Thumb teenagers assaulted

Pair face rape charges

The preliminary examinations for a pair of Elkton residents charged with raping 2 Thumb teenagers were to have been resumed Tuesday afternoon following a day-long session Monday in Huron County District Court.

The defendants, Patricia L. Bland, 45, and Franklin E. Apley, 45, each face 5 counts of first degree criminal sexual conduct. The pair, who are lodged in

the Huron County Jail, have been denied bond.

The charges are in connection with what authorities are calling a very tragic case involving a baby-sitting scheme allegedly used by the defendants to lure the young teens to their Oliver Township residence.

Bland and Apley are accused of engaging in sexual penetration 4 times in December, and once with the other vic-

tim during an incident this month. The defendants allegedly used force or coercion against the first victim, and threatened the second with a jackknife.

According to Huron County Prosecutor Leslie Hagen, Bland and Apley contacted their victims, apparently randomly, with requests for a baby sitter. She said the teens were assaulted after arriving at the couple's Stein Road home.

Authorities are continuing an investigation of the case in both Tuscola and Huron counties.

"We have reason to believe there are other victims out there," Hagen said, adding anyone with information about the case, or who believe they were contacted by the defendants is asked to contact the Michigan State Police, Bad Axe Post, at 269-6441.

\$400,000 needed

School ponders tax for building repair

The Cass City School District taxpayers will be facing a significant capital investment for building repair, Supt. Ken Micklash told members of the school board Monday night in its regular session at the high school.

Building repair cost that could reach \$400,000 is needed for the high school and the intermediate building.

Despite the big expense, it's possible that the district could pay for the repairs out of operating revenues, Micklash explained, but it's also possible that a one or 2-mill tax for a year or 2 will be necessary. It depends on how the state funds schools and our enrollment, he added.

President Ben Hobart went on record as favoring a tax for the work. We don't want to be put in the position again of cutting services or curriculum, he said.

Already there has been an unforeseen expense of \$6,700 for the repair of the high school heating system, which is 25 years old. During the Christmas holidays the heat went out and it took 4 days for a boiler expert to repair it.

That's just for starters. This summer another \$8,000 to \$21,000 must be spent to bring the system up to date. The \$8,000 is for minimal work and the \$21,000 cost includes installation of a back-up system.

Another can't wait project is the electrical system at the

intermediate school. The 1926 system is overloaded, blowing out fuses daily and the fuses get too hot to touch, Principal Don Schelke said. A new system is estimated at between \$20,000 and \$25,000.

Already on the agenda is a new roof for the high school, which is estimated at \$225,000 to \$375,000. It is expected to be completed in stages over 2 or 3 years, unless of course a tax is floated for all of the work. In that case, presumably, the work would be completed at once.

Already spent this year has been \$1,200 to repair the electrical system at Deford School.

IT'S OFFICIAL

It's now official. The school colors are dark maroon and white. The school mascot is the "fighting Hawk" for sports events and the "flying Hawk" for more formal occasions. An official school logo was also adopted.

The action was taken by the board on the recommendation of the student council, which surveyed the students and the community.

NEW VAN

The board voted to buy a Dodge 15-passenger van from Board Chrysler-Plymouth-Dodge for \$16,986. The van is a 1990 model with 6,000 miles on it with an original sticker price of

\$22,197. Trustees also authorized undercoating for the unit at additional cost.

OTHER BUSINESS

High School Principal Russ Biefer reported on the new math offerings at the school and said that for the first time this spring advanced placement tests will be offered in various courses where interest is present.

Students taking the tests and passing will receive college credit. The main purpose of the tests, Micklash told the board, is to save parents money.

There will be a charge of \$57 for the test and students can earn 3 college credits if they pass. Earning the credits at college would cost about \$300.

Director Elaine Howard presented the contracts for adult education classes, which were approved. She also told the board that there were 68 students in adult high school completion courses and that computer and math classes were full. She expects 13 to graduate this spring.

A room in the school was rented to Saginaw Valley State University to use as an office to supervise courses it offers in Cass City. The rent is \$500 a month year-around and can be terminated by either party with 60 days notice.

The college had been using the room for some of its courses rent-free before the agreement. A sign announc-

ing the college services will be erected in front of the school.

Kathy Dorland, a 2-year teacher at the school, was granted tenure.

Dennis Meck, advisor, and the Cass City Ski Club were given permission to use the school van the weekend of Feb. 1-3. Special permission was needed because the outing includes a Sunday.

Dan Ulfig, Al Hartwick and Jim Turner were appointed to a committee to review non-union, including administrators, salaries for 1991-92.

Various board members will attend board meetings at Caro, Mayville, Reese and Unionville-Sebewaing in an exchange program approved by 10 districts in Tuscola County.

According to Blissfield officials, the store was painted with signs such as "U.S.A. No. 1" in the early morning hours Saturday after the store was closed.

Members of the church of which Khoury is a member rallied behind him and voluntarily helped him restore the store to its original condition.

Teen escapes injury

A Caro teen escaped injury Friday when the vehicle he was driving left an Ellington Township road and tipped over on its side.

Ty T. Lanway, 16, was westbound on Orr Road south of Deckerville at about 1:15 p.m. when he lost control on the slippery roadway, according to Tuscola County Sheriff's deputies, who state the vehicle spun around, left the road and tipped over.

Response overwhelming

Cass City students adopt soldiers

Understanding the War in the Middle East may be difficult for students at Campbell Elementary School, but the youngsters have proven they're more than willing to help in any way they can.

The students—more than 540 of them in all grades—combined efforts to collect goodies for servicemen taking part in Operation Desert Storm, and then packed the

items in boxes, which were mailed Friday.

The project, sponsored by the school's Student Council, began a few weeks ago, according to third grade teacher Barb Tuckey, who along with Shirley Tuckey, another third grade teacher, sponsors the council.

Tuckey explained the school collected names of servicemen who had ties to the district, and then asked

the students to bring donations from home.

"We were overwhelmed with the response—people were very generous," she remarked.

Each classroom "adopted" a soldier. Students then collected toiletries, paper, pencils, cards, snack foods, Kool Aid, inner soles for boots and, Tuckey added, lots of toilet paper to send. The students also included letters and valentines in the boxes.

The classes also raised money, through popcorn sales and other activities, to cover shipping costs.

A total of 25 boxes were mailed to former Cass City students and other soldiers who have ties to the school.

For example, the brothers of John Hoppe, a third grader, and Rob Bliss, a fourth grader, are stationed in the Middle East, as is the father of Tanya Etimani, a kindergartener, and Penelope Etimani, a second grader.

More names have since been added to the list, Tuckey said, adding students are sending packages to as many soldiers as possible.

She indicated the effort to send a little bit of home to servicemen has benefitted the children as much as those receiving the packages.

"The students wanted to do something for the men over

there," she said. "This is their way of taking some action; it gives them something to do about the situation."

Tuckey noted news accounts of the war via television have had a significant impact on the students.

"They know about (the situation). They're very well informed," she said, "and some of them have very real concerns, especially the ones who have brothers there or other family members."

Tuckey continued, "They're trying very hard to comprehend what this means in their own lives, and that's not easy."

The students' gifts will be appreciated, judging by the comments of William and Brenda Healy, whose son, Jeff, has been in Saudi Arabia since August.

Healy, a U.S. Air Force sergeant with the 23rd Tactical Fighting Unit, will receive a package from Mrs. Iseler's third grade class.

"I'm sure it will (help). I know he really appreciates it," Mrs. Healy remarked, noting the soldiers typically share their packages with one another.

"I guess the food there's been getting very bad. He said it was getting unbearable, and he's not one to really complain about it," she said.

The Healys last heard from their son on the Thursday prior to the beginning of

Operation Desert Storm.

A 1984 Cass City High School graduate, Healy, who assembles and installs bombs on aircraft, hasn't been allowed to say exactly

where he is.

"He was allowed to make one final phone call. All I know is he's close to the border," Mrs. Healy said.

"I know he's really getting

homesick," she added. "His morale has been really good, (but) he was getting a little down. He said he wished they would just go ahead and get it over with."

Do something. Indulge yourself somehow, and keep busy. It's the best way I know to hurry spring along.

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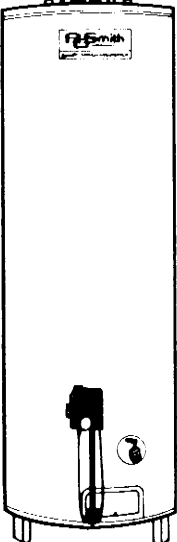
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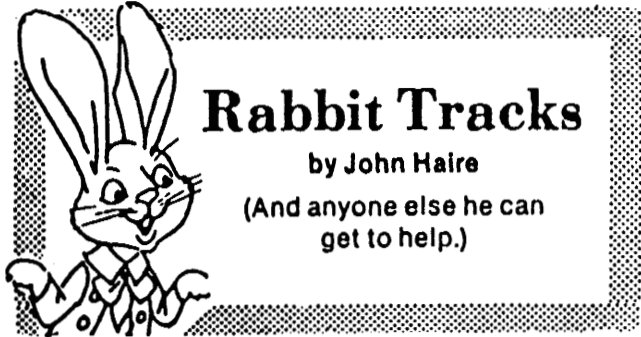

One of the disadvantages of writing a column for a weekly is the time that elapses between the writing and the publishing.

This column is being written Thursday morning and everything seems trivial compared to the war in Iraq. Next Tuesday or Wednesday, when most of you will be reading this, who knows what the situation will be.

So as inconsequential as it seems right now, this column is about the Thumb fight to separate the private schools from the public schools in the Michigan High School Athletic Association post-season sports tournaments.

There's no doubt that the private schools have a definite advantage over public schools in that they are not restricted by district boundaries. There's no doubt that some private schools recruit athletes. There's no doubt that in Class D and Class C competition private schools win a disproportionate share of the state titles.

Having said that, we hesitate to endorse a split between private and public schools. It would be nice of course to be able to hang a state championship banner on the gym wall, but it wouldn't carry the weight that it does today.

A split is just too radical. Just like the one-class for all is too radical for Indiana.

The problem that is being addressed primarily concerns the class D and C schools. When you get to class B the public schools hold their own, and private schools seldom win a class A championship these days.

There's probably no plan that would please everyone. Changing the classifications for private schools could stop the bleeding a little, I believe.

Private schools normally in class D moved to C, and C-population schools moved to class B would help. That plan wouldn't have done much to help in the basketball tournament last year. Detroit Country Day voluntarily moved from C to B and won it all anyway.

But we believe that Detroit East Catholic, the D winner, would never have made it in class C.

One thing certain. There will be no change in the regulations unless it is approved by at least 75 percent of the schools in the MHAA. That's what it takes for change not voted by the MHAA board.

Among the school people spearheading the drive for change are Cass City's Don Schelke, athletic director, and Wayne Dillon.

Persons wishing to learn more about the change that has been talked about for years can do so at a special meeting scheduled Wednesday, Jan. 23, at 6:30 p.m. at Cass City High School.

John "Jack" Roberts, president of the MHAA, will be present.

It's likely to be a lively meeting even if nothing comes of it.

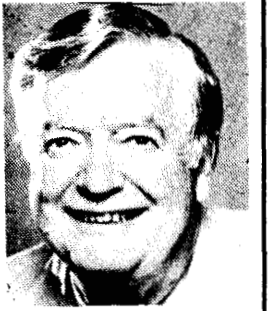
All funds raised from this event will stay in the respective communities represented by the walkers. The goal for this event has been set at \$10,000.

"If It Fitz...."

Superbucket woes

It was a chance to save \$3, but I hesitated. Which was ironic, because the purpose of the bargain is to eliminate hesitation and keep the popcorn line moving.

We were in the Star John R Theater in Madison Heights last week. It may be recalled that I first wrote about the Star refreshment counter in October, complaining that it had embarrassed me into admitting my wife and I don't trust each other.

I'd ordered 2 boxes of popcorn and the clerk said we'd get more for the same money in one Superbucket. Feeling constrained to explain why I'd pass up such a grand opportunity for economical nutrition, I admitted we'd previously experimented with communal feeding and discovered we couldn't enjoy the movie because she worried that I'd grab more than my share of popcorn, and I regarded her with the same nervous suspicion.

Subsequently I crafted a scholarly column examining the Star's civic responsibility not to encourage situations that could damage otherwise loving relationships. I speculated that popcorn containers cost management more than the popcorn itself, so more people eating out of fewer containers means higher profits.

There was a genial response from Barrie Lawson Loeks, co-owner of Loeks-Star Theatres, which operates 64 screens contained in 7 theaters (communal viewing begat communal feeding). "The main reason we push Superbucket combos is not because of the container cost, but because it is faster to prepare a Combo than multiple containers," she said. "We strive for next-in-line service so speed is important. I'm sure you know how frustrating it is to wait in line while your movie is starting."

Sure. Which brings us back to our most recent trip to the Star John R. This time we were a party of 3, including granddaughter Emily. And when I ordered 3 small boxes of popcorn and 2 soft drinks (my wife prefers stealing slurps from mine), the clerk said I could save \$3 by getting the same amount of popcorn in a single bucket. Which certainly gave me the pause that the buckets are designed to eliminate.

For an old poop who used to pay 10 cents for a double feature plus 5 cents for popcorn, \$3 is a lot of money. On the other hand, when I'm with my wife and Emily, it's the same as having 2 wives. Emily agrees with her grandma on everything, including the unfair contention that I eat popcorn like a starving pig. I knew I wouldn't enjoy the movie with 2 wives monitoring my feeding procedures and slapping my hand whenever it reached toward the bucket.

So I told the clerk 3 boxes would be best, even for \$3 more, because otherwise there'd be an awful battle over who got to hold the bucket, and I'd lose, 2-1. Previously, that honest admission of a distrustful relationship had elicited regretful but polite, if surprised, compliance from the popcorn salesperson. But not this time.

"We have bags for such situations," the clerk said with an understanding smile.

I said I didn't believe it. He showed me the bags specially provided to facilitate peaceful sharing of bucketed popcorn. I took 2 empty bags and one full bucket and saved \$3.

IT'S A MATTER OF PROPORTION

"I'd like to think my column had something to do with this new bag-plus-bucket policy," I told my wife. "I wonder how many marriages I've saved. If Ann Landers had written to me, she might have avoided a divorce."

But then we sat down and my wife said she had to split the popcorn up because I couldn't do it without spilling half of it. Emily said yeah. My wife and Emily got bagfuls and I got what was left in the bucket. With the naked eye it was impossible to tell if the portions were equal.

It must be noted, however, that the 2 wives were still eating long after I was done. And the person who gets the bucket gets the dregs, which must be eaten, just in case of a drug bust.

Star advertises as "The World's Best-run Theaters." Based on 60 years of continual movie-going, I agree. Opulent lobbies, large auditoriums and astonishingly accommodating employees.

The next time I balk at savings by the bucketful, I expect the clerk to offer marriage counseling.

Caro wins, 64-61

Hawks fade in final seconds---

A disappointing call in the final 11 seconds of the game Tuesday ruined Cass City's chances for an upset victory at Caro, and the heavily favored Tigers escaped with a 64-61 victory in a Thumb B Association contest.

It was an especially frustrating loss for Cass City which led through all of the last half until the final 30 seconds of the game.

The play that ended Cass City's chances for a win came with the Hawks in possession trailing by a point. Coach Ron Nummerger had called time out to set up a play and, on the pass from out-of-bounds, Steve Tuckey stepped on the over and back line and was called for it, and the Tigers took over.

While that play at the end was devastating for Cass City, the game actually turned at the foul line.

Cass City's Troy Perry fouled out in the fourth quarter and spent much of the last half on the bench with 4 fouls. When he left the game, the Hawks defense suffered. At crunch time Mike Mitin was left by himself for 2 easy baskets that moved Caro from behind into the lead.

Through much of the last half, Cass City had 2 men on him whenever he got the ball, and Chris Herringshaw dogged Bluem all over the court. It was fairly successful until the game was on the line in the last quarter.

Cass City had racked up its largest lead of the game, 54-47, with 5:45 left to play.

Steve Hinderer scored to cut the margin to 5 points. Tuckey got that back on a pretty post move and then Bluem scored 2 buckets, a free throw and caused a Cass City turnover, and suddenly the score was tied.

Cass City slipped back in front on a free throw by Tuckey and a bucket by Mark Irrer. Hinderer scored for Caro to set the stage for the final Tiger winning rally with 40 seconds left.

The Hawks used a 4-corner offense much of the night to combat the taller Tigers and tried to keep players from fouling out.

The Hawks used some fine outside shooting by Greg LeValley to stay ahead of Caro in the third period, as the sophomore forward sunk 2 3-pointers in a row from the right side.

Bluem whipped in 31 points for Caro and Mitin added 14. Cass City had

balanced scoring with 4 players in double figures led by LeValley with 15.

The rebounding was about even with Cass City credited with 35 and Caro with 34.

However, the Tigers were better on the offensive boards and second shots accounted for several Tiger baskets.

North Branch wins 65-57

---Repeat fade with Broncos

If nothing else, the Cass City High School Red Hawks have kept fans on the edge of their seats in recent games and if Coach Ron Nummerger's charges could learn to close out the game at crunch time, add a few wins to the one lone game this season that's on the positive side of the ledger.

For the second time in 2 games the Hawks were ahead in the dying moments of the game, only to lose. The loss this time was to North Branch Friday, 65-57, in a Thumb B Association game.

The Hawks have been playing better since the holidays and judging by what happened when the teams met the first time, should have a legitimate shot at another win Friday at Marlette. Tuesday a postponed game at Cass City against league-leading Lakers is scheduled.

In the first quarter against North Branch, Cass City played probably as well as it is capable of, with crisp

passes, good shooting and tight defense. As a result the Hawks ended the period with an 18-14 advantage. The lead lengthened in the opening minutes of the second period, but with a 21-14 lead, Cass City suddenly cooled off and the Broncos ripped in 8 unanswered points to take a one-point lead.

After that the lead saw-sawed back and forth until the fatal fourth quarter when Cass City wilted under the Broncos' full-court press and lost the game.

Cass City could manage only 5 points in the second quarter, but North Branch wasn't all that great on the offensive end either and at the half the game was up for grabs with the visitors leading, 24-23.

Cass City used some fine free throw shooting in the third period to stay on the heels of the foul-prone Broncos, converting 8 of 10 tries.

Early in the fourth quarter Cass City spurred to over-

come a 5-point North Branch lead and go in front 48-46 by scoring 9 unanswered points. There was 5:55 left in the game.

The Broncos responded with a full court trapping defense and Cass City wasn't able to handle it. The Hawks turned the ball over several times and 2 of them resulted in easy baskets.

Despite that, Cass City might have coasted in for the win if the team could have cashed in on the foul line. In a turnaround from the third period Cass City netted just 4 of 10 tries from the charity stripe and that was the ball game.

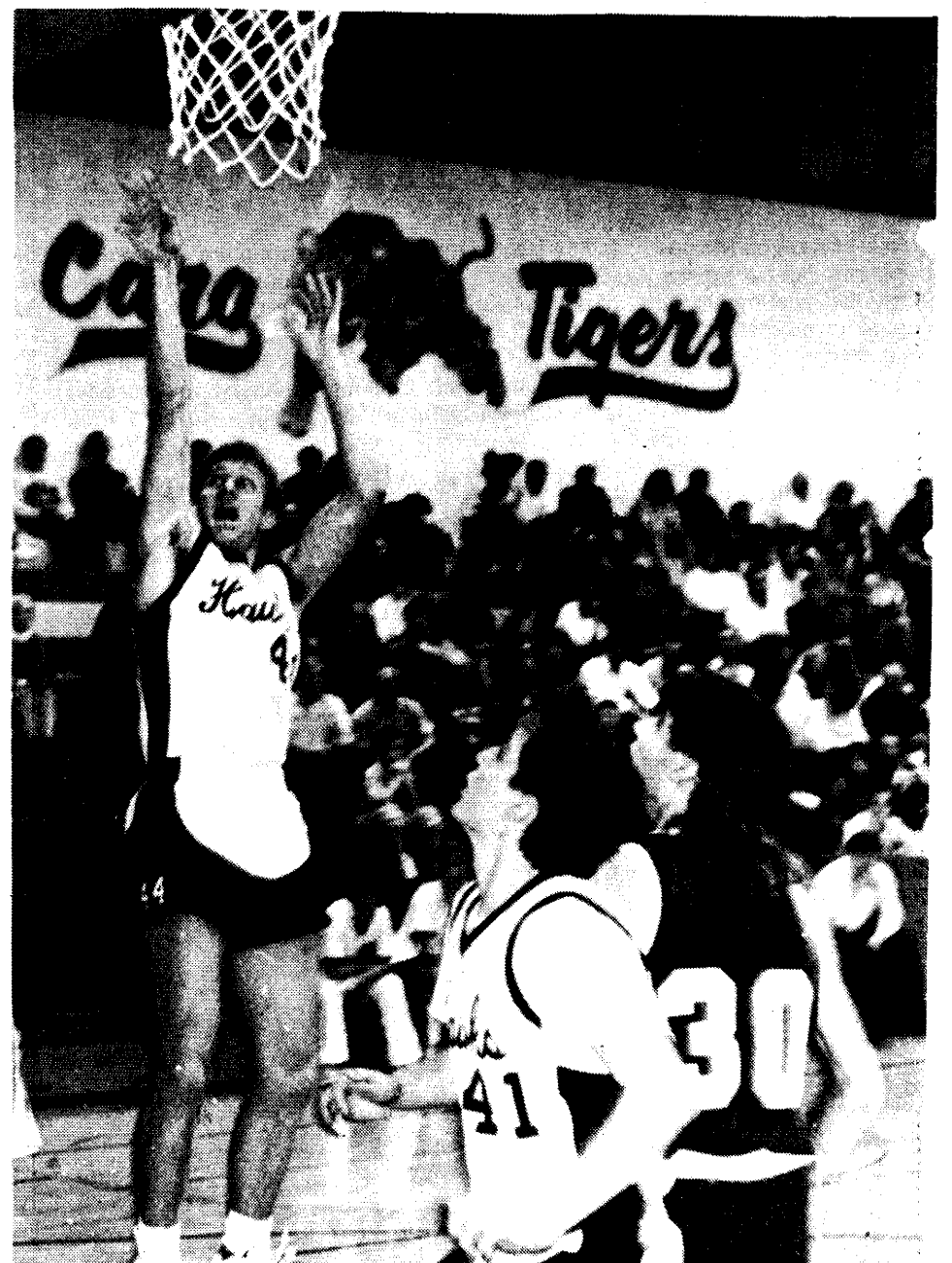

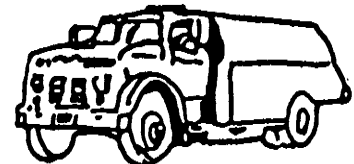

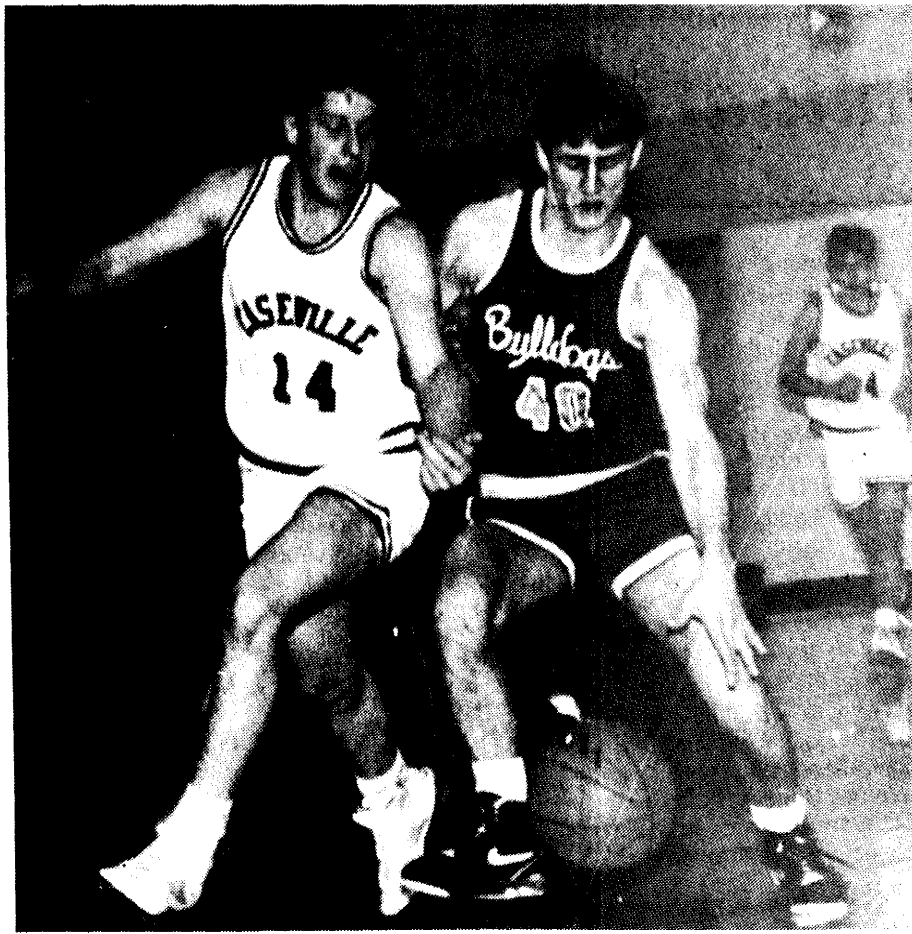

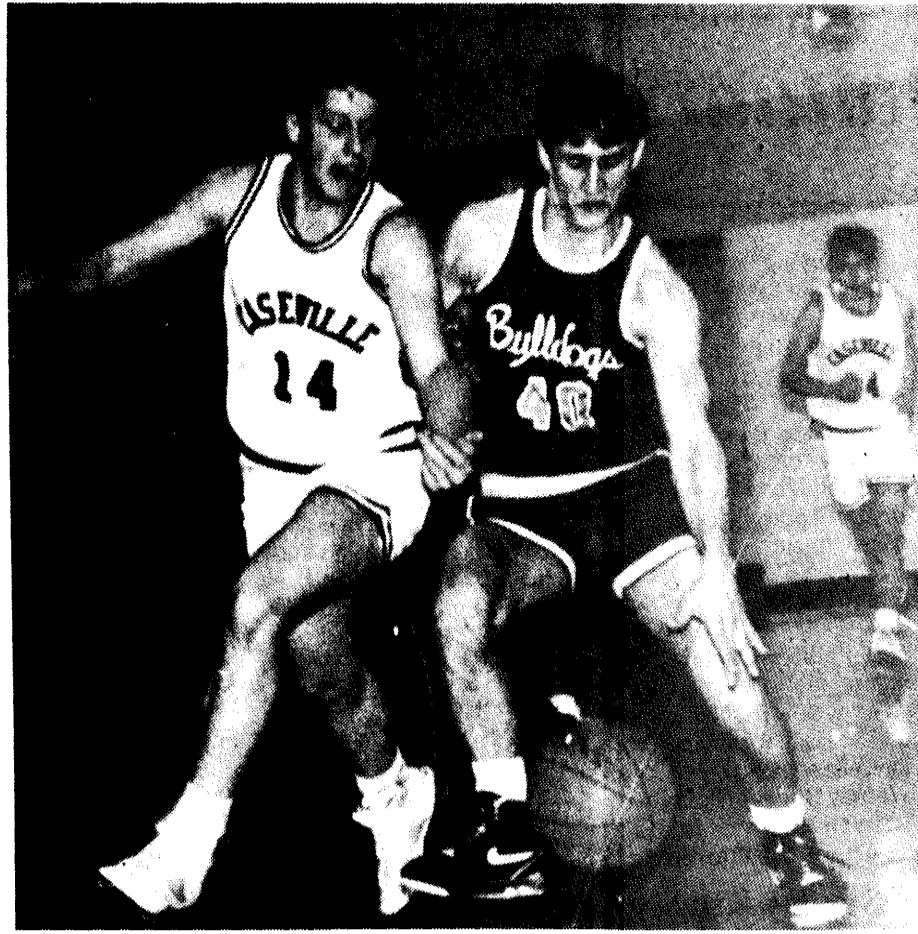

The Bulldogs' next contest is scheduled for Thursday at Kingston.

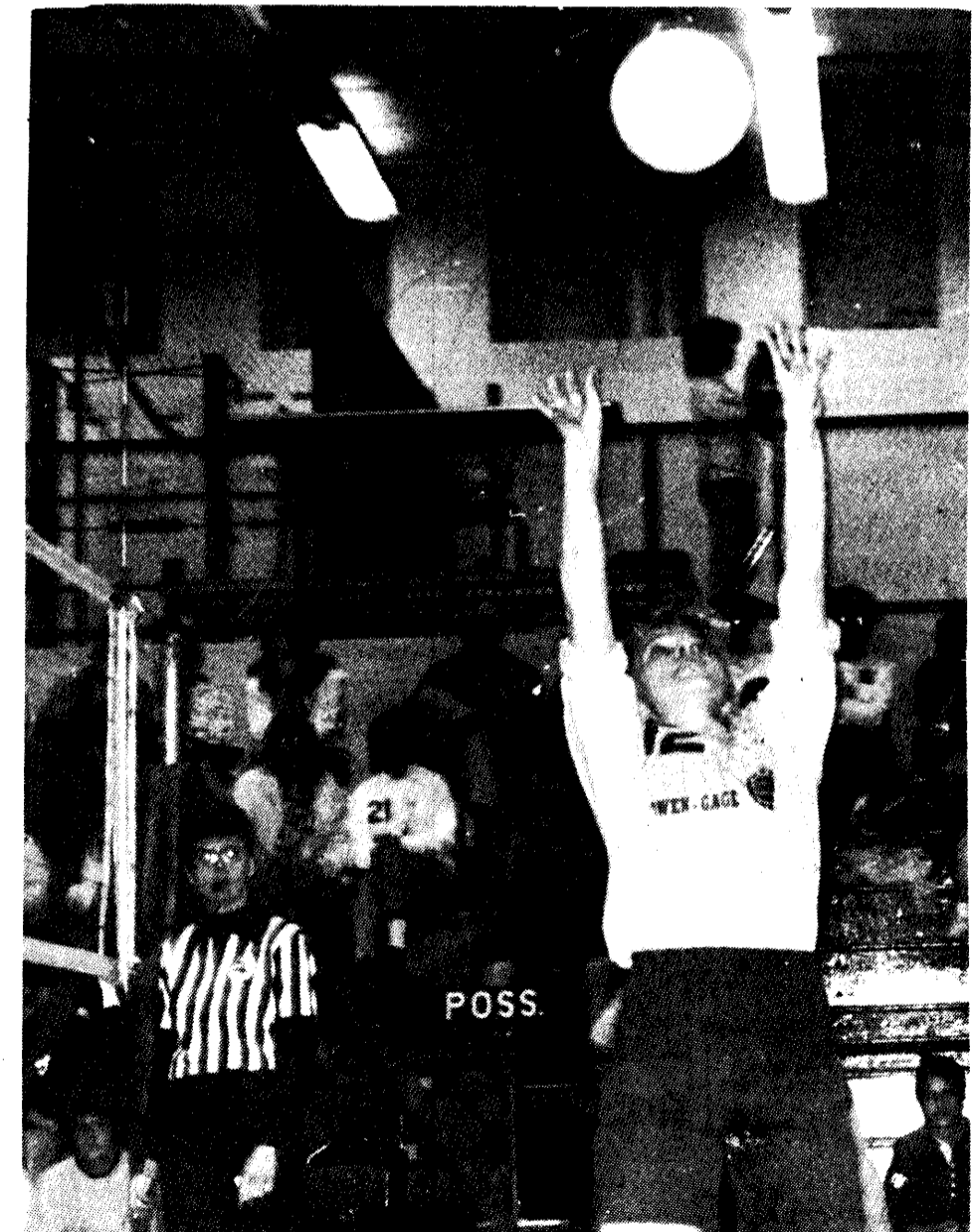

NRC recommends SWAP funding

The Michigan Natural Resources Commission recently recommended that more than \$17 million in grants to 41 applicants, including Tuscola and Huron counties, be appropriated under the Solid Waste Alternative Program (SWAP).

The state grants include a \$50,000 award to Huron County, which will contribute a local match amount of \$16,670; and \$22,500 to Tuscola County, which will match its grant with \$7,500. Both awards are to be used

for resource recovery education.

The grant program is funded by the Protecting Michigan's Future Bond and administered by the Department of Natural Resources.

This is the fourth round of SWAP funding. The grant recommendations, which were selected from among 116 applicants, will now be submitted to the Legislature for approval.

Grant awards will be made in October.

The program, established in 1989, provides grants or loans to local units of government, businesses, non-profit organizations, universities and others for projects that will assist in diverting solid waste away from landfills.

To date, more than \$60 million has been allocated for 235 SWAP projects out of the \$150 million in bond funding available for the program.
