## Charge Fortson for killing John Bulla

An on-going argument apparently led to the shooting death of a Cass City man Saturday in Mayville, Tuscola County Sheriff Tom Kern said Monday.

John A. Bulla, 36, Seeley Road, Cass City, was found dead outside a First Street home in Mayville at about 2:15 p.m., according to Kern, who said the victim had been shot once in the head with a 12-gauge shotgun.

The resident at that address, John D. Fortson Jr., 30, gave himself up to officers at the scene and was arraigned Sunday on a charge of open murder.

Fortson, who faces a preliminary examination next week in Tuscola County District Court, is being held without bond.

Kern indicated Saturday's fatal shooting — the first in some 20 years in Mayville — occurred in the wake of a series of verbal confrontations between Bulla and Fortson, a former Cass City resident.

"Bulla was there (Fortson residence) last week and caused some problems,"

Kern said, adding the victim had been making threats to Fortson, claiming Fortson owed him some money.

Bulla, along with a brother and 2 others, were at the Fortson residence again Saturday about an hour before the shooting, according to the sheriff, who said the foursome left, but Bulla and his brother, Hugh Bulla, returned later.

Police believe the shot that killed Bulla, who was standing in the driveway of the Fortson residence at the time, was fired from within the home.

Kern lauded a cooperative effort between the sheriff's department and the state police post in Caro in investigating the homicide. Officers and detectives from both agencies worked together in a joint effort, he said.

Also assisting were personnel from the state police's crime laboratory in Bridgeport, Watertown Township police and the Mayville Chief of Police.

### OBITUARY

Bulla was born Dec. 15,

1953, in Bad Axe, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John C. and Clara Periso Bulla of Cass City.

He was united in marriage to Patsy Maynard June 24, 1972, in Kingston. The couple made their home in Cass City, later moving to Elkton and returning to Cass City in 1985.

Bulla served with the United States Army during the Viet Nam War. He also was a past member of the Elkton Jaycees.

He is survived by his wife, Patsy; 4 children, Sandra, Carla, Rebecca and John, all at home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John C. Bulla of Cass City, and 3 brothers, Lawrence Bulla of Deford, Arthur Bulla of Ypsilanti and Hugh Bulla of Elkton.

Funeral services were scheduled for today (Wednesday) at 11 a.m. at Little's Funeral Home, Cass City, with the Rev. James Falsely, pastor of St. Michael's Catholic Church, Wilmot, officiating.

Interment will be in the Novesta Township Cemetery, Cass City.

## School board reinstates elementary art at Owen-Gage

The Owen-Gage Board of Education Monday approved a motion that will reinstate an elementary art program and expand the high school librarian's hours by 60 minutes each day.

The motion calls for the addition of a full-time position in the district instead of part-time position as was approved last month.

School Supt. Harley Kirby explained that his earlier proposal, which reinstated a

home economics offering in the high school, was based on the belief that other previously cut programs had been restored.

He pointed out Monday that he was unaware at that time that the elementary art program hadn't been reinstated. In addition, he said, the district is in violation of its University of Michigan accreditation because the high school librarian position is currently only part-

time (2 hours daily) rather than half-time (3 hours).

The superintendent explained that the additional staff member will teach elementary art and physical education, and 7th grade science, English and social studies, allowing the band instructor to teach home economics and the librarian to have the extra hour in the library.

The changes will go into effect starting with the sec-

ond semester, Kirby noted.

In other business during the monthly session, which lasted a little more than 2 1/2 hours, the board approved attendance by school officials of 4 upcoming conferences.

Attendance by Kirby and the board at a state school administrators/school boards mid-winter conference Feb. 16 and 17 in Grand Rapids, and mini negotia-

tors conference Feb. 8 in Flint received unanimous approval, as did a request by 2 elementary teachers to attend a Michigan Reading Council conference March 12 and 13 in Grand Rapids.

Kirby also was granted permission to attend a Michigan Association of School Administrators mid-winter conference Jan. 30 and 31, and Feb. 1 in Grand Rapids, but on a split vote of 5-1, with Trustee Tom Fritz casting the lone "no" vote.

## Boylan home ransacked by "tidy" thieves

Tuscola County Sheriff's deputies are investigating the recent break-in of a Cass City area couple's home, which was ransacked by thieves who stole a host of items ranging from appliances to lighting fixtures.

The break-in occurred at the C. Clark Boylan residence, 6008 E. Cass City Rd., located near the intersection of M-81 and Koepfgen Road.

The crime was discovered and reported Thursday evening by a friend who was

looking after the home while the couple was away.

"They entered through a back door and ransacked the place quite thoroughly," Deputy Richard Hofmeister said Monday.

Hofmeister said it isn't certain when the break-in occurred, although evidence suggests it happened sometime before the last snowfall.

Stolen from the residence were a television, microwave oven and numerous other items, including light-

ing fixtures and a chandelier, according to the deputy, who noted he recently received word from Cass City police that one of the stolen items, a small safe, has been recovered from a gravel pit south of town.

No dollar estimate was available on the combined property loss.

Hofmeister said the thieves did little damage to the home itself. "They were quite neat about it," he added.

## Elderly passenger hurt when car flips on M-81

An elderly Port Hope woman remained hospitalized in "fair" condition Monday following a 2-vehicle accident about 3 miles west of Cass City Saturday morning.

Troopers from the state police post in Caro reported that Daniel J. Barriger, 17, of Unionville was driving west on M-81 west of Crane Road at about 9:50 a.m. when he attempted to pass and struck another westbound vehicle, driven by Nelson H. Pease, 61, of Port Hope.

Barriger struck the Pease vehicle after losing control on an icy patch, according to troopers, who stated the Pease vehicle then left the roadway, entered a ditch and rolled over.

Pease and 2 passengers in his vehicle, Mildred Pease, 60, of Port Hope, and Gertrude Leese, 91, also of Port Hope, were taken to Hills and Dales General Hospital.

A hospital spokeswoman said Leese was treated and then transferred to Saginaw

St. Mary's Hospital. Neither Nelson nor Mildred Pease were treated, she said. Barriger was not injured.

Barriger, who told troopers that the Pease vehicle was moving at a slow rate of speed prior to the accident, was cited by troopers for careless driving.

The Elkland Township Fire Department's Jaws of Life were used at the scene. Also assisting were Tuscola County Sheriff's deputies and Cass City-Mercy Ambulance personnel.

### 2-VEHICLE CRASH

A Cass City woman was injured in a 2-vehicle accident on Seeger Street north of Garfield Avenue Friday evening in Cass City.

According to Cass City police, Agnes Milligan, 80, 4788 Hospital Dr., was backing out of a driveway at 4280 Seeger St. at about 7:10 p.m. when she pulled into the path of and was struck by a southbound vehicle driven by Alan B. Pe-

ters, 2310 Phillips Rd., Deford.

Milligan was transported by Cass City-Mercy Ambulance personnel to Hills and Dales General Hospital, where she was treated and then released, a hospital spokeswoman said.

Also reported injured last week was a Deford area resident who lost control of her vehicle on an icy patch of M-81 about 1 1/2 miles west of Cass City.

Sheriff's deputies reported Lori L. Hartwick, 1751 N. Cemetery Rd., was eastbound on M-81 east of Spence Road when she lost control of her vehicle, which veered off the roadway, struck 2 mailboxes and rolled over.

Hartwick refused medical treatment, according to reports, which noted the ice was caused by standing water that had been splashed onto the roadway.

Cass City police reported a one-vehicle mishap on Woodland Avenue north of Third Street Sunday.

Reports state Thomas R. Leach, 6729 Garfield Ave., was southbound at about 11:49 a.m. when his vehicle skidded on a patch of ice and struck a utility pole, which broke and fell onto the roadway.

Police noted that just prior to the mishap, the throttle on Leach's vehicle became stuck as he was attempting to keep the vehicle from stalling.

Also in Cass City, 2 vehicles collided at the intersection of Main and Nestles streets last Wednesday.

Police said a westbound vehicle driven by Brian M. Wright of Fort Wayne, Ind., struck another westbound vehicle, driven by Martha L. Hahn of Filion, from behind. Reports state Hahn had stopped behind a turning up. Please turn to page 12.

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

## Au pair

The woman behind the bar gave me a startled look. "Please don't lean on the bar," she said. The bar was moving toward her, forcing her to back up while pouring liquid on ice.

We were in the lobby of Ford Auditorium during intermission of the Nutcracker ballet. "This bar is on wheels," the bartender explained. "If you lean on it, it pins me to the wall."

I wasn't leaning on it, but I could understand her mistake. She couldn't see the nearest customer, Tricia, because only her tiny fingertips were visible. Tricia, 3, was using the edge of the bar for a trapeze.

"I need an au pair for my granddaughter," I said as I belatedly snatched Tricia out of trouble. Au pairs probably aren't as belated as grandpops.

A newspaper said GM Chairman Roger Smith and wife Barbara, "are taking their kids, spouses and grandkids down to the Caribbean for the holiday. The family group will number 11, with an au pair along to make the tally an even dozen."

In the same newspaper, a few pages away, there was an article detailing the travails of workers laid off from a closed GM plant. They were in for a meager Christmas, without much to

give their children. I wondered how many of those unlucky parents knew what an au pair is.

My dictionary says an au pair is "a foreign girl who does domestic work for a family in return for room and board and the opportunity to learn the family's language."

### A PUNGENT REACTION

Michael Moore, creator of the much-acclaimed "Roger & Me" movie, would undoubtedly have a pungent reaction to the ironic juxtaposition of the Smith au pair and jobless ah pooh articles.

He might say: "The Roger Smiths have a foreign babysitter, but they don't want you to have a foreign car. The difference is you don't have to pay for an au pair with cash, you just have to teach her how to say 'stock options' in English."

I haven't seen "Roger & Me," so I have no opinion on it, except to say several people voiced opinions on it before seeing it, and my objective opinion is they're full of baloney. As editor of a nearby weekly newspaper, I supported Sinclair when he said bad things about the American Legion, and I rooted for Moore when he refused to act like the typical school board member—conservative Republican and half-asleep. My stance was unpopular and I was roundly berated by the local citizenry.

But Lennon never sang for me, and I'll never win an Academy Award, drat it. Some rebels just don't have what it takes, or they have a wife and 3 children.

Anyway, I spent the holiday with children and grandchildren but sans au pair (I love to write words I never say). Even on New Year's Eve, I didn't lean on a bar. Tricia and her sister and I banged pans at midnight, but didn't drown out the sound of guns shooting near my Detroit home. I'm glad I didn't have to explain that to an au pair.

## 2 snowmobiles, 1 pickup missing

Cass City police are investigating the theft of 2 snowmobiles and a missing pickup truck.

Police said Charles Nemeth, 6777 Main St., reported that 2 snowmobiles were taken from the rear of his residence sometime between 8 a.m. and 10:30 p.m. last Wednesday.

The snowmobiles are identified as a dark blue 1982 Moto Ski Futura owned by Ross J. Kraft, 4453 Leach St., Cass City, and a yellow 1986 Ski Doo Safari owned by Alfred J. Wallace, 6605 Third St., Cass City. The machines are valued at \$4,000 and \$3,200, respectively.

The persons responsible for the thefts apparently pushed the machines some 50 feet away from the residence before starting them and driving away, according to police, who theorize the pair were dropped off at the residence by a person riding a third snowmobile.

Police were able to follow the snowmobile tracks into Huron County, but lost the tracks near Hartsell and Canboro roads in northern Grant Township, reports state.

The case remains under investigation.

Also last week, Kirk and Marvin Winter, 2971 Huron Line Rd., reported a missing blue and white 1983 Ford Ranger pickup truck.

According to reports, the

vehicle was taken from a parking lot at the Charmont, 6138 E. Cass City Rd., Cass City, sometime between 9 and 11 p.m. Friday.

Police said the vehicle wasn't locked and there was a set of keys in the glove compartment.

\*Met in executive session for 90 minutes to discuss teacher contract negotiations.



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

# Milk price surge

## Dairy farmers collecting record milk checks, but few rushing out to spend

Dairy farmers are smiling all the way to the bank these days with record milk prices that have risen by more than \$3 per hundredweight in recent months.

The upsurge hasn't prompted most local dairy farm operators to rush out and expand their herds or purchase equipment, however, as the current price of more than \$15 per hundredweight is expected to ease back down by summer.

According to Tuscola County Cooperative Extension agent Eric Frahm, the price farmers received for their milk at the beginning of 1989 was about \$12, which gradually began to rise later in the summer and "really started to take off in September."

"I believe it's a new high record," he said of the current price levels. "I know it's the highest it's been in 8 or 10 years."

"The biggest reason for the change has been a decrease in production," Frahm explained.

He noted that production in

Wisconsin and Minnesota, the No. one and No. 3 dairy producers in the nation, respectively, was down by 6 percent last year due primarily to reduced and poor quality feed supplies caused by drought.

"We've been down about one or 2 percent (in production) in Michigan all of 1989 compared to the year before," he continued. "Nationally, these numbers are about the same."

Despite the record prices, Frahm indicated the trend isn't expected to last.

A good first alfalfa cutting in the spring, along with rising dairy cow numbers, will insure a drop in price, he said.

"Most people are predicting that February is going to be the peak, and then it's going to start coming down gradually," he said. "They're predicting that the average milk price for 1990 will be somewhere between the \$13.25 and \$13.50 range," about the same as in 1989.

That prediction has prompted many farmers to take a conservative approach to the market.

### HOG WILD

"I haven't seen too many people go hog wild because the last couple of years have been tight for them," Frahm said. "Most of them are just playing catch-up."

"That's basically what we're doing — trying to catch up," Sanilac County dairy farmer Arthur Severance, remarked, adding he

has no plans to expand his 100-cow operation in Evergreen Township.

Severance agreed prices will probably level off in February and then begin to fall.

"I'd like to wait and see what it's (price) going to do over the next year," he added. "I don't think it's going to go down as low as it was. I'm hoping it will stay around \$14."

Cass City area dairy farmer Jim Tuckey indicated higher prices have helped offset a drop in production caused by poor feed quality, but probably won't translate into a higher profit margin overall.

### WON'T EXPAND

"We won't expand any," Tuckey, who is currently milking about 30 cows, commented. He pointed out that the cost of a good dairy cow also has risen sharply, from \$800 4 years ago to \$1,400 now.

"They're saying it (milk price) might go to \$16, but they don't think it's going to stay," he said. "You're going to have fresh cows coming in in the spring, and that's going to increase production."

Another Cass City area dairy farmer, Doug Laurie, also said he feels current prices will be short-lived, though welcome.

"It's a basic reaction to a short market right now. I dare say you'll see some correction in the next 6 or 12

months," he said.

Laurie, who is milking 135 cows currently, predicted prices will still be better than before even after they fall.

He also pointed out that the people who are left in the dairy industry today are operating at full capacity, meaning a temporary boom in prices isn't going to be enough to finance any major expansion.

### MAJOR INVESTMENT

"Our facilities are maxed out. It would take a major investment to do that," he said.

"We're kind of watching the economic indicators and seeing what the prices are going to do."

That's good advice, according to Frahm.

"I'd recommend spending it (additional income) paying down on existing debt because I don't believe we're going to stay at this level," he said.

Dairy farmers will likely end with the same annual average price this year that they received last year," the agent continued. "I think what they're going to do this year is have their money early in the year instead of later in the year."

Just the same, the upsurge in milk prices has made being in the dairy business especially rewarding in recent months.

"It sure helps," Severance remarked.

"It makes getting up in the morning worthwhile," Laurie agreed.

## Blanchard discusses issues facing Michigan residents

A U.S. "peace dividend" as a result of relaxed tensions in Eastern Europe will ease state budget pressures over the decade, Governor Blanchard predicts. The governor said the state is in better shape to deal with budget problems than it was when he took office 7 years ago, and is optimistic regarding the state's economy over the next decade.

After a period in which federal cutbacks were as much a source of problems facing the state budget as increased prison spending, Blanchard said he expects more U.S. aid for education, health and the environment. "I sincerely believe at some point there will be a peace dividend in terms of a renewed federal investment in domestic affairs. It won't happen right away, but I think we will have some new help from the federal government in dealing with things like health, education and the environment," Blanchard said. And, he said he is more optimistic about those prospects than he was just 4 or 5 months ago.

Federal defense officials have proposed reducing Pentagon spending in the wake of improved relations between NATO countries and Eastern European countries which are moving to market economies and permitting other political parties to compete for power with the Communist Party.

On his unannounced decision on whether to seek a third term as governor, Blanchard said it will not be "automatic. It's a lot to ask the people and of yourself. It shouldn't be done automatically because you think you've done a good job and it shouldn't be made because the possible opponent is a bad guy."

The Republican candidate, will almost certainly be Senate Majority Leader John Engler of Mt. Pleasant. The governor resisted discussing Engler directly or differences between the 2, saying that "may" only become relevant later next year.

"I really don't even know what the Senate Republican Leader's philosophy is. The most important thing for me to do is try to be a good governor for all the people of Michigan and not worry about one or 2 state Senators."

The reason he would seek another term, he said, is "we've got a lot to do. We have so many innovations and the process of implementing them is going to take a lot of my energy."

As to whether his administration is getting stale after 7 years in power, he said, "The key is to look ahead and meet the challenges of the future and the key is whether a person or administration has the ideas and energy for the future, not

how long they've been in office.

Although most forecasts are for a slowdown in the economy in 1990 and lagging automobile sales are already a concern, Blanchard is optimistic about the ability of the state to deal with employment shocks and for improvements beginning in 1991. "I'm optimistic overall in the future because 1991 will be better than 1990," the governor said.

He noted the state's overall job picture continued to improve after General Motors closed several auto plants 3 years ago, and of the current slowing of sales, he said, "I'm worried, but it is important to point out that the economy is more balanced," adding, "We are in a stronger position to deal with challenges than we were at the start of the decade."

The governor said education will continue to be the top priority in the new budget with appropriations increased, and he will not seek revenue increases despite the rising costs of prisons and possible welfare costs from a slowdown. "We have to live within our means. I think it's just making the tough choices. No government, no institution can do all the things it wants," he said.

Blanchard said the prison expansion program "has pretty well reached the limit for what we need." Construction completed or in final stages will have added 19,000 beds to the system since 1983, but the latest Department of Corrections estimates indicate the state will have almost 16,000 more prisoners than space available by the end of 1992.

His proposal to provide cost-sharing incentives for counties to expand jail capacity is one answer, he said. That proposal was first announced almost a year ago with further details provided during the summer, but has not progressed in the Legislature.

Blanchard said he will "insist" that money for education and social services be spent in more effective ways, saying legislators who criticize him just want to increase money in both programs without making fundamental changes. "More money for the status quo is not the answer and that puts me at odds with some people in my party and some people in the other party," he said.

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
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## Caution urged with scholarship searches

# Jury should see DeLisle tapes

There's no denying that our judicial system isn't perfect. Many times criminals are set free on minor infractions that are incorporated into the legal process to help protect the rights of the innocent.

Unfortunately, there undoubtedly are innocent people who have served unjustified jail time.

Which brings us to the case of 29-year-old Lincoln Park resident Lawrence DeLisle.

DeLisle, accused of intentionally driving his 1977 Ford station wagon into the Detroit river and killing his 4 children, confessed to the murders in August but now claims police brainwashed him into confessing to the 4 counts of first degree murder.

DeLisle was interrogated by police for 9 hours without any legal council.

We asked your neighbor, Glenda Mester, if she had an opinion on DeLisle's case.

"He's guilty", claims the Gagetown resident. "There's no way you would admit to killing your kids if you didn't do it, no matter how long you were questioned."

DeLisle's 9 hours of statements to police were videotaped, but sealed. A ruling by Michigan's Supreme Court, however, could release those statements soon.

"I think the jury should see the tapes to help them make a better judgement," says the 33-year-old mother of 2, who is employed at Parkway party store in Cass City.

Mester's 2 children are Shane and Ryan Ross, 15 and 12 years old, respectively.



Consequently, sharp-shooter Mike Kady attempted only 4 shots from behind the 3-point arc and was held to just 5 points, 11

## 23 winter festivals await anglers

More than 10,000 inland lakes and 23 festivals will lure adventurous anglers outdoors this winter, AAA Michigan reports.

But winter enthusiasts should be aware that Michigan records an average of 7 ice-related deaths annually, so precautions are advised when fishing, skating or walking on ice. Remember:

Ice is strongest when it's hard and blue.

Be extra cautious near gray, dark or porous spots.

Ice deteriorates first around stream mouths, lake inlets and outlets, shorelines and docks.


Continually test ice with a steel spud or heavy bar.

Rescue gear, including a ladder and at least 50 feet of rope or hose, should be handy.

If you do fall through the ice, turn on your back, kick and work your way out. Roll away in the direction that you walked in on until you can safely stand. Move quickly to shelter and warmth.

To get in a wintry mood, travelers may visit any of the 23 events listed in the ice fishing festival guide. Fishing contests, parades, fireworks, snowmobile races, ice sculptures and "polar bear" plunges are among the highlights.

Winter fishing novices need a spud for testing ice thickness and making holes; a sled to haul equipment; skimmer to keep the hole clear; a pail; hook and line. A portable shelter and heater also are considered necessary by many experienced anglers.

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

# New league a bummer for Cass City

Barring a last minute change of heart by boards of education of schools in the Thumb C League, Cass City and Lakers will be odd men out in the realignment of schools in that league and the Thumb B Association.

A meeting of representatives of the 6-team C league voted to accept the applications of Bad Axe, Marlette and Deckerville and refuse entrance to Lakers and Cass City.

Although no official rea-

sons for the decisions have been announced, the athletic programs of the 2 schools refused entrance have been consistently stronger in the last decade than those of the schools accepted.

The new alignment means that the C league will have 9 schools, an odd number for scheduling purposes, and the B league will have 6 teams.

Much more difficult for athletic directors will be scheduling in the 6-team

league. A concentrated effort to bring more teams into the league will be made by the remaining Thumb B Association schools. Since only schools of comparable size would probably consider joining, any new teams would have to come from the area's urban areas.

If that proves to be the case, Cass City will play in the league where all but one of the schools (Lakers) will be larger and in which it is located on the outer edge of

the conference boundaries. The district is located in the heart of the Thumb C territory and its territory touches 6 Thumb Class C schools.

Speaking of the scheduling difficulties with a 6-team league, Cass City Athletic Director Don Schelke said that perhaps playing the same conference teams more than once in football and more than twice in basketball might be necessary.

The obvious fault with

that system is that either the extra games would not count in the league or the championships could be decided on teams that happen to schedule the less talented teams with the titles at stake.

Although all the schools in the new C alignment are in the same class, Cass City would have been the largest in terms of enrollment. However, judging by the number of persons in the grades now, Bad Axe is projected to grow rapidly.

The new league arrangement will take effect for the 1991-92 school year.

Teams in the new Thumb

C are: Mayville, Harbor Beach, Bad Axe, Marlette, Sandusky, Deckerville, USA, Uby and Reese.

Teams left in the Thumb B are: Cass City, Lakers, Caro, North Branch, Millington and Vassar.

When the Cass City Red Hawks travel to Caro Friday there's no chance that the team will be able to sneak up on the Tigers. Not after the tremendous upset victory posted last Friday over the visiting Lakers, 50-43.

It was hard to tell who was more surprised that the winless Hawks could top the powerful Lakers, Cass City fans or Laker fans.

Early in the game it appeared like the same old story. Cass City couldn't find the basket and the Lakers dominated the offensive boards to charge into a 12-6 lead at the end of the first period, as Reggie Ignash netted 3 field goals.

Defense is the key to any success we have, Nurnberger feels. Our style of defense can be frustrating to play against.



## HEALTH TIPS Every alcoholic drink diminishes driving ability

By now, it should be common knowledge that drinking alcoholic beverages and driving a motor vehicle pose a serious danger to the health and safety of everyone involved. Yet, nearly one-half of the nation's traffic fatalities can be blamed on the abuse of alcohol. I don't call alcohol-related crashes "accidents." I think of them as avoidable collisions, because, in every case, at least one driver failed to make the sensible and right choice of not driving while impaired by drugs.

That's right, by drugs. Alcohol is a drug, and, like any other drug, it must be used with caution. The effects of alcohol on driving ability have been well documented. Indeed, since the invention of the automobile, it has been recognized that alcoholic beverages impair the skills and dull the senses that safe driving demands. Still, drunken driving has become one of this country's most costly public health problems. What is the price we pay for this terrible and totally unnecessary problem?

First, alcohol impaired driving crashes are the leading cause of death for young people. We know from our research that young drivers are more likely to be involved in a car accident by the sheer fact of their inexperience behind the wheel. Alcohol only compounds

the risks of crashing for young drivers.

Of course, alcohol-related crashes are not restricted to the young. All of us are victimized. If we haven't been in an alcohol-related crash ourselves, we know someone who has. Sadly, current statistics indicate that 2 out of every 3 Americans will be involved in an alcohol-related crash sometime in their lifetime.

We pay a high cost for these crashes in terms of economic loss and human suffering. All of us share the economic costs — lost productivity in the workplace, property damage, insurance and medical-care costs and legal expenses. But what is the price of the emotional burden that must be borne by families whose lives have been shattered by an alcohol-related crash? If you ask, they will tell you that the price is beyond measure.

It is difficult to state with precision the amount of alcohol or the number of drinks that will make you an unsafe driver. Weight, sex, the amount of food in your stomach, the time you spent drinking — all of these factors influence your reaction to alcohol. If you drink on an empty stomach, for instance, you will feel the effects of alcohol sooner and more intensely than you would after eating a meal.

We do know that driving ability is diminished with

each drink you take. In driver performance tests, even those drivers with low levels of alcohol in their systems showed diminished driving ability. Alcohol had impaired their accuracy of steering, braking, speed control, lane tracking, gear changing and judgments of speed and distance. Even the smallest amount of alcohol in the system, as little as one drink, can impair a driver's ability to respond to emergency situations.

So, make the right choice when it comes to drinking and driving. Stay healthy and set a good example for others by always choosing to drive sober. Because alcohol impairs judgment, it is possible that sometime, perhaps in the near future, someone you know will be incapable of making the right choice. That person needs your help. Stop him (or her) before he gets behind the wheel and hurts himself or others. Unlike many other health concerns, the drinking and driving problem is preventable. It's time we made up our minds that the price it exacts is far too high.



## 7 enter pleas

# Sentence 6 in Tuscola Circuit Court

Seven persons entered pleas and another 6 were sentenced during a busy session Friday in Tuscola County Circuit Court.

Rebecca S. Fackler, 21, of Mayville, pleaded guilty to a charge of felonious assault. Sentencing is to be scheduled. Bond was continued at \$2,000.

According to court records, Fackler assaulted Shirley Burns with a knife Aug. 10 in Watertown Township.

Deford area resident Alec Mester, 5348 Shabbona Rd., entered a plea of innocent during his arraignment on a charge of Criminal Sexual Conduct, second degree.

The case was scheduled for a pre-trial Friday.

Mester, 65, is charged with engaging in sexual contact with a person under the age of 13 years Nov. 11 in Novesta Township, records state.

Melloyne D. Staffen, 34, of Vassar, pleaded nolo contendere (no contest) to a charge of operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor, third offense, Sept. 1 in Akron Township.


Bond for each of the in-
