#### Street work outlined

# Unveil 5-year village plan

Cass City officials recently unveiled a plan detailing planned capital expenditures totaling nearly \$1.3 million over the next 5

The plan, the result of 2 months of work by department heads, staff members and committees under the direction of village Manager Lou S. LaPonsie, was reviewed during the Village Council's Nov. 27 monthly meeting.

By far the biggest chunk of proposed expenditures set torth in the spending plan nearly \$543,000—is earmarked for street work (see chart accompanying this story).

Another \$181,000 will be spent for Department of Public Works equipment— \$45,000 for a truck and blade in 1991, \$36,000 for a jet rodder (a piece of equipment that utilizes water pressure to clean sewers) and pickup in 1992, \$40,000 for a backhoe in 1993, \$28,000 for a chipper and pickup in 1994 and \$32,000 for dump truck and box in

Another major project area continues to be the village's water main replacement expected to total \$175,000

over the next 5 years. Areas slated for replace-

ment are: 1991-south al-

ley (Seeger to Sherman); 1992—east end of Pine Street to the corner of Houghton and Elclare, and Pine Street (Maple to Ale); 1993—Oak Street (Garfield to Third); 1994—Sherman Street (south alley to Third) and Oak Street (Huron to Church); and 1995—south alley (Leach to West), Maple Circle, Sixth Street (Seeger to West) and north alley (Oak to Maple).

The students initially sent letters to get responses for the school newspaper, according to Hopper, who noted she decided to expand the pen pal project after reading some of the responses.


"A lot of them sounded scared and lonely, so I had all my English classes do it,' she said.

One of the favorite expressions often admonished by my mother, a lady from the old school if there ever was one, was "you just wait, chickens come home to

She said it when she learned of some of the more questionable activities of my youth. You know, of course, that she was right.

As a nation our chickens are coming home to roost in the desert. Our economy depends on oil, foreign oil.

If we had stayed on the course that started with the first oil crisis, there is no doubt today that we could ignore Saddam Hussein's invasion of Kuwait just as we ignored the Lebanon, Tibet and other invasions of one country by another.

So now with the president pushing us with as much vigor as possible, we are on the verge of a shooting war.

Is the oil worth it? It won't happen, but there is a way to test the will and the desire for us to spend lives in the Middle East.

Make war possible only if a draft for all persons, men and women, between the ages of 18 and 35, is instituted, and say that none will be exempt for any reason. Then take a vote and see what happens.

We had that commitment in World War II. As a nation we were behind the effort nearly 100 percent. No sacrifice was too great.

Everybody was "in" that war. If they were not fighting themselves, someone in the family was sure to be in it. The civilians endured rationing and shortages of nearly everything.

It was the last time that we were truly united in a war. Maybe the disillusionment with that "war to end all wars" is the reason.

Whatever the reason, it's apparent that there is not the universal support for a shooting war now that there was in the 1940's.

Maybe having our soldiers in Saudi Arabia would be more palatable if Japan and Germany, who have more dependence on oil than we do, were sending soldiers to the front in the same ratio that we are.

What's really hurting, when you get down to it, is that there's no commitment for doing what is necessary to make ourselves energy self-sufficient.

You can blame the leadership for this, but it's a cop out. They reflect us, and if they tried solutions such as slapping on a 50-cent a gallon gas tax they know what would happen. Zip, you're out of office.

It's like taxes and expenses. Everyone wants expenses cut and taxes raised, but not theirs. It's not impossible for the United States to wean itself away from energy dependence. It doesn't appear that we have

the will to do it.

Maybe that will change when Americans come home in body bags, but I doubt it.

We'll blame the other guy for it.

#### Smoking "little cigars"

Celebrities are often quoted because they're celebrities, not because they said anything worth quoting, or even understandable. In a magazine interview, actress Michelle Pfieffer said: "I used to smoke two packs a day, and I just hate being a nonsmoker.....But I will never consider myself a nonsmoker. Because I always find smokers the most interesting people at the

Why would smokers be more interesting than non-smokers? Perhaps because they're demonstrating an attractively independent attitude that says they're not frightened by statistics that indicate they're smoking themselves into an earlier-than-otherwise grave. Undeniably, there is something romantically fascinating about people who willingly risk death. High-wire walkers and mountain climbers, for example.

You might point out that when mountain climbers and wire walkers fall, they usually don't land on innocent people, but smokers exhale. You're clever and obviously a nonsmoker. You're not attractive to Michelle Pfeiffer who, although she no longer smokes, refuses to consider herself a nonsmoker, otherwise she couldn't consider herself one of the most interesting people at the table.

#### LITTLE TEST OF WILLPOWER

I quit cigarettes cold in 1953, long before the surgeon general began maligning tobacco, simply to show off my fabulous willpower. but lately, I've become worried that other people at the table, or on the other side of the room, especially old acquaintances, will think I'm smoking a cigarette, thus discrediting my splen-did willpower. So I keep telling everyone, over and over and over and over, beyond the point of boredom, that it's not a cigarette in my mouth, it really really isn't, it's....

A little cigar!
During the first 35 years after I nobly rejected cigarettes, I had an occasional cigar. A normal-size cigar, maybe two or three a month, always enjoyable, always in

a saloon or restaurant where other people also were smoking. So I could still brag about my marvelous willpower, I never had a cigarat work, at home, in my car, in downtown doorways or any of the other locations commonly used by tobacco addicts lacking my tremendous willpower.

Two years ago, I noticed that more and more restaurants forbid cigars in smoking areas. Even cigarette smokers looked with disfavor upon anyone gross enough to light up a cigar. Simply because it seeped out of a larger wrapping, cigar smoke was regarded as more offensive than cigarette smoke. To avoid widespread condemnation, especially lynching, I quit cigars in 1988 just as stalwartly as I'd quit cigarettes in 1953.

It was yet another opportunity for me to display my magnificent willpower, the willpower that enables me to stay slim by skipping lunches, despite my great hunger, and walking to work, bravely leaving two cars home with my wife.

#### IT'S NOT A CIGARETTE, REALLY

But a few months ago, in a drugstore, I saw something I'd never seen before — a

cigarette size package containing 20 little cigars. That's exactly what it says on the pack — "Little Cigars." Although they are the same size as regular cigarettes, the word "cigarette" isn't mentioned once.

So now, in public smoking areas, two or three times a month, I smoke a little cigar. They burn quicker than fuses, but cost only 80 cents, about half the cost of a pack of cigarettes. Yes, I inhale, but I exhale into my shirt pocket and don't let the smoke out until I'm outside, alone, in the middle of a large vacant lot.

The only problem is I'm afraid someone will mistake my little cigar for a cigarette and think I've lost my stupendous will power and broken a 37-year-old vow. So I tell everyone, including passing strangers, that the thing in my mouth is a little cigar. I make them read the "Little Cigars" on the package. I've become a bore.

Even if I smoked three little cigars at once, Michelle Pfeiffer would find me the least interesting person at the table.

My wife had a comment: "If Michelle thought your cigar talk were boring, she should hear you talk about your stupid, idiotic will-power."





## New books at the library

LONGSHOT by Dick Francis (mystery). John Kendall writes survival manuals for an adventure-travel agency, but has taken time off to pen a novel. When money runs thin, he agrees to write the biography of famed horse trainer Tremayne Vickers. Leaving London for Vickers's Berkshire home, Kendall arrives as one of Vickers's 2 principal riders is acquitted of murdering a young woman with whom he'd quarreled. However, members of Vickers's entourage. including sons Gareth and Perkin and Perkin's wife, Mackie, suggest the hot-tempered jockey had some part in the death. Kendall fits easily into the household, conducting research, taking notes, even cooking and working horses; then the body of a missing stable girl is found in the woods. As Kendall's research continues his riding skills improve and he is taken into Vickers's confidence, the intrepid writer finds himself under attack.

KING'S OAK by Anne Rivers Siddons (fiction). Maybe it would be wrong to say Diana Andropoulis was born on the wrong side of the tracks in Atlanta, but she certainly was not brought up in the kind of neighborhood her future husband came from. Her marriage into the high and mighty Calhoun family is not successful, and eventually she and her daughter flee Atlanta for a small town - namely, Pemberton, near the Big Silver Swamp. Here she meets a man who exists on a less earth-bound level than she, and her affair gets her embroiled in a controversy surrounding a nuclear plant's spoilage of the Big Silver.

THE WOMEN IN HIS LIFE by Barbara Taylor Bradford (fiction). Tycoon Maximilian West, workaholic founder of a multinational financial empire, is endowed with "personal magnetism," "fatal charm," "charisma" and "presence" but is emotionally obtuse with the women who adore him. Born Maxim Wertheim in Berlin, he is brought to London in 1939 by his loving nurse-maid; his parents die in concentration camps. Forging a brilliant business career, he married a glamorous French woman, eventually losing her to the demands of his career; 2 more wives and assorted mistresses fail to bring him happiness. He finally understands the reason for his increasing problems and wins the woman of his heart.

# Village eyes boost in water, sewer rates

Cass City's 1991 budget may get a boost from higher water and sewer rates, something village officials have been talking about for some

The proposal surfaced again during a monthly Village Council meeting last week, when council members reviewed budget projections for the next 5 years, including a proposed 1991 spending plan totaling \$1,517,495.

The new budget, which represents a planned spending increase of about \$160,000, or 12.4 percent, over estimated actual 1990 expenditures, will be the topic of a public hearing set for 7 p.m. Dec. 17.

Following the hearing, the council will hold its regular monthly meeting. Included on the agenda will be a Public Services Committee recommendation on water and sewer rates.

During discussion last week, village officials explained rate increases are being considered primarily because revenues in the Wastewater Treatment Fund regularly fall short of expenditures. Future budget estimates indicate the Water Fund will follow a similar trend beginning in 1992.

According to budget figures, the Wastewater Treatment Fund will need a \$27,200 subsidy from the village's General Fund this year. The subsidy represents about 9.2 percent of the \$294,200 wastewater budget.

Moreover, officials estimate the General Fund will have to contribute \$55,800 in 1991 (17.6 percent of the wastewater budget), \$71,400 in 1992 (21.3 percent), \$85,300 in 1993 (24.4 percent), \$101,050 in 1994 (27.5 percent), and \$117,100 in 1995 (30.4 percent).

The Water Fund, meanwhile, is expected to require General Fund subsidies of \$17,050, \$20,700, \$17,350 and \$21,400 in 1992, 1993, 1994 and 1995, respec-

Village President L.E. Althaver, who pointed out there hasn't been a rate increase in 8 years, noted Cass City's auditors annually give the village a gentle slap on the wrist regarding enterprise funds—particularly the Wastewater Fundwhich aren't self-support-

Althaver attributed the problem to several factors, including increasing maintenance costs tied to the wastewater treatment plant, now 8 years old.

Over the next 5 years, annual wastewater treatment expenditures are expected to increase by more than 21 percent, from \$317,150 in 1991 to \$385,500 in 1995. Compounding the problem are a decrease in water usage, and implementation of

new DNR fees.

Village Manager Lou S. LaPonsie said water flows at the wastewater treatment are the lowest they've ever been, averaging 150,000 to \$160,000 gallons a day. In contrast, the daily flow from 1982 to 1989 has averaged 300.000 gallons a day.

Officials attribute the decrease in water usage to the loss of a big water user—Wesley's Milk Plant, reduced water leakage as a result of the village's water main replacement program, and an increase in water recirculation by industrial and residential customers.

LaPonsie said a new DNR Discharge Permit Fee, meanwhile, will cost the village an additional \$3,600 in 1991, \$6,300 in 1992, \$9,300 in 1993 and \$10,000 in each of the years 1994 and 1995. Also new are costs tied to a DNR-mandated sludge analysis which will cost the village another \$10,000 in 1992.

The importance of increasing revenues in the Wastewater and Water funds was particularly emphasized during a review of a 5-year budget plan, which estimates the village's current fund balance of nearly \$590,000 will be depleted by 1994.

municipality the size of Cass City should maintain a fund balance of at least \$200,000 to \$250,000.

#### **1991 BUDGET**

Turning to the proposed 1991 spending plan, Althaver briefly outlined anticipated revenues and expenditures.

The General Fund budget, which depends on nearly \$154,000 from fund balance, compared to \$32,975 this year, features few significant changes on the revenue side. The exceptions are an expected property tax revenue increase of about 5 percent, and the absence of a major restricted contribution, such as the \$30,000 Evans Estate gift received in

Proposed 1991 General Fund expenditures are set at \$789,550, an increase of about 17 percent, or \$116,000, over 1990.

The increase is due partly to higher solid waste disposal costs—refuse pick-up and disposal expenses are up \$12,000 and costs related to closure of the village's old landfill are up \$34,500.

LaPonsie pointed out a Other proposed expenditures include \$16,500 for a new police car, \$8,000 for a new boiler and pump at the swimming pool and \$10,000 for development of a walking trail.

Other proposed 1991 village funds are:

•Major Street Fund, set at \$217,200, up by \$23,575 over 1990. Major Street work slated in 1991 includes paving curb and gutter on Rose Street, from Ale to Oak, and Hill Street, from Church to Dale (total cost, \$131,000).

•Local Street Fund, set at \$72,750, down by \$17,500 compared to 1990. •Industrial Park Fund

(new), set at \$4,845, with a fund balance of \$11,398. •Parking System Fund, set



# Safety tips for holiday lights

Decorative holiday lighting — when used correctly — is a safe and inexpensive option, according to Joan Bradley, Detroit Edison lighting specialist.

Bradley advises holiday decorators to examine every light string carefully for chipped or damaged sockets and for frayed wires.

"Any such items should be thrown out," she said. "Also, throw out any lights that do not have the Underwriters Laboratories (UL) seal. The seal indicates the lights meet specific safety standards."

Bradley said holiday lighting can be penny-wise as well as safety-wise.

Most strings of lights have an operating cost of a halfcent to 7 1/2 cents per string for 6 hours of use," she said. "Twinkle-type lights use even less electricity because they are off half the time." Bradley offers the follow-

ing safety suggestions:

INDOOR LIGHTING: - Use no more than 3 sets of door extension cord.

Never use lights on a metal tree. Instead, a lighted revolving color wheel or low-wattage color floodlights may be used to illuminate the tree.

- Keep lights away from carpeting, furniture, curtains and drapes. Some standard lights produce enough heat to scorch or damage items they touch.

- Use only flame-resistant ornaments and other decorations, including artificial snow, on and around the tree.

- Don't put the tree near an active fireplace.

OUTDOOR LIGHTING: - Use only weather-resistant equipment and lights

manufactured for outdoor - Use only outdoor extension cords with molded

plugs and sockets. Keep cords out of the way to prevent tripping accidents. - Keep all electrical connections off the ground and hang sockets downward to

prevent water from seeping

- Fasten extension cords or light sets to wood or hardboard surfaces with insulated staples; never use nails or tacks because they may pierce the wires and cause shock or shorts.

- Don't run outdoor lighting cords through door or window openings where they can be damaged.
