Cass City plant mulls moving to Caro site

Engineered Tools Corp., Cass City, may be moved to Caro following a change of ownership last June.

Glen Perkins, who purchased the business June 30 from Richard Biddinger, confirmed Tuesday that the possibility of a move is very good, although he cautioned that "nothing is signed."

"It's too early to speculate," he said. "Cass City is still in the running until everything is signed, sealed and delivered," he said.

Perkins said there currently is not enough space at the existing building, located at 4429 Doerr Rd., to accommodate current and future growth of the company, which manufactures precision products for the

computer and other industries.

Since the change of ownership, he noted, employment has increased from 4 to 5 employees to 22 employees.

Construction of another building at either the Cass City or Caro industrial parks has been considered, but the company's needs dictate

another building soon, Perkins indicated, adding he has looked at buildings in Caro as well as Marlette and Imlay City.

Perkins, who said he would "like to have everything worked out in a week," declined further comment on the Caro site or on a land lease approved by Tuscola

County Commissioners last week.

Commissioners Thursday approved a one-year lease with Perkins, with an option to buy, for a portion of land adjacent to the dog pound in Caro.

The board action was approved 6-1, with District 3 Commissioner John Good-

child casting the lone dissenting vote.

Cass City Village Manager Lou S. LaPonsie said village and EDC officials have met with both Perkins and Biddinger over the past several weeks. "We did the best we could to retain them," he said.

Sunday open house kicks off yule season

Rawson Memorial Library will get into the spirit of the season with an old fashioned tree trimming session and story time Dec. 10. The following Saturday, Dec. 17, is Christmas crafts and stories time.

For weeks now, volunteers have been busy creating scenes for the Christmas Town Story Book which will be displayed at the Cass City Recreational Park. The new scenes will be added to the displays that proved so popular last Christmas. They are expected to be erected by Dec. 12.

Folks shopping Sundays will be offered free coffee tickets by most merchants, good in selected Cass City restaurants.

Community Thanksgiving free dinner open to all

Area residents and families who don't or can't enjoy a traditional Thanksgiving gathering may be interested in taking part in a community celebration that truly embraces what the holiday is all about.

There'll be turkey and all the trimmings plus a full afternoon of socializing and even some singing.

There's no obligation. All you need to do is show up with a healthy appetite.

Now in its third year, the Family Fellowship Community Thanksgiving Dinner, set to begin at 1 p.m. Nov. 24 at St. Pancratius Church, is drawing more participation every year.

Last year, nearly 140 dinners were served. The attendance was twice that of the first year, and organizers of the event say they hope this year's participation will be even greater.

"We'd like to see this re-

ally turn out to be a community affair," Cass City resident Alan Klco, one of the event's organizers, remarked. "We hope to see it grow to the point to where we have to move it up to the high school cafeteria."

Aside from the sit-down dinner, take-out meals will again be available and delivered, if needed, on request to persons who are unable physically to attend.

The emphasis, however, is on a gathering of persons from throughout the community, similar to the first Thanksgiving, according to Klco.

Although the event started out with the idea of offering something to persons who had no place to go on Thanksgiving Day, the dinner has evolved into a means through which an entire community could meet to fellowship and give thanks, he explained.

Klco noted that most area churches contribute to the event in some way. Many of them participate directly by taking responsibility for portions of the menu, while others take the time to announce the event in their weekly bulletins.

Bob Gengler, who also has played a part in the annual dinners, noted that the event isn't tied to any one denomination.

"Our sponsorship has come from the various churches, (but) we've tried to make it so it's not a religious event, so people wouldn't feel an obligation or feel reluctant," he said.

Gengler emphasized that the dinner is open to all interested persons, and that many attend because they want to, not because they need to.

"Naturally, some families have traditions, but we want anyone in the community

who is not already tied down with a family tradition to join us."

Gengler added that the only request organizers have is for persons who plan to attend to call ahead, but even that isn't absolutely necessary.

And, there's no need to take a donation.

500 donate \$5,000 Saturday at George Sangster benefit dinner

They jammed the Evergreen Township School parking lot, they crowded into the hall leading to the gym, they flooded the waiting tables on the gym floor, they devoured a 25-foot long table of baked goods, and more of them came to eat than could be served, but they left smiling anyway.

Over 500 persons were at the school in Shabbona Saturday night to give a helping hand to George Sangster, 45, of Decker.

It was a giant lift for the popular lifelong resident of the area, who recently was informed that he is suffering from cancer. A total of over \$5,000 was raised at the benefit supper and bake sale, Mrs. Dale Bullock, one of the organizers, said.

The money will be sorely needed. The recently diagnosed illness was a total surprise, an unexpected shock for the likeable Sangster when it was discovered in a routine physical exam that he took at the urging of his daughter, who works at the Bay Medical Clinic, Bay City.

Outside of a slight momentary loss of control in his arm, Sangster had no clues to the cancer. He felt no pain before the examination and he feels none now. Yet

doctors say he has cancer of the brain, lung and liver.

The Sangsters do have insurance, but it is unknown how much of the lengthy treatment it covers. Right now he is receiving radiation treatment in Midland for his brain tumor. It requires a trip to Midland 5 days a week for both Sang-

ster and his wife, as he is not allowed to drive.

After that, Sangster is not sure what the treatment will be. Originally I was to go to Chicago for treatment in intensive care, he said, but when the brain tumor was found, that was postponed.

Despite the illness, Sangster remains determined that

he will survive and put the cancers into remission.

Sangster has had more than his share of misfortune. His first wife died from an illness. There are 4 children in the family.

He is self-employed in the excavating business and also is a dairy farmer. Because of the illness, he is

unable to work. He graduated from Evergreen School and attended Cass City High School.

The crowd of friends and well wishers that crowded around him at the dinner was, one friend said, a tribute to George and an indication of how well regarded he is in the community.

Theresa McElhinney killed in accident

A Mayville woman was killed early Thursday morning in a traffic accident about 6 miles from where her husband was killed in a motorcycle crash 4 months ago.

Theresa M. McElhinney, 25, of Mayville was pronounced dead at Caro Community Hospital after the van she was driving crashed into a driveway embankment and rolled over on M-24 near Blackmore Road in Fremont Township, according to a spokesman at the state police post in Caro.

The spokesman said McElhinney was southbound on M-24 at about 2:40 a.m. when her vehicle went off the west edge of the roadway. McElhinney attempted to correct, but lost

control of the vehicle, which then crossed both lanes, left the east side of the road and hit the embankment.

McElhinney, who was not wearing a seat belt, was thrown from the vehicle, the spokesman said.

Troopers, who are continuing their investigation, are uncertain as to what caused the accident. The section of road McElhinney was driving on was straight, but it also was raining at the time, which may have contributed, they said.

McElhinney's husband, David N. McElhinney, 26, of Mayville, was killed July 22 when the motorcycle he was riding slammed broadside into a car on M-46 at the intersection of Cat Lake Road. Reports stated

McElhinney didn't have his headlight on when the 10:40 p.m. crash occurred.

In other accidents last week, a 37-year-old Romeo woman sustained minor injuries in a 2-vehicle mishap on East Caro Road northeast of Dutcher Road in Ellington Township Nov. 8.

Reports state Rebecca Reeves, Romeo, was northbound on East Caro Road and was attempting to make a left turn when another northeast bound vehicle, driven by Joseph G. Terjek of Saginaw, struck her in the rear. Reeves' vehicle then spun around and struck a parked vehicle.

Terjek, who was cited by troopers for violating the basic speed law, stated Please turn to page 12

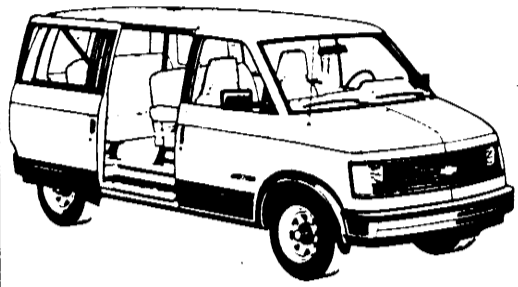

Seek grant for trash transfer station

Tuscola County Commissioners Thursday lauded the county Health Department's application for a \$300,000 state grant that, if approved, would pay for a Class A trash

transfer station in the county.

According to environmental health Director Ed Kimbrue, the station, which would include a trash compactor, would play a major role in the county's future solid waste management plan as well as help combat the rising cost of transporting waste to licensed landfills.

Currently, refuse from Tuscola County is hauled to landfill sites in Saginaw, Genesee, Lapeer and Sanilac counties.

There are no licensed landfills in Tuscola and Huron counties, and a dispute over whether Sanilac County's only licensed landfill can accept garbage from other counties is pending.

Kimbrue noted opening another landfill in the upper Thumb would not be feasible because the volume of refuse from Tuscola, Sanilac and Huron counties combined would not be enough to make such an operation feasible.

Although it's uncertain at this time how many counties would be able to utilize the transfer station, Kimbrue pointed out that officials are trying to work out a regional concept for the facility, which would be county owned and privately operated.

No sites have been named for the transfer station, but the Caro area has been suggested as a primary site be-

cause of its central location. Officials have good reason to be optimistic about the grant application, which is a near duplicate to the application they filed last year. "We were told last year we were second" in the selection of a grant recipient, Kimbrue remarked, adding this year's application is expected to be submitted early next month.

RESIGNATION

Democrats will dominate the county board a little earlier than expected following the resignation of District 4 Commissioner Christopher Taylor.

Taylor, who resigned because of a possible conflict of interest due to his election Nov. 4 as Indianfields Township supervisor, will be replaced by Norma Bates, who defeated Bernard Lenda in the General Election race for the District 4 post.

Bates' victory gives the Democrats control of the board for the first time in history. Her first regular meeting as a commissioner will be Nov. 22.

FOC BUDGET

The county's Finance Committee reviewed the 1989 Friend of the Court budget request and recommended approval of the spending plan, but no action was taken pending a full review of the county's 1989

budget.

The 1989 FOC request, which reduces one part-time person and includes an increase of one full-time person, step wage increases and other increases, totals \$291,274. The FOC's 1988 budget totals \$257,107.

Of the total FOC budget, 26 percent will come from the FOC fund and the remaining 74 percent from the county's General Fund in accordance with a 1988 agreement. Previously, the split was 17 percent-83 percent.

In a related matter, the board approved Finance Committee recommenda-

tions regarding budget adjustments for the distribution to the FOC and General funds of bonus incentive, Cooperative Reimbursement Program and data processing monies.

Other Finance Committee recommendations approved by the board were the transfer of \$755 from the Public Improvement Fund and \$28,194 from the voted Medical Care Facility Fund to pay for equipment/capital improvements made at the Medical Care Facility; payment of about \$13,700 for the recently installed Annex furnaces; restoration of

\$25,000 cut from the Health Department's 1988 appropriation, and the transfer of \$13,332 from the General Fund to the Senior Citizens Fund as an advance to operate senior citizen programs during the last quarter of 1988.

Also Thursday, the board: —Formally approved the district court employees' labor contract as negotiated by the board, 71-B District

judge and the Tuscola County 71-B District Court employees.

—Received a letter of resignation from Emergency Service Director Dan Sargent.

—Tentatively set a special budget meeting for 1 p.m. Thursday.

—Authorized the Caro Christmas Committee to use the courthouse lawn through the Christmas season.

National Diabetes month underway

November is National Diabetes Month -- a month selected by Congress to increase public awareness about the seriousness of diabetes, its personal and economic cost and the need for continued funding to find a cure.

About 460,000 Michigan residents have diabetes. That's 5 percent of the state's population. What's more, 180,000 of these people have diabetes and don't know it.

Nationally, about 5 million people have diabetes. The number of those affected is increasing at approximately 6 percent per year. By the year 1999, the American Diabetes Association predicts there will be nearly 20 million persons with diabetes in the United States.

Diabetes is a disease in which the body is unable to change certain foods into heat and energy needed for everyday activities. The body is unable to produce either the quantity or quality of insulin required to perform this task.

There are 2 major types of diabetes, insulin-dependent and noninsulin-dependent. With insulin-dependent diabetes, the pancreas is unable to or produces very little insulin. With the more common noninsulin-dependent diabetes, the pancreas does not produce the insulin that is needed.

A third type of diabetes is gestational diabetes. This type of diabetes develops in women during their pregnancy, but does not continue after they deliver.

Anyone may get diabetes at any time. At present, diabetes cannot be cured. It is treated with a well-regulated diet, exercise and by achieving and maintaining the ideal body weight. Many people with diabetes also need medication. Some take tablets and others must inject insulin.

Soil testing announced

The Michigan Energy Conservation Program (MECP) technicians are taking soil samples for farmers interested in planting no-till crops next spring. The technicians, Dave Pape and Steve Bohn, are also available to pull soil samples for farmers who would like a soil test on conventional fields. The farmer will be responsible for mailing in his sample. Soil samples should be taken at least every second or third year to insure good soil fertility is being maintained.

Thumb program awarded \$15,000 in grant funds

The Children's Trust Fund for the Prevention of Child Abuse awarded a \$15,000 grant to Care and Response Enabling Self Sufficiency (CARESS), which will use the grant to provide a viable support system for mothers.

The support program uses a well informed visitor to commit at least a once a week visit and phone call over a 12-month period to the mother and to provide emotional support, parenting skills and child development knowledge that will help in the challenge of child rearing.

The volunteer visitors are trained in child development, infant health and nutrition, and skills of supportive visiting. Each volunteer is carefully screened and provided with early devel-

opment material to share with the mothers.

The program serves the 3 counties of Huron, Sanilac and Tuscola. All new mothers in the tri-county area may receive support through the program, which will serve 30 mothers during the term of this grant.

The Children's Trust Fund was created in 1982 to fund local programs which prevent child abuse and neglect. CARESS was one of 45 agencies awarded a grant in Michigan this year.

Originally created through the Michigan Legislature, the fund is an independent, nonprofit, autonomous agency supported through donations. Its primary support comes via a check-off box on the Michigan State Income Tax Return.

Election results prove Democrats picking up ground in Tuscola County

Running for political office on the Republican ticket in Tuscola County is no longer tantamount to a victorious campaign.

Area voters, following county-wide voting patterns in the November General Election last week, again proved that the trend—voting for individual candidates rather than voting a straight ticket—isn't a passing fad.

While the Democrats' nominee for president was getting beat nationally and statewide Nov. 8, the party picked up a lot of ground in Tuscola County.

Despite a traditional Re-

publican stronghold locally, voters in Elkland, Novesta, Elmwood and Kingston townships, which make up the District 2 seat on the County Board of Commissioners, retained one-term incumbent Kim D. Glaspie, Democrat, over Republican challenger Jack Brinkman, 1,514-1,178.

Glaspie, who easily carried all the townships except Kingston, was the first Democrat to be elected to represent the district 2 years ago, when he defeated incumbent Royce Russell by a margin of only 3 votes.

The district voters' decision last week to keep Glas-

pie, along with the election of a Democrat in District 4 (Caro area) for the first time, will allow the Democrats to take control of the county board, claiming 4 of the 7 seats.

The area township vote totals predicted the county-wide election results.

A majority of voters in Elkland, Novesta, Elmwood and Kingston chose Democrat Tom Kern over Republican Bill Montague. The vote total of the 4 townships was 1,812-937. Likewise, voters chose Democrat Patricia Donovan over the Republican, L. James White, for the office of treasurer, 1,445-1,152.

The victories of both Kern and Donovan marked the

first time ever Democrats were elected to county-wide office.

It was a different story in the races for clerk and register of deeds. A majority of voters in each of the 4 area townships picked Republican Erma Brown over Democrat Alexandria Maylou for clerk, 1,756-764, and Republican Virginia Papp, 233-231, for the clerk's post.

Voters in the 4 area townships also favored the Republican candidates for president (George Bush) and the 77th District Michigan House seat (incumbent Dick Allen), while the majority in each township chose the Democrat incumbents for the U.S. Senate (Don Riegle) and U.S. House (Bob Traxler).

Similarly, the area township voters also favored the reelection of Ronald Reagan over Walter Mondale 4 years ago, but chose a

Democratic governor (James J. Blanchard) over Republican William Lucas 2 years ago.

Another trend seen in last week's election saw area voters from both parties agree that they've seen, and approved, enough millage requests.

With the exception of a request of .5 of a mill for fire protection in Elmwood Township, all millage questions, including 2 county-wide requests, were defeated soundly.

To Thumb Area Consortium

\$18,000 awarded for literacy work in Thumb counties

About \$18,000 has been awarded to the Thumb Area Consortium to promote and enhance local literacy projects within the 4-county area of Huron, Lapeer, Sanilac and Tuscola.

Funded through a Michigan Department of Education grant, the award will be used for publicity, recruitment, training tutors and purchasing low-level reading materials.

"Last year our \$10,000 grant served to build a foundation for aiding our non-reading citizens. This year we will further develop and expand literacy resources in the Thumb so all adults have

an opportunity to learn to read," Marvin N. Pichla, executive director of the Consortium, said.

The \$18,000 award is to be divided equally among the 4 counties which comprise the Thumb Area. This year, 3 recipients will share the \$4,500 allocation in Tuscola County. The Mayville District Public Library and the Kingston Community High School Library will each receive \$400 to purchase low-level reading materials. The Thumb Literacy Council will receive \$3,700 to further its volunteer tutoring efforts through the purchase of needed teaching supplies

and development of a county-wide recruitment campaign.

"There is a strong commitment to win the battle against illiteracy in Tuscola County, where a solid partnership exists between educational institutions, human services, local libraries and concerned citizens. Collectively, the needs of the non-reading adult are addressed; viable solutions are provided which can and do impact the quality of life," Pichla observed.

Persons who have difficulty with the written word can be referred to the Thumb Literacy Council at 673-3166, or the local library.

O-G board debates use of school gym by groups

A question of whether or not to allow the use of Owen-Gage School gyms for community winter recreation activities remained unanswered Monday, but the board indicated it's in favor of allowing continued use of school facilities.

opened up during the board's monthly meeting when school Supt. Harley Kirby recommended that the board not allow the Sunday night winter program.

Citing an incident last year in which a youngster broke his leg and, subsequently, a suit was filed against the school, Kirby said the program presents too great a liability to the district.

Board members, however, resisted Kirby's suggestion. "I guess what I don't understand is why do you recommend against this and not the other," Trustee Patrick Goslin remarked, referring to the board's earlier approval of a request by the Huron County Men's League to use the Owendale gym on 2 Sundays this winter. "My opinion is one group is as good as the other," he added.

Kirby indicated the men's league is better organized and takes more responsibility for those attending its activities.

He dismissed suggestions that signed releases freeing the school district of responsibility in accidents would lessen the district's liability. "The insurance company said it's nice that they sign it, but it doesn't mean a thing," Kirby said. "All they had to do was file it (suit) and they got it."

Still, board members maintained that closing school facilities to the public wouldn't be appropriate. "I feel the tax payer owns the building (and) they have a right to use it," Trustee Ronald Good commented.

PRICE INCREASE?

Hot lunch prices probably will be increased in the near future as part of the school administration's ongoing attempt to keep the program as debt-free as possible.

Kirby made the announcement after the board approved a resolution forgiving the Owendale Hot Lunch Program's \$11,757 debt, dating back to the 1985-86 school year, to the school's General Fund.

The motion, which was urged by the district's auditing firm, allows the program to begin the 1988-89 school

year free of debt.

In other business during the 2-hour regular session, the board approved a motion to request that the elementary school staff provide for an evening performance of the annual elementary school Christmas program this year.

Last year the board agreed to a staff request to hold 2 daytime performances, but one district resident told the board Monday that many parents missed the program because they couldn't attend during the day.

Also Monday, the board: —Held a 35-minute executive session to discuss ongoing teacher contract negotiations.

—Approved a motion adding psychology to the list of advanced subjects covered by the high school's 5-point grading system. The motion calls for the 5-point system, which also includes accounting, physics, fourth-year English and fourth-year math, to be retroactive to the 1987-88 school year.

—Approved a request from French teacher Sandra Juengel for a small group of Owen-Gage students and chaperons to accompany a group of USA students on a trip to Quebec April 19-24. It was noted the group is paying its own way.

—Approved a motion okaying the elementary school's gifted student program. The motion, according to Principal William Britt, will allow the school to receive some \$1,300 for the program.

—Decided to utilize a Municipal Investment Fund program at First of America Bank-Thumb Area.

—Okayed the appointment of Robert McPhail as the junior high basketball coach.

—Formally approved the district's 1987-88 audit report.

—Approved senior Andrea Goslin as the high school's "student of the month" for October.

—Authorized Kirby to purchase at least \$15,000 of fire insurance for a district-owned house in Gagetown. The insurance will cost about \$125 per year.

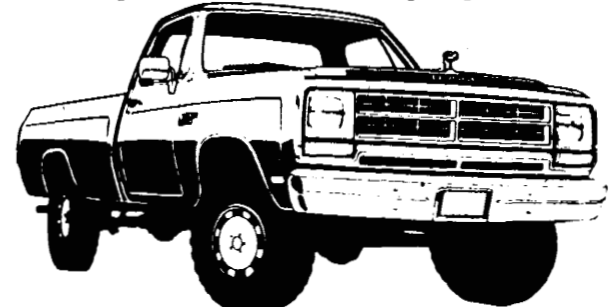

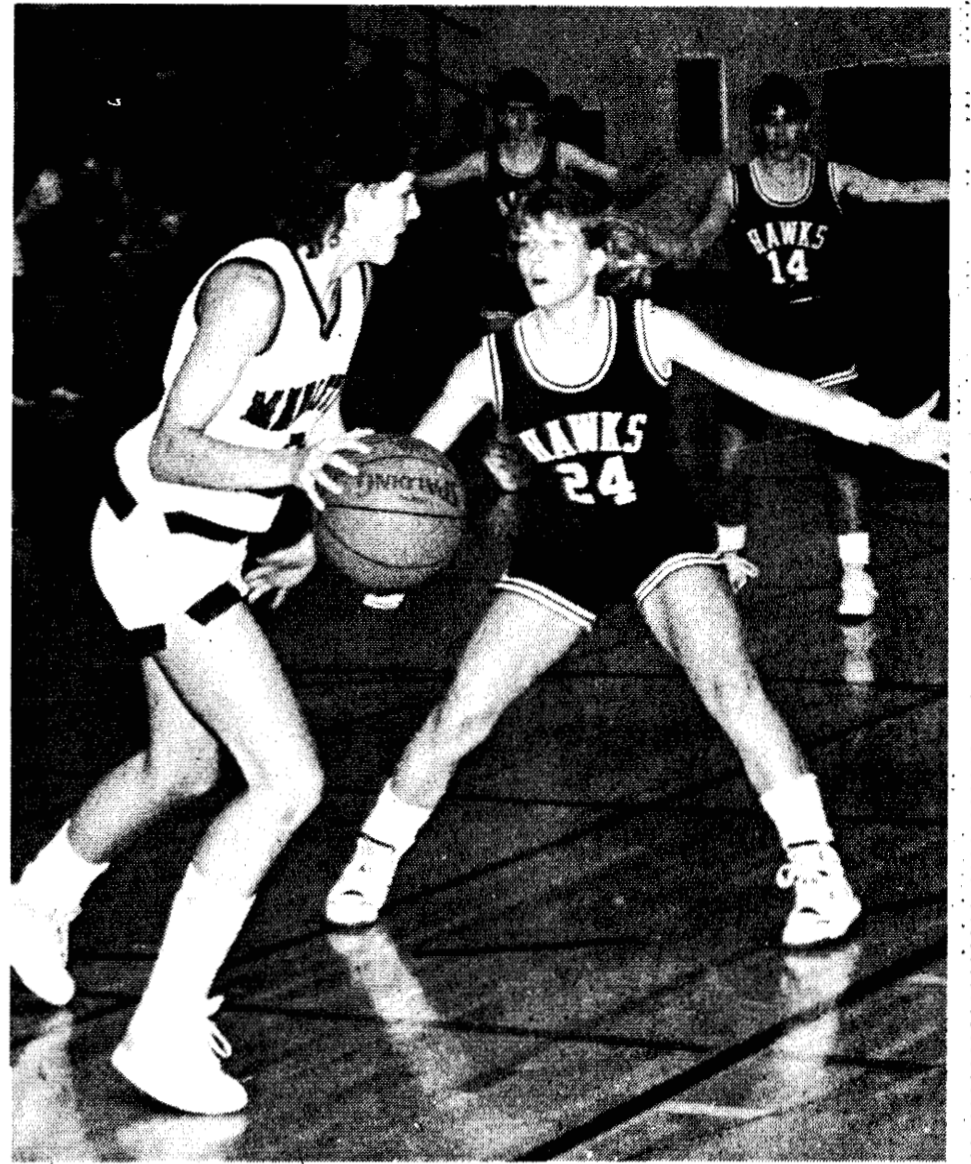

The Bulldogs' talent runs too deep. The Bulldogs jumped out in front of the visitors 20-14

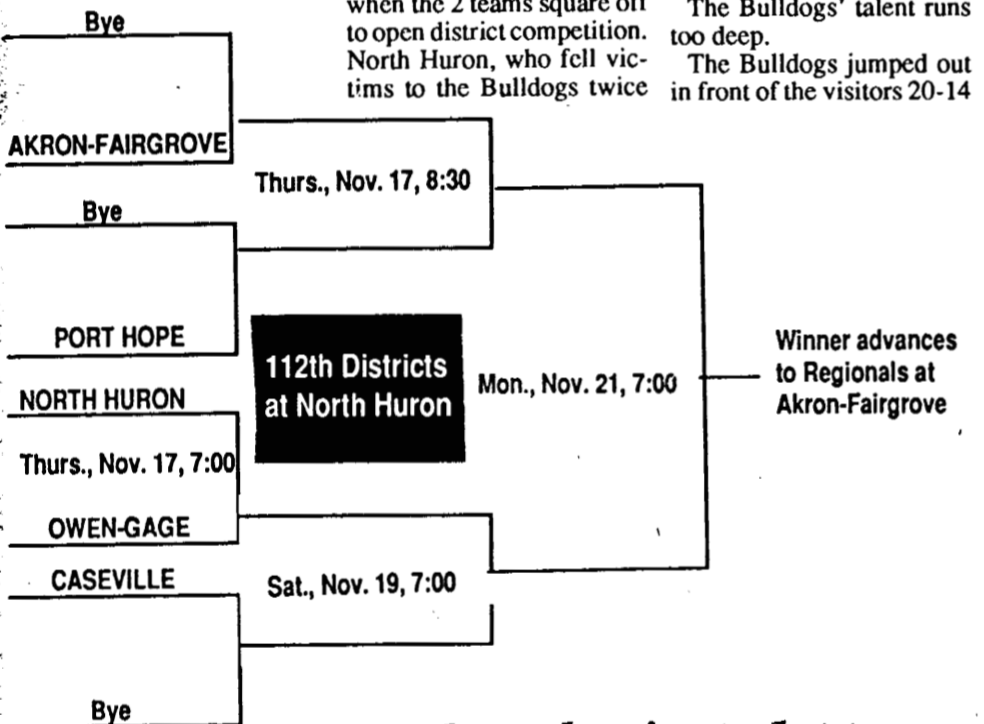
in the first quarter and never looked back.

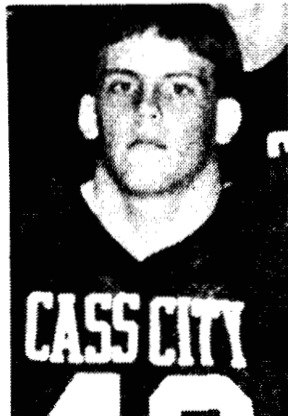

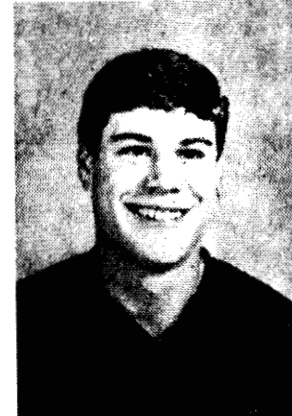

Several sentenced in circuit court

A 19-year-old Cass City man was sentenced to 3 to 10 years in prison Thursday in Tuscola County Circuit Court for probation violation.

Counseling also was ordered for Duane S. Wilcox, who violated probation by failing to report to his probation officer May 5 and again June 2.

He was convicted May 1, 1987, on a charge of unlawful use of a motor vehicle Feb. 16, 1987, in Cass City.

Sebewaing resident Steven C. Wells, 28, 315 Albert St., was sentenced for a plea of guilty to operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor, third offense.

Wells was sentenced to one year in the county jail with credit for one day served, 12 months probation and alcohol treatment. Participation in the work site program was granted to the defendant, who was remanded to the custody of the sheriff.

The Sept. 23 conviction stems from an incident June 26 in Akron, court records state.

Theodore L. Miller Jr., 34, of Fostoria, was sentenced to 45 days in the county jail and 2 years probation plus \$600 in court costs and fines for a Sept. 23 conviction of attempted felonious assault.

The conviction stems from an incident that occurred Sept. 22 in Watertown Township.

A deferred jail sentence was moved up for Randell C. Fielder Jr., 17, 143 Ellington St., following the Caro resident's conviction of probation violation.

Fielder, who failed to attend an alcohol safety program Nov. 7 in accordance with his probation, was ordered to continue going to school, with jail time set after school for 60 days. He was remanded to the sheriff's custody.

Couple is Botswana bound

Clarkes headed for Peace Corps mission

Have kids, will travel. It's been a way of life throughout most of Lyle and Jean Clarke's 37-year marriage. The Cass City couple, both teachers, have come (and gone) a long ways with their children since the family's first camping trip in Alabama years ago. The long-time area residents have visited most of the United States as well as a host of other countries and islands, including Canada, Mexico, Australia, New Zealand, Fiji and Tahiti.

Now, the Clarkes' 5 children are all grown, but that hasn't dimmed the pair's love for adventure.

In fact, the couple this week will embark on what may be their most interesting trip to date—a 2-year Peace Corps teaching assignment in Botswana, a country about the size of Texas in south-central Africa.

The Clarkes, during an interview last week, remarked that they've been thinking about going to Africa for some time now.

"When we got back from Australia, we had thought of going," Jean said, adding they postponed those plans following the 1971 trip because they still had 3 children living at home at the time and didn't want to take them out of the area school system for another 2 years.

With the exception of the couple's 2 oldest children, the family spent a full year in Australia, where Lyle taught agriculture and science.

About a year ago, the couple decided to take a serious look at the Peace Corps.

What followed was quite a hectic application process, the Clarkes explained, adding the process has included a mountain of paperwork, an interview, submission of resumes, extensive health and dental exams, and security checks.

Lyle, who retired from the Cass City School District last spring after a teaching career spanning 35 years, says he'll be teaching poultry and vegetable production, fruit trees and field

crops in one of Botswana's 119 secondary schools.

LOOKING FORWARD

Despite an already lengthy tenure as an educator, Lyle indicated he's looking forward to continuing to teach agriculture, a subject which has been eliminated in the local school district's curriculum.

"I never really had a desire to retire as far as retiring and not doing anything," he remarked. "I always have worked and I guess that's a way of life."

Lyle won't be alone in making a contribution.

Jean, who earned a bachelor's degree in 1983 and a master's degree in early child development in 1986, will teach at the Letta Nursery School. The school, which serves 32 Botswanian children ages 2 1/2 to 6 years, is located about 30 miles north of Gaborone, the capitol of Botswana.

Aside from teaching, Jean, a substitute teacher in the

Tuscola Intermediate School District for the past 5 years, will help develop a curriculum and a program for a new building planned for construction.

CONDITIONS

Although the couple knows what they'll be teaching, they're uncertain as to what teaching and living conditions they'll find.

The material they've received from the Peace Corps states that housing and utilities, which will be provided by the school and Ministry of Education, can range from a small, one room thatch-roofed hut to a large western style house with electricity and hot and cold running water.

Schools, meanwhile, range in size from 80 students to more than 1,200 in grades 7 through 12. The school Lyle will be assigned to may be small, overcrowded and poorly lit, or a fully-equipped modern facility.

Lyle said he expects that the education system in Botswana will be similar to what he experienced in Australia. He described the British system as being slower paced, with classes beginning at 7 a.m. and concluding at 12:30 p.m. (including tea time).

The school year begins in January and is divided into 3 terms, each separated by 3 to 6-week breaks.

He also noted that education isn't taken for granted. Many of the students who attend high school don't continue formal education after earning their tenth grade certificates.

"There's a considerable portion of the school that goes into trades after receiving that certificate," he said, adding that qualifying students who want to go into a professional field finish 2 additional years of high school and then take an exam to qualify for university.

DIFFERENT ATTITUDE

"It's a different attitude there because your educa-

tion will determine your future work," Jean pointed out.

A desire on the part of the Botswanian Government to improve the availability of education in its country is a primary reason educators and volunteers like the Clarkes are in demand in that country.

The government in 1980 set a goal of universal access to secondary schools by 1991. In 1983 Botswana had 41 secondary schools and only 25 percent of elementary school graduates were given places in those schools.

By January 1989, 62 new secondary schools will have opened since 1985. Despite that growth, a shortage of teachers has continued to plague the education system.

The challenge of helping out is an exciting prospect for the Clarkes, who are anxious to begin their new work.

Asked if they're anxious about the next 2 years, the couple didn't hesitate in saying, "no."

"I guess we've traveled enough that it doesn't bother us that much," Lyle commented.

Jean agreed. "I'm not concerned about it in any way. The Peace Corps has discovered that older people are more accepted in (some) countries," she said, adding age and respect go hand in hand.

The couple are scheduled to leave Thursday for Kansas City, followed by stops in Atlanta and London. They expect to arrive in Gaborone Nov. 22. For the

first few weeks of their stay, the Clarkes will reside with a family while undergoing a village-based training program.
