First Thumb laprascopic surgery performed at Hills and Dales

Sharon Taylor might have to put up with a funny look and a giggle or 2 when she tells her friends that a surgeon removed her gall bladder through her belly button and then patched the wound with a band aid.

But the Mayville area housewife will have the last laugh when it comes to comparing recovery time and scars with other gall bladder patients.

Taylor found herself at the center of attention at Hills and Dales General Hospital, Cass City, after undergoing the surgery Friday morning. Although gall bladder sur-

gery is common among adults, Taylor is the first person to undergo a Laprascopic Cholecystectomy in the Thumb area.

Medical terms aside, the new procedure still results in removal of the gall bladder, but allows for a much quicker recovery as well as less post-operative pain and less risk of infection.

Taylor, who was discharged from the hospital Saturday, is proof.

"It really isn't that uncomfortable; it's not that bad," she remarked. "It feels kind of like having the stomach

"With this new technique, most patients are back to work in a week," Cass City surgeon Dr. Hoon K. Jeung, who performed the operation, said.

Dr. Jeung pointed out that while a conventional cholecystectomy requires a hospital stay of up to 5 days and 4 to 6 weeks recovery at home, the new procedure allows the patient to leave the hospital after a day or 2, followed by a recovery period of about a week.

DIFFERENCE

The difference lies in specialized instruments and techniques.

In a conventional cholecystectomy, a surgeon removes the gall bladder after making a 6 to 10-inch incision, which requires cutting and suturing a number of

layers of tissue. In contrast, the laprascopic cholecystectomy requires only 4 small puncture

"There's no cutting of muscle or skin. There's less chance of complications, less chance for infection," Dr. Jeung remarked.

That means less post-operative pain. The patient is able to walk around after surgery and can practice deep breathing exercises (encouraged for patients who undergo general anesthesia) with less discomfort, he said.

Dr. Jeung underwent 3 days of training in Kansas fats. City and Chicago to learn how to perform the new procedure.

He explained the operation relies on the use of a video camera which allows the surgical team to see inside the patient and perform the procedure while watching a monitor.

The camera is connected to a small, lighted tube that is inserted in a small (onecentimeter) incision in the

navel. Another tube placed into the incision forces CO2 into the abdomen, causing it to expand, which allows the surgeon to better see inside. Specialized instruments, inserted into the abdomen through 3 other small punctures, are then used to remove the gall bladder from its location under the liver.

STORAGE

The gall bladder is a hollow, pear-shaped organ that functions as a storage space for bile, a bitter, greenish fluid secreted by the liver that aids in the digestion of

The next step is to drain the bile from the gall bladder, causing the organ to shrink enough to be removed through the small incision in the navel, Dr. Jeung continued. He added that any large gall stones are crushed before the gall bladder is removed from the body.

The surgeon pointed out that the procedure relies heavily on teamwork. He lauded the efforts of his assistant, Dr. Richard Hall, and other members of the

surgical team. "It does take many hands because of all the equipment involved," O.R. Supervisor Phyllis Little, R.N., agreed, adding, "It takes a steady hand to operate the camera.

EXCITING

Little and 3 other surgical nurses who took part in the operation, Gale Nicol, Marilynn Carpenter and Cindy Bader, indicated it was exciting to participate in the new procedure.

They also conceded it will take some time to get used to operating while watching a video monitor.

While Friday's operation took 3 hours to complete, Little said that with experience, the procedure can be done in 30 to 45 minutes. Dr. Jeung indicated he's

very pleased with Friday's surgery, particularly because it's an example of state-of-the-art medicine being made available lo-Please turn to back page.





Janssen hooked on old buildings, "village" planned

George Janssen gets inspiration from a dream once envisioned by a famous engineer, Henry Ford.

The Owendale resident doesn't aspire to re-pioneer the assembly line or produce his own cars. In Janssen's sights is a landmark; sort of a Greenfield Village in the country.

'We want to start an historical village here over the next 10 years," he said, referring to himself, his wife, Audene, and their son, 8year-old Georgie. The family already lives in a notable building; an old depot on 12 acres behind Janssen's Party Store, 9 miles north of Cass City on Elkton Road.

Janssen's latest acquisition is a one-room schoolhouse located, until recently, behind Owendale-Gagetown High School.

Built around 1910 or 1915. he estimated, Brookfield Township School number 5 probably was used to teach grades first through eighth. In 1959, Owen-Gage school district had the structure moved from its original site, one and a half miles east of Bach, and utilized it as a band room until 1978. Since then, Janssen said it's served as a storage facility.

Although Owen-Gage schools didn't charge him for the building, it wasn't exactly free. Talaski Building Movers of Bad Axe, Detroit Edison, Thumb Electric and the sheriff's department all were involved on moving day, Aug.

The building is about 27

feet high, Janssen said. him of a painting which road Co. around 1963 and Technicians from Detroit Edison and Thumb Electric raised or lowered power tended as a child. lines and stoplights out of

Law enforcement officials had to block off Sebewaing Road and reroute traffic to accommodate the schoolhouse, 34 feet by 36 feet, which took up the entire thoroughfare. Because of its size, the movers transported it at speeds of 5 to 15 miles per hour. It took an hour and a half to haul it about 4 and a

Once it arrived at Janssen's, Frank and Todd Talaski and their crew needed several hours to tow the structure along a doubletrack dirt road and set it in its final resting place, 100 feet behind the family's home.

"It cost quite a bit to move it down here," Janssen noted. He figured it will total about \$5,000 to relocate the building and renovate it.

Fortunately, rebuilding the structure isn't necessary. "The lumber is just like the day it was made. It's sturdy," he remarked. "It's going to be all put back in its original condition," he added, except for one detail. "It's got a red, white and blue door on it now and it looks terrible."

Besides replacing the door with an antique and painting the outside walls a light gray instead of red, Janssen wants to keep the structure's exterior and interior as it was 65 to 80 years ago. The school even came equipped with the original furnishings, an oak teacher's desk and 7 double students' desks. Janssen said they were stored in the attic and are in good condition.

Once the schoolhouse is completely cleaned up and restored, he plans to add one final touch to the decor: George Washington's pic-

At an auction some time ago, Janssen purchased an old print of Washington which came from a similar school in Unionville. He said the picture reminded hung in the one-room school in Sterling Heights he at-

Preserving the school gives him a sense of pride, he said. "A lot of well-educated people today started in that school building."

This building is the third such relic Janssen has acquired, and he plans to obtain at least 20 more. A love of antiques and purchasing a remodeled laundromat got him interested in eternalizing area history.

MANY BUSINESS **INTERESTS**

From 1967 to 1974 Janssen was a Cass City resident and owned the Allen Health Care building on Koepfgen Road. At that time it was Janssen's M-81 Motel, he said. When the motel business lost its charm, he bought the former Cass City Laundry, moved in 1959 by its original owner to the southeast corner of Rescue and Elkton roads.

About 14 years ago he started retailing antiques out of this Owendale area location, which he renamed Trash and Treasures. Five years later Janssen got into auctioning antiques and conducted 134 consecutive sales in about 3 years.

The building underwent another change when available antique items ran thin. Janssen's Party Store, home of the buffalo burger, is his current venture.

Although he had owned an historical structure for many years, Janssen said he didn't develop a real interest in such buildings until he fell in love with the old Owendale Depot.

Until the depot went up for sale he and his wife of about 10 years, Audene, were planning to build a log cabin on their 12-acre, L-shaped property behind the store.

P. O. and N. Railroad Co. built the depot in 1913 on a site across from Owen-Gage High School, and rebuilt in 1927 after it was destroyed by fire. Sebewaing resident Grace Esch bought it from Grand Trunk Western Railkept it for 25 years.

When he purchased it in 1988, Janssen had the structure moved to an area about 300 feet behind his store. By erecting walls and more plumbing he created 2 bathrooms, 2 bedrooms, a living room and kitchen and ended up with his dream house.

CREATING HIS KINGDOM

Buying and renovating the depot gave Janssen the idea to create an entire village made up of preserved historic buildings from the Thumb area. "I just love them old buildings (and) a lot of them are getting destroyed," he commented.

But Janssen is somewhat fussy and won't accept just any old edifice.

"I'm looking for more buildings that have some character to them." Other criteria include buildings fairly close to his location and in good enough shape to move, he added. Moving an establishment over long distances is costly and can damage the structure.

At this time he is looking for an old mill, or a barn he can convert into a mill and set up near the natural pond on his property. Janssen also is in the market for a dry goods store, a wooden country church, and a 2-story gingerbread-style house.

In 10 years or so, Janssen hopes to have at least 20 buildings scattered around his property. He plans to build another pond for fishing, set up picnic grounds and import several fallow deer and buffalo.

A brother in Kalkaska has raised buffalo for about 30 years, he said. The brother sells meat to Janssen, who retails it in his store. A couple of live buffalo will live on Janssen's acreage when he establishes a strong field for them, he said.

One other feature of Janssen's kingdom may be a miniature, gas-powered replica train which will transport visitors throughout the village, he noted.





Health organizations may of 50 should be screened annually for breast cancer.

> This means that starting at age 50, women should have both a breast examination by a physician and a mammogram every year.

Currently, only an estimated 5 percent to 15 percent of these women are getting the mammogram, which is the best method for detecting breast cancer in its earliest stages - before the cancer has spread and often before the tumor can be felt. The mammogram is an Xray examination of the breasts.

Health professionals say here are several reaso why women in this higher risk group may fail to get mammograms but the benefits of a properly performed mammogram certainly outweigh the risks. Detecting the cancer at an early stage means a higher chance of survival and perhaps less drastic surgery.

Women are encouraged to ask questions about mammography screening. It is recommended that you ask your physician for the name and location of a mammography center that practices good mammography techniques, that is, utilizing equipment specifically designed for this examination and X-ray technologists and radiologists specially trained and experienced in

mammography.
Other guidelines are to compare costs, be informed and be prepared. The cost can vary from approximately \$50 to \$100, but keep in mind that the quality of the examination should be primary concern. Most insurers do not cover mammography for screening, but do cover it for diagnosis, once an abnormality is suspected.

To be informed and prepared is to know where to go and what to expect when scheduling a mammogrgam, and if there are any special instructions to follow before going for the examination.

A look at what goes on during a mammography examination may be helpful. For example, health professionals indicate you may experience minor discomfort or pain during the few seconds that the breast is compressed for the X-ray exposure, however proper compression is essential to achieve a high quality mammogram with the lowest radiation dose possible.
