Request stoplight at Doerr Road-Main Street corner

Traffic congestion near Doerr Road and Main Street in Cass City has prompted village officials to request the state Department of Transportation to take another look at the intersection.

The request was prompted following brief discussion of the matter at a recent village council meeting. Village Manager Lou S. LaPonsie said he has requested a transportation official to observe the intersection and determine whether the traffic might warrant installation of a traffic signal.

An apparent increase in congestion, partly due to the recent opening of 2 new businesses at the west end of the village, is one reason for the request, LaPonsie said, adding, "The other concern is that the traffic coming from out of town still isn't slowing that much."

"There are times when the intersection is busier than at other times, but it's a busy intersection," LaPonsie noted. Doerr Road is used by many employees from General Cable Co. and Walbro

Corp., and from persons entering or leaving the village's Industrial Park.

Elwyn Helwig, who chairs the council's Streets Committee, agrees.

Aside from new business, the Charmont Motel is adding on rooms, and "that is going to cause more traffic," he remarked.

"My point was people were complaining about the time they had to spend to get into the intersection," Helwig said.

That same complaint prompted village officials to ask transportation department official David Van Hine, district traffic and safety engineer, to take a look at the intersection nearly a year ago.

The results of an hour-long observation by Van Hine, however, showed traffic volume at Doerr Road and Main Street wasn't excessive enough at that time to warrant consideration of a traffic signal.

According to Van Hine's report, 99 vehicles were observed between 3 and 4 p.m. Feb. 10, 1987. Of those

vehicles, 38 turned left from Doerr Road onto Main Street and the remaining 61 turned right.

Van Hine reported that vehicles making a right turn waited an average of 3.90 seconds, with half waiting less than 2 seconds to make their turn. Left-turning vehicles waited longer—an average of 10.61 seconds,

with half waiting less than 8 seconds.

"To put this into perspective," Van Hine said in his report, "the existing traffic signal at Seeger Street has 36 seconds of 'red' time. If you first miss the yellow signal indication, you will wait 36 seconds before receiving a green signal. Only

Caro man dies in car crash

A 25-year-old Caro man was killed and another Caro man remains hospitalized following a one-vehicle crash early Friday morning on the grounds of Caro Community Schools.

Lee M. Lipan was pronounced dead at the scene, a spokeswoman at the Caro Police Department said.

A passenger in the vehicle, Mark L. Flikkie, 28, was listed in "critical" condition Monday at St. Mary's Medi-

cal Center in Saginaw.

The spokeswoman said Lipan was westbound on Lincoln Street at about 12:45 a.m. when his vehicle crossed Hooper Street, entered the school grounds and traveled about 200 feet before hitting a tree. Lincoln Street ends at Hooper Street, which runs north-south.

There were no visible signs of skid marks or that brakes were applied, according to the spokeswoman, who said neither Lipan nor Flikkie was wearing a seat belt.

The Caro Fire Department's Jaws of Life were used to remove the pair from the vehicle.

The accident, Caro's second traffic related fatality in the past 6 1/2 weeks, remains under investigation.

Glory pheasant days recalled

Army ready for Tuesday opener

A number of area residents will join the state's army of hunters next week when the firearm deer season gets underway.

The opener holds much optimism—conservation officials say they expect another record kill.

But the season also has sparked the memories of some Cass City area hunters who remember a time when the fall "opener" in the Thumb had little to do with deer. Rather, it meant some of the best pheasant hunting in the state.

Back in the 1930s, 40s, 50s and even into the 60s, the pheasant season here wasn't merely popular; it was celebrated throughout the community.

"They used to close down some of the business. They even let school out on opening day," Cass City resident and avid bird hunter Fred Leeson remarked. "It was quite an event."

Although the pheasant population has since dwindled, while the deer numbers have exploded, Leeson said he still prefers bird and small game hunting. He doesn't hunt deer anymore.

Another area hunter, Howard Muntz, recalled the abundance of pheasants locally.

"They were really thick, like chickens," he explained. "I can't remember what the bag limit was, but you had no trouble getting your limit; you could do it in a half hour."

Muntz, who noted there were few deer around at that time, added, "There were just people hunting all over. You had a lot of people

coming up from the cities." Now, he said, "We occasionally see one (pheasant), but you don't see them that often."

Muntz said he likes to hunt for deer, but would also like to see the pheasant numbers grow again.

HEYDAY

Former Cass City businessman and avid hunter Phil Retherford also remembers the pheasant's heyday in the Thumb.

"They had a hunters' ball and everything else the night before the pheasant season opener," he recalled. "They (hunters) came from all over."

"About the 1950s is when the deer started coming. Before that it was all pheasants," Retherford commented. "The limit was 2 a day and 8 in a season, but there weren't many that paid that much attention to it."

Retherford said he doesn't hunt anymore, but noted he'd rather hunt pheasant than anything else.

He recalled that seeing a flock of 15 to 20 pheasants wasn't uncommon years ago, and that it took only a short time to bag a limit.

Avid hunter Larry Groombridge of Cass City recalled similar memories.

Groombridge wasn't old enough to hunt during the earlier days, but he said he remembers the success hunters enjoyed.

"Five minutes into the season, if you were a good shot, you should have your limit," he commented. "Pheasants were in your backyard, it seemed, but you never saw any deer at that time."

Groombridge, who prefers deer hunting, also remembers ladies aid groups from churches in the Shabbona area putting on a dinner at Shabbona Hall for pheasant hunters.

The Thumb was really noted for pheasant at that time," he continued, adding he noticed that as the pheasant population dropped, other bird numbers, such as the partridge, increased.

POPULATION SHIFT

With the Thumb deer and pheasant populations having shifted over the past several years, the Department of Natural Resources is attempting to increase pheasant numbers while at the same time pare the deer population.

And although hunters in Michigan bagged an estimated record of more than

337,000 deer last year, DNR officials say the kill wasn't enough. This year's total deer kill is expected to top 400,000.

The state's large deer herd, estimated at 1.5 million animals, is the result of high herd survival rates due to milder than usual weather in the lower peninsula and an average Upper Peninsula winter last season.

In an attempt to reduce the herd, the DNR is allowing more deer to be taken in certain areas, including portions of the Thumb, where crop damage from deer feeding is prevalent.

According to DNR Wildlife Biologist Bud Jarvis, crop damage has been a problem locally. Jarvis this summer issued 3 times the normal number of special deer permits for crop dam-

World War I veteran

French honor Lewis Bishop, 90

About 60 persons attended a dinner in honor of Cass City resident and World War I veteran Lewis Bishop Saturday evening at the Cass City Veterans of Foreign Wars Post Hall.

Post 3644 member Jack Esau surprised Bishop with a certificate from the government of France in appreciation for services rendered during WWI.

Bishop, who will be 91 in December, spent 21 months overseas as a member of the U.S. Air Corps, which was attached to the English Air Corps. He began his service in 1917, spending 6 months in England and a full year in the Argonne Forest area in France, where he served as a reconnaissance photographer.

A ruptured appendix forced Bishop to return to the United States in the spring of 1919.

According to Esau, officials at the French Embassy in Washington estimate there are about 2,000 living American WWI combat veterans who served in France. To date, about 1,750 have received certificates of appreciation.

Among those in attendance Saturday were Bishop's family and fellow WWI veteran Vernon McConnell, also of Cass City, who earlier this year received a certificate of appreciation from the French Government for his role in the war. McConnell, 92, was a sergeant in the Army.

**Lo-cho. recipes**

Actor James Garner, who appeared on the Johnny Carson show Friday night, had succeeded in lowering his cholesterol level from the dangerous zone around 275 to 159, primarily by changing his diet.

Garner had little choice. He had already survived surgery for 4 heart bypasses and an aortal aneurysm.

Most of us are concerned with keeping our cholesterol levels under control. Sometimes, though, when con-

fronted with the long list of no-nos and the few acceptable foods, it seems as if the joy of eating must be a thing of the past.

Angel food cake is one of the few desserts allowed in a low cholesterol diet. Betty Crocker has come up with a neat little recipe book designed to perk it up and make angel food a little more interesting.

Here are a couple of recipes that have zero cholesterol and very few calories.

**FRUIT TRIFLE**

1/2 of an angel food cake  
1 can (15 1/4 oz.) crushed pineapple, drained  
1 can (11 oz.) mandarin orange segments, drained  
1 pkg. (.9 oz.) sugar-free vanilla instant pudding  
1 envelope whipped topping mix  
1/4 cup chopped walnuts  
6 maraschino cherries with stems

Tear cake into small pieces. Mix pineapple and orange segments. Prepare pudding as directed on package, except use skim milk. Layer half each of the cake pieces, fruit mixture and pudding in a 2-quart serving bowl. Repeat. Prepare topping mix, using skim milk, and spread over the top. Sprinkle with walnuts and garnish with cherries. Refrigerate at least 2 hours.

**CRUNCH CAKE**

3/4 cup coarsely crushed Wheaties or Total cereal (about 1 1/2 cups uncrushed)  
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon  
1 pkg. white angel food cake mix

Heat oven to 350. Mix cereal and cinnamon. Prepare cake mix as directed on package and fold cereal mixture into batter. Pour into ungreased 12-cup bundt cake pan and bake as directed. Serve with fresh fruit.

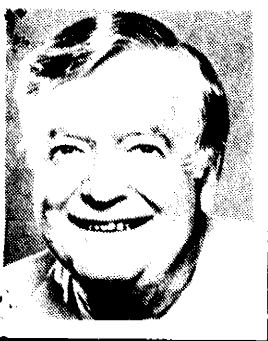

"If It Fitz..."

I hated it

Last week, my 19-year-old granddaughter did the same thing I did when I was 19, in 1945. She returned to her Michigan home from Munich. It is something for an old poop to think about.

Michele was on vacation with two other girls. They were invited to stay in the homes of traveling Munich musicians they met at a German festival this summer in Frankenmuth. Forty-three years earlier, on my visit to the Munich area, with no invitation, I stayed in a tavern, sleeping behind the bar.

I arrived there toward the end of World War II, an inadequate replacement in the 12th Armored Division. I was an assistant half-track driver, which meant I washed it.

Conquering soldiers moved in where they pleased and worried little about where the displaced enemy might go. My armored infantry company took over a beer garden in a tiny farming village near Munich. The second floor had been converted into a makeshift garment factory where women made military uniforms. In one big room, two dozen sewing machines were lined up like school desks.

The tavern keeper and his family lived on the job, and there were five bedrooms in the building. I remember clearly because, as one of the new guys, I didn't get a bed. I spread my sleeping bag behind the bar, which, unfortunately, was dry. Not one full bottle or keg. Thirsty troops had preceded

us. **BREAKING THE GARBAGE RULES**

Those troops had done their job — killing and destroying. The evidence of their effectiveness could be seen in the occasional charred German tank and in the shot-up buildings of Munich. This evidence could also be seen in the eyes of the German people on the streets. I avoided their sullen glances, but I felt them. I wondered which of them had to move out of the tavern building because I moved in.

There were almost no young German men on the streets. Just old men and women of all ages. And little children who snatched the American soldiers' cigaret butts as soon as they hit the ground. Children who stood beside the garbage cans outside our mess tent and silently begged us to scrape out our mess kits into their hands or containers.

Once in awhile I drew garbage detail. That meant riding the garbage truck to a dump outside town and shoveling the stinking refuse into huge piles. The little children were there, too. They picked through the garbage, sticking the most choice bits of rotting food into tin cans to take home to their families.

Most of the conquering soldiers tried to steer the cleanest garbage toward the children. We also gave them candy. We weren't supposed to. During those last weeks of the war, and for a while after, there was a birthday — with no desire to return.

"non-fraternization policy" that forbade the occupying army from any sort of social contact with the enemy.

But what were we supposed to do, blame the children for Hitler and his followers? Punish them for the unbelievably obscene things that adults did in a Munich suburb called Dachau?

**PROGRESS, AFTER 43 YEARS**

I hated it in Munich, mainly because of those children grasping for garbage. They were the same age as my little sisters back home. I was happy to get out of there, sailing for home on Aug. 5, 1945 — my 19th birthday. Forty-three years later, my 19-year-old granddaughter was sorry to leave Munich. She had a great time and wants to go back. Splendid. That's progress in international fraternizing and I yearn for much more of the same — everywhere.

And I wonder about those little children at that garbage dump in 1945. They'd be around 50 years old today. Did one of them, just by chance, pass near my granddaughter on a Munich street in 1988? Did one of them ever have a bedroom over a tavern, near two dozen sewing machines? Did he or she have to move out quickly when the Americans moved in?

It is something for an old poop to think about, and damn near cry.

8:30 p.m. the same evening while parked at the Crestwood Lounge in Caro.

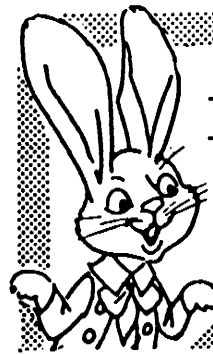
**Music, mission weekend slated**

Big deal, my wife sniffed, as she delved into a story in one of the daily papers that comes to the house. The story that was treated with such disdain concerned a 12-year-old girl who climbed into the family car and, using 2 pillows for leverage, drove it for 100 miles.

She had been driving for 2 1/2 hours before she was stopped and coaxed into a parking lot by a police officer.

You need to know the background before you can understand why the story generated so much disdain in the Haire household. Way back in the dark ages when we were that age, a 12-year-old driving was nothing unusual. Dorothy drove to school every day at 12 and by that advanced old age, I had been dragging around the back roads for 3 years.

There were a variety of

reasons for driving at a young age in farm communities at the time. One was that there were no school busses (We paid for our books and pencils, too, but that's another story.) and kids either were in a car pool or walked.

Sure, things were different then. But not as much different as you'd imagine a half century later. There were fewer cars, but the roads were less wide, couldn't accommodate the traffic during peak periods. Nothing changes much, does it?

In Pinconning where we lived, M-13 (then U.S. 23) was a 2-lane road and on Sunday afternoons it was as jammed as I-75 at the old Zilwaukee bridge when a boat was going through.

To tell the truth, I think that both of us were lawbreakers. If memory serves, the legal age was 14. But no one paid too much attention to that and by the time it was legal to drive, everyone who had access to a car was a veteran with 100's of miles under his or her belt.

There were plenty of accidents involving student drivers, legal and non-legal, but none that resulted in funerals or life-time disfigurement.

It would be nice to brag that all this was because we were better drivers in those days. The truth is that the kid behind the wheel hasn't changed much. Just like today, there were the rash drivers, the timid drivers, the cautious drivers and the take-a-chance stupid ones.

I can remember piling about 10 in a car to drive to the ball diamond and ending upside down in the ditch because the driver attempted to take a corner too fast. Now that would get you a ticket, at least. Then we all jumped out, pushed the car upright and out of the ditch and went to practice.

I suspect that there were probably more accidents then per mile driven than there are today, but can't prove it.

How do I account for the lack of serious accidents in 10 years I drove while going to school?

As the guy said, I'd rather be lucky than good.

### SCHOOL INFORMATION

The 1987-88 audit shows a deficit for the year in the General Fund of \$208,281. The General Fund balance decreased from \$415,473 to \$207,192. Of the \$207,192 fund balance \$74,764 is restricted for asbestos abatement, leaving an unrestricted fund balance of \$132,428. When considering the General Fund balance, it should be kept in mind that there is \$200,979 in bus notes which the district is responsible for from general revenues.

One of the primary reasons for the deficit was due to a loss of 41 students in the total district enrollment. This student decrease resulted in revenue losses of nearly \$100,000.

All debt retirement payments were made on schedule and the accounts retain sufficient balances to meet payment needs.

During the past year the major maintenance project for the school system was the asbestos abatement project. All identified asbestos insulation materials in all of the school's boiler and air handling rooms have been removed and replaced with non asbestos materials.

# Area mother, volunteer share year of support

of questions about their son, Shawn, in the weeks following his birth 13 months ago. The Gagetown area couple encountered frustrations typically encountered by

new moms and dads. There was uncertainty that what they were doing and feeling was "okay."

The Gaeths' transition to parenthood was eased, however, with the help of a new tri-county volunteer program, which provided support and more.

The program, Care and Response Enabling Self Sufficiency (CARESS) for new mothers, was established about 2 years ago for single or married mothers whether they're having their first baby or their eighth baby.

The program offers "support" in the form of a volunteer, who undergoes 6 hours of training (available on video tape) and then meets with the mother on a regular basis for a period of one year.

For Gaeth and her volunteer, Berniece Abbe of Owendale, who recently completed their year together, the program has provided not only a helping relationship, but also a lasting friendship.

"It's meant a lot to me to be able to ask any questions whether they were stupid or not, and not have someone force their opinions on me," Gaeth remarked during a recent interview at her home. "I don't think it (relationship) will stop now. I think we'll continue to be good friends."

"It turned out to be more than I expected," Abbe agreed, adding, "I feel like I've made a good friend."

Abbe, who has a 17-year-old daughter, noted that as a volunteer, her job has consisted largely of simply being a friend and sharing her experiences as a mother.

## OPTIONS

"Basically, we're supposed to (provide) information to the mother—give her options, be someone she can bounce questions off objectively," she explained. "It's not our role to tell the mother what to do."

Gaeth and Abbe recalled a few of the problems they've conquered during their 60 to 90-minute weekly visits over the past year.

Gaeth remembered a brief period during which her son seemed to be experiencing discomfort after breast feeding. She mentioned the problem to Abbe, who asked if she had been drinking orange juice. The juice turned out to be the culprit. "Another thing I helped Rosemary with was her feelings when she got ready to go back to work," Abbe recalled. "I tried to help her prepare" for what she would feel when she got ready to go back.

"It's difficult when you don't know what to expect of yourself," she observed, adding that often a mother simply needs to know that what she's feeling is normal and alright.

Gaeth nodded. "You always feel like you're supposed to solve your own

problems. You wonder if you're the only one who's going through this," she said.

## WILLINGNESS

Abbe indicated Gaeth's willingness to ask questions and take part in the support relationship was key in terms of what she got out of it. She pointed out that Gaeth's husband, Brian, also took an active part. "When he was there he'd ask questions."

Brian, an electrician with Sebewaing Industries, commented that his interest was sparked by a desire to understand what his wife was going through emotionally.

"I think the positive part about it is the objectivity" of the volunteer, he said, adding that after their son was born, "We were bombarded by everybody to do this or do that."

According to Ubyly resident Julia Heilig, who serves as executive director of CARESS, providing information to mothers and then allowing them the freedom to make their own decisions is the program's primary objective.

"Self sufficiency is never going to happen if someone is always telling you what to do," she remarked.

Heilig noted that the need for programs such as CARESS, the brainchild of Harbor Beach resident Marge Nilsen, has been growing in recent years.

## MOBILE SOCIETY

"We've become such a mobile society, we don't have the family support we used to," she commented, adding other changes in society, including more emphasis being placed on career selection than on the skills of motherhood, also have contributed to the need for a support network.

For the mothers, the biggest advantage of CARESS is the friendship, support and trust of another person, she continued. "Even though we don't target the men in these families... they definitely feel like they are part of" the support relationship.

CARESS matched up 15 mothers and volunteers in its first year of operation, which was made possible through about \$5,600 in seed money provided by the Reorganized Church of Latter Day Saints' Tangible Love Fund, and donations from the Huron and Sanilac CAN councils.

This year Heilig was flabbergasted with the results of her request for a \$4,500 grant from the Children's Trust Fund of Michigan.

"They called in July and because of the magnitude of the program and their belief in how badly needed it is, they gave us \$15,000," she said. The money, which allowed Heilig to begin working 3 days instead of

one, must be matched by local funds totalling 25 percent of the grant, she noted. Heilig said she hopes to match up at least 30 mothers and volunteers this year.

All will be satisfied customers if their experience comes close to that enjoyed by Gaeth and Abbe.

"It grew into a good friendship," Gaeth remarked, adding after getting to know Abbe, she was much more relaxed and able to ask important rather than trivial questions.

"She gave (me) confidence in myself, too. She always told me what I was doing right rather than what I was doing wrong."

Abbe added, "This was a situation where I've gotten more in return than I feel I have given. It's a good feeling."

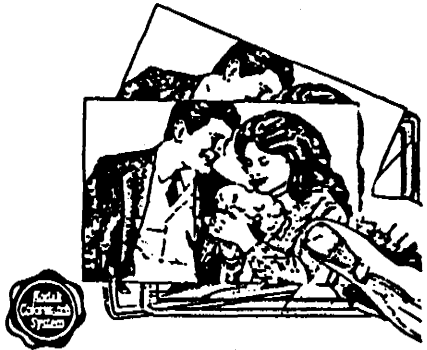

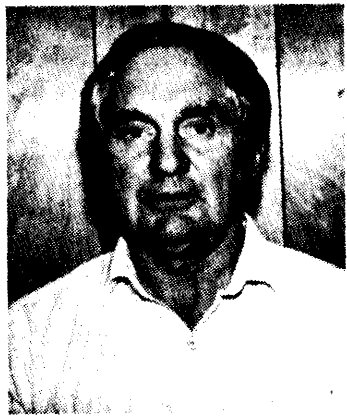
The City State store hopes to become an active member in the business sector of the village, and your neighbor, Dean Hoag, believes they will.

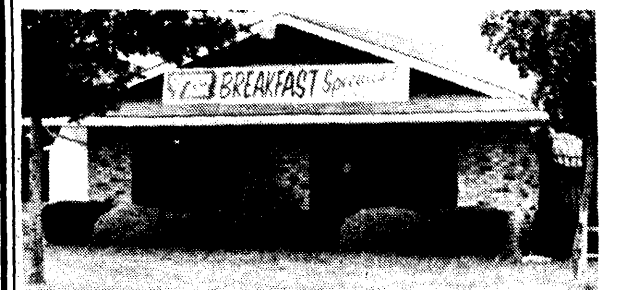

**Armed robbery plea nets 4 to 20 years**

One of 4 men accused of taking part in the Feb. 28 armed robbery of a Cass City couple was sentenced to 4 to 20 years in prison Friday in Tuscola County Circuit Court.

Lonnie L. Jordan, 21, of Detroit, was sentenced for an Aug. 10 plea of guilty to armed robbery.

Jordan and Fernando Vega, 21, also of Detroit, were charged with holding Larry and Karen Wilding at gun point and ransacking the couple's upstairs apartment at 6359 Pine St. while searching for drugs and money.

In July, Vega pleaded guilty to armed robbery in circuit court. He also pleaded guilty, in U.S. District Court, Bay City, to using a firearm in a drug trafficking crime.

Charges are still pending against 2 other defendants, who police believe were waiting in a vehicle near the Wilding apartment during the robbery. The defendants are Anthony E. Nerkowski Jr., 23, of Dearborn, and Allen Zimmerman, 24, of Gageton.

In other proceedings Friday, Randall J. DuRussell, 34, 225 Ellis St., Caro, was sentenced for a plea of guilty Sept. 9 to breaking and entering an unoccupied dwelling.

DuRussell was sentenced to 1 year in the county jail, with credit for 188 days

served; 5 years probation, \$600 in costs and fines, and attorney fees. He also was ordered to receive counseling at Mental Health and to attend Alcoholics Anonymous meetings.

Court records state the charge against DuRussell stems from the May 1 break-in of the D & C Department Store in Caro.

Millington resident Gary C. Gipson, 27, 2075 Swaffer Rd., was sentenced to an additional 30 days probation and ordered to pay \$40 in restitution and a \$500 fine



# Review hunter safety measures

Area hunters planning to take a crack at Michigan's bulging deer herd next week are urged to practice extreme caution and common sense in handling firearms. Last year 30 hunters were injured and 6 more lost their lives during the Nov. 15-30 firearm deer hunting season.

Twelve of the accidents (2 fatalities, 10 injuries) were self-inflicted, while the remaining 24 (4 fatalities, 20 injuries) were a result of another hunter's bullet. The 1987 figures were up from the 1986 firearm season, which claimed the lives of 4 hunters and injured 28

others, but were down slightly from 1985 statistics with a reported 31 injuries and 6 fatalities.

### Safety tips

1. **Treat every gun as if it were loaded** — you can never guarantee that your chamber is unloaded, so give an unloaded firearm the same respect you'd give a loaded firearm.
2. **Watch where you point your gun** — never point the muzzle at yourself or anyone else, even if it isn't loaded.
3. **Know your firearm** — make sure your firearm is in safe operating condition and the barrel free of obstructions. Double check the specifications of your ammunition to make sure it fits your gun.
4. **Don't load your gun before you're ready** — When traveling to and from your hunting blind, take down or have your actions open.
5. **Be sure of your target, and beyond** — Before you

squeeze the trigger, make sure you've carefully identified your target then look past it to be sure it's safe to shoot.

6. **Beware of fatigue** — when you've been out in the woods a long time fatigue can cause carelessness, which can cause accidents.

7. **Don't take chances with a loaded firearm** — never step over fences, jump ditches, or make other awkward or unbalanced moves while holding a loaded gun.

8. **Use care when practicing** — make sure your backstop will prevent ricochets and protect bystanders.

9. **Store guns safely** — store firearms unloaded, away from ammunition and out of the reach of children and inexperienced users.

10. **Remember, alcohol, drugs and firearms don't mix.**

age in the upper Thumb. Another indication that the local deer herd is too large is the number of car-deer accidents that occur each year.

In 1987, there were 644 such accidents in Tuscola County. The accidents caused 16 injuries but no deaths. There were 558 deer-car accidents in 1986 and 472 in 1985.

In Sanilac County, there were 720 deer-car accidents in 1987, causing 28 injuries

and one death. The county had 605 such accidents in 1986 and 525 in 1985.

Huron County recorded 522 accidents last year, causing 18 injuries and no deaths. In 1986 there were 510 deer-car accidents, compared to 438 in 1985.

Hunters who plan to bag a deer in the upper Thumb are expected to find the best hunting in eastern Tuscola, eastern Huron and northern Sanilac counties.

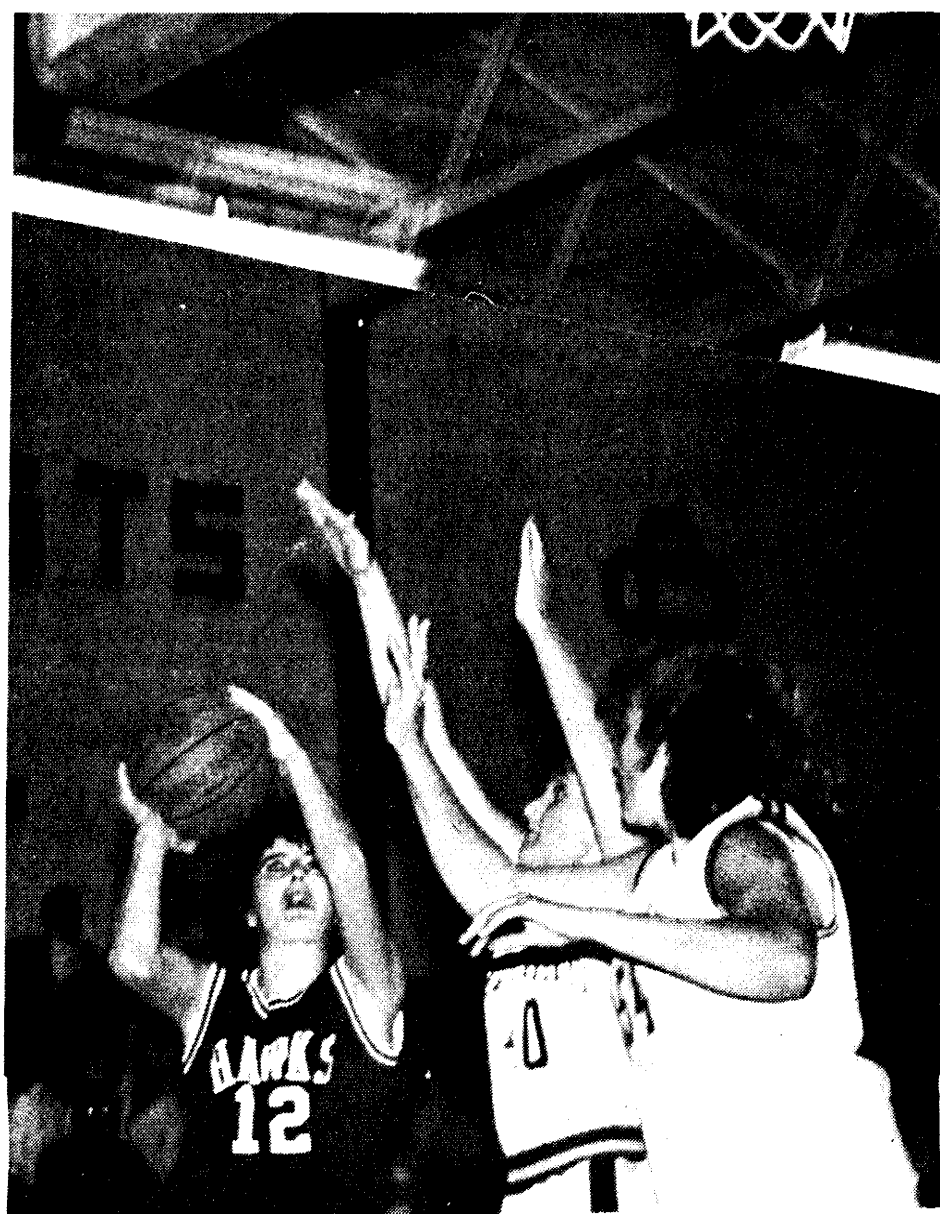
(8), but the meager output was enough to give the Hawks a 22-21 lead at the intermission as the defense limited the Hatchets to a basket and 3 free throws.

## Senior services contract settled

A tentative senior services agreement reached late last month by the Human Development Commission and Region VII Area Agency on Aging executive boards received final approval Thursday from the full Region VII board.

The agreement, which settles a dispute between the 2 parties over reimbursement rates for certain senior services, had already been approved by the full HDC board, which empowered its executive board to act on the contract.

Mary Ann Vandemark, HDC executive director, said Friday she's relieved. "I think it's workable," she said of the contract. "I'm confident we can keep the quality up, and that was our main concern."

The dispute, aired during contract negotiations in late September, focused on proposed reductions of reimbursement Region VII provides to HDC for home delivered and congregate meals, and case coordination and support services.

HDC officials indicated cuts in their proposed budget would mean a reduction in the quality of services. Region VII Director Mohammed Kahn, however, said administrative costs were too high and that by cutting those expenses more seniors could be served in the programs.

Vandemark said the approved contract represents compromise on both sides. "What we did was cut \$27,000 to \$30,000 out of the budget," she explained, adding the reimbursement rates agreed upon are \$1.65 for congregate meals, \$1.70 for home delivered meals, and \$9.14 for case coordination and support services.

Despite the lower-than-requested rates, HDC will still provide the same number of meals (91,150 congregate and 146,120 delivered) it had planned initially, Vandemark said.

one of the 99 Doerr Road vehicles waited that long to leave the stop sign."

"Installing a traffic signal is not going to reduce the present waiting time at Doerr Road," he concluded.

Contacted Friday, Van Hinc said he has agreed to make another observation in Cass City. He added, however, that it isn't likely traffic at the intersection has increased drastically enough to consider a traffic signal.

He explained that in order for an intersection to be considered for a signal, there would have to be a traffic flow of 140 vehicles per hour for at least 8 hours daily.

He added, "Traffic lights generally cause a lot more trouble" than they resolve.

Cass City Police Chief Gene Wilson suggested that measures other than installing a light, such as increasing street lighting and extending speed limits, might be more feasible, considering that traffic at the intersection is heavy only at certain times of the day.

"I would say the worst times are between 8 and 8:30 a.m. and 3 and 4:30 p.m.," he said, adding "cruising" also has contributed to traffic congestion at the west end of the village.

# '88 Apportionment Report indicates tax bills going up

### ELKLAND TOWNSHIP

In Elkland Township, where the SEV rose by nearly \$2 million, residents living in the Cass City School District will pay taxes on 43.1770 mills, an increase of 3.027 mills over 1987.

Township residents living in the Owen-Gage School District will be assessed 56.8159 mills, an increase of .6802 mills.

### ELLINGTON TOWNSHIP

Caro School District residents living in Ellington Township are to be assessed a total of 46.09 mills (31.02 mills 12-1-88 and 15.07 mills 7-1-88). The 1988 millage rate is up by 4.09 mills.

Cass City School District residents living in the same township, meanwhile, will pay taxes on 46 mills, an increase of 6.1 mills over 1987.

The SEV in Ellington Township fell by \$25,383 in 1988.

### ELMWOOD TOWNSHIP

In Elmwood Township, where the SEV dropped by nearly \$2.5 million, those living in the Caro School District will be assessed 44.09 mills, compared to the 1987 rate of 42.99 mills.

Cass City School District residents and those living in the Goslin property district will pay on 44 mills, up by 3.1 mills over the 1987 rate.

Those township residents living in the Owen-Gage School District will be assessed 57.6389 mills, compared to 56.8857 mills in 1987.

### NOVESTA TOWNSHIP

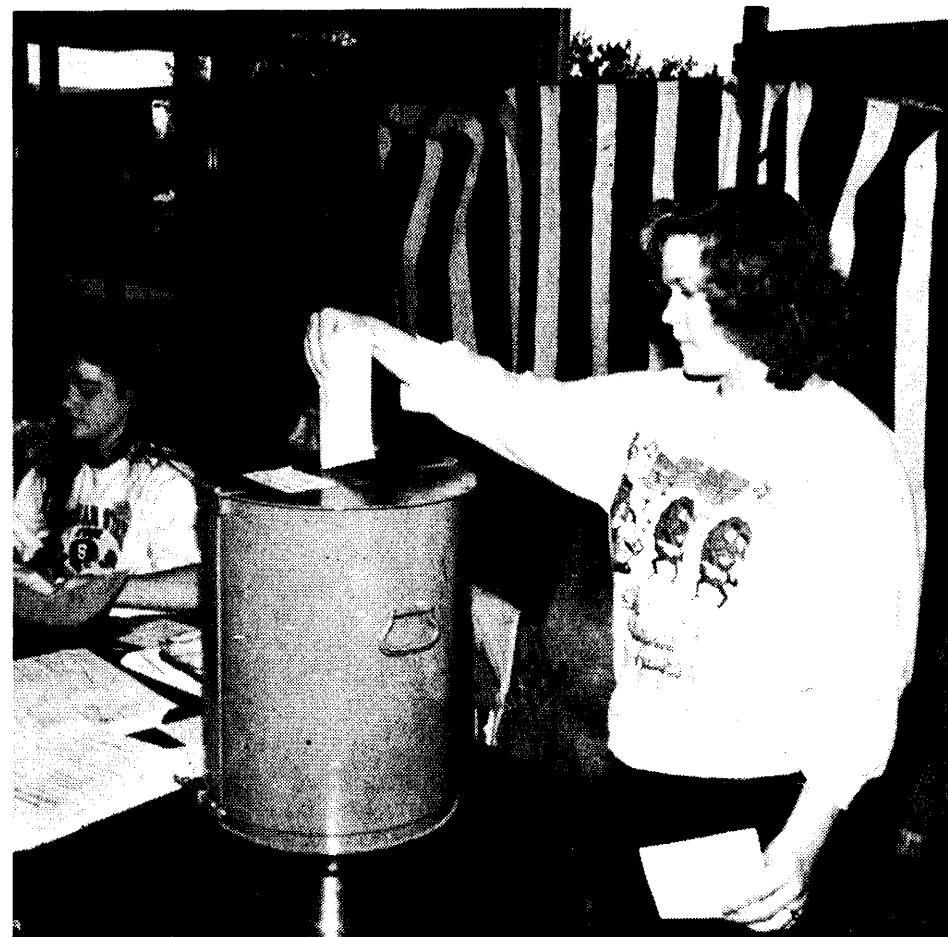
In Novesta Township, all of which is in the Cass City School District, the total tax bill will be based on a levy of 42.5 mills, up by 3.1 mills over the 1987 rate of 39.4 mills. The township's SEV fell by nearly \$1 million in

1988.

The Cass City School District also includes portions of 4 other townships.

Almer Township residents living in the district will pay on 44 mills, compared to 40.4 mills in 1987; Columbia Township residents (including those living in the

Goslin property district) will be assessed 44 mills, compared to 40.9 mills; Kingston Township residents will pay on 42.5 mills, compared to 39.4 mills, and Wells Township residents will be assessed 42.3419 mills, compared to 39.2406 mills in 1987.

## Novesta property taxes to increase?

Novesta Township Board members learned Monday that residential property taxes in the township are expected to go up by 15 percent following the next assessment.

Township Supervisor William C. O'Dell said the news isn't official yet, but added a letter from the Tuscola County Equalization Department indicates there will be a raise in residential property based on sales this past year.

In other business during the monthly meeting, board members examined the township's junk ordinance.

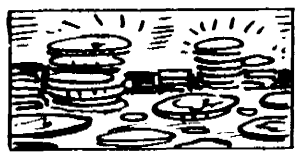

## Elkland board okays request

An application for P.A. 116 was approved during a brief monthly meeting of the Elkland Township Board Monday night.

Township Clerk Norma Wallace said the application, from Donald Shagene, is for 76.09 acres in section 3 of the township, located north of Cass City.

Because of declining land values, the Tuscola ISD, which levies 4.5 mills, will collect \$76,000 less next year. The Huron ISD will collect on 2.65 mills and the Sanilac ISD, 3.15 mills.

Tuscola County, meanwhile, will collect some \$2.36 million for general operations. That figure represents a decrease of \$80,000 from last year, when the county's state equalized valuation totaled \$581,024,066, compared to \$561,962,317 this year. The county's peak SEV came in 1985 at \$700,281,856.

Also to be collected by the county next year will be \$280,981 for bridge construction and an equal amount for operation of the Medical Care Facility, \$112,392 for senior citizen programs, and \$505,766 for the sheriff's road patrol. The 1988 county bridge and medical care millages will each net about \$10,000 less than a year ago.
