Village Manager Lou S. LaPonsie said he has requested a transportation official to observe the intersection and determine whether the traffic might warrant installation of a traffic signal.

An apparent increase in congestion, partly due to the recent opening of 2 new businesses at the west end of the village, is one reason for the request, LaPonsie said, adding, "The other concern is that the traffic coming from out of town still isn't slowing that much."

"There are times when the intersection is busier than at other times, but it's a busy intersection." LaPonsie noted Doerr Road is used by many employees from General Cable Co. and Walbro


Post 3644 member Jack Esau surprised Bishop with a certificate from the government of France in appreciation for services rendered during WWI.

Bishop, who will be 91 in December, spent 21 months overseas as a member of the U.S. Air Corps, which was attached to the English Air Corps. He began his service in 1917, spending 6 months in England and a full year in the Argonne Forest area in France, where he served as a reconnaissance photographer.

A ruptured appendix forced Bishop to return to the United States in the spring of 1919.

According to Esau, officials at the French Embassy in Washington estimate there are about 2,000 living American WWI combat veterans who served in France. To date, about 1,750 have received certificates of appreciation.

Among those in attendance Saturday were Bishop's family and fellow WWI veteran Vernon McConnell, also of Cass City, who earlier this year received a certificate of appreciation from the French Government for his role in the war. McConnell, 92, was a sergeant in the Army.







Last week, my 19-year-old granddaughter did the same thing I did when I was 19, in 1945. She returned to her Michigan home from Munich. It is something for an old poop to think about.

Michele was on vacation with two other girls. They were invited to stay in the homes of traveling Munich musicians they met at a German festival this summer in Frankenmuth. Fortythree years earlier, on my visit to the Munich area, with no invitation, I stayed in a tavern, sleeping behind the bar.

ad arrived there toward the end of World War II, an inadequate replacement in the 12th Armored Division. I was an assistant half-track driver, which meant I washed it.

Conquering soldiers moved in where they pleased and worried little about where the displaced enemy might go. My armored infantry company took over a beer garden in a tiny farming village near Munich. The second floor bad been converted into a makeshift garment factory where women made military uniforms. In one big room, two dozen sewing machines were lined up like school desks.

The tavern keeper and his family lived on the job, and there were five bedrooms in the building. I remember · clearly because, as one of the new guys, I didn't get a bed. I spread my sleeping bag behind the bar, which, unfortunately, was dry. Not one full bottle or keg. Thirsty troops had preceded return.

their job - killing and destroying. The evidence of their effectiveness could be seen in the occasional charred German tank and in the shot-up buildings of Munich. This evidence could also be seen in the eyes of the German people on the

streets. I avoided their sullen glances, but I felt them. I wondered which of them had to move out of the tavern building because I moved in.

There were almost no young German men on the streets. Just old men and women of all ages. And little children who snatched the American soldiers' cigaret butts as soon as they hit the ground. Children who stood beside the garbage cans out-

side our mess tent and silently begged us to scrape out our mess kits into their hands or containers. Once in awhile I drew garbage detail. That meant riding the garbage truck to a dump outside town and shoveling the stinking refuse into huge piles. The little children were there, too. They picked through the garbage, sticking the most





I can remember piling about 10 in a car to drive to the ball diamond and ending upside down in the ditch because the driver attempted to take a corner too fast. Now that would get you a ticket, at least. Then we all jumped out, pushed the car upright and out of the ditch and went to practice.

I suspect that there were probably more accidents then per mile driven than there are today, but can't prove it.

How do I account for the lack of serious accidents in 10 years I drove while going to school? As the guy said, I'd rather

SCHOOL INFORMATION

The 1987-88 audit shows a deficit for the year in the General Fund of \$208,281. The General Fund balance decreased from \$415,473 to \$207,192. Of the \$207,192 fund balance \$74,764 is restricted for asbestos abatement, leaving an unrestricted fund balance of \$132,428. When considering the General Fund balance, it should be kept in mind that there is \$200,979 in bus notes which the district is responsible for from general revenues.

One of the primary reasons for the deficit was due to a loss of 41 students in the total district enrollment. This student decrease resulted in revenue losses of nearly \$100,000.

All debt retirement payments were made on schedule and the accounts retain sufficient balances to meet payment needs. During the past year the major maintenance

project for the school system was the asbestos abatement project. All identified asbestos insulation materials in all of the school's boiler and air handling rooms have been removed and replaced with non asbestos materials.



said Friday she's relieved. "I think it's workable," she said of the contract. "I'm confident we can keep the quality up, and that was our

main concern.' The dispute, aired during contract negotiations in late September, focused on proposed reductions of reim-

bursement Region VII provides to HDC for home delivered and congregate meals, and case coordination and support services. HDC officials indicated

cuts in their proposed budget would mean a reduction in the quality of services. Region VII Director Mohammed Kahn, however, said administrative costs were too high and that by cutting those expenses more seniors could be served in the programs.

Vandemark said the approved contract represents compromise on both sides. What we did was cut \$27,000 to \$30,000 out of the budget," she explained, adding the reimbursement rates agreed upon are \$1.65 for congregate meals, \$1.70 for home delivered meals, and \$9.14 for case coordination and support services. Despite the lower-thanrequested rates, HDC will

still provide the same number of meals (91,150 congregate and 146,120 delivered) it had planned initially, Vandemark said.



An Owendale motorist was treated and released from Hills and Dales General Hospital Friday after her southbound vehicle was struck by another vehicle at the intersection of Cemetery and Bay City-Forestville roads.

According to Tuscola County Sheriff's deputies, Ruth I. Jaworski, 5511 Canboro Rd., Owendale, stopped at the intersection and then continued south at about 6:30 a.m. when her vehicle was hit by a westbound vehicle driven by Marcus T. Osantowski of Ubly.

Jaworski's vehicle sustained light damage and Osantowski's vehicle sustained moderate damage, according to reports, which state Osantowski was cited for failing to yield.

A Pontiac man was arrested on suspicion of operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor carly Saturday morning in Wells Township.

John R. Dowling, 28, was observed driving in the wrong traffic lane on Bevens Road near Murray Road at about 2:40 a.m., reports state.

'88 Apportionment Report indicates tax bills going up

Tuscola County residents can expect to see higher tax bills over the next year, despite a third consecutive drop in property values overall in 1988.

A total of \$29,273,464 in taxes will be collected by the county next year, according the Equalization to Department's 1988 Apportionment Report, which was approved last month by the County Board of Commissioners.

The annual report outlines the millages which will be levied against property values in the county.

The 1988 tax tab, up by \$1,258,079 over last year, includes \$25,208,565 in winter tax bills. Vassar City He added, "Traffic lights and the county's villages have already collected most of an additional \$2,427,171, and the Caro School District will collect half of its levy (\$1,637,727) next summer. Although property values, particularly agricultural land, have continued to fall overall, taxes are up in most areas of the county to some extent because of voter approved millage increases.

How much taxes will increase depends on what township and school district one resides in and whether additional millage has been approved. All county residents will be

assessed an additional 1.1 mills for the combined road patrol/dispatch and senior services millages, which were approved in August.

In addition, voters in 7 of the county's 9 school dis-tricts (Caro and Mayville are the exceptions) have approved additional operating millage requests over the past year.

No changes were made in the millages collected by the intermediate school districts in Tuscola, Huron and Sanilac counties.

Because of declining land values, the Tuscola ISD, which levies 4.5 mills, will collect \$76,000 less next year. The Huron ISD will collect on 2.65 mills and the Sanilac ISD, 3.15 mills. Tuscola County, meanwhile, will collect some \$2.36 million for general operations. That figure represents a decrease of \$80,000 from last year, when the county's state equalized valuation totaled \$581,024,066, compared to \$561,962,317 this year. The county's peak SEV came in 1985 at \$700,281,856. Also to be collected by the county next year will be \$280,981 for bridge construction and an equal amount for operation of the Medical Care Facility, \$112,392 for senior citizen programs, and \$505,766 for the sheriff's road patrol. The 1988 county bridge and medical care millages will each net about \$10,000 less than a year ago.

Caro School District residents living in Ellington Township are to be assessed a total of 46.09 mills (31.02 mills 12-1-88 and 15.07 mills 7-1-88). The 1988 millage rate is up by 4.09 mills.

Cass City School District residents living in the same township, meanwhile, will pay taxes on 46 mills, an increase of 6.1 mills over 1987.

The SEV in Ellington Township fell by \$25,383 in 1988.

ELMWOOD TOWNSHIP

In Elmwood Township, where the SEV dropped by nearly \$2.5 million, those living in the Caro School District will be assessed 44.09 mills, compared to the 1987 rate of 42.99 mills.

Cass City School District residents and those living in the Goslin property district will pay on 44 mills, up by 3.1 mills over the 1987 rate. Those township residents

living in the Owen-Gage School District will be assessed 57.6389 mills, compared to 56.8857 mills in 1987.


The Cass City School District also includes portions of 4 other townships.

Almer Township residents living in the district will pay on 44 mills, compared to 40.4 mills in 1987; Columbia Township residents (including those living in the

Goslin property district) will be assessed 44 mills, compared to 40.9 mills; Kingston Township residents will pay on 42.5 mills, compared to 39.4 mills, and Wells Township residents will be assessed 42.3419 mills, compared to 39.2406 mills in 1987.






