

Village on track for new track at park

Talk over the past several months about building a new track in Cass City has turned into concrete planning.

And thanks to the dedication of a handful of community leaders and businessmen, and some commitments for donations and labor, the project is expected to get underway this year.

Bob Tuckey, a local CPA and Lions Club member. and Cass City Intermediate School Principal Don Schelke discussed the project during an interview Thurs-

The pair said they've been informally talking for the past year about ways to get a new track built.

"The school, the athletic department, checked into the costs and that's when we decided the school just can't (afford) it," Schelke said, adding that prompted a meeting earlier this month with about 15 community leaders, who were asked

their opinion of the idea. The result, Tuckey said, has been the formation of a

raising money for the project from private donations and service clubs.

The group is headed by a board composed of Tuckey, Herron, Larry Robinson and Ken Jensen.

Also involved are a host of others, including Supt. Ken Micklash and village Manager Lou LaPonsie, who have offered technical advice and other information. Tuckey explained that cur-

rent plans call for removal of the existing track surface and construction of an allweather 8-lane track which will meet all specifications for state and regional meets. Basically, he said, the existing 440-yard cinder track will be converted into a 400meter track with a special rubberized surface.

PROJECT COST

Estimated cost of the project is about \$100,000, but it's hoped a significant amount of the cost will be

group of people who are covered by commitments of labor and use of equipment.

"We've got commitments from various individuals and service clubs for over \$48,000," Tuckey re-Schelke, Ken Blue, Tom marked, adding the total so far includes a commitment of \$15.000 from the Lions Club, while the Rotary and Gavel clubs have each

promised \$10,000. Additional donations. which are tax exempt, are being sought, Tuckey emphasized.

"We did look into a grant, but they won't give grants to organizations" for interscholastic activities, he noted, adding, "We'd like to (eventually) see bleachers, a ramp and some other things, but right now the track is our main goal."

The project is expected to take at least 2 years to finish, but with the completion of a new base and hard surface, athletes could be running on asphalt next year, before the rubberized surface is in

BIG BOOST

Tuckey and Schelke agreed the new track will be a big boost to Cass City's track program as well to the community as a whole.

And the residents' effort in procuring the facility seems

After all, it was community support that made it possible to build Cass City High School's existing track back in the 1940s, when nearly everyone in town pledged \$100 to the project.

With improvements to the facility completed in the 1950s, the cinder track quickly became the place to run meets in the Thumb.

Since then, the track has become a dinosaur of sorts, and few Thumb teams are enthusiastic about competing in Cass City.

'We were the place that they all came to run track meets," Tuckey recalled, adding that now, "You almost can't get the other Please turn to page 10

The increased cost to the district will be about \$105,000 for the first year for salaries. In addition increases for length of service will add another \$35,000, bringing the total increase to the district to about 6 1/2 percent in 1988-89.

Cass City Teachers Association President Lloy Schinnerer said that all-inall he felt that the teachers were satisfied with the new agreement. Most of us didn't care much for the rollback in insurance, but I feel it is a liveable contract. You never get an agreement that is totally pleasing to everyone, Schinnerer pointed out, but the overwhelming approval (no figures were released) that the contract received indicates that most found it satisfactory.

I'm just happy that we now have a 3-year contract and it ended this way without having a strike, the union president concluded.

The rollback in insurance that Schinnerer referred to will save the district about \$20,000 from the cost of coverage under the former

effect Mar. 1. Although the new health care package is a rollback in teacher benefits, it will still cost more than the present pact because of skyrocketing health insurance costs. The increase to the district will be 18 percent more instead of the 27 percent that

the old plan would have cost. There were several other concessions received by the

teachers. They included: School to provide space for the storing of teacher valuables, but the school not responsible in case of loss.

• Teachers to be required to stay 20 minutes after school is dismissed instead

• Unused sick leave will be paid at the rate of \$30 a day instead of \$25. • School will pay a \$25

registration fee in 1989-90

for teachers attending special programs. • Teachers who choose health coverage under a program other than the one

available to teachers will receive \$35 instead of \$30 a month placed into the teacher's annuity account. • A committee was authorized to study a school day with 5 classes instead of 6.

SECOND YEAR In the second year of the contract teachers at the top of the wage scale will receive a 6 percent wage in-

crease while teachers at the beginning of the schedule will have wages frozen.

In the second year, salary for extracurricular activities, such as coaching, will be frozen. In this year's pact these salaries have been increased 5 percent.

The unusual agreement was reached in a compromise. Teachers had been seeking a lump payment for years of service after the top of the increment scale had been reached.

THIRD YEAR

Teachers will receive a cost of living increase, plus one percent, in the third year to a maximum of 5 1/2 percent. In addition time off for Please turn to page 10

Village purchases 8.7-acre Grand Trunk land for \$8,100

The Cass City Village Council Monday night designated a special assessment district for curb and gutter work on 4 streets, and okayed the purchase of 8.7 acres of Grand Truck Railroad property.

Under the assessment district, landowners whose streets are slated for curb and gutter as well as blacktopping will be assessed an estimated \$8.25 per foot for the curb and gutter.

The road projects, budgeted for construction this summer, cover Brooker Street, from Main to Third; Third Street, from Brooker to Vulcan; Vulcan Street, from Third to Garfield; and Fourth Street, from Vulcan

to West. Curb and gutter assessments for the combined streets are expected to make

assessment district was scheduled for the council's next regular meeting. The session will begin at 7 p.m. March 27 in the Municipal Building.

Turning to the land purchase, trustees voted to purchase 2 parcels of Grand Trunk Railroad property for a total of \$8,100.

The purchase consists of a narrow 2.2-acre right-ofway, which stretches from Garfield avenue north to the south border of the Walbro Corp. property line, and the other is a Y-shaped 6.5-acre parcel which connects the Cass City Industrial Park to

Cemetery Road. The council indicated it would like to eventually use the 2.2-acre parcel as a recreational trail. Purchase of up about \$34,000 of the total the 6.5-acre parcel, trustees

A public hearing on the main sewer line, and the option of an additional access to the industrial park via Cemetery Road.

"As we add industry, there's a lot of traffic and a lot of truck traffic," village President L.E. Althaver remarked. "I think another route into the industrial park, without going through a residential area, would be very positive."

In other business during the 70-minute session, the council, as expected, approved a rate increase of 33 cents per household per

month for garbage pick-up. The rate hike, effective Feb. 1, was requested last month by Gateway Sanitation Services officials, who cited a landfill rate increase project cost, which is esti-said, will both insure com- of 75 cents per yard at TriCity Landfill in Sanilac County. That request may be re-

vised in the near future, While Tri-City Landfill

has been the destination of refuse hauled from the village, a court ruling (made after Gateway's request for a rate increase) closed the site to out-of-county trash. Consequently, local officials are uncertain as to when and to what extent rates will be affected based on the additional travel and time involved in hauling to landfills further south.

Following brief discussion, trustees voted to send a letter to the Tuscola County Solid Waste Plan Committee, which is charged with updating the county's longterm solid waste management plan, urging the group to pursue a countywide TAKE A STAND

"I think we ought to take a stand and say we want that committee to more actively pursue a. . .landfill," Althaver said. "I'm concerned if we don't see action on a countywide basis, we're going to find ourselves on the outside looking

LaPonsie, a member of the county solid waste commit-"Tuscola tee, agreed. County is in a position where we don't have a back-up."

The council also indicated its Public Services Committee in the near future will begin to look into recycling at the community level.





"If It Fitz..."

Do you blame him?

The judge was stern. The defendant was fined \$100, although the prosecutor had recommended \$50. The 2 police officers involved didn't testify. And no one addressed my first question: Wasn't there a better way for the law to handle the situation?

And now I have a second question. It concerns a second-degree murder charge made against one of those officers in an unrelated case.

I asked the first question in a December column describing what happened to Randy Moss and his handicapped mother, Maxine, when they tried to park in a handicapped parking space in a small shopping center at 8 Mile and Lahser. I implied that the police had mishandled the case, so it's only fair to report now that the judge disagreed with me.

The charge was only a misdemeanor — interfering with an officer. Randy Moss, a 36-year-old cook, was arrested Dec. 17 when he admittedly lost his temper because 2 officers refused to move a police car straddling 2 handicapped parking spaces.

PARKING SPOT WAS NEEDED

Maxine Moss, 61, is crippled by polio and must be lifted from her car and placed in a wheelchair. She has a handicapped parking permit. Randy Moss told me he politely asked that the police car be moved to make one of the handicapped spaces available, but Officer William Barksdale refused. He and the second officer, Shirley Jones, were taking a robbery report from a woman in the backseat. Randy Moss continued to

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insist the police car move, and he became angry as Barksdale repeatedly refused. At one point Moss pulled open the police car door, which had been slightly ajar.

"That's when the officer got out and grabbed me," Moss said. He said Barksdale bent him back and was rough while putting him in handcuffs, leaving him sore five days later.

Moss was taken to the 8th (Northwest) Precinct and locked up for 2 1/2 hours before making \$100 bail. His mother was left behind in a car she couldn't drive. "I told a lieutenant (J. Lashbrook) my problem, and he was nice. He sent 2 officers to my car, and they took her home."

Moss appeared before 36th

District Judge Willie Lipscomb on Feb. 1. When Moss admitted he'd behaved belligerently after Barksdale refused to move the police car, that was it. "The judge said there was no way he would allow civilians to tell police officers what to do," Moss told me later. "At first, he wanted to fine me \$300. My lawyer advised me to plead guilty in return for a \$100 fine, so I did. "This whole thing has been tough on my parents, and I didn't want to put them through a jury trial."

Officers Barksdale and Jones were present but didn't testify. They weren't asked why they didn't accommodate a handicapped person by simply moving their car a few feet, thus, avoiding the subsequent arrest, struggle, jailing and court action over a misde-

My first question was: duty in Wasn't there a better way for the law to handle the situ-

ation? Judge Lipscomb gave the only answer that counted: No.

SHOCKING HISTORY LESSON

My second question is prompted by something that happened to Officer Barksdale in December 1987. He was suspended without pay and arrested on a charge of a second-degree murder in the strangulation of a 43-year-old man with a history of mental problems.

According to court rec-ords, Barksdale and a partner were assigned to take the man to the hospital and when he resisted, Barksdale grabbed the man's neck and held him to the ground for about 15 minutes. When onlookers protested that the man had a heart disorder, Barksdale told them to "shut up" or they'd go to jail, too. The man died in the hospital emergency room.

About a year later, on Dec. 2, 1988, Barksdale was found not guilty in a nonjury trial and later returned to duty. A few days later, Barksdale manhandled Randy Moss, according to







Change giving easier for taxpayers

Children's Trust Fund officials recently announced a change on the 1988 state income tax return which, it is hoped, will increase the amount of money contributed to fight child abuse.

In the past 6 years that the voluntary contribution check-off for the Children's Trust Fund for the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect has appeared on State of Michigan tax returns, only those taxpayers receiving a refund were allowed to donate by reducing the amount of their refund. But a change on the 1988 return allows, for the first

time, both taxpayers receiv-

ing a refund and those who owe tax to contribute. Taxpayers can contribute \$5 or any other amount by simply checking off the CTF box on their state income tax form.

"The Children's Trust Fund was established in 1982 as a permanent source of funding for local programs throughout the state that work to prevent child abuse and neglect," said David C. Mills, executive director of the trust fund. "It is an independent, nonprofit organization that has made significant progress in preventing child abuse and neglect by helping more than 100,000 Michigan children and families.

As she proceeds to conduct her private investigation of Conor's questionable business ventures, she falls irrevocably in love with her family's nemesis. Torn between revenge and desire, Diana risks her heart as well as her sanity in a dangerous game of deception and double-cross.

BINGO by Rita Mae Brown (fiction). The story is set in fictional Runnymede, Maryland, a town divided by the Mason-Dixon line, where feuds erupt with the regularity of the weekly bingo night. Well, there's a fellow in Beverly Hills, Calif., who has been calling every day for a week to let me in on this deal. It happened because I sent in a coupon. I do this a lot to see what the boys are

The scheme goes like this, so I'm told. You pay in half of your contract now. If the contract calls for \$5,000, then you send \$2,500. That gives you the right to the first 20 ounces of gold from a 133-ton chunk of ore in a California mine.

When the mining and refining process starts then you chip in the balance of \$2,500. In maybe 9 months, you are supposed to get your 20 ounces of gold. If the price level is around what it is now, it would be worth \$8,000.

It was a busy week on the phone for gold bugs. Another outfit in California wanted to sell gold on mar-

"Gold has been making important moves lately, said the pleasant woman on the phone.

Mostly downward, I reflected. From \$500 January '89 to under \$400 now.

How much is the margin rate, I asked. "12%," she said.

So the price has to go up 12% a year for you to break even. That would put the stuff around \$440 based on February 1989 prices.
