# Local races spark election interest

County clerks in the upper Thumb say they're looking for a "decent" voter turnout in the Nov. 6 General Election, although better than average turnouts can be expected in areas hosting local races.

"I don't think we're really going to have a great (turnout), but I think it will average 30, 35 percent," Tuscola County Clerk Erma Brown

some hotly contested statelevel battles, including that for the office of governor, may draw more voters out this year, Brown said. At the same time, however, all the negative campaigning may prove to be a detriment, she added.





Walbro Corporation and Magneti Marelli S.p.A., Milan, Italy, have signed a letter of intent to form a joint venture in France to develop, manufacture and market automotive fuel system components to aucustomers tomotive throughout Europe.

The joint venture's activities will focus on "tank storage systems" for use in electronic fuel injection systems. Tank storage systems include fuel pumps, fuel modules, fuel level sensors and other fuel tank-related components and subassemblies.

Magneti Marelli, 1989 sales equivalent to \$3.5 billion is an international manufacturing group that designs and manufactures high technology components and systems for the automotive market. Magneti Marelli's activities focus on engine control systems. Major products include fuel injection components (multi-point and single-point) and associated electronic controls

Walbro Corporation, 1989 sales of \$135 million, is a multinational manufacturer of fuel system components. Walbro's major automotive products include fuel pumps, fuel modules other tank-related and components. Walbro common stock is traded on the NASDAQ National Market System under the symbol WALB.

Following final agree-ment, Magneti Marelli will own 51 percent of the joint venture, with Walbro holding a 49 percent interest. Sales are expected to reach approximately \$150 million (U.S.) within the next 5 years. It is expected that approximately 350 people will be employed by the joint venture.

The venture will initially combine the technologies of both companies and will in the future develop new, ad-

Another bonus is that the companies are already vendors with many of the auto companies in Europe, including Fiat, Jaguar, Peugeot, Renault and Ford. It could very well be that the business in Europe would exceed what is done here, Althaver observed.

Walbro is world-wide and Althaver commented on the company business in other areas. He said that currently a breakthough in the Far Eastern market depends on a product development now nearing completion. Without it we cannot sell to the Japanese, Althaver pointed out. However, our company in Japan is making a part for us and is making money for the corporation without any sales there.

Walbro has a facility in Korea which is promising and is necessary to have an entry into the car manufacturing business there.

Althaver said that SEM of Cass City, a joint venture, recently was awarded a contract that will begin in 1991. It's a significant contract because of its size and also because it is the first contract to supply a part for a 4-cycle, instead of 2-cycle, engine for the company.

#### **INEVITABLE SWITCH**

Althaver was less enthusiastic about the near-term outlook for Orbital engines, the 2-cycle engine for which Walbro is engineering the fuel injection system.

The engine still has all the potential that we thought it had when we started working with it, Althaver said. Breaking into the market has been difficult because of the major changes necessary and the risk that a new-type engine might cause unforeseen problems.

Long term, I feel that Orbital will succeed. As the price of fuel escalates, the government demands better mileage and the environmental regulations stiffen, the demand for the more efficient 2-cycle engine will be irresistible, he concluded.

Walbro Corporation chairman, president and chief executive officer L.E. Althaver has announced a significant restructuring of the company's operations. "The major thrusts of the

restructuring include a streamlining of corporate staff and a shifting of all operating responsibility to Walbro's small engine and automotive groups, in order to provide a more effective approach toward the company's 2 major markets," the Walbro Chief Executive said in announcing the restructuring.

Under the restructuring, Walbro's Small Engine Division will become a separate corporation, owned by Walbro Corporation.

'The establishment of Walbro's small engine operations as a separate corporation will provide a total separation from Walbro's automotive operations, ensuring its complete dedication to the small engine industry," Althaver said.

The new small engine corporation will be headed by Robert H. Walpole, who will hold the title of President and Chief Operating Officer. Prior to this appointment, Walpole served as Walbro Corporation's Executive Vice President.





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

On cable television last week, "The Court Martial of Jackie Robinson" revived a 45-year-old memory for me. And that memory helps answer these questions asked by a Plymouth reader:

"Why are blacks allowed to have their own black organizations but every white organization is pressured to take in blacks? Why do almost all professions have black organizations for, for example, black doctors, black lawyers, black journalists, and so on?"

The made-for TV movie concerned a racial incident sparked when Robinson was an Army lieutenant at Camp Swift, near Austin, Texas, during World War II. This was after Robinson was a star athlete at UCLA and before he became the first black to play major league baseball. Robinson was court-martialed --- and found innocent --- in connection with aggressively

fane order to move to the

back of an Army bus.

I was also stationed at Camp Swift around that time, and rode the same Army buses. My first night at the Austin bus station, I was the second soldier from the bus door when the civilian driver said, "Only one seat left." Some general had decided crowded buses were

unmilitary, so no standing was allowed. I thought I had to wait for the next bus. But the driver motioned me to go ahead of the man in front of me. "Get aboard,

Mac; this guy can wait." The other soldier shrugged and stepped aside. I was 18, from up north, and terribly naive. I had to ask the driver why he brushed back the first soldier.

"Because the empty seat isn't in the back of the bus," he answered. "Hell, let the N-walk."

I wish I could report that I said vile things to that red-

neck driver and subsequently refused to serve in a racist army. But I didn't. More puzzled than righteous, I merely stepped back off the bus, which accomplished nothing; another white man took my place.

That was in 1945. Flash forward to 1990, last week, on my home phone around midnight. A reader called to complain about something that happened to her daughter. She quickly confided she had absolutely no use for black people, and when I told her I didn't care to listen

to racist trash, she accused me of taking bribes from blacks. I hung up. A week earlier, in one of Detroit's nicest restaurants,

our small, pale party was joined by a successful white Detroit businessman I'd never met before. He congratulated me on something critical I'd written about Mayor Coleman Young, and quickly began snarling antiblack slurs. I told him he had no right to assume I

racist language, and asked him to shut up or leave. He left.

Naturally, I'm glad my reaction to racists is more pointed today than in Austin in 1945. But I'm dismayed that the reaction is still required. When I was 18, and for many years after, I was sure that — given a normal life span — I'd live to see the day when white racism would be a very minor problem in the United States. Now I know I won't.

It would be marvelous if black organizations, such as those cited by the Plymouth reader, were no longer necessary. But they were created long ago in response to a white power structure that automatically excluded blacks. That structure still

exists, and still excludes. except for enough tokens to keep weak antidiscrimination laws from embarrassing the good-old-boys network

- the network that was so delighted this week when

President George Bush flipped his hips at a civil rights bill that might have helped a few minorities escape discrimination in the workplace.

Don't be fooled by old cities like Detroit, where most government positions are held by blacks. The money is still mostly white, and it's money that determines who drives the bus.

I don't blame black doctors, lawyers, journalists, etc., for getting together to try to improve the black situation. They are merely reflecting the system that beats them back and makes nonwhite organizations necessary. The day must come when they won't be neces-

sary. Forty-five years after Jackie Robinson and I rode buses between Austin and Camp Swift, it's hard to believe that day is still so far away. But it is, and a lot of white people should be ashamed.







**BPW 'Women of Year'** 

The one vegetable that I simply can't stomach is parsnips. As a kid it was family policy to eat a little of what was on the plate, regardless. It was the irresistible force (my mother) against the immovable object (me). There were no winners in this battle.

All of this came floating back when a Michigan Department of Agriculture release about a prize winning menu in a "Best of Michigan Chefs Competition" came floating past my desk.

There were some mouth watering dishes. Sour cream and whitefish caviar, Great Lakes pickerel baked with walnuts and char-grilled roma tomato-basil sauce with grilled sweet corn salsa and a cornucopia of late summer peppered fruits.

ning meal called for parsnip pancakes with Northern Spy apples. How could he do it to

pancakes, one of my favorite dishes? Pancakes are best with nothing on them but butter and 100 percent pure maple syrup. They are okay with blueberries, apples, peaches and what have you. Now he takes this won-

derful dish and utterly ruins it by adding parsnips. The thought turns my stomach. It's not likely that I'll be returning to Charley's Crab any time soon, but if I do it's certain that pancakes will not be a choice and any other dish will be carefully examined before being ordered.

It would be a catastrophe if I ordered something with parsnips in it and I ate it and never knew the difference. Just in case you are crazy enough to want to eat something like this, here is the recipe:

3/4 pound parsnips, peeled and coarsely grated. 1/2 Northern Spy apple, peeled and coarsely grated. 1/4 cup onion, finely diced.

1/4 cup flour, 2 eggs, 1/4 teaspoon salt. One tablespoon olive oil

for cooking. 1/2 cup sour cream, 4 tablespoons whitefish cav-

iar. One tablespoon fresh chives, snipped.

One tablespoon fresh thyme, finely chopped (or one teaspoon dried).

Combine parsnips, onion, apple, thyme and flour, toss gently. Lightly beat eggs and fold into mixture. Add salt and pepper, toss gently.

In non-stick fry pan, heat butter and olive oil. Form pancakes into silver dollar size by using approximately one ounce of mixture. Cook until golden brown, 2 to 3 minutes on each side.

Place on platter and garnish each pancake with dollop of sour cream and whitefish caviar. Serves 4 to 6.







## Your neighbor says **Scariest monster** makes you mad

sought for the abduction and rape of a Vassar woman on a rural road near Cass City. We asked your neighbor, Deb Elliou, if she has taken any special precautions since the incident - the 4th in the area over seven months. "It makes you feel a

little mad and scared," says Elliott, a lifelong Cass City resident. 'But I haven't really

changed any of my habits (because of it)."

Elliott, who is finishing up Lamaze classes, says the rape is the main topic of conversation in her classes, which meet in Lapeer.

"You feel bad it happened in our town, says the 39-year-old, adding, "They'll catch him eventually."

The 1968 graduate of Cass City High School feels although rapes, drugs and the like are on the increase in the area, they're not nearly as bad as crime in the city.

"My husband works in Detroit. I know (things are much worse in the city)."

Elliott, a 22-year-employee of General Cable, where she is president of the United Steel Workers of America union #6222, doesn't think the rapist will strike in Cass City again. "Let's hope not."



Two Tuscola County men-one convicted of rape and another on manslaughter and drug-related charges-received hefty prison terms Friday in Tuscola County Circuit Court. Allen L. Fergason of Caro, who was charged with raping, abducting and again raping a woman early this year in Caro and Watertown Township, was sentenced to 30 years to 60 years in prison for his Aug. 28 plea of no contest to one count of first degree Criminal Sexual Conduct.

The plea was part of a plea bargain agreement in which another count of first degree Criminal Sexual Conduct and charges of kidnapping and unlawfully driving away an automobile were dropped.

Investigators said Fergason, 27, sexually assaulted the woman at her place of employment in Caro Jan. 25, then abducted her, drove to the southern part of the county and again assaulted her in her own vehicle. Also Friday, John D.

Fortson Jr., Mayville, received 4 prison sentences, including a 10- to 15-year term for voluntary manslaughter in connection with the fatal shooting of a Cass City man.

Fortson, 31, was also ordered to serve a 2-year term for a felony firearm violation. Both convictions, handed down by a jury Sept. 21, resulted from a trial involving the murder of John A. Bulla of Cass City Jan. 6 in Mayville.

In a separate case, Fortson was sentenced to prison terms of 5 years to 20 for each of 2 drug-related convictions returned by a jury Aug. 23.

noted the village will also be responsible for any charge incurred in marketing the materials Overall, the village may see a small profit from the

sales, but it isn't expected to be significant. Campbell cited a negative market for news print, but said there is a steady market for glass, plastic and metal.

### EXTRA PROGRAMS

In addition to residential curbside recycling, the Waste Management official pointed out that a second phase of the program will establish additional recycling programs, at no charge to the village, that will collect large volumes of recyclables such as corrugated cardboard and office paper from large commercial and industrial accounts.

He explained that this phase is made possible by Waste Management's presence in Cass City and the number of commercial accounts currently being serviced by the company. Campbell emphasized that Waste Management will sponsor an intense commu-

nity education/public relations campaign throughout the contract period. The effort will include a

pre-kickoff education and information campaign, including organization of volunteer block networks and a Citizens Technical Advisory Committee; sponsorship of various multimedia events, and an extensive, well-publicized multimedia kick-off campaign.

Prior to unanimously approving the proposal, council members discussed several aspects of the program, including cost.

The council indicated it's satisfied with Waste Management's bid, particularly considering the service includes recycling.

### **RISING RATES**

Officials indicated they believe area residents will see an increase in waste service rates next year regardless of the steady i landfill rates over several months, a ing landfill space.

Less than 2 years ago, Cass City residents were paying \$3.50 per household per month for the service, less than half the current rate of

\$7.50. Council members also indicated they're excited about taking a lead in doing something to help contain long-term increasing disposal costs and conserve land filling space.

They also expressed confi-Waste dence in Management's Recycle America program, which, at the end of 1989, provided recycling services to more

than 1.2 million households through 142 municipal contracts throughout North America.

Campbell noted Cass City will be the first upper Thumb community to take part in curbside recycling. The nearest community that has a similar program is the village of Almont, which has a population of 586.

"I think it's great, and I think it's a big step in this part of the state," Trustee Nat Tuttle, chairman of the council's Public Services Committee, remarked.

In a related matter, village officials said no decision has been made yet as to what will happen with Cass City's volunteer recycling program through Blue Water Recycling of Port Huron. In a report to the council Monday, Judi Reinhold, project chairman, indicated the local effort has been successful so far.

"I would say the response has been good. There's quite a bit of interest," she told council members. "We're working on our third trailer already.
