Ugly man killed in crash

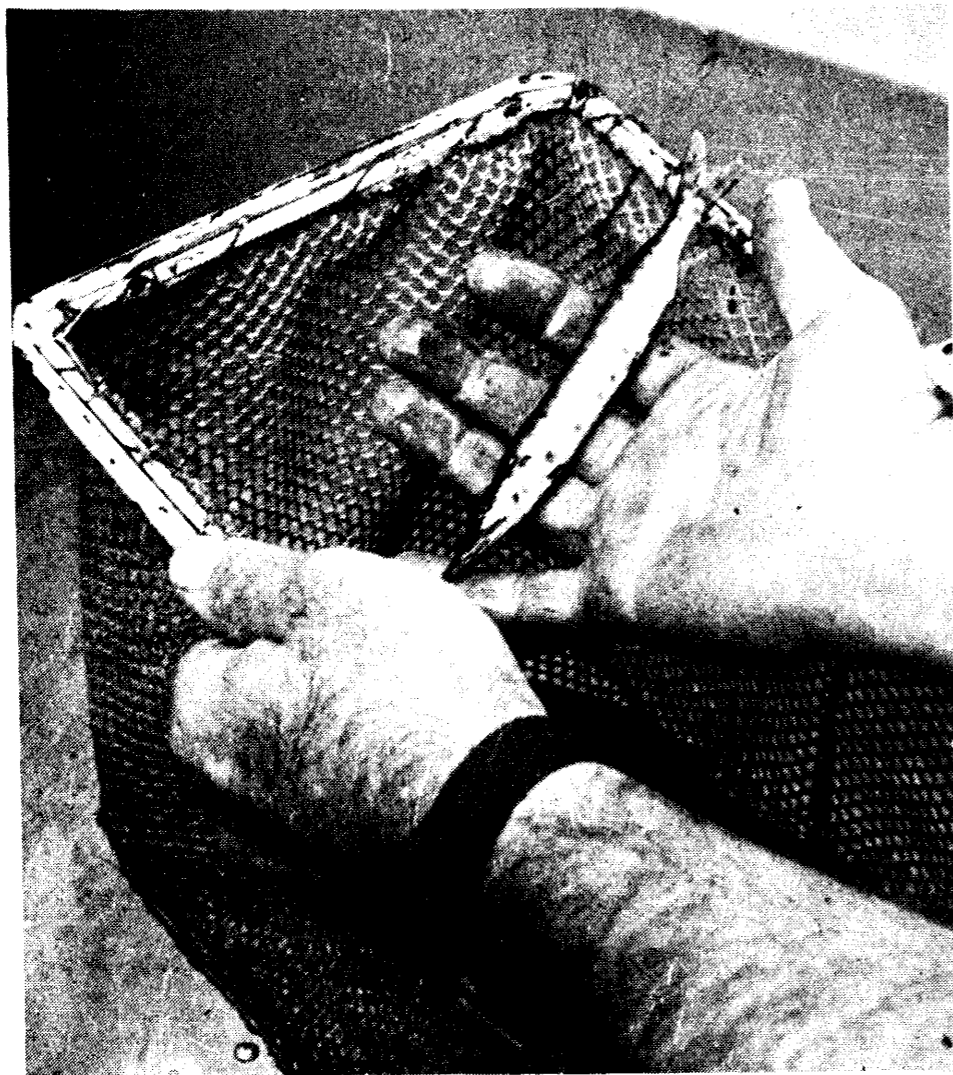
A 33-year-old Ugly man was killed and 2 other area residents injured Friday in a 2-car collision in Huron County's Sheridan Township.

Patrick A. Binkley, 4575 Garfield St., Ugly, was killed after his northbound pickup truck collided with an eastbound United Parcel Service truck driven by Kelly M. Dillon, 23, Cass City, at the intersection of McIntyre and Barrie roads at about 9:45 a.m., a Huron County Sheriff's Department spokesman said.

Dillon was treated and released from Huron Memorial Hospital, while a passenger in Binkley's vehicle, Madonna M. Czewski, 32, of Ugly, was listed in "good" condition at the hospital Wednesday morning.

According to reports, there were no seat belts in the Binkley vehicle. Dillon was wearing a seat belt at the time of the accident.

There are no traffic signs at the intersection, the spokesman said, adding neither driver apparently saw the other until it was too late to avoid impact.

Plant Ohio muskellunge in Cass River experiment

The Cass River last week became the first Michigan river in at least 20 years to be planted with Ohio strain muskellunge.

About 150 fall fingerlings from the DNR's Wolf Lake Fish Hatchery in Mattawan were planted in the river near Cass City, Aug. 30.

Department of Natural Resources officials expressed disappointment at the small number of fish available for

the recent planting--the DNR had originally expected 2,000 to 4,000 fish from Ohio--but indicated selection of the Cass for the project means the outlook for additional plantings is promising.

"Although the numbers were disappointing, one thing this planting has done is put the Cass River on the very top of the list for future plantings of this Ohio strain," DNR Fisheries Habitat Biologist Don Nelson remarked

last week.

Nelson said the DNR has been interested in finding out how the Ohio strain of muskellunge, a member of the pike family, would survive in a southern Michigan river. "Michigan has for 20 years tried to get some of the Ohio strain," he continued, adding, "They're hard to come by."

After learning of an expected surplus of the fish, officials selected the Cass

River for the initial planting.

"It (Cass) seemed to fit the bill in terms of habitat," Nelson explained. He added that large pools and an ample population of redbreast sunfish (the primary forage base for Ohio strain muskellunge) made the river a good choice.

Nelson noted the Ohio strain is a type of northern muskie that inhabits rivers rather than lakes. Although the river muskellunge tend to be a little smaller than their open water cousins, they "have the potential to reach very large sizes, up to 45-48 inches," he said.

Nelson pointed out that any local study will have to wait until a significant number of the Ohio strain muskie are available. There's little chance of determining, with the number of fish planted last week, whether any have survived 3 or 4 years down the road, he said.

Kingston School Supt. Jerry H. Laycock said all-day talks Aug. 31 and Friday netted a tentative 2-year contract for teachers, whose previous 2-year pact expired Aug. 31.

Township investigation continues

20 delinquents due in camp Oct. 1

Up to 20 youth offenders are expected to enter Michigan's first "work and learn" camp in Koylton Township Oct. 1 following licensing of the camp last week.

The state Department of Social Services issued the camp license Aug. 31 to Pioneer Work and Learn Center Inc., which has contracted with the DSS to operate the program at Kingston Hills Camp, located about 1 1/2 miles south of Kingston.

According to Jack Drenovsky, program manager of the contracts unit in the DSS Office of Children and Youth Services, the DSS also approved a second contract with Pioneer officials.

The 13-month contract, effective Aug. 31, 1988, to Sept. 30, 1989, calls for expenditures of up to \$2.945 million. The contract replaces a trial contract for \$43,253, which ran from May 3 to Aug. 30.

Mike Jones, director of the camp, remarked Tuesday that job interviews, many of them with area residents, are already well underway for positions such as counselors, cooks, secretaries and maintenance personnel.

Jones said he's interviewed some 40 local residents for jobs at the camp. "They're knocking on my door. There's a lot of interest," he said, adding the camp staff will eventually total 54 persons. "We're definitely going to hire right here."

Despite the planned opening, Koylton Township zoning officials say they are continuing their investigation of the camp, which will eventually house up to 50 juvenile delinquents--ages 13 to 17--who have been convicted of non-assaultive crimes.

The campers will take part in a 6-month program that emphasizes educational and work experiences similar to those offered in popular wilderness survival programs such as Outward Bound.

Koylton Township Zoning Board member Russell Mayer remarked Tuesday that those responsible for repairs at the camp continue to ignore township zoning laws in terms of required permits.

With the exception of electrical and furnace permits,

he said, "They have not made any effort to get any permits. As far as they're concerned, the township doesn't exist."

Mayer noted repairs or construction exceeding \$500 require a township zoning permit. He said he believes work at the camp has exceeded the \$500 cap in some areas, yet no permit has been requested.

He added that he expects township zoning officials to request permission in Tuscola County Circuit Court to make a second visit to the camp via an order of discovery in an attempt to determine what has been done.

Drenovsky, meanwhile, said the DSS does not intend to "bully anyone or step over the bounds of what must be done to operate the camp lawfully. That is our clear understanding--that (this) must be and will be done lawfully."

He added that local approval of physical improvements is a requirement of the camp license.

Although township and Pioneer officials have acknowledged they expect to see one another in court

again over the camp, last week's licensing was a victory for proponents of the "work and learn" concept, which has been rejected by 3 other Michigan communities since it was proposed by Gov. James J. Blanchard in January 1987.

Citizen opposition ended plans to establish a camp

near Lexington in Sanilac County, as well as near Ann Arbor and Holly.

Citizen opposition also has been evident in Koylton Township, but DSS officials, including Drenovsky, say Pioneer officials demonstrated "sufficient community support" for the local program.

Gracey parts with her doll collection

Bernice Gracey recently spent 2 hours at her Sanilac County home unpacking boxes of dolls she's collected over the years.

She picked up an old, shabby doll, and despite its ragged appearance, recalled it being very special to her. The doll, packed away with the others in a closet in recent years, was her only Christmas present one year while growing up during the depression in Hudson, Wis.

Although she's never lost her love of dolls, Gracey's collection, with the exception of 3 special dolls and a few G.I. Joe figures, will soon be on the auction block.

Having decided to move out of state, most of her household furnishings and

other items--furniture, tools, appliances, antiques, etc.--will be sold at a public auction set for Sept. 10 at her home, about 8 1/2 miles east of Cass City.

Leaving the dolls behind was a hard decision, Gracey admits, adding her collection at last count totaled about 85 figures of various sizes, styles and ages. Many of them are handmade.

"I've picked them up in different states and countries. I got one in a street sale in Wisconsin. I picked up one doll in Ireland. . . and I got one in Germany. I've been to every state but Arizona, California and Mexico," she continued.

"I like my own doll," Gracey said of the battered doll she received at the age of 10 years. "I'm going to

keep her. All my nieces have played with her; my grandchildren have played with her."

"She's in pretty bad shape, she's been through a lot. People will say, 'You ought to do this with her or you ought to do that,' but I like her just the way she is. . . she's old like I am."

Gracey's fondness for dolls has kept her collecting for more than 30 years, although she's never purchased a brand new doll for the collection.

"I just like dolls, and when I'd see a doll at a garage sale or something and I'd take a fancy to it, I just bought it," she said, adding, "I'd just see a doll, think it was cute and I could clean it

U of M honors Dr. Donahue

To enter Hall of Fame

Dr. H. T. Donahue of Cass City will be one of 7 persons to be inducted into the Michigan Hall of Fame at the honor induction banquet at Crisler Arena Friday, Sept. 16.

Dr. Donahue will be honored at the organization's 11th induction ceremony for his wrestling record at the University of Michigan.

Dr. Donahue was the first Big Ten wrestling champion for the Wolverines in 1926. He also was first in 1927 and

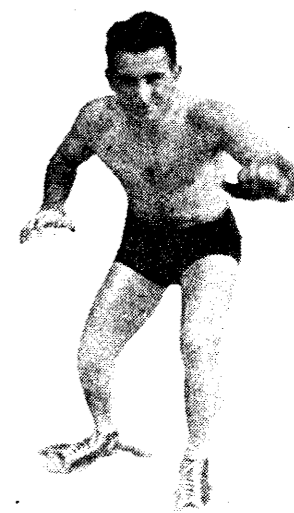
second in 1928. He was second in National Collegiate Athletic Association competition in 1928. In 1928 he narrowly missed qualifying for the Olympics. Two qualified and he finished third. His career record is 29-5-0.

Dr. Donahue assisted Coach Keen while attending medical school. He was a 4-time State of Michigan amateur champion in the 158-pound class.

Joining Donahue in the hall

of fame will be other athletes well known by all who follow sports at the university. They are Ed Frutig and Merv Pregulman, football; Francis Heydt, swimming; Donald McEwen, track; M. C. Burton, basketball, and Bruce Haynan, baseball.

Besides their athletic prowess, selection of the new members was made because they continued to enhance the university's reputation through their life's work.

HEALTH TIPS
Know your cholesterol level

A new program is under way in the Public Health Service. It's called the National Cholesterol Education Program, and its purpose is to reduce mortality from heart disease, the number one cause of death in America today. Its message: "Know your cholesterol level. It could save your life."
The links between high levels of cholesterol in the blood and the development of heart disease are clear. Many good studies have documented the connection; the matter is beyond dispute. The problem is that high blood cholesterol, like high blood pressure, seldom causes symptoms. You can have high blood cholesterol and not know it, and if you wait until you feel ill to be tested, it may be too late for

HEALTH TIPS

Know your cholesterol level

even the best heart specialists to save you from a heart attack. That is why everybody needs to know his or her blood cholesterol number.
You can get a cholesterol test from your doctor or at a health center. Your participation in the test will be quick and easy; you simply have to give up a sample of blood from a vein in your arm. From that sample, your cholesterol number will be calculated.
At present, devices that require only a drop of blood (from a simple finger stick) for the measurement of cholesterol are being evaluated. These tests are of great interest to public health officials because they typically give results in 3 to 20 minutes and can be used at worksites, shopping malls and other locations where large numbers of people could be given the opportunity to know and, if necessary, to control their blood cholesterol levels.
If you haven't had your blood cholesterol checked, you may, nevertheless, have heard other people talk about their readings. When they say that their level is 200, 180, 230 or whatever, they are referring to milligrams of cholesterol per deciliter of blood, or mg/dl. A desirable level usually is under 200 mg/dl. A reading between 200 mg/dl and 239 mg/dl is considered to be "borderline high," and a level of 240 mg/dl or more is high blood cholesterol. People who have readings of 240 or more should talk to their doctors about further testing and about how they can lower their blood cholesterol levels. So should people who have readings of 200 to 239 who have heart disease or are at high risk of developing heart disease, which is to say those with a

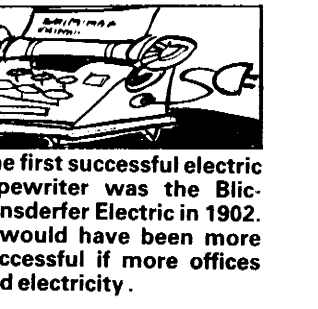

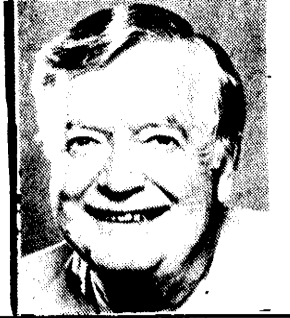

tion for a while, and came up with an answer that likens life in the big city to mountain climbing. You know you could get killed or hurt, but the adventure is worth the risk. We live here because it's here.

There is much pleasure in living in a downtown high-rise. I can look out one window and see the lights of Tiger Stadium. Out another window I see freighters from Europe and Milwaukee gliding on the beautiful Detroit River. I see a couple of fine restaurants I enjoy visiting. I'm a short walk away from lots of enjoyment, in Greektown, Ford Auditorium, the RenCen and so on.

I'm lucky. I live where I do by choice; I'm not financially trapped in some scummy neighborhood where police protection is a sad joke. Downtown is full of cops, protecting the city's image as seen by tourists, making sure the riverfront is worthy of being named after the Lord Mayor Coleman Young.

A fortunate thing about living in the big city is that your tolerance for crime inflates, just like prices. No matter if you live downtown or in the neighborhoods, there is no guarantee against the rapists in the park, the burglar through your window. The bad guys are everywhere, in varied numbers, and you gradually grow to accept it.

Twelve years ago, as a newcomer to the city after a lifetime of rural living, my wife would have screamed and fled from that young man offering sex in the park. Today it is an adventure, a funny story to tell at cocktail parties.

YOU GET USED TO IT

On a Saturday morning she took granddaughter, Emily, visiting from her small town home, shopping in colorful Eastern Market. They were in a spice store when a drunken man had to be evicted, with much pushing, shoving and cursing. Emily was frightened and wanted to get out of there immediately. Her grandma wouldn't leave until her purchases were completed.

Later, we chuckled about Emily's inexperienced reaction. Twelve years earlier, her grandma would have gone through a wall to get out of that store quickly.

On the door of the drug-store where I frequently shop there is a sign that says "No Change Without \$5 Purchase." Huh? What if I want to buy a \$2.50 item with 3 dollar bills? The owner said not to worry, the only purpose of the sign is to discourage thieves from asking for change just to see how much money is in the cash register. That made me laugh. It didn't make me worry about being caught inside the store during a holdup.

A few days ago a 14-year-old boy boarded the Mack bus at Cadillac Square and, a few blocks later, was shot dead by a fellow passenger. I often board the Mack bus at Cadillac Square. My wife and I wondered, with a laugh, how many times I've sat next to some young punk carrying a gun.

That's life in the big city, accepting risk to gain adventure, just like mountain climbing. We enjoy the excitement and laugh at the danger of falling off the mountain. We laugh nervously.

We laugh to keep from crying.

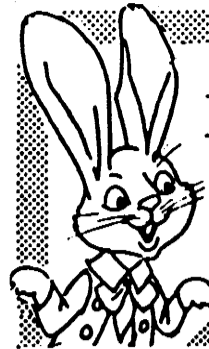

3 sentenced, several enter pleas in busy Tuscola Circuit Court

Three persons were sentenced to jail and/or prison during a busy day Thursday in Tuscola County Circuit Court.

Akron resident Joseph H. Brady, 22, 4331 Beach St., was sentenced to 93 days in the county jail and 32 months to 60 months in prison for Aug. 10 convictions of retail fraud, second degree, and probation violation.

Brady also was ordered to pay \$8,000 in restitution.

Court records state he stole property from a store in Caro July 26, and violated his probation by consuming alcohol July 25.

Randall C. Fielder Jr., 17, 143 Ellington St., Caro, was sentenced to 365 days in the county jail, to be delayed until the end of the school year, for 2 counts of breaking and entering.

He also was ordered to serve 5 years probation, pay \$600 in fines and costs plus restitution and attorneys fees, and receive therapy for

drug abuse.

The charges stem from the April 26 break-in of a vehicle in Caro, and the April 20 break-in of a house at 2888 W. Gilford Rd. in Almer Township.

Vassar resident Rodney W. Withers, 36, 2002 Higgins Rd., was sentenced to 90 days in jail, which was deferred, with work release granted, for a bench verdict of guilty to malicious destruction of property over \$100.

Withers also was ordered to serve 2 years probation, attend mental health counseling and pay \$500 in costs and fines.

The conviction stems from an incident involving an automobile Nov. 22, 1987, in Juniata Township, court records state.

Also Thursday, a plea of guilty to fourth degree Criminal Sexual Conduct, entered by Juan Ruiz, 24, of Akron, was refused by the court.

The case is to be scheduled for a pre-trial hearing.

Court records state Ruiz is charged with engaging in sexual conduct with another person, using force or coercion to engage in the act, April 13.

The offense carries a maximum sentence of 2 years imprisonment and/or a \$500 fine.

Gerald Csirke Jr., 19, of Burton, pleaded innocent to charges of breaking and entering an occupied dwelling, carrying a concealed weapon and malicious destruction of property over \$100.

A pre-trial hearing is to be set. Bond was set at \$7,000.

Csirke is charged with breaking into a house at 7206 Washburn Rd. in Vas-

sar Township, carrying a knife in a motor vehicle and damaging waterbeds, blankets and sheets belonging to Robert Tyndall Aug. 7.

Thomas J. Parrent, 33, 2312 S. Reese Rd., Reese, stood mute at his arraignment on charges of resisting and obstructing a police officer and operating a motor vehicle while his license was suspended Aug. 1 in Reese.

A hearing for motions is to be set. Bond was continued at \$1,500.

Parrent is charged with resisting and obstructing Reese Police officer Keith Nawrocki. The offense carries a maximum penalty of 2 years imprisonment or 1,000.

Also standing mute during his arraignment was Caro resident Jay C. Lind, 18, 3631 Mushroom Rd., who faces a charge of false pretenses over \$100.

A motion to reduce Lind's \$5,000 bond was denied. The case is to be scheduled for a pre-trial hearing.

Lind is charged with claiming to be his father, Leroy Lind, and giving permission to have \$2,500 withdrawn from his father's bank account.

The offense carries a maximum sentence of 10 years imprisonment or \$5,000.

Michael L. Nowicki, 19, of Wellston, stood mute during his arraignment to a charge of unlawfully driving away an automobile belonging to Timothy Fryers Aug. 9 in Mayville.

Bond was continued at \$5,000. A pre-trial hearing is to be set.

The offense carries a maximum sentence of 5 years imprisonment. Millington resident Gary

C. Gipson, 27, 2075 Swaffer Rd., entered a plea of innocent to probation violation. A hearing on the case is to be scheduled.

Court records state Gipson allegedly violated his probation July 11 by using marijuana. He is serving 24 months of probation for a Feb. 26, 1987, conviction of operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor, second offense.

Mark A. Martin, 25, 183 Gamble St., Caro, also pleaded innocent to a charge of probation violation. A hearing is to be scheduled in 12 days. Bond was set at \$50,000.

Expect seed shortage

Order now, farmers urged

Farmers should order their seed corn as soon as possible because of an anticipated shortage of seed corn for next year.

"I don't think we're ready to press the panic button yet, but farmers should be aware that there could be a shortage of seed," Elmer Rossman, Michigan State University corn breeding research specialist, said. "The earlier

farmers place their orders, the more likely they are to get their desired hybrids."

Like most Michigan farmers, seed growers have suffered from this year's drought. Early projections are that yields will be reduced by about 50 percent from previous years.

"Just how short the seed supply will be is still unknown at this time," Rossman remarked. "We're at least a month away from knowing the actual seed set. Early frosts could also damage yields."

Rossman expects that growers will be able to get adequate seed for next year's crop, but they may not be able to get the preferred hybrids that they have grown in the past.

To make matters worse, this year some seed companies had reduced their seed carry-over from last year.

Seed corn companies always carry-over seed to cover this type of an emergency, Rossman said. But at the start of this year the carry-over was not as large as normal because of the large carry-over from 1986. Farmers who have seed left over from this spring can still plant it next year. Seed that is stored in a cool, dry place should be viable for 3 or 4 years. Farmers should have a germination test run on the seed to ensure it will produce an adequate stand.

Farmers should also order their wheat and other small

grain seeds early.

"There will be an adequate wheat seed supply for Michigan Farmers, providing they order early," Dennis Greenman, manager of the Michigan Crop Improvement Association, said. "People handling seed aren't going to get stuck with a large inventory, so farmers need to get their seed lined up."

Greenman explained that Michigan supplies winter wheat seed to Wisconsin, Canada and part of New York. This means that Michigan growers who wait until the last minute to order their seed may find it difficult to find enough seed to plant their normal acreage. Farmers should also line up supplies of oats, barley and rye early to ensure they will have an adequate amount to plant. The availability of soybean and dry bean seeds will not be known for about another month.

Because of the low test weight and small size of wheat and oat seeds this year, Greenman recommends that farmers get a seed count per pound. Grain drills should be recalibrated because wheat seeds from this year's crop are about 25 percent smaller than normal.

Greenman added that smaller wheat seeds will not have an effect on next year's yields. Germination tests are 95 percent or better from wheat harvested this year.

Arenac no match for experienced Bulldogs in grid season opener

The Owen-Gage Bulldogs are busy preparing for this week's home opener against Webberville, after defeating an inferior Arenac Eastern team Friday for the second year in a row, 33-6.

Arenac was the only team to fall victim to coach Arnie Besonen's corps last season and the veteran head coach knows that his squad's first real test will come this Friday.

"We've got our work cut out for us against a strong Webberville team from the Lansing area. We've got to correct several mistakes, mainly ones that occurred in the first game. So we're not going to panic," Besonen said.

Webberville trounced the Bulldogs 32-0 last year and handed the young Bulldogs their first of 8 consecutive losses. But this time around it will be the Bulldogs who are the veteran team, as Webberville lost 9 starters, via graduation, from a year ago.

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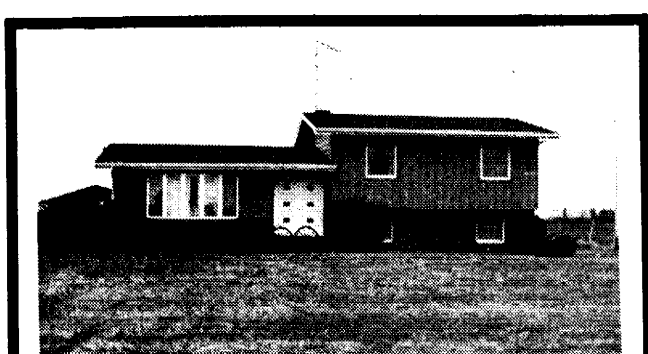


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Taking stock

The current rage of the environmentalists is garbage. Suddenly America is menaced by swill. The solution of course is to throw millions upon million of dollars at the problem.

For example: In the little suburb of Madison Heights north of Detroit they have an incinerator which up to now has not disturbed the state bureaucrats and the EPA and the local Nervous Nellies.

But now the bureaucrats have done a "study."

There is some fly ash that goes out of the stack when garbage is burned. The government has said the stuff is dangerous.

How dangerous? If you lived on the lee side (prevailing winds are southwest) for 70 years, 24 hours a day, then the chances are 15 in one million you would contract cancer, says the study's report.

Madison Heights has 30,000 people. That would mean that 45/100ths of one

Madison Heights resident would get cancer after 70 years of living in the same house 24 hours a day.

Personally if I had to live in the same Madison Heights house 24 hours a day for 70 years I would welcome malignancy. Mind you, there would be 29,999.55 people in town who wouldn't be afflicted. And only 45/100th of my body would get hit.

Seriously, do you know of anyone who has lived in the same place for 70 years, 24 hours a day?

I ran down the list of friends around 70 and find that they all have lived in at least a dozen different places during their lifetime.

In the face of such arguments, the government will still insist that Madison Heights spend \$12 million to cut down the fly ash from the incinerator. That's right—12 million bucks. That's worse than an affliction in itself.

Onward!

Two case histories: (June 1985 to June 1988)

Case I--A gift of 25M (par value) of zero coupon bonds is made to a new grandson. Tampa, Fla. Home mortgage revenue bonds, 0% coupon, insured by Verex, yield basis at purchase, about 10%, tax free. Due 2014 but callable by lot beginning 2004. Tax free. Cost, \$1,000.00

Market value June 30, 1988--\$1763.

Case II--A conservative investor, successful over a lifetime, and a canny man, gets a re-purchase agreement with his bank, loaning

them money for 30 days and then renewing every month. "Repo's" they call this sort of deal.

Average rate around 7% over the period. Taxable, with net yield after tax, 5%. Value of each \$1,000 now after 3 years of compounding, \$1157.

The comparison is one of apples and oranges. Case II is as close to 100% liquid as you're going to get. With 30-day paper, your average time to cash-in is 15 days. You can hold your breath almost that long, and it wouldn't hurt most of us to starve for a fortnight.

Rising interest rates would help the fellow with the 30-day loans to the bank. They'd hurt Tiny Tim, the grandson whose mother is holding the zero-coupon bonds for him. However, the youngster is too young to worry, and his mother is too busy.

With an insured housing bond from Tampa, you do know that it will be paid off at par, and Tiny Tim will get the full amount in 2014, when he will be 29 years old, and hopefully out of school and ready to go to work.

So the zero-coupons are now worth \$1763. The repo's in the bank deal are worth \$1157 after compounding.

It's still early in this game, but so far, so good. Score: \$1763 vs \$1157.

As any financial writer will tell you, the time to report news is when it's in your favor.

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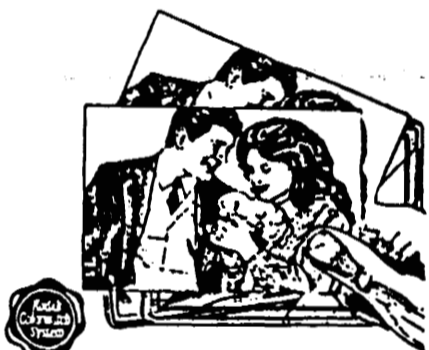

AROUND THE FARM

Watch for spider mites

There have been several inquiries at the Tuscola County Extension office relating to spider mites in growers' soybean fields, and we are encouraging growers to scout their soybean fields immediately for spider mites. Initial damage appears as yellow speckling on the upper surface of the lower leaves and gradually progresses to bronzing of the entire leaf. Infestations often start along grassy or weedy edges, near dusty roads or in previously dry or stressed areas of fields. Treat any portion of a field which has severely bronzed leaves. Be sure to check how far the mites have spread beyond the area of visible damage. Spot treat the entire area in which mites are present. If the infestation is more general but bronzing has not occurred, then treatment is recommended if 25% of the leaf area shows yellowing and mites are present. A hard thunderstorm will greatly reduce mite populations but usually not completely remove them. Where rainfall has occurred, continue to scout to catch any mite build up.

There have been a few fields in Tuscola County sprayed for spider mites, however, the real concern we have is if the weather should warm up and dry and hot conditions prevail, the spider mite problem can really explode. Consequently, it is important to continue to observe your fields through mid September since good, healthy green leaves determine size of soybean harvest. The insecticides recommended for spider mite control are: Cygon (dimethoate), Lorsban 50W, Diazinon AG 500, Omite 6E, Comite and Curacron 6E. Information from a recent test against mites in Indiana have shown that Cygon (dimethoate) and

Lorsban have given the highest percent reduction in killing the adult mites. It is important to use 3 or more gallons of water per acre by air to increase the effectiveness of the products. Avoid spraying by air except early in the morning and late in the evening. This will avoid the problem of spray particles being carried upward by currents of warm rising air. For ground applications using drop nozzles directed into closed canopy beans, use 40 PSI and 30-40 gallons of water per acre for best control. If you should have further questions relating to the spider mite, please contact the Tuscola County Cooperative Extension Service office in Caro at 673-5999, Ext. 228.
