Big expense to village

Getting the lead out promises to be costly

New, tougher standards for lead in drinking water, handed down recently by the Environmental Protection Agency, have been met with little comment from municipal officials still trying to interpret the new mandate.

Once they understand the ruling, however, the quiet will turn into a storm of protest, a Michigan Municipal League official predicts.

Don Stypula, environmental affairs advisor for the municipal league, an association of some 520 Michigan cities and villages, including Cass City, says the EPA's new guidelines spell big expense for municipalities and, subsequently, their citizens.

The new standard, which affects municipal water systems in communities of all sizes, reduces the level of lead considered safe in drinking water from 50 parts per billion to 15 parts per billion.

Lead, a naturally occurring element, leaches into potable water supplies from lead piping and lead-based solders and fluxes used to join copper piping, according to health officials.

Older homes are more likely to have a problem with lead levels. Lead solder was commonly used in plumbing until 1986, when lead piping and lead-based solder were banned from use in residential and public much lead can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women. In order to arrive at EPA's

One chance in 40 Try again for oil in Novesta

A Texas-based firm's search for oil in Novesta Township was expected to

be wrapped up Sunday.

Drilling of an exploration well located 3 miles south and about a half mile west of Cass City, along the old Grand Trunk Railroad bed just south of DeLong Road, has been underway since early last week.

has been the same—finding oil deposits believed to be lying about 2,500 feet underground, according to Jack Nowland, a wellsite geologist with Source Consulting, Traverse City. Source Consulting, as well

as Bigard Drillers, Mt. Pleasant, are contractors involved in the estimated \$150,000 drilling effort. Nowland said the depth in

the well being drilled last week would reach about 4,000 feet to what is known as a Bois Blanc formation. However, he noted, the drillers' target area was only about 2,550 feet down, where Dundee limestone, an oil producing rock formation, is located.

Michigan has a number of good Dundee fields, including the well-known Oil City field between Midland and Mt. Pleasant, first drilled in the late 1920s. But Nowland pointed out that doesn't guarantee success in Novesta Township.

More recently, Marathon Oil Co. spent some \$1.5 million and drilled nearly 10,000 feet down in search of petroleum at a site located December 1989 and was abandoned weeks later. Despite the failures, Nowland said geologic and seismic studies indicate it's

likely the petroleum is there.

The research has included the use of small explosive charges to bounce sound waves off the various rock formations. The waves are then measured, Nowland

said, adding the object is to find abnormalities in the readings, indicating the possibility of oil.

Whether or not those tests were proven with a payload of petroleum last week won't be released publicly for several days, until the company files its final project report with the Department of Natural Resources.

Charge youth in accidental shooting

A Cass City man has been charged with involuntary manslaughter in connection with the accidental shooting death of his younger brother last December.

James W. Finkbeiner, 20, 4137 Maple St., was arraigned last Wednesday. He also faces a felony firearm charge in connection with the shooting, which claimed the life of Clark Finkbeiner, 14, Cass City.

A preliminary examination in the case was to have been held Tuesday in Tuscola County District Court. Bond has been set at \$10,000.

The accident occurred at about 2:20 p.m. Dec. 27 at the Finkbeiners' Maple Street residence. Police reported that prior to the shooting, 4 or 5 persons were passing around a 9-millimeter handgun at the home, examining, handling and loading and unloading the weapon.

Police said that at some point, James Finkbeiner pointed the weapon at the victim, thinking it was unloaded, and pulled the trig-







economic development. Certainly the DNR could improve its decision making and provide answers more quickly than it sometimes

Perhaps that's part of the reason that politicians, headed by Tom Alley, a Democrat, are pushing to take away environmental control from the DNR and leave it responsible for only hunting, fishing and recrea-

Alley maintains that the separation would make the department more accountable and improve lines of communication.

Which sounds like what it is, a politician making soothing sounds but not really saying anything. Tell us how, in the severe economic conditions today when the state already can't balance its budget, this new division is going to find the people to enforce the environmental laws the way the DNR does

today. You don't have to be a senior citizen to remember how it was before or know now how we are still paying for the pollution that ran unchecked for so many

We all still pay for the contamination in our Great Lakes which makes it impossible to eat salmon and trout more than occasionally because of the risk of cancer.

The Love Canal episode, and the stream near Detroit where a boy was scarred by

the chemicals left behind by industry when he fell in the mud, come to mind quickly.

The story in the Bay City Times said that Alley told a group that one commissioner told him that be believed between \$12 to \$18 million was siphoned off from hunting and fishing money for use for environmental programs.

There's no way of assessing if that's true or not, of course, but even if it is, to say that money spent on environmental concerns can be divorced from the needs of hunters and fishermen is ludicrous.

Money spent to remove pollution from our lakes, streams and woods will have more long-range benefits to the sportsmen than any temporary fixes that come from planting a few pheasants or

The DNR is involved with the environment everyday with its work with fish. game and recreation. They go together like ham and

Putting the environ-mental authority and policy setting in the hands of the Natural Resource Commission would effectively kill the progress that has been made and perhaps make it impossible to ever eat a Lake Trout with complete safety.

One statement that Alley made that we agree with is that everyone has to start paying more attention.

If they do, the politicians will leave well enough alone and forget about this bad idea that will harm both environmentalists sportsmen.

A little balance

Last Saturday around 11 p.m., while waiting for his Lafayette bus to leave the Cadillac Square station in downtown Detroit, Jim Elkin witnessed the terrible beating of a young man, probably a teenager.

Several young men were involved in the fight, which wasn't racist. All the participants were black, which is irrelevant to the dismaying violence. Ordinarily I wouldn't mention race, except, in this case, it's something you need to know to understand why I was initially reluctant to write about what Elkin saw.

Three days later, middleaged Elkin was still shook. He said the experience reminded him of the infamous Kitty Genovese case in New York. Many people nearby knew Genovese was being attacked, but no one came to her aid, and she was killed. No one on Elkin's bus, or in the station, tried to help the young man who was being kicked while lying helpless on the sidewalk.

Elkin also was reminded of the ubiquitous videotape of those Los Angeles cops brutally and inexplicably beating a suspected traffic offender who offered no resistance. Except there were no police anywhere near the bus station, which bothered Elkin.

"Cadillac Square would be a good place for a mini-station," he said, especially in warm weather when Hart Plaza events and Greektown lure so many people downtown. It seems like all the cops are on Jefferson, doing nothing about auto gridlock, or in Greektown.

The Cadillac beating might have looked worse than it was; Elkin hopes so. His bus pulled out before he could witness the outcome. He cared enough to check the next day at police headquarters and hospitals. There were no reports of near-fatal beatings.

So why write about it? Why contribute to the most prevalent unfair racial stereotype—that all young black men are dangerous toughs? That a black youth can't be waiting for his mother in a Birmingham parking garage; he must be there to steal cars, so point a gun at him.

FINDING ELUSIVE BALANCE

You read about these young men in the newspaper and shy away from them on the street. The news articles usually don't say the street brawlers are black, but you know it, because the great majority of Detroit residents, young and old, are black, right?

Right. And the great majority are decent law-abiding citizens, the same as the great majority of white citizens. That fact is so obvious that I cringe to state it. It feels gratuitous and condescending. But sometimes the obvious should be stressed, to balance wrongheaded perceptions shaped by unbalanced news reports.

My wife and I also had an interesting experience last Elkin's. After greatly enjoying the Detroit Symphony Orchestra at Orchestra Hall (excuse the digression, but I don't care if conductor against miserable odds. Neeme Jarvi makes almost

as much as a Tigers utility infielder; pay him whatever it takes to keep him, double ticket prices and forget tax subsidies), we moved up Woodward a few steps to the Gnome Restaurant for similar good music, except jazz-

Harold McKinney was at the piano, with brother Ray on bass. The McKinneys have long furnished one of the nicest sounds heard in Detroit or anywhere else. When I hear about a local organization paying thousands to bring in famous Bobby Short from New York, I wonder why. Harold plays piano and sings like Short, only better.

On this evening there were 2 added starters. Harold, a music teacher as well as entertainer, introduced them as "my nephew and adopted nephew." One nephew played the piano, and the other blew trumpet. Oh man. They were marvel-

They did their uncle proud. They performed and behaved exactly the way you'd love to see your son behave.

They are 15 and black. They are more typical of Detroit youngsters than those brawlers in Cadillac Square. They just don't cause the kind of trouble that weekend, but nothing like gets mentioned in the newspaper.

The good Detroit kids are out there, thousands of them, sometimes prevailing Obviously.



Some quit to start a family. Others quit to help their families. Still others quit to support themselves.

With each person comes a unique story - one of being overwhelmed, sidetracked or discouraged. Whatever the situation, a common factor exists; they never thought they would finish high school. Until now.

About 14 area residents were to graduate from Cass City's Community Education program this month. The 13th annual commencement ceremony was Tuesday at 8 p.m. at the high school.

Gloria Bucholz, of Deford, is this year's recipient of a full-ride scholarship to Jordan College for an associate's degree.

"I was in between jobs when I decided to go back to school," said 43-year-old Bucholz. "I was surprised about winning the scholarship. I only thought I had a chance at it like everyone

Receiving her high school diploma closed a 27-year gap in Bucholz' life. She was 16 when she quit school to help care for her younger brother, who was diagnosed with severe juvenile diabe-

"It upset me very much that I had to quit, but I spent so much time helping with my brother that I would miss a lot of school," Bucholz recalled. "I found out the school was going to fail me for the whole year, so I just decided to quit."

Only months after marrying Bad Axe resident Jerry Bucholz, her sweetheart of 4 years, 19-year-old Gloria was widowed when Jerry drowned in a gravel pit. Her brother also died from his continued illness.





Blitz

Urge participation in safety belt compaign

Motorists on Michigan city streets, county roads, and state highways will be the focus of a special law enforcement effort to increase

Alcohol a factor in crashes

According to 1989 Department of State Police statistics, 738 of the 1,630 traffic fatalities (45.3 percent) in Michigan were alcohol re-

lated. Alcohol was a factor in at least 34,000 traffic crashes which resulted in loss of life, personal injury or property damage. The University of Michigan Transportation Research Institute estimates the direct and indirect costs due to drunk driving exsafety belt use.

The program, entitled "The Blitz," involves state, county and local law enforcement agencies in paying special attention to the non-use or misuse of safety belts. Motorists not buckled up or having infants and children not buckled up can expect appropriate enforcement action.


The Blitz is a national usage campaign coordinated by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. It will be conducted during 6 target dates during the spring, summer and fall.

"It may sound cliche, but safety belts save lives. In Michigan, we spend more than \$750 million on medical costs due to the non-use of safety belts," Tuscola County Sheriff Tom Kern said. We want to make citizens aware that law enforce-

way when it comes to belt use. Whether failing to buckle up is a primary or secondary offense, we want the public to get used to using them. It's the law and they save lives."


The latest survey of safety belt use in Michigan indicates that 49.6 percent of motorists buckle up. Michigan's safety belt use laws helped increase compliance from 15 percent in 1965. The state's adult and child passenger safety belt laws resulted in 31,710 fewer deaths and injuries, level of 70 percent would


saving the state an estimated \$734.72 million. Experts predict that a compliance save 300 lives each year. Kern, who has been asked to coordinate the Blitz in Tuscola County, said he hopes to have all police agencies in the county participating in the campaign.









Public Notice - Weed Control

Notice is hereby given that the growing of noxious weeds on property within the Village of Cass City is prohibited by State law and any such weeds must be cut by the property owner, tenant, or occupant of the property on or before June 1, 1991, and again thereafter on or before August 15, 1991.

"Noxious weeds" include Canada thistle (Circium arvense), dodders (any species of Cuscuta), mustards (charlock, black mustard and Indian mustard, species of Brassica or Sinapis), wild carrot (Daucus carota), bindweed (Convolvulus arvensis), perennials sowthistle (Sonchus arvensis), hoary alyssum (Berteroa incana), ragweed (ambrosia elatior 1.) and poison ivy (rhus toxicodendron), poison sumac (toxicodendron vernix), oxeyes daisies, ragweed, goldenrod, or other plant which is recognized as deleterious to health, safety, or public welfare and recognized as common nuisance.

If the weeds are not cut, the Village will enter the property and do so, and all costs incurred shall be chargeable to the property owner, tenant or occupant, who may also be subject to prosecution and fine under State law.



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

As a wave of ominous looking clouds rolled in overhead Friday morning, Kingston Elementary School Principal Jim Franklin sat atop the school roof, with an umbrella leaning

against his chair and a portable radio at his side.

Below, small groups of students periodically stepped out of the school to see, peering upward, pointing and giggling.

Considering the weather, Franklin acknowledged his timing couldn't have been much worse, but he promised students he would sit on the roof if they scored high on a national reading test.

They did, and he did. Franklin, who has been in education for 31 years, also proved a point—his belief that low student scores aren't necessarily the result of poor teaching, as some critics say, but rather a lack of motivation in many in-

He noted that his promise was to spend an hour on the roof for each fourth, fifth and sixth grade class in which 70 percent or more of the students posted high scores on the Gate's Reading Test, a national reading exam. As additional incentive, Franklin said he would also give the students a pizza party.

Two groups, Doug Kramer's sixth grade class and Robert Ciure's sixth grade class, had the necessary test results to send Franklin out into the rain, from 9 to 11 a.m.

"What that says to me is (they were) motivated; they wanted a pizza party and they wanted the principal on the roof,"he joked, adding at least one other class camextremely close to keeping him on the roof for another

"I think motivation, and kids trying is really important," he concluded.

Asphalt plant proposed

Tuckey re-zoning hearing scheduled for May 28

operation of an asphalt plant on 75 acres of land south of M-81 and just west of Cass City will again be heard by the Elkland Township Zoning Board next week.

A hearing on the matter is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. May 28 at the Elkland Township Hall in Cass City.

This is property owner J.D. Tuckey's third attempt in less than a year to secure the zoning change for PTI Corp., which would own and operate the plant.

The proposal, first presented at a hearing in front of the township zoning board last August, meets all environmental concerns of the Department of Natural Resources. But several residents protested, voicing concerns regarding an increase in noise, dust and

A proposed zoning change truck traffic as well as how that would pave the way for such a plant would affect their land values. The board recommended against the rezoning following the 2hour hearing.

Later the same month, Tuckey asked village officials to annex the land, but no action was taken because not enough of the property abuts existing village boundaries to allow for annexation.

Since then, Tuckey has revised his proposal in an effort to address residents' concerns.

He told members of the Elkland Township Board last month that he has worked out an agreement with Wayne Rabideau, owner of Rabideau Farm Sales on M-81, to have trucks enter and leave the plant through the Rabideau property. The access road would be blacktopped and the area landscaped, he said. **Elkland Township Zoning** Administrator Anton Peters said the proposal also calls for the property to be cleaned up when the plant closes, leaving the land suitable for residential develop-

At next week's hearing, the township zoning board will consider rezoning the Tuckey property from A-1 Agricultural to M-1 Manufacturing/Distribution.

The change is needed to operate an asphalt plant, but not to remove gravel from the site, Peters noted, adding the right to take gravel off the property is not in ques-

Following the hearing, the zoning board will make a recommendation, which will then go to the Township Board for final action.

Throw the book at repeat offenders

Tougher drunken driving laws may become a reality if the state Legislature supports a 4-bill package which was introduced Tuesday. The proposals would create a mandatory 30-day license suspension without a restricted license

option for anyone convicted of drunk driving. Failing or refusing to take a Breathalyzer test would result in police immediately seizing the suspect's li-cense and allowing the driver a temporary license valid only until the trial date.

The bills would mandate prison terms for repeat offenders, create a new 15-year felony sentence for drunken drivers who kill someone and a 5year felony sentence for causing serious long-term injuries. In addition, the license revoca-

tion fee would increase from \$60 to \$90.

Mixed reactions on the issue of tougher laws was expressed by your neighbor, Betty Hurst.

While she admits driving under the influence of alcohol is a very serious offense, Hurst said she thinks young, firsttime offenders should receive positive, educational punishment instead of a prison sentence.

"Jail sometimes just scares kids without teaching them a lesson," said the Millington resident.

"Today's young people don't seem to respect the value of money, so just increasing the fines might not help either."

Tougher community service requirements, including making arrested youths accompany police officers to the scenes of automobile accidents which involved alcohol, might be more effective, she said.

"Take those kids out on police calls to bad wrecks and let them see firsthand what drunk driving can do," she added. However, for repeat offenders the authorities should, "throw the book at them."

The accident remains under investigation.


