Theresa McElhinney killed in accident

killed early Thursday morning in a traffic accident about 6 miles from where her husband was killed in a motorcycle crash 4 months

Theresa M. McElhinney, 25, of Mayville was pronounced dead at Caro Community Hospital after the van she was driving crashed into a driveway embankment and rolled over on M-24 near Blackmore Road in Fremont Township, according to a spokesman at the state police post in Caro.

The spokesman said McElhinney was southbound on M-24 at about 2:40 a.m. when her vehicle went off the west edge of the road-McElhinney attempted to correct, but lost

A Mayville woman was control of the vehicle, which then crossed both lanes, left the east side of the road and hit the embankment.

McElhinney, who was not wearing a seat belt, was thrown from the vehicle, the spokesman said.

Troopers, who are continuing their investigation, are uncertain as to what caused the accident. The section of road McElhinney was driving on was straight, but it also was raining at the time, which may have contributed, they said.

McElhinney's husband, David N. McElhinney, 26, of Mayville, was killed July 22 when the motorcycle he was riding slammed broadside into a car on M-46 at the intersection of Cat Lake Road. Reports stated

McElhinney didn't have his headlight on when the 10:40 p.m. crash occurred.

In other accidents last week, a 37-year-old Romeo woman sustained minor injuries in a 2-vehicle mishap on East Caro Road northeast of Dutcher Road in Ellington Township Nov. 8.

Reports state Rebecca Reeves, Romeo, was northeast bound on East Caro Road and was attempting to make a left turn when another northeast bound vehicle, driven by Joseph G. Terjek of Saginaw, struck her in the rear. Reeves' vehicle then spun around and struck a parked vehicle.

Terjek, who was cited by troopers for violating the basic speed law, stated

500 donate \$5,000 Saturday at George Sangsterbenefit dinner

They jammed the Evergreen Township School parking lot, they crowded into the hall leading to the gym, they flooded the waiting tables on the gym floor, they devoured a 25-foot long table of baked goods, and more of them came to eat than could be served, but they left smiling anyway.

Over 500 persons were at the school in Shabbona Saturday night to give a helping hand to George Sangster, 45,

It was a giant lift for the popular lifelong resident of the area, who recently was informed that he is suffering from cancer. A total of over \$5,000 was raised at the benefit supper and bake sale, Mrs. Dale Bullock, one of the organizers, said.

The money will be sorely needed. The recently diagnosed illness was a total surprise, an unexpected shock for the likeable Sangster when it was discovered in a routine physical exam that he took at the urging of his daughter, who works at the Bay Medical Clinic, Bay

Outside of a slight momentary loss of control in his arm, Sangster had no clues to the cancer. He felt no pain before the examination and he feels none now. Yet

doctors say he has cancer of ster and his wife, as he is not the brain, lung and liver.

The Sangsters do have insurance, but it is unknown how much of the lengthy treatment it covers. Right now he is receiving radiation treatment in Midland for his brain tumor. It requires a trip to Midland 5 days a week for both Sang-

allowed to drive.

After that, Sangster is not sure what the treatment will be. Originally I was to go to Chicago for treatment in intensive care, he said, but when the brain tumor was found, that was postponed.

Despite the illness, Sangster remains determined that he will survive and put the cancers into remission.

Sangster has had more than his share of misfortune. His first wife died from an illness. There are 4 children in the family.

He is self-employed in the excavating business and also is a dairy farmer. Because of the illness, he is

unable to work. He graduated from Evergreen School and attended Cass City High School.

The crowd of friends and well wishers that crowded around him at the dinner was, one friend said, a tribute to George and an indication of how well regarded he is in the community.

According to environmental health Director Ed Kimbrue, the station, which would include a trash compactor, would play a major role in the county's future solid waste management plan as well as help combat the rising cost of transporting waste to licensed

Currently, refuse from Tuscola County is hauled to landfill sites in Saginaw, Genesee, Lapeer and Sanilac counties.

There are no licensed landfills in Tuscola and Huron counties, and a dispute over whether Sanilac County's only licensed landfill can accept garbage from other counties is pend-

Kimbrue noted opening another landfill in the upper Thumb would not be feasible because the volume of refuse from Tuscola, Sanilac and Huron counties combined would not be enough to make such an operation feasible.

Although it's uncertain at this time how many counties would be able to utilize the transfer station, Kimbrue pointed out that officials are trying to work out a regional concept for the facility, which would be county owned and privately oper-

No sites have been named for the transfer station, but the Caro area has been suggested as a primary site be-

Officials have good reason to be optimistic about the grant application, which is a

near duplicate to the application they filed last year. 'We were told last year we were second" in the selection of a grant recipient, Kimbrue remarked, adding this year's application is expected to be submitted early next month.

RESIGNATION

National Diabetes month underway

November is National Diabetes Month - - a month selected by Congress to increase public awareness about the seriousness of diabetes, its personal and economic cost and the need for continued funding to find a

About 460,000 Michigan residents have diabetes. That's 5 percent of the state's population. What's more, 180,000 of these people have diabetes and don't know it.

Nationally, about 5 million people have diabetes. The number of those affected is increasing at approximately 6 percent per year. By the year 1999, the American Diabetes Association predicts there will be nearly 20 million persons with diabe-

tes in the United States. Diabetes is a disease in which the body is unable to change certain foods into heat and energy needed for everyday activities. The body is unable to produce either the quantity or quality of insulin required to perform this task.

There are 2 major types of diabetes, insulin-dependent and noninsulin-dependent. With insulin-dependent diabetes, the pancreas is unable to or produces very little insulin. With the more common noninsulin-dependent diabetes, the pancreas does not produce the insulin that

A third type of diabetes is gestational diabetes. This type of diabetes develops in women during their pregnancy, but does not continue after they deliver.

Anyone may get diabetes at any time. At present, diabetes cannot be cured. It is treated with a well-regulated diet, exercise and by achieving and maintaining the ideal body weight. Many people with diabetes also need medication. Some take tablets and others must inject insulin.

Soil testing

The Michigan Energy Conservation Program (MECP) technicians are taking soil samples for farmers interested in planting no-till crops next spring. The technicians, Dave Pape and Steve Bohn, are also available to pull soil samples for farmers who would like a soil test on conventional fields. The farmer will be responsible for mailing in his sample. Soil samples should be taken at least every second or third year to insure good soil fertility is being maintained.





There is a strong commitment to win the battle against illiteracy in Tuscola County, where a solid partnership exists between educational institutions, human services, local libraries and concerned citizens. Collectively, the needs of the nonreading adult are addressed; viable solutions are provided which can and do impact the quality of life," Pichla observed.

On the anniversary of the October 1987 stock market crash, the Fort Lauderdale News remarked cheerfully:

"The economy is still intact. Although household net worth technically declined by \$500 billion, it was a paper loss...'

Oh blessed newspapers, especially Sunday editions. Why, if we hadn't been subknown that the nation was still in one piece. Now we can go ahead and order some Christmas cards.

Nobody except the excitable New Yorkers were really panicky after the crash. Oh, of course the bureaucrats in Washington had to make some speeches and start a Congressional inquiry. The rest of us watched Monday night football, if we could stay awake that long, got up the next morning and went to work, same as ever.

In 1987, stock market players got richer up until Aug. 25 when the Dow hit 2722. Then the air started to go out of the balloon. Oct. 19 the averages were 1738. A drop of 38%

Enough of a spanking to teach millions there was no free lunch, and to drive them into buying bonds. (Don't say we didn't tell you, to the point of boredom, all these

But the people of America and other leading countries didn't go bonkers. Business went on as usual, except for some 15,000 in the stock market firms, when customers and also their bosses found these \$500,000-ayear men weren't worth that much.

The Lauderdale paper now commends us for not dissolving the nation, and consoles us that the \$500 billion down the drain was only a paper loss.

We'll accept the first part of the statement, although it really didn't occur to us that the world was going to come worse than the usual Sun-

everything we own, practically, is paper. Let's see, I have a sailboat, and a car, and a television set and some used clothing, and a retirement watch State Mutual Insurance Co. of Lapeer, Mich., gave me, engraved "Good riddance."

Everything else is on paper. My gains and my losses

will be paper ones, except when my associate Jennifer Birdsong nails me at backgammon. She insists on hard cash. No checks, no Visa.

Let's hope that reflections on Black Monday of October 1987 will fade away after this first anniversary. Pundits wrote thousands of pages explaining what happened. Only one of them got scribers we wouldn't have to the core of the crash. He was John Kenneth Galbraith, who said in words that ought to be pasted in front of every desk:

"Prices were too high."

You don't have to be an expensive magazine to make dumb statements. Take Business Week, Oct. 3 issue, page 141:

FORTUNE magazine in a big issue keyed to investments said zero coupon municipals were a good thing to have, but there weren't many around.

The Blue List, that bible of the bond buyer, had 275 different offerings in its Oct. 10 issue, for example. They ranged from \$5,000 par value to \$8 million. Maturities were from May 1989 to July, 2027.

Possibly the same Ivy League graduate who wrote that also dropped in the paragraph that government bonds paid interest quarterly. I never heard of an, that paid oftener than semiannually, but I spent many of my college days playing poker and polo.

I suppose I'm nit-picking, but after paying \$3.95 for the magazine, I have me rights,

Another illustration. You have money in a savings account. You want to take some out. Do you think that doesn't cost you interest it would have earned, left in the bank? The bank does have the grace not to charge you to withdraw your own

After reading and hearing all this guff, I bought some Wisconsin Housing bonds, 8.25%, tax free.

Hunting mishaps rose in 1987-88

Big and small game hunting accidents in Michigan increased during the 1987-88 hunting season compared to previous years, with 100 accidents (11 deaths, 89 injuries) reported, up from 81 accidents in 1986-87, 85 accidents in 1985-86 and 88 accidents for the 1984-85

Michigan, however, still ranks below the national average for hunter accidents, with only 6.43 accidents reported for every 100,000 licenses sold annually, compared to a national average of 8.10. more than 1,571,000 Michigan hunting licenses were sold in 1987-88.

"We're disturbed to see an increase in accidents from previous years," Department of Natural Resources Director David F. Hales said. "Nearly all of these accidents could have been prevented if hunters had worn the required hunter orange apparel or observed some very basic safety rules."

More than 70 percent of the 1987-88 hunting accidents fell into the following categories:

-Victim out of sight of shooter: 28 accidents (3 fatals, 25 injuries);

-Careless handling of firearms: 18 accidents (1 fatal, 17 injuries); Victim mistaken for

game: 10 accidents (5 fatal, 5 injuries);

-Victim shot by hunter turning to shoot on game: 10 accidents (10 injuries);

-Victim moved into line of fire: 5 accidents (5 injuries). Overall, 33 of the 100 accidents were self-inflicted. while 67 accidents were the result of another hunter's bullet. In addition, most of the accidents occurred within 10 yards of the victim, involved violators 32 years and older, and included persons of the same hunting party.

Two hunter safety laws have had a significant impact on the reduction of hunter accidents in Michigan since the mid-1970's, 3658.

when Michigan averaged 219 hunting accidents annually, said Lt. Jim Dabb, hunter education coordinator for the DNR's Law Enforcement Division.

"Implementation of mandatory hunter safety training in 1971 for first-time hunters ages 12-16, and enactment of the hunter orange law in 1977, requiring hunters to wear a blaze orange cap o. vest, continue to be a key element in reduction of hunter accidents," Dabb



Each year some teams have a difficult time getting a team manager. Any adult interested in helping with a team is invited to call the library, 872-2856, for more information.


Registration forms may be picked up at Rawson Memorial Library or the School libraries. Registration will end Dec. 16.





leased last month by the Public Health Service's Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry, exposure to lead remains a serious public health problem in the U.S., particularly for young children. Lead, all parents should know, is very poisonous. Just one little chip of lead-based paint, a chip the size of a fingernail,

can send a small child who

eats it to the hospital with

acute lead poisoning. At high levels, which scientists define as 80 or more micrograms of lead per deciliter of blood, lead poisoning can cause coma, convulsions and death. At half that amount, it can cause permanent damage to the brain and central nervous system, perhaps resulting in amnesia and retardation and interfering with the synthesis of vital blood products, vitamin D and calcium.

The more scientists investigate lead, the more they are seeing its effects at lower and lower concentrations, even as low as 10 micrograms per deciliter. Levels once thought safe are considered safe no longer.

Exposure to lead is particularly hazardous for young children because their systems absorb lead more readily than do the systems of adults and because, unlike adults, they are unable to store lead in their bones. Instead, the lead that young children ingest and absorb goes directly to their vital organs. And because lead crosses the placenta, which means that it moves freely from the body of a pregnant woman into the body of her unborn child, the human fetus can be badly damaged, just as its delicate nervous system is being formed.

The Federal Government has done quite a bit to limit human exposure to lead. Lead based paint was banned in 1977 by the Con-

ning this year, lead pipes and According to a report re- lead solder can no longer be used in connection with public water supplies.

The new lead report also notes that actions taken by the Food and Drug Administration and the canning industry have lowered lead levels in canned food.

Despite all of these corrective actions, including the removal of lead-based paint from federally funded public housing and other buildings, serious lead-exposure problems remain. Lead based paint was used extensively prior to 1950, and much of it remains in place on the walls of older buildings and other structures. Regulations have halted lead emissions from new motor vehicles, but many older vehicles still burn fuel that uses lead as an antiknock additive. Emissions from industrial plants, such as smelters, have been reduced but not eliminated, and lead residues often are found in the dirt and soil around industrial and manufacturing areas and in areas where industrial plants once

The upshot is that while we have made progress in reducing the average level of lead exposure in this country, the problem remains. and the more we study it, the more we learn about it, the more we realize that it is much greater than we previously thought.

It behooves all of us from physicians and public health workers to teachers and, especially, parents — to keep ourselves and each other fully informed about this toxic and ever-changing threat and to make certain that our children are not being exposed in their varied and daily environments — in nurseries, day care facilities and schools, in public housing, community playgrounds and even in our ownback yards.
