"Little Caesars" building in Cass City

A Little Caesars restaurant will open in Cass City early next year, bringing about 18 new full and part-time jobs to the village.

The news was confirmed Monday by businessman and Port Austin resident Rick Fields, who along with his wife, Bev, owns and operates several other Little Caesars outlets in the Thumb and in 2 other states.

The Cass City store will be located behind Kelly & Co. Realty, 6451 Main St. The property and building will be leased to Fields by Kelly & Co. owner Kelly Smith.

Fields credits Smith's efforts with making it possible to establish a restaurant in Cass City, something he's been looking to do for some time. "We've always been interested in Cass City," he remarked.

Construction of the 1,300 square foot restaurant is scheduled to begin this week, with a grand opening slated for early 1992.

Fields said the restaurant will employ a total of about 20 persons, including managers, one of whom is from Cass City and currently works at his Caro location.

Fields and his wife have been with Little Caesars for more than 9 years. The couple currently own and operate a total of 13 outlets, including 6 in the Thumb — Bad Axe, Caro, Vassar, Caseville, Harbor Beach and Sebawaing. The couple's other 7 stores are located in Ohio and Indiana.

Petition filing deadline near

Area residents interested in seeking village office have less than 2 weeks to file nominating petitions.

The deadline for filing is 4 p.m. Nov. 26. Primary elections, if necessary, will be held Feb. 17, and the General Election will be conducted March 9.

In Cass City, nominating petitions are available at the village municipal building during regular business hours, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Voters will fill a total of 6 seats in the spring election. They are the 2-year posts

now held by village President L.E. Althaver, Clerk/Treasurer Joyce LaRoche and Assessor Dan Eria, and 3, 4-year trustee seats now held by Nat Tuttle, Joanne Hopper and Matt Prieskorn. LaRoche said persons interested in filing a nominating petition should obtain at least 7 to 10 signatures.

OTHER VILLAGES

The 4-year terms of 3 trustees, Thomas Reehl, Richard Carroll and William Ehrlich, are expiring in the

village of Gageton. Prospective candidates can pick up nominating petitions at the home of village Clerk Elery Sontag, 4580 State St., Apt 11, Gageton. In Kingston, voters will elect a village president, clerk, treasurer/assessor and 3 trustees, all for 2-year terms.

Currently serving in those positions, respectively, are Arlo Ruggles, Kenneth Boileau and Beverly J. Heron, and Paul Lalko, Daniel Westerby and Richard Filipek.

Nominating petitions are

available at the village office on Fridays, from 9 a.m. to noon and 1 to 4 p.m.

Uby officials whose terms are expiring include village President David Jaroch, Clerk Chris Tyll and Treasurer/Assessor Florence Schrader, and trustees William Roberts, Dan Lackowski and James Zulauf. Officers serve 2-year terms and trustees, 4-year terms.

Also to be decided are a pair of 6-year terms on the library board.

Evergreen School sold

School seeks entry in Thumb C loop

In a special meeting Thursday afternoon at the high school, the Cass City School Board voted to support an attempt to join with schools in the Thumb C League and made arrangements to abandon all claims to the closed Evergreen Township School building for \$10,000.

Supt. Ken Micklash said that the other 3 schools in the 4-school Blue Bay League are in agreement with the merger proposal. The teams are Bad Axe, Marlette and Lakers.

The board approved 2 possible merger plans, depending on what the Thumb C member schools desired. The first would be to allow the 4 schools to enter as members in a single division and the second, as a 2-division league with the 4 schools serving in one division.

With the 2-division set-up, the current 7 Thumb C Schools would remain in one division and continue to award trophies and honors based on the won-lost record of the 7 schools.

In the 2-division league, teams in each division would play each other with the results not counting for league honors.

The board agreed that "it is the intent (of Cass City Schools) to preserve the integrity and commitment of the seven Thumb C Schools, while at the same time having 11 Thumb Area Class C Schools get together for scheduling."

The board asked Thumb C representatives to meet to discuss details of a possible merger.

Reasons that were presented to representatives of the Thumb C League included the size of the schools. (All are class C.) Students are of similar backgrounds and interests.

Importantly, the schools are in the same geographic

area, resulting in reduced transportation costs for all districts and a healthy neighborhood rivalry that increases interest and athletic revenues, the petition said.

The Blue Bay League schools would like to see the combined leagues in operation either in the 1992-93 school year or the 1993-94 year.

EVERGREEN SCHOOL

The long, complicated legal tangle caused by the

unusual situation concerning the ownership of the Evergreen Township School building came to an end Monday in Sandusky.

The solution reached after 2 years of legal wrangling was to have the Cass City School District issue a quit claim deed to the property to Kent Parrott, representing the heirs of the Keyworth family, for \$10,000. The building was to have reverted to the family, according to the deed, if not used as a school. For giving up all claims, the school received

\$10,000.

After buying the quit claim deed, the heirs then sold the building to the Snover-Bethany Christian School, to be run by Mennonites, for \$18,000. In addition, the new owners agreed to pay for all legal fees.

Supt. Ken Micklash said that the school wanted to get out from under the maintenance, legal liability and other expenses connected with school ownership. In the long run the agreement probably is beneficial to all parties, he believes.

O-G okays television programs in classroom

The Owen-Gage Board of Education Monday approved participation in a program designed to incorporate educational television programming in the classroom.

The board approved joining a consortium composed of Huron County Intermediate School District schools

that would contract with an individual, Dennis Puvalowski, who plans to offer the schools access to educational and news programs on 4 channels via a wireless cable transmission system.

The schools control use of the channels, known as Instructional Television Fixed

Service channels.

Under the proposal, the schools would allow the channels to be activated for commercial as well as educational use, providing revenue to the program operator and a variety of educational programs to the schools.

The service, regulated by

Smith vows to keep family farm

Charles Smith grows wheat, oats and soybeans on the same land his great-grandfather cleared and worked more than 100 years ago.

The original 40 acres has since been expanded, and the house and farm buildings have undergone a few changes over the years, but the farm continues to serve as a strong reminder of his heritage and that of his son, Brian, who also is involved in the farming operation.

Charles says he isn't certain whether that tradition will continue in the future, but he hopes it will.

The 160-acre farm of his parents, Pearl and the late James A. Smith, was recently certified by the Michigan Historical Commission as a centennial farm.

A centennial farm, as defined by the Michigan Historical Commission, is a working farm of 10 or more acres that has been continuously owned by the same family for at least 100 years.

The Centennial Farm Program was established by the Michigan Historical Commission in the 1940s in cooperation with the Detroit Edison Company, Consum-

ers Power Company, local electrical cooperatives and farm groups.

Since 1948, the program has recognized some 6,000 centennial farms.


The Smith farm, located about 2 1/2 miles southeast of Argyle at 1230 Shabbona Rd., was purchased by James P. Smith in January 1890, according to Pearl Smith, Charles' mother.

The 40-acre tract cost \$250 — \$6.25 an acre, Pearl's daughter, Doris Timlin, noted. She added her great-grandfather and his wife, Emily, moved to the Thumb

The history of Cass City is the focus of a video now available to area residents.



Owen-Gage board okays loan bid

The Owen-Gage Board of Education last week approved the lowest of 2 bids submitted by financial institutions interested in lending the district \$250,000 on anticipated tax revenues.

School Supt. Harley Kirby said the board, during a special meeting Monday night, Nov. 4, selected First of America Bank, Bad Axe, which bid an interest rate of 4.49 percent.

A bid also was received from First National Bank, Bad Axe, which bid an interest rate of 4.74 percent.

Kirby said the loan interest cost to the district is expected to total \$4,583.

There's been a series of articles in one of the Detroit papers saying that deregulation has been a disaster for the airlines and the trucking industry.

The articles went on to tell about all the major airlines that have been forced out of business since deregulation while service has deteriorated and rates increased. The story made the same claim about freight lines.

Pointed out was the devastating loss in well-paying jobs in both industries as consolidation and bankruptcies continued.

That a bundle of well-paying jobs have gone down the tube is not open to question. Service and prices charged are another matter.

Before the deregulation of trucking the story was that the customers in the highly populated, large volume areas would receive lower rates and their poor cousins in towns like Cass City would pay higher rates for poorer service. That appears truer in the airline business

than the freight hauling business.

There's no way of really telling if rates would have increased more or less for trucking if the industry remained regulated.

I can say from personal experience that the service did not deteriorate with deregulation. In fact it's a whole lot better for the Chronicle than it was when companies operated in restricted areas and trucks would whip down M-81 to M-53 on the way to Bad Axe and be prohibited by law from delivering as much as a sheet of paper in Cass City. With a monopoly they didn't need to please the customer.

But with deregulation, as the financial crunch became acute, there was a change in the service by the drivers.

To illustrate let me tell you about a personal experience. This was back in the days when the staff knocked-off for dinner all at once. It was raining and the truck stopped to deliver a bulky, heavy bundle of paper. When the driver learned that the woman in the office was unable to help, he tossed the bundle off the back of his truck and took off. Never, I mean never, would a driver condescend to carry any freight farther than the tailgate of his truck.

Contrast that to today, when every driver that comes here bends over backwards to help unload any way he can. They know that if the customer is not happy the next load will come from a competing company. No freight to haul, no job.

There is regret that the good jobs are no longer there like they were. But in the long run it's hard to say if they would have been there anyway. Inefficient operations don't last long in these days of global competition.

Not most places anyway, Washington D.C. excepted.



Warm memories

MRS. THOMPSON'S KIDS

For 30 years, until her sudden death from a heart attack last week at age 67, hundreds of little children received the right stuff, with love, at "Mrs. Thompson's nursery school" in Lapeer. The wife of a successful physician, John Thompson, Doris didn't teach because she needed the job. She did it because she so obviously enjoyed being with little children.

I always thought her loving attitude had much to do with the worst tragedy of all: Doris and John had four children but two of them died when they were very young.

Death and Lapeer, where I lived for 25 years, have been much on my mind lately. A few days before the Presbyterian Church was jammed for Doris' funeral, it was equally jammed for the funeral of Joe Gwinn, local hardware dealer taken by cancer before his 60th birthday. For many years, I sold advertising to Joe and wrote about his many civic activities. When they were young, one of Joe's daughters was the best friend of one of my daughters; they were a guitar-playing singing duo, perched on stage on bar stools awkwardly transported from my basement saloon. A relationship like that provides memories that remain forever warm.

ANOTHER FRIEND IS GONE

And a few days after Joe died, so did Bill Small, 68, retired owner of a printing company. There was a pleasant time when we worked on the same newspaper, played golf and poker together, and laughed an awful lot. Actually, Bill giggled. I can hear him now; a nice man.

This is personal grieving that perhaps I should keep to myself. Everybody suffers the loss of friends, especially as the years tick beyond 60, and there's certainly nothing special about the dull aches I feel. My excuse is the preachy question:

We are daily reminded of how brief and uncertain life is, so why aren't we nicer to each other while we have the chance?

Also, there is the special value of a good teacher, like Doris Thompson, who touches so many lives. Ferd, my daughter of the bar stools, is only one of hundreds with good reason to remember Doris with loving appreciation. The following quotation, from Ernest Samuels' 1973 "The Education of Henry Adams," was given to me by Ferd, for Doris, and for all the other saintly teachers:

"A teacher affects eternity; he can never tell where his influence stops."



Peck eliminates O-G in Thumb D title race

Now it is merely a matter of playing out the season. Peck, the North Central Thumb D League leader, eliminated the Owen-Gage Bulldogs from title contention with its 56-47 decision over the Bulldogs Tuesday, Nov. 5.

All that remains is a game to have been played Tuesday at Akron-Fairgrove and the season-ender against Caseville at home Friday.

The game with Akron-Fairgrove looms important because the 2 teams are in the same district in next week's tournament. The final against winless Caseville will serve as a final tune-up prior to the tourney.

Fouls and foul shots were the key to the game, Coach Dean Roller said. The team was hurt in the first half when both Lori Ondrajka and Jill Susalla were forced to the bench with 3 fouls. For

the game, the Bulldogs were whistled for infractions 23 times and Peck cashed in on 18 of 28 attempts. Owen-Gage was 9 of 18. Both teams scored 19 field goals.





Sentence Mayville man to 10-15 years in jail

A Mayville man was sentenced Friday to 10 years to 15 years in prison for a jury verdict of guilty to third degree criminal sexual conduct.

According to Tuscola County Circuit Court records, the defendant, Daniel A. Binkowski, 43, engaged in sexual penetration with a person, using force or coercion, Sept. 30, 1990, in Fremont Township.

Others sentenced Friday were:

*Inmate Frederick A. Taylor, 29, was ordered to serve a prison term of 6 months to 5 years for his plea of guilty to prison escape.

The sentence is to run consecutive to sentencing already imposed on the defendant, who escaped from the Camp Tuscola Correctional Facility, Caro, Oct. 20.

*John D. Thompson, 18, of Auburn Hills, was sentenced to one year in the county jail for his plea of guilty to unlawfully driving away an

automobile belonging to Sherry E. Vaughan.

The offense occurred April 26 in Fremont Township, court records state.

*Roger L. McKnight, 33, Caro, was sentenced to 3 years probation and 6 months in the county jail for his plea of guilty to arson of personal property valued at more than \$50.

McKnight, who was granted permission to participate in the work release program, was also ordered to undergo mental health and substance abuse counseling, and to pay a \$200 fine, \$200 in court costs, restitution totalling \$400 and a \$30 victim crime fee.

According to court records, McKnight's offense occurred July 2 in Caro and involved a dumpster.

*Kenneth A. Warren, 21, Clio, was sentenced for his plea of guilty to one count of assault with a dangerous weapon.

He was ordered to serve 3 years probation and 180 days in jail, and to pay a \$500 fine, court costs of \$500 plus attorneys fees, and a \$30 victim crime fee.

Warren was charged with assaulting Ana M. Edenburn with a pistol June 22 in Arbel Township, court records state.

*Gregory Myers, 36, of Fairgrove, was sentenced to 36 months probation and 120 days in jail, with work release, for his plea of no contest to third degree criminal sexual conduct.

Myers also was ordered to pay a \$500 fine, \$500 in court costs plus attorneys fees, and a \$30 victim crime fee.

Court records state he was charged with engaging in sexual contact with a person, using force or coercion, Feb. 12, 1988, in Fairgrove Township.

*Leo G. Zarko, 28, Vassar, was sentenced for his plea of guilty to attempted manufacturing of marijuana July 3 in Vassar.

Zarko was ordered to serve 2 years probation and 30 days in jail, with work release, and to pay \$200 in court costs plus attorneys fees, a \$200 fine and a \$30 victim crime fee.

*Raymond L. Philo, 24, Millington, also was sentenced to 30 days in jail.

Aside from jail time, he was ordered to attend substance abuse counseling, and to remain on probation.

Althaver, the village president, told the association what Cass City had to offer in services and recreational activities. Althaver also explained parts of the village's master plan.

Hutchinson, Rawson Memorial librarian, told the group of resources available at the library, while Anthony, a representative from Hills & Dales Hospital, spoke briefly on health care in the area.

Koylton people punished for upholding zoning laws

Dear Editor,

I would like to commend Vassar for making the choice to give up its autonomy.

I had hoped your decision to accept Pioneer Work and Learn would encourage the PWLC to stop its continual punishment of Koylton Township residents for wanting to uphold their zoning laws.

Some examples of punishments? Koylton Township has spent in excess of \$70,000 to uphold its zoning laws. Judges from the local to the highest state courts have said that Pioneer Work and Learn has been operating in violation of the township zoning laws.

Mr. Wollack, executive director of PWLC, seems to sue those who speak loudest against his activities. He sued me for \$1.5 million, but seemingly the case was dropped ("without prejudice") because of pressure from the Department of Social Services and their refusal to reimburse Wollack for the court action against me. Wollack threatened, in a letter to Senator Welborn (R-District 13), to sue another resident if she continued to speak out against the camp, and at an October zoning hearing, he threatened yet another.

In a letter to the editor of the Tuscola County Advertiser, Feb. 7, 1990, Wollack described the paper's 6-year editor as "inexperienced" because Brett McLaughlin spoke out against Wollack and his activities in Koylton Township. Thus the punishment continues.

A word to Vassar. To keep your community intact and save money, let Wollack have his way. Congratulations, Vassar.

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

HELP FOR PMS

Premenstrual syndrome, or PMS, begins 7-10 days before menstruation and has a wide variety of symptoms which include headaches, dizziness, palpitations, abdominal distention, cramps, swelling and arthritis-like symptoms.

The cause of PMS isn't known, but suggested causes are high levels of prostaglandins or prolactin (both hormones), excessive caffeine, or a lack of vitamin B6 or magnesium.

What can you do about it? Dietary changes often help. First, stop using caffeine. This means no coffee, tea, caffeine-containing soft drinks or chocolate. If you must cheat, you may have a little chocolate and decaffeinated coffee.

You should limit salt, which is high in most packaged and canned foods and in restaurant food. A mild diuretic may help to decrease the salt and fluid retention. Nutritious meals and a couple of high protein snacks, such as unsalted peanuts or yogurt, are advisable.

Birth control pills help in many people. They are an excellent choice when birth control is also needed. Progesterone (a female hormone) can help with weight gain and other symptoms.

Vitamin B6 in the last half of the cycle appears to help some women and is inexpensive and has very few side effects. A vitamin and mineral supplement which includes magnesium may be considered.

Aspirin, ibuprofen, and other pain pills are helpful in relieving the headaches, aching and arthritis-like symptoms.

from Moore Township, Ontario, Canada.

Family members haven't been able to find a great deal of information about James and Emily and their journey to Sanilac County, but they know the couple farmed the land and raised some livestock.

At the time of their arrival, the couple already had one young son, Robert, who had been born in Canada. The Smiths later had another son, Oliver, and a daughter, also named Pearl.

Tragedy struck the family while the children were still young, according to Doris, who explained Emily died

of what was known as consumption. Doris' grandfather, Oliver, was only 6 years old at the time.

"He never remarried," she said. "He raised 3 children all by himself."
"He took care of them himself. Just neighbors helped him out," Pearl added.

Oliver married Christine Hutson and the couple had 5 children; James A., Katherine, Ina, Mary Lee and Grace.

Pearl said she married James A. Smith June 30, 1938, in the Snover area. Aside from Doris and Charles, the couple had 2 more sons, Dwane and Larry, and a daughter, Kathy.

Pearl, who noted her husband died in 1986, commented that over the years, the farming operation has included raising dry beans, soybeans, wheat, corn and oats, as well as several head of cattle, chickens and pigs. "Charles has been working (the farm) since his dad took sick," she continued.

Pearl hopes the family farming tradition will continue, although she isn't certain whether any of her 10 grandchildren and 3 great-grandchildren will take over in the years to come.

One thing is certain, and that's the tradition will continue for now, according to Charles.

"As long as I'm alive it will," he concluded.

He later explained that a recording of meetings would provide an accurate record of board discussions and actions regarding matters that could lead to litigation.

Kirby told the board he will investigate legal implications of taping recording meetings.
