"certainly haven't gotten any better. We're to the point here now where we've got a lot of work to do," he commented.

But the rain has caused additional problems for farmers. "We have to get rid of the weeds," Bortel emphasized.

Nagelkirk added that the problem with weeds is not new. "Last year we had quite a few weed control failures because of dryness." He explained that the chemicals used on the weeds need some moisture and there just wasn't enough rain last summer.

LeCureux commented that in Huron County dryness

caused the chemicals used on weeds to be ineffective during the early part of May. But he added the conditions have improved and the weeds are no longer a factor in the county.

However, Bortel noted there are more problems to contend with in Tuscola County, which has some 280,000 acres of farmland. "Cutting alfalfa hay is something that needs to be done." He reported that there are approximately 25,000 acres of alfalfa that need to be harvested in the county. Furthermore, dry beans are usually planted in late May

or early June, but, "now it's

News last month reminded me that I used to patronize a movie theater that forbade popcorn. It not only didn't sell popcorn --- or anything else to eat or drink — it wouldn't allow you to bring your own popcorn from home or purchased from a nearby candy store. Imagine that.

Today, my wife and I would aggressively avoid such a totalitarian theater. She might even throw rocks at it. When we depart home for our weekly movie, she never asks what we're going to see, she asks if I've chosen a theater with decent popcorn. Corn freshly popped on the premises is much preferred to the alreadypopped variety that is warmed up before being sold at an outrageous price. If it weren't for the dumb way she eats it, I'd say my wife likes movie popcorn ----small box, no butter --- even more than I do. But she pops the popcorn into her mouth one kernel at a time, for

> your lap. These days, the only movie theater I know of that doesn't sell popcorn is at the Detroit Institute of Arts. This is understandable. The DIA shows foreign films with subtitles and caters to people who think popcorn munching prevents the audience from fully appreciating and understanding the cinematic achievement of the director, who requires his actors to scratch a lot. My wife and I go to the DIÅ when we feel that our artistic sensibilities need cleansing, not to mention our palates. or when the same movies can't be seen at the Maple or Tele-Arts, two area artsy theaters with popcorn count-

ers.

But more than 35 years ago, when we first began dating, we regularly attended a movie theater that banned popcorn for no artistic reason other than the manager didn't want to sweep up the fallen kernels, which attracted local rodents. It was the Pix Theater, still operating in downtown Lapeer today, but now with a popcorn counter. The manager was the late Jay Lishness, one of my favorite unforgettable characters. Jay not only forbade cus-

tomers to bring in popcorn, he sent them home if there weren't enough of them.

There was no profit in show-

ing a scheduled movie to a sparse crowd, so, if the head count fell short, Jay passed out refunds and told the paltry patrons to try again another night. I never left home for the Pix without phoning first to ask if the movie would be shown as advertised. And sometimes Jay said it depended on how many people I brought with me. The only reason I got married was to have children I could take to the movies they didn't want to see, just to pad the crowd. Jay more than made up for the popcorn ban by running a militantly quiet theater that is a distant sweet memory in these days of multi-screen complexes with several loudmouths in every shoe box. If a patron wouldn't shut up, Jay called the cop (Lapeer had a small force in the Pix's early days),

with Jay, who was about 40 years older. He always took my money. I tried to get even by lying about him in the local newspaper. When Jay complained about the competition from early TV, and closed the theater for a few weeks in the summer, I wrote that the poor impoverished Lishness was vacationing in Lum, a four-corner settlement a few miles away, where the only way to spend money was in a vending machine. ### **Insect zappers**

Researchers have discovered that many plants have insect-zapping capability. equal opportunities in and out of the job market. people may start to wonder if other groups are being overlooked.

# **Pattons prepare to retire** from 27-year "team" ministry

lare Patton isn't a physician, but he's tried to help many heal wounds over the past 6 years.

"God gives people different gifts. One of our gifts for the ministry, I think, (has been) bringing a sense of family and oneness, and to bring peace," the pastor recently remarked in his office at Salem United Methodist Church.

Patton came to the Cass City church in June 1983, shortly after a split occurred in the congregation. Since then, he and his wife of more than 40 years, Louine, have worked to rebuild unity.

Now, as he prepares to retire, Patton says he believes his role in that work is finished.

"Some hearts have been healed that have needed healing," he said, adding he has worked to instill a sense of harmony in the church. "It's not done yet because

families were divided," he said. "(But) there has been development of a sense of family in the Salem church. People have been more intentional in their care of one another, and in their support of one another."

Patton, who will be replaced by the Rev. Donald Daws, pastor of 3 Imlay City United Methodist churches for the past 9 years, will deliver his last message June 18.

The service will mark the end of a ministry spanning nearly 3 decades. Interestingly, the work has

been a second career for Patton, who was in the construction business for 11 years before giving up his trade as a carpenter at the age of 35.

"I was converted in May 1957. Two-and-a-half years later I felt a call to the ministry," he recalled. "I had a pretty good business going at that time, but I felt at that point I couldn't do anything else if I was going to be at the center of (God's) will for my

"I hadn't the foggiest idea of where it would lead or where it would take us," he continued. "Fortunately, my wife was very supportive and willing to do what the Lord has wanted us to do."

Patton noted Louine has been not only supportive, but also has shared in his work, taking on a host of responsibilities.

She's taught Sunday School, directed choirs and served as secretary over the years, he commented, adding, "We're a team minis-try."

Following 3 years of study at Garrett Theological Seminary, Evanston, Ill., Patton received his first appointment in June 1962 to a church in Columbiaville, where he stayed for 5 years. He then spent 5 years in Wisner and 11 years in Vassar before coming to Cass City.

## Alfalfa weevil problem may surface this year

The Alfa!fa Weevil has not been much of a problem in Michigan for the last few years, but this year may be different. "There are heavy infestations of weevil reported from the Ohio/Indiana border north to the Lansing area," states Eric Frahm, Extension Agricultural Agent. "Although we haven't seen high concentrations of weevil yet, we need to be watching fields closely because populations could reach damaging levels this week."

Alfalfa weevil adults feed on the leaves, causing round holes in the leaves, but not causing serious damage. Weevil grubs, or larva, cause more damage than the adults. Grubs feed on the tips of the leaves or on the young, unrolled leaves at the tip of the alfalfa stem. The tips of the leaves will show signs of feeding and begin to turn brown looking, similar to frost damage. A rule of thumb is that spraying is needed if 1/4 or more of the tips show damage and the alfalfa will not be cut for one

There are a few things that can be done to control the infestation of alfalfa weevil. Frahm states, "The best control is to cut affected fields immediately. If the field cannot be cut within 4 to 5 days, then you may want to consider spraying with an insecticide. The most important thing to remember about an insecticide is to

check the pre-harvest interval, (number of days allowed between application and harvest). Some products have pre-harvest interval of 21 days," adds Frahm.
