11 hours of surgery saves Sonny Quinn

expert emergency care by his son, Jerry, the Cass City Mercy Ambulance personnel and the Elkland Township Fire Department may have either saved the life of Owen "Sonny" Quinn, 6216 Hadley Road, Cass City, or kept a serious, debilitating injury from becoming worse than it is.

Quinn had climbed a tree Sunday, Nov. 18, in a woods near his home to locate the best place to build a deer blind, when he fell.

He suffered a broken back, which later required 11 hours of surgery at the University of Michigan Hospital, where he was to have been placed in a body cast Tuesday, Nov. 27.

Modern medicine, quick, be accepted into the rehabilitation center in Ann Arbor, his wife, Rosie, explained, and will be there for at least 2 months.

Mrs. Quinn was extremely grateful to everyone connected with the rescue of her husband. They just did a super, super job, she asserted time and again.

This is how the rescue was conducted. After the accident, that happened about 7:30 a.m., Jerry Quinn left his father on the ground and went for help. He flagged down a passing car and went to a near-by home, from where he called for assistance.

Poachers gut-shoot deer

Poachers are creating a problem for land owners in the deer-rich area west of M-53 and about a quarter mile north of M-81. They have property owners in the area up in arms and they have been especially troublesome to Tom Ponder, who owns a home and a few acres in the area.


Ponder and his neighboring land owners, Ed Hunsinger of Imlay City and the 10-Point Hunting Club, have been finding doe-deer gut shot and left in the woods to die for the past 2 years.

This year they say about a dozen in a 250-acre area have been found rotting in the woods. Last year there were probably as many, according to Hunsinger and

That's bad enough, but what makes Ponder even more incensed is that when unauthorized hunters are discovered in the area they give his name and address.

That had all his neighbors believing that he was poaching and killing deer, Ponder said. Hunsinger came to my house and when he saw me he knew it wasn't me that was causing the problem, Ponder stressed.

Ponder was so concerned that he came to the Chronicle office and wanted to buy an ad with his picture in it to show that he wasn't the one that was indiscriminately slaughtering deer.

Reputation growing state-wide

Record crowds at Bach Festival

The 12th annual Village Bach Festival more than lived up to its reputation for excellent concerts presented by seasoned musicians.

The popularity of the 4-day series is continuing to grow and spread well beyond the Thumb, according to festival officials, who report attendance during this year's festival, held Nov. 20, 23, 24 and 25, was up substantially compared to past years.



It was presented in Detroit last week by the Michigan Opera Theatre and unanimously acclaimed by Detroit crit-

The Haires had a chance to see it at a matinee. We agree with the critics. It was enjoyed as much as any performance we have seen.

The music of Jerome Kern and lyrics by Oscar Hammerstein II, including Ol' Man River, Make Believe and others, was outstanding and the performers did it justice. It's easy to see why it is going strong after more than 60 years.

The ad for the matinee offered a special price of 2 for the price of one and said that tickets started at \$11. What it didn't say was that it was for each ticket, making the normal price for the cheapest ticket \$22.

We sat in the mezanine and the price for tickets there was \$36.50 for the 2 at the half-off price. Main floor, center, tickets were sold out and they normally cost \$45 each.

Those prices, I guess, are cheap compared to Broadway, but they kind of jolted 2 visitors from the hinterland.

Chamber of Commerce President Bill Kritzman had to figure it just wasn't his day. After a good deal of effort he had arranged for a triumphant arrival of Santa Claus in Cass City

The Cass City pep band was there, too. Just when Santa stepped down from the fire truck, it started to rain, hard. After a few minutes he let the band members leave and Santa retreated to shelter.

A few minutes later the rain ceased and it was again a very nice day.

Here's one prediction in the oft-quoted GTE booklet,"2001 Imagine the Possibilities" that we flat-out agree with.

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

Michigan farmland values rise

The Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago recently reported that farmland values in 5 midwestern states showed a modest uptrend this summer.

"To see Michigan farmland values increase by one percentage point during the summer months is certainly encouraging," Michigan Farm Bureau economist Bob Craig, said.

"What we're seeing, though, is that farmland is barely keeping up with the rate of inflation, so while it certainly is positive and heading in the right direction, we're not seeing farmland values growing at any huge rates," Craig said.

He noted that farmland values will be affected by the impact of the 1990 Farm Bill and the results of the negotiations over the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade.





Building begins at Bay Shore

Phase I construction of a long-awaited multi-purpose Youth Center has begun at Bay Shore Camp of Sebewaing, according to Camp Director Lew Tibbits.

One reason that the emergence of these players with limited experience can make a marked difference in the fortunes of the team is the Thumb B Association itself.


Rarely has it been as balanced. There isn't an outstanding team in the league as it enters its final season.
