Protests stall school safety road project

Cass City's 1991 road improvement plans hit a snag Monday night, when residents' protests prompted the Village Council to shelve one of 2 projects, at least temporarily.

The protests, heard during a 20-minute special assessment hearing, were aimed primarily at planned improvements to Rose Street. Plans call for the street to be resurfaced and curb and gutter installed from Oak Street to Ale Street. The project cost is estimated at \$64,400, including the village's share (\$4,000) for a new sidewalk in front of Campbell Elementary

School. For their part, the 9 residents whose properties abut Rose Street would be expected to pay for the curb and gutter, estimated at \$9 per foot.

For 8 of the 9 residents, that totals nearly \$900 each, with the remaining resident facing a bill of more than \$1,150.

Most of the property owners were represented at the meeting, and most indicated they aren't happy with the prospect of paying for the improvement.

PERMIT OKAYED

Turning to old business, the council approved an agreement endorsing Tom Meismer's request for an Entertainment Permit from the Michigan Liquor Control Commission.

Meismer and his wife are the owners of Gilligan's and the Cast-T-Way Inn.

The agreement, drafted following a meeting between the council's Rules Committee and the Meismers, restricts the entertainment allowed to monologues, dialogues, still slides and contests.

Specifically prohibited are '. . . any topless entertainment, exotic dancers or gogo dancers, lingerie fashion shows, wet tee shirt contests and/or other similar type entertainment..."

The agreement also states the owners will request that the permit be revoked in the event of foreclosure, lease or sale of the premises, or if the council requests the same without cause.

FOUNDATIONS

In other business during the 40-minute monthly session, the council heard a brief presentation on establishing a community foundation. In a nutshell, a community

foundation is a pool of charitable funds donated and invested for a community's future, according to guest speaker Kathy Agard, a representative of the Council of Michigan Foundations.

She noted such foundations are a channel for private giving for the public good, with the interest earned from various gifts used to make grants for any number of charitable pur-

Agard, who pointed out a substantial investment is needed to make a commu-

Also Monday, the council:

 Approved a Budget and Finance Committee recommendation to retain Yeo & Yeo, P.C., Marlette, as the village's auditor. The firm will handle the village's 1991 audit at a cost not to exceed \$7,200, which is comparable to the 1990 cost. village Manager Lou S. LaPonsie said.

 Approved the purchase of a truck and blade at a cost of \$43,626. The equipment, which includes a dump box and screen cover, and an undercarriage blade and plow hook-up, will replace a 20-year-old truck.

 Heard comments from Dan Ulfig, who urged action on the proposed construction of a sidewalk on the east side of Ale Street, from Church Street north to Campbell Elementary School.

The project cost is estimated at \$8,000 to \$10,000.







The other day the discussion at the coffee table was about when the switch to Daylight Savings time occurs. The last of April, the first week in May were tossed out, neither correct.

We spring forward on the first Sunday in April, which is April 7 this year. The confusion is because of the several hanges in effective dates that have occurred since time switching started.

The GTE booklet, "2001 Imagine the Possibilities" forecasts that "More than a dozen nations will have nuclear weapons at their disposal, including China, France, Israel, Pakistan, Libya, Iraq, Iran, Brazil and Taiwan."

You can cross Iraq from the list. You still can't feel too comfortable with some of the countries left if the prediction oves accurate.

If form is followed it will of course pour more fuel on the fire of resentment that many public school officials feel because of a perceived advantage that private schools enjoy when recruiting talent.

The campaign by Thumb coaches received a boost when Wayne Dillon was sent a copy of a survey taken by Mid-Peninsula Conference officials in the Upper Peninsula.

Their concerns mirror those expressed by Thumb coaches who are awaiting reaction to a survey sent to all schools in the state.

According to Marty Cleven, executive secretary of Mid-Peninsula, the information was presented to John E. Roberts, head honcho of the MHSAA, with the request that it be considered by the full council last Saturday. That was refused. It's apparent that Roberts had this information when he attended a meeting of school representatives in Cass City to discuss the problem, but it

was never mentioned. That survey was sent to 712 MHSAA schools and a total of 432 were returned, or 60.8 percent.

The low rate of return makes it harder to say with certainty if there is a sizeable majority out there which wants to upset the apple cart.

Better than 92 percent of the schools replying felt that private schools have an advantage over public schools in athletic competition, but there was no such unanimity about what to do about it.

The questionnaire presented 4 options to the schools about possible solutions and asked them to rank each 0-5 with 5 being the most highly preferred pol-

The choices were: Kick private schools out of MHSAA state tournaments; separate MHSAA tournaments for private schools; boost private schools up one class, and add 10 percent to private schools' official enrollments.

The top choice among the schools with a rank of 3.35 out of a possible 5 was to boost private schools up a

But there was plenty of support for the other options, too, with the exception of kicking them out of the MHSAA tourneys en-

And that illustrates the problem in a nut shell. Nearly everyone agrees there is a problem, but few agree on the solution.

Among the comments received from the Mid-Peninsula Conference was this one that sums it all up.

The Longhorn World Championship Rodeo made its annual Detroit area stop over the weekend, but for the first time in many years, my cousin Al didn't attend. Instead, he drove north to the Houghton Lake area, hoping to see snowmobilers run over mallard ducks. Among other rodeo pleas-

ures, Al missed the calfroping. That's when a baby cow, running about 25 m.p.h., is jerked to a sudden halt by a rope tied around its neck. Then a cowboy grabs the calf around the neck and slams it into the ground. This is done in the name of macho sport, for the profit of the cowboy and the rodeo promoter, and for the pleasure of a yahooing audience, not to make veal cutlets.

A CASE OF **ANIMAL CRUELTY**

Sometimes a two-cowboy team assaults a steer. One cowboy is called the heeler and his job is to lasso the 2 rear heels of a galloping steer while his partner lassoes the head. The partner is called a header. Isn't that a clever use of words? And you probably thought rodeo cowboys weren't smart enough to do anything except smoke Marlboros.

read about one rodeo where the heeler had bad luck and didn't win a cash prize. His header did a good job lassoing the steer's head, but the heeler managed to rope only one of the steer's hind heels. Instead of immediately hitting the dirt, for a few seconds the steer looked like a competitor in a 3legged race which, while sufficiently cruel to the steer, isn't a regular rodeo event because real cowboys don't go to office picnics.

Spanish visitor adjusts to area

America could probably be summed up in a single word--adjustment.

The wide open space sur-rounding the Decker area home she shares with the Phil and Barb Rockwell family, for example, is a far cry from the urban environment she's used to in her native Spain.

And a daily ritual of going out with friends to a show or to socialize at a bar has been replaced with a quieter social schedule.

On top of that, the language spoken by her peers at first bore little resemblance to the English she's studied for the past 4 or 5 years.

Getting used to life in Cass City has presented a number of contrasts in culture.

But that's okay, according to the quiet-spoken 18-yearold, who says her aim in coming here was to learn about another way of life and different customs and people.

Luisana arrived in Cass City early last September through the Pacific Intercultural Exchange Program and will spend a total of 10 months with the Rockwells, her host family.

So far, the experience has been a good one, she recently remarked, adding, "It's quite different, but it wasn't that hard" to get used

The petite, dark haired teen recalled that prior to arriving in America, her impressions and those of her friends were based on what they had seen in movies. She wasn't expecting to find so many little cities.

She noted that her home, Santander, located in northern Spain, is much larger and more heavily populated than Cass City.

Although many people drive cars in her city, many others walk in the streets, she said. "We have problems to park, so a lot of people walk and take

The house she shares there with her parents and twin sister also is different. Luisana described her home as a 4-story, vertical structure night, so it's not like you go built adjacent to many oth-

Turning to school, Luisana biggest challenge here at

Students in Spain are required to learn a second language, typically English, and Luisana has a good command of the language. In fact, she and her sister enjoy speaking it around their parents, who don't understand English.

However, understanding slang and dealing with so many words that have more than one meaning proved difficult here.

"At first it was kind of hard. They (students) couldn't understand anything I said, and I couldn't understand them.'

Luisana said the school schedule here is also a change from home, but the subjects are about the same. In Spain, teachers, rather

than students, move from classroom to classroom, she said. "We start at 9 in the morning, then we get a halfhour break from 11 to 11:30, then we get out of school at 1:30, then we go to eat for 2 hours, then we go back at 3:30 to 5:30," she continued.

SEPARATE

At meals, Luisana said she's used to 3 separate courses. The first plate usually features beans and vegetables, the second, meat or fish, and then dessert and

After school, teens in Spain are a lot like teens in Amer-

"We go out with friends, and homework if we feel like doing it," she remarked, grinning.

Unlike their counterparts in America, however, teens in Spain typically gather at bars to socialize.

In Spain there is no drinking age limit, but that doesn't mean the teens head for the bars to get smashed every night, Luisana said.

"You don't go there to drink; you go there to spend time with friends," she added. "We can do it every

teens get involved with at

this age, according to Luisana, who noted she and her indicated language was her friends aren't yet interested in getting serious about relationships with one person.

WANT FREEDOM

"We want to be free now, then later on, like at 20 or 23, we will find someone," she

While Luisana will have many stories to tell her friends when she returns to Spain, few will equal the excitement of being in America during a time of

After war broke out, she recalled, "The TVs were working in the school all

day.
"Everybody in school is
"Mostly talking about war. Mostly everybody has a friend there," she said. "I'm worried about the war like everybody else."

When Luisana does return home, her plans include attending a university. She hasn't decided for sure on a career—becoming a police officer or reporter are possibilities—but said she doesn't want to sit at a desk all day.

For now, however, Luisana indicated she's looking forward to spending the summer with her host family.

Of course, she misses her family and friends in Spain, but commented she's enjoying her exchange experience, and getting out of it period honor roll: what she'd hoped she would. "I'm learning English, I've got a whole bunch of friends and I've got a new family," she added.

A 2-week pilot program titled "A World in Motion" concluded Monday in the Cass City school system with raves from all involved parties.

Offered to most schools in North America, Cass City was the only school in the tri-county area to participate in the cooperative learning setting.

"A World in Motion" is a science enhancement program designed to stimulate the minds of youths in 4th, 5th and 6th grades throughout the country in the fields of math and science, channeled toward careers in engineering.

Sponsored by the Society of Automotive Engineers, students and teachers were assisted by engineers from Cass City's Walbro Corporation, who gave hands-on discovery of science principles.

Theories of physics were taught and then applied to specific projects in each singled out classroom.

Participating in the project were Mrs. Linda Gray's 4th graders, who built skimmer sailboats, Mrs. Jennifer Green's 5th graders, who built derby cars, and Doug Hall's 6th grade class, who

constructed can crushers. All the projects were constructed of basic materials such as milk cartons, tin foil and the likes. The students competed for honors at the end of the 2-week period.

Walbro Corporation offered engineers Ken Cotton, John Niebrzydoski, Dan Hittler, Tom Hoover and Dan Alsobrooks to assist with the projects.

Students learned about

gravity, friction, weights and balances, value of drawings, among other factors to help promote science liter-

Said Hittler, "The benefits of pursuing future projects is obvious. The enthusiasm of both teachers and students convinced us of this.

Added Superintendent of Schools Ken Micklash, The potential gains from a blend of education and pro-

fessionals working together for excellence in our school system is just one more positive move in our commu-

Further, Mrs. Gray added that in the year 2000 the work force will be in need of nearly 1/4 million engi-
