# Winter storm blasts area

Winter arrived with a vengeance early Monday morning, blasting the area with a combination of gusty winds and snow, later turning to sleet and rain.

Cass City Wastewater Treatment Plant officials estimate total snowfall for the day at only about 2.5 inches, but note an accurate

reading was difficult due to blowing and drifting.

The weather kept county law enforcement officials busy and gave area students at least a half-day off.

Most Thumb schools canceled classes or closed early. Also closed early were non-essential Tuscola County offices, while some busi-

nesses canceled second and third shifts, and a host of evening activities were called off.

Law enforcement agencies, meanwhile, reported a number of vehicle accidents.

State police at the Caro post reported at least 7 crashes related to weather

conditions Monday, including one serious accident—a head-on collision in Caro that resulted in injuries to 4 Clio area residents and a Caro motorist.

A spokesman at the Tuscola County Sheriff's Department reported at least another dozen minor property damage mishaps during the same period.

## Street work outlined

# Unveil 5-year village plan

Cass City officials recently unveiled a plan detailing planned capital expenditures totaling nearly \$1.3 million over the next 5 years.

The plan, the result of 2 months of work by department heads, staff members and committees under the direction of village Manager Lou S. LaPonsie, was reviewed during the Village Council's Nov. 27 monthly meeting.

By far the biggest chunk of proposed expenditures set forth in the spending plan—nearly \$543,000—is earmarked for street work (see chart accompanying this story).

Another \$181,000 will be spent for Department of Public Works equipment—\$45,000 for a truck and blade in 1991, \$36,000 for a jet rodder (a piece of equipment that utilizes water pressure to clean sewers) and pickup in 1992, \$40,000 for a backhoe in 1993, \$28,000 for a chipper and pickup in 1994 and \$32,000 for dump truck and box in 1995.

Another major project area continues to be the village's water main replacement program, with expenditure expected to total \$175,000 over the next 5 years.

Areas slated for replacement are: 1991—south al-

ley (Seeger to Sherman); 1992—east end of Pine Street to the corner of Houghton and Elclare, and Pine Street (Maple to Ale); 1993—Oak Street (Garfield to Third); 1994—Sherman Street (south alley to Third) and Oak Street (Huron to Church); and 1995—south alley (Leach to West), Maple Circle, Sixth Street (Seeger to West) and North alley (Oak to Maple).

During the same period, \$142,000 in projects are planned at the wastewater treatment plant.

Most of the money will be spent on maintenance. Nearly \$50,000 of the total is the result of new DNR-

mandated discharge permit and sludge analysis fees.

The following is a rundown of other capital expenditures slated over the next 5 years:

•Police department, \$80,800 (includes 4 patrol cars and communications equipment).

•Office equipment, \$45,800 (primarily computer equipment and programs).

•Grants, \$44,900 (the village's share of 2 grants totalling \$388,369. The grants are for development of a walking trail and landfill closure).

•Buildings, \$25,500 (equipment replacement

and repairs at the pool building, and re-roofing of the pool and arts and crafts buildings).

•Hydrants and valves, \$24,200 (replacement).

•Tower and wells, \$23,000 (paint and coat water tower, 10-year maintenance on village wells).

•Parking lot, \$10,500 (repave village parking lot)

•Recreation, \$2,500 (maintenance of tennis courts)

"It's a very ambitious program," village President L.E. Althaver acknowledged. "On the other hand, I don't think there's anything in here that's frivolous or not in the best interest of the community."

While the projects planned for 1991 are expected to proceed, it's uncertain whether future revenues will allow completion of all the projects.

Several factors are unknown, including what local property values will do in the near future, and how an

# Pen pals

## Owen-Gage students write alumni in Saudi Arabia

From first grade classrooms to the high school, Owen-Gage students are extending a hand of friendship to servicemen and women serving in the Middle East.

Since October, elementary and high school students

have been writing letters to Owen-Gage alumni as well as a host of other soldiers, airmen, sailors and marines taking part in Operation Desert Shield.

In addition, students at the high school are sending Christmas cards and pack-

ages to former Owen-Gage students now serving in the Middle East.

Students also have set up a showcase in the high school which displays letters and souvenirs, including Saudi money and a Saudi Pepsi can wrapper, sent by soldiers. And, soon a yellow flag made by the Home Economics Department and bearing the names of Owen-Gage alumni serving in the Middle East will fly under the American flag in front of the high school.

The effort began in early October with about 15 students in Joanne Hopper's senior English class.

The students initially sent letters to get responses for the school newspaper, according to Hopper, who noted she decided to expand the pen pal project after reading some of the responses.

"A lot of them sounded scared and lonely, so I had all my English classes do it," she said.

Before long, many of the 120 students in Hopper's English and psychology classes got involved. "They really liked the responses that they got from (writing to) the general addresses," Hopper said, referring to letters that were distributed randomly to soldiers.

Currently, students are preparing Christmas packages of American munchies, games and other items to be sent to 4 former Owen-Gage students stationed in Saudi Arabia—Dawn Dorsch and her brother, Steven Czaj; Shawn Norcross and Scott Cavanaugh, all serving with the U.S. Army.

Hopper noted a number of

An elderly Cass City area woman remained hospitalized Monday following an accident involving 3 vehicles Sunday afternoon in Cass City.

Cass City police reported the accident occurred at about 4:40 p.m. on Main Street southwest of Downing Street.

According to reports, Marian L. Croft, 79, of Cass City was driving in the outside eastbound lane of Main Street when she attempted to

move towards the inside lane, away from a parked car, and collided with another eastbound vehicle, driven by Jude J. McNaughton, 16, Cass City. Croft's vehicle then struck a parked car belonging to Beverly A. Frank, Cass City.

A passenger in Croft's vehicle, Iva Profit, 83, of Cass City, was transported by Cass City-Mercy Ambulance personnel to Hills and Dales General Hospital, Cass City, where she was

listed in "fair" condition Monday.

All those involved in the accident were wearing seat belts, police said.

Another Cass City area motorist was treated and released at Hills and Dales General Hospital following a 2-vehicle crash Saturday near the intersection of Garfield Avenue and Sherman Street.

Reports state Clara F. Bulla, 57, Cass City, was driving south on Sherman

Street at about 5:05 p.m. when she pulled into the path of a westbound vehicle driven by Matthew T. Zimba of Deford.

Bulla was transported to the hospital by Cass City-Mercy Ambulance personnel.

Zimba and one passenger in his vehicle, and 3 passengers in Bulla's vehicle were not injured, according to police, who reported all front-seat occupants were wearing seat belts.





# Elementary students in book donation program

Students at Campbell and Deford Elementary Schools will be demonstrating the Christmas spirit of giving by participating in a special "Reading Magic" program this month. Reading Magic is a home-school reading program that rewards students for reading achievements. For Christmas, however, the students will be asked to give the gift of reading. Children in grades kindergarten through fourth will be bringing a new or "like-new" book to their school library. There, the books will be stamped with a "donated by" stamp and gift-wrapped for Christmas. Gifted-wrapped books will be given to the Thumb Area Assault Crisis Center, which serves women and children who are victims of domestic violence. Reading teacher Cathy Cooper and librarian Donna Emerson, coordinators of Reading Magic, selected the center as recipient of this year's books because it is a local organization that has benefited Cass City women and children. Children who are staying at the center over Christmas will receive books and gifts. Any remaining books will be used to create a library shelf for the center. The Information Exchange Bookstore in Cass City is cooperating with this program by offering a 20-percent discount on books children say are being purchased for Reading Magic. Used books are also available at the store for 25 cents.

Parents, meanwhile, have been asked to donate wrapping paper, ribbons and gift tags so that students will have a selection to choose from in wrapping their gifts.

Two years ago, I noticed that more and more restaurants forbid cigars in smoking areas. Even cigarette smokers looked with disfavor upon anyone gross enough to light up a cigar. Simply because it seeped out of a larger wrapping, cigar smoke was regarded as more offensive than cigarette smoke. To avoid widespread condemnation, especially lynching, I quit cigars in 1988 just as stalwartly as I'd quit cigarettes in 1953.

It was yet another opportunity for me to display my magnificent willpower, the willpower that enables me to stay slim by skipping lunches, despite my great hunger, and walking to work, bravely leaving two cars home with my wife.

cigarette size package containing 20 little cigars. That's exactly what it says on the pack — "Little Cigars." Although they are the same size as regular cigarettes, the word "cigarette" isn't mentioned once. So now, in public smoking areas, two or three times a month, I smoke a little cigar. They burn quicker than fuses, but cost only 80 cents, about half the cost of a pack of cigarettes. Yes, I inhale, but I exhale into my shirt pocket and don't let the smoke out until I'm outside, alone, in the middle of a large vacant lot.

The only problem is I'm afraid someone will mistake my little cigar for a cigarette and think I've lost my stupendous will power and broken a 37-year-old vow. So I tell everyone, including passing strangers, that the thing in my mouth is a little cigar. I make them read the "Little Cigars" on the package. I've become a bore.

Even if I smoked three little cigars at once, Michelle Pfeiffer would find me the least interesting person at the table.

My wife had a comment: "If Michelle thought your cigar talk were boring, she should hear you talk about your stupid, idiotic willpower."

## From Saudi with love: O-G pupils, soldiers write

other former students are serving in armed forces, but haven't yet been called to participate in Operation Desert Shield.

They include Tom Halasz (Army), Chris Abbe (Marines), Brad Susalla (Marines), Graham Besonen (Marines), R.T. Susalla (Marines), Stu Stirrett (Marines), Dennis Czap (Army), Steve Sobczak (Marines) and Steve Root (Air Force).

In addition to the efforts of high school students, pupils at the elementary school have been writing to soldiers since mid-October.

Principal Bill Britt said students began writing after he received a letter from 1989 Owen-Gage graduate Dawn Dorsch, who asked that students correspond with soldiers.

About 90 percent of the

students in grades one through 6 have responded to the request.

"We've gotten responses back to the third grade and the second grade. Now, they're in the process of answering those letters," Britt remarked. He added the soldiers talk about the weather, foreign customs and other topics in their letters.

Britt noted an 11-year Army veteran, Staff Sgt. Jerry J. Morris of Florida, wrote to the third graders after receiving their address from Dorsch.

The soldier mentioned that the servicemen miss television, especially the big college and pro football games, Britt said, adding he also included a bit of encouragement to his young pen pals, telling them to practice their handwriting and drawing.

"I think (the students) are a little more aware of the situation over there" as a result of the correspondence, Britt commented.

Hopper agreed. She said the project has brought a global event close to home, and said she hopes the effort will help students "realize that they need to care for other people."

Ron D'Aoust, high school principal, counselor and teacher, indicated the students' efforts, particularly with respect to former Owen-Gage students now serving with American forces in the Middle East, is all part of living in and being part of a close-knit community.

"There's a local pride. I think there's a school pride," he said.

D'Aoust added that in a small school district like Owen-Gage, "There are no strangers. We don't lose identity here."

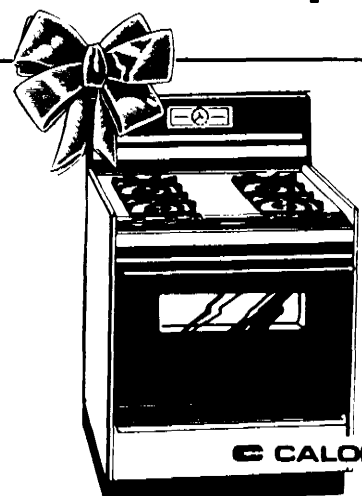

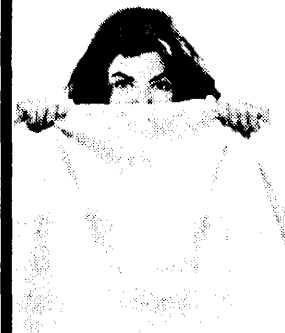

New books at  
the library

**LONGSHOT** by Dick Francis (mystery). John Kendall writes survival manuals for an adventure-travel agency, but has taken time off to pen a novel. When money runs thin, he agrees to write the biography of famed horse trainer Tremayne Vickers. Leaving London for Vickers's Berkshire home, Kendall arrives as one of Vickers's 2 principal riders is acquitted of murdering a young woman with whom he'd quarreled. However, members of Vickers's entourage, including sons Gareth and Perkin and Perkin's wife, Mackie, suggest the hot-tempered jockey had some part in the death. Kendall fits easily into the household, conducting research, taking notes, even cooking and working horses; then the body of a missing stable girl is found in the woods. As Kendall's research continues his riding skills improve and he is taken into Vickers's confidence, the intrepid writer finds himself under attack.

**KING'S OAK** by Anne Rivers Siddons (fiction). Maybe it would be wrong to say Diana Andropoulis was born on the wrong side of the tracks in Atlanta, but she certainly was not brought up in the kind of neighborhood her future husband came from. Her marriage into the high and mighty Calhoun family is not successful, and eventually she and her daughter flee Atlanta for a small town - namely, Pemberton, near the Big Silver Swamp. Here she meets a man who exists on a less earth-bound level than she, and her affair gets her embroiled in a controversy surrounding a nuclear plant's spoilage of the Big Silver.

**THE WOMEN IN HIS LIFE** by Barbara Taylor Bradford (fiction). Tycoon Maximilian West, workaholic founder of a multinational financial empire, is endowed with "personal magnetism," "fatal charm," "charisma" and "presence" but is emotionally obtuse with the women who adore him. Born Maxim Wertheim in Berlin, he is brought to London in 1939 by his loving nurse-maid; his parents die in concentration camps. Forging a brilliant business career, he married a glamorous French woman, eventually losing her to the demands of his career; 2 more wives and assorted mistresses fail to bring him happiness. He finally understands the reason for his increasing problems and wins the woman of his heart.

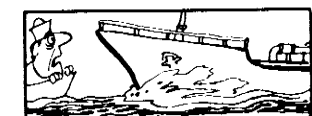

Haldane, height notwithstanding, will be Wright's best scoring threat on the inside. Haldane's quick first

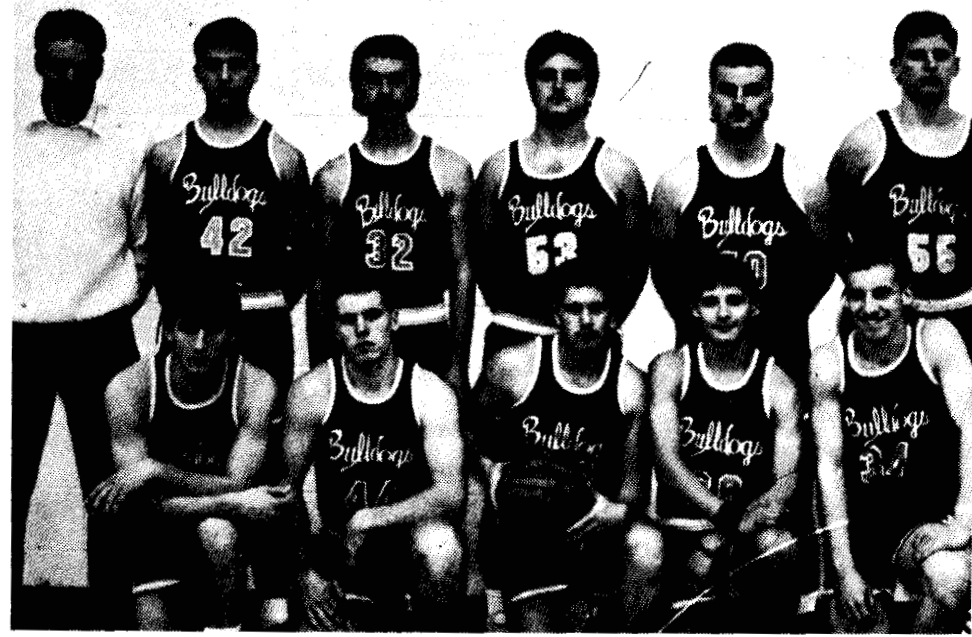
step often allows him to register several baskets along the baseline.

### In circuit court

## Man sentenced in brother's death

A Vassar man charged in connection with the May 13 death of his older brother was sentenced Friday in Tuscola County Circuit Court.

The defendant, Fred J. Colosky, 19, Vassar, was sentenced to 3 years probation and 365 days in the county jail (deferred to the end of probation), and ordered to pay a \$200 fine, \$200 in court costs, attorneys fees, a \$30 crime victim fee and \$30 per month oversight fee.

Colosky pleaded guilty to involuntary manslaughter after delivering a fatal blow to the head of his brother, Cecil W. Colosky, 23, in Vassar Township.

Another Vassar resident, Sean P. O'Leary, 22, was sentenced on a delayed sentence for his plea of no contest to attempted felonious assault Jan. 26, 1989, in Vassar.

O'Leary was ordered to serve 2 years probation and 10 days in the county jail, complete 54 hours of community service, and pay a \$30 per month oversight fee and \$500 in court costs and fines.

Jeremy R. Gatz, 20, of Birch Run, was sentenced to 9 months in jail, with work site privileges, for his Oct. 26 plea of guilty to attempted unlawfully driving away a motor vehicle.

Gatz also was sentenced to 3 years probation and ordered to pay a \$30 per month oversight fee, \$30 crime victim fee, \$200 fine and

court costs of \$200 plus attorneys fees. Restitution also is to be paid, records state.

Gatz was charged in connection with a Sept. 30 incident in Arbel Township involving a semi-tractor and trailers belonging to K&W Trucking.

In other proceedings Friday, the court took under advisement a plea of no contest entered by Stanley M. Spencer, 48, Vassar, to a charge of second degree Criminal Sexual Conduct.

Sentencing for the defendant was slated for Jan. 28 and a pre-sentence investigation was ordered. Bond was continued at \$20,000.

Court records state Spencer is charged with engaging in sexual contact with a person under the age of 13 years April 12 in Tuscola Township.

Pablo Gonzales, 30, of Fairgrove, pleaded guilty to charges of breaking and entering an occupied dwelling and possession of a firearm during the commission of a felony.

His sentencing also was set for Jan. 28. A pre-sentence investigation was ordered by the court, which continued bond at \$800,000.

Gonzales is charged with breaking into a house at 47 Ringle Rd., Fairgrove, June 23, and possessing a shotgun during the crime, court records state.

Also Friday, Cass City resident David A. Chrzan, 21, 6450 Main St., entered a plea of guilty to being an

accessory after the fact.

The charge stems from the June 16 larceny of cash from Cass City Floral, 6450 Main St., Cass City, according to court records, which state Chrzan concealed or otherwise aided the offender, Joseph Racine, knowing he had committed a felony.

A pre-sentence investigation was ordered for Chrzan, whose sentencing is scheduled for March 1. His bond was continued at \$10,000.

### THURSDAY

Four persons, including a Kingston area man charged in connection with the March 21 shooting death of his wife, entered pleas Thursday.

Christian W. Hagen, 41, 7380 Centerline Rd., Kingston, pleaded guilty to the amended charges of second degree murder and possession of a firearm in the commission of a felony. Both charges stem from the death of his wife, Capitola M. Hagen.

A pre-sentence investigation was ordered. Sentencing was set for Feb. 2.

Herman C. McConnell Sr., 45, Caro, pleaded guilty to second degree Criminal Sexual Conduct.

Sentencing was set for Feb. 8. Bond was continued at \$30,000.

McConnell is charged with engaging in sexual contact with a person who is mentally incapable, disabled or

incapacitated, or physically helpless. The defendant and victim are related by blood, according to court records, which state the incident occurred in the fall of 1989.

Silverwood resident John S. Fessler, 26, pleaded guilty to charges of possession of a short barrel shotgun and possession of an uncased firearm in a motor vehicle July 22 in Watertown Township.

A pre-sentence investigation was ordered by the court, which scheduled sentencing for Jan. 28.

Larry Mayfield, 45, Flint, pleaded no contest to attempted retail fraud, first degree, in connection with a March 27 incident in Vassar. Sentencing was set for Jan. 28. Bond was continued at \$5,000.

### OTHER CASES

In other proceedings last week, Columbiaville resident Guy A. Perry, 30, pleaded guilty to a charge of attempted unlawful use of a motor vehicle Feb. 26 in Watertown Township.

The defendant's bond was revoked, according to court records, which state sentencing is set for Feb. 8. A pre-sentence investigation was ordered.

Also, a 2-day jury trial ended with the jury returning a verdict of guilty against a 44-year-old Vassar man charged with first degree Criminal Sexual Conduct.

Sentencing for the defendant, Jimmy L. Sabin, was set for Jan. 25. A pre-sentence investigation was ordered, and bond was continued at \$15,000.

Records state Sabin engaged in sexual penetration with a person under the age of 13 years June 15, 1989, in Vassar Township.

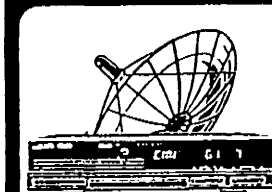

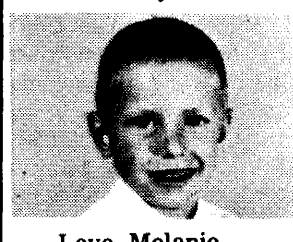

## 1991 budget reviewed

# Village eyes boost in water, sewer rates

Cass City's 1991 budget may get a boost from higher water and sewer rates, something village officials have been talking about for some time.

The proposal surfaced again during a monthly Village Council meeting last week, when council members reviewed budget projections for the next 5 years, including a proposed 1991 spending plan totaling \$1,517,495.

The new budget, which represents a planned spending increase of about \$160,000, or 12.4 percent, over estimated actual 1990 expenditures, will be the topic of a public hearing set for 7 p.m. Dec. 17.

Following the hearing, the council will hold its regular monthly meeting. Included on the agenda will be a

Public Services Committee recommendation on water and sewer rates.

During discussion last week, village officials explained rate increases are being considered primarily because revenues in the Wastewater Treatment Fund regularly fall short of expenditures. Future budget estimates indicate the Water Fund will follow a similar trend beginning in 1992.

According to budget figures, the Wastewater Treatment Fund will need a \$27,200 subsidy from the village's General Fund this year. The subsidy represents about 9.2 percent of the \$294,200 wastewater budget.

Moreover, officials estimate the General Fund will have to contribute \$55,800 in 1991 (17.6 percent of the

wastewater budget), \$71,400 in 1992 (21.3 percent), \$85,300 in 1993 (24.4 percent), \$101,050 in 1994 (27.5 percent), and \$117,100 in 1995 (30.4 percent).

The Water Fund, meanwhile, is expected to require General Fund subsidies of \$17,050, \$20,700, \$17,350 and \$21,400 in 1992, 1993, 1994 and 1995, respectively.

Village President L.E. Althaver, who pointed out there hasn't been a rate increase in 8 years, noted Cass City's auditors annually give the village a gentle slap on the wrist regarding enterprise funds—particularly the Wastewater Fund—which aren't self-supporting.

Althaver attributed the problem to several factors,

including increasing maintenance costs tied to the wastewater treatment plant, now 8 years old.

Over the next 5 years, annual wastewater treatment expenditures are expected to increase by more than 21 percent, from \$317,150 in 1991 to \$385,500 in 1995. Compounding the problem are a decrease in water usage, and implementation of new DNR fees.

Village Manager Lou S. LaPonsie said water flows at the wastewater treatment are the lowest they've ever been, averaging 150,000 to 160,000 gallons a day. In contrast, the daily flow from 1982 to 1989 has averaged 300,000 gallons a day.

Officials attribute the decrease in water usage to the loss of a big water user—Wesley's Milk Plant, reduced water leakage as a result of the village's water main replacement program, and an increase in water recirculation by industrial and residential customers.

LaPonsie said a new DNR Discharge Permit Fee, meanwhile, will cost the village an additional \$3,600 in 1991, \$6,300 in 1992, \$9,300 in 1993 and \$10,000 in each of the years 1994 and 1995. Also new are costs tied to a DNR-mandated sludge analysis which will cost the village another \$10,000 in 1992.

The importance of increasing revenues in the Wastewater and Water funds was particularly emphasized during a review of a 5-year budget plan, which estimates the village's current fund balance of nearly \$590,000 will be depleted by 1994.

LaPonsie pointed out a municipality the size of Cass City should maintain a fund balance of at least \$200,000 to \$250,000.

### 1991 BUDGET

Turning to the proposed 1991 spending plan, Althaver briefly outlined anticipated revenues and expenditures.

The General Fund budget, which depends on nearly \$154,000 from fund balance, compared to \$32,975 this year, features few significant changes on the revenue side. The exceptions are an expected property tax revenue increase of about 5 percent, and the absence of a major restricted contribution, such as the \$30,000 Evans Estate gift received in 1990.

Proposed 1991 General Fund expenditures are set at \$789,550, an increase of about 17 percent, or \$116,000, over 1990.

The increase is due partly to higher solid waste disposal costs—refuse pick-up and disposal expenses are up \$12,000 and costs related to closure of the village's old landfill are up \$34,500.

Other proposed expenditures include \$16,500 for a new police car, \$8,000 for a new boiler and pump at the swimming pool and \$10,000 for development of a walking trail.

Other proposed 1991 village funds are:

•Major Street Fund, set at \$217,200, up by \$23,575 over 1990. Major Street work slated in 1991 includes paving curb and gutter on Rose Street, from Ale to Oak, and Hill Street, from Church to Dale (total cost, \$131,000).

•Local Street Fund, set at \$72,750, down by \$17,500 compared to 1990.

•Industrial Park Fund (new), set at \$4,845, with a fund balance of \$11,398.

•Parking System Fund, set at \$26,600, up by \$13,700 over 1990. Increased spending is due to payment on and paving of a parking lot, located at the southwest corner of Church and Seeger streets, being purchased by the village.

•Wastewater Treatment Fund, set at \$317,150, up by \$22,950 over 1990. Increased expenditures include office and lab equipment (up \$8,000) and DNR

fees (up \$4,800).

•Water System Fund, set at \$89,400, up by \$8,050 over 1990.

### PAYMENT OKAYED

In other business during the nearly 2-hour Nov. 27 regular session, the council:

•Approved a recommendation to pay an additional \$155,000 in 1991 on the village's FHA bonds for the wastewater treatment plant.

The extra payment, which will come from dollars carried over in the village's 2.5-mill debt retirement millage since 1981, will allow the village to save \$369,000 in interest payments and retire the debt 5 years earlier.

•Approved spending \$14,985 for a new police car. The 1991 Ford Taurus will

be purchased through Board Chrysler-Plymouth-Dodge, Cass City.

•Appointed Bill Lovejoy and Nat Tuttle to serve on the Rawson Memorial Library Board for terms that will expire Jan. 1, 1995, and Jan. 1, 1993, respectively.

•Authorized Althaver to endorse a \$20,000 grant application being submitted to the Neighborhood Builders Alliance by VFW Post 3644, Cass City. If approved, the funds will be used to help cover the expense of refurbishing the VFW's new post hall.

•Endorsed a resolution supporting the primary enforcement of Michigan's general safety belt use law and encouraging legislators to work for passage of primary enforcement.

## Safety tips for holiday lights

Decorative holiday lighting — when used correctly — is a safe and inexpensive option, according to Joan Bradley, Detroit Edison lighting specialist.

Bradley advises holiday decorators to examine every light string carefully for chipped or damaged sockets and for frayed wires.

"Any such items should be thrown out," she said. "Also, throw out any lights that do not have the Underwriters Laboratories (UL) seal. The seal indicates the lights meet specific safety standards."

Bradley said holiday lighting can be penny-wise as well as safety-wise.

Most strings of lights have an operating cost of a half-cent to 7 1/2 cents per string for 6 hours of use," she said. "Twinkle-type lights use even less electricity because they are off half the time."

Bradley offers the following safety suggestions:

**INDOOR LIGHTING:**  
- Use no more than 3 sets of

standard lights on each indoor extension cord.

- Never use lights on a metal tree. Instead, a lighted revolving color wheel or low-wattage color floodlights may be used to illuminate the tree.

- Keep lights away from carpeting, furniture, curtains and drapes. Some standard lights produce enough heat to scorch or damage items they touch.

- Use only flame-resistant ornaments and other decorations, including artificial snow, on and around the tree.

- Don't put the tree near an active fireplace.

**OUTDOOR LIGHTING:**  
- Use only weather-resistant equipment and lights manufactured for outdoor use.

- Use only outdoor extension cords with molded plugs and sockets. Keep cords out of the way to prevent tripping accidents.

- Keep all electrical connections off the ground and hang sockets downward to prevent water from seeping

into them.

- Fasten extension cords or light sets to wood or hardboard surfaces with insulated staples; never use nails or tacks because they may pierce the wires and cause shock or shorts.

- Don't run outdoor lighting cords through door or window openings where they can be damaged.
