A Little Caesars restaurant will open in Cass City early next year, bringing about 18 new full and part-time jobs to the village.

The news was confirmed Monday by businessman and Port Austin resident Rick Fields, who along with his wife, Bev, owns and operates several other Little Caesars outlets in the Thumb and in 2 other states. The Cass City store will be located behind Kelly & Co. Realty, 6451 Main St. The property and building will be leased to Fields by Kelly & Co. owner Kelly Smith.

Fields credits Smith's etforts with making it possible to establish a restaurant in Cass City, something he's been looking to do for some time. "We've always been interested in Cass City," he remarked.

Construction of the 1,300 square foot restaurant is scheduled to begin this week, with a grand opening slated for early 1992.

Fields said the restaurant will employ a total of about 20 persons, including managers, one of whom is from Cass City and currently works at his Caro location.

Fields and his wife have been with Little Caesars for more than 9 years. The couple currently own and operate a total of 13 outlets, including 6 in the Thumb —

Bad Axe. Caro. Vassar. Caseville, Harbor Beach and Sebewaing. The couple's other 7 stores are located in Ohio and Indiana.

School seeks entry in Thumb C loop

In a special meeting Thurs- area, resulting in reduced day afternoon at the high transportation costs for all school, the Cass City School Board voted to support an attempt to join with schools in the Thumb C League and made arrangements to abandon all claims to the closed schools would like to see the School building for \$10,000.

Supt. Ken Micklash said that the other 3 schools in the 4-school Blue Bay League are in agreement with the merger proposal. The teams are Bad Axe, Marlette and Lakers.

The board approved 2 possible merger plans, depending on what the Thumb C member schools desired. The first would be to allow the 4 schools to enter as members in a single division and the second, as a 2-division league with the 4 schools serving in one divi-

With the 2-division set-up, the current 7 Thumb C Schools would remain in one division and continue to award trophies and honors based on the won-lost record of the 7 schools.

In the 2-division league, teams in each division would play each other with the results not counting for league honors.

The board agreed that "it is the intent (of Cass City Schools) to preserve the integrity and commitment of the seven Thumb C Schools. while at the same time having 11 Thumb Area Class C Schools get together for scheduling.

The board asked Thumb C representatives to meet to discuss details of a possible merger.

Reasons that were presented to representatives of the 'Thumb C League included the size of the schools. (All are class C.) Students are of similar backgrounds and interests.

The Owen-Gage Board of Education Monday approved participation in a program designed to incorporate educational television programming in the classroom.

The board approved joining a consortium composed of Huron County Intermediate School District schools that would contract with an individual, Dennis Puvalowski, who plans to offer the schools access to educational and news programs on 4 channels via a wireless cable transmission

system. The schools control use of the channels, known as Instructional Television Fixed

Service channels.

Under the proposal, the schools would allow the channels to be activated for commercial as well as educational use, providing revenue to the program operator and a variety of educational programs to the schools.

Smith vows to keep family farm

Charles Smith grows wheat, oats and soybeans on the same land his greatgrandfather cleared and worked more than 100 years

The original 40 acres has since been expanded, and the house and farm buildings have undergone a few changes over the years, but the farm continues to serve as a strong reminder of his heritage and that of his son, Brian, who also is involved in the farming operation.

Charles says he isn't certain whether that tradition will continue in the future, but he hopes it will.

The 160-acre farm of his parents, Pearl and the late James A. Smith, was recently certified by the Michigan Historical Commission as a centennial

A centennial farm, as defined by the Michigan Historical Commission, is a working farm of 10 or more acres that has been continuously owned by the same family for at least 100 years.

The Centennial Farm Program was established by the Michigan Historical Commission in the 1940s in cooperation with the Detroit Edison Company, Consumers Power Company, local electrical cooperatives and farm groups.

Since 1948, the program has recognized some 6,000 centennial farms.

The Smith farm, located about 2 1/2 miles southeast of Argyle at 1230 Shabbona Rd., was purchased by James P. Smith in January 1890, according to Pearl



Ushers were Virgil Messing and Kenneth Messing, both uncles of the bride. At the reception held at the St. Columbkille Church





There's been a series of articles in one of the Detroit papers saying that deregulation has been a disaster for the airlines and the trucking industry.

The articles went on to tell about all the major airlines that have been forced out of business since deregulation while service has deteriorated and rates increased. The story made the same claim about freight lines.

Pointed out was the devstating loss in well-paying jobs in both industries as consolidation and bankruptcies continued.

That a bundle of wellpaying jobs have gone down the tube is not open to question. Service and prices charged are another matter.

Before the deregulation of trucking the story was that the customers in the highly populated, large volume areas would receive lower rates and their poor cousins in towns like Cass City would pay higher rates for poorer service. That appears truer in the airline business

There's no way of really telling if rates would have increased more or less for trucking if the industry remained regulated.

I can say from personal experience that the service did not deteriorate with deregulation. In fact it's a whole lot better for the Chronicle than it was when companies operated in restricted areas and trucks would whip down M-81 to M-53 on the way to Bad Axe and be prohibited by law from delivering as much as a sheet of paper in Cass City. With a monopoly they didn't need to please the

customer. But with deregulation, as the financial crunch became acute, there was a change in the service by the drivers.

To illustrate let me tell you about a personal experience. This was back in the days when the staff knocked-off for dinner all at once. It was raining and the truck stopped to deliver a bulky, heavy bundle of paper. When the driver learned that the woman in the office was unable to help, he tossed the bundle off the backend of his truck and took off. Never, I mean never, would a driver condescend to carry any freight farther than the

tailgate of his truck. Contrast that to today, when every driver that comes here bends over backwards to help unload any way he can. They know that if the customer is not happy the next load will come from a competing company. No freight to haul, no job.

There is regret that the good jobs are no longer there like they were. But in the long run it's hard to say if they would have been there anyway. Inefficient operations don't last long in these days of global competition. Not most places anyway,







'Almost overwhelming'

Geneva Richards recalls recent journey to Israel

To hear Geneva Richards talk about her recent trip to Israel is to hear a fast-paced, interesting description of places, people and impres-

Names and details flow from her mouth, painting word pictures that reveal aspects of life in the war torn region not seen on television news programs.

Like many others before her, Richards enjoyed visiting the Holy Land. But her interests in visiting Israel ranged from international olitics to her own family nistory, as well as her religious roots.

"Israel seems to be a focal point in anything that happens in the world, and it's just a small place," she observed.

Recent international events have proven that true, with Israel becoming a focal point during the Persian Julf War and, more recently, the historical Mideast peace talks in Madrid, Spain.

Richards, whose 2-week trip began Sept. 16, noted she was there during talks between the United States trip involved 157 people, led and Israel regarding aid to help Israel accommodate the influx of Russian Jews returning to their homeland.

'Everywhere we went, there were scads of them,' she said. "We saw (Secretary of State James) Baker and his car going out as we were coming in.

Politics aside, Richards said the trip allowed her to get a close look at a part of her family history. In fact, her ties to Israel are what led to the once-in-a-lifetime experience.

She explained that ancestors on her mother's side of the family were among a group of people who sailed from Jonesport, Maine, to old Jaffa (Modern Tel Aviv) in 1866 with the intention of establishing a colony there.

FORERUNNERS

The expedition is detailed in a book entitled, "The Forerunners," written by Dr. Reed Holmes, a neighbor of Richards when she lived in Independence, Mo.

by a man by the name of George Adams, who sailed to Jaffa on the clipper ship Bark Nellie Chapin.

The people, Richards said, weren't Jews, but rather new world Christians who "really, truly believed that (a reunited) Jewish nation would come to be in Israel, and they wanted to be the forerunners" in helping the Biblical prophesy come to

"Men, women, children and businessmen bought the ship, outfitted it with grain, fruit and (farm) implements to start a colony. They sold all their businesses, gave up everything," she remarked, adding they also took prefabricated wood and timber from Maine to build houses.

The colony was established, but hard times fell on the colonists. They were treated badly upon their arrival and faced a cholera epidemic and a monsoon. Richards said Adams became so discouraged that he began to drink and carry on, a source of embarrassment to his followers.

NO SHAME

Many of the descendants of those pioneers didn't want to talk about the expedition because of that embarrassment. But Holmes, in his book, sought to show that the pioneer's efforts did a lot of good, and that there was nothing to be ashamed about, Richards explained.

Earlier this summer, Holmes contacted Richards and asked her to take the trip to Israel and represent her ancestors at a ceremony celebrating the expedition, and restoration of one of 22 houses built by the colonists. The house has been restored as a historical landmark.

Richards agreed to go and, along with some friends, toured the country in a

"I looked on so many things," she said of the trip, which consisted of a lot of walking. She described the country as "a lot of old and new mixed together." The countryside, she added, appeared to be one hill after another.

NO WIMP

"When they said Jesus walked the hills - They're (talking about) mountains," she joked. "I'll tell you, Jesus couldn't have been a wimp."

'I saw the area where Samson took the jawbone of an ass and slew all those people. We drove the Gaza Strip and the Golan Heights," she recalled, adding she also visited a hillside where Jesus is believed to have preached. "That was one of the nicest, quietest experiences I had."

Richards also saw the Dead Sea, Sea of Galilee, Judea, Jericho, Mount of Olives, Gethsemane, Samaria and the Massada. The list goes on and on

"It made more sense, for me, to see the history - to feel it," she commented.

Today, Israel and its people are quite modern, the food wonderful and the dress very similar to that seen here. The cities, which utilize solar power, have modern buildings and asphalt streets. "All their traffic signs are just like ours," she pointed out, noting the signs are marked in both Hebrew and English.

FRIENDLY

The people, she continued, were surprisingly friendly.

Richards said she found Jews and Arabs alike able and more than willing to speak English. Unlike people in some countries, she remarked, "They were not rude to you."

"I never, ever once was afraid," she said. Asked by some if she had some fear

about traveling to the Mideast, she replies, "I'm just as afraid to go to Detroit or Saginaw, anymore."

Of the Israeli people, Richards commented: "When you see them, they look happy. They're beautiful people, and they love their children and their families. I was impressed a lot with that."

She recalled a great deal of activity in the streets at night, when people escape crowded conditions indoors and go outside to eat, visit, chat and walk. Young families would go out with their children, who were really well behaved.

"I just really enjoyed watching" the people, Richards said. She pointed out she went on the trip without prejudice against Jew or Arab, and wanted to visit places of importance to both peoples.

"It was sort of an inspiration. They live under siege, (yet) they make the most of what they've got. They've got determination. They have a great respect for their country and their history."

She indicated that getting an impression of Israel by watching a news report on a violent murder would be the same as deciding what Michigan is like based on a similar news report.

"To see the country as a whole makes me feel better," she added.

Looking back at her trip, Richards remarked, "I feel totally fulfilled. The opportunities I had to be part of such contrasts."

Even without saying so, it's evident Richards will never forget her experiences in Israel.

The glow in her face, the shine in her eyes and the never-fading smile on her face as she describes the people and places make it clear the trip made a very real impression, one that will last a lifetime.

"It's almost overwhelming sometimes," she remarked as tears welled up in her

"I feel like I've been enriched by it."



HELP FOR

Premenstrual syndrome, or PMS, begins 7-10 days before menstruation and has a wide variety of symptoms which include headaches, dizziness, palpitations, abdominal distention, cramps, swelling and arthritislike symptoms.

The cause of PMS isn't known, but suggested causes are high levels of prostaglandins or prolactin (both hormones), excessive caffeine, or a lack of vitamin B6 or magnesium.

What can you do about it? Dietary changes often help. First, stop using caffeine. This means no coffee, tea, caffeine-containing soft drinks or chocolate. if you must cheat, you may have a little chocolate and decaf-

feinated coffee. You should limit salt, which is high in most packaged and canned foods and in restaurant food. A mild diuretic may help to decrease the salt and fluid retention. Nutritious meals and a couple of high protein snacks, such as unsalted peanuts or yogurt, are advis-

Birth control pills help in many people. They are an excellent choice when birth control is also needed. Progesterone (a female hormone) can help with weight gain and other symptoms.

Vitamin B6 in the last half of the cycle appears to help some women and is inexpensive and has very few side effects. A vitamin and mineral supplement which includes magnesium may be considered.

Aspirin, ibuprofen, and other pain pills are helpful in relieving the headaches, aching and arthritis-like symptoms. Always discuss treatment options with your doctor.
