Straw shredder blamed in \$75,000 structure fire

A raging fire fanned by gusty east winds leveled a large barn and milk house at the Harland Lounsbury farm Monday, causing an estimated \$75,000 in damage. Fire fighters from 6 area departments responded to the 2:30 p.m. alarm, combining efforts over the next 6 hours to extinguish the blaze.

The barn, located about a mile and a half west of Cass City at 5612 W. Cass City Rd., was fully engulfed when Elkland Township fire fighters, the first department to respond, arrived. Chief Dick Root said there was no chance of saving the structure.

Root said the blaze was ignited by a spark from a straw shredder, located at the east end of the barn.

According to Lounsbury's wife, newspapers were being chopped for livestock bedding—an experiment Lounsbury started a month ago—when the fire started. An employee who was operating the machine noticed the papers getting warm, she said, adding he went to get more newspapers in a nearby area and when he returned, everything was in flames.

The wind got into the east end and the flames spread quickly, Root said. Fortunately, Lounsbury was able to get his dairy cattle out of the structure with the exception of a pair of calves.

Aside from the barn and milk house, a hay chopper, Oliver Tractor, 1977 Chevrolet pick-up truck and "quite a bit" of hay and straw stored in the barn were all lost, and one silo was badly damaged, according to the fire chief, who noted Lounsbury is insured.

Elkland fire fighters, who arrived at the scene with a pumper, tanker and rescue van, received assistance in the form of a pumper, tanker and manpower from the Caro and Elmwood-

Gagetown fire departments, a tanker and manpower from the Kingston Fire Department, 2 tankers from the Owendale Fire Department and one tanker from the Oliver Township Fire Department.

Elkland Township firemen responded to 3 fire alarms last week. A fire that leveled a storage shed in Evergreen Township Feb. 12 remains under investigation, according to Root, who said fire fighters

were called to the scene at about 10:20 p.m. The shed, located 4 miles east and 3 miles south of Cass City at the Jeannie Wilcox residence, 5206 N. VanDyke Rd., was a total loss, as were its contents,

including 2 push mowers, a riding mower, a rototiller, bikes, tools and other items. Root estimated the loss at \$4,000. Firemen were still at the scene when they were called. Please turn to back page.

Cost set at \$28,000

Okay 5% non-union pay hike

The Cass City School Board Monday night accepted the recommendations of the salary committee and authorized a raise of 5 percent for all non-union personnel at the school for the 1991-92 school year. The raise will cost district taxpayers about \$28,000 in added wages.

Allan Hartwick, one of the members of the committee that reviewed the salaries, said that salaries paid in 12 surrounding districts were reviewed for comparison purposes. Supt. Ken Micklash said that an analysis of these salary schedules reveals that the new wages will place Cass City somewhere in the middle range among area districts.

A complete breakdown of the salaries by position appears elsewhere in this edition.

In addition to setting the salaries, the board heard a complaint from Richard Powell after his son was suspended from school for 8 days following a fracas in the school cafeteria.

Powell's son, Jeff, was suspended for punching another boy in the nose following an argument. According to Powell, and confirmed by Principal Russ Biefer, his son and another youth, not identified, were taunting each other when the youth touched his son on the face.

Several minutes later, Powell seated across from

the youth reached over and punched him in the nose.

Biefer was called and ordered Powell to clean up the mess in the cafeteria. He started to do so and was later given a pair of gloves because there were blood spots and a small puddle on the floor. Cleaning up blood without gloves is against the school regulations. The boy's father told the board that he was in contact with the health department and wanted to see what action the board would take.

In the discussion it was revealed that Biefer had informed Richard Powell that if he came in the next morning the suspension would be lifted. He refused.

Powell asked the board to rescind the 6 points his son was awarded for fighting because the other boy involved received none.

Discussion by the board revealed that one of the key points was that the youth hit his opponent with a closed fist. That's simply not allowed, the school principal said, while pushing, showing, pinching and similar activities are handled with warnings.

Biefer said that Jeff Powell's record was good before the fight and that he had only a few tardys on his record this year.

Co-citizens, co-jr. citizens honored Saturday

Narrowing the list of candidates for Cass City's Citizen of the Year and Junior Citizen of the Year apparently was more difficult than usual this year. For the first time ever, the chamber selected 2 recipients in both categories.

All 4 persons were honored during the chamber's annual dinner/dance banquet Saturday evening at the Colony House. Despite stormy weather, the event drew some 150 persons.

Named as Co-Citizens of the Year were Arlan Hartwick and Wayne Dillon. Both men were introduced by Ken Jensen, last year's recipient.

Jensen referred to Hartwick as a veteran contributor to the village who was particularly active during the 1950s and 60s, when the foundation for growth and prosperity in Cass City was firmly established.

A 1928 graduate of Cass City High School, Hartwick started in business in 1930. He later moved from the village, but returned to Cass City in 1942, purchased an existing grocery store on Main Street and operated it successfully for the next 30 years.

He opened at 7 a.m. each morning to accommodate those who had to go to work early or who were coming home from working third shift, Jensen said, adding, "He was always willing to deliver groceries to the elderly or the invalid."

This concern for others continued into retirement as he still visits shut-ins and nursing home patients, and assists others who need a hand.

Hartwick has served the community in a variety of other ways, including 8 years on the Village Council and 20 years on the Zoning Board of Appeals. He was an early member of the Cass City Chamber of Commerce and an original investor in the Cass City Industrial Development Corporation.

Hartwick also served on the Elkland Township Board of Review for 18 years and was a member of the Tuscola County Social Services Board for 15 years. A Gavel Club and Cass City Historical Society member and long-time United Way volunteer, he

also led the Cass City Hub Investment Club for many years, and served in the Lutheran Church for 25 years as treasurer.

He is the father of 3 children, Kathy, Kay and Jack, and has 12 grandchildren and 8 great-grandchildren. Turning to the other recipient, Jensen described Dillon, a high school guidance counselor, as an "unsung hero" whose main contributions to the community have come informally, one on one, behind the scenes.

Jensen read a quote from Joyce Hampshire that stated, in part, "He's outgoing and responsive to any age group, but still 'tells it like it is.' His ready 'listening ear' is one of our school's most cherished possessions. I once asked him the secret of his popularity — his reply, 'Just let them know you care'."

A part-time farmer, Dillon has arranged employment for, counseled and advised countless young people as well as working on fund raisers for many student groups, chaperoning dances and organizing dozens of activities in the community.

He has been active in both the Cass City Education Association and the Tuscola County Guidance Counselors Association. A former Gavel Club

member and current Lions Club member, Dillon is a United Fund worker and Christmas display and track project volunteer, Cass City Booster Club supporter and a coach for minor, little and pony leagues. He also is an active member in his church.

Dillon and his wife, Sherry, have 2 sons, Jeff and Scott.

Jane Marker and Steve Tuckey were named the Co-Junior Citizens of the Year. Selected from a field of 10 Cass City High seniors, both were introduced by John Cooper, a member of the chamber Board of Directors.

Marker, the daughter of Richard and Mary Marker, has been a Student Council representative for 3 years, serving as vice president and secretary in her sophomore and senior years.

A member of the National Honor Society, she attended Rotary Camp and has been active in the Foreign Language, Girls Varsity and Ski clubs. The 1990 Homecoming Queen also has volunteered for Toys For Tots and attending Michigan State has helped hand out food packages to the poor during Christmas.

Marker also has been involved in athletics as a member of the volleyball, track and basketball teams. Her future plans include

attending Michigan State University, where she'll study political science or psychology.

Tuckey, the son of Bob and Barb Tuckey, has been a National Honor Society member for 2 years. He also has been active in Student Council and the Foreign Language Club, and has been a member of the 4-H Livestock Club for 8 years.

Chosen an Outstanding Biology Student, his other honors including having attended Boys State and Rotary Camp. An active member of the Salem United Methodist Church, Tuckey has volunteered his time to help set up the Story Time Display and helped with the community track project. He also is a blood drive worker and donor.

Tuckey also is a 4-year member of the the football, basketball and track teams and one-year member of the cross country squad, and has earned 8 athletic letters during his high school career. His future plans include attending Michigan State University, where he plans to major in engineering.

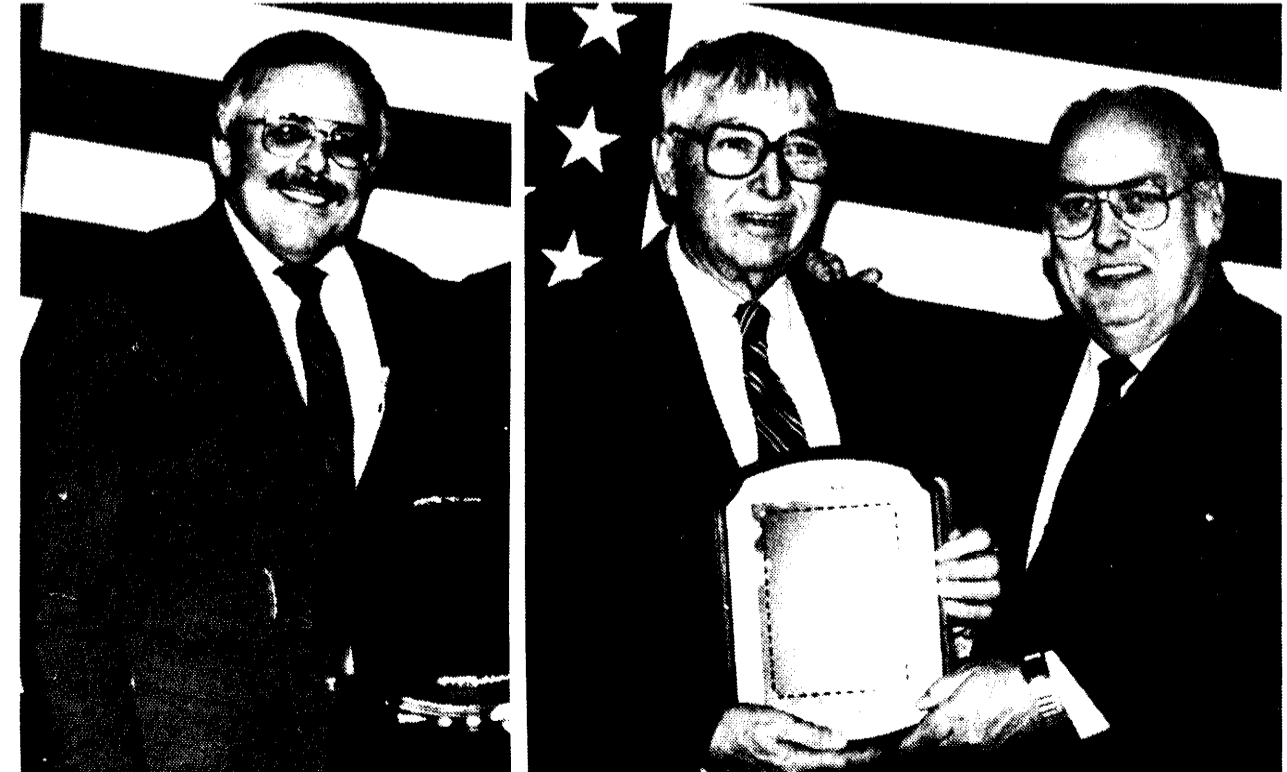

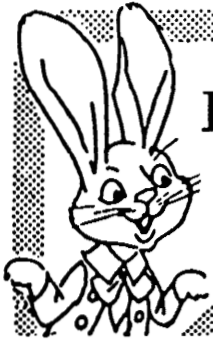

Rabbit Tracks

Unidentified flying objects were sighted by at least 3 reputable Cass City residents in the early evening Thursday, Feb. 7. The 3 who saw several strange lights descending are Roy Tuckey, Charles Tuckey and Kenneth Micklash.

According to Roy Tuckey who was in his yard at the time several objects that looked something like a light fashioned to a parachute came floating down and then suddenly all disappeared together.

One of the more unusual ethnic restaurants is Busia's in Gaylord. It offers a Polish menu. It's a moderately priced restaurant (we spent \$19.50 for 2) that moved from a small building up town to a large building on old US-27.

In a visit Saturday, the dishes we ordered were kielbasa and sauerkraut and boiled dinner.

The entrees were good and the desserts (bread pudding and raspberry cake) were excellent. The salad bar only so-so.

Busia's is one of those places where you go for something different and the menu includes a dozen or more Polish dishes.

A memento of by-gone days was uncovered during repair of basement window wells at Old Wood Pharmacy.

In a corner of one of the basement rooms a crude shower stall was uncovered with a portion of an unused Lifebuoy soap bar tucked away on a rafter.

Warren Wood, who was Tom Proctor's predecessor at Old Wood, reported that the shower was used by the Cass City High School boys' basketball team which held practice and games in what is now the Cass City Cultural Center.

On one of my trips a couple of buddies took a bump, received the free tickets, took a later flight and arrived home just one hour after I did.

About the best bargain that has come my way has been a flight to Atlantic

City. The flight was cheap...we won't talk about the cost after arrival.

One flight that I can recall was a good news, bad news affair. The bad news was that because of trouble the airline opened the bar to free booze. That's bad? Yes, because my stomach was a little queasy and I just couldn't hack any of the premium-brand stuff that was being poured out like water.

The real good news of that whole affair is that the reason we returned to Chicago after about a half hour in the air is that one engine quit, but the rest didn't. It should be pointed out that by the time we took off again about half the passengers didn't care one way or another.

Ghost tickets

The news about Detroit, as reported in other cities, isn't all bad. Last week, a headline in the Lansing State Journal blared: "Ghostwriters are hanging around those Detroit meters again."

Hey, that's nothing compared to an indicted police chief, a cheating congresswoman and a mayor running scared from war terrorists. It's almost comforting to see Detroit's image stained by nothing more alarming than a lousy little parking ticket scam.

Lansing area readers couldn't have been too surprised. Last April, another State Journal headline said: "Stubborn Portland (Michigan) couple beat Detroit's ghost-car ticket." That report concerned a couple who sent our Municipal Parking Department photocopies of gas receipts proving their vehicle was in the state of Wyoming when the department said it was illegally parked in Detroit. Our bureaucratic bozos rejected the evidence and insisted a \$30 fine be paid to avoid a court battle and possible loss of driver's license. The bozos relented only after the couple brandished the name of the Detroit columnist who first put Detroit's ghost tickets on the map.

Young's contribution is perhaps the most astonishing. The mayor is forever cursing the news media, national and local, for trampling on Detroit's image. But, soon after the Persian Gulf War began, Young made Detroit the only city in the United States to seek National Guard protection against war terrorists. Gov. John Engler quickly rejected the incredibly premature request, but not before Young undoubtedly-scared away some potential tourists, residents and business.

LOAN WASN'T A SMART MOVE

Running a close second in the astonishment race is Collins, who has publicly claimed to be smart enough to belong to Mensa, the exclusive international club for extraordinarily intelligent people. But Collins, a veteran campaigner for local, state and national offices, claimed she wasn't smart enough to know she was doing anything wrong when, during her recent congressional campaign, she called a \$75,000 bank loan a personal loan and welcomed co-signers plainly prohibited by campaign regulations. Mensa said long ago it never heard of Collins, but now a lot of non-Detroiters have, and are

probably not eager to move into her district.

As for Hart, accused of stealing \$1.3 million, much national publicity has resulted from the charge that some stolen police cash was used to pay the rent for a California home occupied by one of his daughters and her family. Not as widely known is the fact that another Hart daughter lives in a Detroit co-op apartment whose owner of record is reportedly Hart. I wouldn't mention it except I live in the same apartment building.

According to Lansing columnist Schneider, the executive director of the Detroit Parking Violation Bureau, Ronald Ruffin, denied a ticket scam. Ruffin blamed ghost tickets on administrative mistakes, such as poor penmanship, or Lansing cars being driven to Detroit without the owners' knowledge.

"I feel strongly about the integrity of this department. I'm not going to roll over on this issue," Ruffin said.

Ruffin shouldn't roll, he should brag. Compared to Hart, Collins and Young, ghost tickets give Detroit a good name.

WHAT EVIL LURKS IN MOTOWN?

Under last week's headline, after naming 2 more Lansing area residents ticketed by Detroit for illegally parking where they never parked, State Journal columnist John Schneider wrote: "...it's kind of an ongoing situation comedy — Phantom Cars of the Motor City. Ten or 15 times a year I hear from Lansing area people baffled by notices of parking violations supposedly committed in Detroit on days when they were nowhere near Detroit."

But so what? As a loyal Detroit resident, I'm almost proud of the part I've played in insinuating to out-towners that they have nothing to fear from Detroit except unfair parking tickets. That sounds like favorable chamber-of-commerce-type advertising when contrasted to the national publicity recently generated for Detroit by former Chief William Hart, Congresswoman Barbara-Rose Collins and Mayor Coleman Young.

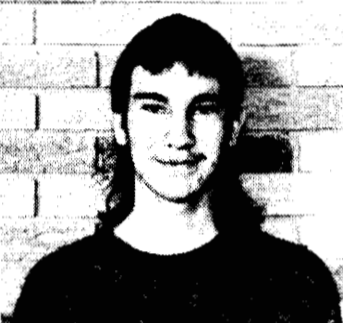

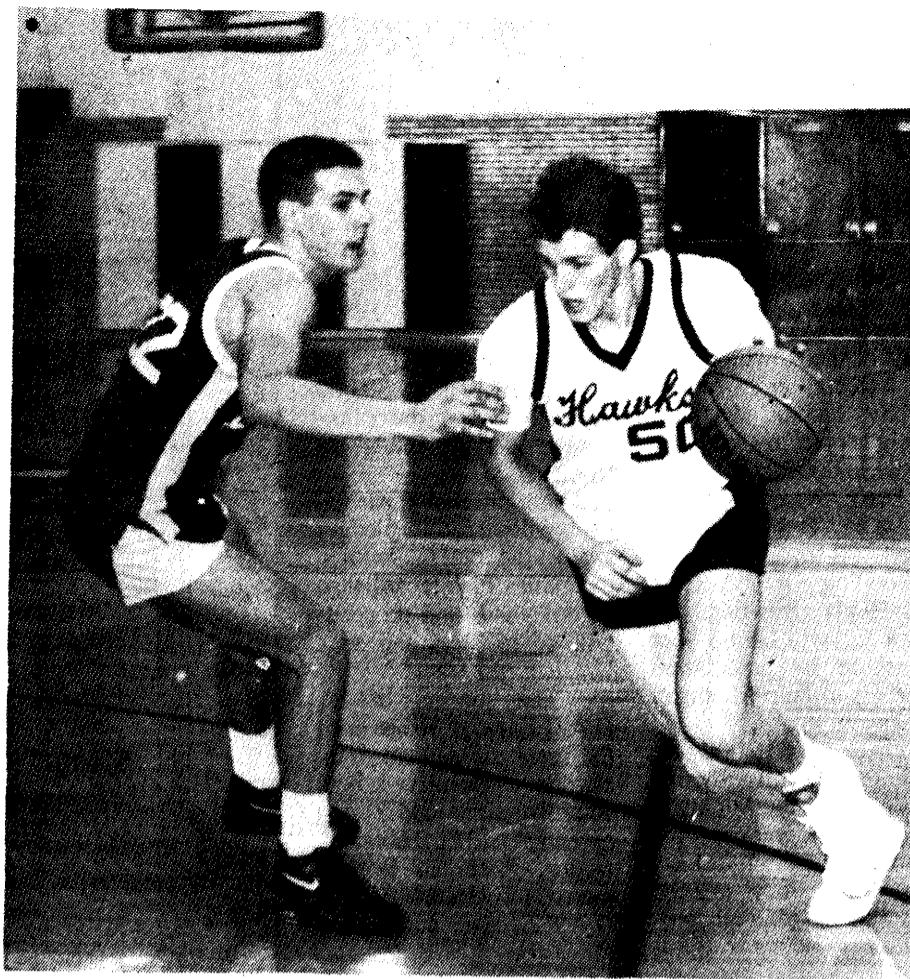

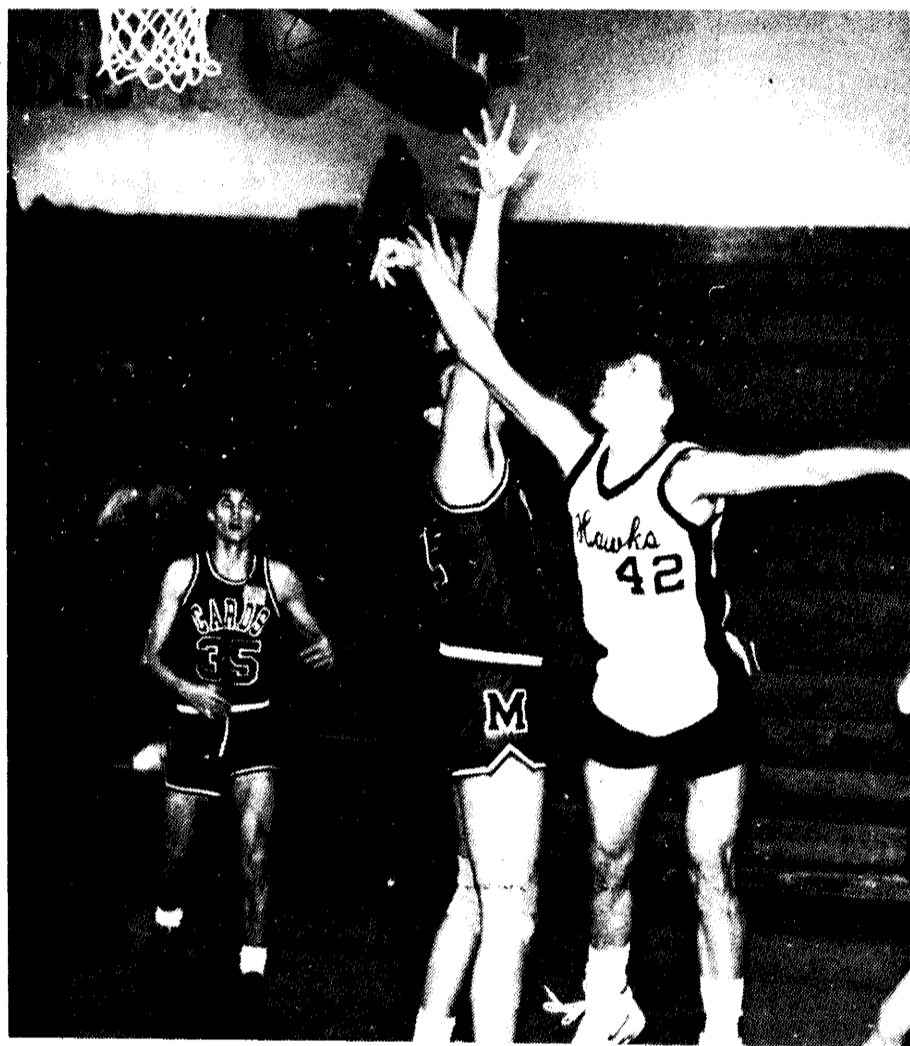

Coach Judy Campbell ex-

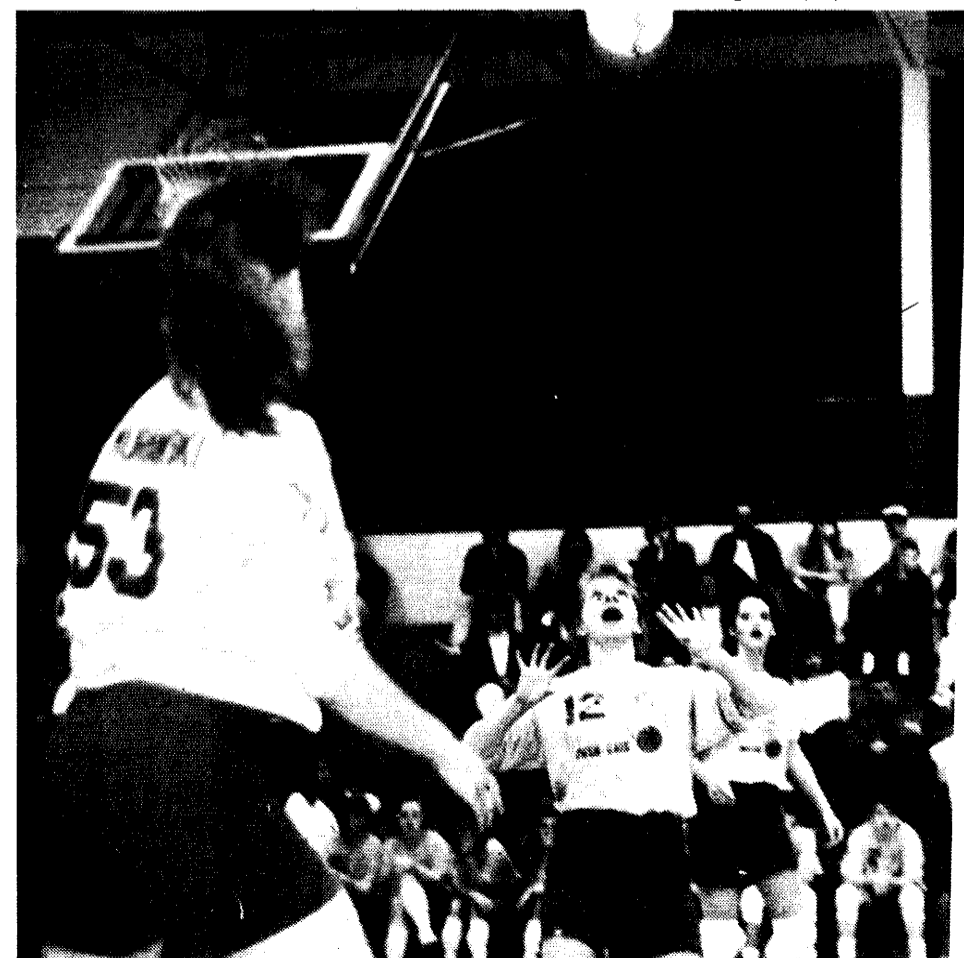
pressed concern about her team's motivation after the loss. "They're practicing hard, but playing without much heart."

Fund-raising project for D.A.R.E. slated

Owners of 200 bowling centers, including the Charmont in Cass City and the Brentwood in Caro, and officials of the Bowling Centers Association of Michigan have announced a fund-raising project to earn more than \$250,000 for the Michigan Drug Abuse Resistance Education (D.A.R.E.) program.

In both programs, participants will secure pin pledges against the total pins scored in 3 games. Pledges will then be collected, and proceeds will go to local and state D.A.R.E. programs.

"The success of the D.A.R.E. program has been the result of dedicated instructors, supportive school administrators, and caring parents," said Lt. Thomas J. Miller, Michigan Department of State Police, D.A.R.E. state administrator.

"Our success also is because of the support and enthusiasm from organizations like the Bowling Centers Association of Michigan. With their resources and commitment, projects like 'Bowling for D.A.R.E.' and 'Kids Bowling for D.A.R.E.' are made possible."
