood vessel disease, those who have high blood pressure and males, smokers, diabetics and people who are obese.

In most cases, the method for lowering blood cholesterol is simple. Avoid foods that are high in saturated fat and cholesterol, control weight, and exercise. A brisk walk of 2 miles, incidentally, can be almost as beneficial as more strenuous exercises, such as cycling, swimming or tennis.

Here are a few dietary suggestions:

- Eat lean cuts of meat and/or substitute fish and chicken for beef, pork, lamb and other meats high in fat. — Use polyunsaturated

and monounsaturated fats like safflower, corn, soybean and olive oils.

RIDING THE IRON ROOSTER: By Train Through China by Paul Theroux (non-fiction). Theroux spent a year exploring China by train, and his impressions about what has and has not changed in the country, as gathered in hundreds of conversations with Chinese citizens, make up a large portion of the book. The Cultural Revolution and the vandalism of the Red Guards have left scars on both me land and the people. Mao's death brought a collective sign of relief from the population; reforms brought about under Deng Xiaoping have generally been welcomed. Whether describing his dealings with a rock-hard bureaucracy, musing over the Chinese flirtation with capitalism - they've "turned the free market into a flea market" - or commenting on the process of traveling, Theroux conducts the reader through this enormous country with wisdom, humor and a crusty warmth.

There have been several inquiries at the Tuscola County Extension office relating to spider mites in growers' soybean fields, and we are encouraging growers to scout their soybean fields immediately for spider mites.

Initial damage appears as yellow speckling on the upper surface of the lower leaves and gradually progresses to bronzing of the entire leaf. Infestations often start along grassy or weedy edges, near dusty roads or in previously dry or stressed areas of fields. Treat any portion of a field which has severely bronzed leaves. Be sure to check how far the mites have spread beyond the area of visible damage. Spot treat the entire area in which mites are present. If the infestation is more general but bronzing has not occurred, then treatment is recommended if 25% of the leaf area shows yellowing and mites are present. A hard thunderstorm will greatly reduce mite populations but usually not completely remove them. Where rainfall has occured, continue to scout to catch any mite

There have been a few fields in Tuscola County sprayed for spider mites, however, the real concern we have is if the weather should warm up and dry and hot conditions prevail, the spidermite problem can really explode. Consequently, it is important to continue to observe your fields through mid September since good, healthy green leaves determine size of soybean harvest.

The insecticides recommended for spider mite control are: Cygon (dimethoate), Lorsban 50W, Diazinon AG 500, Omite 6E, Comite and Curacron 6E. Information from a recent test against mites in Indiana have shown

By Bill Bortel Lorsban have given the highest percent reduction in killing the adult mites. It is important to use 3 or more gallons of water per acre by air to increase the effectiveness of the products. Avoid spraying by air except early in the morning and late in the evening. This will avoid the problem of spray particles being carried upward by currents of warm rising air. For ground applications using drop nozzles directed into closed canopy beans, use 40 PSI and 30-40 gallons of water per acre for best control.
