## Supporters meet Jordan College top management

Supporters of Jordan College were introduced to top management prior to ceremonies commemorating the start of a new facility at the corner of Ale and Main Street in Cass City at a coffee klatch at Charnont Restaurant Thursday.

The group was introduced to Jerry White, campus dean, and Lexie Coxon, president of the board of directors.

Coxon reviewed the college's history since it first arrived in Bad Axe in 1983 and the lengthy negotiations that led to the decision to build in the community.

She lauded the persons who agreed to help secure the financing and explained that a joint business venture that failed made it necessary to receive financial backing to come to Cass City.

Coxon reviewed the dona-

tion of the site by Chemical Bank and adjacent land by the Pinney family, saying it was typical of the support and cooperation received in the community.

We think that we will be better able to serve our students in this facility, Coxon concluded, and "we are here for our students, serving because we care."

Lambert Althaver, village president and one of the persons who worked with

college representatives, said that it was well-known that Cass City is a specially dedicated community. Persons that are invited to come to the community must be special, too.

We welcome you (Jordan College) to Cass City, he said.

After the meeting the group went to the building site for ground-breaking ceremonies.

## Cass City sewage pollution free

Cass City area residents need not be concerned about uncontrolled sewage polluting the Cass River, despite what a representative from Saginaw said in a television interview concerning the major problem the city has in times of heavy flooding.

The reason, says village manager Lou LaPonsie, is twofold. First, Cass City has state-of-the-art waste disposal at the Cass City Waste Water Treatment Plant. Second, storm water is not handled at this plant.

The way it works, treatment plant superintendent Dick Mohr and worker Dave Irla explain, is that storm water is carried through storm sewers to a discharge point into Condensary Creek, southwest of Cass City.

Sewage is handled with another line and undergoes treatments. The final filtering process, the tertiary treatment, separates the Cass City plant from most others that stop after 2 filtering processes.

When that's done, Erla says, except for the chlorine smell, you could place it next to a glass of drinking water and never tell the difference. We're proud of the job we do here, he smiled. Making Cass City's sewage pollution-free and able to pass stringent Environ-

mental Protection Agency scrutiny has not come cheap for village residents. In 1982, village taxpayers voted approval of general obligation bonds that call for payments of nearly \$70,000 a year for 40 years.

The modern plant has solved the sewage waste

disposal problem, but there still could be trouble ahead, Mohr cautions. That's because there is no filter or monitoring of storm water that pours into the Cass River via Condensary Creek. That means, of course, a spilled ice cream cone, or a cigar stub, or

refuse deliberately and illegally dumped into a storm catch basin eventually finds its way into our streams.

But with the massive pollution now taking place after every major storm in the urban area, it's not likely that the drainage system in the village will be a major

focus for the EPA for many years.

When it does, Cass City's past record indicates that the community will meet the challenge. It had a state-of-the-art system long before other Thumb communities addressed the problem at the insistence of the State.

## Continued rain becoming problem for Thumb farms

Last year's hot and dry weather caused problems among farmers in Tuscola, Huron and Sanilac counties. This year's cooler and rainy weather is the opposite of last year's, but now there might be too much rain.

"Roughly 20,000 acres may be over saturated and the crops are hurt," remarked Tuscola County Cooperative Extension Director William Bortel. "If we get any more water, the crops can be hurt worse."

"We've gone through one week to 2 weeks with unusually wet periods. This is very

different from past years." Huron County Co-op Extension Agent Jim LeCureux compared last year's weather to this year's, "like night and day. Last year we were in the midst of the worst drought in 100 years. And this year we've had a lot of rain."

Despite heavy rainfall in recent weeks, Sanilac County Co-op Extension Director Martin Nagelkirk reported that 3 "weeks ago we were considerably below last year's rainfall. Now with the rainfall, we've had a few fields (10%) overly wet."

Bortel added that after the rainfall on Friday, the fields,

"certainly haven't gotten any better. We're to the point here now where we've got a lot of work to do," he commented.

But the rain has caused additional problems for farmers. "We have to get rid of the weeds," Bortel emphasized.

Nagelkirk added that the problem with weeds is not new. "Last year we had quite a few weed control failures because of dryness." He explained that the chemicals used on the weeds need some moisture and there just wasn't enough rain last summer.

LeCureux commented that in Huron County dryness

caused the chemicals used on weeds to be ineffective during the early part of May. But he added the conditions have improved and the weeds are no longer a factor in the county.

However, Bortel noted there are more problems to contend with in Tuscola County, which has some 280,000 acres of farmland. "Cutting alfalfa hay is something that needs to be done." He reported that there are approximately 25,000 acres of alfalfa that need to be harvested in the county.

Furthermore, dry beans are usually planted in late May or early June, but, "now it's

### Incumbent loses at O-G

## Extra millage at Cass City defeated

An incumbent was defeated at Owendale-Gagetown and a request for added millage defeated in Cass City in annual school votes Monday. Other districts were uneventful because there was no competition and no millage issues on the ballot.

#### CASS CITY

The Cass City school board will be considering options for school operations next Monday following a narrow 26-vote loss of a request for 2 additional mills for operation Monday.

The request, one of 2 millage requests, was defeated 365 to 339. Voters approved a 3-mill renewal, 486 to 217, and re-elected incumbent board members who ran unopposed. Ben Hobart received 554 votes and Allan Hartwick 591 votes. There were 16 write-in votes for various candidates.

Supt. Ken Micklash said that the board will have 3 options. One will be to further deplete the fund balance the school has. Another is to cut services and the third is to try again for the added funds.

#### OWEN-GAGE

Upset was the key word

Monday in the Owen-Gage district, where a challenger not only ousted a one-term incumbent to win one of 2 seats on the school board, but also garnered more votes than either of his incumbent opponents.

Thomas J. Fritz, 37, of Gagetown, earned a 4-year term with 158 votes, while 14-year board veteran and current President Joseph Warack, 63, netted the other vacant seat with 150 votes.

Current board Secretary Mary Ann Abbe received

115 votes, losing her bid for a second term.

The race might have been closer had every voter selected 2 candidates.

Although a total of 230 (16 percent) of the district's 1,400 voters went to the polls, the votes cast totaled only 423, compared to the expected total of 460 (2 votes per ballot).

#### KINGSTON

Both Kingston and Ubley school board elections went as planned.

The Kingston millage of 20.35 was renewed for 5 additional years, as 730 people voted. The millage passed by a vote of 580 to 148. In addition, Julia Heilig, who was unopposed, was reelected with 675 votes.

#### UBLY

In Ubley David Kolacz, who received 93 votes, and Louis Wenzlaff, who obtained 85 votes, were both reelected. Overall, 93 votes were cast.

## Tiny wage boost okayed at O-G

Owen-Gage school district officials and teachers have reached and ratified a new 3-year labor contract over the past week.

News of the agreement was aired Monday night during the board of education's monthly meeting, when board members approved

ratification of the pact following an hour-long executive session.

School Supt. Harley Kirby declined to release some details of the contract pending signing of the document by both sides, but said the pact calls for a wage freeze in 1987-88 and salary increases for some teachers of 1.65 percent in 1988-89 (retroactive) and 1989-90.

Kirby explained that the increases aren't spread across the board. Rather, the hikes will affect only those instructors who have reached the top of the district's salary schedule, which will remain unchanged.

Kirby estimated that more than half of the district's 22 teachers, who have been without a contract since

August 1987, are currently at their top pay level.

The superintendent said the increases will cost the district about \$8,100 per year. He added, however, that the hikes will be offset by concessions agreed upon during negotiations.

Teachers ratified the new contract last Wednesday following a meeting with board representatives earlier in the week. The favorable vote came a week after teachers rejected the pact "due to a misunderstanding in (its) presentation," Kirby said.

He noted additional details, including changes in the teachers' fringe benefit package, will be released after the contract has been reviewed and signed by both sides.

That beloved old maple is like a huge umbrella, shading the house and most of the yard throughout the summer. I guess it's a small price to pay.

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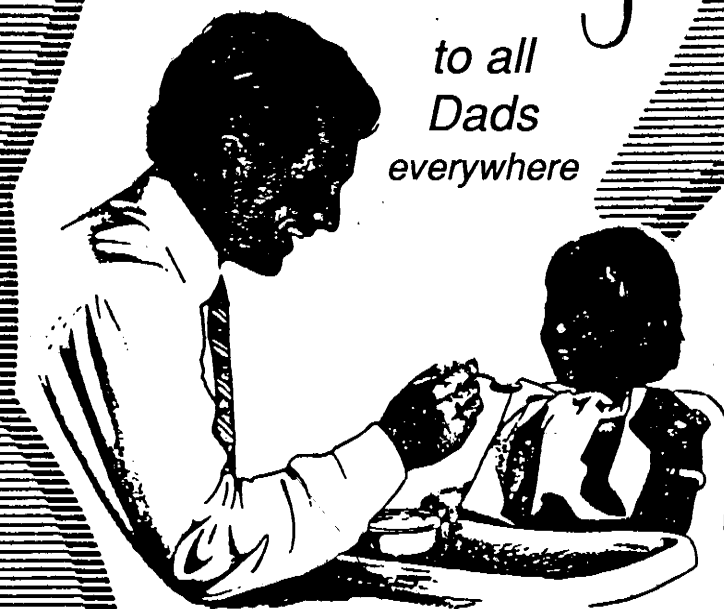
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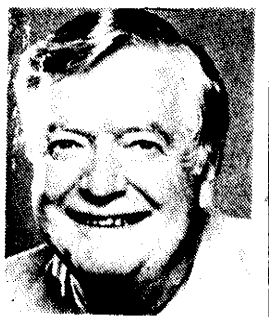
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## "If It Fitz..." Mad about popcorn

A picture in the Detroit News last month reminded me that I used to patronize a movie theater that forbade popcorn. It not only didn't sell popcorn — or anything else to eat or drink — it wouldn't allow you to bring your own popcorn from home or purchased from a nearby candy store. Imagine that.

Today, my wife and I would aggressively avoid such a totalitarian theater. She might even throw rocks at it. When we depart home for our weekly movie, she never asks what we're going to see, she asks if I've chosen a theater with decent popcorn. Corn freshly popped on the premises is much preferred to the already-popped variety that is warmed up before being sold at an outrageous price.

If it weren't for the dumb way she eats it, I'd say my wife likes movie popcorn — small box, no butter — even more than I do. But she pops the popcorn into her mouth one kernel at a time, for

Lord's sake. Anyone with any gourmet sense knows popcorn should be crammed into the mouth by the complete handful. That way, when the box is empty, you still can eat popcorn out of your lap.

These days, the only movie theater I know of that doesn't sell popcorn is at the Detroit Institute of Arts. This is understandable. The DIA shows foreign films with subtitles and caters to people who think popcorn munching prevents the audience from fully appreciating and understanding the cinematic achievement of the director, who requires his actors to scratch a lot. My wife and I go to the DIA when we feel that our artistic sensibilities need cleansing, not to mention our palates, or when the same movies can't be seen at the Maple or Tele-Arts, two area artsy theaters with popcorn counters.

### A MILITANTLY QUIET THEATER

But more than 35 years ago, when we first began dating, we regularly attended a movie theater that banned popcorn for no artistic reason other than the manager didn't want to sweep up the fallen kernels, which attracted local rodents. It was the Pix Theater, still operating in downtown Lapeer today, but now with a popcorn counter. The manager was the late Jay Lishness, one of my favorite unforgettable characters.

Jay not only forbade customers to bring in popcorn, he sent them home if there weren't enough of them.

There was no profit in showing a scheduled movie to a sparse crowd, so, if the head count felt short, Jay passed out refunds and told the patry patrons to try again another night. I never left home for the Pix without phoning first to ask if the movie would be shown as advertised. And sometimes Jay said it depended on how many people I brought with me. The only reason I got married was to have children I could take to the movies they didn't want to see, just to pad the crowd.

Jay more than made up for the popcorn ban by running a militantly quiet theater that is a distant sweet memory in these days of multi-screen complexes with several loudmouths in every shoe box. If a patron wouldn't shut up, Jay called the cop (Lapeer had a small force in the Pix's early days),

In my thirtysomething youth, I often played golf with Jay, who was about 40 years older. He always took my money. I tried to get even by lying about him in the local newspaper. When Jay complained about the competition from early TV, and closed the theater for a few weeks in the summer, I wrote that the poor impoverished Lishness was vacationing in Lum, a four-corner settlement a few miles away, where the only way to spend money was in a vending machine. Jay was so unembarrassed, he put it on the Pix marquee: "Gone to Lum."

The aforementioned newspaper photo that reminded me of Jay and the Pix was of his widow, Esther Lishness, having her lovely white hair done in the beauty shop at the Avondale Convalescent Hospital in Rochester. She began living there last August after suffering two strokes. The article described Esther as looking stylish and pretty, which is how I remember her. I also remember that half the fun of kidding Jay was hearing his wife laugh about it.

Today's column is for 95-year-old Esther Lishness and the wonderful popcornless days at the Pix. Just because I felt like it.

## Board halts legal action

The Elkland Township Board Monday voted to suspend legal action against a township resident over a dispute involving the township's junk ordinance.

According to township Zoning Administrator Anton Peters, a problem with communications led to the board's vote last month to proceed with legal action against the resident, who wasn't named by officials.

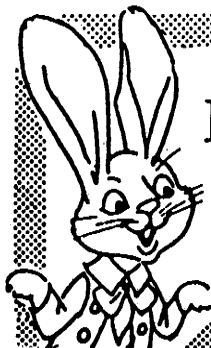
Peters explained Monday that prior to last month's vote, he had been in communication with the resident regarding cleaning up the property in question, located east of town on the north side of M-81. The resident promised to begin the clean-up and in fact did begin, Peters said, but he failed to send a written statement to that effect as was requested.

In other business during the hour-long monthly session, the board voted to hire Lyle Kreh to handle roadside mowing along township roads, township Clerk Norma Wallace said. He will be paid \$1,400 for the first cutting and \$300 for the second cutting, she added.

Also, Wallace noted, the board is working to develop a plan for landscaping the new section of the township cemetery.

### Insect zappers

Researchers have discovered that many plants have insect-zapping capability. National Wildlife magazine reports members of the sunflower family, including daisies and marigolds, produce chemicals that are poisonous to insects. When these chemicals sop up sunlight they become highly toxic. But their poison loses its punch in the dark. One plant pesticide is more toxic to mosquito larva than the outlawed chemical DDT.

## Senior citizens need benefits

In today's society it seems every group gets its own special benefits. With the growing concern of giving minorities equal opportunities in and out of the job market, people may start to wonder if other groups are being overlooked.

# Pattons prepare to retire from 27-year "team" ministry

Clare Patton isn't a physician, but he's tried to help heal many wounds over the past 6 years.

"God gives people different gifts. One of our gifts for the ministry, I think, (has been) bringing a sense of family and oneness, and to bring peace," the pastor recently remarked in his office at Salem United Methodist Church.

Patton came to the Cass City church in June 1983, shortly after a split occurred in the congregation. Since then, he and his wife of more than 40 years, Louine, have worked to rebuild unity.

Now, as he prepares to retire, Patton says he believes his role in that work is finished.

"Some hearts have been healed that have needed healing," he said, adding he

has worked to instill a sense of harmony in the church.

"It's not done yet because families were divided," he said. "(But) there has been development of a sense of family in the Salem church. People have been more intentional in their care of one another, and in their support of one another."

Patton, who will be replaced by the Rev. Donald Daws, pastor of 3 Imlay City United Methodist churches for the past 9 years, will deliver his last message June 18.

The service will mark the end of a ministry spanning nearly 3 decades.

Interestingly, the work has been a second career for Patton, who was in the construction business for 11 years before giving up his trade as a carpenter at the age of 35.

## CONVERTED

"I was converted in May 1957. Two-and-a-half years later I felt a call to the ministry," he recalled. "I had a pretty good business going at that time, but I felt at that point I couldn't do anything else if I was going to be at the center of (God's) will for my life."

"I hadn't the foggiest idea of where it would lead or where it would take us," he continued. "Fortunately, my wife was very supportive and willing to do what the Lord has wanted us to do."

Patton noted Louine has been not only supportive, but also has shared in his work, taking on a host of responsibilities.

She's taught Sunday School, directed choirs and served as secretary over the years, he commented, adding, "We're a team ministry."

Following 3 years of study at Garrett Theological Seminary, Evanston, Ill., Patton received his first appointment in June 1962 to a church in Columbiaville, where he stayed for 5 years. He then spent 5 years in Wisner and 11 years in Vassar before coming to Cass City.

## ACTIVE

Aside from serving as pastor locally, he has been active for the past 4 years in the Cass City Ministerial Association, which honored him with a gift and luncheon last month.

Also, he has held the position of board president for Bay Shore Evangelical United Methodist Camp, Sebawaing, for 6 years. He and Louine hope to spend more time at the camp in retirement.

The couple, who will reside about 6 miles south of

Caro in a home they built 11 years ago, also plan to see more of their children and grandchildren.

The Pattons have 3 children, Steven, who along with his wife, Laura, and 2 children reside in Lexington, Ky.; Brian and his wife, Susan, and their son, who live in Chatanooga, Tenn., and Terry, who along with his wife, Judy, and the couple's daughter, live in Caro.

Although the Pattons are looking forward to retirement, particularly now while they have good health,

they indicated their 27-year ministry has been rewarding.

"We never came to a church with the idea of being the boss or telling a church what needs to be done, but to contribute what gifts we have," Clare remarked.

"We've been privileged to be in the company of the finest people in the world—God's people," he added. Louine agreed. "It's been a privilege because of the sharing that there can be," she said. "I've come to love the people very much. It's been a joy to work with them."

## Alfalfa weevil problem may surface this year

The Alfalfa Weevil has not been much of a problem in Michigan for the last few years, but this year may be different. "There are heavy infestations of weevil reported from the Ohio/Indiana border north to the Lansing area," states Eric Frahm, Extension Agricultural Agent. "Although we haven't seen high concentrations of weevil yet, we need to be watching fields closely because populations could reach damaging levels this week."

Alfalfa weevil adults feed on the leaves, causing round holes in the leaves, but not causing serious damage. Weevil grubs, or larva, cause more damage than the adults. Grubs feed on the tips of the leaves or on the young, unrolled leaves at the tip of the alfalfa stem. The tips of the leaves will show signs of feeding and begin to turn brown looking, similar to frost damage. A rule of thumb is that spraying is needed if 1/4 or more of the tips show damage and the alfalfa will not be cut for one week or more.

There are a few things that can be done to control the infestation of alfalfa weevil. Frahm states, "The best control is to cut affected fields immediately. If the field cannot be cut within 4 to 5 days, then you may want to consider spraying with an insecticide. The most important thing to remember about an insecticide is to check the pre-harvest interval, (number of days allowed between application and harvest). Some products have pre-harvest interval of 21 days," adds Frahm.

# Nerkowski sentenced to prison

The fourth of 4 men charged and convicted in the February 1988 armed robbery of a young couple in their Cass City apartment was sentenced Friday in Tuscola County Circuit Court to 6 years to 15 years in prison.

The sentence handed down to Anthony E. Nerkowski Jr., 25, of Dearborn, is to run concurrent with a federal sentence, court records state.

Nerkowski, who pleaded

guilty Jan. 3, was one of 3 Detroit area men to enter guilty pleas to armed robbery. The other suspects, Fernando Vega and Lonnie L. Jordan, both 21, received sentences of 6 to 20 years and 4 to 20 years, respectively.

In the same case, a fourth man, Allen N. Zimmerman Jr., 25, of Gagetown, pleaded guilty to breaking and entering an occupied dwelling.

Also Friday, Kelly S. Fri-

day, 20, of Clifford, was sentenced for his April 20 pleas of nolo contendere (no contest) to charges of attempted first-degree Criminal Sexual Conduct.

He was ordered to serve one year in the county jail for each count in addition to 5 years probation, \$600 in court costs and fines. He also was ordered to attend mental health counseling.

Court records state Friday attempted to engage in sexual penetration with 2 persons under the age of 13 years Jan. 14 in Koylton Township.

Becky K. Kaczor, 17, of Bad Axe, was sentenced to 180 days in the county jail, with work release and credit for 14 days already served, for a Feb. 17 plea of guilty to breaking and entering an unoccupied dwelling.

Kaczor also was ordered to serve 36 months probation and pay a \$100 fine and \$200 in costs plus attorney fees.

According to court records, Kaczor broke into a country club located at 1201 Gun Club Rd., Caro., Sept. 19, 1988.

Caro resident James H. Wright, 19, 626 Allen St., was sentenced for an April 14 plea of guilty to breaking and entering.

He was ordered to serve 90 days in an incarceration program, 6 months in tethering monitoring and 5 years probation, and attend substance abuse counseling and pay fines and costs totalling \$600, \$182 in restitution plus attorney fees.

The Dec. 6 offense occurred at a liquor store at 109 Montague St., Caro, court records state.

David C. Buczynski, 28, of Caro, was sentenced to 180 days in jail and ordered to

pay \$1,007 in restitution for his April 14 plea of guilty to no account checks.

The court, which gave Buczynski permission to participate in work release, ordered that the restitution be paid within 90 days or an additional 90 days be added to the jail term.

Records state Buczynski wrote fraudulent checks for \$175 and \$200, both drawn on Mayville State Bank, July 16 in Caro.

In other proceedings Friday, a 25-year-old Caro man pleaded guilty to attempted delivery of cocaine (less than 50 grams), Sept. 11 in Indianfields Township.

Sentencing for George H. Crittenden II, 184 State St., is slated for 8:30 a.m. Aug. 11.

Charles M. Huizar, 31, of Vassar, entered a plea of guilty to delivery of marijuana June 2, 1988, in Caro.

Sentencing is scheduled for Aug. 4.

Terry F. Perry, 34, Linden, entered a plea of guilty to a charge of no account check. Sentencing is set for Aug. 4. Bond was continued at \$4,000.

Court records state the Sept. 4 offense involved an \$80.97 check written at Shop-Rite in Caro and drawn on State Savings Bank of Fenton.

Tamara S. Staple, 30, of Vassar, entered a plea of guilty to fraudulently altering a license plate March 28 in Vassar.

Her sentencing is scheduled for 8:30 a.m. Aug. 4.

Also, Robert A. Quinn, 27, of Millington, pleaded innocent to a charge of retail fraud.

A pretrial is to be scheduled. Bond was continued at \$500.

According to court records, Quinn is accused of stealing property valued at more than \$100 from a store in Arbela Township June 2.

# Novesta residents may end up footing trash pick-up bills

A sooner-than-expected hike in trash hauling rates and a tougher stand on township junk ordinance violators were among the topics aired during a regular meeting of the Novesta Township Board last week.

About 15 persons, many of them concerned about waste disposal costs, attended the 2 1/2-hour session.

Township Clerk Nursie Kloc said the concern stems from a prediction by Ray Hayes of Gateway Sanitation Services, Almont, who told residents attending the township's annual meeting in March that costs would probably double by the end of the year.

"The next meeting it was doubled," Kloc remarked, adding the cost for one truck to make 2 pick-ups per month went from \$480 to \$900.

Kloc predicted the topic would draw another sizable attendance at the board's July regular meeting. She said township officials will probably call a special meeting of electors to discuss the possibility of shifting waste disposal costs from the township to residents.

Turning to the township's junk ordinance, the board voted to take legal action against 2 residents for violations.

Kloc, who declined to name the persons, said another resident has been given 45 days to respond to a notice of violation for a mobile home, located at the corner of Shabbona and Cemetery roads, that doesn't meet township zoning specifications.

In other business during the June 5 session, the board voted to switch the township's insurance coverage from Harris-Hampshire Agency Inc., Cass City, to a state-wide insurance pool program offered through

Burnham and Flowers, Kalamazoo.

Kloc said the switch provides the township with double the coverage plus coverage for errors and omissions, while the cost -- \$2,974 -- is \$1,226 less than the local agency's bid.

The board also voted to resurface one mile of Severance Road, from Warner Road to Phillips Road, and Crawford Road, from Deckerville Road to Gilford Road.

The township's share of the cost for the work is estimated at \$10,000 to \$11,000.

Kloc said another proposed project, resurfacing one mile of Kelly Road, from Cemetery Road to Warner Road, was tabled pending a check on heavy-vehicle traffic that is damaging the road surface.

In a related matter, Dale Mills asked the board to take responsibility for Kitch Road, which he stated was turned over to the township in 1964.

Kloc, who said Dale presented evidence regarding the transaction, noted the resident lives off Kitch Road and has been unable to get a legal easement to his

property.

Unfortunately, she remarked, nothing was done with the road after it was turned over to the township and it's unlikely anything will be done in the near future because of the cost involved.

The clerk explained that further investigation by Supervisor Maynard Stine revealed that the township would have to bring the road up to specifications in order for it to be recognized legally.

Also last week, the board revoked a motion to issue a lifetime lease to the Old

Settler's Reunion for the group's newly constructed veterans memorial, located at the township cemetery.

Kloc said the board has since learned the Old Settler's Reunion would be responsible for taxes under the arrangement. She added that other options, including granting the lease to the local VFW Post, will be discussed at the next meeting.

The board also received request to bring a section of VanAllen Road up to specifications, and agreed to investigate complaints regarding inadequate spraying of brine on township road.

Films to be featured are "Great Lakes Schooners", which tells the story of sailing ships and the men who followed the Great Lakes to settle and develop the midwest; "Kirtland's Warbler: Bird of Fire", a film that relates the life history of the rare Kirtland's warbler and shows management efforts to create habitat for the bird, and "Year of the Wildebeest", a documentary focusing on a herd of wildebeest on their annual, epic 2,000-mile migration in Kenya in search of grass and water during the dry summer months.

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

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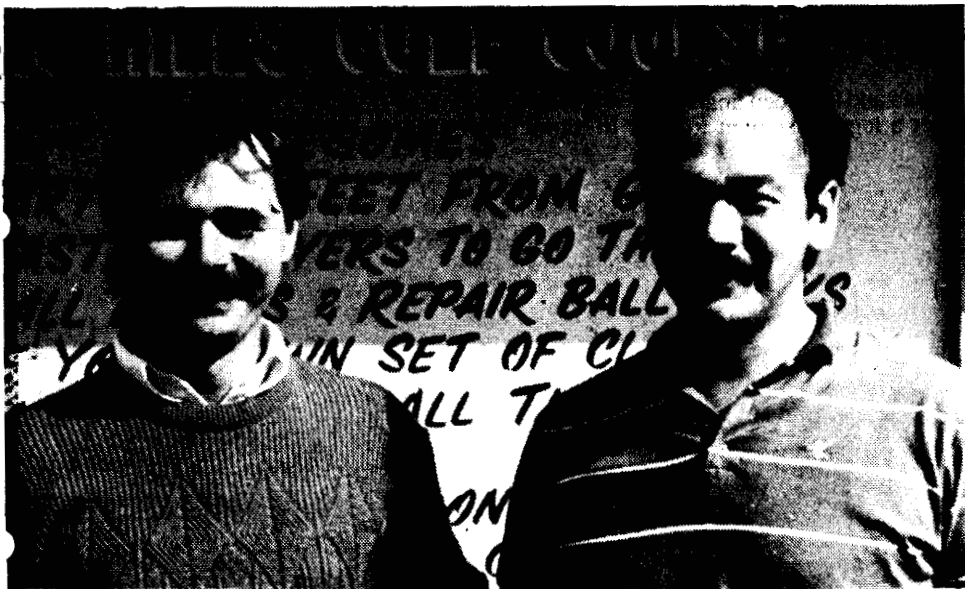

a quarter into June and we've not been able to get any planted. It's something that needs to get done," Bortel emphasized, adding there are about 45,000 acres of dry beans that need to be planted.

The late alfalfa harvest and late dry bean planting are also problems in Huron and Sanilac counties.

In addition, the alfalfa weevil, an insect larva that feeds on the tips of the plant, is causing some damage to crops, Bortel remarked, adding that overall, "it's not at a critical situation."

The problem with the weevil is a result of the rain, LeCureux pointed out, adding the rain caused a late harvest of alfalfa, which gave the weevil a longer chance to spread. "There's not much you can do. You just have to work around it the best you can."

Bortel, Nagelkirk and LeCureux explained that although the Thumb has had a lot of rain, it fares better than other parts of Michigan.

"The entire sum is relative to past years," Nagelkirk commented. "We may be a pinch better but we're at the least in as good shape, if not better, compared to other areas in the state."

However, even though the counties have had fewer inches of rain, Bortel said enough is enough for at least a week or 2. "What we need right now is to let things dry up, get rid of the weeds, harvest the alfalfa hay and plant the dry beans."

Many of the other crops, such as early corn, sugar beets, oats and barley, look good to the 3 experts.

"We're in good shape," LeCureux remarked, and Nagelkirk said, "Right now for the most part, our field situation is good."

Bortel added Tuscola County fields are also doing well, but if he could design the weather for the next 3 months, the crops would be even better. "I would like a week to 10 days of dry weather and then on Saturday nights we would like a half inch to 3 quarters of an inch."

Athlete's Foot Treatment

Athlete's foot is the most common fungal infection occurring on the skin. The infection may cause pain, inflammation, scaling, breaks in the skin, and possibly a loss of the top layer of skin. The areas between and under the toes are most frequently affected. The organisms that cause athlete's foot thrive in a warm, moist setting. While severe athlete's foot may require the care of a physician, many infections can be prevented or treated with self care and the use of nonprescription medicines.

Keep both feet as clean and dry as possible. Change socks frequently, especially during hot weather. Carefully dry the feet after bathing or swimming. Wear wooden or rubber clogs when staying at motels or using public showers and swimming pools. During hot days wear sandals or no shoes at all.

If athlete's foot develops, apply topical antifungal creams, sprays, or powders. Two of the most effective topical antifungal medicines are available without prescription - tolnaftate and miconazole. Daily use of topical medicines containing salicylic acid may help remove dead skin so that antifungal medicines will reach the areas of infection and work more effectively.

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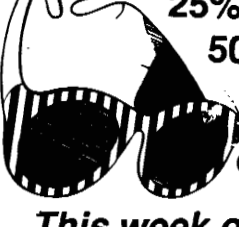
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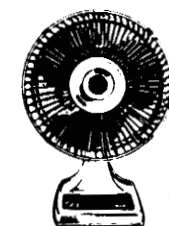

# Asbestos removal slated in Owen-Gage District

The Owen-Gage board of education approved a \$21,200 asbestos removal bid from Asbestos Control Services, Sanford, during a lengthy meeting Monday night.

The estimate is close to what school officials had expected to pay, but doesn't represent the total cost involved in the first phase, according to school Supt. Harley Kirby.

Kirby, who presented 3 bids ranging from \$21,200 to \$43,200, noted Owen-Gage, as well as several others in Huron County, joined in a consortium with the intermediate school district to accept bids from several companies.

He said 9 different company representatives visited

the district last week to evaluate what needs to be done in the first phase of removal, which will consist of removing boiler and hot water pipe wrappings in the high school.

The second phase will focus on the elementary school in Gagetown, he said.

Fortunately, Kirby noted, it was determined that ceiling and floor tiles, following a re-evaluation, won't have to be removed. Estimates of that project range in the area of \$500,000.

Still, the superintendent added, the planned asbestos removal, slated to begin next month, will be costly.

Aside from the expense of removal, the district will have to pay another firm for personnel trained to monitor

the air during the work. That cost is \$65 per hour per person with a minimum 8-hour day, he said, adding the first phase is expected to be completed in 14 calendar days.

The district's custodial staff can probably re-wrap the pipes, but the materials will have to be purchased and some replacement work in the old boiler room will require the help of outside professionals, he continued.

Kirby pointed out the removal will have to be paid for out of fund equity. It's another strain on an already tight budget, he indicated, adding state and/or federal government officials need to start making money for such projects available to schools on a more wide-

spread basis.

"They're going to have to come up with something because school districts can't afford what they're asking them to do," he remarked.

## POLICY CHANGE

In other business during the 3 1/2-hour monthly session, the board, following little discussion, approved a policy change reducing the number of physical education credits required for graduation from 2 to one.

The proposal was brought up last month by district resident, parent and Owen-Gage substitute teacher Ruth Grassmann.

Grassmann, who received the support of high school counselor and Principal Ronald D'Aoust, explained the 2-credit requirement was causing scheduling problems for many upper-classman who would rather select another academic course of their choice than take a second year of physics.

\*Met in an hour-long executive session to discuss Preschool Director Diane Warack's contract. No action was taken following the session.

In a related matter, the board approved a statement of philosophy regarding the preschool program. The action was needed to apply for grant monies in the fall, Warack said.

\*Hired Janet Allen, on the recommendation of D'Aoust and elementary school Principal William Britt, as the district's new band teacher.

Allen, who is close to completing the requirements for her master's degree, taught for a year in Reed City and has extensive substitute teaching experience in the Lansing area, according to D'Aoust, who noted she was one of 24 applicants for the job.

\*Set a special budget meeting for 8 p.m. June 26 in the Gagetown Elementary School cafeteria.

\*Approved board President Joseph Warack's nomination of veteran school board member Ronald Good to the Michigan Association of School Boards Board of Directors.

\*Approved a resolution to join the Michigan High School Athletic Association Inc. for the 1989-90 school year.

\*Noted that physical exams will be offered to student athletes in grades 7 through 12 Aug. 10 beginning at 6:30 p.m. in the Owendale gym. The exams will cost \$5 or \$6 per student.

## HELPFUL

She added the change will be especially helpful to college-bound students, whose academic, not physical, credits will be taken into consideration in terms of college or university admission.

Also Monday, the board: \*Directed Kirby to check with local plumbing contractors, regarding needed repairs in the district's heating system, before accepting an outside bid for the work.

Knowlton, who obtained a 3.69 GPA and scored 21 on the ACT, also received a Michigan Competitive Scholarship for \$1,200.

Nieboer was also given the Michigan Competitive Scholarship of \$1,200 and

additional scholarships of \$750 from the Lions Club, and \$100 from the Zonta Club.

Yep. Always has. What else is new?

\*\*\*\*\*

Ben Webberman writes a pretty good column on bonds in Forbes magazine. He seldom stirs up an argument from this writer, and that is quite an achievement for anyone, anywhere.

His May 29 piece on zero coupon bonds had a lot of half-truths, enough to compel me to start up the typewriter.

"Zero coupon bonds have become popular with the brokers because they generate large commissions."

Larger than what? I saw a Paine Webber confirm today for \$714 worth of stock, and the commission was \$60. That's 8.4%.

While the transaction size was small, brokerage firms get about that same cut on mutual funds, on annuities and other forms of insurance policies. On limited partnerships the rate is even higher. On unit trusts, 5% is common.

When a new issue of zeros come out, 1.25% on the dollar amount is typical commission. The individual broker selling a par value of \$100,000 in zero coupons with an offering price 20, or \$20,000, would get \$250 for his firm, and he would keep \$100 for himself.

On the secondary market I admit there could be fat mark-ups if the broker has no conscience, and he isn't in business for the long haul, versus a quick buck from rip-offs.

People who buy zeros (or any other bond, but zeros in particular) should do so on a

yield basis, and not the dollar price. If you don't have a bond yield calculator, then ask the broker to figure out the yield to maturity and the yield to call for whatever you are looking at.

For example, you are offered a good quality tax-free zero due in 20 years at 24 cents on the dollar. \$2,500 for a \$10,000 bond which will be paid off in 2009. A good deal?

Not really. That's only a 7.05% yield. And the salesman isn't likely to tell you that if you don't ask. His pitch is "4 times money back, all tax free."

You comb the Blue List in the zero-coupon section at the back. You locate one with a listed yield of 7.5%. It might just be the same issue the salesman is trying to peddle at a dollar price of 25, or \$2500 for \$10,000 par value bonds. At a yield of 7.5% the price will be \$2293. That's \$207 you can save.

The lesson is clear: Buy zeros on a yield basis. The dollar price is so far from par that the yield is never apparent. The main thing that should interest you (aside from quality) is what the investment is going to produce.

Webberman says that because of the high commissions (which I dispute) you have to figure on keeping zeros to maturity. Again you figure what yield basis similar bonds are going for and tell your broker that's about what you want. It might cost a little more percentage-wise to sell them, but not much. I've sold a lot of them during interest rate cycles when rates were down and prices were up. If I do say so, the results have been pretty good, considering I am but a simple country boy from Lapeer, Mich.

\*\*\*\*\*

My partner at the dinner table was active in an investment club. I asked her what

the gals were buying these days.

One was California Energy, traded on the American. It's a geo-thermal energy company.

"It's completely pollution-free," she said. "And it's low cost energy and it has a great future."

I remarked gently that nuclear and hydro were pollution-free, too.

A glance at the Standard & Poor Stock Guide showed for California Energy:

1. No rating, not necessarily a bad sign, but one to produce a quizzical look.

2. Price range of 2.75 to 11.75 in 1988, and 7 1/2 to 17 this year. At this writing in late May, 11.5.

3. No cash dividends, although 4% stock early this year.

4. Book value \$1.37 per share. (Compare to price of 11.5).

5. Earnings first 12 months, 8 cents per share. Prior 5 years, either no earnings or loss of 1 cent or 2 cents per share.

Well, maybe it will turn out all right. Or maybe it will reflect the results of buying-by-committee.

Nevertheless, investment clubs are fun and educational. The exposure to the investment world could be very handy when the old boy departs this earth.
